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Another question was where the extra trash would be dumped. County manager Suzanne Cox said the present county dump will soon reach capacity.

Hightower questioned the fairness of a county-wide trash assessment to provide services mainly to those in more populated areas of the county.

Karn directed Krieg to look at the costs of additional dumpsters and the assessments for the usage areas.

A footnote to the discontinuance of Ruidoso services to county residents: The Ruidoso Village Council decided in its meeting Tuesday night to not discontinue present trash services to those outside of village limits.

Commissioners formed a road review committee to make a recommendation for a request to open a new county road in the Loma Grande, Maggado Creek Estates area. Leota Pfingston, Bill Rawlins, Patsy Sanchez and Frankie Silva, as alternate, were selected.

—Approved the professional/technical services contract with New Horizons Developmental Center, Inc.

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Property owners given favorable treatment by P&Z Commission

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In a memo dated August 8, village manager Frank Potter lined out the DRC to form more effective and less time-consuming review, discussion and coordination of planning. He recommended the planning administrator, building inspector, village engineer, fire chief and heads of Water, Street, Sewer and Parks and Recreation departments comprise the DRC.

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"It formalizes what we do now," said Cleatus Richards, planning administrator. "It gives me more strength to get those recommendations (from department heads)," he added.

White continued to voice concern over the authority placed in the hands of staff, and the commission finally recommended establishing

DRC as a sub-committee of P&Z with no authority to make field decisions.

Also Monday, the commission endorsed plans by Richards to ask council for permission to undertake a service demand survey.

Richards said the 1990 census will not provide the type of information he'll be seeking from Water Department customers. He said the information will be helpful in planning.

Assistant village attorney Mike Runnels presented a proposed zoning code amendment prohibiting billboards or other off-premise signs relating to a business not located within village limits or within the two-mile extra-territorial area.

Runnels said the five-year amortization is just compensation for businesses affected by the proposed ordinance.

"What you're saying is that you're not going to have any signs in Ruidoso that don't have anything to do with Ruidoso," noted Runnels,

adding the proposal still will be "fine-tuned."

Runnels also commented on the upcoming paving project along Mechem Drive.

"It's a massive project that will have a detrimental affect on a number of businesses," said Runnels.

In other regular business the commission:

—Approved a replat of Lot 5, Block 5, Cree Meadow Heights, Unit 1.

—Approved variances on Lot 8A, Block 2, Town and Country Estates; and also approved site development plans submitted by owner Leland Bartlett for that lot.

Bartlett plans to open a water softener business in that location.

—Set a public hearing for the next regular meeting, at 2 p.m. September 19, on a proposed nuisance ordinance.

Commissioners Candyce Garrett, Peggy Jordan and Ellen Long were absent Monday.

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"For about three percent of this town to be disgruntled at all times, I think it's ridiculous to keep spending money," said Mayor Davis. "You take several financial institution coffee rooms and blow them up and you don't have even one percent who's unhappy," said Davis.

"All it's going to really do is settle once and for all..." began Junge before Davis interrupted saying: "it's going to spend \$10,000 and it's not going to do a thing."

Later in the meeting, Clyde Emmons, a part-time resident and a water resource engineer, praised Ruidoso's water system.

"Whatever it cost to develop that water, it's worth it. Don't back up, you did a good job," said Emmons, whose presentation earned applause from the mayor, council and audience.

Emmons was at the meeting on behalf of Cree Meadows Country Club offering to sell surplus water from wells located on the golf course. His proposal was passed on to administration.

The council delayed action on a community center after hearing an offer on the True Value Hardware building on Mechem Drive. Real estate agent James Paxton, speaking on behalf of the owner, detailed how the village could purchase the building and 2.6 acres of land for \$68,000 less than the building's appraised value—paying nothing for the land.

"I understand ... there's an

urgency about it," said Pirelli, asking Paxton to request an extension on his September 15 deadline.

"I don't exactly want to say close the door on the situation," added Pirelli, noting the True Value building may be another alternative to the proposal for developing a center at the old airport land.

