## State beauties vie for Miss NM title

Young women from across New Mexico will arrive at the Inn of the Mountain Gods Tuesday, November 14, to compete in the Miss New Mexico USA contest.

The new Miss New Mexico will be crowned during a pageant Saturday night at the Inn of the Mountain Gods. That ceremony will start at 8 p.m. A victory ball will follow the pageant with tickets available at the door.

Pre-pageant events will get rolling Tuesday afternoon when candidates will be given sashes, fitted for Catalina swimsuits and then meet news media personnel.

Opening ceremonies Tuesday at 8:30 p.m. will include a costume parade followed by a dance. Escorts for the ball will be officers from Holloman Air Force Base at Alamogordo.

Wednesday's schedule includes a beauty clinic under the direction of Ramon Madrid of Las Cruces.

Fittings for a Fashion Jubilee set for Saturday night will take place Wednesday as will photo sessions.

Dance rehearsals also are planned. Thursday will feature rehearsals, also. They will continue on Friday.

At 8 p.m. Friday, the Miss New Mexico USA Presentation Show will be open to the public. Area residents can meet and greet the delegates in the Inn lobby after the show.

On Saturday candidates will have breakfast with the judges, followed by personality interviews. Sunday a farewell breakfast will be staged for delegates and parents.

The new Miss New Mexico will reign for a year. She will compete later in the Miss USA contest. The Miss USA winner has a chance to become Miss Universe.

Ruidoso's contestant in the Miss New Mexico contest is Kelly Moseley.

The current Miss New Mexico is Traci Brubaker who was crowned at the Inn of the Mountain Gods in November 1988. She was Miss Alamogordo when she entered the 1988 event.

## MainStreet members agree: sidewalks, parking are needed

Picture a visit to Midtown Ruidoso—envision plenty of safe, free parking, lots of wide paved walking surfaces and streetscaping to add to the mountain resort charm.

That's a vision the MainStreet Ruidoso and the administration of the Village of Ruidoso are trying to make a reality.

Leon Eggleston, Village of Ruidoso support services director, is optimistic that Ruidoso will be successful in getting a grant to make some of those improvements on Sudderth Drive.

"The grant application was mailed in today," Eggleston told MainStreet Ruidoso members at a special membership meeting Wednesday.

"If we can get through the staff, I feel there is a good chance we can get a \$500,000 grant," Eggleston said.

He said the Community Development Council has "set aside funds." He said the Economic Development Administration also has funds but is "holding to see what happens to the other application."

The amount available through EDA is \$278,000, but uses are restricted to paving, water and sewer lines.

The main grant funds can be used for streetscaping, sidewalks, underground utilities and drainage.

Herb Brunell, president of MainStreet Ruidoso, said shoppers want comfortable walking conditions and parking.

Frank Potter, village manager, said the State Highway Department's five-year plan includes overlay work on Sudderth for 1991 and 1992. He said the village will ask the legislature in January to seek funds for sidewalk design.

He said the village has tried unsuccessfully to get the Highway Department to do the sidewalks, but that the state wanted a co-op agreement with the village paying 40 percent.

The plan, he says, is to have a sidewalk plan in hand when the Highway Department does the work on Sudderth in 1991-92. The grant money would be the needed matching funds.

Potter said the highway department will be spending \$8 million in

Ruidoso during the next two years on widening Mechem. He said \$2.5 million in state and federal funds had been spent in the area in the past two and a half years.

He said the village hasn't been short—changed.

"We will get it done," Potter said of Sudderth improvements.

"There is a rumor that went around that all on-street parking on Sudderth will be eliminated ... if so, we will have adequate off-street parking," said Brunell.

MainStreet Ruidoso members voted Wednesday to amend by-laws to meet IRS requirements for tax exempt status.

## Judge Payne dies; services scheduled

Ruidoso Municipal Judge Bill Payne died Sunday at Lincoln County Medical Center. He was 55.

A memorial service is planned at 4 p.m. today (Monday), November 13, at St. Eleanor's Catholic Church, with Father Dave Bergs officiating.

Judge Payne was born August 7, 1934, in Hughes, Arkansas, and his education took him from California to Missouri, where he earned a doctor of jurisprudence at the University of Missouri in 1964.

His legal career ranged from private practice as a defense attorney to four years as an assistant district attorney, three terms as a magistrate judge, six years as a municipal judge in Carrizozo and his current service to the Village of Ruidoso as municipal judge. He

also had served in the children's court system as a referee.

Judge Payne was elected Ruidoso Municipal Judge in March 1988, after being appointed by Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr. to fill the bench left vacant when former Municipal Judge John Cupp died.

He maintained his private practice in Ruidoso while serving as a judge, but had a special love for his service to the community as a judge.

"I don't have friends or enemies when I'm judge; I try to treat everybody the same," said Payne when seeking his office in 1988. "I'm proud of my record as a judge," he added.

That record, one of consistency of treatment to all defendants, was a matter of great pride to Payne.

Payne also was involved for several years in Lincoln County Abstract, which was a family business.

Payne moved to New Mexico and settled in Alamogordo in 1964. He and his family moved to Carrizozo in 1968, and he moved to Ruidoso in February 1986.

He is survived by his parents, Thomas P. and Avis Lloyd Payne, of Puxico, Missouri; two sons, Philip Payne, of Hondo, and Stephen Payne, of Las Cruces; a daughter, Ramona Walker, of Sugarland, Texas; and one grandchild.

Survivors include six brothers and one sister: T.L. Payne, of Las Vegas, Nevada; the Reverend Dean Payne, of Poplar Bluff, Missouri; Dr. J.D. Payne, of Chaffee, Mis-

souri; Dr. R.B. Payne, of New Madrid, Missouri; Jerry Ray Payne, of Lees Summit, Missouri; and Michael Payne of Cape Girardeau, Missouri; and Patsy Mollencamp, of Rolla, Missouri.

Payne was a member of St. Eleanor's Catholic Church. He served on the board of director at Cree Meadows Country Club and was a former member of the Carrizozo Rotary Club. Judge Payne was a member of the New Mexico Bar and the American Bar associations, and was a former chairman of the Lincoln County Democratic Party.

