

# Crucial grid clash will make history

The first state football championship ever held in Ruidoso will take place this Saturday at W.D. Horton Stadium between the Portales Rams and the Ruidoso

Warriors. Game time is 6 p.m.

The Wednesday Quarterback Club and the Ruidoso Boosters Club in separate meetings this week stressed the need for everyone to show the Warriors how much the community supports their ef-

forts. Community businesses are asked to fly their Warrior flags and everyone is urged to wear Warrior blue this weekend.

Warrior head coach Cooper Henderson said a pep rally will be held in the Ruidoso High School

gymnasium this Friday at 11:15 a.m. He said the public is welcome and urged to attend.

Henderson said he appreciates all the noise created by the fans last week. He said it was the most vocal he has heard from the field

this year.

Henderson spoke with pride of his coaching staff.

"You don't improve the way our Warrior team has come together this year without assistant coaches that know their job, work individu-

ally in different areas, scouting, and as a unit at game time."

"In our system, all the football coaches are involved, from the Ruidoso Middle School coaches

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### Airport land planning group wasting no time

It took months to get an Airport Land Oversight Committee, but it didn't take long for that new group to get to work.

Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr., after past disputes with some members of the council over the size and membership of the committee, appointed nine members to the airport group Tuesday.

Eight of those nine people got together Wednesday, less than 24 hours after the council approved their appointments. The group got organized and began their task as set forth in the Airport Land Master Plan. That plan calls for a

committee to set policy and oversee the development on the more than 160-acre site next door to village hall.

Frank Kolb was elected to chair the group, with Rick Evans as vice-chairman and Jerry Shaw, secretary.

"This will be a very important committee," said Kolb. "We have a lot of work to do and we have to get started immediately," he added.

Davis also appointed Herb Brunell, Ovella Estes, Cece Griffin, Don Shaw, Don Swalander and Wayne Townsend. Swalander was absent Wednesday.

Members discussed their tasks as contained in the Master Plan,

and it was learned the group is a policy-making, rather than an advisory, board. Brunell noted the plan calls for implementing short-, medium- and long-range plans.

Don Shaw said the plan charges the board with developing a detailed implementation strategy and a capital improvement budget.

Planning administrator Cleatus Richards said any development proposed on the airport tract should first go before the oversight committee. All agreed their function is to ensure the highest and best overall development of the land; while the Planning and Zoning Commis-

### Councillors tackle full work agenda

The Ruidoso Village Council, meeting for the first time since councillors took an early adjournment on election day, took care of a lengthy agenda Tuesday that ranged from airport to zoning.

About half the regular items Tuesday were left over from the agenda that was scrapped when councillors cut the last meeting short without dispensing with the business before them.

The Airport Oversight Committee, a bone of contention between the mayor and several councillors during a past meeting, had smooth sailing Tuesday when Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr. announced his list of nine people for the group.

Councillors had opposed the mayor's plan to appoint a list of 17 people to the committee called for in the Airport Master Plan, and spent one workshop session strategizing on how to pare the group to a more manageable size. Davis said Tuesday he tried to appoint members of the old Airport Land Use group who worked with master planners on developing a comprehensive plan for the airport land.

### Fort Stanton changes are resisted

(EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the second part of a continuing series about the proposed preservation and development of historic Fort Stanton.)

Fort Stanton has been the center of Lincoln County since its inception in 1857.

Currently, it serves the mentally retarded population at the Fort Stanton Training School and Hospital.

A master plan, developed over an eight-month period, calls for the preservation and restoration of the historic buildings into a possible museum and tourist attraction. These plans also are creating an

atmosphere of paranoia among the 200-plus employees who currently work at the state-operated facility.

Ervin Aldaz is the administrator. He is a fourth-generation Fort Stanton employee. "If anyone understands heritage, I do," Aldaz said as he sat in the conference room of a building constructed in the 1880s.

The building features two-foot thick walls, windows trimmed in a "territorial style", ceilings 12 feet high. Bathrooms retain some of the original marble basins, and fireplaces have mantels of darkened wood and beveled edge mirrors. Some of the trim is being replaced as well as other interiors, in the original style.

