The Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC), the group that developed the multi-million Sierra Blanca Regional Airport (SBRA), may soon disband.

Attorney John Underwood told the Ruidoso Village Council during a work session Tuesday that he is

drafting an agreement to eliminate the joint powers agreement between the village and Lincoln County. SBAC was formed in that agreement.

Underwood said he's working on a plan for the village to take on, not only the operations at SBRA, but also the continuing development of the regional air facility. He said his

preliminary plan calls for the county to turn over to the village all deeds to airport property.

County attorney Gary Mitchell confirmed Underwood's statements, noting the Lincoln County Commission has seen the airport through its initial development and will con-

## Lodgers tax group deals with problem

The problem was based upon a payment made to Paul Crown for publicity of the Chili Cook-off. The cook-off was one of the groups which received funding at budget time this year.


Ruidoso village clerk Tammy Maddox reported a payment was made by the city to the cook-off before proof of non-profit status was received by the LTAB. Maddox said she would withhold funds until LTAB took action or proper forms were submitted by Crown.

LTAB members Mike Warren, Bill McBeth, Bobby Parsons, Anne Evans and Dick Weber discussed the merits of the event, its past years of success and its probable compliance with non-profit statutes. Weber moved the cook-off committee, because it promised to furnish proof of non-profit status and has already received partial payment toward their budgeted amount, be allowed to receive the balance of funds budgeted to them.

Weber, McBeth and Parsons voted in favor, Evans and Warren voted against it, but the motion carried.

Treasurer Evans noted the Retirement Services Division had not submitted any bills against their budgeted \$10,000 allotment. Maddox explained that funds do not automatically carry into a new year and may be lost by not submitting a voucher for payment. Village councillor Al Junge suggested the

## Old mill site believed contamination source

The discovery of toxic waste is disturbing, and when it is in or near your home town, cleanup becomes a priority.

When the New Mexico Environmental Improvement Division (EID) heard of a person with possible cyanide poisoning at a local hospital, they began to investigate. Division personnel suspected a milling operation in Carrizozo. When the site was investigated, indeed cyanide was found in a water well.

The mill, named Cimarron Mining Corporation, also known as Southwestern Minerals Corporation, operated during 1979-82. The mill

recovered metal from ore transported to the site. The process used a solution of cyanide salt and metal stripper. Previously, the mill was operated by Sierra Blanca Mining and Milling for extraction of gold with cyanide. Both processes generated a liquid waste containing cyanide and heavy metals.

A site inspection by the EID in October, 1984, revealed two cyanide solution tanks, a discharge pit, tailings impoundment, an uncovered tailing pile and a drum storage area. The tailings impoundment and pile were located outside a fence surround the rest of the site.





# Health insurance pitch presented to Chamber of Commerce board

The Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce board of directors endorsed a poll of local insurance agents concerning a health plan proposal offered through United Chambers.

Meeting at their new 4 p.m. time Wednesday, the board heard a presentation of the health plan proposal by Terry Green who is an agent with Dalton Insurance Company of Alamogordo. Green said the United Chambers Insurance Plan (UCIP) is a good tool for attracting members to the chamber.

If the chamber chooses to go with UCIP, chamber members in good standing will be given the option to purchase the plan.

"It is a good program at reasonable cost," Green said.

There will be no occupational exclusions, although the plan is based upon a business with 14 employees or less and the rates are based on the age of those insured.

Only full-time employees of a business belonging to the chamber will be covered by the plan. Green said the Alamogordo Chamber has signed with UCIP and the Las Cruces chamber also is considering it.

Green asked that the chamber give Dalton (his insurance compa-

ny) exclusive rights to market UCIP in Ruidoso.

This request led Dan LeCrone to question why no local agency was to market UCIP. Chamber director John Jeffers replied that no local agency has offered UCIP.

Chamber board president Becky Bell-Durham stated the plan "is an excellent opportunity," but she endorsed a poll of local agencies to see if they would market UCIP.

Durham appointed LeCrone to a committee to poll the local agencies.

Durham also appointed Mary Maul, Rick Evans, Ron Andrews and Roy Crocker as ex-officio members of the chamber board. They will have voting power and will serve one year.

In other business the chamber board:

—Approved the financial institution dues schedule of \$120 plus \$35 per each million dollars deposited.

—Heard a report from Jeffers about the Retirement Services, which has collected \$61,500 and is scheduling a late winter and early spring ad campaign.

