Master Plan is 100% flexible, says planner

The airport master plan was designed to offer a flexible framework for the valuable property, according to planner John Petronis.

"There's almost 100 percent flexibility," said Petronis, president of Architectural Research Consultants, the company that prepared the document adopted last year by the Ruidoso Village Council.

Speaking during a regular meeting of the Municipal Airport Planning Board (MAPB), Petronis said his company has a continuing interest in the airport property. He said, after doing the research and preparing the plan, ARC is interested in the excellent implementation of


that plan.

Gathered along with the planning board, were members of the Ruidoso Village Council and the Planning and Zoning Commission. Petronis, in the village for the first time since the planning board was activated, asked if the group is faced with any outstanding issues, and got a whole list of answers.

"I'd like to see some forward motion," said MAPB member Herb Brunell, adding the plan is a good one, but he is ready to see some progress, something for the community.

Brunell and board member Don Shaw disagreed over whether

EDAB changes directions again

After agreeing last month to pursue an agreement on one building, the Economic Development Advisory Board (EDAB) asked village administrators Friday to check out seven buildings that have been named as possible civic/events centers.

Just two months ago, EDAB was pushing for a new building to be constructed on the old airport land, but last month members backed off on that plan because of cost overruns and dissension among citizens.

They asked administrators to prepare a proposal over the large building behind Ruidoso State Bank North that is commonly referred to as the "old True Value" building. The plan was to present their recommendations to the council on Tuesday, January 10.

But Friday, board members expanded their request for information on buildings to include all the buildings that were checked out last year. Those buildings were investigated by a task force and by village staff, and EDAB members asked village manager Frank Potter to pull the information from the files and do further research and report back at noon Tuesday, January 24.

Buildings to be considered include the old Gibson's, the old convention center in Ruidoso Downs, the old Ben Franklin, the old Safeway on Sudderth Drive, King's, Rocky Mountain Builders Supply and the old True Value.

James Paxton, agent for the old True Value building, said his client is willing to rent the building to the village on a "triple net" agreement at \$55,000 with the village paying taxes and insurance. He said his client, even on a rental, will give the village an option to purchase the facility for \$700,000.

EDAB member Bill Hirschfeld, cautioning the group against negotiating in a public meeting, asked if

the negotiations weren't placed in the hands of village administrators at the last meeting. Village manager Frank Potter said he is working on it, as well as looking over the building.

"We're not finding many problems with the building," said Potter.

EDAB member Ralph Petty said, since the last meeting, he was asked by two members of the Ruidoso Village Council to look into the old Safeway building. He said he learned that building can be rented, also on a triple net basis, for \$3,500 a month. Since the building is owned by the Mormon Church, it may not be taxed, he added.

"Are we on a search again for another building?" asked Hirschfeld, and apparently that's just what EDAB is doing.

For, by the end of the meeting, Potter was authorized to recheck all the buildings that were investigated before EDAB was told by a previous council to concentrate its efforts on something on the old airport land.

All agreed that the community is pushing for a facility, and Petty reminded EDAB of the commitment to Ruidoso lodgers to provide a meeting place as soon as possible.

"I want to get something going," said Hirschfeld.

In discussions over a proposal for the old airport land being offered by racetrack owner, R.D. Hubbard, Petty said Hubbard is spending a lot of money at the track and is going to do some great things for this town. EDAB member Preston Isaacs said one sign of the optimism about the racetrack is the fact that Turf Club seats already are sold out for this year.

"What happens at the race track ... what happens at the ski area ... are important to the community," said Isaacs.

Potter said he'll have information on all the proposals on January 24.

EC Board dives into water fight

The Eagle Creek Intercommunity Water Association is ready to jump into the dispute between the Village of Capitan and Alamogordo.

During a meeting Friday morning in Ruidoso, members of the Eagle Creek board, their attorney Bill Payne, Capitan Mayor Benny Coker and Capitan attorney Mike Rannels talked about water.

Alamogordo and Capitan have had an arrangement for years that allowed Capitan to purchase water from the Bonito River. That arrangement ran into problems recently that led Alamogordo to shut off water to Capitan.

Those two municipalities have had several meetings over their dispute, with the next one scheduled later this month.

