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Gas Co. changes ownership

Natural Gas Processing Company announced last week the completion of its acquisition of Ruidoso Natural Gas Company.

Natural Gas Processing is a fully integrated oil and gas company with a gas utility division, Wyoming Gas Company, presently serving in the state of Wyoming.

Natural Gas Processing, with offices in Worland, Wyoming, intends to continue to operate Ruidoso Natural Gas under its current management and trade name. However, it does intend to increase its employee and equipment base to upgrade and expand its New Mexico system.

Ruidoso Natural Gas has been a private corporation owned by stockholders in Albuquerque and Santa Fe since 1966. The company provides service to Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs.

"We plan to do some extensive expansions, extending the mains throughout Ruidoso and the surrounding area," said Ken Johnston, who has been manager of the utility company for the past four years. Johnston will continue as manager, and all 11 Ruidoso Natural Gas employees are still on the job.

Johnston said the Ruidoso acquisition is the first New Mexico operation for the Wyoming company.

"Most utilities have a town saturated, no more room for growth," said Johnston, noting that the development potential in this area is unusual.

"There is so much room for growth," he said.

The New Mexico Public Services Commission approved the transfer on December 30.

State agency reps visit commission

Information ranging from purchasing and property tax to public safety and emergency services was presented to the new Lincoln County Commission, along with other elected officials, at a special workshop Wednesday in Carrizozo.

Praised by some of the representatives as the first forum of its type in the state, the workshop was suggested by Commissioner Karon Z. Petty and organized by county manager Suzanne Cox.

More than half of the 21 various federal, state and county agencies represent public safety or health. Several agency representatives complimented Cox for her past work in establishing public safety and emergency services.

Phil Roybal of the New Mexico Department of Finance and Administration (DFA) in Santa Fe, opened the forum. DFA oversees all financial matters of local governments. Monthly treasurer and budget reports are required of all governments, to ensure no excesses of budget expenditures, Roybal said.

He told the commissioners they are, by law, the board of finance, charged with overall management of county government. Property taxes are the main source of county revenues, and are governed by the property tax code.

"The first place to get into trouble is the Open Meetings Act," Roybal said.

Purchasing is another problem area for commissioners, Roybal said.

"The best advice I can give you is to seek advice from your county manager," he said.

About legal matters, Roybal recommended the commissioners seek advice from the county manager, district attorney or his office. He closed by praising Cox for her good work with his office.

George Del Curto, director of the New Mexico Property Tax Division, said his department has direct supervisory authority over county assessors and works with the county treasurer's office. He said the staff in the Lincoln County Assessor's of-

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Hall, Carruthers preview '89 legislative session

State Representative Ben Hall identified a number of issues he'll focus on during the 60-day legislative session set to begin at noon Tuesday, January 17, in Santa Fe.

Interviewed last week, before Governor Garrey Carruthers unveiled his legislative package, Hall said education will be a big issue this session.

Carruthers, too, placed education among his top priorities.

Speaking to the New Mexico Press Women Saturday, Carruthers lined out his package that calls substance abuse the number one challenge, but places a high emphasis on education and New Mexico's youth.

"The young people of New Mexico are its greatest natural resource," said Carruthers during a lunch Saturday. A legislative delegation was on hand to hear the Governor explain the program for the first time.

Using a flip chart to illustrate his legislative package, Carruthers said his administration had a great impact on the 30 to 32 bills that have come out of interim committees to be considered during the upcoming session.

Hall, a Republican representing parts of Lincoln, Chavez and Eddy counties, Hall predicts that legislators will act to modify Senate Bill 106, an educational reform package that was to be phased into action. He said the state just can't afford

some of those provisions.

Carruthers, too, said SB 106 needs some changes. His educational proposals include an Incentives for School Improvement Program, providing bonuses to the schools showing the most improvement. Carruthers said the cash bonuses would go directly to the successful schools, not through the administration.

He also described a plan that would allow students to enroll in the schools of their choice, whether or not they live in that district. He said the state funding for that student would go to that school.

Senator Gary Hoyer said Saturday that plan could be disruptive to schools, causing problems in setting budgets from year to year with a constantly changing student population.

The Governor's plan also calls for a local option property tax levy, a re-learning system and higher education.

Hall said the State Board of Ed-

ucation is recommending a 13 percent pay increase for teachers, but Carruthers didn't touch on that in his proposal. Hall said he doesn't see how the state can afford the 13 percent pay hike.

"We are going to have a surplus of \$84 million ... by the time I get there, they will have spent that plus more," said Hall.

