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
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
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

## Economic development group to show off offices at open house on Thursday

The Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County (EDCLC) will show off its new office between 1 and 7 p.m. Thursday, September 22.

The office, located in Suite 3C, on the third floor of the Ruidoso Financial Center on Mechem Drive, will be home to the group which started two years ago as a committee of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce.

The original committee dealt with the development of the old airport property, said EDCLC chairman Buddy Bundick. Eventually the committee hopes to attract outside businesses to Ruidoso. Bundick said the concept was successful enough to make the exploration of economic development for the county a priority.

The committee split with the chamber to better administrate the advertising funds and decided to "broaden our scope" to include the rest of Lincoln County.

After many meetings, the group, no longer a committee of the chamber, formed a non-profit corporation with its own set of bylaws and constitution, and Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County was born.

Originally, the group asked the villages for funds, but as everyone was cutting budgets, the idea did not gel, Bundick admitted. So the group advertised and began to sell memberships. And every Lincoln County community bought a membership in EDCLC.

Now with 161 members, there is a 15-member board of directors. Bundick is president, Scott Shafer of Carrizozo is vice-president, Ronnie Paulger of Ruidoso is treasurer and Cindy Lynch of Ruidoso is secretary.

Board members from Lincoln

County communities are Crystal Lueras from Corona, Dorothy Smith from Capitan, Hal Simms from Carrizozo, Jake Harris from Ruidoso Downs, J.D. James from Ruidoso, Ralph Dunlap from the Lincoln County Board of County Commissioners and John Jeffers from the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce.

Dr. Bill Harrison, Roy Crocker, Don Shaw and Rod Adamson complete the board.

EDCLC is looking for export businesses which do not rely on the local economy to exist. Bundick said the group is trying to attract smaller businesses with 10 employees or less. If a small business fails, the impact on the community will be less than with a large business hiring a large number of local employees.

Bundick acknowledged Ruidoso may get the most attention from prospects, but EDCLC also is looking for prospects that are interested in other communities in Lincoln County.

"The whole county seriously lacks export business," Bundick continued. "Retail and tourism are still the major industries in our area, yet we still need to diversify."

EDCLC drew a budget this year, and at their board of directors meeting May 19, the pursuing of a half-mill levy was approved. The board then approached the Lincoln County Commissioners for funding at budget time. Commissioner John Allen Hightower suggested EDCLC members approach every Lincoln County Community for the mill levy approval by their councils.

In a near-unanimous approval (Capitan Trustees approved the mill levy idea with two dissenting votes) from the county villages, EDCLC went back to the commissioners.

The half-mill levy was imple-

mented and now pays the bills for EDCLC. The mill levy will provide about \$120,000 this year for advertising and other expenses. The advertising will target markets and draw inquiries from businesses in other areas. To date, EDCLC has had several inquiries, all of which are confidential, Bundick said.

Matching funds of \$12,500 were received from the New Mexico Economic Development and Tourism Department. "Lincoln County was fortunate in receiving these funds," Bundick added.

"We put a lot of money in the state coffers from tourism," he continued. "The state can't overlook us."

Bundick is pleased with the support throughout the county.

EDCLC "has given a voice to entities outside of Ruidoso," said Bill Harrison.

Governor Carruthers is encouraging more regional efforts in economic development, Bundick added.

Thursday, the public will have a chance to see the office which will be financed with the half-mill levy funds. EDCLC secretary Dixie Bellows already is organizing the office. Much of the office machinery and furnishings were donated, making that part of the budget small.

Most of the budget will be spent on salaries and advertising to target prospective business, Bundick said. The group plans to advertise nationally for a director as well as advertising to attract businesses. "And advertising is expensive," he concluded.

The "office warming" begins at 1 p.m. and at 6 p.m. the Ruidoso Valley Greeters will host a ribbon-cutting. The warming concludes at 7 p.m. Refreshments will be served and EDCLC members will be present to answer questions.

## Slipup alleged in village's insurance

The Ruidoso Village Council, after an executive session on personnel Tuesday, reconvened to discuss workmen's compensation insurance.

With two binders in their possession, one from Safeco and another from the New Mexico Self Insurers Fund (NMSIF), councillors finally voted to place the village workmen's compensation coverage in the state pool.