Meanwhile, Eagle Creek board members said Friday that the 100,000 or more gallons of their water that is delivered to Fort Stanton daily is being ignored.

"Somebody owes Eagle Creek for

it," said board member Frank Sawyer.

"Every gallon used from Eagle Creek freed up a gallon at Bonito," said Rannels, noting that Alamogordo is ignoring that issue in the complicated dispute between the two towns. Although the independent Eagle Creek group has had no involvement in that dispute, Rannels said it has reached the point where Eagle Creek's ability to sell water to Capitan has been interrupted.

"You are involved whether you like it or not," said Rannels, calling on the board to adopt a statement saying the water delivered by Eagle Creek to Fort Stanton was for the benefit of Alamogordo. He said if the credit isn't allowed on a gallon for gallon basis, it should be admitted that the benefit was substantial.

Rannels asked for a statement from Eagle Creek to the effect that the board is going to insist on credit for the water delivered to Fort

Ruidoso man is dead, apparent suicide victim

A 71-year-old Ruidoso man died early Saturday, the victim of an apparent suicide.

Ruidoso Police said Floyd E. McCune was pronounced dead in the backyard of his 112 Skyview Drive home after police and emergency medical services responded to a call at 5:37 a.m. from the victim's wife, Ava McCune.

Detective Mike Lovelace said McCune died as the result of an apparently self-inflicted gunshot wound. He said a .38 special was found beside the man's body.

McCune's body was transported to the Office of the Medical Investigator in Albuquerque, and Ruidoso Police are awaiting the autopsy results.

Lovelace said McCune retired in 1968 as a colonel in the United States Air Force.

The victim's wife reportedly told police that her husband had been ill and had suffered a great deal of pain over a number of years.

Ruidoso meteorologist Bill Hostetter predicts today, January 9, to be fair with temperatures a little higher. Winds will be light. Tonight will be clear and temperatures will not be quite so cold.

Tuesday will be fair and temperatures will be higher. Winds will begin to blow from the southwest at 10 to 15 miles per hour by afternoon.

Precipitation probabilities are: 0 percent today; 0 percent tonight and 0 percent tomorrow.

The extended forecast for Wednesday through Friday calls for higher temperatures Wednesday with a chance of snow on Thursday or Friday. Temperatures will be below the seasonal low of 17 degrees and the high of 50 degrees.

The official low of 0 degrees today (Monday) represents the coldest temperature in Ruidoso since minus five degrees on January 20, 1988, when 10 inches of snow covered the ground.

Investigation continues into mysterious death.

The continuing investigation into the mysterious death of Tony Dudley led to the discovery of very small traces of a substance suspected to be marijuana.

Lincoln County Sheriff's Department investigator Paul Wersich said he found very small amounts of what is suspected to be marijuana when he searched Dudley's pickup that was discovered December 28, in the Block Ranch area north of the Capitan Mountains, about 10 miles north of Capitan.

The 34-year-old Texan's body was found December 30, about a mile from where the pickup was discovered by a rancher.

The Sheriff's Department and White Mountain Search and Rescue (WMSAR) launched an intensive search on December 28, when it was discovered the truck matched that described on a missing person's poster distributed by Dudley's family.

However, the body was found during an air search by El Paso helicopter pilot Charles (Cheater) Bella, who was hired by the Dudley family to search the vast cattle ranching area Friday. He discovered the body within a mile of the pickup and just a half mile from where the WMSAR operation ended.

Dudley's body was partially

mummified, probably from the extremely cold temperatures, said Lincoln County Sheriff James McSwane, who was called into the case by former sheriff Don Samuels whose term ended at midnight December 31.

Forensic investigator Mike Lovelace of the Ruidoso Police Department assisted in the investigation and took fingerprint samples on the truck.

Dudley's body was pronounced dead by deputy medical examiner Nancy Guck at the site where it was found. The body was transported to the Office of Medical Investigation in Albuquerque, but toxicology results are not expected for three to four weeks, Wersich said. Those tests will determine if Dudley had any drugs or alcohol in his system.

Initial external exams made immediately after the body was sent to Albuquerque for autopsy showed no external injuries. Wersich said those results indicate the man may have died of exposure.