The building houses the administration offices for the hospital. The master plan mentions the "limited preservation" started by the hospital staff. The document says the staff exhibits good craftsmanship; however, it further states "a detailed master plan should be established and professional guidance involved."

#### HEALTH CARE FUNDS

Most of the funds budgeted at the hospital are for health care of the residents, Aldaz said. A maintenance budget was established for the upkeep of the buildings, however, nothing extra comes from the state for preservation, Aldaz said.

"One of the big pluses is the open campus," he said. Because of the open campus, the residents have the flexibility to walk about.

Current stringent regulations require the residents to be in some type of training constantly. To comply to these regulations, some of the old buildings are used for therapy and classrooms.

A "negative effect on the historic fabric of the site" is the master plan's comment about the buildings which have been "drastically altered...to conform to federal standards."

Davis offered the names of Herb Brunell, Ovella Estes, Rick Evans, Cece Griffin, Frank Kolb, Don Shaw, Jerry Shaw, Don Swalander and Wayne Townsend for the committee, and the council unanimously endorsed that slate.

After making the appointments, Davis noted that watching council meetings on television helps to get things in perspective. He recalled when he gave a citizen, Charlotte Jarratt, "what-for" during a council meeting.

"As an elected official I have no right to be rude," said Davis. "You really owe it to the public not to abuse them at a public meeting," he added.

Davis said Jarratt had accepted his apology, and the audience applauded.

The council split two to four on a decision to reject all bids on a garage truck, with the mayor asking to have his vote recorded with the two who favored awarding the bid.

Purchasing agent Fonda Hazel, during a previous meeting, recommended the bid go to MCT Industries of Albuquerque, the apparent low bidder when the five percent in-state preference is applied to the bid total of \$77,197.75.

Councillors expressed concern that a local bidder, Shamaley Ford, was unable to take the five percent preference because the business was in the process of a change in ownership. Although Shamaley's bid, \$74,200, would cost less; the five percent preference made MCT the official low bidder.

Councillor Al Junge said the matter of "product commonality" was not included in the specifications, and Mayor Davis said the MCT product is compatible with the village system.

Councillors J.D. James and Jess

Stinson both voiced concern over paying more for a piece of equipment because of the five percent preference.

"It looks like we'll be hornswoggled out of about \$3,000 if we go with this bid," said Stinson who was among the four who voted to reject the bids.

MCT filed an appeal after the council rejected its bid during a previous meeting. A company representative stated his case during a public hearing last month. After hearing from MCT and the new owner of Shamaley Ford, councillors agreed to delay action until Tuesday's meeting where they rejected the bids.

Also Tuesday, councillors denied a request to change the zoning on Lot 133E, Block BB, Sleepy Hollow Subdivision, from residential to commercial. Owners Cathy Hairston and Dave Krezer said they bought commercial property and it

remained commercial until the new zoning ordinance was adopted.

"We're not asking for a new designation ... we want our old zoning back," said Hairston.

Hazel Haynesworth, representing Upper Canyon neighbors, opposed their request, predicting a "domino effect" of people asking to have their property zoned commercial. She said the area and Main Road can't bear the amount of traffic generated by commercial enterprises.

"I appeal to your sense of justice," said Haynesworth. "I fail to see why these neighbors need to be kicked in the teeth," she added, voicing concern for the investments of those who have purchased Upper Canyon property.

The Planning and Zoning Commission recommended the property be rezoned, but councillors disagreed with councillors Junge and Stinson voting to uphold P&Z, and councillors Tom McNeil, Elmer Pirelli, Larry Simon and J.D. James voting to leave the property with the residential designation.

In other regular business Tuesday, the council:

—Adopted airport rules and regulations.

—Heard Corinne Swearingin describe problems she encountered trying to get information from a member of village staff about needed repairs on the second Upper Canyon bridge. Swearingin said she has been trying for a year to get answers on the bridge that she said needs more work.

Potter concurred with Swearingin's contention that a swingwall is needed on the bridge, but said the current contract was at \$600 per unit so the village ended that contract. He said the village has \$51,000 in direct appropriations funds, but can't spend that money until the state pays for work

already completed.