Although the policy expired on September 1, the village didn't put it out for bid.

"Someone is slack in village hall for not acting on this before now," said Councillor J.D. James, noting he just found out about the problem on Monday. Councillor Al Junge, a retired insurance man, also was critical of administration's handling of the workmen's compensation insurance.

Finance director John Varley said the village had a three-year contract with Safeco through its local agent, the Insurance Center. That contract just expired. Varley said the change he recommended—to Self Insurers—was one recommended during the major insurance overhaul worked out last year under the guidance of consultant Tom Raborn.

While Councillor Junge pushed to keep the insurance with the local firm, Varley concurred with the consultant's recommendation to place the policy in the state pool. Varley gave the council a written report, which they apparently discussed during their closed meeting.

In that report, Varley said insurance policies must be competitively bid if the premiums exceed \$5,000.

Varley quoted an attorney general's opinion that "the self insurance fund offered by the NMSIF is a pooling of reserves, and payments thereto are in essence a pooling of funds and not a procurement in the context of the Procurement Code, and therefore not subject to the bid requirement of the Code."

In order to comply with the state procurement code, Varley said the village had no choice but to contract with NMSIF.

Junge said the NMSIF lost more than a half million dollars in 1987, but Varley disagreed. He said the Risk Management Division of the General Services Department showed a shortage in reserves, but stressed that Risk Management and NMSIF are different and separate.

"We were assured the pool is healthy," said Varley. Junge, noting that the local carrier had supplied the binder on September 1, said the change would be a "shabby" way to treat the company. He said the binder was presented by Safeco in plenty of time.

"We don't even know who authorized the Self Insurers binder," said Junge, but Varley said it was "no accident."

"You can get in serious trouble if you don't go by procurement codes," said village attorney John Underwood.

The Safeco quote was for \$141,000, but Varley said it wasn't that simple. He said the cost would be adjusted based on losses, with a possible dividend at the end of the year. He said it would be \$73,000 with zero loss and \$172,000 with substantial losses.

Varley said the NMSIF quote

was for \$99,848 with the possibility of a dividend.

But Junge questioned why the NMSIF quote was decreased twice after telephone calls on Monday or Tuesday.

"If we don't accept (NMSIF) we're legally obligated for \$49,924," said Varley.

"We need to accept the low money bid," commented Councillor Tom McNeil, and Varley responded, "you're required by law to do that."

Junge finally made a motion to renew with Safeco at \$141,876, and James seconded; with the two voting in favor of the motion. Councillor Jess Stinson voted "yes, if it's legal."

Councillors McNeil, Elmer Pirelli and Larry Simon voted "no," and the mayor broke the tie with a "no" vote.

James then made a motion to appoint division director Leon Eggleston to oversee village insurance policies, but the group didn't vote, agreeing to discuss their idea with village manager Frank Potter who is on vacation.

Questioned Friday about the insurance policies, Varley said the NMSIF was created in 1983 or 1984 by the State Legislature when private carriers were unwilling to write municipal workmen's compensation policies.

"It's a pool—that's why it's not a purchase," he said.

Varley said his recommendation was strictly a fiscal one, in line with the overall recommendation of the consultant.

"As far as I know the agent provided superb service ... no problems," said Varley.

## B. Bartlett is freed of all charges

Charges against Boyd Bartlett were dismissed recently in District Court in Carrizozo.

Accused last August on sex charges, Bartlett's attorney filed the motion to dismiss on grounds the state failed to comply with a court order compelling them to produce an audio tape of the complaining witness's statement.

District Judge Richard A. Parsons signed the dismissal order.

Assistant district attorney Scott Key told The News some months ago that Bartlett's first trial ended in a hung jury.

Bartlett said that jury ended in a 10-2 vote for acquittal. Although he was pleased to put what he said turned out to be a year-long nightmare behind him, Bartlett said he would have been happier to have a "not guilty" verdict.

"I didn't do it," said Bartlett, who has contended from the first that he is innocent of all charges. He said the false charges have cost him around \$75,000, as well as his job and his home.

"I've lost face in this community," said Bartlett. He said his family has been in the area for three generations, he has roots here and intends to stay.

"I just want everybody to know," stressed Bartlett.

He said he has no prior felony convictions and was critical of the way this case was handled.

Bartlett also was critical of The News for its coverage of his case.