He said he'll be working on legislation dealing with the handicapped and the construction industry.

Hall said he'll push for some major changes in the Construction Industries Division, the state agency that oversees the state building industry. Hall said the CID paid staff has tried to get involved in writing rules and regulations, functions that should be reserved to the appointed committee.

If major changes in CID don't come out of this session, Hall said he would like to see an end to the agency. He's pushing for higher pay

for the inspectors and field personnel, and fewer employees in the Santa Fe division.

"Nothing makes me madder than the bureaucrats in Santa Fe getting all the money and not paying the people doing the job anything," said Hall.

He also has been asked to pursue more money for the Water Defense Association to pay attorney fees already incurred in the ongoing water dispute. Hall said the association owes more than \$140,000, of the more than \$400,000 in attorney fees incurred so far.

He said Capitan is asking for funds to redo the Lincoln County Fairground, and he'll assist Representative Richard Knowles in going for those funds.

Hall said he'll also try to get funds to continue remodeling buildings at Fort Stanton. He said the Health and Environment Division also is asking for \$700,000 for capital improvements at the hospital and training center.

Air Ruidoso moves base from SBRA

Sierra Blanca Regional Airport (SBRA) manager Tim Morris confirmed today (Monday) that Air Ruidoso is no longer operating at the regional facility.

Morris said the village sent a letter asking the company to conform to the operating rules and regulations and minimum standards adopted by the Village of Ruidoso, and Air Ruidoso president Helene McCoy notified him she was moving her base of operation.

Air Ruidoso has been the only airline offering scheduled service to SBRA.

Morris said McCoy told him her company will not operate at SBRA until next spring.

A lease agreement between the village and Air Ruidoso has been under negotiation for months, but, according to Morris, McCoy has never signed an agreement.

He said any operator will be required to operate by the same rules, regulations and minimum standards.


McCoy couldn't be reached for comment.

Downs trustees will consider equipment purchase from track

Mayor Jake Harris said the Village of Ruidoso Downs is working closely with the Ruidoso Downs Race Track on a proposal for purchasing dumpsters and a sanitation truck now owned by the track.

Harris made the announcement at the regular board of trustees meeting Monday. He said the proposal will be brought before the board when all of the facts and figures have been presented to him.

Fire Department Chief Mark Hazel thanked the village and village employees for their support

and help during the diesel spill that occurred at Triple Crown Condominiums. Hazel also thanked Junior Montano for bringing his blade down to open a road for the fire truck to enter.

The village clerk said \$68,634 previously transferred from a General Fund CD to the Infrastructure fund money market account has been transferred back to the General Fund. The resolution called for \$66,695.77 to be transferred.

Mayor Harris and the board discussed a letter written by Delbert Posey regarding his water bill. Posey said that he had a leak on his

side of the meter, but would like the board to consider an adjustment.

Discussion followed and it was determined that Posey should pay the bill, but that he could make payments on the full amount until paid.

The board adjourned into executive session. On their return, a motion was made to abolish the village position of shop supervisor. The position has been vacated and the board felt it was no longer needed. The motion carried unanimously.

Miller encourages voter interest in board election

The biggest issue facing Ruidoso Municipal Schools is economics, said school superintendent Sid Miller.

Maintaining progressive school programs and complying with New Mexico State Legislature directives in Senate Bill 106 challenge the school system's limited budget, Miller said during an interview Thursday.

SB 106 directives include lower pupil-teacher ratios and improved teacher salaries and benefits.

During the 1987-88 school year, Ruidoso teachers received no raise, school programs were cut and positions remained vacant because the actual student enrollment did not meet the administration's projection.

Since schools receive most state funds based on enrollment, the failure was economically disastrous for Ruidoso Schools.

However, the situation forced the school administration and board of education to review their programs and expectations.

Conservative enrollment projections were met for the 1988-89 school year, but there was no growth. The stagnant enrollment reflects the economic situation in the village, Miller said.

"The schools have such an impact on the village," Miller said. More than 200 employees bring home paychecks from the \$6.5 million district budget. The money cir-

culates within the village, thus increasing local private and public revenues.

Aside from economics, the schools impact the lives of 1,800 students and a big portion of the adult population of the village and surrounding area, Miller said.

Because of the economics and human impacts Miller hopes the voters will take interest in the February 7 board election.

Two positions are open on the board which makes final determination on fiscal activity (athletics and others) and academic programs. Board members Lynn Willard, in position four, and Rod Adamson, in position five, are seeking to maintain their seats. Candidates Wanda Lynn Moore, Katherine S. Travis and Eloy Candelaria are running for the position four slot. Bernita J. Deaton and Susan Marie Lutterman are candidates for position five.

