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

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

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

per purchases by Cooke Media Group and Raljon Publishing Co.

Ken and Walt Green have owned The Ruidoso News since October 13, 1975, when they purchased the twice-a-week newspaper from Al and Glo Lane.

In 1981 Walt Green became publisher of the Deming Headlight. Jim Green, Ken and Walt's father, of Artesia also had interests in that paper. In 1984, Walt and Ken purchased their father's interest in the Deming paper.

The Green family owns the Artesia Daily Press which is not involved in the impending sale.

In 1982, Walt, Ken and Keith Green, who is no relation, purchased the Defensor Chieftain in Socorro.

And in April of this year, Walt and Ken Green purchased the Valencia County News-Bulletin in Belen. Walt is currently publisher there; Darrell Pehr, former editor of The Ruidoso News, is editor there. The Belen newspaper also is not involved in tomorrow's sale.

Sammy Lopez became publisher of the Deming paper this year where he will continue as publisher. Keith Green will continue as publisher of the Socorro newspaper.

Cooke said last week that he is selling the Cooke CableVision operation he owns and that he wants to concentrate on newspapers.

Several financial publications

have reported that his asking price for the cable TV properties is \$1.9 billion.

It's been reported that when Cooke sells his cable operation, he will become one of America's billionaires. He almost made that designation in the recent issue of Forbes which listed the wealthiest men in America. Forbes estimated Cooke's net worth at \$950 million.

Cooke was born in 1912 in Hamilton, Ontario, Canada.

A true renaissance man, he studied clarinet at the Toronto Conservatory of Music while playing hockey, football and soccer.

Cooke's career was launched when he became a partner in Radio CJCS owned by Roy Thompson.

The partnership lasted for 15 years during which time the company purchased a number of Canadian and United States newspapers, radio stations and magazines.

In 1952, following a friendly breakup of the partnership, Cooke bought Consolidated Press, one of Canada's largest magazine publishing houses.

If media was his vocation, sports were his avocation.

Other highlights of Cooke's life and career:

—In 1952 he purchased the struggling Toronto Maple Leaf baseball club and built the team to where it entered playoffs for the first time in seven years.

—In 1981 he became the sole owner of the Washington Redskins. He turned it into the winningest

team in the National Football League.

—He owned the Los Angeles Lakers, the Los Angeles Kings hockey team, formed the United States Soccer Association and the Los Angeles Wolves soccer team. Also in Los Angeles he built the Forum sports arena.

—He promoted the first fight between Muhammed Ali and Joe Frazier in 1971.

—He purchased the Los Angeles Daily News for \$176 million in 1985 and in one year increased readership 23.3 percent. Sunday circulation is over 200,000.

—He purchased the Chrysler and Kent Buildings in New York City in 1979. He has restored these noted landmarks and they are now leased to full capacity.

—In 1983 Cooke purchased a group of commercial office buildings in Phoenix, Arizona, and renamed it Kent Plaza. He developed the center into the largest modern office development in Phoenix.

—Cooke is restoring Elmendorf Farms to its status as one of the "jewels of the bluegrass" and hopes to produce a 1989 Kentucky Derby winner.

—Last month he announced plans to build with his own money a new \$150 million stadium for the Washington Redskins.

Ken Green said Cooke is a "fine man, an interesting man."

"Nothing will change with The Ruidoso News except the masthead," he said.

School board approves merit, demerit plan for system here

To encourage and reward responsible behavior by each Ruidoso Middle School student, the Ruidoso schools staff has developed a merit/demerit incentive proposal.

The proposal was approved by the Ruidoso Board of Education at its meeting Tuesday.

Objectives of the proposal are to develop a well-structured and consistently applied merit/demerit system, initiate consequences for unacceptable behavior, to communicate to all students that individuality is encouraged but not at the expense of classmates or the learning environment at Ruidoso Middle School (RMS).

OTHER OBJECTIVES

Other objectives are for students to experience due process in the school setting, establish standards of acceptable conduct and acknowledge and reward student successes.

The proposal was developed by a committee consisting of Delton Estes, chairman, Beth Hardean, Dean Hood, Carolyn Chubb, Sue Dolgener, Linda Hawthorne and Lindy Lott.

Demerits, counted on a nine-week basis, will be given for behavioral infractions: consistently tardy, disrespectful to faculty, staff and other students, consistently failing to bring required materials and supplies to class, failing to complete assignments, disregard for school rules and inappropriate behavior in or out of the classroom.

Only one demerit shall be issued per offense. Demerits will not be canceled by merits.

Demerits will be filed daily in the principal's office.

An accumulation of demerits will result in a student becoming in-

eligible for extra-curricular activities, as well as additional punishments such as lunch time detention.

ACTIVITIES NAMED

Extra-curricular activities include: dances and other similar school activities, play days, IPE competition, intramurals, band and choir competition and performances, interscholastic athletics, non-classroom related field trips and participation in clubs, organizations or other events sponsored by RMS.

Accumulation of demerits will result in the following: 0-four result in no specific actions, with five the student will be counseled by the staff counselor, with six the student will be counseled by the principal; with seven, parents will be advised by the principal, with eight the student will be suspended from noon hour activities and shall report daily to a supervised study hall; with nine, no specified actions, and with 10 students will become ineligible for all extracurricular activities.

A panel of three teachers and the RMS principal will review a student's behavior prior to suspension of eligibility.

DEMERITS CAN FADE

Demerits will be removed at the end of the nine-week period. However, more than 10 demerits will be added to the next nine-week period.

Merits will be given to students who demonstrate genuine and consistent responsible behavioral characteristics and true academic growth and consistency in scholarship.

Merits will be not bargained. For example "if I do this, will you give me a merit?"

Merits may be given to students who show marked improvement

and/or consistency in positive behavior and attitude such as showing respect and courtesy to students, teachers and other staff; cooperation with teachers, staff and other students; show a high degree of responsibility and show positive leadership characteristics.