But Thursday, Bartlett said his main interest is in letting people know that he has been exonerated of all charges.

## Letha Barnes is appointed

Governor Garrey Carruthers has reappointed Letha Barnes of Ruidoso to the State Cosmetology Board.

Letha Barnes, 39, is owner of Olympian University of Cosmetology in Ruidoso. She holds a Cosmetologist and Instructor's license from Texas and New Mexico. She comes to the Cosmetology Board with 20 years experience.

She was first appointed to the board by Governor Carruthers on May 17, 1988, to replace Betty Buffington of Farmington who resigned.

Barnes is a graduate of Dora High School in Roosevelt County.

councillors gave the go-ahead when the budget was approved. Varley said councillors all were provided with budget request worksheets, with one from the Parks and Recreation Department, entitled Park Repairs, listing a sledding area at School House Park.

That sheet calls for spending \$300 to "provide a safe sledding area for residents and visitors of Ruidoso."

With the need assessed on that sheet as a "necessity," the plans call for purchasing inner tubes and landscaping. According to that worksheet, a fee would be charged and the area open on the weekends as a revenue-producing operation.

Obermueller said the usage fee will be minimal, from 50 to 75 cents. In separate conversations he estimated from six to a dozen trees will be removed, along with underbrush. Obermueller said the Forest Service approves of his plan.

According to Obermueller, Tom Dorgan of Ski Cloudcroft has agreed to bring over his snowmaking equipment to prepare the base.

to 12 to the Albuquerque Public Schools with 85,000 students in K-12 (the 27th largest in the United States.)

New Mexico is one of a few states where the majority of students are "minority" races. This cultural diversity is an asset, he said.

The idea of reform describes an era of change, which has resulted in good and bad effects. How the reform is enacted makes "all the difference in the world," Morgan opined.

The Nation at Risk program, which began in 1983, began a movement that culminated in the New Mexico State Legislature in 1986 with Senate Bill 106. The SB106 created massive change, as the legislature felt there was not enough change rapidly enough, Morgan continued.

SB106 is a 55-page, 30-section set of new laws in a five-year phase-in with a price tag of hundreds of millions of dollars, Morgan said.

One major aspect of SB106 was the repeal of teacher tenure. The controversial repeal created a fear among many, especially the teachers' union, that massive firings would result. They did not, Morgan acknowledged.

In turn, teachers were to have received raises of \$2,200. Another aspect of SB106 was the lowering of class size, especially high school English. The price tag of such a mandate was feasible in 1986 when the price of oil was much higher than today, Morgan said.

"When the legislature was asked to sign the check (this year) they were not in the position to do it," Morgan said.

The smaller classes are better for kids, he opined.

A new project for the National Association of State Boards of Education (NASBE) is a "second wave of reform" with a project to identify the barriers created by school reform. The project will enlist teachers and other educators to visit schools to target areas of reform that teachers feel are barriers to their performance in the classroom.

"I said I would donate the use of some equipment," said Dorgan, who was contacted by Lynn Willard of the Parks and Recreation Advisory Board.

Dorgan said he has discontinued the tubing area he had at Ski Cloudcroft.

"It's very, very dangerous and the liability was prohibitive for me," said Dorgan. "It is dangerous if it's not supervised. The size of the hill they're proposing will limit the hazard," added Dorgan.

"I'd like to see it," said Dorgan, stressing that anything that enhances recreational opportunities for winter vacationers will be good for the town.

"It gives people an alternative to skiing," said Dorgan.

Questioned over the liability concerns, Varley said the area will be covered under current village insurance policies.

Village manager Frank Potter is on vacation, and councillors Tom McNeil and Elmer Pirelli couldn't be reached for comment.

Both Stinson and James said they'll ask village staff for a report on the proposed sledding area.

percent at the state level. The remaining small amounts come from local property taxes collected. This system, "the Robin Hood" concept, Morgan coined, takes funds from the richer areas of the state (where mining and other extraction industries provide larger revenues) and distributes them to all school districts accordingly.

In the future Morgan predicts New Mexico to be a leader state in identifying a "restructuring change." The restructuring is designed to return responsibilities back to the local level.

"Not all wisdom resides in the state capitol," Morgan humored.

"The wisdom resides in the local children."

