Jeremy Knight of Corona will show hogs and lambs; Alethea Knight of Corona also will show lambs and hogs; Sandra Copeland

of Corona will show heifers and steers; Tracy Stone of Capitan will show heifers and lambs and Kelly Witter of Capitan will participate in the horse show.

According to Lincoln County 4-H Agent Sid Gordon, Witter is leading in the horse division in the state of New Mexico this year. Gordon also said Lincoln County hogs and lambs are as "good as any in the state."

The competition is great at the state fair, as an example, swine show participants must compete against at least 800 other hogs, Gordon acknowledged. But he hopes some of the Lincoln County exhibitors do make it to the livestock show Friday.

Ruidoso property owners will be assessed an additional three mills when the tax bills go out in December.

The Village Council, in a special meeting last Tuesday, passed the three mill levy to pay for the airport terminal building, large hangar and auto sunshades. With an extension to impose the tax after the official deadline, the council action was submitted to the Department of Finance and Administration (DFA) just under the wire.

DFA provided the new certificate of tax rates to county assessors last week, with the Lincoln County Tax Assessor receiving the new rates on September 8. According to a spokesperson for the Lincoln County Assessor's office, the new rates are not official until approved by the Lincoln County Commission. Commissioners were expected to approve the certificate last Friday.

The Village of Ruidoso has a taxable value, according to that certificate, of \$103,016,108 residential, and \$43,789,770 non-residential.

The new tax rate for residential property in the Village of Ruidoso is \$32.005, and for non-residential the rate is \$33.966.



## Presbyterian pastor here accepts call to Roswell

Winston Presnall will preach his last sermon as minister of the First Presbyterian Church of Ruidoso on Sunday, September 25.

"I've invested seven years of my life here," said the Reverend Presnall describing his mixed feelings as he leaves this community to accept a call to the First Presbyterian Church of Roswell. "I wish I hated everybody here," he said with a smile.

"It's hard to leave," added Presnall seriously.

Ironically, Presnall preached his first sermon in Ruidoso on World Communion Sunday—the first World Communion Sunday—of 1981, and will start his ministry in the 600-member Roswell church on World Communion Sunday of 1988.

Presnall, a Texas native, is a graduate of the University of Texas at Austin, and McCormick Seminary in Chicago, Illinois. Presnall is a second generation minister, the son of Robert Presnall of Borger who has been minister to the Presbyterian Church there for 20 years. The elder Presnall spent 13

years as a Baptist minister before joining the Presbyterian Church. The younger Presnall remembers that his decision to become a minister was made soon after high school. His call was more of a "growing fondness" than a lightning bolt.

"You look at your gifts and abilities and where they can be used," said Presnall.

Before accepting a call to the Ruidoso Presbyterian Church, he and his wife, Brynda, spent a year in Amarillo, Texas, where Presnall was chaplain at Northwest Texas Hospital.

The couple's two children, Derek and Layna, both were born in Ruidoso. Derek is a kindergartener at Nob Hill, and Layna is two years old.

Although Presnall got his first taste of Ruidoso when he preached for the congregation before he was invited to become pastor to the small church on Nob Hill, he said this area was perfect for him—a sports enthusiast.

## Presbyterian pastor here accepts call to Roswell

Winston Presnall will preach his last sermon as minister of the First Presbyterian Church of Ruidoso on Sunday, September 25.

"I've invested seven years of my life here," said the Reverend Presnall describing his mixed feelings as he leaves this community to accept a call to the First Presbyterian Church of Roswell. "I wish I hated everybody here," he said with a smile.

"It's hard to leave," added Presnall seriously.

Ironically, Presnall preached his first sermon in Ruidoso on World Communion Sunday—the first Sunday in October—of 1981, and will start his ministry in the 600-member Roswell church on World Communion Sunday of 1988.

Presnall, a Texas native, is a graduate of the University of Texas at Austin, and McCormick Seminary in Chicago, Illinois. Presnall is a second generation minister, the son of Robert Presnall of Borger who has been minister to the Presbyterian Church there for 20 years. The elder Presnall spent 13

years as a Baptist minister before joining the Presbyterian Church. The younger Presnall remembers that his decision to become a minister was made soon after high school. His call was more of a "growing fondness" than a lightning bolt.

"You look at your gifts and abilities and where they can be used," said Presnall.