—Heard a report on the Winter Recreation Area project in conjunction with the village of Ruidoso. Jeffers said the area will feature supervised tube and other sledding. Jeffers said he hopes a commercial group will take the project over. He

emphasized the area will have a snow-making machine, which was donated.

—Heard a report on the Mule Races. Jeffers suggested the chamber become more involved with the races; such as promotionals other than the existing Aspenfest ads and physical help.

—Approved the appointment of Cindy Lynch to the Old Airport Oversight Committee, with the appointment to go before the Ruidoso village council for approval.

—Heard a report from Ron Andrews about the Golden Aspen Motorcycle Rally. Andrews commented the rally participants were up 20 percent over last year. Jeffers led a discussion about the image of "undesirable" motorcyclists. Possible activities to be sponsored by the chamber next year include an ice cream social, bonfire, melodrama and western entertainment. The group agreed the motorcycle rally promoters need to emphasize a "family and professional" image of many of the riders.

A suggestion to Andrews was to have participants include their profession when they register.

—Approved the Executive Committee meeting change to the Monday a week before the regular Wednesday board meeting.

sider relinquishing further fiscal responsibility as part of any agreement.

The SBAC was formed in 1978, the outgrowth of an airport study commission that worked on the project from 1973-78.

The original commission included Lincoln County, the Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe and the villages of Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs and Capitan. That group obtained the land as well as state and federal funding to build the state-of-the-art airport on Fort Stanton Mesa.

By the time the airport opened in December 1987, the SBAC was reorganized by an amended joint powers agreement between the village and the county. All three members of the Lincoln County Commission and three Ruidoso elected officials appointed by the mayor now serve, with Commissioner Bill Karn as chairman and Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr. as vice-chairman.

The present commission has divided down the middle on a number of issues, with Ruidoso's representatives and the county commissioners at odds over finances. While the joint powers agreement places development responsibilities on the county and operational responsibilities on the village, the two groups have disagreed over paying for the terminal building and large hangar.

Discussions over the proposed dismantling of the group apparently took place in an executive session, but both lawyers said their clients are ready to negotiate a plan to turn SBRA over to the Village of Ruidoso.

Voicing concern over funding future development, the Ruidoso Village Council recently implemented

a mil levy. Mayor Davis also wondered why the Lincoln County Commission didn't continue a mil levy passed last year to pay for airport development.

County manager Suzanne Cox recently sent the village a full accounting over last year's mil levy. She said her report was in response to remarks by Mayor Davis when he directed the attorney to notify the commission that the village expects that body to honor the joint powers agreement by providing a full accounting of all funds.

According to that report, the SBAC has received \$11,773,852 and spent \$11,773,484. Following is a list of the sources of those funds:

Cox said the county spent \$164,524.62 on the airport to provide the local share on federal funds and to pay \$23,271.73 to Otero Electric. Cox said \$27,000 is budgeted for airport utilities. Lincoln County continues to serve as fiscal agent for the SBAC.

## Human services offices here are moved


The Lincoln County office of the New Mexico Human Services Department of the Income Support Division opened today (Monday) October 3, in its new office in the Ruidoso Financial Center.

tal Protection Agency (EPA) erected a fence around the tailing impoundment and piles in August, 1987 to prevent direct contact with hazardous substances.

Analyses conducted by the EID detected cyanide and heavy metals in groundwater, soil, sediment and tailing on the site. Cyanide was detected in a water sample taken from one holding pond in April 1982. In May 1984, a tailings pile sample contained cyanide in levels which are potentially toxic to human health.

In June, 1982, New Mexico charged Cimarron with failing to comply with the state water quality and hazardous waste regulations. The company took no action in response and went out of business. In August, 1984, the company declared bankruptcy in federal court.

As an estimated 1,500 people obtain drinking water from municipal wells within three miles of the site, the EPA considered the site to be enough of a potential problem to investigate.

EPA representative Steve Gilrein, section chief of the EPA office in Dallas, visited Carrizozo last Thursday and briefed the group of about 20 people concerning the investigation scheduled to be funded in January, 1989.

Gilrein briefly covered a historic view of the EPA and hazardous

waste. In the 1970s hazardous waste came into public view. As no laws were on the books then, Congress passed the 1976 Resource Conservation Recovery Act. The act dealt with transportation, handling and disposal of all hazardous wastes, Gilrein said.