The family suggests memorials to the University of New Mexico Cancer Center or a favorite charity.

## Area law officers are hitting the books

A number of area law enforcement personnel were doing the same thing a lot of area school children were doing this past week. They spent the week in class.

A total of 21 officers from around the area and even from as far away as Canada, participated in a week

long, 40-hour, burglary investigation course at the Ruidoso Police Department.

Ruidoso is one of 15 municipalities in New Mexico which was selected to offer advanced police training courses through the Department of Public Safety's New Mexico Law Enforcement Academy Advanced Training

Division.

The New Mexico Legislature provided a \$1 million dollar appropriation in fiscal year 1988-89, to the Training and Recruiting Division for the purpose of conducting statewide advanced law enforcement training. The courses are offered on a regional basis, at locations selected to minimize the

travel distance for officers to approximately 40 miles. There is no charge for the course to the officer or his municipality.

Participating in last week's course were representatives from the Ruidoso Police Department, Ruidoso Downs Police Department,

Money from a number of fund-raisers continues to come into the Michael Malis Fund.

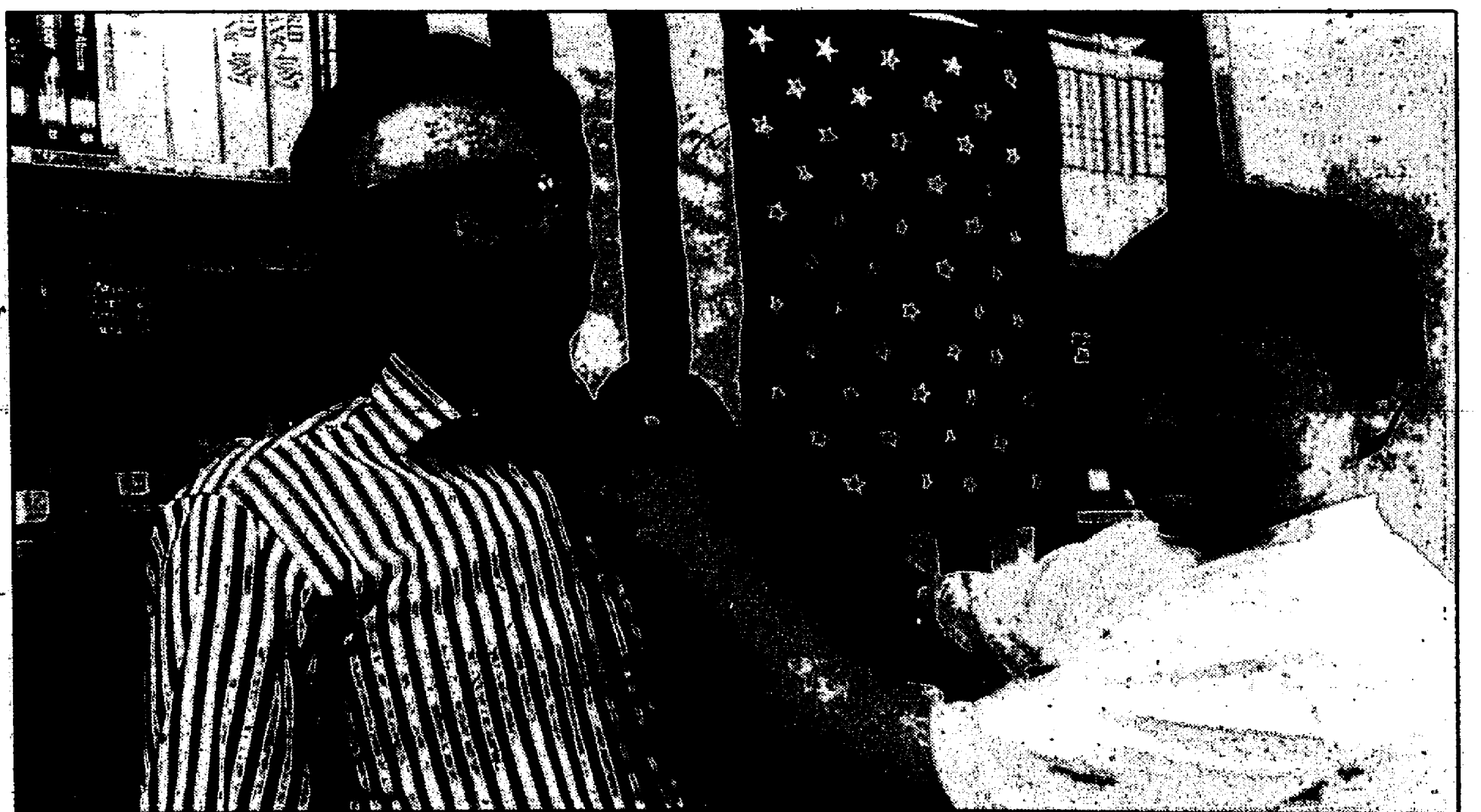

# Crimestoppers nominates 6 for officer of year

The Ruidoso-Lincoln County Crimestoppers Board of Directors announced plans for the annual Christmas party fundraiser and the candidates for the 1989 Ruidoso Crimestoppers Officer of the Year.

During a special meeting at the Great Wall of China Restaurant, the board announced the Christmas party will be at 7 p.m. December 9, at Cree Meadows Restaurant.

Tickets for the event are \$10 a person and are available from board members or at J.T. Yamaha, First National Bank, Seeley and Company, High Country Insurance Agency and Village Hall.

Included in the ticket price is a late night buffet and the chance at a number of door prizes. The buffet will feature cheese enchiladas, beans and rice, tostados and salsa, scrambled eggs, biscuits and gravy and coffee.

The Christmas party will also feature a live band, The Randy Jones Band, playing country, pop and rock favorites.

All proceeds from the party go into the Ruidoso-Lincoln County Crimestoppers reward fund. This year, Crimestoppers has paid out a significant amount of money in rewards. Crimestoppers calls have led to the arrest of an accused rapist and a number of narcotics related arrests.