Merits also may be given to students who show marked improvement and/or consistency in scholarship and academics, for those not on the honor roll but working toward that goal; evidence of excellent use of study skills and habits; evidence of achievement beyond expectancy (over achievement).

HONOR ROLL CLUB

An incentive program established is the Honor Roll Club. The club is for students with an average grade point of 3.2, with no grade lower than a C. Each student will be responsible for taking his report cards to his homeroom to average. The teacher will give the names of those eligible to the Honor Roll Club Sponsor.

The Principal's List is for students who have a grade point average of 3.7 with no grade lower than a C. The same procedure use for the Honor Roll Club will be followed.

The grade point average will be figured with two-hour classes and one-hour classes that meet every day counting as two units. One-hour classes that meet every other day will count as one unit. Their added total will be divided by 16.

An A equals 4, B equals 3, C equals 2 and D equals 1.

For parents and family of Honor Roll Club and Principal's List members will become a member of a support group called the Academic Booster Club (ABC).

Airport commission cancelled out

By the time this issue of The Ruidoso News is printed and hits the newsstands, the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport Commission will be terminated.

All rights, powers, duties and

liabilities of the commission were to be transferred to the village of Ruidoso at a special meeting of the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners in Carrizozo this morning (Monday).

The termination agreement signed today is a vehicle for transferring all funds belonging to the commission and the county to the village of Ruidoso.

All property and improvements, at the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport will be transferred to the village of Ruidoso by quitclaim deed.

All current and ongoing contracts, grants and "other matters" of ongoing concern also were to be transferred to the village of Ruidoso.

management policies of the Lincoln National Forest and the apparent philosophy of benign neglect adhered to by its administrators are resulting in the degradation of forest resources," concludes the report.

Throughout the report names of users and respondents are deleted with various forest users classified by number.

Of concern to some of those forest users was the reported lack of cooperation exhibited by the USFS to the Lincoln Report Team.

Bud Eppers, New Mexico rancher and chairman of the National Cattlemen's Association Public Lands Committee, was quoted in the "Western Livestock Journal" saying the most alarming thing about the report was the refusal of

The Sierra Blanca Commission originally was created in 1978 with agreements between the villages of Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs, Capitan and the Mescalero Apache Tribe. The commission worked toward acquiring the property on which the airport is now located.

A subsequent agreement known as the Sierra Blanca Commission Agreement was signed in July, 1987 by the village of Ruidoso and the county of Lincoln.

Also today, the commissioners were scheduled to canvass the general election votes, transfer the ownership of a liquor license and endorse a labor survey for the Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County.

the USFS to open its files to investigators.

"If everything the Forest Service was doing was substantiated with documents, then there should be no concern about opening their records," Eppers was quoted as saying. He said management policies on the Lincoln Forest have become "very alarming."

Eppers, who is also president of the Public Lands Council, has called for full scale federal investigations of the operation and management practices of the USFS with regard to multiple use of federally controlled lands.

"The report is indicative of what is transpiring in other forests throughout the West as well," Eppers reportedly said.

Warrior team members treated like sons

Henderson profiled

The last airhorn blast of the day had signaled everyone that practices had come to an end. It was dusk and a tired team of sweaty Warriors in blue had finished their cool down exercises and slowly streamed toward the showers.

In the distance, two figures stood alone at the edge of the 30-yard line. One Warrior, helmet in hand, listened intently to the soft low voice of the coach.

You couldn't hear what Cooper Henderson was saying. He didn't appear angry, only concerned. After several minutes, the two broke away and walked in different directions.

That same scene was repeated a hundred times during regular football season with every player on the team. Never was the content of a conference revealed or even whether discussion related to football or not. All you knew was that Cooper Henderson, one more time, had given that player, like all his players, individual attention.

As the season progressed, it became obvious that Henderson regarded his team as a family and he treated each player as his own son.

MUCH RESPECT

It was halftime at the Cobre game and it looked like just a matter of time before the Warriors would win the district championship. Warrior manager Bobby Romero was standing next to the huge orange coolers filled with water.

"I guess you guys will pour that cooler over Coop's head if you win," someone said.

Romero's eyes grew large and round. "Ooooooooh," he said, as if the mere thought might get him into trouble.

After all, you don't douse your dad with water no matter how good you feel. Your dad deserves that guarded respect.

More than a football coach or a teacher of a history class, Henderson is a teacher of human values. Not willing to compromise principles, never searching for the easy way out for himself or his players.

He was taught that way by his dad, L.G. He respected L.G.'s methods and is proud to pass them along.

ACADEMICS IMPORTANT

No one has a better grasp on Cooper's ideals or work ethic than his wife, Judy.

"I don't think anyone takes academics more seriously than Cooper," she said. "Both of us were good students and we know that takes a lot of work. Cooper has always believed athletics and academics should support each other for the best-balanced student."

Henderson's work day begins around 7 a.m. As athletic director he coordinates all sports as well as teaches his history classes.

"I love teaching history, I love teaching sports," he said. "There are a lot of lessons you can teach in sports, valuable disciplines, that are hard to teach in any other place."

"It would concern me if I had a child that had no interest in keeping fit in mind and body. I hope my son is interested in sports, but if he isn't, I hope he is interested in music, or DECA, or some other involvement to broaden his education and improve his quality of life."

"Being a good athlete takes a lot of time. Being a good student takes a lot of time. If you're a good student and a good athlete, you're not going to have lots of other things going on, but that's not negative, that's positive. What more could you expect from an education than a well-rounded academic-athletic program to help build your future."

L.G. won five state championships at Artesia and the hearts of thousands of parents and sons throughout Texas and New Mexico.

"My background, like most people, had an impact on where I am today," Henderson said. "Growing up in a family where Friday's football game was the big event of the week that you looked forward to seeing."

FRIDAYS SPECIAL

"My mom not only made our Fridays special, she made each of us children feel special, baking our favorite pies and cakes, and so many other things."

"All the relatives would meet for the playoff games, it was a big part of my life."