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Paxton agreed to ask the owner of the 40,000 square-foot building to consider extending the deadline on the \$743,520 offer, and to discuss a lease agreement.

Discussions over developing a facility at the old airport land were delayed after Councillor J.D. James announced Ralph Petty was unable to attend and make a presentation on behalf of the Economic Development Advisory Board.

Pirelli called for a moratorium on any action involving a community center until all the proposals can be heard and evaluated.

After a lengthy discussion on communication, Junge persuaded the council to establish a study session before each meeting, beginning at 3 p.m. Tuesday, September 13.

"We have sorely lacked communication since this election," said Junge. He said the four-man council that served from 1982-84 regularly had study sessions and it worked very well until the four were recalled in March 1984.

"Let me tell you how well it worked," said Junge listing accomplishments that include design and financing for Grindstone Canyon Dam, the Police Complex, city vehicle-maintenance barn, hot mix plant, pool slide, trash compactor.

"All those six projects were completed by the council and it was dedicated to discussion, talks and communication and that's all it

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

December is the "free admission" month for Otero and Lincoln Counties.

Besides the County Recognition Days, the museum also will give free admission to all New Mexico residents on the first Monday of the month for the remainder of 1988, unless that day is a holiday. Free Mondays are September 12, October 3, November 7, December 5 and on Christmas Day and New Year's Day. For County Recognition Day, residents of the counties being admitted free during a specific month must show their driver's license to enter the museum without charge. This applies to free Mondays, also. Museum hours are from 9 a. m. to 5 p. m.

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

Buddy Bundick, representative, said EDCLC has been working on inquiries and is organizing a workshop for all county governments. Bundick also said a state grant for \$12,500 for advertising EDCLC was approved. The grant will be discussed at the next EDCLC meeting September 8 in Lincoln.

—Approved the continuance of the Alpine Village Sanitation District Tax Levy.

—Accepted the final budget approval for the 77th Fiscal Year from the New Mexico Department of Finance and Administration. Adjustments were made for beginning cash balances and certain road department receipts, said Cox.

—Approved a change order for the Sierra Blanca Airport access road for asphalt prime coat and additional seed for the right-of-ways.

—Approved a year's lease for the magistrate court office space within the Lincoln County Courthouse in Carrizozo.

home for a five-day rest. Hot Shot member Clifton Perkins said the work is hard and physically demanding. The crew has two power saws and each man has hand tools—shovel, poleax (a type of pick) and pack.

As the Hot Shots are on the front lines of the fires, they are


transported there in various ways. Perkins said they sometimes hike into the fire, other times they ride a helicopter or horses; any way that will take them to the front lines.

The Mescalero fire crews were the first Indian fire fighting units in the United States. After the success of the Mescalero crews, more Indian groups joined the ranks of fire fighters, Perkins said. There

are nine crews from Mescalero presently and another is being formed.

New Mexico fire fighters comprise many of the crews battling blazes throughout the United States.

For now, the Hot Shots rest briefly, then it is back to the front lines of the forest fire battles.



Property owners given favorable treatment by P&Z Commission

The Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) approved several requests from property owners Monday.

During a special meeting, scheduled to replace the first September session, commissioners also adopted a procedures manual, discussed a proposed nuisance ordinance and recommended establishing a Development Review Committee (DRC).

"One step and P&Z would be out of business," said Commissioner John White, worrying aloud that the DRC would take over P&Z duties and make decisions in the field.

In a memo dated August 8, village manager Frank Potter lined out the DRC to form more effective and less time-consuming review, discussion and coordination of planning. He recommended the planning administrator, building inspector, village engineer, fire chief and heads of Water, Street, Sewer and Parks and Recreation departments comprise the DRC.

The group will meet at 9 a.m. the second and fourth Wednesday of each month to review matters on the P&Z agenda.

"It formalizes what we do now," said Cleatus Richards, planning administrator. "It gives me more strength to get those recommendations (from department heads)," he added.