Before accepting a call to the Ruidoso Presbyterian Church, he and his wife, Brynda, spent a year in Amarillo, Texas, where Presnall was chaplain at Northwest Texas Hospital.

The couple's two children, Derek and Layna, both were born in Ruidoso. Derek is a kindergartener at Nob Hill, and Layna is two years old.

Although Presnall got his first taste of Ruidoso when he preached for the congregation before he was invited to become pastor to the small church on Nob Hill, he said this area was perfect for him—a sports enthusiast.



"You couldn't create a better environment for me in terms of nature," said Presnall, who fishes, hunts and enjoys the winter snows. So proficient a fisherman is Presnall, that he provides fish for an annual church fish fry.

Presnall said the First Presbyterian Church offered quite a challenge since it had lost membership and had a budget that was subsidized by the Presbytery.

"We've done it," said Presnall, noting in the past seven years the congregation had become self-supporting and has redeveloped its program. Some key areas that needed to be affected were young

adults and children, said Presnall, pointing out a nursery that now houses five cribs.

"We are not isolated, though we sit on a hill," said Presnall, commenting on how the Presbyterian church needed to regain its influence in the community back in 1981.

That, too, has happened, as Presnall and members of his congregation have been involved in community organizations and the church has become home to the Lincoln County Food Bank.

Presnall will be going from a congregation of 86, to a church with a membership of 600 when he becomes pastor to the First Pres-

byterian Church of Roswell. While he is sorrowed to leave this community and the congregation, Presnall said he's looking forward to the challenges and opportunities for growth that lie ahead.

He got a taste of that when he preached in Roswell two weeks ago. "I stood in the pulpit and looked at nearly 400 worshippers," recalled Presnall, adding "it was a different experience, but it felt good."

And so, with regret and anticipation, Presnall sets forth on his next challenge.

"God calls people to service wherever they are," said Presnall to his Ruidoso congregation Sunday.

## Cree owners to discuss litigation

Cloud Chief Creations is like no other gift shop in Ruidoso. Like its owner, Esther Caldwell, it is very, very unique.

"My best childhood memories were of Ruidoso and Uncle Charlie's horse, Cloud Chief, as he raced out here in the pastures," Esther said.

"I traveled through this town last year, stood dead still in the middle of the street out front and said, 'This is my Ruidoso.' I never left."

Esther's shop is located in the Four Seasons Mall, midtown.

"I thought featuring a store with completely handmade goods would help tourists not see the

same old merchandise that you general see in a gift shop," she said. "You know, small items that make good gifts that everybody looks for."

"Even my turquoise is not conventional turquoise. We have a few Indian made pieces, the rest I designed in my head."

Every colorful sweater in Esther's shop is made of hand-knitted leather. Unless you touched the garment, you would not know it was not wool.

Esther said a unique property of a leather sweater is its seasonal versatility. "In the winter, worn over a natural product like silk or cotton, it is very warm and comfortable. In the summer, worn with a camisole, it feels like your only wearing the camisole."

Esther sells gold trees with jeweled leaves. A piece of 24 gauge wire turns and twists in her hands forming a tree laden with gem stones like amethyst, jade, garnets and rubies.

"I do a Christmas business that is out of this world," she said.

Esther's craft career began unexpectedly. An accountant in Salinas, California, she severely injured her back in 1972.

Laying in the hospital, she said she needed something to do other than say, "poor little me." "Working with my hands saved me from going crazy on that hospital bed," she said.

Surgery performed enabled her to straighten her back, but doctors informed her she would never walk again. She spent six months in the

hospital.

"The doctors did me a favor by telling me that," she said. "Two weeks after I was released from the hospital, I walked."

Other line items in Esther's shop includes Indian mandellas, Sioux-Fox ceremonial prayer fans, pottery and jewelry.

"I do a Christmas business that is out of this world," she said.

Esther is a dual business owner in Ruidoso. She has reopened the Diamond B Barbeque Restaurant located next to the post office.

"We've worked on a formula to make our barbeque the tastiest in Ruidoso," Esther said. "We marinate with our special blend, then cook with oak and applewood with a pinch of mesquite."







## Swanner is standout although Warriors find Goddard Rockets are really tough

On a perfect football night, Goddard of Roswell played perfectly to dominate the Ruidoso Warriors in every aspect of the game, 38-0.