"It must have been a good experience, both my brother and sister are coaches as well as teachers."

Asked if there was much sibling rivalry in the family between brother and sister, Henderson responded.

"Dad had a way of handling people," Cooper said. "I remember sitting around the family table as big kids and he would say, when you get angry, who do you hurt? And we would have to sing out, 'ourselves.'"

"When I played under dad he might chew my tail out on the field, but when he got home, he never mentioned football unless I asked him. He was dad. He never carried anything over. At home, it was back to the family, and I really admired that. Hope I can do that too."

Henderson has strong convictions about what makes up a family unit.

"The biggest blessing in my life today is my family, Judy, Bryan and Britni."

"My wife and I have the same strong religious convictions and that gives you substance to lean on and to build. I'm not saying I'm free from mistakes. I know I make as many mistakes as the next guy, but religion is a big part of my life and carries with it the best values to hang on to."

"My son Bryan was born seven weeks early. He was having difficulty breathing. We made trips nearly every night to the hospital. It was our first child and we pulled through that adversity together. It made us stronger. There are little steps, just like any adversity in life that you have to walk through to make you stronger."

Cooper was tight end in his playing days.

"I still get the urge to run on the field. A tight end gets to catch, to run with the ball, you get to block. I still don't understand why a player would want to do anything else."

"I was lucky that my brother was a quarterback. He was three years ahead of me, so we played a lot of pitch and catch at home throughout the summertime."

"Dad was more businesslike when it came to football. When he worked with you, it wasn't play. It was let's work on catching the ball or some other part of the game."

Cooper turned down a scholarship with the Air Force Academy for Eastern New Mexico University because of his love to play football. He felt he was too small to play for the Air Force and was given encouragement by Eastern's coaches.

Like most first-year students in college, Henderson was undecided about his future. He liked sports, but he also had an interest in politics.

By the end of his first year at Eastern, Cooper had determined that coaching was going to be his profession and he could still be in politics as a history teacher.

POLITICS SPECIAL

"I remember collecting political newspaper clips of Goldwater and Johnson when I was in the fourth grade," Henderson said. "I liked math and English, but there was always something special I enjoyed about politics and history. Several people tried to talk me out of it, but I decided that I was going to teach what I enjoyed the most."

While at Eastern, Henderson met his wife Judy. Judy has her degree in Elementary and Special Education. Judy taught second and third grade until their son, Bryan, was born.

Cooper and Judy both taught in Perryton, Texas, until Cooper accepted a coaching position in Amarillo, Texas.

"I had a head coach, Larry Dippel, at Amarillo that was very encouraging and supportive. I loved living in Amarillo and liked Amarillo High. It was a 5-A school and I probably would have been there to this day, but the coach told me if I was going to be a head coach, I would have to map out my future."

I interviewed with the athletic director of the school and let him know my intentions. I told him it may be two years or 15 years, I just want to know if when the head coach leaves, will I have a good chance of ever getting the head coaches job at Amarillo. He said, "No."

"He said you're much more likely to get a head coaching job at Amarillo if you had been a head coach somewhere else. He said the school wouldn't hire a head coach without prior head coaching experience."

"He was honest with me and I

started sending out resumes. Coach Dippel understood. He said he didn't want me to hang around so long that other people would begin to wonder why I hadn't become a head coach."

"I knew, because of the reputation of my dad in Artesia, I would have a better chance with an application in New Mexico."

"I was excited about my job in Ruidoso. The administration at the school was very supportive. They listened to new ideas and what an off season program could accomplish. It was obvious they wanted a winning program and were very receptive to improving skills through year round athletics."

SCHOOLS FALL SHORT

Many schools in New Mexico are not willing to provide that kind of commitment. Our athletic success can be measured by our special programs. We have the smallest enrollment of any school in our district. To compete successfully at the scale we have, it would be a credit to the administration to allow us to continue those programs.

In Cooper's five years at the helm of Ruidoso's football team, the Warriors have won three district 3AAA championships. The only three in the school's history.

Henderson is quick to thank his coaching staff for this success.

"People often overlook the importance of assistant coaches. I've been very, very fortunate to start off my first head coaching job with coaches who had so much experience, similar philosophy and strong loyalties. When you get to 3-A, if you don't have

good assistants, you're not going to have a good football team. This is a technical game and one man can't do it. Any success I have is a shared success. Assistant coaches are like linemen who know if the backs are getting credit, give thanks because that means you are doing a good job."

"The greatest pleasure you can have in the coaching profession is when young people come back and let you know they appreciated past opportunities."

"Penn State's Joe Paterno, once said he never wanted his player to come back to him and say Joe was soft on us, we could have been better if he just made us work."

"I feel there's a lot of truth in that, I would rather our players think how tough I was than to say, he should have pushed us harder."

"Our players might get sick of hearing it, but if I didn't feel like athletes were learning things from sports other than how to play a game, I sure wouldn't be a coach. What they learn may not be evident today or tomorrow. It may be something ten years from now that we did that helped them along in their life."

If Henderson appears to be a perfectionist, he is. If Henderson appears to be a little sensitive, he is. Idealistic, yes. Stubborn at times? You bet. Hard nosed? Every inch of the way.

If that is what it takes to be committed to excellence, to search for quality, so be it. No apologies necessary.

"I'm very proud of this team. I thought our runners competed well," said Maskew. "And if they know how to compete we can build them into a winner."

Cycling coach is participant in 4-day clinic

Warrior cycling coach Galen Farrington was among a select group of coaches to participate in a recent bicycling coaches clinic that was held at the Miller High Life-sponsored U.S. Olympic Training Center in Colorado Springs last week.

Farrington is currently a teacher in Ruidoso school system. He was a 1973 graduate of Eastern New Mexico University. He has been coaching in the sport of cycling for 16 years. He has coached a 1988 state champion in the road and time trial division and he also coached a 1986 state medalist in road and time trial. His hobbies include photography, cycling and travel.