White continued to voice concern over the authority placed in the hands of staff, and the commission finally recommended establishing

DRC as a sub-committee of P&Z with no authority to make field decisions.

took," said Junge.

He went on to detail how following councils entered into questionable contracts and spent \$2.5 million on water projects that he said could have been saved through better communication and discussion—by having study sessions.

"Decisions are made without discussion or thought on the effect of what the decision is going to be," said Junge, adding he believes if the four-member council had not been recalled they would have saved the village a great deal of money.

The study sessions will be open to the public and attendance will be voluntary.

"I don't want to sit here and be responsible for previous councils," said James, recalling how he questioned various aspects of the Eagle Creek project and the pipeline.

Mayor Davis explained why he supports bringing fresh water into the system through a pipeline in-

stead of down the creek bed, noting the \$750,000 for the line is less than would be spent on treating the water.

"I can remember in 1939 when the Wingfields put in a bathtub right next to the Village Hardware and everybody in Ruidoso, instead of being out saying, 'My goodness, isn't that grand that they've put in a bathtub,' they said, 'what in the Hell do they want with indoor plumbing,' and we still have that attitude," said Davis. "I think it would be nice if we someday stood up and said, 'hey ain't it nice that somebody's doing something nice for the community,'" he added.

In other regular business Tuesday, the council:

—Unanimously approved a vacation of right of way on River Drive at 50 cents a square foot.

—Learned that no bids were received for a side-loading refuse packer. Purchasing agent Fonda Hazel said she'll rework the specifications and rebid the equipment.

—Awarded the bid to provide a 1989 12-passenger van for the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport to the low bidder, Reliable Chevrolet of Albuquerque at \$14,787.02. The village received six bids varying from the low to \$19,499.

—Voted unanimously to double the magistrate court lease in the Police Complex from \$250 to \$500 a month. Varley said he analyzed the cost versus rent, and determined the village was losing money on the lease.

—Agreed to lease a small amount of land near Grindstone Canyon Dam to James Townsend to continue to operate Grindstone Riding Stable. The agreement is retroactive to May and will continue through September at \$30 a month.

Davis explained that the stable was in operation under an agreement with the former owners of the property the village recently purchased. He said Townsend leases other land, with only a portion of

his operation on village property.

—Approved mayoral appointments, Personnel Board, Hugh Johnson; Parks and Recreation Committee, Danny Sisson; Lodgers Tax Advisory Board, Bill McBeth; Planning and Zoning Commission, Frank Kolb; Economic Development Advisory Board, Bill Hirschfeld.

—Agreed unanimously to continue trash pickup outside village limits in areas where it was initiated some years ago. Davis said those customers pay more for the service than village residents.

—Went into executive session on pending litigation.

Councillors Larry Simon and Tom McNeil were absent Tuesday attending the New Mexico Municipal League meeting in Grants. Also absent were village manager Frank Potter, village clerk Tammie Maddox and Infrastructure Division director Becky Bell-Durham.

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
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




Number 11 Tino Gallegos brings the ball goal cinched the game for the Tigers, 20-13. (Photos by Doris Cherry)

Tigers trample Cardinals

The Capitan Tigers roared their way to victory Friday night with a 20-13 win against the 2-A Eunice Cardinals.

Interceptions won the game for the Tigers as Eunice slipped around on the wet turf Friday night. The Cardinals scored two touchdowns to the Tigers' one by the time the clock neared the half-time mark. But that soon changed with an interception by Dallas DeWees at 3:35 minutes remaining in the first half. The interception changed the course of the game as DeWees carried the ball 50 yards to a touchdown. The successful kick evened the score at the half-time whistle.

The Tigers continued to try for another touchdown in the second

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

Also expected to draw significant support at the parimutuel windows is Tommy Joe Hoyt's Just



And they're off... The richest quarter horse race in the world—the 1988 All American Futurity—is set for 4:14 p.m. Monday, September 5, at the Ruidoso Downs Race Track.

At stake is \$1 million when ten top two-year-olds leave the gates and head around the track for the 440-yard race. The gross purse for this, the 30th running of the All American, is a whopping \$2.5 million, with the finals purse totaling \$2 million.

