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

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

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
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# Councillors conduct informal meeting

Village councillors met informally Tuesday to discuss agenda items scheduled for their regular meeting at 6:30 p.m.

With four of six councillors present, they talked of finances and financial reports, and questioned village manager Frank Potter over tasks the council has asked staff to perform.

"So many of these things we don't do," said Councillor Al Junge, reminding Potter of a directive to renegotiate the village legal contract and another order to begin refunding water deposits.

Potter reminded Junge that some of those discussions took place in executive sessions, and Junge agreed. "We ought to come back out in open meeting and say 'by God, that's the way it is,'" said Junge.

"It would help," said Potter. He said the legal contract was revised down to \$75 an hour, and the paralegal allowance was removed from the contract.

Junge also wanted to know why he was told that water deposits are being refunded, when they aren't. He said Mary Wimberley of the Water Department told him no refunds had been issued since late 1984.

Potter disagreed with Junge, who also wanted to know why notes haven't yet been inserted in water bills regarding the upcoming house numbering project. Village clerk Tammie Maddox said the public hearing over that ordinance is scheduled the last meeting in December.

Potter said it would be premature to notify residents before the ordinance is passed. Contel has agreed to purchase and install house numbers, and Potter said

details of that agreement need to be worked out.

Councillor J.D. James said the council is now getting the vendor report he has been seeking, and councillors said they also would like to see year-to-date totals by vendors. Junge said John Varley is preparing a report that will include that information.

James questioned item after item on the vendor report, as Potter explained each expenditure.

"I think it's our duty to see how the money is being spent," said James. Junge noted the legal budget for the year is almost all spent with the fiscal year not half over.

Councillors discussed the new pothole repair machine, with Councillor Elmer Pirelli and Junge agreeing it isn't being used properly. Councillor J.D. James said Street Department director Charlie Armstrong went to a school on the equipment.

Pirelli said the department has the wrong materials, and Junge asked Potter to have Becky Bell-Durham, division director, go watch the crews use the machine.

Potter said requests for proposals on group health insurance will be opened during an insurance workshop on December 15. He said a committee of employees will review the proposals and make a recommendation to council.

Insurance consultant Tom Raborn will be on hand for the workshop, said Frank.

Workshop meetings are conducted at 5:45 p.m. preceding regular meetings at 6:30 p.m.

Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr. and councillors Jess Stinson and Tom McNeil didn't attend the workshop, but were present for the regular meeting.

or four-wheel drive has rarely been used, said Newman.

"Last Thursday morning was a rare morning," he added. He said road conditions were extremely hazardous and treacherous.

Councillor J.D. James said he learned the news release discouraging travel to Ruidoso reached as far as Lubbock, Texas. He said he knew of two young women who heard they would be cited for driving without chains, and went out and bought some on credit.

"No one in our department ever intended to say not to come to

Ruidoso," said Newman.

Councillor Larry Simon said the village has an obligation to inform people of road conditions; and Junge added police action Thursday may have saved lives.

"I never heard of Colorado closing roads unless the snow was seven feet high and they were impassable," said Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr. "New Mexico has never gotten into the winter resort business," he added.

"I regret what happened and it certainly won't happen again," said Newman.

In other regular business, coun-

cillors:

—Reviewed a letter from Margaret McDonald-Lahey suggesting membership on the Municipal Airport Planning Board be open to those who live outside village limits who are actively involved in Ruidoso. She questioned if an ordinance requires living in village limits to serve on the board, and suggested that be reviewed when a vacancy occurs.

—Authorized village staff to conduct a public hearing to determine what projects citizens want to earmark for a Community Development Block Grant application. The

staff recommendations will be given to councillors who will choose a project and conduct a hearing for public input on the specific plan.

—Referred to legal counsel an encroachment of right of way onto private property in the Navajo Sub-division.

—Adopted the 1989 holiday schedule with one less holiday than in 1988.

—Wished everyone a merry Christmas and adjourned in what one councillor said might be record time—29 minutes.