Potter assured Swearingin the work will be done next spring.

—Approved the appointment of Dick Whitwam to the Parks and Recreation Advisory Board.

—Heard from Pirelli that a testing firm has been selected to test the Eagle Creek wells.

—Agreed to provide utility easements and enter into a contract over the youth center operated by Kiwanis Club at the old airport land.

—Voted unanimously to name the Grindstone Dam access road Wiggins Way. Planning administrator Cleatus Richards said P&Z approved the change for the Ruidoso Mountaintops Gymnastics Booster

Club. The street name was offered as a prize in a club fundraiser.

—Approved a vacation of right of way on South Road adjoining Lot 1, Block 12, McCarty Addition.

—Set a public hearing for the last meeting in December over a plan to require lot numbering throughout the village and amendments to the Sign Ordinance.

—Unanimously adopted joint powers agreements with the State of New Mexico Economic Development and Tourism Department for cooperative advertising funds for Southwest Flair Festival and Ruidoso Wurstfest.

—Adopted a resolution making minor changes to the Personnel Ordinance.

—Authorized a publication of public hearing to increase the laboratory fee for controlled substance abuse convictions from \$25 to \$75. The change is needed to comply with state law.

—Approved the village budget with minor adjustments required by the Department of Finance and Administration.

—Proclaimed Ruidoso Warrior Day for Saturday, December 3, in recognition of the "mighty Warriors," and encouraged citizens to support the Ruidoso High School football team by attending the state championship game at 6 p.m. Saturday.

—Retired into executive session over personnel.

## Indian Health Care Act put into law by Reagan

WASHINGTON — The President has signed into law the Indian Health Care Improvement Act of 1988. This is a comprehensive bill that includes provisions authored by U. S. Senator Jeff Bingaman (D-NM).

Both of Bingaman's provisions focus on preventive services, an aspect which is often neglected in Indian health care. One measure creates a new health promotion and disease prevention policy for Native Americans within the Indian Health Service.

The other measure establishes a community-wide health promotion project to determine the most effective and cost-efficient means of

providing health promotion services to Native Americans. The Secretaries of the Interior and Health and Human Services would also be required to establish health education programs for Indian youths.

"I am very pleased that the President saw fit to sign this measure," Bingaman said. "It is long overdue legislation crucial to improving the health care of our Indian population."

Bingaman particularly cited diabetes, which is virtually of epidemic proportions among American Indians. Studies show one Indian in every four will develop diabetes, compared to one in 20 in the U. S. population at large.

## Aircraft crisis is fluke

Emergency crews responded early Tuesday to reports of a downed aircraft in the Capitan area.

A small plane was finally located on a private airstrip near Capitan. The owner was working on the airplane and forgot to turn off the emergency locator transmitter (ELT), according to a spokesperson for White Mountain Search and

Rescue.

She said the ELT signal was picked up by the Russian satellite that passes over this area every four hours, triggering the air-ground search that included 20 people and two Civil Air Patrol aircraft from Alamogordo.

The search was called off about 2 a.m.

sion's function is to review and act on specific developments.

Members of the committee were concerned that the delay in their appointments could be a problem since P&Z already has scheduled two public hearings over proposed developments on the land. Kolb said he also has a letter from people interested in another project on that land.

"If you fragment development early on you could drastically impact any future development," warned Richards.

Members agreed that public input will be very important, and adopted a policy offered by Evans calling for public hearings with the required 15-day notice before making any major decisions regard-

ing the land.

"The basic responsibility of this committee is to the citizens of Ruidoso," said Don Shaw, and Evans noted the public hearing process will guarantee those citizens "their day in court."

Members voted to ask P&Z in a letter to delay action on the events center proposal until it can also be presented to the oversight group. The group also will ask to see youth center development plans before P&Z acts on that request.

The Airport Land Oversight Committee will meet at 2 p.m. each Wednesday in council chambers of Ruidoso Municipal Administrative Center. Items to be included on the agenda must be submitted to the Planning Department 10 days before the meeting.