"The clinic is designed to help the coaches gain knowledge in physiology, nutrition, training programs, organization and management," said Walter Golebiewski, national development cycling coach and director of the coaches clinic.

On the fourth and final day of the clinic, the coaches were tested for their U.S. Cycling Federation Licenses. They were pursuing licenses for a Category IV position-assistant coach for club levels, Category III-club coach cycling, Category II-regional coaching in two or three different states, and the highest level tested for was Category I-national coaching level.

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



Business operators warned at fair to make assessments

Tips for success given

Identify a need, research the market and analyze the potential return on investments of time and money before starting or expanding a business, advised David Valles of the Small Business Administration.

One of a group of speakers at the Small Business and Procurement Fair Thursday at the Ruidoso Inn, Valles cautioned business operators and those planning to start businesses to check out the feasibility before borrowing and/or investing money in a venture.

The New Mexico Minority and Small Business Development Council, in cooperation with the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce and the Vocations Services Committee of Ruidoso Altrusa, sponsored the one-day fair.

Just a handful of citizens listened to speakers from the Los Alamos and Sandia national laboratories, the New Mexico Indian Business Development Center and the Rio Grande Minority Purchasing Council.

They learned where to find information on starting a business, obtaining financing and getting help with market analysis and demographics figures.

One idea discussed Thursday was providing a subsidiary product for an industry already located in an area. For instance, an area producer might look to making an item related to the bus manufacturing company already doing business in Roswell.

Speakers from Sandia and Los Alamos explained how to do business with those two large companies. They said those two companies sometimes have a problem spending the amounts allocated or "set aside" for contracts and purchases from small and minority-owned businesses.

Michael A. Rivera, Socioeconomic Business Liaison Officer with Los Alamos said the key to a successful business relationship between a provider and the laboratory is personal contact. He said sellers should visit the laboratory and provide information on their products to the various buyers.

Maria Feliz of Sandia National Laboratory said her company is constantly striving to increase the

amount of business it does with small companies. She recommended getting on the buyers list and marketing a product with the appropriate buyers.

Sylvia Baca of the Minority and Small Business Development Council provided information on doing business with the State of New Mexico, the largest purchaser of goods and services in the state. She said New Mexico buys everything imaginable, spending \$550 million a year.

New Mexico buys everything from bread and butter to sheets, towels and zippers for the various state offices, hospitals and prisons.

Baca said it costs \$75 a year to be on the state vendor list, but that is an excellent means of finding out if there is a market for a given product or service through the state.

The Small Business Development Council publishes a directory of New Mexico business that is sent to buyers at various government agencies, the national laboratories and other places by request.

"We're pretty much a reference point for you to find out about doing business in New Mexico," said Baca. She said the council also has information on selling to the federal government.

Ted Pedro of the New Mexico Indian Business Center said the intent and focus of that group is to assist members of the 21 New Mexico Indian tribes in establishing businesses. He said the center provides research services and information on financing.

"Our mission is to increase business opportunities for women and minorities," said Richard E. Lavers, executive director of the Rio Grande Minority Purchasing Council. He said they use "networking" to bring buyers and sellers together.


The Rio Grande Council, a privately funded organization, sponsors a yearly trade fair in Albuquerque and has access to a \$10 million national business consortium fund.

All the speakers provided handouts and were available for private consultations Thursday afternoon.

Third quarter earnings told by Pioneer

Pioneer Savings and Trust, F. A., headquartered in Roswell, reported third quarter net earnings of \$31,000 compared to an after-tax loss of \$109,000 for the same period last year.

Pioneer has an office in Ruidoso as well as Albuquerque, Alamogordo, Las Cruces, Carlsbad, Hobbs, Roswell, El Paso and Midland, Texas.

For the first nine months of this year Pioneer's income, before taxes, was \$381,000, compared to \$172,000 in 1987. After taxes, the Association reported a loss of \$215,000 for the first three quarters, compared to a loss of \$295,000 in 1987, an improvement of 27 percent.

"Over the past 18 months we have taken drastic steps to reduce our operating costs," George Mitchell, Pioneer's president, reported. "This amounted to \$1,335,000 in the first nine months of 1988."

Mitchell explained that the savings and loan association had closed offices in Denver, Colorado, and in Artesia and Clovis and had reduced personnel expense by 20 percent in 1988.

"The economies of our region appear to be improving; mortgage loan delinquencies have decreased to the lowest levels in the past 18 months," he said, "and sales of foreclosed real estate have increased over the last year."

Former Ruidoso man builds own brewery

Mike Buckner, a Ruidoso resident from 1945 to 1958, built his own brewery and is now selling his own stock, according to *Business Outlook* in the *Albuquerque Journal*.

Albuquerque Brewing & Bottling Co. has a private offering under way under a state regulatory exemption that permits small, unregistered offerings to New Mexicans.

The *Business Outlook* article said, "Albuquerque Brewing is one of two micro-breweries in the state. Micro-breweries have gained in number and popularity in the last decade selling full-bodied beers made in small batches."

Albuquerque Brewing makes Michael's Golden Ale and Jungle Juice, a non-alcoholic fruit drink. The company will act as its own transfer agent, selling stock on a best-efforts basis.

Buckner is president, treasurer and sole employee of the company and has worked so far without salary other than small advances. If the offering is successful, he will receive \$36,000 a year and control 80 percent of the stock, a prospectus says.

The newspaper story says the company hopes to be making a profit in 1989. The prospectus warns that the investment "involves a high degree of risk," standard language with stock offerings of new, unproven companies.

Buckner is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Buckner of Tularosa. He is a diesel mechanic and former vice president of Sandia Detroit Diesel. He started the brewery in 1986 and spent a year and a half rebuilding second-hand equipment and refurbishing the plant. He recently began making beer.



Veterans of several wars note special day with ceremony here

Solemnly the men raised the flag, at precisely 11 a.m. on November 11, Veterans' Day.