The elected officials will sit on a board that is responsible for programs which affect the lives of the area children.

Academic and athletic programs were cut in the 1987-88 school year, but, because of good budgeting, Miller said there should be very few future cuts.

"I hate to see programs cut," Miller said.

Although few cuts are expected, the school will experience very little growth, said Miller.

He said current members recognize the need to raise teacher

salaries and to maintain existing programs. However, the no-growth situation existing now, makes the school dependent on the State Legislature.

During the 60-day legislative session which begins in Santa Fe Tuesday, Miller said representatives will address the difficulty for Ruidoso and other New Mexico schools of complying with the directives in SB 106, mainly because of the high cost of implementing the mandated school reforms.

Teachers' salaries also will be a high priority in the state, Miller said.

Faced with the problems of continuing programs within the limited budget, the voters should consider their choices to fill the positions on the board of education, Miller said.

"It's a very important thing to have the influence as to the choices (to the board positions)," Miller added.

This year's election is to fill the two four-year positions only. The mill levy question two years ago will not appear on the ballot until the next board election (in two years), Miller said.

Incumbent Willard ran unopposed in the last election, which Miller believes is an indication of voter satisfaction.

Whatever the outcome this election, Miller encourages all registered voters within the Ruidoso School District to cast ballots on Tuesday, February 7.

Ruidoso man's heart used in Hawaiian transplant operation

When Ruidoso resident James Bates died early New Year's Day he left a priceless gift to a Hawaiian man.

Bates, 32, died as the result of a motorcycle accident in Kahala, Hawaii, and his heart was used in a transplant operation on Thomas C.K. Chang, 42.

According to published reports provided by Beth Bates of Ruidoso, sister-in-law to James Bates, the New Mexico man suffered head injuries when the motorcycle he was a passenger on struck a car. He wasn't wearing a helmet.

Bates, who lived in Ruidoso for the past 10 years, was kept on a life support system until his organs could be transplanted.

The transplant recipient, Chang, is the fifth to undergo that operation in Hawaii. Chang, the father of five, was one of five people whose names were on a heart-transplant waiting list. The operation was performed at St. Francis Medical Center in Honolulu.

At last report Chang was reported in stable condition, and was expected to be released from the hospital within three weeks.

Before the transplant, Chang's condition was

such that his activities had been severely restricted for years. He couldn't lie flat on his back because it caused breathing problems, according to Dr. Judson McNamara, the surgeon who performed the three-and-a-half hour operation.

Chang had his first heart attack in 1978. "The first thing he'll want to do is go fishing when he gets well enough," his wife was quoted as saying.

The heart transplant didn't surprise the Bates family in Alamogordo. One family member said Bates had indicated an interest in becoming a donor, but she didn't know if he ever signed the donor card. His sister, Ruth Bates, reportedly said he had talked to an aunt about a donor card, and had indicated his intent to do that paperwork.

"He's been riding motorcycles for years, but he never wore a helmet," said Ruth Bates.

The victim's sister said he never expected to get hurt, but she is sure he would have wanted someone to have the benefit of his healthy heart.

"He was in wonderful physical shape; someone was lucky to get his heart," said Ruth Bates.

Mescalero woman is arrested

A Mescalero woman has been charged with not returning a leased vehicle, according to Lincoln County Sheriff's Deputy Jim Rethmel.

Christine Breuninger was arrested on a Lincoln County warrant by the Tularosa Police Department

Thursday and is in the Lincoln County Jail, said Rethmel early today (Monday).

Breuninger allegedly rented a car from Avis Rental at Sierra Blanca Regional Airport on November 23, and failed to return the vehicle, Rethmel said.

Lincoln County Commission adopts road priorities list

Meeting briefly after an all-day workshop session, the Lincoln County Commissioners approved the road priority list for New Mexico State Highway Department (NMSHD) road programs Wednesday.

Commissioners named the school bus route in Maggado Creek Estates as the first priority and Alamo Canyon Road in the Hondo area as second priority to the School Bus Route program. The project is 100 percent funded by the state.

Schlarb Road near Carrizozo was named as first priority and BO 23, west of Baca Campsite as second priority on the County Arterial Program (CAP). The county is responsible for 25 percent and the state will provide 75 percent of the

total cost.

Commissioners approved Bridge BO 21 in Hondo as first priority and 17th Street in the Carrizozo area second on the Coop program. The county will provide 40 percent and the state will provide 60 percent of the total cost of the projects in that program.