Dudley was reported to be in Ruidoso to ski and was last seen at Wal-Mart December 10.

The investigation continues, with law officers searching for answers to why Dudley was in the remote ranching area north of Capitan.

Stanton. "They're down there using our water," said Frank Potter, a member of the Eagle Creek board. He suggested that Jackie Atkins of Atkins Engineering do a hydraulic analysis of the Eagle Creek to Fort Stanton water.

Atkins said it will be very hard to reconstruct how the water has been delivered and used. He suggested researching the original agreement when Eagle Creek purchased water rights from the railroad, to see if there is any stipulation over the delivery of water to Fort Stanton.

"Irrespective of the dollar figure, a gallon of water is a gallon of water," said Runnels. Eagle Creek members unanimously adopted the statement calling on Alamogordo to give Capitan credit for the Eagle Creek water delivered to Fort Stanton, and then retired into executive session.

Petronis should discuss specific proposals for the land, with Shaw suggesting he avoid dealing with those.

Petronis, backed up by an assortment of maps and charts, reviewed some points in the master plan. He said the allowable-use chart he displayed provides a logical sequence of the multi-uses that include an entry, focal point, internal trails and municipal or cultural facilities.

"This is a tremendous asset—it's going to be a tremendous asset for 100 years. You don't want to spend it all at once," said Petronis.

He said Ruidoso may be able to expand on its image, explaining that the focal point called for in the plan could enhance the high mountain resort image. He said a water feature was recommended because the airport property is on the site of a former stream.

At least one audience member, Corinne Swearingin, questioned whether there really is a stream on the land, but board member Jerry Shaw said it's a known fact that there is a drainage problem on the property.

In discussions over the upcoming presentation by a golf course and hotel developer, Petronis said those uses are totally compatible with the plan. He cautioned the board, when reviewing the golf course proposal, along with any future development proposals, to consider if the use is available elsewhere and if it will take up the entire 160-acre tract.

Petronis told the board that their function can take a passive or

active direction, but either way the group will need resources, including staff to accomplish their goals.

A passive approach would be for the board to wait for proposals and determine how they fit into the plan.

"We had the advisory board initiating marketing efforts," said Petronis, explaining the function of the planning group as envisioned by master planners.

Discussions over marketing the land extended to suggestions that the Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County, already organized and at least partially funded, could take on that responsibility.

P&Z Commissioner John White suggested, since EDCLC receives mill levy funds with more than 60 percent generated in Ruidoso, it would be logical for that group to take on the marketing job.

"It would be irresponsible of us to set up another taxpayers bonanza when they can get at least 60 percent help," said White.

Petronis said the board can make a recommendation to the council over the resources needed to market the airport land, and can also recommend who should do that marketing. He noted it is primarily a village function.

Margaret Lahey suggested the MAPB needs to very active ... to initiate activity. "They're the ones that should generate most of the ideas," said Lahey.

"We need almost an advocacy board to protect and develop the land in the right way," said Lahey.

MAPB member Rick Evans said the board doesn't yet have a sense

of the direction the council sees for it.

When a proposal is presented, Petronis said the board should consider if the plan would diversify the economy, provide a use not provided elsewhere and if land is avail-

able elsewhere.

"Midtown should be the prime commercial area," said Petronis, adding that uses should not be duplicated on the valuable land.


Questioned over infra-structure, Petronis said the development often

puts that in place first. "It's sort of like planting the seed," said Petronis.

Also Wednesday, Jeff Maul make a presentation over Weatherport, the modular fabric building systems he sells.

"This is not a proposal ... just to let you know the product is available," said Maul.

MAPB will meet next at 2 p.m. Wednesday, January 11, in council chambers of Ruidoso Municipal Administrative Center.

Louisiana firm expands with Lincoln County plant

Juma Farms makes wood products

Juma Farms, Ltd., headquartered in Monroe, Louisiana, is expanding its operations with a manufacturing plant in Ruidoso.

Specializing in the manufacture of wooden letters, numbers and other wooden parts, Juma Farms, Ltd. is the largest national distributor of those lines in the United States.