The board also announced the recommendations of the 1989 Ruidoso Crimestoppers Officer of the Year Committee. The committee, consisting of assistant district attorney Scot Key and the area chiefs of police, recommended six area law officers for Officer of the Year.

They are officer Rick Emmons of the Carrizozo Police Department, officer Ron Moore of the Depart-

ment of Game and Fish, deputy Charley Engelking of the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department, officer Danny Kiper of the New Mexico State Police, officer Cynthia (Lou) Wardwell of the Ruidoso Police Department and officer Will Hoggard of the Ruidoso Downs Police Department.

The committee used the following criteria for making the nominations:

—The officer had to be a full-time salaried police officer working within Lincoln County.

—The officer must have exhibited exemplary performance in their law enforcement duties within the past year.

—The officer should have exhibited a concern and interest for the community in which they live.

—The officer should have participated in activities which furthered the perception of all law enforcement within the eyes of the public.

A brief synopsis of the officers' nominations reads:

## Rick Emmons

Officer Rick Emmons is a newly hired police officer with the Carrizozo Police Department. Although officer Emmons has little experience he has entered the Carrizozo Police Department as an enthusiastic person faced with an adverse political environment. Despite the environment, officer Emmons has demonstrated that the laws of New Mexico are to be followed by every citizen and not ignored by a chosen few.

Officer Emmons has inherited a juvenile drug and alcohol problem in Carrizozo which he quickly addressed by citing numerous juveniles drinking and partying past curfew.

Officer Emmons has demonstrated an ability to listen and to develop cases that will be successful

in Municipal, Magistrate and District courts.

## Ron Moore

Officer Ron Moore has been with the Department of Game and Fish for six years. Prior to coming on with the department, Ron received his bachelor of science degree in Wildlife Management and a minor in Agriculture. Officer Moore received specialized training in criminal investigations and search and seizure law and has been active in the District Attorney's continuing education courses for police officers.

Officer Moore is active in the community by participating in various sportsman club activities and by playing men's softball.

Officer Moore's direct supervisor indicated that Ron was one of their seasoned veteran officers for his work in felony game and fish violation investigation. He is known for his top quality work and his knowledge within the field.

## Charley Engelking

Deputy Charley Engelking has approximately 16 years of experience in law enforcement. Prior to becoming a deputy in Lincoln County he was in charge of investigations with the Doña Ana Sheriff's Department. He also was a warden at Radium Springs Correctional Facility.

While with the Doña Ana County Sheriff's Department, deputy Engelking developed a specialty in criminal investigations and has extended that specialty to the investigations of sexual abuse cases. In the past year he investigated a child sexual abuse case in Lincoln County with a four-year-old victim. This investigation resulted in the conviction of the perpetrator. Deputy Engelking has also just recently been appointed to the Lincoln County Sexual Abuse Protocol

Team consisting of officers with specialized knowledge in the field.

He has been described by his fellow officers as mature, knowledgeable with a genuine concern for the well being of the children of Lincoln County.

## Danny Kiper

Officer Danny Kiper has been in law enforcement for 19 years. His experience dates back to his first position with the Roswell Police Department. From there he had a stint with the New Mexico State Police and the Chaves County Sheriff's Department before returning to the State Police. Officer Kiper has the reputation as a cool headed, experienced officer that relies on his past experiences to deal with present problems. Danny Kiper is a well-known, well-liked officer in southern New Mexico and is always available to assist fellow officers from other agencies.

Officer Kiper also is very active in the community. He uses his rapport with children to teach classes in all aspects of law enforcement and safety. He has spoken to children in the Capitan School System and various Girl Scout troops in the recent past on these important issues. Officer Kiper also has been active as a little league coach of boys basketball.

## Cynthia "Lou" Wardwell

Officer Cynthia "Lou" Wardwell is an officer with many titles with the Ruidoso Police Department. She is the administrator of the police department, she is the training coordinator and she is the intelligence officer. She has been with the department for almost seven years. Officer Wardwell in the past year has been extremely active in developing a prototype training manual for the Ruidoso Police Department's newly-hired officers. She also coordinated the Law En-

forcement Academy Training Program for the Ruidoso area. She was instrumental in obtaining this important training function for our area.

Besides her first rate law enforcement efforts, she also was and still is, the driving force behind the tremendously successful Santacops Program in Ruidoso. This program has enhanced the image of all law enforcement personnel in addition to providing less fortunate children in the Ruidoso area with a Merry Christmas. Officer Wardwell was the coordinator for the Ruidoso area Special Olympic's fundraising activities. The events she organized and orchestrated raised \$3,800 for Special Olympics. This amount was higher than any other area in the state, including Albuquerque.

## Will Hoggard

Officer Will Hoggard has more than two years of experience in the Ruidoso Downs Police Department; however, in that time Hoggard has been recognized as developing good law enforcement skills. Officer Hoggard has been a very active member of the Fraternal Order of Police here in Ruidoso and has exhibited leadership over that organization to both enhance the image of all law enforcement agencies and to provide community assistance to those who are in need. Officer Hoggard has served as vice-president of that organization for the past year and has done a commendable job of uniting all law enforcement agencies within Lincoln County. He has also been very active in the Santacops Program and has assisted in delivering Thanksgiving and Christmas baskets to shut-ins as a supplement to the Santacops Program.

He has been described by fellow officers as very enthusiastic towards his job and always avail-

able to assist other agencies in investigations. His immediate supervisor commented that officer Hoggard is a "dedicated fool." One of his interests has been in the juvenile field in as much as he has exhibited a willingness and ability to communicate with juveniles within the Downs. Officer Hoggard's motivation for this activity is his feeling that by giving juveniles some direction, they may be deterred from committing delinquent acts as a juvenile and perhaps later, crimes as an adult.

The winner of the 1989 Ruidoso Crimestoppers Officer of the Year will be announced at the Christmas Party on December 9.