With qualifying times of from 21.500 to 21.845, the 1988 All American promises to be the best yet. Top horses from California to New York will join the southwestern-bred animals in their race for \$1 million.

One of two California-bred finalists, Our Special Girl campaigned all summer on the west coast. With 11 career races under her belt, she and Merganser bring the most experience into the final. Our Special Girl seems to get better with each try, finishing seventh in the June 18 Kindergarten Futurity at Los Alamitos, then running fourth to Sig Hanson in the Dash For Cash Futurity on July 16.

Layton rode See Me Do It for the second-fastest time in the trials, and Super De Kas for the ninth-fastest qualifying time. "Right now I have no idea who I'll ride back in the final," said Layton. "See Me Do It and Super De Kas have about the same kind of speed and they both have a fighting chance to win the final," he added. Layton said early this week he'll work both contenders and then make his decision. The 1988 All American Futurity winner will take home \$1 million, but the rest of the field won't go home empty-handed. The second-place finisher will take home \$343,500; the third, \$153,500; fourth, \$105,500; fifth, \$77,500; sixth, \$73,500; seventh, \$69,500; eighth, \$65,500; ninth, \$60,500; and tenth, \$51,000.

State loses round in John Connally action

New Mexico lost the first round in efforts to pull former Texas Governor John Connally's million-dollar personal papers into his bankruptcy, according to published reports.

New Mexico is one of 300 creditors filing claims against Connally's assets in bankruptcy court, with those claims stemming from a 1987 lawsuit that alleged fraud and misrepresentation in the sale of time share in the Triple Crown condominium project in Ruidoso Downs.

U.S. Bankruptcy Court Judge Larry Kelly denied the motion filed by New Mexico asking to inspect, inventory and appraise a collection containing about three million personal documents Connally donated to the Lyndon B. Johnson Library at the University of Texas.

Kelly ruled that New Mexico had no standing to make the motion.

Triple Crown, overlooking the Ruidoso Downs Race Track, was de-

veloped by Connally and his partner, former Texas Lieutenant Governor Ben F. Barnes.

New Mexico alleged, in 1987, that Triple Crown promoters committed numerous violations of the Unfair Practices Act, misrepresented the value of the investment and failed to disclose the existence of the mortgage on the project.

The Barnes-Connally partnership and Connally personally filed for protection in bankruptcy court before the New Mexico suit was resolved.

Connally reportedly listed debts of \$93.3 million and assets of \$13 million, according to Marsha Kocurek, trustee in the case.

With as much as \$83.9 million of those debts secured claims, holding priority, New Mexico's unsecured claim is unlikely to be satisfied, New Mexico Assistant Attorney General Randy Childress is quoted as saying.

Bonito firemen kept busy when lightning bolt hits

An intense lightning storm kept the Bonito Volunteer Fire Department (VFD) crews hurrying to fire calls this morning (Thursday).

Lightning struck a power pole near milemarker 11 on Highway 48 north of Alto, causing the pole to fall into a tree. According to Rusty Lanelli of the Bonito VFD, the pole fell into the tree, pulling the wires loose at one end while still connected to the main power lines.

"The lines were 'glowing red hot' when the fire crews arrived, Lanelli said. The problem was solved when Otero Electric Coop crews arrived

and cut the power to the toppled pole.

As soon as the Bonito crews arrived at home after the power pole incident, the phone rang about another lightning related fire in Gavilan Canyon.

An old stump, on the ridge across the canyon from the Trinity Mountain Fellowship Church, was struck with a lightning bolt and began to burn. The Bonito crew arrived and doused the 10-foot stump.

No structural damage occurred in either fire.

The Plant Corner

by Sally Black



Dear Sally: My Boston Fern sheds continuously, looks bad and there is always a mess on the floor around it. I would appreciate your help. What is the best fertilizer and general care for the Boston Fern? Thank you, Dorothy.