The wind fluttered the stars and stripes as a gathered group saluted the symbol of the country which they defended. Many gathered were gray-haired, with memories of a war fought on both sides of the earth (World War II), some younger with memories of Korea and Viet Nam. Some are disabled.

Veterans' Day 1988 was celebrated much as years before: to honor those veterans and others in the United States, living and dead.

A group of veterans, including Lemuel Clarke, commander of the American Legion Post 79, George White, commander of the Disable American Veterans (DAV) Co. Curry Post 23 and Veteran of Foreign War command Romeo Klein,

gathered in the wind Friday, to remember.

After the flag-raising, the group heard John Chappell, president of the Association of Retired Federal Employees, speak of American pride.

"You are American patriots," Chappell said to the veterans gathered.

He spoke of "little things...creature comforts," such as electricity in most homes, microchips and television, that were invented since World War II.

But no matter how many advances, if America was to go to war, it would still depend on the "fighting men to fight," Chappell said.

"Politicians get us into war, and it's the GIs that get it stopped."

"There is a lot of pride in America by Americans," he said. Pride in the freedom to speak our minds, to gather together without fear, to

travel without passports, to vote, to lobby our law makers and to run for office."

Chappell reminisced about his time in a railroad battalion in Luzon during World War II.

"I salute you, the American veteran, and with reverence those who didn't make it back," Chappell concluded.

Afterwards, the group of veterans shared a covered dish luncheon before going to various locations in town to distribute Buddy Poppies.

The small red flowers are made by disabled veterans and are given to anyone making a donation.

Otero County man is freed from Lincoln County jail after judge dismisses charges

An Otero County man, jailed since January in the death of his wife, was released Friday from the Lincoln County Jail.

Vance Causey, 46, was indicted for murder in January, charged with killing Cathleen Causey in their High Rolls home.

Those charges were dropped Friday in a hearing in Carrizozo before Seventh Judicial District Judge Paul Marshall of Socorro. Sitting as a magistrate in the case that was

moved to Carrizozo on a change of venue, Marshall determined there was not enough evidence to constitute a case.

Judge Marshall said in a telephone interview Friday he found no reason to bind Causey over for trial.

"This whole case was circumstantial," said Marshall. He said the two days of testimony indicated the case was based on inconsistent statements.

Cathleen Causey was 43 on August 3, 1987, when her husband returned to their home and found

her unconscious in the bathtub.

The accused testified to pulling his wife from the tub and trying to revive her, but was accused of murder after the state medical examiner performed an autopsy and ruled she was choked to death.

During the hearing in Carrizozo, an independent medical examiner testified that Cathleen Causey's injuries resulted from a fall in the bathtub.

Judge Marshall said it appeared the Causeys had a good relationship, adding he found no motive

since Vance Causey had nothing to gain from the death of his wife.

"It looked like an accident to me," said Judge Marshall. He said both medical examiners made good points, but the victim reportedly had no bad bruises.

"I think everybody calls it the way they see it," said Judge Marshall. "I had to really go on what the state had," he added.

District Attorney Bert Atkins presented the state's evidence, and Causey was defended by Ruidoso attorney Gary Mitchell.

Valley youths are injured

Two San Patricio youths were transported to Lincoln County Medical Center late Sunday afternoon after their car knocked down five pine trees off Highway 48.

Raul Rubio Fernandez, 20, of San Patricio was driving a 1973 Mercury two-door south on Highway 48, at a high rate of speed accompanied by his passenger Miguel Angel Perez, 17, also of San Patricio, said Lincoln County Sheriff's Department deputy Oscar Villado.

Fernandez could not negotiate a curve and left the roadway. Villado said Fernandez then overcompensated to return to the highway, losing control of the vehicle.

The car went off the road onto Lewis Tognaci's property, just north of the Track and Ski Lodge in

Alto. The car downed five pine trees which were six to nine inches in diameter, before coming to a stop in a streambed. Villado said the car left 170 feet of skid marks on the pavement.

Villado said he responded to the accident call at 4:20 p.m. When he arrived, the smell of gas was strong, so the Bonito Volunteer Fire Department was called in case of a fire.

Fernandez and Perez both complained of neck injuries, Villado said, so the Alto Ambulance was called. The youths were stabilized on back board and transported to LCMC where they were treated and released.

Villado said charges are pending as the case is still under investigation.

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

Veterans Day Celebration

North Central to evaluate high school NCA review process is repeated every seven years

Ruidoso High School (RHS) will soon get the "once-over" from an evaluation team of the North Central Association of College and Secondary Schools (NCA).

RHS teacher Carole Hubbard, a member of the local steering team, said the high school has been NCA-accredited since 1968. She said the intensive accreditation review process is repeated every seven years.

The study is performed in stages, starting with a detailed "self-study" that includes every section and department in the school.

"We'll end up with a 500-page book," said Hubbard, explaining how the steering committee works with the faculty and administration in gathering information on everything from curriculum to facilities to teacher training.

A first step for RHS was to

determine a philosophy for the school. Hubbard said the committee and faculty worked together on the final statement on the school's philosophy.

That philosophy, says in part: "staff guides students to enable them to develop their potentials fully and to be able, upon leaving, adequately to function mentally, emotionally, socially and physically in a society fraught with rapid technical advances and with the growing pressures of a crowded world."

The statement continues by saying the instructional program, in spite of the school's small size, is enhanced by taking advantage of each staff member's talent. According to the philosophy, students are offered opportunities to "maximize their talents through remedial, regular and advanced programs," and are directed in choices by a concerned counseling staff.

"Finally, we believe that our success lies in maintaining the desire to succeed as fostered by the attitudes of the principal, staff, parents and students of RHS," concludes the philosophy statement.

That statement is followed by a seven-point list of objectives designed to help attain the ideals set forth in the philosophy. They include statements on leadership, character, responsibility, self-discipline, critical thinking skills and involving the parents and community in the academic process as well as co-curricular and extracurricular activities.