Living quarters have been brightened with murals painted in the halls and rooms. The use of plexiglass had enabled staff to create bulletin boards with residents' art work. Pictures from home and other things that interest the clients are encouraged, Aldaz said.

The image of the dark, smelly mental institution is not applicable at the facility.

"I'm concerned about the plan (master plan) at this point," Aldaz said. Although the group who drafted the plan did meet with Aldaz and other hospital staff in three meetings, the finalized plan was not presented or endorsed by him.

Aldaz said he did request the paragraph which is printed in the opening pages of the master plan, stating the "project is not meant to interfere in any way with the health care operation at Fort Stanton. The purpose of this project is for historical preservation of the site."

"We can do both (hospital and preservation), but it must take into account the privacy and dignity of the handicapped," Aldaz said.

**DESERVE PRIVACY**  
"People don't understand the rights of the residents," he continued. "They deserve the privacy and dignity."

He maintains that tourists "gawking" at the residents will not work. He also is very concerned that the pressures put on the state by groups wanting to develop the historic site into a tourist attraction will add "fuel to the fire" on a state level.

"Right now my bosses (at New Mexico Health and Environment Division) said they have no plans for Fort Stanton except for the current operations," Aldaz said.

But he is concerned about those groups "knocking on their door."

**IDEAL SIZE**  
The hospital is an ideal size according to Aldaz. Residents number about 150, from mild to severely retarded. Aldaz said parents and relatives are happy with the campus, but many of them are concerned about future plans and have formed a parent group.

"Picture yourself with a handicapped child," Aldaz said. The trauma of retardation, then the realization you can't care for that child at home. The trauma of sending the child off and finding a place you feel comfortable with.

"These people (residents) have rights. Some have been here for 22 years (when the facility opened). Some I see as friends, as I was associated with them since I was 14 when they came," Aldaz said.

Before doing anything, such as development, Aldaz requests any group keep the residents in mind. Economically, Fort Stanton's

direct budget for the hospital is about \$6 million. However, the large staff also contributes to enrollment in area schools.

Capitan Schools alone receive about \$300,000 for employees' children.

Also Lincoln County Medical Center receives over \$100,000 in funds through Medicare payments for medical services for residents.

Aldaz said he's all for economic development, but he does not want to lose what "we already have."

The master plan recommends immediate, "proper preservation." Since the facility incorporates development from the late 1850s through 1985, the plan states "it would be difficult to justify removal of the more contemporary elements simply for philosophical purposes."

The master plan recommends specific preservation philosophies be developed for each building.

**FIVE BUILDINGS**  
Five buildings are mentioned for preservation. Two are vacant and deteriorating. Both were officers' quarters, and funding was provided by the state legislature, with help from Representative Ben Hall, to reroof the buildings.

Three of the buildings are currently used. The master plan states "if vacated, (the current recreation hall) could be restored to its original use in the 1870s as a guard house (where Billy the Kid was held)."

Another building, formerly used as a dining hall, is partially occupied. The master plan says it is "substantially" vacant. Aldaz said the building was proposed for remodeling into a therapy unit.

The remodeling project was number three on a list of capital improvements scheduled for state facilities. However, Aldaz said the project was reclassified and ranked below tenth place, because of the proposed development of Fort Stanton.

The master plan ultimately calls for construction of a new facility, possibly west of the current historical area.

"It will cost \$26 million to build a basic facility," Aldaz said. And the state has offered no funds for such.

**UNCERTAINTY REIGNS**  
Currently, there is a mood of uncertainty among the employees at Fort Stanton. Aldaz said the newly erected sign proclaiming Fort Stanton as the new home of the National Center for the Western Horse has created a paranoia among the staff.

"They come to me and ask if they can buy a car, or if they should wait," Aldaz said.

"I go home and lose sleep thinking about it," he added. "It's discouraging."

Staff members questioned said they are nervous about what might

happen to their jobs. The sign reminds them everyday as they go to work that someday the hospital might be gone.

Current surveying of the state highway has caused rumors. Aldaz said the New Mexico Highway Department is surveying to improve and possibly redirect the highway which will pass by Fort Stanton and continue to the new Sierra Blanca Regional Airport.