Commissioner Karon Petty wants it "made clear" she does not want the priorities changed by NMSHD.

Commissioners Petty and Rick Simpson spent seven hours touring roads and bridges Tuesday with county road supervisor Tommy Hall.

Although most county roads are in good shape, Petty said the Maggado Creek Estates road appeared to be the most dangerous during inclement weather. Commissioners also toured Alamo Canyon Road,

which also was considered for the School Bus Route program.

Simpson said the Alamo Canyon road was rough in spots, but has a good base. He also considered Maggado Creek Estates Road in more need of improvement.

All agreed Bridge BO 21 is in extremely bad condition and Petty requested county manager Suzanne Cox search for emergency funds to repair the bridge before the coop program is considered by the state.

Cox said no emergency funds are available except through the road programs.

Commissioners complimented the newly-constructed county bridge in Glencoe. Petty requested the old bridge be totally fenced as agreed.

The county engineer will make reports about each priority for state consideration.

Lincoln County project nets state award for Texas Tech students

A Lincoln County project resulted in a Take Pride in America/Take Pride in New Mexico award for Texas Tech University in Lubbock, Texas.

The Department of Park Administration and Landscape Architecture was named in an award presented by Governor Garrey Carruthers at the second annual Governor's Community Achievement Award Program Friday in Santa Fe.

The second-place award, received by Chairman Tom Musiak of the Texas Tech faculty, was for a site analysis and field guide of the Fort Stanton Recreation Site. The work was performed by students enrolled in a special problems course in the department who have since graduated from the university.

The "Site Analysis, Design and Master Plan: Fort Stanton Recreation Site, Lincoln County, New Mexico" and the "Fort Stanton Field Guide" were prepared by students under the supervision of James W. Kitchen, professor of park administration and landscape architecture.

Kitchen said the special problems course gives students a chance

to apply their classroom knowledge to real-world work situations.

"Students become familiar with the park planning process by working on a specific site and with a natural resource agency," he said. "They also learn about the limitations and capabilities of the Bureau of Land Management to implement the developed plan."

Kitchen said the students produced very detailed and comprehensive documents. The contents range from development goals and existing conditions to endangered species and vandalism of the area.

Students on the planning team were: Don Horton of Haskell, Texas, a 1986 graduate of park administration; Michael Bilbo of El Paso, Texas, a 1987 graduate of landscape architecture; John McDaniel of Center, Texas, a 1988 graduate of landscape architecture; and Cynthia Baxter of Seabrook, Texas, a 1986 graduate in recreation.

fic is very qualified.

He discussed the recent mandated property reappraisals to 1980 market values, which resulted in disparities in valuations. The market value approach to property taxes is established in the local offices with help from Santa Fe. The Yield Control Law, a mathematical process which sets mill rates for counties, allows county budgets to increase by a maximum of five percent, Del Curto said. The five percent limit does not apply to property tax increases, a popular misconception, he said.

"Often, high increases occur when properties were undervalued when the assessor's office caught up with the problem," he said.

However, voters and government entities have the last word on how high property taxes are, he said. Julia (Samora, assessor) doesn't set taxes," Del Curto concluded.

The New Mexico State Highway Department, represented by Doug Ditto, district maintenance engineer, sponsors road programs available to counties: Cooperative (Co-op) Agreements, County Arterial Programs (CAP) and School Bus Routes. He said \$64,620 is available to Lincoln County for the Co-op Agreement Program, \$53,611 for the School Bus Routes program and \$135,741 for the CAP. Funding for the first two projects is established by a percentage of the total district project funding shared by eight counties in the district.

The CAP program is funded by mileage of maintained county roads.

Barak Wolfe of the state Health and Environment Office, Dr. Walter Hopkins director of Lincoln County Emergency Medical Services (EMS) and Jim Stover of the Ruidoso EMS discussed the excellent services developed in Lincoln County because of Cox's interest in health care for the vast rural area.

Wolfe also discussed the county health clinics in Carrizozo and Corona. The physicians assistants (PA) controversy, which restricts PAs from prescribing drugs and threatens to close rural health clinics, will be considered by the New Mexico State Legislature, Wolfe said.

The controversy affects Ernie Gonzales, PA in the Carrizozo and Corona Health Clinics, supported by Lincoln County.

Wolfe also expounded on the "exceptional arrangement" of the "cadre" of 60 licensed Emergency Medical Technicians in Lincoln County, as the "best organized in the state."