In other Crimestoppers news, coordinator Lanny Maddox announced that the \$1,000 rewards offered by Ruidoso-Lincoln County Crimestoppers for the two recent bank robberies in Ruidoso have been enhanced by the banks themselves to \$3,000 for information on the Ruidoso State Bank robbery and \$1,500 for information on The Bank of Ruidoso robbery.

The Ruidoso State Bank North Branch was robbed on September 25, and The Bank of Ruidoso in the Financial Center was robbed on Friday, November 3.

The suspect in The Bank of Ruidoso robbery is described as an Anglo male with a deep, young sounding voice. He is approximately five feet, 10 inches tall. The suspect was wearing blue jeans, a designer type blue denim jacket, a bright green T-shirt and a dark blue or black ski mask with holes for the eyes and mouth.

Lincoln County Sheriff's Office, the Portales Police Department, Roswell Police Department, Alamogordo Department of Public Safety, the Chaves County courthouse and the Waterloo Regional Police Force, Kitchener, Ontario, Canada.

According to officer Lou Wardwell of the Ruidoso Police Department, this is the first of five classes that will be conducted during the upcoming months. She said the next class will be January 8 through 12 and will be a Firearms Instructor class taught by the Department of Public Safety.

The other classes will on interviews and interrogations, aggressive patrol tactics for drug enforcement and search and seizure. Wardwell said the topics for the courses were determined by the chiefs of police in a survey sent out last year by the training academy.

Wardwell is the site coordinator for the training classes in Ruidoso.

The courses are taught by instructors from all over the country and are provided through universities, institutes, academies and various other agencies. This past week's course on burglary investigation was through the Northwestern University Traffic Institute and was taught by Larry Schey, chief of the Morton Grove, Illinois, police department and Sergeant Bob Jones, also with the Morton Grove Police Department.

Jones said the criteria for the courses are established by the state and include a number of different topics. He said the burglary investigation course included such things as preliminary investigation, crime scene investigation, chain of evidence, legal issues, fencing operations, string operations, report writing, methods of operation, entry methods and managing of criminal investigation.

He said the topics are covered through the use of lectures, slides, video tapes and class exercises in things like fingerprinting and report writing.

Teaching classes to police officers is only a part-time occupation for Jones. He is a 25-year police veteran and commander of the technical services division of the Morton Grove police.

"I enjoy teaching, it's a challenge and I enjoy meeting other police officers," Jones said.

He said the classes are a good opportunity to learn about other departments and other police techniques.

Jones will have plenty of opportunity to learn about New Mexico police departments. In addition to the class he taught in Ruidoso, he also taught a class in Angel Fire last month and will be teaching classes in Portales, Alamogordo and Albuquerque in the coming months.

"The whole concept is good for law enforcement in this area," said Chief William Newman of the Ruidoso Police.

Newman said the classes offer the police officers a large amount of training at very little expense. He added that the class doesn't cost the Village of Ruidoso or its officers a dime. He said he hopes the classes will be a success because of the opportunities they give the officers.

"It's a good class and a good exchange of information and techniques," said Wardwell, who was one of six Ruidoso police officers to take the course.

She said, because things change fast in law enforcement, the class was a good opportunity to keep abreast of what is going on and she added it was an opportunity to get together with other officers.

Wardwell said the department was appreciative of the assistance provided them by Tracey Moran and staff of the Chamber of Commerce. The chamber prepared an information packet on points of interest in the area for the out-of-town officers.

In addition to the information packets, dispatch officer Betty Bennett arranged with Bob Hart of the Lincoln County Heritage Trust to keep the museum and courthouse in Lincoln open late for the out-of-

town officers.

One of the officers who came a long way for the class was officer Alexander Shantz of the Waterloo Regional Police Force, Kitchener, Ontario, Canada.

Shantz said he learned about the courses through a sergeant in his department who brought back material given to him by an officer from Albuquerque.

"I wanted to take different courses and upgrade myself," said Shantz.

He said he had an extra 56 hours of vacation time coming, so he decided to take back-to-back courses. This week, Shantz is in Clovis attending a course on interviews and interrogations.

Shantz is an officer in the planning and research division of the Waterloo police force. He said, even though he does not do investigation, the course was informative.

"There is a lot of other information that will be beneficial," he said.

This was his first visit to New Mexico and he said he will definitely bring his family back.

"It's really a beautiful state," Shantz said.

Besides Wardwell, also attending the class from the Ruidoso Police Department were officers Lance Zink, Bobby Barnes, Roxann Pfeffer, Jim McBride, Laura Standridge and Betty Bennett.

Almost the entire Ruidoso Downs Police Department attended the class as did Lincoln County Sheriff's deputies Connie Hopper and Lerry Bond.

## Ruidoso man is convicted

A Ruidoso man was convicted Friday, November 3, in Socorro on drug charges.

Frank Steven Apodaca, 31, was convicted by a jury of a felony charge of possession of a controlled substance (marijuana) with intent to distribute.

The charge developed from an incident on February 7 when State Police officer Peter Conticelli stopped a vehicle driven by Apodaca, said media reports.

Apodaca produced a Texas drivers license, the vehicle bore Ok-

lahoma plates, and there was no proof of registration.

The officer, in testimony, said Apodaca was behaving nervously and his version of the group's destination differed from the passengers' versions.

After obtaining permission, the officer searched the trunk and the luggage there and discovered five wrapped bundles later determined to be marijuana.

The News has no information on sentencing.