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## Canadians look for gold in county

It's all exploration right now, Norm Pitcher, Ruidoso representative of Pioneer Metals Corporation of Vancouver, British Columbia, said of mining operations in Lincoln County.

For several years, the Canadian mining company has been exploring for gold and silver in the Lincoln National Forest above Bonito Lake, primarily.

Robert E. Wood, public affairs officer, Lincoln National Forest, reports that the company "is collecting information to determine the characteristics of a mineralized zone in the Rio Bonito watershed, adjacent to the White Mountain Wilderness."

Pitcher told The Ruidoso News that the company has constructed a 600-foot-long tunnel "for exploration purposes" and has punched 200 diamond drill and reverse circulation drill holes in the quest for minerals.

The mine site, he said, is reached via Bear Canyon and on up the mountain to the area where the old Great Western mine was located, it is believed.

Pitcher said that no exploration is needed, that no methods of recovery have been decided.

"We don't know right now," he said of what the future holds in regard to feasibility and methods of possible recovery.

Pioneer Metals has three other mining properties, Pitcher said. One is a site at Puffy Lake, Manitoba, Canada. Another is under construction at Stewart, British Columbia, a "Premier Project," Pitcher said.

The third is an open pit operation at Stibnite, Idaho.

The Lincoln County operations are closed down for the winter.

The Forest Service says the company is in the final stages of exploration in Lincoln County.

Wood said exploration information "will be used to prepare a feasibility report. If the report indicates the area has commercial possibilities, a complete environmental analysis will be documented in an

Environmental Impact Statement (EIS). The EIS will be prepared by Pioneer to Forest Service specifications.

The EIS will display alternatives and the effects on the environment of those alternatives. Forest

Supervisor Jim Abbott will then select one of them."

Wood said public involvement will be an integral part of the process regarding environmental studies.

# Citizens 'roast' county officials

The Forest Service has issued a permit to put a landfill on Forest Service lands," said Steve Makowski before a joint "special" meeting of the Lincoln County Commissioners and Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) and a meeting room packed with people.

The landfill was to contain "industrial garbage" and will receive it by railroad.

The proposal caused a great deal of concern with the county attorney Gary Mitchell. "This impacts the Tularosa Basin water which El Paso wants," he said.

"They told me to come over here and tell you," Makowski said.

P&Z chairman Mack Bell did not object, nor did any members and they approved the proposal.

Mitchell still looked concerned, but very soon began to realize this was no ordinary meeting.

Next came P&Z member Betty Shrecengost, who requested a demolition permit to tear down an old building in Lincoln and construct another, in the original use.

The original building was a "Chorro," she said and that was what she wanted to build.

"What is a Chorro," came the reply.

"Well," she hesitated and then explained it was a house where the oldest profession known to women was practiced.

Shrecengost used the "grandfather" clause as support for her request.

"I guess grandfathers can use it then," member Alton Whittaker said.

Again, the members present began to realize this was no ordinary meeting and they approved the demolition permit.

Next came a request for a special use permit in the Maggado Creek Estates subdivision. Joyce McMath wanted to open a school. A special school, one which every woman could benefit from.

She then gave an example of what her school would teach: belly dancing.

The lights dimmed and McMath began the dance with sparkling bangles and jingling bells.

What was this?

No ordinary meeting. Shrecengost moved to "definitely" approve the request.

After the "business" the real business of honoring the outgoing county commissioners began. Sue Stearns, toasted the commissioners and read a poem written by Bonnie Celine. The poem summed up the last two years with all the political controversies and accomplishments by the commissioners.

Pictures with humorous expressions were presented to the commissioners and a framed copy of the U.S. Constitution was presented by the Lodgers' Tax Committee.

County manager Suzanne Cox said she "tremendously" enjoyed working with the commissioners as they accomplished a lot and supported her in her job.

At the conclusion of the meeting, chairman Bell announced all business conducted at the "special" meeting was "absolutely unofficial."

Then the "special" meeting was adjourned and the crowd was treated to refreshments in the lobby.