Hopkins told of the Lincoln County EMS program which grew from a single station wagon with help from passersby (in case of an accident) to the outstanding, award-winning program with five volunteer and one paid ambulance services.

"This (volunteer) ambulance service runs on my license," Hopkins said. Because of this, Hopkins monitors all ambulance calls and grades all EMS reports.

"Through Suzanne (Cox) we have one of the best systems (EMS) in New Mexico," he said. EMS coordinator and advance life support person Nancy Guck also was praised.

"Thank God you live in Lincoln

County and the EMS system which will save your life someday," Hopkins concluded.

Stover explained the Ruidoso EMS and its support and cooperation with county EMS, which led to the "victory" of winning the Service System Excellence Award.

Other health and safety related agencies represented were Lincoln County Medical Center (LCMC), Fort Stanton Training School and Hospital and Department of Public Safety.

LCMC director Steve Keller said the commissioners were responsible for the remodeling project at LCMC, which will result in an excellent small health care facility.

LCMC has 105 employees and Carrizozo Health Clinic has five employees. LCMC is part of the Southwest Community Health Services associated with Presbyterian Hospital in Albuquerque.

"Health care is expensive," Keller said. Of the \$5,250,000 annual LCMC budget, half is lost to charities and discounts. Keller said that is one of the better incomes in the state.

"We don't turn anyone away for emergency health care," Keller said.

He listed the programs LCMC supports: disaster drills, Lifeline for elderly and other frail individuals, Meals on Wheels, diabetic instruction and work with local law enforcement officials.

He highly praised the volunteer efforts and financial support of the LCMC Auxiliary, the "Pink People," as the most successful program of its size in the state.

Dr. Dale Goad, dentist in the county health clinic in Carrizozo, said he offers dental care with

"state-of-the-art" equipment, with services charged on a sliding scale.

Marcia Miller representing Fort Stanton Hospital read a letter from Administrator Ervin Aldaz addressed to the commissioners.

He expressed his appreciation of county support in the past and requested continued support to maintain the facility at Fort Stanton. Miller also read a fact sheet about the facility, including agreements with Lincoln County for a sanitary landfill, animal control, fire department, EMT and ambulance services.

Sam Larcombe and Phil Cordova from the Department of Public Safety listed the state requirements for dealing with hazardous materials, search and rescue exercises, education and training for disasters. The men reviewed the process for disaster declarations in case of natural or man-made disasters.

Emergency preparedness plans, drawn by county governments, will protect those entities from possible litigation, Cordova said.

Public awareness and emergency information training programs are being initiated by the department also.

William Vigil, deputy director of the New Mexico State Area Agency on Aging, said the goal is to improve the quality of life for New Mexico seniors through local senior citizens centers.

Lincoln County supports the Zia Senior Citizens Centers which have three satellite branches: Carrizozo, Capitan and Corona.

Transportation takes a large amount of the agency budget, which is financed with federal funds. Vigil said ten years ago,

however, the purpose of the senior centers was to take the elderly out of their isolation. Nutrition programs were added, and now senior adult care centers are being included in the programs.

"We deal with the whole issue of adult services," Vigil said.

The use of mini-vans for senior transportation began in Lincoln County and was not well received by state legislators. However, Vigil said Lincoln County senior director Barbara Ward's insistence on using the mini-vans, because of the fuel savings, was accepted and is becoming the norm in other county senior programs.

Other agency representatives involved in the county workshop were Department of Public Safety Director Howard Graff, District Attorney Bert Atkins, county auditor Donald Wingfield, Lincoln National Forest District Ranger Jerry Hawkes, Howard Shanks from the Soil Conservation Service, Larry Bandy from the New Mexico State Forestry Department and Mike

Hofacketi of Triadic Enterprises Inc. a computer firm which maintains the county computer systems.

Hofacketi praised Cox for computerizing Lincoln County offices in 1982, one of the first counties in New Mexico to do so.

Don Scott of Radio Communications Company briefly explained the county radio systems.

Barry Herd, Lincoln County extension agent concluded the workshop with an explanation of his office's role in educating citizens on many different subjects through the Extension Service at New Mexico State University.

He introduced 4-H agent Sid Gordon and home economist Betty McCreight.

"We are one of the best deals Lincoln County has," Herd concluded.

All workshop participants were treated to a Lincoln County courthouse tradition started by former commissioner Bill Elliott, the potluck luncheon.

NMSU program offered teachers

New Mexico State University's Graduate Intern/Teacher Exchange Program is actively recruiting students who will be first-year teachers next year.