Company president Dave Talley gives the Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County (EDCLC) credit for his decision to move his operation to Ruidoso.

While looking for a better source for white pine, Talley learned of the Mescalero Apache Forest Products operation. He entered into an agreement to purchase his wood and do the block cuts right at the sawmill—saving freight and disposing of the waste chips at the same time.

That's when Talley began looking for a site for his manufacturing operation that will eventually employ from eight to 10 people.

EDCLC board members learned about Talley and his plans. They contacted Talley, showed him around, answered questions and helped him find the vacant property on Carrizo-Creek Road where

he's installing his plant. "We get a prospect, and we walk right along with them," said EDCLC president Buddy Bundick. "That's why I'm here," added Talley, who could have placed his operation in a number of other places.

Talley said he was sold on the area by the EDCLC members who, with no self-interest or personal gain, went out of their way to help him. "Those are men of the highest integrity," said Talley, praising Bundick and board members Don Shaw and Ronnie Paulger. Talley said Ruidoso real estate agent Frank Kolb, a "friend of a friend," put him in touch with the development group. He said Kolb, too, went way out of his way to help him find and secure a Ruidoso location.

While other towns are offering incentives like free rent, free land and various other financial helps, the EDCLC is out there just selling the area, said Talley. While that could make their job harder, Talley is convinced that's the way to get good stable businesses into the area.

"If these men had had what some of these other towns had to offer, no telling what they could do," said Talley.

Juma Farms, Ltd., has been in business since 1977, and presently employees 22 people. The company distributes most of its products through large home centers—most with hundreds of outlets. The products are shipped into 44 states.

Western Auto in Ruidoso carries the Juma Farms letters and numbers, and Talley said he saw his product on many Ruidoso business signs.

Talley said his Ruidoso foreman, Mike Free, has been with the company since he was 18 years old. He is in the village, working on the "cut-up" end of the operation at the sawmill. When the plant is ready, Juma Farms will begin adding to its local staff.


"This is exactly the kind of business we've been looking for," said Bundick. He said the company isn't reliant on the local economy, is non-polluting and will make use of an otherwise vacant building.

Shaw said the EDCLC is looking for 100 such businesses that employ about 10 people each. He said by boosting the number of jobs through many small companies, the area will gain more stability than by relying on one large employer.

"We're just extremely pleased to have Dave and his business here," said Shaw.

Finance director explains sales tax revenues, voices concern over fluctuations

Village of Ruidoso financial director, John Varley provided information Friday over village gross receipts tax collections over the past five years.

Village business operators collect 6.5 percent on every sale, and the village gets 3.6 percent back: 1.35 percent state-shared, .75 percent municipal, 1.00 supplemental and .50 airport debt service.

Since the average retail sales in the village are \$9.3 million each month, the village should receive about \$334,800 from the state as the 3.6 percent municipal share of gross receipts tax collections.

Varley said beginning sometime in late 1987, the sales tax figures began to be a bit out of line, with the reports furnished by the state to the village showing bigger than usual differences in those amounts remitted for the 1.35 percent and other gross receipts tax increments. Varley and village manager Frank Potter have voiced concern over the methods being used by the state to account for tax collections.

In some cases, according to village officials, village sales have appeared to be up, and yet tax remittances from the state have dropped.

Although the village can find out from the state if a business is

reporting its sales, the village may not be told if a business is paying its taxes. Varley and Potter said there are many unanswered questions surrounding the differences they've noted in gross receipts tax remittances to the village.

Using just the 1.35 percent portion, Varley said the village collected the following amounts:

1984	\$1,692,528
1985	\$1,658,941
1986	\$1,575,978
1987	\$1,533,961
1988	\$1,429,393

Varley's month by month comparisons show big difference from one month to the next, and bigger than expected differences when comparing the same months of different years.

He provided the chart (left) that shows the gross receipts tax changes and a moving average.

Both Varley and Potter said they'll continue to monitor the collections and remittances.

Potter said he spent a great deal of time during the Christmas holidays in village businesses. He said business was good and the numbers of shoppers way up. He said he expects sales tax revenues to be up, too, for December.

But those figures, and the check, won't be in his hands until February.