## McKnight ups reward

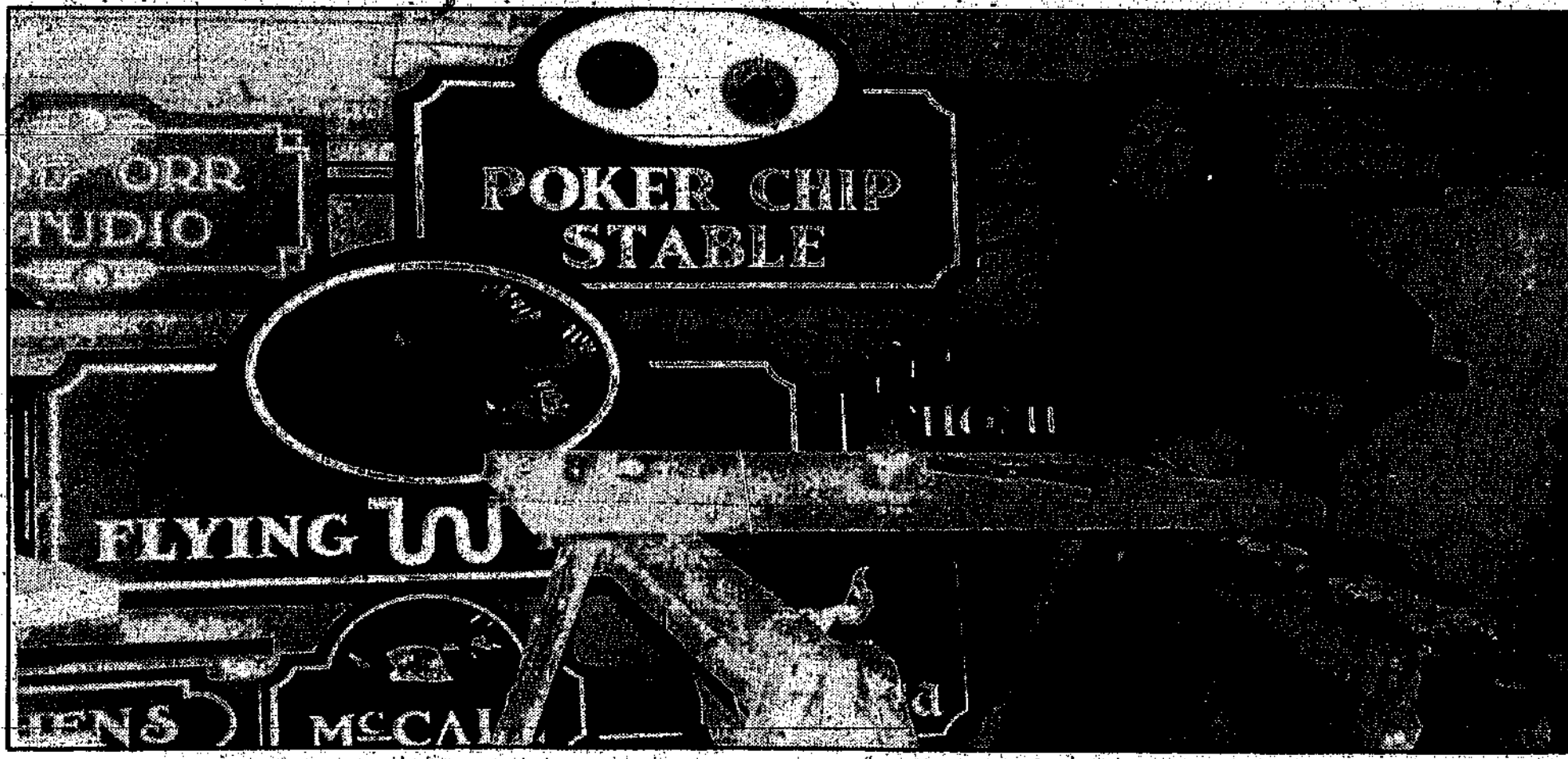

## Small electronics operation slates shift from coast to Lincoln County

Another small electronics firm has been attracted to Ruidoso, George Puckett, executive director of the Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County, said, Thursday.

Puckett reported to the EDCLC board of directors at a regular meeting that Alto Engineering, with Gary Miller as president, will move its operation from the San Francisco, California, area to Ruidoso.

At first the company will concentrate on designing printed circuit boards, with manufacture of the boards to come later. Puckett showed a complex sample board to board members.

"I think Ruidoso can become the mecca for the electronics industry," Puckett told board members. Two other small electronic operations were announced previously. One, Warp Speed, is producing light pens for computer systems.

Puckett said the need for an industrial park in Lincoln County is becoming more evident.

"I think it is real good news when we can get another company in here," said Carroll "Buddy" Bundick, president of EDCLC.

On another front, board members accepted an audit report prepared by Dean, Noltensmeyer, Barraclough, certified public accountants.

The report shows that EDCLC had assets of \$97,912 as of June 30, 1989.

A treasurer's report showed total liabilities and equity for the year through October 31 to be \$68,352.

Tim Morris, manager of Sierra Blanca Regional Airport, said it is possible a small commuter airline can provide service to El Paso and Albuquerque and return.

Territorial Airlines, now based in Roswell, will move its headquarters to Artesia to meet airline needs resulting from establishment of the law enforcement academy in that city.

Morris said four flights daily are planned to Albuquerque and one flight is planned to El Paso.

Ruidoso might be included. Nothing has been finalized, he indicated.

Bundick said Morris is preparing a packet enumerating the capabilities of the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport. These will be distributed to airlines.

Puckett said EDCLC has contacted industrial development people in El Paso. He said the charter under which they operate includes activities in southern New Mexico. He said he attended a Business Quarter meeting where a marketing plan was approved. EDCLC will be participating with a booth at a trade show in Juarez, he said.

Support has been indicated from

UTEP and the dean of engineering at New Mexico State University for EDCLC's proposal to set up a New Mexico Manufacturing Productivity Center.

The New Mexico legislature has provided funds for such a center. The center would be administered by the New Mexico Research and Development Institute. It would work with New Mexico's institutions of higher education and national laboratories and provide technical expertise and assistance to manufacturers in New Mexico.

Technical assistance and expertise would be provided to new and existing small and medium-sized manufacturers.

Board members heard a report from Roy Crocker, CPA and board member, concerning possible tax liabilities if EDCLC starts charging certain firms a relocation fee for services rendered.

EDCLC has been seeking other sources of monetary support since the county reduced annual support from \$130,000 to just over \$50,000.

Crocker was presented a certificate of appreciation at the meeting for his donations of time and effort and for providing a computer to the EDCLC office.

The next meeting of EDCLC board members will be in Capitan, at the Smokey Bear Cafe, with a tentative time of 11 a.m. November 14. Capitan residents will be invited.