Departmental information is due Tuesday, and the final report will be edited by the steering committee before being printed and submitted to the NCA. Hubbard said the NCA team, led by University of New Mexico professors Ignacio Cordova and Don Kelly, will make a site

visit on February 20. Their team will include 20 teachers and educational administrators from throughout the state.

NCA guidelines are more stringent than state Board of Education guidelines, said Hubbard. She said students graduating from NCA-accredited schools have an advantage over students graduating from non-accredited schools when applying for admission to out-of-state colleges and universities.

"It guarantees consistent quality of education across state lines," said Hubbard. She and other members of the steering committee volunteer their time for the long process that began a year ago.

Also on the steering committee are Kathy Travis who retired last year as RHS journalism teacher; Judy Radtke, Daryl Stierwalt, Raymona McAdams and RHS principal Tom Hansen.

Quest program

The Lions Club International Quest Program was given more exposure recently when a Ruidoso teacher and four students explained its merits on a TV program.

It also teaches good communications with teachers and parents among other things, according to Lion "Bo" Bohannon who accompanied the group to Roswell along with Lion Bill Allen.

The local teacher and students were interviewed on Sharon Bell's New Mexico Today program.

Students of area will attend seminar

Some 90 students from 17 schools in Southeastern New Mexico will attend the second annual Student Seminar Program sponsored by U. S. Senator Jeff Bingaman (D-NM) on November 16.

The program will be in Roswell at the Performing Arts Center, Eastern New Mexico University, Roswell Campus, from 9 a. m. to 3 p. m. that day.

It is designed to give students the opportunity to examine some of the critical issues facing the state

and will allow them to play the role of senator for a day while examining issues and suggesting solutions.

Attending from Capitan High School will be Beth Sweeney, John Castillo, John D. Watson, Regina Griego, Tammy Longbotham and Warren Russell.

From Carrizozo, students attending will be Cathy Najjar, Denise Hill, Fred B. Vega Jr. and Michael Chavez.

Bingaman's legislative staff from Washington will lead small group discussion sessions on these issues:

The Drug Epidemic, Education Reform, Environmental Issues, U. S.-Soviet Relations, and Trade, Competitiveness, and Economics.

In the afternoon, the staff will conduct an open question Town Meeting with all of the students.

"These seminars are planned to increase student interest in government and to add to their knowledge of the important problems Congress deals with each day," Bingaman said.

Hunters lost, found during first weekend

Two sets of hunters were lost and found this weekend in Lincoln County.

A spokesman for White Mountain Search and Rescue said his group, along with New Mexico State Police and the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office, was involved in searches for the sportsmen.

One group of hunters was finally located near the Goodloe Ranch north of Capitan, and an individual hunter was found in the Baca Campground area, said Cleston Pritchett. The hunters' names and addresses were not available early today (Monday).

The operations lasted all night Saturday and into Sunday morning, said Pritchett who was responsible for the radio communications among the various groups involved in the search. He said 18 Search and Rescue volunteers, four Sheriff's deputies and two State Police officers took part in the search. Two helicopters were on the way

to the area from Holloman Air Force Base when the last lost hunter was found.

Pritchett said the searchers found the lone hunter, who reportedly was out without warm clothing, by using tracking techniques. He said that operation was complicated by the reporting person allegedly providing incorrect information to police.

He said a further two-hour delay

was caused by closed forest roads. Pritchett said State Police finally cut the locks on the closed roads since it was a "life and death situation."

Pritchett said the number of hunters in the area was up, but the sporting enthusiasts reportedly weren't taking advantage of information booths set up by the United States Forest Service staff.

"They drove by them (information booths) by the hundreds ... didn't stop for information or directions," said Pritchett.

Pritchett said the problems in Lincoln County were the same as those reported throughout the state on this, the first deer hunting weekend. He said hunters should be prepared with enough warm clothing before going out on a hunt.

Pet tips by Susan

Pets can be just as uncomfortable in cold weather as people. Measures should be taken to insure their safety during winter, particularly in the mountainous areas as Ruidoso. Many things can help him stay warm and healthy. A dog's diet can help maintain its body heat during cold weather by increasing its feedings 25 percent with high calorie/high fat meals.

The dog house is necessary if the dog is to be left outdoors any time at all. Insulate it with straw underneath and packed around the outside walls. Insulate floors with cedar shavings. Or a dozen thicknesses of newspaper on a cold floor will work as a temporary insulation. But absorbing materials, such as blankets and rugs need to be changed frequently. It is not healthy for a pet to lie on damp surfaces. Electric kennel pads are available in various sizes and can be purchased at pet supply stores.

Never let your pet sleep on bare stone or concrete floors. Never use metal water dishes outdoors in freezing weather. A plastic pail will hold more warmth and not freeze as readily if placed within an old tire for insulation.

Wherever traction may be difficult, spread kitty litter on the sidewalks or other places the pets run. Kitty litter will not hurt the pads on their feet as rock salt would.

Hypothermia is usually prevented by nature's protection of the winter coat. But if a pet is injured and forced to remain in the cold without shelter, it could suffer from hypothermia - a lowering of the body temperature. If that happens, place the pet in a warm room and apply blankets and hot water bottles until the temperature returns to normal, approximately 101 to 102 degrees. If the pet is conscious, feed him warm liquids.

Winter Wildlife
The birds that frequent Ruidoso need water to drink and bathe just as in summertime. But as the snow and ice cover their usual sources, birds can stage a wonderful show in backyards. Birds need to be "trained" to recognize a yard for water and food source and safety.

That type of program should begin in the fall. When the natural sources freeze, the birds will already be in the habit of returning to the yard they recognize. The water in a shallow bird bath is prevented

from freezing with a small immersion heater like those used in aquariums.

Pet supply stores and garden shops offer many types of feeds and shelters. Densely branched trees and shrubs are best. But man-made birdhouses and roosting boxes will provide some birds with good shelter. The construction should be designed for the type of birds already in the area and placed with their safety in mind - at least ten feet from the ground and facing south.