Also during the session, board members heard reports from Fern Kaufman, president of the South Dakota School Board Association and Storrs Bishop, president of the Montana School Board Association. Both are local school board members in their respective states.

A common complaint of school reform was the lack of state funding to support the reforms mandated by the legislatures. Both states are dependent on local property taxes to support their school programs, a situation which creates problems in districts where property values are low. And in South Dakota, a move is on to eliminate property taxes, a move which worries educators there.

All three states represented share the common problem of basing state revenues on resource industries, all of which have suffered financially recently.

In summary, Tim Barritt president of the Wyoming School Board Association, listed the poor tests scores and the loss of funds as major problems. Barritt stated there are more cost-effective ways of teaching, testing and establishing curriculums.

State standards for teachers, administrators and colleges of education hopefully will help raise educational standards.

"The changes all take time," Barritt concluded.

A resident of El Paso, Texas, since 1968, Gress was a rancher in Roswell, a restaurant owner in


Ruidoso and a retired construction engineer for Highway Systems in five states and Puerto Rico.

## RHS victory trumpeting should be slightly muted

The Ruidoso Warriors man-handled a scappy Tularosa Wildcat team to post its first victory of the season, 22-16, Friday night.

It was homecoming night and the Warriors won. Victory is sweet, so let them rejoice and the trumpets blow. Just don't blow too loudly.

Like a fighter gone mad, the Warriors were bent on destruction, but not always with the skill they possess. For the first time this year they got to be the big kid on the block and at times appeared over-zealous.

Warrior head coach Cooper Henderson congratulated the team for a much needed win, but he is also looking for improvement before district play.

"We have the talent to play better," he said. "And we will. Our early season losses to the state's top ranked teams may have created doubts among some when it shouldn't have. Last year we were beaten in early season, but showed marked improvement each game. We needed the state as a contender. We need to see that kind of improvement again and we will continue this week to work on a formula to bring our players back to unit play."

"We're glad to have this win. With two games before district play we're still optimistic toward the task ahead of us."

Michael Swanner continues to be a bright spot for the Warriors working the bootleg play and sweeps to perfection.

Kenny Trapp, stopped cold mid-field, broke a death grip tackle and galloped for 56 yards.

A designed two-pointer worked to chalk board perfection.

"John Winans' stiff blocks opened some holes for Warrior backs.

Logan Stirnam continues to be a fine complement to Trapp in the running attack.

Tularosa gained respect for themselves despite their loss to the Warriors.

The Wildcats have a good team, with good discipline and should be a contender for their district.

The Wildcats opening on-side kick worked flawlessly. Senior running back Craig Glaze broke dozens of tackles for an outstanding game and senior quarterback Steve Garcia delivered heady play that kept the Wildcats alive until the waning moments of the fourth quarter.

First quarter summary: Tularosa is successful with an on-side kick and starts possession on the Warrior 40-yard line. An 18-yard pass and two running plays and the Wildcats score. The rain-bow pass conversion is good and Tulie leads 8-0.

The kickoff is fumbled and recovered by Bubba Lane near the 20.

Kenny Trapp gains three up the middle. Trapp then powers his way up the middle for a 17-yard gain. Trapp tries the center for the third straight time is stopped briefly before he breaks a tackle and is finally brought down by an open tackle on the eight yard line for a 56-yard gain. Ira Sago drives off right tackle for three yards. Swanner on a keeper manages three more yards. Trapp gains two. On fourth and two, Swanner keeps over the right side for a touchdown. The two point conversion is good on a Swanner to Trapp pass and the game is tied, 8-8.

On the kickoff, Tularosa is flagged for holding. McCabe Turner drops Garcia for a six yard loss. Turner knocked heads for another Tulie yard loss. Glaze tears up the middle for a first down.

The Wildcats fail to move in the next three plays in which Garcia misses an open receiver.

The Warriors down the kick on the Tularosa 45-yard line. Swanner hands off to Trapp who gains five off center. John Winans blocks for

Logan Stirnam who barrels down the left side to the 32-yard line. Trapp gains another six up the middle. Stirnam runs over right for four yards and a first down.

Swanner keeps to the eight-yard line. Trapp runs twice for two yards. Turner drops a Swanner pass. On fourth and six, Swanner squeezes through defenders for the TD. Stirnam's kick is good and the Warriors are up, 15-8.