Village is featured in NM Journal

The Village of Ruidoso, along with Mescalero, is profiled in the January issue of New Mexico Business Journal.



The Warrior cagers deserved a better fate. These boys have talent and good size. Good enough to be competitive.

The Warriors were beaten by more than just five talented athletes. The Warriors were beaten by Lovington's athletic program and it showed.

Ruidoso fans and parents are supportive, win or lose. But, if they are asked to attend and support games, they should be treated with a program that has at least the semblance of organization, win or lose.

The aftermath of the Bears-Philadelphia fog-out has spawned a series of debates on ESPN.

The television monitors couldn't sneak through the thick haze at Soldier Field although players on the field still rifled long passes which seemed to indicate their vision was much better.

I understand the stadium offices in Chicago were flooded with telephone calls during the game from residents of the Roswell community who claimed fogs and blizzards were unfair to the team, but they didn't know which team.

Referees have feelings too. This is a true story. I'll not be tacky by telling you which game this event occurred (last Wednesday), but it was touching.

Warrior girls nipped by Artesia dogs

Down by seven points with 2:15 left in the game, the fighting Ruidoso Warriors rallied with a furious comeback pressing the Artesia Lady Dogs all over the court. For the second game in a row, the Warrior girls were a single point short 40-39.

It was a devastating Wednesday night loss for the hard playing home team and a dozen fans surrounded head coach Jody Hopkins on the court to pledge their support for the fine Warrior squad.

Man to Man

The Lady Dogs opened the game with a man-to-man defense. Once the Warriors adjusted, they were able to penetrate the lanes for easy layups.

"Our picks opened the lanes," said Hopkins. "We drove the middle in textbook fashion."

The Lady Dogs tried to confuse the Warriors in the second quarter mixing man-to-man with zone coverage.

"We struggled at first with the mixed defense," said Hopkins. "Because it was difficult to read. Once we adjusted, we were back on track and closed the half with a three-point lead."

"The team felt good about the first half. With our type of offense and the number of picks we set, it is only a matter of time before we get an easy shot."

"Artesia has seen our offense before and played us very tightly before we altered the game plan enough to free our shooters."

Hopkins said a weak Warrior third quarter led to a scoring drought.

More shots

"We only shot 10 times in the third quarter and our goal is 22 per period," said Hopkins. "Of the 10, we only dropped only two through the nets. To the Lady Dogs credit, they put a lot of pressure on us at the top of the key with a match up zone to take away Tara Miller's three-point shot. It took us awhile to adjust to that strategy."

More passing

"We needed more passing at the time to make things happen so I substituted a third guard in the game for more ball movement. It weakened our rebounding for the moment, but it strengthened our outside shooting. Once we began to move the ball, good shot selection began to open up, but the shots wouldn't drop."

The third quarter was Artesia's best playing time, creating a 10-point lead two minutes before the quarter ended.

The fourth quarter saw the Warriors charging back. With two minutes left in the game that had cut the Lady Dogs lead to five and with less than a minute pared the

Hopkins' thin bench prevented an early press.

"I felt we needed to save our players' strength for the last push," she said. "Artesia passed the ball real well and we could have worked ourselves out of contention. We held our own at this point with a match-up zone."

"When we started our final press, the girls made it work and we came back in a hurry. They were giving it all they had. That's what I love about this team," she said.

"It makes you sick to see that much fight, and then lose," said Hopkins. "These girls have more heart than most NBA teams."

"We've got a lot of talent, but these girls have got to have the time to develop it. We fought hard and that's what got us back in the ball game."

"This is the first time we have made this type of comeback."

At three points down with one second left in the game, Miller was fouled. She swished the first free throw and then attempted to miss the second free throw off the rim for a designed tip in play. She threw the ball hard with no arch and the ball slammed through the hoop for a point to the bewilderment of Miller.

We can win

"There was a time when we walked on the court hoping not to be beaten badly," said Hopkins. "Now we're stepping on the court thinking we can win."

"My forwards, DeAnna Swanner, Sarah Kazhe, Norma Murillo and Ardena Comanche, were getting good shots because of improved technique in setting picks."