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Workshop participants are told of special Alzheimer care units

To offer "something special" in a quality way, is the purpose of the Alzheimer's Living Centers developed by the Horizon Healthcare Corporation (HHC), said Elizabeth Irtz, vice president of patient care services.

Speaking at the first annual Alzheimer's Disease Workshop at the Inn of the Mountain Gods, Irtz spoke of how Living Center special care units are developed for Alzheimer's patients. The workshop, sponsored by the Ruidoso Care Center, a unit of HHC, was attended by nearly 50 people from throughout New Mexico who work with Alzheimer's Disease victims.

Irtz spoke of HHC's history of developing the special care units for Alzheimer's Disease (AD) patients. In the more than HHC 68 long-term care centers there are 19 AD Living Centers. Since 1987, HHC has purchased long-term care facilities and had work to develop "quality units," said Irtz.

A major emphasis in establishing the living centers was to eliminate or greatly reduce the use of chemical and physical restraint on AD patients, Irtz said. Behavior problems were more prevalent when the restraints were present. The HHC Living Center team found AD patients not in special units were suffering from neglect and over medication.

The idea of a "safe, secure environment" for the AD patient, which allows freedom within the unit, was a main reason for developing the AD Living Centers.

Irtz supervises a group which helps establish the centers. The group visits existing long-term care facility to grade the actual building, outdoor facilities including plantings and other components to help determine if a facility is suitable for the creation of a Living Center. The Living Centers add to the "quality of life" for AD patients.

It takes HHC personnel six weeks to open an AD Living Center.

Irtz gave an example identifying problems encountered by AD patients when HHC began operating a facility in Warren, Ohio. AD patients at the facility would not walk on dark green floor tiles in the hallway of their facility wing. The tiles were subsequently removed.

By watching the AD patients, the staff learned what stimuli received the most response, Irtz said.

Irtz briefly painted a picture of a day in the life of an AD victim. They don't remember family names, they wander off unable to remember where they live, they misplace personal belongings, leave water running, burners on: all things that require constant supervision. "36 hours a day," Irtz said. The disease causes spouses to retire, eats at family income and cause spouses to say "this is a different person than the one I married."

When considering an AD Living Center, HHC looks at the facility to determine the security of a potential unit including monitoring and restraints.

"Not locking up the patients is the philosophy behind the living centers," Irtz said.

But she emphasized security. Outdoor areas are surrounded by eight foot fencing, indoors areas are monitored with double doors with windows. An alarm system which allows visitors and staff to use a code to open doors are utilized. AD patients usually are unable to remember the code and if they go through the door an alarm sounds.

Irtz said Living Center staff is taught to handle behavior problems in other ways than physical or

chemical restraint. Distraction is an effective behavior device, she said.

Art work in a Living Center is texture oriented. The HHC identified the AD patient as having the ability to deal with texture.

All art is covered with plexiglass as are bulletin boards or other fire extinguishers and pulls. This allows the patients to look at the work without damaging it. Items on the bulletin boards are secured with velcro instead of tacks.

Reduced water temperatures in bathing facilities are important as AD patients have problems determining the temperature of water.

Poisonous plants in outdoor areas are evaluated and removed.

The staff at Living Centers is at a higher ratio than a normal long-term facility, due to a larger number of "burn-outs." Training is more specialized and staff which deal with AD patients are identified with biographical sketches.

The staff also are trained to deal with AD patients' families.

"We look for dependable staff, but mostly we look for compassion

and understanding," Irtz said.

The right attitude is extremely important in dealing with AD patients: empathy, support for families, dealing with behavior problems with distraction, flexibility and limited use of medication are vital parts of the Living Centers.


Consistency and routine also were found to work well with AD patients. However flexibility in dealing with such things as eating is necessary, Irtz said.

Again many phases of the Living Center program were created from watching AD patients and identifying their needs and responses.

"Involve the resident if possible," Irtz said.

Pre-screening of the AD patients prior to admission is used to determine if the patient is ready for help or if community services can be utilized.

Irtz concluded a Living Center is developed by a specialized group of HHC personnel and maintained by a well-trained staff of doctors, nurses and aides to offer quality care to the Alzheimer's Disease patient.



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
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
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

Eye On The Capitol

"Few feats of exploration excel this in romantic interest."

Those words from the otherwise staid and stolid *Encyclopaedia Britannica*.

The expedition was Lewis and Clark's -- "the first explorers to reach the Pacific by crossing the continent north of Mexico."

Recently, New Mexico state officials also made a trek into unknown territory. Willard Lewis, Secretary of the Department of Finance and Administration, and Gail Reese, Secretary of the Taxation and Revenue Department, gave a presentation to an interim committee of state lawmakers, the Revenue Stabilization and Tax Policy Review Committee.

The "Pacific" sought by the Lewis and Reese expedition: the sea of money rumored to be out there for the current and upcoming fiscal years.

I don't want to prolong the analogy, but...

"On May 4, 1804," the *Britannica* tell us, "the party hoisted sail and set out in high spirits for the Western Expedition..."

Thursday's Eye observed Lewis and Reese at the outset of their voyage. They were in a jovial mood -- and with good cause. For the current fiscal year (July 1, 1988-June 30, 1989) projected revenues are \$58.4 million greater than [this year's] appropriations," Lewis and Reese reported. "This is fortuitous," they added dryly, but in true pioneering spirit.

As for the fiscal year starting July 1, 1989, the pair gazed through binoculars and saw the figure "\$1.670" blinking at them from a distant mountaintop. "This figure is \$93.9 million, or 6.0 percent, greater than recurring appropriations for the current fiscal year."

Similarly, Lewis and Clark had somewhat smooth sailing. The *Britannica* says, "Procuring a guide and horses from the Shoshone Indians, the party pushed westward through the Rocky Mountains and embarked in canoes on a tributary of the Columbia river, the mouth of which they reached on Nov. 15."