Many families have worked at Fort Stanton for generations, from the Maritime Tuberculosis Hospital to the World War II German internment camp to the Indian TB Hospital until 1966 when the state placed the retarded residents at the facility.

"It's always been a mainstay of this county," Aldaz said.

"We can do both (hospital and preservation), but we must take into account the privacy and dignity of the handicapped resident and make sure their rights are met."

"I think that a good plan is one that enhances growth, but not substitution. A museum would never generate the money currently generated by the hospital," Aldaz said.

**HOSPITAL BELONGS**  
"Last and most important, is the right of the hospital to be here. This is their (residents') home. I don't want anyone pushed out for any plan," Aldaz said.

Gary Miller, representative for the Lincoln County Heritage Trust, which is very involved with the master plan and preservation of the historic fort, said "our (Trust's) position is not to recommend closing the hospital."

If closure does occur, Miller said, it will be "way down the line someplace." Another alternative to a new facility on the Fort Stanton reservation is somewhere else in Lincoln County.

However, Miller said the master plan is a "fluid idea, with flexibility."

Plans call for the Center for the Western Horse to be constructed near the current facility with horse riding trails throughout the Bureau of Land Management properties.


Aldaz is concerned the Center will create safety problems with added traffic and liability problems when horses are brought into the hospital setting.

A meeting between Aldaz and those involved with the preservation and development of Fort Stanton is scheduled for Tuesday, December 6, at Fort Stanton.



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

# Village becomes sole operator and owner of regional airport

The Village of Ruidoso is now the sole owner and operator of the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport (SBRA).

Village councillors, meeting informally before Tuesday's regular meeting, agreed to reconsider postponing action on abolishing the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC) agreement.

"In other words, we ought to go ahead with the divorce," said Councillor Al Junge in response to Councillor Jess Stinson's suggestion.

Stinson said he made the original motion to postpone action, but has since learned the regional airport may be eligible for some state funds if the council votes to end the agreement.

The SBAC, formed through a joint powers agreement signed by the village and the Lincoln County Commission, has been the group that developed the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport (SBRA). The six-member commission is made up of three village elected officials and three county commissioners.

According to that agreement, the county was responsible for capital improvements and development with the village taking on operational control of the airport.

The SBAC and the Lincoln County Commission both voted unanimously to abolish the agreement, turning over all property and responsibility for the regional airfield to the Village of Ruidoso.

When the agreement, drafted by attorney John Underwood at the direction of the council, came up for a vote last month, councillors opted to postpone action until three new county commissioners take office on January 1.

Tuesday, during the regular meeting, the council voted unanimously for ending the joint powers relationship.

Also, during the workshop, councillors discussed development plans for the old airport land, a proposal to number village houses and rumors of a move to try to change the way Ruidoso is governed.

Councillor J.D. James said the council, criticized by those pushing for an election to change the form of government, doesn't get credit for the good things it has accomplished, James said the present council is the first to establish a reserve fund.

Village manager Frank Potter described the issues involved in efforts by Kiwanis Club to develop a youth center at the old airport land as "complicated."

"There has to be a way to work it out," said Councillor Larry Simon, and division head Leon Eggleston said assistant village attorney Mike Runnels suggested the village keep the land, Kiwanis Club keep the building and the two enter into an agreement for the club to operate a teen center.

Also during the workshop, James questioned several payments listed on his vendor report and learned they were advertising expenses authorized for lodgers tax funds.

## NM election is judged very clean

Attorney General Hal Stratton announced the Secretary of State's Office experienced far fewer problems with alleged election abuses and voter fraud in the recent general election than in recent years.

"The Office of the Secretary of State contacted us to let us know that our Voter Fraud Project bore fruit," said Stratton. "The knowledge that we had alerted the voters to watch for possible violations, and that we would have agents standing by to investigate reports, seems to have acted as a deterrent to people who may have been thinking about trying to fiddle with the system," he added.

Hoyt Clifton, director of the Bureau of Elections, told the AG the number of complaints received about alleged voter fraud was far smaller this election than in the past, especially in counties with histories of such problems.