According to Neldea Slate, program coordinator and curriculum and instruction professor at NMSU, there are 20-25 slots to be filled. Graduates must be certified to teach in New Mexico.

Students interested in teaching in the Alamogordo, Deming, Truth or Consequences, Hatch or Gadsden areas are especially encouraged to apply. Students desiring placement in the Las Cruces Public Schools

also are eligible.

The program takes new college graduates regarded as promising teachers, places them full-time in public school classrooms, and gives them constant support from experienced teachers.

Beginning teachers can earn a master's degree in 14 months while they teach and go through the intern program. Participants can take graduate classes part time throughout the school year and during two summers, tuition-free. During that year, participants can earn half the salary of a beginning teacher.

NMSU's College of Education in-

stituted the innovative program to combat the drop-out rate in the teaching profession, Slate said. Recent studies show a high teacher drop-out rate: 40 percent leave within seven years, while 15 percent leave after the first year and six percent turn over annually.

For many, Slate said, the first years prove so difficult that many talented beginners give up.

By providing these promising beginners more professional support, NMSU educators say it is likely more will stay in the classroom.

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

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

Artesia Bulldogs take big bite of Warriors

The high-ranking Artesia Bulldogs bulldozed the Ruidoso Warriors in the flatlands last Friday 113-81.

Artesia, ranked fourth in the state in some Class AAA polls had a particularly hot hand the first half, scoring 74 points.

The second half was another story with the Warriors and Bulldogs scoring 39 points each.

The Warriors' heavy scoring attack was an amazing feat considering the number of turnovers and weak rebounding that left them on the short end of the stick in number of shots attempted.

Warrior head coach Dean Hood was optimistic in spite of the loss because the team made progress in several key areas of development.

"The first half was an interesting half," Hood said. "We worked a small man lineup and scored 42 points the first half, but we couldn't contain them defensively. We started our big men the second half and scored 39 points, but we were able to hold them to 39 points."

"Hopefully, we have sorted out several details that needed attending. There were positive signs in the second half that showed where we want to be."

"The intensity that we created in the ball game last night will hopefully carry over to other games and begin to put us in better rebound

position. I thought last night we found ourselves in better rebounding position than anytime so far this year, even though we didn't pull down as many as we should have."

"Artesia had three big men with good height and sturdy. Javier Valenzuela was very powerful underneath. And he could make those shots off the glass anywhere he wanted to."

"Valenzuela and Kullen Burk were as good as any big men we have played against."

"I don't believe we will see the quickness that we have seen in Artesia and Lovington. If we can make our press halfway effective against Artesia and Lovington, I'm hoping we make it very effective when we enter district play."

"Socorro is big and stout. We will probably have to play a half court game with them."

"We've played some tough games. It has been difficult to establish consistency. After last night, I feel very positive. We worked together, you could see it materialize on the court. What we gave up was in the first half. It wasn't that we didn't score, we just gave up too many points."

"I don't think with the lineup we had in the first half I could have played a zone or man-to-man effectively. Burk and Valenzuela were just too big inside."

"I'm not sure the press hurt us

the first half, it definitely didn't help us a whole lot, except for learning rotation and how to execute."

Hood summed up the positive factors of Friday's game.

"We had team work, we had intensity and we had togetherness on the floor which we have not had. If we can carry that into tonight's ball game (New Mexico Military Institute) and build on those attributes, we will be in good shape when we enter district next week. Things have to come together and now is the time. Last night we saw the togetherness that had been lacking. We had team work."

Several Warriors had fine games. Chris Long, Eric Eggleston and Cody Willard were all in the double figures. Willard led the pack with 17 points.

Rickey Brazell and Mashon Swenor came off the bench to play some of their best basketball of the season, according to Hood.

Hood praised Logan Stirman for his defensive efforts in blocking out his man for rebounds.

Hood said rebounding has been a big problem for the Warriors all season and one he continues to work on.

"Some players are not as physical as others," he said. "Stirman is one of the few players we have who works very hard for position."

Hood was hopeful other players would follow Stirman's type of ag-

gression in jockeying for position.

Balance sports & books, says Miller

School board elections are right around the corner and the unusually high number of worthy opponents will have to present a platform of change if they are to oust any incumbent.

A central issue appears to be sports, academics and the degree to which each is to be supported economically.

The Ruidoso School Board is, apparently, proud of its record in both areas, although the balancing act to sustain quality in each, according to school superintendent Sid Miller,

is a long, arduous and difficult task.

Miller summarized this school board's present position and past efforts.

"As a small 3-A school, small within the district as well as statewide, we have performed well," said Miller.