Sounds like an energetic crew. Speaking of energy, Lewis and Reese discovered while traveling down one tributary, that back in 1981-82, the energy industry (mostly oil/gas) kicked in "\$385 million, 34.4 percent of General Fund recurring revenues. Oil prices peaked that fiscal year at \$34.43/bbl." This year Lewis and Reese expect to see "only \$178.3 million, or 11.0 percent" from energy.

To get around those dangerous rapids, Lewis and Reese decided to explore another tributary. "Interest earnings exceed 20 percent of General Fund revenues. An important policy shift will likely reduce these revenues over the short- to mid-

term," they warn. "For a number of years the policy of the Investment Council has restricted the equity (stock) share of the [permanent funds] to 20 percent... In part due to pressing revenue and cash flow requirements in the wake of the oil price collapse, the equity share of the Permanent Fund was cut back [to only 8.1 percent in August]."

Enter the helpful Shoshone Indians, the horses, the canoes. Lewis and Reese write, "In recent months the state has received present value studies from Salomon Brothers and Duff and Phelps recommending an increase in the permanent funds' exposures to equities."

Buy more stocks? Now? Sure. "Including capital gains, over the long-term equities have outperformed bonds by 1 to 2 percent (in real terms)," Lewis and Reese report. "The premium represents the investor's return for risk."

What other helpful parallels meet Lewis and Clark?

*The *Britannica* notes, "The explorers and men of the exploring party were rewarded with grants of land from the public domain..."

Oh, well. "In March 1807," the *Britannica* says, "Lewis was made governor of the northern part of the Louisiana territory."

As for Clark, "He was territorial governor of Missouri from 1813 to 1820..."

So, both explorers became governors.

The governor has a ceiling on what he can recommend for total

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expenditures by state government. The ceiling is set according to technical factors, primarily wage and salary data.

Lewis and Reese reported that "the limit on the Executive expenditure recommendation for the 78th [1989-1990] is \$1,648.6 billion." But the projected total revenues for that year are \$1,680 billion, if the estimate is right, Secretary Lewis said, "\$32 million would be left on the table."

Keep in mind, however, that the

expenditure cap pertains only to what the governor can legally recommend, not to what the legislature can appropriate. As Secretary Lewis later commented, "It will not be difficult to spend all that's there."

The *Britannica* noted of the Lewis and Clark expedition, "They had travelled upwards of 4,000 mi. from their starting point, had encountered various Indian tribes never before seen..."

We certainly hope that when George Bush becomes president that he will keep Katherine Davalos Ortega as treasurer of the United States.

Ortega, a native of Otero County but who has spent much time in Lincoln County in years past, has been a fine, articulate and effective treasurer. Look on your paper money; her signature is on every bill of recent vintage.

Another function of the U. S. treasurer is to promote sale of U. S. Saving Bonds and commemorative coins. Katherine Ortega has done this effectively.

Since she was appointed by President Reagan, we can think of no valid reason that President-elect Bush would replace her.

Ortega, sister of Ethel Olson who recently sold Otero Savings and Loan (including the Ruidoso Mortgage Service Co.), was one of the first female bank presidents in California if not the first. She has had an illustrious career and was a perfect choice for treasurer of the United States.

New Mexico has had a number of its citizens who either were in presidential cabinets in Washington or who were high in rank in the federal government.

One of the most noted was the late U. S. Sen. Clinton P. Anderson who was at one time secretary of agriculture.

Gen. Patrick Hurley of Santa Fe was secretary of war and ambassador to China.

The late Ross Malone of Roswell was named assistant attorney general of the United States at one time. John Kelly, also of Roswell, was assistant secretary of the interior for mineral affairs. Gov. Garrey Carruthers was in the interior department as assistant secretary.

There have been more New Mexicans who climbed the heights through the years.

Katherine Davalos Ortega is one of them. She is one of the first women and first Hispanics to accomplish this.

We hope she continues to serve the nation.

Editor's Bailiwick

Before the computer and electronic age, elections were a lot more difficult for the media to cover.

In fact, newspaper editorial staffs dreaded election night and the following day because election night usually meant no sleep to speak of.

Everything was done by hand and by adding machine. Our experience in covering many, many elections was mostly in Chaves County (spelled Chavez County by far too many people yet today).

The classic old courthouse on Main Street in Roswell saw several radio station crews set up in the county clerk's office. The newspaper had reserved space, with five or six people there with charts and adding machines ready for progressive tabulating.

The newspaper was responsible for feeding election information to the Associated Press which preferred a call every 20 minutes or so after the boxes started flowing into the clerk's office. That's why the adding machine grew warm through use on election night.

Each of the media preferred to do its own thing in tabulating results. A cooperative venture would have worked, but it just wasn't in the cards.

All the while the county clerk and her crew were busily tabulating results also. These were posted on a chalk board facing a "spectator" area where people could follow the counts. There was a lot of duplication of effort.

Doing things hand took a lot longer than doing them electronically. And the boxes didn't come in as fast. About midnight there would always be a few boxes out, it

seems. And most elections, one or two boxes (maybe Duncan or Penasco) would not come in until the wee, wee hours of the morning and occasionally not until mid-morning.

That was devastating to an afternoon newspaper where the tired crew from the night before came in very early the day after the election to put together an election edition with photos of winners, full results where possible, etc.

It was probably illegal as heck, but along about 2 or 3 a. m. when the county clerk and others were waiting for the final boxes, a bottle of Old Granddad or something similar, ice and cups would magically appear in a back room.


That provided a temporary lift to workers who were twiddling their thumbs while waiting.

There was a camaraderie covering an election that may or may not exist today. One thing about it, the hours during the rush period when boxes were stacking up went quickly.

There were always candidates hanging around waiting for results to be posted or who had their own people tabulating as quickly as possible. Their expressions ranged from gleeful to sour depending on how they were doing. Sour could turn to happy in a few seconds or vice versa when another box would be reported.


It was always a good feeling when the final call was made to the Associated Press:

"Thirty-five of 35 boxes reporting good morning." Sleep came quickly post-election night.




Poster winners