Second quarter summary. Warrior defense dominates the second quarter. Ira Sago has a 35-yard touchdown run nullified because a Warrior hit below the waist. Zach Chavez and McCabe Turner assert themselves with several tackles for Wildcat losses.

Jesse Guardiola shows a good pair of hands with a nice reception of a high Swanner pass. It appeared the Warriors were on the move near the end of the quarter when another Warrior hit below the waist kills momentum. Swanner's long pass to make up the lost ground is intercepted. Neither team moved on two possessions and the half ended, 15-8, Warriors.

Third quarter summary: Wildcats can't move and kick deep to the Warriors who grind it back to Tulie territory on a series of short runs. Sago is stopped on a fourth down run and the Wildcats take over on the Warrior 40.

The Cats can't move and boot deep to the Warriors five-yard line. Swanner hits Guardiola on the 15, and he takes it to the 28 before being knocked out of bounds. The third quarter "theatre of the dull" ends, 15-8, Warriors.

Fourth quarter summary: Warriors start on their 28-yard line.



## Cycling equipment and setup see changes over last 15 years

Muscles burned as legs reaching exhilarating speeds of 61 miles per hour. Ruidoso's Jesse Foster was following a semi-truck across Apache Summit towards Mescalero on a bicycle.

Ruidoso high school English teacher Galen Farrington initiated the cycling program 15 years ago with his wife, Chris, and principal Tom Hanson.

"Hanson was very instrumental in providing us with instrumentation and money to get the program off its feet," said Farrington. "By 1979 we had our first state champion. Every time we have gone to state we have medaled."

Farrington said the United States Cycling Federation classifies everything according to age and experience.

This June, Roger Marr was the state champion in two events. Clay Mosley took fifth in his two events.

Farrington said Jesse Foster, a team member and five time medalist, didn't medal this year because he devoted his energy to skiing.

Farrington said Buck Bowen, a former student graduate, is a top skier and cyclist. This year in Spokane, Washington, Bowen made it all the way through the Olympic trials. He's on the best team in the country.

Farrington said most road cyclists are in their mid-twenties to late twenties, with a long peak of about ten years. "Endurance sports are a little easier on your body when it comes to peaking," he said.

"We have the longest season in sports," said Farrington. "It starts near the end of March and doesn't end until November."

"There's one race in Ruidoso, the race to the ski area," Farrington said. "It's the first Sunday in October. A relatively short race, covering 12 miles, but you know what the road to the ski area is like."

Ruidoso is the only school that has an adviser, Farrington. All students from other schools compete on their own.

"I've tried for years to get other schools involved with cycling, but interest is lacking," he said.

Last year was a good year for participation according to Farrington. "We had two girls who were very good, Emily Chavez and Tina Beechie, freshmen. There are only a few girls who participate in cycling in this state. Ironically, we have a Tour de France competitor in Carole Rogers Denning of Las Cruces. Hopefully we can get her to inspire

other girls to participate in the sport.

Over the past 15 years the equipment and the whole organization of cycling has changed. During the national championships and Olympic trials this year, there were no riders wearing state championship jerseys, only team jerseys, very commercialized.

A cyclist can earn an average of 200 dollars a day and still be considered an amateur.

"Basically, the bicycle itself hasn't changed a whole lot," said Farrington. "What has changed is the technology of the materials and the design factors."

"For instance, just ten years ago it would be unheard of to have a carbon fiber or an aluminum frame. Now we have both those substances used. Some machines are actually made with steel, aluminum and fiber, all three elements. In the 1980 national championships, a bicycle with a six-speed rear and was introduced. My bicycle today has a seven-speed rear end, 14 gears for racing. This year's Tour de France offered a new development, a 16-speed racing bike, eight-speed rear end. It's not on the market yet."

"Tires today weigh mere ounces, you can see through the inner tubes as opposed to the old thick rubber tubes that were very heavy. A racing tire today weighs nine ounces, 20 years ago they weighed two pounds."

"Spokes aren't round anymore. They are either ovalized through the wind better, flat as blades or completely disc wheels with no spokes at all. A disc wheel weighs more, but because it is more aero-dynamic you can go faster. The disc wheel has a very specific

use that is only used in road racing. Bikes don't use it in road racing.