## Commissioners hear details Tuesday on proposed western horse museum

The National Center for the Western Horse (NCWH) will be a long-term benefit to Lincoln County, Sid Goodloe told Lincoln County Commissioners at their regular December meeting Tuesday in Carrizozo.

Goodloe reviewed plans for the horse riding trail system proposed for Bureau of Land Management lands in the Fort Stanton reservation.

Goodloe said the Fort Stanton Training School and Hospital can control traffic through the grounds, if the present road becomes heavily traveled by those using the horse trails, or ask BLM to detour around the hospital.

Current "two-rut" roads will become the trails, as the BLM has not mapped any "trails," Goodloe said.

The proposed restoration of the historic stables for the NCWH also was mentioned by Goodloe. He emphasized the NCWH is part of the recreation project for the Fort Stanton lands as opposed to the separate restoration projects for the actual historic fort buildings which is being considered by the Lincoln County Heritage Trust.

The stables area, however, is being considered by the NCWH, Goodloe said. The stables project is "down the road" if State Representative Ben Hall gets appropriations for restoration and OKs by the hospital, Goodloe added.

The BLM is making plans for the public lands based on a five-year study. Goodloe said he has had problems getting the BLM to work with the NCWH, however, plans for construction of a parking lot to park horse trailers for those using the trails are tentatively set for May 5, 1989.

A question about where water for the horses, brought the response that there is no money to develop water systems for the NCWH at this time.

"They'll just have to go to the creek," Goodloe said.

"This is no bricks and mortar project now," Goodloe said about construction of a building to house the NCWH. "There are no juniper trees with \$100 bills on them."

Pressure from the BLM and county commissioners to develop the public lands led to the NCWH idea, Goodloe said.

Fort Stanton Hospital representatives present at the meeting expressed concern over wording in the recently published NCWH brochure. The brochure states "ride through historic Fort Stanton."

Concerns also dealt with the need to inform those using the trails that the hospital grounds are not open to general public use.

Goodloe replied he should have considered the wording in the brochure more carefully. He also encouraged the hospital and other concerned citizens to contact the BLM about their concerns.

"Some day there will be a new facility," Goodloe said and he encouraged everyone to "work to obtain the funds" to construct it.

"The old buildings cannot be maintained forever," he said.

The representatives requested that Phase Two of the Fort Stanton Restoration Masterplan not be implemented until Phase One is addressed.

Goodloe said the Fort Stanton Heritage Recreation project unanimously supports the hospital. "We were caught unaware there was

any concern," he said.

He assured the representatives the recreation part will not disturb the hospital.

Actual construction plans of a museum to house the NCWH and the proposed Living History Ranch have not been drafted.

Commissioner Bill Karn suggested concerned citizens contact Hall and State Senator James Martin. However, he said to "take both ideas in context."

"Nobody wants the hospital to go away," he added.

Goodloe said, "nothing happens quick in the BLM," but he hopes to open the trails in May.

Commissioner John Allen Hightower expressed his appreciation to Goodloe for his efforts. He requested all those concerned keep informed and in touch with their legislators who keep the money.

"Nothing happens without money," he said. "We're fortunate to have Ben Hall."

In other regular business, the commission:

—Presented certificates of appreciation to Mabel and Mario Candelaria for their holiday decorations on the courthouse buildings.

—Removed French, Holly, Alto and El Camino Drives in Alto area from the county maintenance system and appointed a road review committee to recommend abandonment. Road supervisor Tommy Hall requested the closure due to the hazard caused steepness of the roads.

—Accepted written nominations for the Lincoln Historic Preservation Board. Appointments will be made by the new commission after the new year.

—Approved the grant award amendment for the Senior Citizens

Centers, as a continuation of the original grant award.

—Approved a pay request on the Fort Stanton Road reconstruction project.

—Approved a request by J.R. Hale Contracting on the Fort Stanton Road project, to extend the completion date to December 31, 1989.

—Set a New Year's Day holiday for county offices on Friday, December 30.

—Set a meeting at 10 a.m. Tuesday, December 27, as the final commissioners' meeting, with a mid-year budget review.

—Awarded the heating and cooling system maintenance bid to Trane Company of El Paso.