"It's like having a cop watching traffic on the Interstate," said Clifton, calling the Voter Fraud project "quite beneficial."

The project included a television, radio and print campaign informing the public on how to spot violations of election laws. Members of the AG's investigative division staffed a toll-free Voter Fraud Hotline to receive reports of alleged violations.

On election day, November 8, the office deployed 15 agents throughout the state to investigate reports.

The project received an average of two calls a day in the weeks before the election, and agents processed 60 calls on election day.

"Most of the calls were from people who just needed some information," said Stephen Westheimer, deputy AG.

## Alamo-Capitan water agreement proposed

The Capitan water situation with Alamogordo continues to develop.

Capitan village attorney Mike Runnels said Wednesday he received a new proposed agreement with the city of Alamogordo from that city. He also is working on an agenda and schedule to meet Alamogordo's 60-day deadline.

Runnels declined to state what is included in the proposal, but said money is not the issue in the dispute "at all."

Alamogordo, Capitan and the Eagle Creek Intercommunity Water Association must work together in developing a policy for the water, Runnels said. However, Runnels is worried Alamogordo will take a "short-sighted" view of the situation.

Runnels hopes to direct the talks toward a long-term, broadly-based, mutually beneficial arrangement.

Capitan Mayor Benny Coker and Runnels met with Alamogordo in July about an agreement over the water, to update an agreement made between the two municipalities in 1957.

Since July, no agreement was finalized and eventually led to the water being shut off by Alamogordo three weeks ago.

Although the water lines were reconnected, the village water staff is trying to get the water filter back to full capacity. Because elements in the filter dried out, it only is operating at 50 percent presently.

No meetings have been set between the two municipalities at this time.

"Tillman likes to hand off to his fullback Jeff Hancock, 5-10 and 185 pounds. Hancock likes to run the trap up the middle."

"Portales runs an offensive

similar to the Warriors, traps, sweeps, the option, the bootleg pass."

"The best Ram player other than Tillman is 6-2, 205-pound Roger Moore. Moore will play their right end, a tight end and occasionally go back to a halfback position."

"Moore is particularly dangerous on defense. Playing one of their two middle linebackers."

"Crane has said Moore is the

best football player he has ever coached. That's saying a lot. Bobby Crane has coached many fine athletes."

"The Rams are every bit as tough as Goddard, but just a different type of ball club."

Tara Miller provided the point power for the Warriors, hitting four


three-pointers and 11-13 free throws for 23 points to keep the game within range.





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## The Plant Corner

### POISONOUS PLANTS

It is Holiday time and we like to decorate our homes to reflect the season.

I believe an ounce of prevention is better than a big veterinarian or doctor bill. So I remind you to be careful with certain poisonous plants we use where pets and small children can come in contact with them.

Some plants to avoid are: Holly, mistletoe and poinsettias. These plants are poisonous and can be harmful.

Evergreen hollies with their bright red berries are a favorite for Christmas decorating. Most species grow tall if allowed to grow, although usually they are kept trimmed and used as hedges.

The leaves appear either dull or dark and shiny green. Bundles of small branches are sold for home decorations.

The toxic part is ingestion of the bright, red berries. They contain the bitter principle, "ilicin," which is responsible for several poisonings in children and pets every year.

So keep the plant out of reach of small children and discard it later in a safe way so animals cannot be harmed.

Mistletoe is another Christmas ornamental. It is a semi-parasitic plant growing on deciduous trees. Its leaves and branches are yellowish-green to a dark green, with small white berries.

All parts of the mistletoe contain toxic principles. The berries are the portions most frequently involved in poisoning. Death has occurred in about 12 hours after ingestion.

Don't take chances if there are pets or small children around. The new silk artificial plants are just as effective for kisses and no harm can come from a silk mistletoe.

The poinsettia is without a doubt the favorite Christmas plant of all.

Although the poinsettia has a wide reputation for being a very toxic plant, its reputation is, for the most part, unjustly due.