The trademark second half spark that ignited the Warriors to comebacks in the past two games wasn't there last Friday.

On this night, in the Wool Bowl, few high school teams would have beaten Goddard who flawlessly executed in running, passing, defense, ball control, kicking and any other area that rules the game.

Warrior head coach Cooper Henderson said Ruidoso had teams in the past that possessed less ability, but were not beaten as badly.

"We're going to work on being a mentally tougher football team," he said. "We have not improved the past two weeks. We're approaching a point in the season where improvement is expected and that's what we're looking for this coming weekend, to get back on the promising track of our earlier scrimmages. I know we can."

"Anytime in life you face defeat, you pause to evaluate where you are and where you came from," Henderson said. "A winner turns that defeat into a positive action to be stronger. We're going to use this game as our turning point. We will be a stronger football team."

Bright moments may have seemed few to Warrior fans, but they had to be proud of the courageous play of Michael Swanner who played through injury to direct the club on some of its best runs, delays up the middle. With no time to pass and no receivers open, Swanner absorbed some crushing blows including one late hit to the back of legs that could have ended the season for him.

Logan Stirman had a couple of fine punts and a great tackle on one return that saved six points.

Bobby Fowler kept his man out of the play on the Warriors first drive, their best of the game.

Kenny Trapp got untracked several times, but the Rockets were targeting Trapp and he worked hard for every inch of dirt conquered.

Were the rockets just too big, too fast, too good? On this night, yes. However, the Warriors are still 0-0 in district play. The season isn't over. Heck, the fat lady hasn't even cleared her throat.

First quarter summary: The usual squib kick against the Warriors is downed on the 29 yard line. Trapp runs over center for two. Logan Stirnum, hits a hole made by Dusty Beavers to pick up the first down. Swanner bullets a five yarder to Ricky Brazell who swallows the ball with his huge hands and at that point in the game, the Warriors look good.

The Warriors are forced to a timeout by an equipment adjustment. Kenny Trapp gains a yard. Swanner fakes the defense out of their equipment and keeps the ball down center to the Rocket 40-yard line for a first down. Trapp follows with three yards. Stirman picks up another three off the right side tackle and then turns receiver on a Swanner pass to the 29. Swanner takes a hit as his pass into coverage is battered away. Trapp tries the right tackle for about four yards and is gang tackled. A delay of game penalty creates a passing situation of third and 12.

Swanner keeps the drive alive with a toss over center to wide open Jesse Guardiola who wings it to the 16 yard line for a first down.

Warriors are called for a mouth-piece infraction (player isn't wearing one) and the ball is moved back to the 21. Stirman picks up one. Swanner can't find a receiver and fights to the line of scrimmage. On third and 11, Swanner finds Brazell wide open on a short button hook and Brazell takes it to the nine for fourth and one.

Swanner hands off to Trapp and the entire Rocket line pounced on him for a yard loss. The drive

lasted over eight minutes.

Goddard wants to establish a running game and their first play is over tackle for ten yards.

Goddard's next three plays are on the ground and good for another first down. Then Kevin Romero tosses to Perry Wakefield who shakes a couple of tackles for another first down.

The Warriors lose five yards on a contact foul. Romero then runs a bootleg right and races for 33 yards. Two plays later and another first down, Romero tries to thread the needle in the end zone and is intercepted. Trapp runs for no gain as the first quarter ends.

Second quarter summary: The Warriors can not move beyond the three yard line on the next two plays and Stirman, deep in his own endzone, boots a fine kick to the 40 that the Rockets return to the 12. Several plays later and Romero completes a six yarder in the end zone for a Rocket score. The conversion kick is good and the Rockets lead, 7-0.

Chris Torres takes a fumbled kickoff return to the 22. Swanner, finds no one open, keeps for a 9 yard run up the middle courtesy of a Bobby Fowler block out. Swanner hands off to Trapp for no gain. On third and one Trapp gains a yard and a first down.

Swanner, under pressure, passes incomplete to Chris Torres.

Swanner then hits McCabe Turner in the flats and Turner turns it up field to the 35. Swanner again pressured to pass, manages to get back to the line of scrimmage after going through five different Rockets.

After a movement flag on the Warriors, Stirman boots from his own 11 to Wakefield standing on the Ruidoso 36. Wakefield runs it

back to the Warrior 40 yard line.