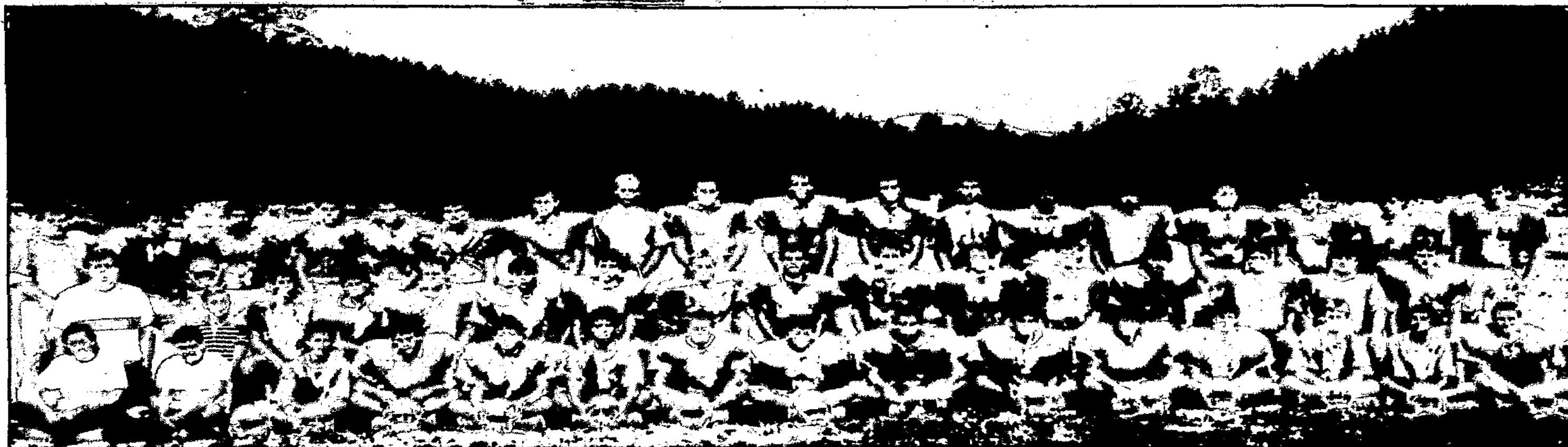

## Tan those hides for a valuable keepsake

Ben Hanson, from the New Mexico Game and Fish has found a great recipe for tanning deer hides and would like to share it with hunters. This procedure was taken from the VIRGINIA WILDLIFE magazine.

Hunters often wonder what they should do with a deerskin.

Why not keep it? Organizations, such as the Elk's Club, will take fresh hides if you would rather not spend the time tanning them.

But, transforming a freshly skinned deerhide into an attractive tanned pelt is worth the time and effort.

Start with two gallons of water, two pounds of salt (any kind) and two ounces of sulfuric acid (or eight ounces of battery acid).

Use a non-metallic container, like a crock or plastic garbage can to mix the ingredients.

Mix salt with the water first, then tip the container and pour the acid slowly down its side.

Remember, NEVER add water to acid but ALWAYS add acid to

water. Explosive reactions occur when water is added to acid.

Be careful not to let the acid splash.

Stir the entire solution with a non-metallic stick. At this point the solution is diluted enough to be used safely and will cause no damage to your skin.

The ideal temperature for the mixture is 70 degrees Fahrenheit. Higher temperatures may damage hides, and lower temperatures will retard the tanning process.

After the acid mixture has been prepared, wash the skins in cold salt water (two cups of salt per gallon). This will remove the blood stains and aid in the fleshing process.

Then, scrub the skins gently with warm water and detergent. Squeeze out the extra water. Never wring water out of an animal skin or fur.

The preparation of the hide is finished. Place it in the acid solution and stir it around. Weigh it down with a non-metallic object, like a clean brick or a plastic jug filled

with water.

Depending on the size of the hide, the tanning process will take from three days to three weeks. Don't worry about the length of time the skins are left in the solution. If they are stirred every three to four days the skins can be left submerged for six months.

After you're satisfied with the texture of the pelt, remove it and wash it with detergent. Rinse in cold water and peel away the fat and flesh, which should pull away from the skin easily.

Wash and rinse the skin again and put it back into the mixture, leaving it for a week or two.

Again, remove it, wash, rinse and squeeze dry. Allow the skin to hang in a shady place until it is drip dry.

A damp skin can be placed in a clothes dryer. Keep the heat turned off and tumble dry, if a clothes dryer is not available, let the skin dry completely while hanging.

When dry, the skin will need to be worked and stretched into a soft white hide.

Fine buckskin can be produced by pulling out the hair before tanning. To do this, first soak it in a strong lime juice which loosens the hair, so it can be pulled out easily. Keep the acidic lime juice away from hands and eyes.

After the hair is removed from the hide, wash it thoroughly removing all traces of lime acid. Then follow the normal tanning procedures. It's finished!

Tanning a hide this way is much easier than belabored pulling and stretching.

Also, having a soft, extravagant pelt is better than letting the deer skin go to waste.

This is not a difficult tanning process, according to Ben Hanson, and can be used on all types of skins.

So, take a little time and use the entire deer after hunting this season. A fine pelt is an attractive part of a hunter's history.

# Area building is at \$6 million

Six new homes planned in the Alto area boosted the October building permit figure at Village Hall to well over a million dollars.

Five permits were taken out for new homes in Ruidoso proper.

Total building permit figure for October was \$1,197,515. This compares to only \$324,240 for the same month last year and \$642,568 for September 1989.

Permits for January through October totaled \$6,080,478, with permits for 1989 running slightly ahead of 1988.

Permits for new single family dwellings (SFD) in October totaled a whopping \$989,500. That figure for October 1988 was \$165,500. September found single family dwelling permits totalling \$489,845.

Residential additions and additions in October totaled \$196,015, compared to \$105,040 in October 1988. September 1989 found \$134,723 in such permits.

There was one \$12,000 commercial permit in October, none in October 1988 and none in September of 1989.