The validity of a 1919 report of a fatality in Hawaii due to the ingestion of a poinsettia by a two-year old now appears in doubt. Ingestion of the leaves of this plant by small children has occurred frequently. Some do display symptoms.

Sensitive persons may experience contact dermatitis when they handle the leaf or contact the milk sap that exudes from the plant whenever it is injured.

Some symptoms are nausea and vomiting with diarrhea following. There may be some blistering of the lips and tongue, also some blistering on the skin. This may not be fatal, but who wants these symptoms on holidays.

I would avoid "tinsel" and "glass" ornaments if possible. I recall being at a friend's home last Christmas and my young pup ate a lovely bright red glass tree ornament. The pup threw up many small pieces of the ornament, on the living room rug, and was a sick little dog for a good long while. She did not suffer any long-term effects from the glass, but it could have been a very sad Christmas Day.

Do take care to use paper and bows rather than glass on the bottom of the tree.

The silk variety of plants can be very beautiful in the low places. Save the real things for completely safe places.


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
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

## Eye On The Capitol

They're here. Well, almost. The Christian Science Monitor was the first to spot them.

"In 1991, the United States will use the new US census to reposition states' political power. . . That's when the fun begins. And Republicans and Democrats are already trying to affect the outcome. This year they battled to a near standstill to control state legislatures. . . The parties are expected to fight even harder in 1990." (Nov. 18)

The newspaper observes, "In states where redistricting is likely to be an issue, Democrats . . . took control of the previously evenly divided New Mexico Senate." Likely to be an issue!

In 1982, Governor Bruce King, Secretary of State Shirley Hooper, and New Mexico House leaders were dragged into Federal Court over their redistricting plan. The upshot: Three Federal Judges decided it was their "unwelcome obligation" . . . to impose a reapportionment plan. The judges redrew 17 House Districts.

That's not all the judges did. They threw out a formula New Mexico had used in prior years for calculating the populations of districts. What was wrong with the formula? The district populations varied too greatly, the judges ruled, creating a "constitutionally impermissible" result violating the one-person, one-vote principle.

With reapportionment already upon us again, it's worth taking a look back. Is another formula possible?

I ask that question for this sole reason: What we have now isn't working.

In the 1982 reapportionment case, I was the expert witness in federal court for the Legislative Council Service, the professional staff in the Capitol who draft bills and research things for legislators. I testified in support of the formula the judges said was illegal.

Today, six years later, I am even more convinced that the formula -- developed in, by and for New Mexico -- was the most creative, most advanced technique existing anywhere in the world for realizing the one-person, one-vote principle.

That conclusion of course is diametrically opposed to what the three Federal Judges ruled. It's not a very comfortable position. You might consider how the people felt who first challenged the Warren Commission's conclusions on the JFK assassination.

individuals in their right to vote -- "that every voter is equal to every other voter in his State." (Supreme Court, Gray v. Sanders). Equal rights are unconstitutionally impaired only when the weight of a vote "is in a substantial fashion diluted when compared with votes of citizens living in other parts of the state." (Gaffney v. Cummings).

How did the three judges seek to put that principle into practice in New Mexico? "The Legislature," they ruled, had "to construct the legislative districts as nearly of equal population as is practicable."

All that mattered, in brief, was warm bodies. Simply divided the New Mexico's population (1,302,894) by the number of house districts (70), and you have the population of your ideal district: 18,613. Keep all your districts close to that number, and the one-person, one-vote principle will be realized.

Was it? Are the weights of votes cast in state house district elections across New Mexico roughly equal?

New Mexico followed the Court's order. Here's what happened in real life:

\*In 1984, 8,723 people voted in the representative's race in House District 30 (John McMullan, Bernalillo). Only 3,776 people voted in the representative's race in House District 33 (Ralph Hartman, Dona Ana).

Simply put: a vote in Hartman's race had over twice the weight of a vote in McMullan's race.

\*In 1986, it happened again. Over 8,000 votes were cast in the representative's race in District 44 (Pauline Eisenstadt, Sandoval) compared to 3,154 in Hartman's election.

There are many other examples -- too many.

What went wrong? The judges' "warm body" reapportionment solution -- make the districts equal in population -- was "one-person, one-person" reapportionment, not "one-person, one-vote."

