## Police Chief offers advice

 for safer winter drivingby CHARLES STALLINGS Widoso News Sports Writer and heavy traffic are but a fnow, ice tion signs for mountain motorists to be aware of while driving a car. Ruidoso Police Chief William Newman discussed some basic
rules for defensive driving. Some rules for defensive driving. Some
rules are familiar, but other Newman points will surprise even the eteran mountain driver.
"The most common accident we have in Ruidoso is the front to rear collision," said Newman. "Most of these occur on Sudderth, and somemaking a left turn into a driveway or a private parking area and the ar behind is either following too closely or just not paying attention, then rear ends the car màking the
turn."
Newman said following too closely or traveling at speeds too
fast for the condition of the road is the biggest contributor to this type of accident.
The winding roads of the mountain demand motorists slow
down below what even speed signs indicate.
"Mechem, north of Bennett's Grocery, is a good example of a posted 40 miles per hour area that leads all the way to Alto that is, in
my view, a little fast," said Newmy view, a little fast," said New-
man. "A good defensive technique, even if the road is dry, would dictate that you not drive that stretch of road at 40 miles per hour. The main reason for slow driving in this area is the sight distances.

There may be someone coming and when you're traveling that fast, you just don't have enough time to react.
"If
"If you were to drive from Wal-
mart to Alto five miles mart to Alto five miles per hour un-
der the speed limit, I doubt if you der the speed limit, I doubt if you
would lose more than three minutes," Newman said. "That
reduced speed would go a long way reduced speed would go a long way
in preventing accidents because of rres and sight distances.

portant rules in driving on snow and ice are, "slow down, slow down "Wlow down." teriorate, our weather conditions become exaggerated. If you slow down on ice and snow, there are some things you can't prevent from happening, but the consequences

wheel drives, is that they think they can go faster because they can get more traction than the vehicle with a two-wheel drive. Once they hit those brakes and lock the wheels, it doesn't make any difrerence, the vehicle will be out of

Dear Sally; I really have enjoyed your two columns on Palms. Thank yofir for the many helpful details. I tion about Ferns. I believe ferns and palms would make great "companion' plants. Thank you, Billie onès.
Dear Billie Jones; You are right about ferns and palms making good humidity as well as many other similarities.
Ferns are among the oldest groups of plants in existence and can be found practically anywhere rom just at sea-level to the tops of ountains.
there is evidence of a renewed house plants and outdoors. For Ruidoso we will consider only indoor plantings.
Most ferns are decorative and undemanding. They are grown for the grace and beauty of thei
fonds, which more than com pensates for the lack of flowers.
There is a very wide range, from the stately, slender blade of the
Heart's tongue (Scolopendrium Vulpare) to the frogile gare) to the fragile, lacy beauty of capilus-veneris), Yat when com pared with the rich exotic aptarance of many other kinds of plants, almost all ferns deate an air of relaxation and grouped together in -individual pots or planted in one large container deal growing conditions wôuld be to place them just under and along side your palms, which you have al ready provided with proper light and so on.
Soil: Repotting is done only
when the roots completely fill the pot, preferably at the beginning of the growing season. If repatting is not indicated, just remove the sur face layer of soil and add a top dressing of fresh potting mixture. This will help to eliminate some of bide-outs.
A good general mixt tre is made up of one-third peat mose or finely ground bark, one-third cparse san and one-third potting mix number two. To this add some vermiculite and allo allow orysen to get to the Woots Water Ferns should be watered regularly with minall, frequen raterings, to koep a good mois cordition. Never allow the soil to
cause rotting of the roots
Humidity is essential for their well-being, and you can provide the pot on a large saucer of pebbles or gravel that is kept constantly wet. Frequent spraying with distilled water adds humidity and cleans dust from the fronds.
Light and temperature: All ferng recommended here will grow well in a minimum temperature of 50 degrees, although some can, in fact, stand even colder conditions. No fern can survive for long in hot dry air.
Shady pe their natural home is in hady places, ferns should be kept
away from too much sun and can way from too much sun, and can the room except on a sunny, window sili. They love the overkead light of asy-light or a tube gro-bulb.
The fronds will be prettier if al-