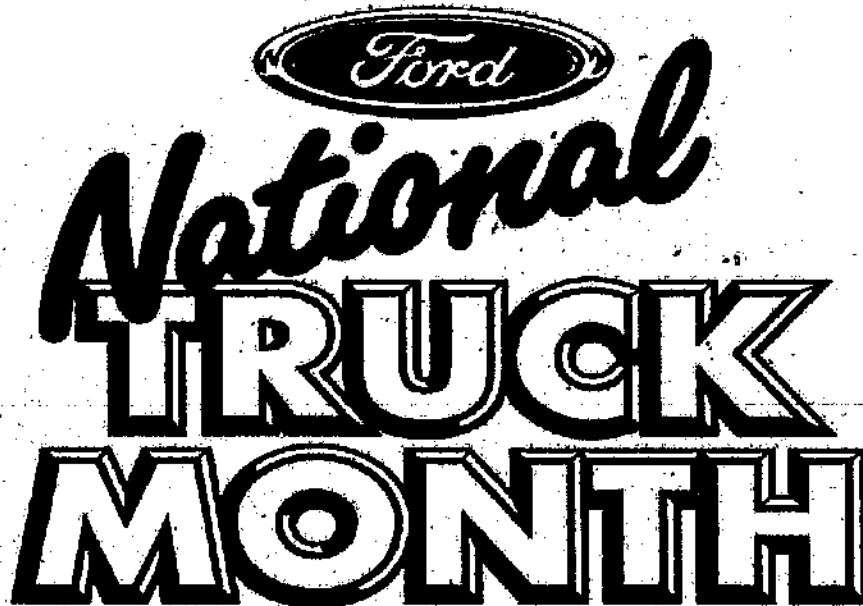

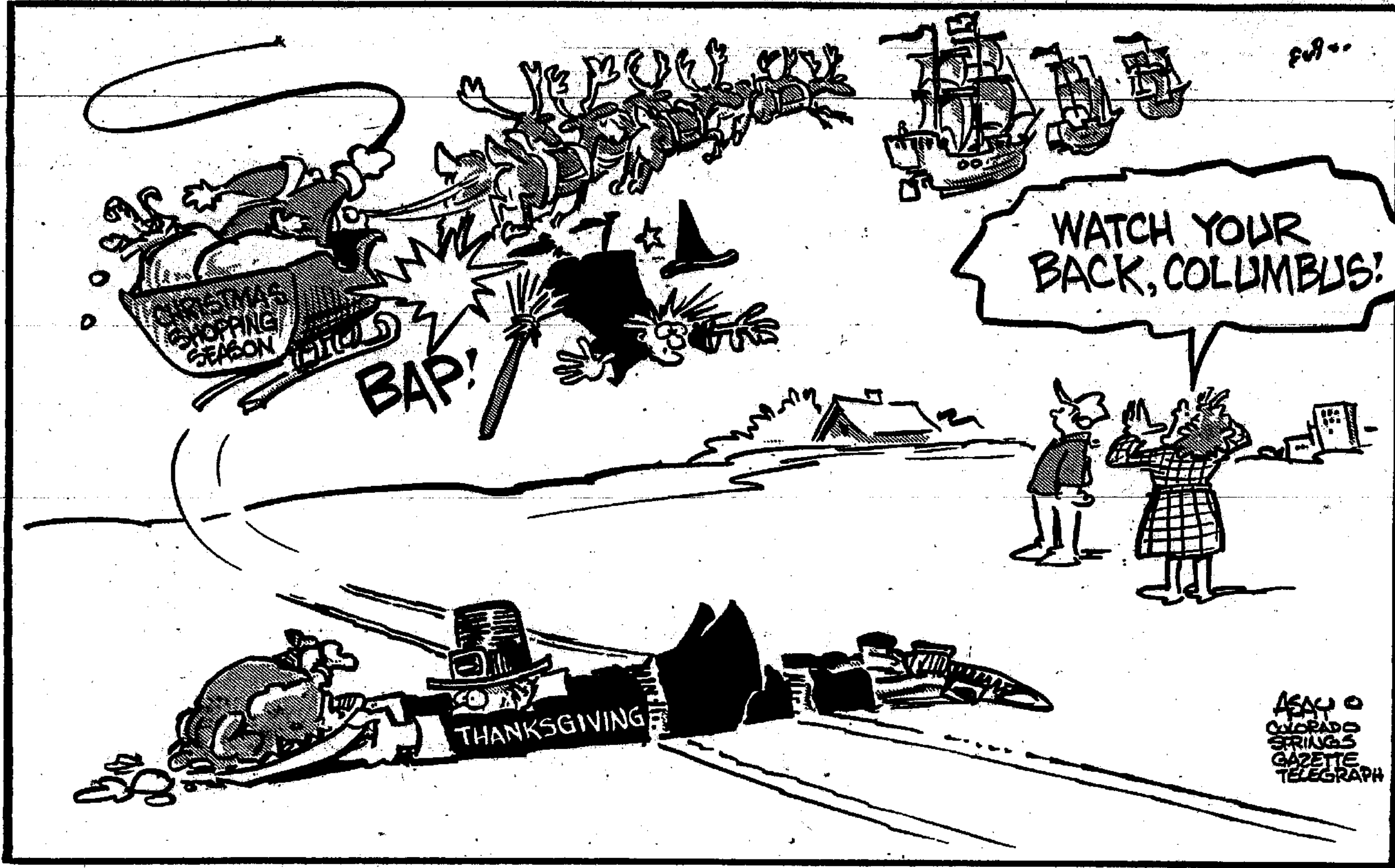

## EDITORIAL

It's only natural to be suspicious when what appears to be a public happening is cloaked in a veil of secrecy. And suspicion reared its ugly head as we watched from outside as the election board for the Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe closed out the world to count the paper ballots cast in Tuesday's election.

We have no reason to doubt the results of that tribal election, but we do wonder why total privacy was needed for the tedious task of tallying the ballots. We've stood quietly by many times as other election boards, for schools, municipal and county elections, went about the task of closing the polls and tallying results. We would have been willing to stand by on Tuesday, even if it took all night; for members of the press stand in for the public at such times.