Zach Chavez leads a host of Warriors to nail Romero back on the 50 for a ten yard loss. A holding penalty on the Rockets is declined.

Romero runs the option and picks up 15 of the 20 yards needed. A Romero pass is incomplete and on fourth and six Romero misses again and the Warriors begin possession on the 36.

Swanner hands off to Trapp for a eight yard gain. Swanner is hurt and is replaced by Chris Torres. The same play gains a first down on the Rockets 49. Rusty Silva takes it around the right for a short gain. Another motion flag on Ruidoso is declined. On third and eight Swanner, back in the game, delays, and then runs it down to the 42. On fourth and three Trapp runs for no gain. Goddard takes over.

Two Romero passes take it to the Warrior 27. Romero hands off on a draw play and the ball is carried to the two yard line. An illegal proce-

dure on the Rockets moves the ball back to the seven. Two plays later and 37 seconds on the clock, the Rockets score. The conversion is good and the Rockets lead 14-0.

The kickoff is handed to Trapp and he is downed on the 30. Swanner tosses to Alfred Rue for nine. Swanner, rushed, misses to Brazell. Trapp takes a handoff for a first down to end the first half.

Third quarter summary. Rockets begin the second half on their own 30. Rockets gain six, lose ten on offensive holding and gain five back on a Warrior offside. The Rockets blow huge holes in the line and take the ball down the field on a series of runs before Romero unloads a pass to Wakefield on the Warriors one yard line. The Rockets score on the next play. The extra point is added and the Rockets lead, 21-0.

The kickoff is grabbed by the Warriors at the 20 with no return. Rue misses a pitchout, but recovers for a five yard loss. Swanner gains



# Police group hears candidate Tom Sullivan McSwane to speak later

"I'll be shooting straight with you," sheriff candidate Tom Sullivan told the Fraternal Order of Police (FOP) Thursday.

Sullivan, the Democratic candidate for Lincoln County sheriff, detailed his 20 years of law enforcement experience, including two terms as Lincoln County sheriff, two years at Camp Sierra Blanca and 14 years with the Texas Department of Public Safety. Sullivan said he has completed 2,000 hours of additional classroom hours with many of those in the area of drug investigation.

While stationed in Lubbock, Texas, with the Texas Department of Public Safety, Sullivan said his "beat" was bigger than the state of New Mexico.

"And I had six men," said Sullivan, explaining how he and those six investigators worked narcotics from Fort Worth, Texas, to the New Mexico state line.

Sullivan was Lincoln County sheriff from 1983-86, and is proud of his record as an aggressive law officer.

"Crooks are not going to come in and surrender—you're going to have to go out and arrest them—that's my philosophy," said Sullivan, calling himself a "no-nonsense" sheriff.

Members of the law enforcement group had lots of questions for Sullivan, with queries about departmental staff recurring over and over.

Sullivan said he has several very well-qualified prospects for his

chief deputy, but won't make an announcement yet.

Asked if he'll hire his former undersheriff Charlie Cox, Sullivan said Cox is making more money and doing an excellent job working as an investigator for defense attorney Gary Mitchell.

"Charlie's a good investigator; he was a loyal employee, and I'm not going to sell out a friend," said Sullivan. Later in the meeting, Sullivan challenged those in the group who, apparently, dislike Charlie Cox so much, to stand up and explain why.

FOP members remained seated and silent.

"Charlie Cox was a victim of a vicious character assassination ... and he did a damned good job as undersheriff," said Sullivan.

For undersheriff, Sullivan said he may interview retired State Police officer Bob Miller, as well as a couple of other retired state law officers.

"There's some talent out there," said Sullivan, who stressed his commitment to hiring the best people and running the department himself.

Admitting to some minor problems while serving as sheriff the last time, Sullivan said he'll do better screening of the personnel he hires this term and will schedule on shifts instead of "general hours."

As sheriff, Sullivan said he will set up a structure with "unity of command," noting "you can have too many chiefs."

Asked about upgrading pay, Sullivan recalled when he worked with a former county commission to in-

stitute a graduated pay scale, rewarding officers for their service without increasing the budget.

Sullivan said when he is sheriff he'll place more stress on criminal activity and burglary investigations than on traffic control.