—Approved a lease agreement with Alto Village to construct an informational sign on the triangle of land between the Fort Stanton Road and the Alto Village Road.

—Approved an agreement with the New Mexico Academy of Physician Assistants and also a resolution supporting the Physician Assistants (PA) program to enact new legislation to allow dispensing of prescription drugs.

The impact of forbidding PAs the right to prescribe affects Carrizozo and possibly could cause the loss of the village's pharmacy. Carrizozo Health Center operates with a PA.

—Released the bond on the Alto paving project from Bill McCarty for \$183,223.66.

—Appointed a road review committee to consider a request by Walter Jones to vacate a county road.

—Met in executive session for possible litigation.

—Acknowledged commissioner Ralph Dunlap who was selected as retired extension agent of the year.

## Trustees to meet with Alamo Council

Officials of Capitan and Alamogordo will meet at 5:30 p.m. Tuesday, December 20, to iron out differences over Bonito Lake.

Capitan Mayor Benny Coker announced Monday the meeting between village trustees and the City of Alamogordo councillors is tentatively scheduled to negotiate an agreement or find out if Alamogordo wants Capitan off the Bonito pipeline.

Coker told trustees Norm Renfro, David Rouleau, Myrl Ray and Jack Pogue, as well as citizens at the regular town meeting Monday, that he asked for the meeting of elected officials rather than department heads.

Coker encouraged citizens to attend.

"I feel they want Capitan off the line totally," Coker said, adding that Alamogordo representatives haven't actually told him that.

Capitan resident Duffy Morton asked what will happen if Capitan is taken off the Bonito line.

"We'll have to put in a line," said Coker. He said having the village on the line is an advantage to all communities using the waterline.

Coker said he hopes the city will see it that way and work out an agreeable solution. He said Alamogordo needs to work on the accounting methods for the Capitan water.

Until the Alamogordo meeting, Capitan continues to use the well for its sole source of water, with no

water flowing into the village from Bonito Lake. The line is just filled, but water is not going into the filter, explained Coker.

The filter plant was discussed. Internal elements, already aged and in disrepair, suffered during the time no water was in the filter. Last Thursday, the filter was dismantled by village employees Terry Cox and Dan Davenport and inspected by trustee Pogue and Dr. Bernhard Reimann, who was appointed by the mayor to assist with water problems.

Cox reported on problems caused by no water flowing through the line, that include sediment accumulations. The filter could not be backwashed while the water was disconnected. Reimann said the problems is aggravated by the dryness.

A question of replacement brought Coker's response to wait until the situation is settled with Alamogordo.

"We're not in a crisis," Coker said.

Pogue suggested repairing, replacing, restoring and modernizing the filter while it is down.

Coker replied to a question about the well keeping up with the village's demand for water by saying it is doing "what it was designed to do."

Cox added the well is producing all the water the village needs. However, Davenport said at the rate of water used in the last four weeks, the village could deplete its water rights before a year passes, if

it continues to be a sole source.

Another question about water came from David Cox who has a 31-year old agreement with the village to receive water from the line before it reaches the filter. Cox said he had to move from his house because he had no water for 13 days, when the lines were disconnected by Alamogordo. He requested his water bill be adjusted.

Coker said he could not give an adjustment, as the problem was not the village's fault. Cox argued the agreement had nothing to do with Alamogordo. "My argument is with Capitan."

Coker said Cox's problem may be used as an added argument to the city of Alamogordo. "Let them know their actions affect individuals."

The adjustment request was given attorney Don Dutton who was substituting for Mike Runnels who was unable to attend the meeting. Dutton said he would review the Cox agreement and advise the village how to rule without setting a precedent.

Cox further questioned why no one was told immediately after the water was shut off by Alamogordo. Coker said he had no answers then, and he felt no one was in danger. "It was not a matter of keeping anyone in the dark."

Cox also asked why no one was told when the water was reconnected. Pogue replied the water is not on, just in the lines to the filter, which is not in operation. Davenport earlier explained the water was to keep the lines from freezing

and bursting.