And so, it was with sadness that we huddled in the cold with a few members of the Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe and watched the election board carefully lock and secure the doors and completely cover the windows in the doorway of the building, apparently retiring into seclusion to count those ballots. We were told by some tribal members that requests to update the election by using voting machines were ignored. We also were told that requests to have poll watchers were either ignored or denied.

We weren't told anything by the election officials, who weren't available for comment the day after the election.

It's too bad that any shadow of a doubt over the tribal election results wasn't eliminated by the presence of unbiased observers at the polls and while the ballots were counted.

The tribal members who pushed for changes during this election say they aren't giving up. They say they'll push for more openness in tribal government. They want Mescalero Apache Indians to have access to information on tribal elections, on tribal finances and other things that impact their lives and livelihoods.

We wish them well.-fj

### DEAR EDITOR:

After a recent fire in the structure of my wood fired boiler, it became readily apparent the dangers of living in the forest and using wood fuel.

Even though the chimney had been cleaned just the week prior to the fire, and over heated catalytic converter caused wood structural parts to ignite. A clean chimney is important for the safe use of wood fuel, but with the required addition of a catalytic converter on wood burning equipment, be aware that these converters get extremely hot and are a danger to nearby walls and ceilings.

Also, the topography of many of our canyons make locating residences difficult. I am grateful that police officers Pete Esquibel and B.J. Barnes knew my location and were available to direct the fire department to my home site. I would suggest that if your residence is isolated, getting to know our local fire department and Emergency Medical personnel could save precious minutes in an emergency.

We were lucky that none of our other buildings or the forest around our home became involved in the blaze. Thanks to police and fire de-

partment personnel the fire at our residence was extinguished without tremendous loss of property, but it was disturbing to discover that if a building is not near a fire hydrant the fire department must rely on pumper trucks for water. As I understand it the village does not own a tanker truck. Although a 600 gallon pumper is adequate to extinguish a small blaze, fire department personnel explained that it would be incapable of extinguishing a house blaze.

I recommend this community pursue the purchase of a tanker, because I cannot believe I am the

only isolated location that could threaten the forest or the rest of the community in the event of a fully involved house fire. As for myself, I intend to install a large holding tank and sprinklers. They may not be enough to prevent a totally involved fire, but they may make those few moments difference between a saved structure and total destruction.

Thanks again to the fire and police departments for their attendance at my most recent house warming.

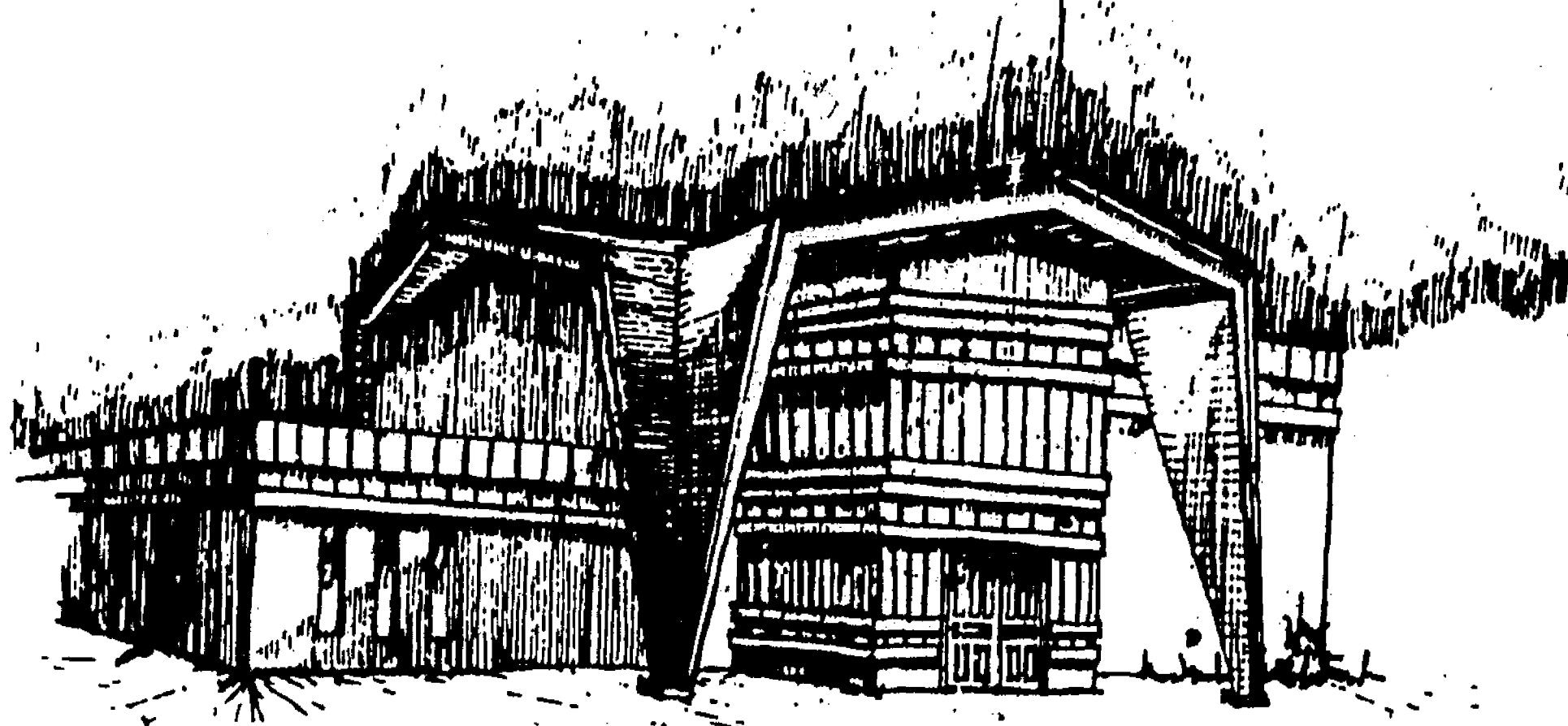