"Bikes today are much more specialized. The average racing cyclist has a bike for time trials, a bicycle for road racing and a bicycle for criteriums, the three major aspects of cycling. Each bike may have three or four sets of gears, two or three sets of spokes. When you get to that level it is all paid for by a sponsor."

"Wearing apparel is extremely important in cycling. Fifteen years ago everybody wore wool shorts, wool jerseys. Now they have lycra one piece suits, a synthetic that form fits to the body so you cut down on wind resistance."

"Over 66 percent of the cyclist's energy after 25 miles per hour goes into fighting wind resistance. At 30 miles per hour, it jumps to approximately 90 percent. So anything you can do to cut wind resistance enables the cyclist to go faster."

"Everything worn in cycling is designed for a specific purpose. The shorts are cut mid-thigh length, because you are riding the bicycle in a lean over position. Shorter shorts tend to ride up on the leg and bunch in the groin area. Chamois leather was used to protect chafing. Today, elastic is used on the inside to prevent the shorts from crawling, and synthetic pads replace chamois."

"The shoes are designed with built in angulation so the foot is in the proper cycling position. They come with cleats and steel shanks so the shoe does not bend. The cleat is designed to put your foot in exactly the right place on the pedal so there is no movement."

If you have too much movement at the foot you can have knee damage. Today's design increases your efficiency from 20 to as much as 70 percent. A cycling shoe can cost from \$30 to \$200."

"In cycling you pay for two things, weight that you don't have to carry and technology and design. The greater the technology, the greater the cost."

"Finally, success in cycling really comes down to the person riding the bike. Roger Marr is a good example. He rides an entry level racing bike that sells for around 400 dollars and he is seventh in the nation. He has no fancy frills and yet competed with cyclists who spent thousands of dollars on equipment. Roger knows how to motivate himself. He has the discipline, trains hard, and has the heart of a winner."



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# Ruidoso is praised for maintaining 'natural' beauty

Representatives of Keep New Mexico Beautiful (KNMB) were in Ruidoso Friday and had words of praise for the village.

"Ruidoso ... I just can't get over it," said Evelyn Prentice, a member of the KNMB speakers bureau. "Ruidoso is one of the few places in New Mexico where you have not allowed people to take down all the trees."

Prentice praised Ruidoso for maintaining a natural mountain setting, in spite of its tremendous growth.

The villages of Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs, as well as the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce are members of Keep New Mexico Beautiful, a non-profit organization that serves as a clearing house for beautification groups in

the state.

Keep New Mexico Beautiful works closely with the Keep America Beautiful System. According to Prentice, KNMB offers grants to municipalities and other groups to plant trees, wildflowers and native plants. Annual awards are divided among five categories: communities, organizations, businesses, individual and media.

Prentice, along with her husband, Glenn Prentice, showed slides of the many KNMB activities and accomplishments, and answered questions of the half dozen citizens on hand.

Two major annual programs sponsored by KNMB include a state birthday celebration on January 6, and an Arbor Day program the second Friday in March. Grants are associated with both of those special days.

Prentice stressed that education is an ongoing priority.

"The best place to start is with the children," said Prentice, displaying a children's book that is used in a third grade school class unit. She said the State Department of Education distributes from 22,000 to 30,000 of the booklet each year.

Dusty Roadrunner is the KNMB mascot, and the organization provides a costume so the statewide cleanup symbol can appear at activities throughout the state.

Prentice, the winner of the Lady Bird Johnson Keep America Beautiful Award two years ago, said the group takes a behaviorally-based system approach to handling litter and waste. She said major sources of litter are improper disposal from

households and commercial operations, followed by uncovered vehicles, construction projects, motorists and pedestrians.

"Litter travels," said Prentice, encouraging citizens to work for updated ordinances, effective enforcement and continuing education.

"I'm really proud of what you've done here—you've done an awful lot with very little," said Prentice.

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# Sheriff candidate McSwane cites track record

"I am qualified to be the next sheriff of Lincoln County," said James McSwane Thursday.

The Republican candidate for Lincoln County Sheriff presented his credentials and answered questions for members of the Fraternal Order of Police.

"I understand the people of Lincoln County," said McSwane, listing

his training and experience. McSwane, a private investigator, said he has worked as an investigator for the Sheriff's Office and for the District Attorney's office, and has been an employee of the State Corrections Department.