"The guards have so many options to be aware of and read. At the same time there is always someone in your face preventing movement. Miller, Jennifer Parker, Stephanie Torres and Melinda Schut did a fantastic job of reading the options and working the ball deep.

"Artesia's strength is fast breaking, and we shut them down," Hopkins said. "I doubt if the Lady Dogs had more than two successful fast breaks all night."

The Warriors will travel to Cobre next Friday, January 13, for their first district game.

Zebbras are defined by Webster as a fleet African mammal related to the horse, but distinctively and conspicuously patterned in stripes of black and white.

In Africa, it is rare when you find a Zebra indoors, but in the confines of many field houses in the good old USA, you can find one most any night of the year between November and March, cavorting up and down a hardwood floor in pursuit of 10 colorfully dressed young men and women.

You see, in our country, where the four-legged variety are found only in a zoo, the better-known two-legged species are found in abundance. Some are simply called, "zebras," while others go under the guise of "convicts" or "grave robbers," or any number of more unmentionable names.

The zebra as we know him is

a necessary evil, viewed by many as a villain one night and a savior on other evenings.

I am a zebra—loosely translated, a basketball game official. Some think I'm a pretty good one; others think I'm not so hot. Many nights, groups of people will shake my hand following an evening's work on the hardwood. On other occasions, they seek me out to wring my neck.

During the course of an evening, you have no idea how many times an official would like to do a little neck-wringing of his own. Some fans feel the buck they paid to get in the door entitles them to special privileges beyond rooting for their favorite sons. They take delight in chastising the officials to their heart's content, if for no other reason than to get a little attention for themselves and to show people sitting around them what experts they are.

Buck back

You don't know how often an official would like to go into the stands, reach in his pocket and pull out a dollar and hand it to a "fan" and tell him, "here's your buck back; now get off my back."

Let me state from the outset that officiating is a thankless profession done by a group of dedicated men who achieve no personal glory. In fact, on many occasions they end up seriously damaging their personal professions because of a call they "missed."

Somewhere, somehow, coaches, fans and media representatives are going to have to accept high school officials for what they are: amateurs who are businessmen first and officials second. We do not profess to be professionals. If we were, most of us would be in the NBA making big bucks instead of the fee paid for high school games.

Low pay

If you figure it on an hourly basis, counting the time an official is on the road going to and from the game site, an hour of pre-game in the dressing room, time on the floor, and time dressing and eating, the pay is pretty minimal.

But nowhere does it say that grown men partake in the profession for the financial gain. We do it because someone has to do it. We do it because we enjoy being part of something wholesome for our young people and our communities.

Several years ago while I was officiating the Hobbs Holiday Tournament, Tommy Nuñez, an NBA official visiting the tournament made the statement, "I've never seen a bad official. It's just that some are better than others."

I thought that was a great observation. We're like Rodney Dangerfield, we get no respect. Some believe we deserve no respect. Others are grateful that there are still a handful of us left

to get this thankless job done.

We are a vanishing breed. It's getting more and more difficult to get young men interested in officiating. Every time you talk to one and try to urge him to join our ranks, he'll tell you, "I've got other things to do with my time than to put up with all the crap that you guys take."

If fans could just chase those 16- to 18-year-old young men and women up and down the court for just one quarter, I don't think they'd be near as quick to criticize or expound. Teams constantly shuffle substitutes in and out of the game, keeping fresh players on the floor as much as possible. But I've yet to see an official get a substitute, except in rare cases where one is injured.

Guest Column

Several years ago while a referee, and operating a sporting goods business, I attached a clip-on odometer like joggers use to my belt during a game to check the distance covered. That night I ran 7.3 miles.

I am distressed when I pick up a paper and read articles detrimental to my profession. I remember seeing big headlines where a team got "home cooked,"

by referees. I certainly hope not. When a guy takes off that striped shirt, he has to look in the mirror. When he does, he can criticize or admire himself. He'd better always be able to look himself squarely in the eyes after a game and say, "I did the best I could."

Officials are only human. Fans don't react to a player when he walks or double dribbles or when a coach makes a hope head decision. Why do they not allow an official to make a mistake?