"We recognize we still have a long way to go and many things have to be done, but the board and administration have supported the athletic program as well as academics."

Miller said the school's current program is much better than in

past years. He credited "hiring good people and ... applying some funds in the right places" as two reasons for the increased proficiency.

Miller said the board is equally concerned about how Ruidoso plays the game.

"We have increased our winnings," Miller said. "And we feel like we've hired people that will really help our students not just in win-loss, but in counseling and providing a proper work ethic. I especially like the philosophy of our athletic director."

"The board itself is committed to balancing academics and athletics

in quality," said Miller. "There was a time when we were known only for our grades. During that time we lacked a top-notch sports program. The board set out to improve our sports program without sacrificing our academic standards. I think that has been accomplished."

Miller indicated the road to excellence has suffered a few detours from hard times.

"During today's economic times, particularly Ruidoso, we have had to reduce staff in some cases," Miller said. "We had to curb salaries and increments for coaches and other activity people. This is some-

times a detriment, but necessary because of the area's economic climate.

"In reducing staff and maintaining economic stability, we may inadvertently hurt a program in athletics or academics," Miller said.

Miller explained the delicate role of the board in Ruidoso's future.

"The board still has to work at balancing the program in these hard economic times."

"If we can achieve a balance, we still have a hard road ahead of us," he said.

"We have to be very careful not to cut key areas academically. For instance, we reduced the staff at the high school level because we felt the overall teacher-pupil ratio was relatively low at the high school."

"In reducing staff, we had to alter programs. We altered sports and the teaching curriculum as well."

"But the board is committed to keeping a good athletic program moving forward. Hopefully, we can increase it."

Warrior 'grunt and groaners' are tripped by Oñate matmen

The Ruidoso Warriors wrestlers thrilled the hometown crowd and were within an inch of tying the Oñate Knights in the final match last Thursday, before falling by two matches 44-32.

Warrior head coach Gerald Ames nervously paced the floor and occasionally broke out in a broad smile as he could not mask his delight over the success of his Warriors.

The evening was filled with good sports stories and no fan left the match feeling empty.

Alfred Rue, a first-year wrestler, had never won a match. He pinned his opponent to the wild cheers of the crowd. His teammates enthusiastically bear hugged Rue who was flailing his arms in happiness.

The loudest cheers were reserved for Bubba Lane, returning state champion. It was Lane's first match since his pre-season injury. He wasted no time, pinning his opponent in 15 seconds.

The pressure of the night was on the shoulders of McCabe Turner, a first-year wrestler with great power. Turner needed to pin his man to tie the match.

Turner started the match aggressively. He dove for his opponents legs and forced him to his back. With sheer power, he maneuvered the wrestler into a pinning position and then began to

apply his weight for the kill. In a sudden turn of events, a mental error reversed the role. Turner's feet left the floor and it was Oñate closing for the pin.

"With more experience," Ames said. "Turner would have finished that kid off. As it is, McCabe has good power and is improving every game."

Ames said the turning point for the Warriors occurred when Jesse Guardiola lost.

"We all knew Jesse was better than this kid," said Ames. "But Jesse was gasping early out there and that's not Jesse. We want to check him out to make sure he has no hidden illness."

James Atwood started the evening with a fast pin of his opponent in the 103-pound division.

"Atwood has the type of aggression I love at that weight," said Ames. "He killed the kid."

Henry Kayitah wrestled Jason Garcia.

"Henry did a good job. He ended up with a tie, but it should have been a win. Henry was doing all the work, having things his way when he tried to cradle and took him the wrong way. Henry's hands broke and that cost him four points. Henry then had to work hard for the tie."

Nerando Lopez wrestled Albert Chavez.

"I thought Fernando was really winning the match. He took Chavez down and looked very good. Then

Chavez forearmed Lopez and that changed the match. Lopez gained a penalty point because of the illegal blow, but he never quite recovered."

Chris Salas, fairly new to the program, wrestled Robert Galaz into the third period before he was pinned.

"I thought it was a good match for Chris," said Ames. "He worked hard the whole match."

Mario Portillo overpowered Ruben Alba in his match, pinning Alba in 47 seconds.

"Mario needs more work on his technique," said Ames. "Right now he is too dependent on his strength."

Nick Herrera, newest member of the wrestling squad, ran into a buzz saw named Paul Perez, an experienced wrestler.

"Nick is only three weeks into our program and I thought he did a good job. Nick caught a knee to his nose and that would affect anybody. The varsity is a hard place to gain your experience."