McSwane said his only campaign promise has been to employ Bob Miller as his chief deputy. Miller, a 31-year veteran

with the New Mexico State Police, retired as a district commander in Las Cruces. He spent much of his law enforcement career in Ruidoso and Alamogordo.

Miller was also on hand to answer questions. He denied a statement made by former sheriff Tom Sullivan that he might be a candidate for his chief deputy if Sullivan is elected.

"I haven't talked to Tom since 1985, when I was transferred out of here," said Miller.

Asked who will be running his department, McSwane replied, "I will." He said he will head the chain of command, followed by Miller.

"No, I'm not going to hire (Sheriff) Don Samuels," was McSwane's response to another question. He said Samuels hasn't asked, but he believes the current sheriff is moving from the area. He refuted rumors that a large contribution was accepted with the stipulation that he hire Samuels.

McSwane said Alto resident Jackie Spencer did contribute \$1,000 to his campaign, but Samuels' name wasn't mentioned.

McSwane said if the undersheriff, Rex Skellett, submits an application, he'll evaluate it along with other requests for employment.

The candidate said he'll do everything in his power to get higher wages for his deputies. Asked about overtime costs, McSwane said he will try to keep them to a minimum, but believes overtime is sometimes unavoidable.

McSwane said he'll commission all the current deputies, and place them on general hours.

"I'm going to give you credit for knowing your community ... what's happening ... when to be out," said McSwane. He said if the deputies can't figure out how to work a 40-hour week and cover their territory,

then he'll assign hours.

"I'll back up my men," said McSwane, saying he won't assign his deputies to do jobs he isn't willing to do himself.

Stressing cooperation among agencies, and working with other law enforcement officers, McSwane was faced with questions about his own record.

Asked if he was arrested for driving drunk, rolling a vehicle and failing to file a report while he was working for Sheriff Ernie Sanchez,

"That did happen eight or nine years ago; I was cited and given a three-day suspension," responded McSwane admitting he has been arrested twice. He said he pled no contest to the accident charges, and was also arrested for disorderly conduct after a domestic dispute. He said he no longer drinks, and those problems are behind him.

On departmental policy, one member wanted to know if shooting at fleeing vehicles will be standard practice.

"I don't believe it was a policy when I shot at fleeing vehicles when I was a deputy," said McSwane, adding there are situations when he believes a vehicle needs to be disabled.

McSwane was critical of his opponent's security service, calling it a conflict of interest.

"If elected I won't sell a service that I can't provide as sheriff," said McSwane.

"More time needs to be spent on felony criminal cases," said McSwane, who said his officers will be instructed to work traffic; but traffic won't be the top priority.

He said he'll put an emphasis on continued training for his officers, and regaining the trust and respect of the people of Lincoln County.

"The Sheriff's Office can have pride ... the cooperation from all agencies, and the respect of all of Lincoln County," said McSwane.





## Eye On The Capitol

Here's the election all the politicians are talking about. No, not president. It's Senate District 40 in Otero County.

The state senate is currently tied 21-21, between Democrats and Republicans. The entire chamber is up for election in November.

The party that wins will dictate the upcoming senate reapportionment. That could mean dominance for a decade.

You can bet Governor Carruthers is watching the senate elections closely. If the Republicans lose, Carruthers could find his legislative program staked out on the ant bed.

Simply put: one senate seat could easily make all the difference. That's where Senate District 40 comes in. Its major characteristic: sheer contrariness.

In 1984, William Vandergriff won the seat as a Republican, then switched to Democrat.

The Republicans weren't exactly thrilled. Republican State Representative Maurice Hobson decided to run against Vandergriff.

But district voters had other ideas. Vandergriff lost the June Democratic primary to Tom Overstreet.

"He was a little short guy," Maurice Hobson told me. "Nobody wanted to dance with him."

A fourth-generation Otero resident, Hobson was talking about life in the 1800's. "My grandmother's sisters went to dances where Billy the Kid was. She told me that."

Hobson was first elected to the house in 1970. Only one representative has more seniority. I asked him: Why switch to the senate?

Hobson is on the House Appropriations and Finance Committee. The HAFIC prepares the General Appropriations Act to fund state government.