"There was no reason to get excited," Coker said. "We're in good shape as far as water is concerned."

In other regular business, trustees:

—Proclaimed January 6, 1989, as New Mexico Day, to note the anniversary of statehood.

—Met in executive session to discuss possible litigation.

The third place finisher, Quickie Quick, raced up on the outside to join the battle in the final furlong. The Kentucky-bred competitor almost caught the leaders, but didn't quite make it to finish less than a neck behind Flachado. Quickie Quick paid \$3.00 to show.

Flachado is the four-year-old son of Great Performance out of Carmoline and has now extended his win streak to four in a row.

In addition to his two handicap victories and one allowance win

over the local oval, Flachado also prevailed in the October 8th New Mexico Breeders Stakes at the State Fair meeting.

The chestnut-colored gelding has had an excellent year on the track winning six of 13 starts at distances of five furlongs to one and one sixteenth miles and has finished out of the money on only two occasions.

No one claimed the track's Tri-Super Jackpot Pool on Saturday.


## Mesquite woman is big winner

the New Year's holiday.

The February board meeting was changed from February 14, 1989, to 7 p.m. Thursday, February 9, 1989.

Miller reviewed and discussed the proposed 1989 legislative proposals adopted by the New Mexico State Board of Education on November 30.

The 25-point proposals emphasize addressing at-risk youth (Native American and other minorities), establishing the Indian Education Center for Excellence, returning authority for establishing class-load requirements to the State Board of Education, returning to local districts the authority for establishing minimum class length by subject matter areas and maintaining the current level of support for teachers to be released from non-instructional duties (noon period).

The proposals also include implementation of a three-year cycle of program/budget planning, support for local board authority for establishing expenditure priorities and proposed increase in the formula index for bilingual education.

The board also supports the position that all consolidation or deconsolidation issues be addressed on an individual district basis, a collective effort with other state agencies regarding study and possible changes in statewide financial accounting systems and the inclusion of the definition of "hearing impaired persons" in the Court Interpreter Act.

The state board also supports providing services to handicapped persons through the Division of Vocational Rehabilitation, implementation of a state-wide educational technology network, efforts to improve state staff salaries and continued funding of MESA program, Project Uplift and Law Related Education Project.

The board calls for funding to reach equity with the region and nation for teacher's salaries, increased contract length to 190 days by July 1, 1992, funding adult education programs and funding for schools in the Re-learning Project.

Industrial Development Training Council's request for \$1 million for training also was supported, as was funding for the State Department of Education and the Division of Vocational Rehabilitation, and Capital Improvements funding (including funds for asbestos abatement) and payment from the Educational Retirement Fund as repayment for prior legislative appropriations, to be added to the State Support Reserve Fund for Public Schools.

Funding requests for public school support totaling \$883,221,811 and other funding requests totaling \$22,850,758 also will be submitted.

In other regular business, the board:

- Set dates for the February election, with December 20, the only filing date for regular candidates, and January 3, 1989, as the filing date for write-in candidates. Candidates must file on that day in the Lincoln County Clerk's office in Carrizozo during regular working hours.

## USFS responds to 'Lincoln Report'

Southwestern Regional Forester David F. Jolly has appointed a group to follow up on issues raised in a 347-page report over management problems on the Lincoln National Forest.

In response to the detailed "Lincoln Report" compiled by a task force appointed by Governor Garrey Carruthers, Jolly formed a group that includes two private citizens, as well as United States Forest Service (USFS) personnel.

Governor Carruthers, after hearing a string of complaints from forest users, asked the secretaries of the New Mexico Department of Agriculture and the New Mexico Department of Energy, Minerals and Natural Resources to lead a study team. The Lincoln Report, the result of fact finding efforts and interviews conducted in 1987 and 1988, was prepared and presented to Carruthers, USFS officials and members of the state congressional delegation.

Jolly appointed Aubrey Dunn of Alamogordo and John Fowler of Las Cruces to the new task force. Dunn is a former state senator and one-time gubernatorial candidate. Fowler, a New Mexico State University professor, is co-coordinator of the New Mexico Range Improvement Task Force.