Like the Warren Commission's single bullet theory, it simply won't work.

But if that's true, what will? More on the later.

\* \* \*

"One person, one person" reapportionment -- the warm body count solution imposed on New Mexico -- runs counter to U.S. Supreme Court rulings.

In Gaffney v. Cummings (1973), the Court held that "total population, even is absolutely accurate as to each district when counted, is nevertheless not a talismanic measure of the weight of a person's vote under a later adoption reapportionment

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plan. The United States census is more of an event than a process. It measures population at only a single instant in time. District populations are constantly changing, often at different rates in either direction, up or down. Substantial differentials in population growth rates are striking and well-known phenomena. So too, if it is the weight of a person's vote that matters, total population -- even if stable and accurately taken -- may not actually reflect that body of voters whose votes must be counted and weighed for the purposes of reapportionment, because "census persons" are not voters. [My emphasis]. The proportion of the census population too young to vote or disqualified by alienage or nonresidence varies substantially among the States and among localities within the States.

Sticking with our illustration, why were so few votes cast in Hartman's district? That is to say: Why is it that a vote in Hartman's representative race had much more weight than a vote cast in McMullan's or Eisenstadt's race?

Hartman's district is on the Mexican and Texas borders. Many of its residents are ineligible to vote. But when apportionment was made strictly on raw body counts, the eligible/ineligible distinction was lost. "Census persons," using the Supreme Court's words and

logic, were not distinguished from voters.

In another decision, the Supreme Court was even more specific and insistent about the lack of any requirement to apportion solely on the basis of warm bodies. In Burns v. Richardson (1966), the Court ruled:

"Neither in Reynolds v. Sims nor in any other decision has the Court suggested that the states are required to include aliens, transients, short-term or temporary residents, or persons denied the vote for conviction of crime in the apportionment base by which their legislators are distributed and against which compliance with Equal Protection Clause is to be measured. The decision to include or exclude any such groups involves choices about the nature of representation with which has been shown no constitutionally founded reason to interfere."

After the Gaffney v. Cummings decision, lower courts ruled that elements other than census body counts may be used for reapportionment.

(1) Goines v. Heiskell, W. Va., 1973: factors other than raw census population are to be examined and weighed.  
 (2) Winter v. Docking, Kansas, 1974: agricultural census may be used for reapportionment.  
 (3) Martin v. Venables, Conn., 1975: town may use registered voters for a reapportionment basis.

Ever see that silvery, very sticky tape.

My kids call it "duck" tape, like the fowl (quack, quack). Construction people, including air conditioning installers, call it duct tape. Duct because the tape is somewhat heat proof, and it is used to connect those foil covered insulated duct pipes.

The tape is not only sticky, it smells, telling you that this stuff is potent, that it will stick through all kinds of cold and heat and usually wet.

Now it is silvery and quite ducky.

## Mail early, advises postmaster

Don't miss Christmas, advises the United States Postal Service. According to the "Postal Bulletin," it's never too early to mail packages overseas or to the military. It's already too late to get packages to some destinations. Postmaster Bob Chamberlain of Ruidoso said his facility isn't experiencing any kind of "Christmas rush" yet. "We always want people to mail early," said Chamberlain. Chamberlain said parcels should reach most United States destinations within 10 days, and mailers should allow at least five days for cards and letters. Air letters, cards, air parcels and priority mail addressed to locations in Alaska and Hawaii must be mailed by December 7 to assure Christmas delivery. International and military mail require more time. For instance, to reach Africa, an air letter or card must be mailed by December 2; and it's already too late to send a package to Africa. Air parcels, priority, air letters and cards must be mailed by December 2 to Europe, Greenland and the Far East. The deadline to reach Central and South America is December 5. The Post Office has strict requirements over the size and wrappings of packages mailed. Chamberlain said the weight limit is 70 pounds and the maximum combined length and girth is 108 inches. He said two inches of packing is needed on all sides for breakable items sent through the mail. He said packages should be securely wrapped and secured with reinforced tape—not cellophane tape or string or ropes.