But, the act did not cover abandoned sites. Thus the 1980 Superfund law was passed and given \$2.5 billion to begin the clean-up. In 1986, the Superfund was reenacted and given \$8.5 billion.

The EPA works with local EIDs to identify potential hazardous waste sites. These sites are ranked on a priority list. EPA conducts public hearings concerning the sites and when September comes, if no adverse public comment is made, the site is put on a finalized list for hazardous site investigation.

Gilrein told the group present, many from the village of Carrizozo, EPA will institute a comprehensive investigation in January, 1989.

"You will see someone in the field by spring," Gilrein said.

The investigation will encompass all possible areas where waste might be found; ground water contamination and a detailed study of underground water flow patterns, risks assessments and how much waste is at the site.

"We spend an average of \$80,000 on an investigation, and it takes one to two years to complete," Gilrein continued. "The average cost of a clean-up is over \$20 million."

The EPA wants to identify all risks, Gilrein emphasized. The Cimarron site was given a priority by the EPA. Only three sites of the six which were identified in EPA's Region Six, which include Texas and New Mexico, will be funded for a clean-up.

Gilrein said the EPA sampled enough data on the Cimarron site to evaluate it, based on a math model, and add it to a "prioritized" list of the nation's worst hazardous waste sites.

"This (preliminary testing) is no means a comprehensive testing here," Gilrein said.

An audience member, who said he had been a manager of Cimarron, said the information on the fact sheet concerning the site was misleading.

Gilrein said all information about the site is public information and can be obtained from Steve Carry, EID Division Director in Santa Fe.

If the EPA finds hazardous wastes in concentrations that are potentially dangerous to humans, the site will be cleaned up.

The state is required to add 10 percent of the total cost of clean up if it is necessary.

Audience member Nancy Guck questioned how a local contractor could become involved in the bidding process for the initial investigation. Gilrein replied the contractor must have 40 hours of hazardous waste disposal training be-

fore the EPA will consider them. The EPA does not offer training, Gilrein added.

The Cimarron site is the newest of all hazardous sites in New Mexico. The closeness of the site to a population center as well as the contaminants found, added to the reasons why the site is on the Superfund list, Gilrein emphasized.

Questions about the severity of the cyanide contamination came from audience members. Lynn Brandvold and Ibrahim Gundiler, both from New Mexico Tech and Bureau of Mines in Socorro said cyanide breaks down into non-hazardous materials over a period of a few years. They said they wanted to avoid creating a problem with the local population.

"The way it (the amount of possible hazardous waste) is presented, it's terrorizing," said Bob Watson, former manager of the mill.

Gilrein stressed the EPA will bring a team of qualified professionals to investigate the site thoroughly.

"If there is not a significant health threat, we'll tell the people. We will confirm or deny if there is a health threat," Gilrein concluded.

The investigation is scheduled to actually begin at the site in spring, 1989. Public input is accepted and inquiries or comment may be sent to Ellen D. Greeney, Community Relations, EPA, 1445 Ross Avenue, Dallas, Texas 75202.

## Omnibus trade act amended

On August 23, President Reagan signed into law, the Omnibus Trade and Competitiveness Act (OTCA) of 1988.

This new law amends the Trade Adjustment Assistance (TAA) for workers in Chapter 2 of Title II of the Trade Act of 1974. Under OTCA, any worker employed by a firm or appropriate subdivision of a firm that engages in exploration or drilling for oil or natural gas, or

otherwise produces oil or natural gas, who was laid off after September 30, 1985, will have a one-time opportunity to file a petition or re-petition by November 18, 1988.

## Game-tying Canutillo field goal attempt hooks wide; Warriors squeak by 13 to 10

The Ruidoso Warriors escaped with a victory as a Canutillo Eagle game-tying field goal attempt with nine game seconds left, hooked wide, 13-10.

The fourth down chip shot from the six-yard line followed a goal line defensive stand by the Warriors that ended the last and most impressive drive of the Eagles.

An Eagle touchdown was nullified two plays prior to the field goal miss when the runner was illegally pushed across the goal line during a pile up over center. The penalty pushed the Eagles back to the six.

The game marked the second win against four defeats for the Warriors this season. Ruidoso will play Deming in their district opener at Horton Stadium this Friday.

Warrior head coach Cooper Henderson was ambivalent about his win against Canutillo. Any elation he had with winning the game was checked by concern.