I recognize that I've made many bad calls. Usually, I'm the first to know it. But I don't believe in that "make-up call" stuff. If you make a poor call, you just say to yourself, "I blew it," and try again to do the best you can and hope that you keep the poor calls to a minimum.

When I go onto a court, I honestly feel that if I can get off the floor without missing over six calls, I've probably done a pretty good job.

To me, it's a privilege and an honor to be an official. Some think I'm over the hill, but I'm the same official I was when I called my first game some 24 years ago; a little slower, but a lot smarter.

True fans

I hope that all true fans can see where I'm coming from in

writing this. We're not asking for your praise, just a little bit of understanding and patience. If you haven't been out there on the dead run, with ten other bodies moving between you and the action constantly, then you ought to try it sometime before you blurt out your comments and your obscenities.

Human

We're human beings, same as you are. Most of us don't beat our wife or kick our dog. We're just common, ordinary folks, trying to keep something worthwhile going for the American people.

One Friday night in Clovis, my partner and I were officiating a very tough game between Clovis and Hobbs. We did the best we could and afterwards still felt we had done a pretty good job.

The Hobbs radio announcer lambasted and ridiculed us unmercifully. I've been behind a mike before, doing a play-by-play, but I'll bet \$5 that guy wouldn't trade places with me for one evening on the court.

It's awfully easy to call the shots from behind a mike or a typewriter. I've done both, so I know. But the job on the floor is the toughest of the three by far.

1988 is marred by dissension in Lincoln County

1988 ...
 A year that saw headlines over the murder of a teen-age girl, elections and political squabbles.
MURDER IN THE VALLEY
 Plenty of snow fell in the early part of the year; then, as it melted, tragedy struck the close-knit communities of San Patricio and the Hondo Valley.
 Katina Chavez, the popular and athletically talented 15-year-old Hondo High School student was reported missing Saturday evening and her body was found on a chilly Sunday morning in the Rio Ruidoso.
 According to autopsy reports, Chavez was strangled, then drowned.
 The community was torn. A search for the killer was organized by the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department and eventually involved New Mexico State Police and Federal Bureau of Investigation officers.
 But clues were sketchy. Deputies questioned family

members and neighbors. Matt Surratt was taken from his class at Hondo High School for questioning by sheriff's deputies. On March 9, he was charged with the murder of his classmate and longtime friend.
 Surratt was transferred to Alamogordo, where he was held in the Otero County Juvenile Detention Center for six months. Surratt was detained until just before his trial, for his own protection, authorities said.
 On June 3, a court ruling determined Surratt be tried as a juvenile and trial was set for August 21, in Fort Sumner. Judge Richard Parsons transferred the case out of Lincoln County due to pre-trial publicity.
 Defended by Ruidoso attorney Gary Mitchell, Surratt was freed after Judge Richard Parsons ruled the state did not present enough evidence for conviction.
 The Chavez family, frustrated by what they saw as a lack of concern in the sheriff's department, began a petition for a grand jury to investi-

gate the murder.
 Parsons, who called a grand jury for the early part of January, 1989, said the District Attorney will determine whether the Katina Chavez murder will be considered by that group.
 As the year closed, the case is still under investigation, and remains a mystery.
POLITICAL SQUABBLES
 Lincoln County Courthouse is filled with new faces this year, with only two elected officials returning to the offices they filled for the last two years.
 County Treasurer Shirley Goodloe and Probate Judge Jack Page are the only incumbents re-elected in 1988.
 The entire Lincoln County Commission is made up of first-time commissioners Karon Petty, Rick Simpson and Bob Hemphill.
 County sheriff James McSwane and County Clerk Martha Proctor also are new to county politics. New assessor Julia Samora, though not new to the assessor's office (she was

an employee previously), steps into an elected position for the first time.
 It's doubtful the elected officials who served over the past two years will soon forget the disputes that characterized their terms.
 The year began with budget problems in the Sheriff's Office—an intimation of things to come. Charged with maintaining a balanced county budget, the commissioners, early in their terms, were in conflict with Sheriff Don Samuels over compliance with county requirements.
 But seeds of dissent had sprouted with strong emotions expressed throughout the county.
 The sheriff claimed he was being "picked-on," and the arguments among county offices continued.
 Commissioners John Allen Hightower, Bill Karn and Ralph Dunlap were the subject of a special grand jury investigation, that found no evidence of any wrongdoing.
 County Clerk Fran Siddens and