Dear Dorothy: We will start with the fertilizer. Boston Ferns (nephrolepis) hate any fertilizer containing salt, which means most all commercial fertilizers. The best fertilizer to use is an organic one. If you can find one to buy, great. If not, you can make your own.

Take a drive out to the new bull barn near Capitan, take some sacks or a couple of five-gallon cans, they will be happy to give you a supply of organic fertilizer.

To make a good manure fertilizer, use a five-gallon can, fitted with a wire-screen lid. Fill the container half with cow manure, filling to the top with water, cover and let stand at least a week. Stir well before using. All your foliage plants will love this fertilizer.

To use, stir well, then add one cup of the mixture to one gallon of water, stirring well again. Newly purchased ferns should never be fertilized for the first six months after bringing them home.

Water and drainage: I suggest repotting the Boston Fern to a clean, large, more permanent-type pot (this plant demands fast drainage) as soon as you bring it home. If you are unable to do the repotting at that time, do so as soon as possible. Use a very porous soil mixture, after filling the new pot about one-third with the plastic packing do-dads.

Now the plant's soil must be kept moist at all times, never dry or soggy wet. Either will cause the leaves to turn brown. Ideally, water

daily, according to size of pot and temperature, about one cup. You can use the manure mixture each time you water all spring and summer. The plant must never stand in water. Keep some pebbles in the tray to prevent this from happening.

Miracid is a good commercial fertilizer, cut to half of the manufacturer's recommended use.

Temperature: 50 to 80 degrees is ideal for growing all species of ferns. No direct sunlight is needed, try to emulate the forest floor where they thrive. At least 150 candle foot power is needed for artificial lighting.

Humidity also is essential for ferns. Never place too near the hot or cold window or the heat supply. Setting in the tray of damp pebbles adds to the humidity. Plastic pots hold moisture better than clay. Ferns do best in bathrooms and kitchens where the humidity is generally higher.

In the early spring take the fern to the bathtub for a good cleaning and trim. Turn the fern upside down and with good sharp scissors, trim all the dead and dying growth from the plant. Turn it up and let a few gallons of fresh, clean water run through the plant to flush out all fertilizer salts, build-up and dust.

The fern does better under an over-head light. The fronds stand up and grow longer before they start to drape over.

I hope I have helped you. Let me hear how your fern progresses.





The Plant Corner

by Sally Black



Dear Sally: My Boston Fern sheds continuously, looks bad and there is always a mess on the floor around it. I would appreciate your help. What is the best fertilizer and general care for the Boston Fern? Thank you, Dorothy.

Dear Dorothy: We will start with the fertilizer. Boston Ferns (nephrolepis) hate any fertilizer containing salt, which means most all commercial fertilizers. The best fertilizer to use is an organic one. If you can find one to buy, great. If not, you can make your own.

Take a drive out to the new bull barn near Capitan, take some sacks or a couple of five-gallon cans, they will be happy to give you a supply of organic fertilizer.

To make a good one, use a five-gallon wire-screen lid. Fill half with cow manure top with water, cover at least a week. Using. All your ferns love this fertilizer.

To use, stir well cup of the mixture, water, stirring well purchased ferns and fertilized for the fern after bringing them

Water and drain repotting the Boston Fern. Use a clean, large, more pot (this plant drainage) as soon home. If you are repotting at that time as possible. Use a mixture, after filling about one-third with packing do-dads.

Now the plant kept moist at all times soggy wet. Either leaves to turn brown

daily, according to size of pot and temperature, about one cup. You can use the manure mixture each time you water all spring and summer. The plant must never stand in water. Keep some pebbles in the tray to prevent this from happening.

Miracid is a good commercial fertilizer, cut to half of the manufacturer's recommended use.


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

To make a good manure fertilizer, use a five-gallon can, fitted with a wire-screen lid. Fill the container half with cow manure, filling to the top with water, cover and let stand at least a week. Stir well before using. All your foliage plants will love this fertilizer.

To use, stir well, then add one cup of the mixture to one gallon of water, stirring well again. Newly purchased ferns should never be fertilized for the first six months after bringing them home.