"We did not show any improvement this week," Henderson said. "The x's and o's are there. That's not the problem. We just need to have more intensity at game time. Our ability to run a particular defense or an offense is no problem. We can do that. We need to do a better job in getting after it with intensity, school spirit and team concept of playing. And we will this Friday."

The Warrior offense introduced a more balanced running attack against the Eagles, with Logan Stirman and Ira Sago trading turns with Kenny Trapp and Michael Swanner.

Trapp still managed to bust loose for long gains and seemed, at times, to back up for his tacklers to have a second chance.

Stirman had a career first half with strong driving runs and hard tackling, including a sideline touchdown saving hit.

First quarter summary: Swanner opens the game with a pass to Ira Sago on the 30 yard line. The Warriors couldn't get off the dime from there and were forced to kick.

The Eagles, with the help of a 24-yard run, worked Stirman's 45-yard kick back to the mid-field stripe before they are forced to kick.

The Warriors are called for a clip on the kickoff return and start their possession from the five-yard line.


On first and ten, Trapp powers through the right side of the line for a 14-yard gain to the 35. Sago adds eight more to the 42 and Jessie Guardiola captures a Swanner pass in Eagle territory on the 48.

The Warriors nicker and dime their way down the field to the goal line where Swanner keeps for a touchdown. Micah Whitlock splits the timbers for the extra point and the Warriors lead, 7-0.

The Eagles couldn't move and kicked the ball short. Sago covered the ball like a grenade. Swanner found a hole up center for 15 yards

Rusty Silva entered the act with a leaping interception deep in Eagle territory and then fumbled the ball on the run back at the 26-yard line.

The Eagle's didn't move and the field goal attempt fizzled. Swanner was able to throw a couple of incomplete passes before being sacked as the first half ended.

Third quarter summary: Rue's tackle halts a fine kickoff return to the 43-yard line. The Eagles run off

another seven yards before Alcalá broke free for 50 yards and a touchdown. The extra boot was good to tie the Warriors, 7-7.

The Warriors accepted an offside call on the kickoff, and the Eagles second punt resulted in a Swanner fumble and an Eagle recovery on the Warrior 32. The Eagles moved the ball to the 17, but no further. A 30-yard field goal attempt was good and Canutillo grabbed the lead 10-7.

The Warriors fought back and moved down the field with ease. A Swanner handoff to Trapp took the ball to the Eagle's 30. Stirman picked up a leg driving eight and then added five more.

A flag dropped on the Warrior's three-and-one-half yard line and backed them them to the 14. Swanner recaptured most of the ground with a 10 yard pass to Guardiola.

After Trapp picked up a couple of yards, Swanner faked to Stirman and took it across the chalk mark for six. Whitlock's extra point attempt was blocked and the Warriors were back in the lead, 13-10.

Fourth quarter summary: Canutillo's long drive consumed most of the clock in the fourth quarter. With 49 seconds left, the Eagles were second and goal from the nine. A running play took them to the two with 38 ticks left. Ramirez, in a massive pileup near the end zone, was ruled to have been illegally pushed across the goal line and the Eagles suffered a five-yard penalty.

Ramirez kept for one yard and then set up for a field goal attempt. The kick hooked left and the Warriors took over. Swanner dropped to one knee for the final play. The Warriors win it, 13-10.

## Deming spikers shut out Warriors



John won a state championship at Truth or Consequences and one at the military institute at the high school level.

John left coaching in 1972 and opened a sporting goods store in Roswell for nine years. In 1980, he returned to the gridiron as an offensive coach at Roswell.

Since 1980, John's owned a couple of businesses including a steak house in Roswell. Joanne kept pace with her own shop, a successful ladies apparel shop that operated for 13 years.

John said retirement was a mistake. He realized his need to

remain active.

The couple had always loved Ruidoso. So much so that they had a second home in the town for over ten years.

"I wanted to get back to coaching and this is an outstanding and congenial staff," John said.

Joanne has always been a hobby freak. Her most recent hobby is copper plate calligraphy. She also likes needlework, gardening, reading, walking and especially traveling.

Throughout John's coaching career he has officiated basketball games on the high school and college level.

"I believe every coach should officiate at least one year. I think you learn to be a little more tolerant. It helps you see the game from a different perspective."





## Local singer wins Country Showdown and heads for national competition

Keri Sugamosto has come a long way from her native New Zealand; and she hopes to go all the way to Nashville.