The candidate said he'll re-establish the drug investigation unit and return to the district concept of covering the county. He said districting is more cost-effective and provides better service to the citizens.

"That's my primary goal—to serve the people of this county," said Sullivan.

"I enjoy law enforcement, and I consider myself a professional," said Sullivan.

Republican candidate, James McSwane, will speak to the Fraternal Order of Police when the group meets at noon Thursday, September 15, at K-Bob's. His remarks will be reported on Monday, September 19.

## The Dreamer by Dan Storm



### Wonderful Days Of Late Summer

This is being sent to you a little before high noon on September ten, with twelve days left in the season of Glorious Summer.

Our good old friend, the West wind, has blown away most all the smoke which had drifted in from the fires up at Yellow Stone Park, so that the sky is mostly clear with the sun shining down with all its might, making up for lost time during the rains spells.

The mountain World turns greener by the day, with the grass growing taller, the leaves of the river trees a richer color, and Pinon and Cedar adding their soft velvet dark green to the emerald world, so that Mother Earth is dressed in shining attire of every shade of Summer's color.

All the Vale is still and quiet in a peaceful, dreamy lull while all the hills and vales and shining mountain meadows rest in the golden sunshine and pure fresh air after the many days of fog, rain, mist and thunder storms. Mother Earth is breathing a soft prayer of thanksgiving to the whpered tune of the East wind which now begins to drift into the land.

### The Ripening Rays

You will notice this time of year the sun is traveling much lower to the horizon in its journey through the sky, and therefore the rays of the sun reach you short of slantwise, and seem to carry and extra bit of heat which seem to warm your face and body even more than the sun of mid summer.

You wonder why this extra heat is with us so late in the summer when you think the days should be turning much cooler.

This late summer and early fall heat is caused by what we call "The Ripening Rays." These side-long beams of sunshine reach into the tree branches, turning the fruit to red and gold. The corn and other crops feel the warm caress of these rays; and the wild grape at the riverside and the wild cherry on high on the mountainside, feel the ripening touch of these sun beams. The small grain of the wilderness, the seeds of many kinds of grass, form a rich harvest going into the winter, for all the creatures of

Mother Earth. And the wilderness harvest will be especially plentiful this season.

### The Fruit Picture

Generally speaking, the fruit crop is light this year. They tell me there are a few pears left in places in San Patricio, and also apples here and there. The apple trees begin at Riverside and extend all the way up to Ruidoso Valley and over into the Bonito Valley, with some trees away up above the dam.







# Opinion



## Eye On The Capitol

"A line must be drawn." Those words came from the state Supreme Court in a long-awaited "Opinion" issued on August 2.

In March, Governor Carruthers vetoed items in the General Appropriations Act. Representative Max Coll and Senator Ben Altamirano, chairman of the legislature's money committee, took Carruthers to court, to get his line-item vetoes overturned.

"In selecting a line," the Court declared, "which should not be crossed lest the legislature intrude on the executive managerial function, we realize our subjective evaluation of the facts underlies the principles and tests we espouse and rely upon."

Subjective evaluation. The Court must be commended for telling it like it is.

But is their subjective evaluation right? The question has pivotal importance far beyond New Mexico's borders.

Our State Constitution says the governor may veto "any part or parts, item or items, of any bill appropriating money..." (Art. IV, Sec. 22). The United States President doesn't have that power. If he can't stomach an offending item, he must veto the entire bill.

President Reagan pushed hard for line-item veto power. He didn't get it. But future presidents will wage the same war. The "Opinion" of the New Mexico Supreme Court will be among the armaments deployed on the battlefield.

On January 22, Eye anticipated the line-item veto confrontation. To understand the basic issue involved, we cited this double-edged sword fashioned in the state Supreme Court's opinion in the 1974 *Sego v. Kirkpatrick* case: "The Legislature may not properly abridge [the governor's line-item veto power] by subtle drafting of conditions, limitations or restrictions upon appropriations, and the Governor may not properly distort legislative appropriations or arrogate unto himself the power of making appropriations by carefully striking words, phrases or sentences from an item or part of an appropriation."

Sounds reasonable. It's also downright vague. How do you know when the governor or legislature goes too far? Enter the 1988 Supreme Court, and the line it drew.