"I am very pleased that John

Fowler and Aubrey Dunn agreed to help us review the issues raised in the Lincoln Report," said Jolly. "We are anxious to respond to the report and know their participation will be a great help to us," he added.

Neil Paulson, forest supervisor on the Coconino National Forest with headquarters in Flagstaff, Arizona, will chair the task force. Darrol Harrison, a member of Jolly's range management staff at regional headquarters in Albuquerque, will also serve on the group.

Jolly said the USFS was not involved in gathering information or in preparing the Lincoln Report.

"I hope the task force is able to interview some of those who were interviewed by the state officials, along with others affected by the proposed management changes recommended in the Lincoln Report," said Jolly.

He said the task force will report to him on actions that should be taken to correct substantiated problems identified in the Lincoln Report. He also stressed the need for a thorough, but timely, review by the task force.

Besides various allegations over management policies made by those interviewed, according to the Lincoln Report team their studies were hampered by lack of cooperation by the forest service.

According to the summary report presented to Governor Carruthers, the team identified a number of problems and concerns over road and access, water, private property rights, livestock and wildlife.

The report paints a picture of the Lincoln National Forest as an agency that is not accomplishing its purpose to properly manage the forest in a way that would benefit the USFS and the people of New

Mexico. The report shows a USFS that is less than a good neighbor.

The team interviewed area ranchers and Lincoln Forest users, identified only by numbers, who made allegations that ranged from poor stewardship in brush management to arbitrary road policies and distorting road access to gain public support for its plans. The team was denied access to some Lincoln National Forest records.

"One of the most common complaints recorded by the Lincoln Report Team concerns alleged Forest Service failure to adequately maintain open roads on the Lincoln National Forest," continues the report.

Some users alleged the forest service is indifferent toward private property, with the Lincoln County Commission finally adopting a resolution attempting to protect private property from USFS road policies and activities.

The report also talks of problems caused by multiple-use management and boundary disputes—some of those disputes have ended up in court.

"The policies and procedures used by the Lincoln National Forest administration in allocating range betterment funds were the target of intense criticism by grazing permittees," according to the report. Favoritism is alleged in the allocation of range betterment funds.

The report team interviewed sport enthusiasts and environmentalists. According to the report there has been a decline in confidence in the administration of Lincoln National Forest.

The group appointed by Jolly will delve into those and many more problems alleged in the Lincoln Report.

—Accepted the resignation of Texie Cole, effective January 13, 1989.

—Acknowledged the retirement of Clarence Buurma on December 23. Buurma was the education director for the Mescalero Tribe for 19 years. The board recognized Buurma for his good relations with the Ruidoso Schools.

—Met in executive session. The next meeting is scheduled for 7 p.m. Tuesday, January 10, 1989.

Also the Lincoln County Commission is a contributor to the EDC.

We're ginning, and some concrete results are beginning to be felt in development. Watch for news after January 1.

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# The Plant Corner

Dear Sally; You column of November 17 has me fired up to start my Cactus Garden. My friend has a Burro's Tail plant. I would love to own one if you will tell me how to care for it. Thanks, Gertrude S.

Dear Gertrude: I must have struck just the right note with the cactus and succulent column.

I have had many questions come in and I am pleased to help. Thanks for your interest and for letting me hear from all of you.

There are hundreds of these Sedum plants grown in containers to be enjoyed. Some of the favorites include: Pachyphyllum (Jelly Bean), Treleasei, Robrotinctum, Stahlia, Dasyphyllum (miniature creeper), Multiceps (little Joshua tree) and the Sedum Morganianum.

Sedum Morganianum is the Burro's Tail or also known as the Donkey Tail you ask about.

The Donkey Tail plant makes a lovely hanging basket. The plant makes many long, trailing stems that grow to three to four feet in six to eight years.

Thick, fleshy, light gray-green leaves overlap each other along stems to give a braided or rope-like effect. Flowers (rarely seen) are pink to deep red.