Sugamosto, popularly known in the Ruidoso area as Keri and the Players, won the New Mexico True Value Hardware Stores Country Showdown at the New Mexico State Fair and \$1,000. The contest had only one winner, first place, she said.

Sponsored by KBUY radio of Ruidoso, Sugamosto found her ticket to the state contest with a second place win at a local Country Showdown in April.

After the April contest, Sugamosto said she began working on an original song. Inspiration came after she heard one of her group's family problems. At 2 a.m. she came upon the idea and began writing.

"I wrote from 2 to 8 that morning." And she named the song "Foster Mom," based on the personal situation in her group. She attributes her win in Albuquerque to this original song.

Sugamosto did sing another song, "Cry," an old Johnny Rae song, at the state contest.

"There was only one place—first," Sugamosto said, "but a group sponsored by KRST radio Albuquerque was runner-up."

Six contestants performed at the state showdown. State Fair performer Helen Cornelius provided the back-up band for the contestants.

Another Ruidoso singer Tresa Halbrooks also competed in the state contest. Sugamosto said Halbrooks did quite well at the show, but the competition was tough.

Sugamosto is working on another original song for the next step along the Country Showdown contests; to Denver to compete in a regional showdown in November.

If she wins in Denver, the prize is an all-expense paid trip to Nashville for a chance to compete in the national finals. The national winner will be awarded \$50,000 and a one-year recording contract.

"I've never been in a contest (like the Showdown) since I was in school," Sugamosto mused. "It was tough competition."

Sugamosto said the judges were very helpful after the state contest; they not only critiqued her singing, but gave suggestions on clothing, style and originality.

Sugamosto most recently is known for her entertaining at the local club Win, Place and Show. She performed through the summer as Keri and the Players.

Before she became Keri and the Players, Sugamosto was known to Ruidoso area audiences as part of the group, the Quintikis.

Such an exotic name, but then it is an exotic group. Sugamosto, with a name quite uncommon to New Mexico, is a native of New Zealand. She attended college in that country and began working for a large insurance firm after graduation.

Although she sang with a group

of college chums, she never considered singing professionally. At that time show groups were forming as the Chubby Checker era began.

Harry Rivers, an agent in Australia, was the person who got Sugamosto started. He encouraged her to go to Australia.

"I was torn between my job and the big lights," Sugamosto said. "I didn't like show biz for the first three months, but Harry kept telling me to stay. 'You've got talent' Harry told me. But after six months I was ready to go home," Sugamosto laughed.

Rivers was looking for an all-Polynesian group, Sugamosto continued. A group named the Quintikis were already big in Australia, Sugamosto said. "I would sneak out of the dorm to hear Wezel when I was in college." Wezel became a member of the Quintikis group.

Sugamosto was becoming well known through Rivers. The Quintikis had heard of her and asked her to join their group. It was during this time, Sugamosto said she "finally got out of my shell."

With the Quintikis, Sugamosto traveled the Orient, Far East and Viet Nam. While in Viet Nam, the Quintikis were recognized by General Westmoreland for their entertainment of troops.

But how did she come to the United States, much less Ruidoso?

An agent from Las Vegas, Nevada, saw the group and requested they make a tour of the U.S.

The tour was to last only six months, but Keri said once she was in the U.S. she stayed and has been here since.

Through her Las Vegas agent, Don Sawyer, the Quintikis were booked for a tour of the Southwest, including Alamogordo. The city eventually became a stopover for the group, and "a second home," for Keri.

When Ruidoso people began to notice the Quintikis, Keri said they were requested to play in the Ruidoso area. Kings Supper Club and the Inn of the Mountain Gods were their first bookings.

After touring with the Quintikis for about 14 years, Keri said she split with the group to be on her own. From this split came Keri and the Players.

Now Sugamosto hopes for a chance to compete in Nashville. She said she is working on another new song and a new wardrobe, for the next Country Showdown competition scheduled in November in Denver.

"It gets tougher as you go along," Sugamosto said, then quoted Helen Cornelius, who provided the back-up band in Albuquerque, "I've won a few and lost a lot."

Hopefully, Sugamosto will win this one.



## Eye On The Capitol

by Tom Warson, Ph.D.

The endless jaw. That's how ABC anchorman Peter Jennings characterized the continuing debate about Bush and Dukakis.