Water and drainage: I suggest repotting the Boston Fern to a clean, large, more permanent-type pot (this plant demands fast drainage) as soon as you bring it home. If you are unable to do the repotting at that time, do so as soon as possible. Use a very porous soil mixture, after filling the new pot about one-third with the plastic packing do-dads.

Now the plant's soil must be kept moist at all times, never dry or soggy wet. Either will cause the leaves to turn brown. Ideally, water

daily, according to size of pot and temperature, about one cup. You can use the manure mixture each time you water all spring and summer. The plant must never stand in water. Keep some pebbles in the tray to prevent this from happening.

Miracid is a good commercial fertilizer, cut to half of the manufacturer's recommended use.

Temperature: 50 to 80 degrees is ideal for growing all species of ferns. No direct sunlight is needed, try to emulate the forest floor where they thrive. At least 150 candle foot power is needed for artificial lighting.

Humidity also is essential for ferns. Never place too near the hot or cold window or the heat supply. Setting in the tray of damp pebbles adds to the humidity. Plastic pots hold moisture better than clay. Ferns do best in bathrooms and kitchens where the humidity is generally higher.

In the early spring take the fern to the bathtub for a good cleaning and trim. Turn the fern upside down and with good sharp scissors, trim all the dead and dying growth from the plant. Turn it up and let a few gallons of fresh, clean water run through the plant to flush out all fertilizer salts, build-up and dust.

The fern does better under an over-head light. The fronds stand up and grow longer before they start to drape over.

I hope I have helped you. Let me hear how your fern progresses.

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

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



DEAR EDITOR:

Cheers for the Lincoln County Sheriff's Dept., Don Samuels, Sheriff.

On Sat. evening 8/27/88 at approximately 6:45 p.m. I picked up two men on the Eagle Lake road as I was leaving the lake from a short fishing trip. It was raining quite heavily and these two appeared to be in dire need of help. They said they had been washed out of their campsite and needed a ride to town and their motel. This turned out to be a fictitious motel name. After looking for the motel for about an hour we were close to where I had picked them up. They then offered all their camping equipment \$2,000.00 worth, they said - because they had no intention of camping out again. Having two deer hunting sons I thought there may be something in the lot they could use.

Upon arriving at their camp, in the dark and rain, they loaded their equipment into my truck. At this point one pointed a gun at me and said he would kill me if I didn't do exactly as he said. Lay on your stomach - arms outstretched - as the other took everything out of my pockets. "Now get into this sleeping bag and zip it up." After doing so the other "hog tied" me in the bag. They then left in my truck.

After freeing myself I was fortunate enough to stumble upon Clyde and Tommie Burnett's place. They dialed 911 and two Sheriff Dept. cars arrived within 20 minutes. After a few questions I left with officers Jim Rethmel and Spear. As we were leaving, Officer Rethmel got a glimpse of a white pickup going up the mountain. He followed it and it turned out to be mine when he found it parked at a campground further up the mountain. He called for backup and within minutes three more Sheriff's cars arrived. It was very foggy, visibility limited to about fifty feet. Needless to say, looking for armed men in their situation was very dangerous.

One officer took me back to the office - out of the cold and wet as I was soaking wet and about to freeze. He made me coffee which was greatly appreciated.

Sgt. McArthur, who was in Captain at the time, was summoned to assist. He arrived within twenty minutes at the Police Station with Officer Rethmel and one of the suspects! They began interrogating this suspect and shortly Sheriff Samuels arrived. It is now about 1:00 a.m. Sunday morning. Not once did I hear one complaint or negative statement from any of these men about being pulled out of bed on such a gosh awful night. They were all there to help me and to settle this case as quickly as possible. I've been a businessman for

over forty years and never have I seen such efficiency and teamwork. All knew exactly what to do at any given time.

As I write this it is 1:15 p.m. Sunday and these men are still on the job - eighteen hours straight!!

They have the second man surrounded on the mountain at this time. Be assured these men will be there until he is captured - whether it be one more hour or eighteen more.