It is a choice plant if properly grown because it grows such long, pendulous stems. Most burro's have only one tail, but if you're the lucky owner of a Burro's Tail plant you'll have a multitude of tails of varying lengths.

Its name is derived from sedo "to sit" and many grow "sitting on walls and rocks." Its natural home is in the temperate climates of central America, south of Peru.

Since you know that it has trailing stems, it's easy to figure out that this is a good choice for a hanging planter. It's much better to hang because the stems get so

heavy that it has balance problems otherwise and is liable to topple off a stand or shelf.

If the Burro's Tail finds you a good host, supplying proper conditions, it will reward you with scarlet flowers at its tips from spring to autumn. So do please treat this plant with respect.

Soil: Being a succulent, it must have a porous, fast-draining mix. Use one-third sharp sand, one-third regular potting soil and one-third peat moss or finely ground bark.

To this add about one pound of vermiculite to maintain a constant moist condition. Never allow to completely dry out or to be soggy wet.

I suggest a five-gallon size plastic pot with the attach tray which is about 12 inches in diameter.

Fill the bottom about six inches deep with plastic packing chunks and pour sharp sand over the plastic to fill in the cracks before you add the soil mix.

The large five-gallon pot is to prevent repotting. Burro's Tails should not be repotted unless absolutely necessary. The stems fall off so easily that repotting could be disastrous to the good looks of your plant and hazardous to your health.

Try to replace the surface soil every couple of years.

Water: Keep the plant "slightly" moist at all times. Overwatering and too much humidity can cause this plant to become mushy with soft, discolored growth.

Underwatering can cause the plant to shrivel.

The Burro's Tail is definitely not a humidity-loving plant.

If you suspect overwatering, try to avoid a root check, remember the plant is very fragile. Instead, remove the damaged foliage and aerate the surface soil with a fork

to send oxygen to the roots.

The most common cause of falling stems is being brushed against family, friends and pets. So hang it in a place where it won't be bothered.

Light and temperature: The plant needs south or west window exposure from four to six hours daily of bright sunlight. The temperature should not fall below 40° to 45° and not above 90°.

Pests: Aphids and the ole mealy bugs are the main pests, the same as other long-stem succulents. You know how to treat these little buggers.

Fertilizer: Normal feeding requires that the plant be fed only once a year in the late spring. Feed older plants more often, say about four times a year with a potash mix or your own mix of organic fertilizer or any good commercial fertilizer made for cactus.

## Early Memories Of Christmas Time

This is being sent to you just before high noon on December twelve, and although all the snow has been melted off of the sunny side of the vale, the mountain meadow out south of the house and sloping up to the foot of the hill is all pure white with snow, glistening in the bright sun.

The snow awakens the spirit of Christmastide within your heart, and awakens many a fond memory.

The first Christmas I remember was when I was a little over one year old. I clearly remember the Christmas tree lighted with small candles held by special little clamps attached to the branches. The candles were colored red and green -- the Christmas colors, and also pink and light blue.

The small candle flames baked out an incense from the Sitka Alaska Spruce tree; sent a pleasant aroma all through the room. This evergreen incense since then has been a great deal of the charm of Christmas celebrations. And even today now that the electric lights have replaced the candles, there is a faint evergreen flavor around the Pinon Christmas tree here in the room, when one of the Christmas bulbs is close to some of the Pinon twigs.

There is magic in this evergreen flavored air that can transport you back through the years in just a moment. (I forgot to say that this first Christmas was in the front room of the small house in which I was born, in Valdez, Alaska.) It seemed that the tree extended

to the ceiling of the room. There were candy canes much like the striped ones we have today. And the bright decorations were much the same as those of this day. Also we had homemade decorations such as cranberries strung on twine and English Walnut shells glued back together and painted red, green or gold.

On this first Christmas I had a small greenish-blue drum, and I remember the harmony of a musical toy which I played with small hammers. And there was homemade fudge and cookies. All these memories are extremely clear and vivid.

At my second Christmas I was a little over two years of age. Father carried me as he and Mother and brother John walked over the deep snow to the little Episcopal Church of the Epiphany, a block or so from the house.