Jennings' image is hard to visualize. That is what makes it so apt. The truly important things about the Bush/Dukakis confrontation went mostly unseen by post-fight commentators.

\*"Mr. Bush." "The Vice President." "George." Dukakis referred to his opponent all three ways. Well, which one is right?

That's precisely the point. Remember that Bush has run twice before nationally, and won. The voters think they know who he is by now — unlike Dukakis.

By diffusing Bush's identity, Dukakis blurred it. To win, Dukakis must create one simple question: Who is Bush?

Here's why.

Not only did Bush run before and win — he won big. If you're like most people, you even voted for him. And that is Dukakis' biggest problem. Anybody who runs against an incumbent has it:

Dukakis must convince the voters they made a mistake. That's hard to do without offending them, and setting up a reaction.

The first step in the mass conversion, therefore, is doubt about the incumbent's identity — a free-floating, irrational doubt which can't be pinned down and refuted.

Bush — Dukakis wants you to believe — may not be the guy you voted for.

Upcoming opinion polls will tell if Dukakis' ploy worked. Only, don't focus first on the counts for the competitors. Movement from one candidate to another seldom takes place directly and in one fell swoop. Rather, most trends pass through the "undecided" zone.

The question is as the question does. Is Bush losing ground to the undecideds at a greater pace than Dukakis?

If so, Dukakis set the stage for an upset.

\*I don't know the origin of a "thousand points of light." Maybe, a Chinese philosopher. Bush first used the metaphor in his closing speech at the Republican Convention in New Orleans. He has since used the expression often on the campaign trail, and did so again, several times, in his debate with Dukakis.

Remember the 1960's song about "the day the music died"? Remember the arguments about what the lyrics meant? Because its meaning can never be known, a good poetic image — like an endless jaw — holds your attention far longer than any mechanical recitation of a proposed White House agenda.

One thing is certain. Whatever they may be, by mentioning them over and over, Bush is trying by association to make sure the thousand points of light are focused on George Bush. As mentioned, Bush cannot let public attention stray.

Furthermore, by invoking a thousand lights, Bush answers who he is on a level not accessible to reason. In the subliminal war, Bush fights fire with fire. He blunts Dukakis' attack on his identity with a simple so-what? You can never know who anybody really is. Why worry about it?

Dukakis sensed the power of Bush's imagery, and attacked it. "A thousand points of light — I don't know what that means." Shrewdly, he sought to make an unintelligible metaphor another identifying mark of Bush's lack of identity.

Of course, nobody knows what "that means." But if the metaphor is vague, how it acts is clear. Bush's thousand points of light are flash-bulbs. They are the equivalent of sound bites, those scripted phrases calculated to grab the media's attention, to be played over and over on the evening news. Sound bites, incidentally, are not limited to TV and radio. In contemporary

phraseology, printed headlines are retinal sound bites.

The polls show no apparent debate winner. But lasting impressions by definition can't be known immediately. Dukakis knows what's one short step away from a lack of identity for Bush. A lack of character.

But in some indefinable way, Bush's thousand points of light worked. Not only did they catch Dukakis' eye. I wouldn't be writing and you wouldn't be reading about them right now, if they didn't go off.

Media critic Tom Shales wrote, "In terms of TV performance, Dukakis was much more in command of the camera Sunday night (he looked into it when speaking, for one thing) . . . Bush addressed his answer not to the camera — and thus to the viewing nation — but to one of the three journalists who asked the questions, or to Dukakis, or to a hole in the wall."

(Albuquerque Journal, Sept. 27).

ABC's Peter Jennings noticed the same behavior, but gave the opposite criticism. Immediately after the debate was over, he said, "I sometimes think people at home think people who look straight into the camera are ignoring the questioner."

I'm not sure who's right. Here's what the KOAT-TV7 news director told me the first time I was on the six o'clock news: ignore the cameras and look at the anchorman when you answer their questions. Why? TV cameras have lights to show which one is on. A rookie will find the lights not helpful, but confusing.

You can be sure that before the debate, Bush discussed at length the question of where to look with Roger Ailes, his media consultant. What I suspect the end product showed: Ailes was worried about Bush becoming distracted.

Mayor Davis said he wanted him (the attorney) present. Since the study sessions are extra meetings twice a month, the village attorney's hourly contract calling for \$80 per hour adds several hundred dollars to the cost of village government each month.