Again - CHEERS for Sheriff Samuels and his magnificent group.

I just learned the second suspect has been captured about five miles from Nogal. He traveled almost eighteen miles through the mountains at night. And these men tracked him all that way. Amazing!

DEAR EDITOR:

I was privileged, last week, to see justice in action, in a courtroom in Ft. Sumner.

The dismissal of all charges against Matt Surratt for the murder of Katina Chavez by Judge Richard A. Parson proves that the judicial system can work as it is intended to.

At the risk of his own political career, Judge Parsons declared Surratt to be innocent, directing his remarks to the parents of Katina; "The whole county has been diminished by the loss of your daughter. She was a splendid young lady. But it would compound the tragedy of this matter if we were to take it (Surratt's trial) any further."

Dismissed jurors took justice a step further, voluntarily meeting to discuss what their verdict would have been. Every one of them agreed to the innocence of Matt Surratt. According to an article written by reporter Marilyn Hadrill, one of the jurors, Frank Martz Jr., said: "I felt sorry for the victim's mother, but I don't feel she would want somebody convicted who was just pulled out of a hat."

Defense attorney Gary Mitchell commanded dignity and truth in his defense of Surratt, never making political implications for the arrest or lowering his standards. It was my feeling that Surratt was his own best witness, however, because the prosecution presented a tape recording of Surratt's interrogation. The method law enforcement used to question him (without an attorney or parent present) was shocking and terrifying; the judge and jury recognized that fact, several of them becoming visibly upset as the tape rolled on. The prosecution immediately rested their case after that; the next morn-

ing, the judge dismissed the charges.

The community must work together now to find the real killer. Matt's trial was, hopefully, the beginning of a healing process for the Valley. Next week, he will return to school and resume his normal life. Benjamin Chavez, Katina's uncle and minister of the Fountain of Living Water Church, said: "We pray that somebody will come up with the truth." He also urged peace among members of the Chavez and Surratt families. I support him in those statements and hope that a spirit of unity can bring people together to find the real truth.

Judge Parsons must have had a sleepless night before taking on the responsibility of dismissing the case, and that was a courageous and compassionate action to take.

The people of Ft. Sumner opened their arms and hearts to those involved in the trial and contributed to the well-being of all concerned with the trial.

All in all, it was a privilege to be involved in this trial, and I have never been prouder to say that I come from Lincoln County.

This is being sent to you on late morning of August thirty, and will reach you on the first day of September. All day yesterday was cloudy with light showers, and all morning the mountain world was foggy and misty.

And now just at eleven, the sun is a silvery ball of glowing fire trying to shine through a light spot in the clouds, casting all the vale in a half light. The little veils of mist all across the green meadows and the pinons and river trees begin to fade away. The mist drops clinging to the little flageolets and banners of the Gramma Grass sparkle with Crystal Light. Now the sun breaks through a spot of blue and these droplets are transformed into hosts of rain jewels, all across the emerald meadows, in the light breeze sparkling in ruby, amethyst, gold and rainbow colors.

This could be a day in Valdez, Alaska, about this time of year. So my memories are going back to the birthday of our brother, Mark.

The river, running bank full, sends up a soft rushing song—like the blue bring out the radiance of the green mountain land.

On just such a misty and Sushine day as today, Marcus Kennedy Storm was born on September four, 1911, to Lynn Whippo Storm and the former Bertha Catherine Kennedy.

Our mother said that at birth he had his hands folded close to this breast as if to protect them. Strong hands delicately formed.

I remember Mark with his bright red hair and light skin with freckles, working with pencil and crayons showing his destiny before he could talk. Before long he was drawing wheels, wagons, horses, and sea gulls and toy drums.

His pride and joy was the horse which drew the wagon in which Mr. Perkins brought the groceries to our house. Mark would laugh with joy as he was brought out to pet the horse.

As the age of two he was brought with his mother and father and brothers, John and Daniel to Denver where we visited Grandpa and Grandma Kennedy, and then to Los Angeles where we visited Grandfather and Grandmother Storm.