(A picture of this church was featured in the geography books in the schools throughout the nation, in later years.)

Inside the little porch-way of the church was a Christmas tree, and each of the children was given a large Christmas stocking made of gauze, through which I could see, and apple, and orange, gumdrops, taffy, English walnuts, and some round large candies we used to call "Jaw breakers."

During the services my Christmas stocking broke and the jaw breakers went rolling under the church pews. I went crawling all down on the floor recovering my jaw breakers, and finally came out

right in front of the minister. I remember his kind smile as I looked up at him. He was the Reverend Zeigler who served many years in Alaska, up into his nineties.

Christmas In Early Lincoln County  
Many colorful and cherished Christmas customs of New Mexico go back to early Spanish times. One which survives today and is popular all through the southwest is the "Luminario" spanish for "lighter-of-the-way"

Old timers in Lincoln country have told me that on Christmas eve a great fire was built on top of the hill north of San Patricio to let people know that midnight mass would be celebrated at the church of San Patricio. The fire was kept going until midnight so that travelers would get the news of the services.

And down in the churchyard, the pathway to the church, and all around the building would be lighted with torches of pitch pine stuck into the ground.

One type of Luminario popular throughout the state is made by filling a paper bag half full of sand so that it will uphold a lighted candle inside. The soft glow of golden light in the darkness gives forth a radiance and a charm special to New Mexico.

Later on we shall have something more on the early Christmas customs of New Mexico and Lincoln County. Meanwhile let us be filled with rejoicing as the day of the birth of our infant Saviour draws near.

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
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


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


## BLM describes new fee structure

The Interior Department's Bureau of Land Management (BLM) has issued a final rulemaking that would facilitate greater cost recovery under its mining law administration program. It would revise certain existing fees and establish new fees. The rulemaking will become effective January 3, 1989.

According to BLM Director Robert F. Burford, the fee changes are being implemented under Title V of the Independent Offices Appropriation Act of 1952. Title V provides that federal agencies should recover costs of program administration or services that provide special benefits to identifiable non-federal recipients above and beyond that accruing to the public at large.

"In Fiscal year 1987, we recorded more than 147,000 new mining claims and processed about 654,000 filings of affidavits for assessment work," Burford said. We also recorded and processed many other mining-claim-related docu-

ments. This rulemaking allows us to recover more of the costs of administering this program."

Burford indicated that the increased fees would generate nearly \$4.5 million in additional annual revenues that, when combined with current revenues from existing fees, would make available approximately \$5.2 million to be appropriated to BLM for the mining law program.

Burford, a release says, emphasizes that BLM has been sensitive to impacts this rulemaking might have on the mining community and has worked to develop fees that would be equitable to all segments of that community.

Mining claimants are required by the Mining Law of 1872 to do at least \$100 worth of assessment work per claim per year. Most claimants file their affidavits of assessment work with BLM in the late fall or winter each year. The \$5 per claim per year filing fee would increase the federally imposed component of the cost of maintaining each claim by not more than 5 percent per year.

According to BLM records, approximately 85 percent of federal mining claimants hold 20 or fewer mining claims. The new \$5 fee would amount to no more than \$100 per year for these claimants.

Because many claimants seeking to make discoveries on their claims are doing more than the minimum \$100 annual labor, the impact on their total costs would be much less than 5 percent. An analysis of the processing costs for BLM in Fiscal year 1987 indicates that each claim for which an affidavit of assessment work (or notice of intent to hold) was filed required an expenditure of \$7.42 by BLM.

Under the mining law, a U. S. citizen is entitled to locate a claim on federal lands that are not otherwise withdrawn from mineral entry. The claimant may then explore for minerals and develop any valuable deposits that are discovered. Any activity disturbing more than 5 acres requires submission and approval of a plan of operations.

To obtain these benefits, a claimant must properly maintain the claim by, among other things, complying with the Federal Land Policy and Management Act of 1976.

This act requires recordation of each claim initially, followed by an annual filing of an affidavit that the required amount of assessment work has been done, or a notice that the owner intends to hold the claim.