The senate always amends the Act. That's where Hobson feels he can play a key role. "I know that bill backwards and forwards. It would put me in good shape in the senate."

Critics charge that in 17 years in Santa Fe, Hobson never chaired a major committee. His defense: "That's simple. When you're on House Appropriations Committee, there's only one chairman. Being a minority [Republican], I never had a chance. Hobson and I were always Democrats, even during the coalition days [under conservative Democrat/Republican leadership]."

Hobson defines his major accomplishments as "big projects I've brought home." Specific examples: improvements in Highway 70 and the North Florida Road, and funding for the Cloudcroft and Tularosa water systems.

"The Republicans feel the race is very important," Hobson notes. Congressman Joe Skeen went door-

to-door with him in Alamogordo. Mrs. Pete Domenici will arrive soon.

And with good reason. "The Democrats have targeted my district. That makes me feel good, that I'm doing something they want to do."

"Very seldom," Tom Overstreet observed, "can you run against two incumbents in the same race."

How does he differ from Hobson? "I'm more pro-education than his record reflects." Earlier this year, Overstreet supported a special session to increase teachers' pay. He feels now "we're running out of time."

Overstreet questions the "effectiveness of Mr. Hobson to bring tax dollars back to Otero. It's bad enough to pay taxes; it's worse when a fair share doesn't come back."

Behind this "double-shot at the taxpayers," Overstreet sees Hobson's shortage of committee chairmanships. "Other Otero legislators have held positions of leadership," Overstreet said. He singled out Aubrey Dunn, a prior occupant of the Senate District 40 seat, who for years chaired the powerful Senate Finance Committee.

Not surprisingly, Overstreet's first choice of committee assignments is the SFC. "I'm an attorney and a certified public accountant. I think I could add something to that committee."

As a senator, Overstreet would focus on "education and jobs. Federal cutbacks are hurting White Sands and Holloman. We need to concentrate on economic development, tourism and retirement communities."

"The campaign looks good," Overstreet says. "We're lining up mailouts, door-to-door work -- the standard how-to-win strategy."

Is the Democratic Party given him extra assistance? "I've received letters from state Democratic senators asking how they can help... The Democratic Party considers this to be an important race."

But the key ingredient, Overstreet believes, is his Otero organization. "I have a lot of excellent people helping me," including Aubrey Dunn.

Voting returns in past elections indicate the Hobson/Overstreet contest is up for grabs. In 1984, a presidential year like 1988, Republican William Vandergriff defeated incumbent Democrat Wyatt Atkins, 4,665 to 3,795. Vandergriff won 15 out of 21 precincts (including absentees).

That sounds like solid Republican turf. However, many of the elections that year were very close. And there are cases of Democrats defeating Republicans: in fact, in the 6 precincts overlapping Hob-

son's house district, Hobson lost by 19 votes to Democrat Reynaldo Cordova (1,454 to 1,435).

But don't conclude from those numbers alone that Hobson is in trouble. In 1986, he carried those precincts over his Democratic opponent, Steven Sanders, by 1,471 to 870.

1984 was the year of the Reagan landslide. You'd expect Democrats to do better in 1986, and they did. Even that year, however, Senate District 40 was again noteworthy

for so many close elections.

Conclusion? Republicans take comfort in the fact that this is a presidential year; Democrats, in finding that even if George Bush wins the district, his coattails won't be very long.

Based on past results, I suspect that when all the votes are counted, Senate District 40 will somehow find a way to prove both parties right.

Or is that wrong?


**DEAR EDITOR:**





**5. Run on consecutive days.** Your ad will not get results if you don't see it! Therefore, it is important to set up a consistent and consecutive ad schedule with your telephone salesperson or outside sales representative. Run your ad for at least one week. Remember, you can cancel your ad as soon as you get the desired results!



**2. Include the price.** Don't waste your time or a potential buyer's time. If you advertise the price of the item or service you offer, the people who respond to your ad will be those who are genuinely interested. Surveys show that readers are more interested in those items and services they know are within their price range.



**4. Include phone number and specify hours.** Be sure to let potential customers know when and where to call. Surveys show that even if a person is very interested in your item or service, he or she will not call back after the first attempt. Stay near the phone during the hours you indicate you will be available. Don't risk missing a sale!