We went back to Alaska and lived in Juneau, where Mark went to the first grade; then down to Oregon, with brothers Joseph and Lynn added to our family. After a year in Old Mexico, Mark had seen a little of the western side of the North American continent.

A happy turning point in Mark's life was reached when we came here to the Ruidoso Valley in 1925. Here all the color of Western Ranch life and lore was at its height, and as a cowboy and rodeo hand he lived the life which was the foundation for his work as a western artist and sculptor.

His string of good fortune shone brightly when in 1924 he was married to the former Ferne Sweeny of Houston. Two daughters and six grand children blest this marriage. Daughters are Tommy Lou and Carrol Jane. Grandchildren are Kent, Eve, Jay, Kathleen, Mark and Karen.

Mark's work reflect the true color of the American West; the cherished values and traditions of our country, and his abiding faith in God.

The sun is out in full now, while scattered clouds of gray amongst the waves on the beach of Valdez bay. And I thank God for our brother, Mark.

Let us all thank the Lord for our loved ones and all our other blessings.

Rabies cases occur mostly in lowlands of this general area

Eight of the nine cases of rabies confirmed in New Mexico so far this year have occurred in rural, low-elevation areas between Artesia and Carrizozo.

State veterinarian Dr. Millicent Eidson said the most recent case was confirmed in a horse that died

August 11 near Pinon.

The horse's owners and a veterinarian who handled the carcass are undergoing rabies treatments. A skunk is suspected in the case.

Eidson said her office is recommending that livestock in the area be vaccinated for rabies and that any unexplained livestock deaths be reported immediately.

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EMTs learn methods of dealing with various aspects of trauma

Pediatric trauma, plane crashes and suicides filled Saturday for area emergency response personnel-but only in the classroom. All were attending the second annual mini-conference at the Swiss Chalet in Ruidoso.

Over 50 Emergency Medical Technicians (EMTs) from both Ruidoso (EMT) and Lincoln County EMS attended the conference which was sponsored by the Lincoln County EMT Association.

Called "Trauma Nobody Talks About-But Everybody Needs to Know," the one day conference offered eight hours of continuing education credits necessary for EMT state relicensure.

"Our topics this year reflect the needs of our communities," said a conference organizer.

Five speakers addressed the group. Ron Beich, RN with Memorial General Hospital in Las Cruces and formerly with the Lincoln County Medical Center (LCMC), spoke on pediatric trauma. "Trauma is the leading cause of death in children," he said. EMTs reviewed airway and shock management for that age group.

Lifeguard Air Emergency Services of Albuquerque was represented by a flight nurse and a paramedic, Joe Dietrich and Mike Murray.

Dietrich presented "Aircraft Safety for EMTs"; Murray discussed the management of suicides and psychotic patients. "New Mexico is second in the nation in the num-

ber of suicides," he said. "Nationally, suicide is the seventh leading cause of death."

Martin Vigil of Corrales Fire Department is a recognized expert in aircraft accidents. His topic was aircraft extrication. He stressed the dangers of hazardous chemicals present in such accidents.

Barak Worlff summed up the day's activities with Critical Incident Stress Debriefing (CISD). Wolf, chief of Primary Care and EMS Bureau in Santa Fe, explained that stress management is critical for the physical and emotional well-being of all emergency personnel-ambulance, fire and law enforcement.

"A CISD team is available statewide to assist those persons who are experiencing normal stress after highly abnormal events," he said.

Dr. Walter Hopkins, Lincoln County Emergency Medical Services medical director, served as conference moderator. He thanked outgoing Lincoln County EMT Association president Thom Heller and recognized incoming president Henry "Ace" Griego.

Hopkins and his wife Gail, also an EMT from Hondo, then surprised conferees with custom T-shirts. "These are in appreciation for the fine care and good wishes I received from you after my accident," he said, referring to the July 12 lightning strike at his Picacho home that injured him and three others. The T-shirts depict a lightning bolt descending from the words "Lincoln County Ambulance" top the word "MD-1".