members of the commission disagreed over the minutes of a meeting where Samuels appeared to discuss his budget. The commissioners and clerk reached a stalemate when Siddens refused to amend her minutes, and that dispute ended in the courts.
 When the Lincoln County commissioners filed suit against the sheriff and clerk, they lost their legal adviser when District Judge Robert Doughty ruled that county attorney Gary Mitchel could not represent any of the parties involved.
 Outside legal counsel was hired, but a dispute erupted over who would pay attorney fees.
 June 1, the argument was taken to the New Mexico Supreme Court. The court ruled the county was not responsible for payment of outside legal representation for the county officials and instructed the DA to act as counsel.
 Late July, the controversy over the minutes was settled in an agreement between Siddens and

the county commissioners. The commissioners agreed to compensate Siddens for her legal fees.
 The argument cooled, and attentions were turned toward routine business.
 August, September and October came and went with little controversy, although the relationship between the commissioners and the clerk could be considered "distant."
 Commissioners, during their last meeting of the year, conducted a mid-year budget review on December 27, and ended the year much as it began—again expressing dismay over the continuing overspending in the Sheriff's Office.
 Siddens presented a budget adjustment to pay her legal fees and Hightower announced further disputes with the sheriff will be handled by DA Bert Atkins.
ELECTIONS
 The June primaries came and went with incumbent commissioners Bill Karn and Ralph

Dunlap losing in their party races, and incumbent John Hightower winning the Democratic nomination only to lose the general election in November.

Hightower ran a campaign based on his accomplishments as commissioner; the other candidates ran campaigns which featured their inexperience as a positive factor.

Newcomer James McSwane defeated the incumbent sheriff in the Republican primary and the race was on between McSwane and former sheriff Tom Sullivan.

Experience versus inexperience, again, with Sullivan recalling his two terms as sheriff.

When election day came, Lincoln County voters turned out in big numbers and elected Republicans to every office in the county, except one. Democrat Rick Simpson, who thought he was a Republican until he filed for office, was the only Democrat to win in Lincoln County.

The voters, by electing mostly newcomers, sent a message to the officials that had been embroiled in the continuing disputes over the past two years.

EDITORIAL

It's time to call in the big guns ... we need Nancy. She may be the only one in Washington D.C. who still knows how to say "no."

An epidemic of greed is sweeping through Washington D.C. as a federal commission is recommending 50 percent pay increases for federal officials, judges, lawmakers and the president. And President Ronald Reagan, on his way out the front door, is endorsing those hefty raises as his parting gift to Washington big spenders.

We're talking big raises, with the president's pay to go from the current \$200,000 to a whopping \$350,000 a year; the House speaker's from \$115,000 to \$175,000 and cabinet members' from the current \$99,500 to \$155,000. Many of these folks who will benefit from the commission ruling are the very same ones who will go down in history for their unprecedented multi-billion dollar deficit budgets.

In the real world, corporations often tie pay raises and big bonuses to good management, increased profits and, yes, a balanced budget. But, not so in Washington D.C. where a bunch of fat cats can say, "I'm worth it, and I want it," and thumb their noses at the hardworking taxpayers who foot the bill.

If members of the House and Senate don't intervene, the raises automatically take effect 30 days after the proposed federal budget is submitted today (Monday). That budget is expected to be heavy on the red ink even before the salary increases.

And, in a replay of the last big pay increase, congressional representatives have only to sit back and wait for their money. The system lets the Congress take those big paychecks to the bank without even taking a vote. And what will they tell their constituents? "I would have voted against it." We heard it last time, and we can expect to hear it again.

We believe the proposed pay hikes are ill-timed, illogical and fiscally irresponsible. Taxpayers should send the Congress a clear message that sitting back and just letting the proposal happen won't be tolerated. We believe lawmakers have a duty and an obligation to intervene.

And that's where Nancy comes in. She's been giving out some good advice for the past eight years, and her words to youngsters faced with tough decisions should be heeded by the Congress as well:

Just say no!-fj