The *Albuquerque Journal* liked where the boundary went. The newspaper accused legislators of "micromanagement of affairs best left in the executive domain..." Altamirano and Coll's challenge was appropriately rewarded with an expansive definition of executive power etched in case law. (Aug. 6) Carruthers definitely won. The Court upheld 11 of his 12 line-item

vetoes. But "appropriately" isn't entirely appropriate.

Let's look at a concrete example: The General Appropriations Act gave \$1,861,200 million to the New Mexico Center for Women. The legislature stipulated that amount contained "\$50,000, to be used for providing a training program for female inmates in motel/hotel and restaurant management." Governor Carruthers line-item vetoed the underlined language. He argued it prohibited the inmates' "participation in a variety of training programs."

The Court upheld Carruthers: "The legislature is authorized to define the basic purpose for which funds are appropriated, but the selection and identification of specific programs is the responsibility of the executive branch of government."

The Court's conclusion is good common sense. It left a managerial function, the selection of specific programs, to the managers, i.e., the executive branch.

So far, so good. Now, what happens to the \$50,000?

The Court said the governor can keep it.

That's wrong. All sides acknowledge the sanctity of legislative intent. But intent is all, not part of, the sentence or sentences in which it is stated. One cannot, as Carruthers did, selectively edit out part of that intent without altering the intent itself.

Of course, like anybody else, the legislature's intentions may not be good. They may even be unconstitutional. In that case, strike the \$50,000 appropriation.

Jack Campbell, the governor's attorney, seemed to make that very case in April. We realize, he stated, that if a line-item veto is made, "the money is gone."

\$1,861,200 million - \$50,000 = \$1,811,200.

A subjective evaluation, granted. But it makes sense. Otherwise, the chief executive, merely by vetoing restrictive language, ends up with unrestricted money to spend.

That state of affairs will never be within legislative intent.

Allowing the chief executive to line-item veto restrictive language but keep the money accompanying it, can produce absurd results.

The 1988 General Appropriations Act contained this language: "Included in the general fund appropriation to the mental health component of the community health programs is \$358,200 to provide three and one half percent cost of living increase for the community based providers employees."

Carruthers vetoed the underlined language - and rightfully so. "These providers are indepen-

dent contractors," he noted. "The Department has no control over the budgets of these contractors and thus cannot mandate a cost-of-living increase..."

The Supreme Court upheld Carruthers' line-item veto. "The legislature," it ruled, "has no authority to alter the terms of existing employment contracts between HED and its providers..." The legislature has intruded far too deeply into the executive function... Since the condition itself is improper, we decline to adopt petitioners' argument that the appropriation must also fail. The legislature left the governor little choice but to strike the offensive language and save the HED ap-

propriation. The veto was valid."

Delete the language, keep the money. I disagree. Let's look at what we are left with:

The total general fund appropriation to mental health community programs was \$10,761,100. By striking the conditional language, state law presently reads: "Included in the general fund appropriation to the mental health component of the community programs is \$358,200."

Perplexing. \$10 million of course included \$358,200, just as it includes any other amount less than \$10 million. The sentence is nonsense without the condition that modified it.

## EDITORIAL

People and agencies always tend to overreact to a crisis or emergency. And, often unfairly, we want someone to blame—even for natural disasters.

The fire situation in Yellowstone National Park is an emergency, a crisis brought about by a combination of factors including a dirty trick played by nature.

The Forest Service has had a long policy of letting lightning-caused fires burn themselves out unless life or property is threatened.

Now there is strong pressure to make the Forest Service abandon that policy because of what has happened in Yellowstone National Park, a national treasure.

Perhaps because hindsight is better than foresight, the "let burn" policy was wrong in this one particular instance. But this is no reason to not give Forest Service people the flexibility in the future to do what's best for a national forest. To set a rigid policy which would apply to all forest fires would be a terrible mistake. Forest management requires making judgment calls, and sometimes those calls will be wrong. But let's not tie the hands of the experts who usually know what procedures are best to insure a healthy national forest.

The reason we are interested is because we live and work and play in the midst of a beautiful national forest. If a controlled burn is the best answer to forest management, let's have it.

If letting a fire burn itself out is the best answer, let's have it.

If putting massive manpower to work to stop a wildfire is the best answer, let's have it.

Let's maintain flexibility in meeting emergencies. After all we all have a stake in the health of our national forest. And some years it will be super dry just as it's been extraordinarily wet this year.