Alfred Rue pinned Chris Sinneros, a senior, in 1:35 for his first win ever.

"Alfred finally put it together," said Ames. "He should have won at least four matches by now, but you have to develop that confidence before you can win. We're all very happy for him."

"Sometimes you like to have all winners, some guy that's 46-0. But there is as much joy in a kid winning one match, his only match of

the year, than there is in a wrestler who's a state champion."

Albert Flores wrestled in a forfeited match at 145 pounds.

"I'm having trouble finding a 145-pounder," said Ames. "I hate forfeits. We have several students working at that weight right now, but no one is ready."

At 152 pounds, Chad Anover wrestled Oñate's best wrestler, David Rivera, the Bowie tournament winner.

Anover has just joined the program and, although he has wrestled before, is not in his wrestling shape at this time," said Ames. "Chad was pinned in the first period, but wrestled quite well

and will show improvement later on."

"Bubba Lane, at 162 pounds, looked good for a first match," said Ames. "He knows what he's doing and you can see the class wrestling we're capable of producing if enough wrestlers get to that point."

"Jesse Guardiola wrestled well. I thought we were going to kill the guy. Jesse began his domination when all of a sudden Jesse ran out of gas. That's not typical of Guardiola. We have to examine the situation more to see what might be the cause."

"At 189 pounds, David Stephenson surprised us. He pinned Lorenzo Martinez who just

last week put Stephenson out of the tournament in El Paso.

"David just keeps getting better and keeps surprising us. He works as hard as anybody and is really coming along."

"Heavyweight McCabe Turner made one little mistake and it cost him," said Ames. "McCabe was pinned with seven seconds on the clock before the period ended. I know if we could have made it to the next period, McCabe would have beaten him."

"This was the best match we have wrestled as a team," said Ames. "We should remember two of our best wrestlers, Pete Baco and Eric Collins, were out with injury."

 This is being written on January fourteen and will reach you on January sixteen, the birthday of Martin Luther King Jr. On this bright sunny day with the sun shining from a blue sky and the silver white patches of snow glistening on the golden Mountain Meadows, the American flag floating in a breeze out of the South - I am remembering back to the day in Denver, Colorado, when two little black boys came into the yard of Grandpa and Grandpa Kennedy.
 I was four years old and had just come down from my birthplace of Valdez, Alaska. These were the first people of African descent I had ever seen and I asked Grandpa Kennedy why they were black and

Grandpa said:
 "Danny these are little colored boys."
 I took Grandpa to mean that they were boys of all colors in the neighborhood and I asked:
 "Are there more colored boys beside these?" and Grandpa said:
 "Oh, many more of them. You must always be kind to them Danny."
 After this I began expecting to see children colored green, blue and other colors.
 Grandpa John Calvin Kennedy was a captain in the Thirteenth Illinois Cavalry in the Civil War and later Adjutant General of the State of Colorado. He was widely beloved and admired. His Christian nature had a profound effect upon me as a child. He taught me a little prayer:

"God bless me. Keep me from evil. Make me a good man." Then he would lead me in blessing all the members of the family by name.
 I dearly loved Grandpa, and his spirit has been a guiding force all my life. His message to be kind to the colored boys set a pattern of respect for all races in my nature.
 During my lifetime I have seen race prejudice fade away, and I am happy to live in a state where all races live in happiness together.
 On the Birthday of Martin Luther King let us send up a prayer that his dream will come true and that Mankind will live in true brotherhood under the fatherhood of God.

 On the eleventh it was like a summer day with the little weeds and herbs showing green amid the winter grass. The West wind had been blowing down the vale all day drying up the land.
 The late that evening the temperature dropped from about sixty to twenty-five, and here came a gray cloud charging out of the north, and in no time at all you were in a blizzard with tiny frozen

mist drifting all through the Vale. The little mist balls grew larger and then were joined by small snow flakes.

stakes at Ruidoso Downs in the coming 1989 racing season.

According to information provided by Ruidoso Downs Racing, Inc., newly graded with a Grade III ranking will be the Mr. Jet Moore Allowance Stake, Go Together Handicap and Ruidoso 550 Championship Handicap.

The Mr. Jet Moore Allowance State-Grade III is for four-year-olds and older going 400 yards and runs Saturday, May 13. It carries a purse of \$20,000—half from Ruidoso Downs Racing and half from the Quarter Horse Breeders' Classic awards.

The Go Together Handicap-Grade III is for fillies and mares three-year-olds and older going 350 yards and runs Sunday, May 21. It carries a purse of \$20,000, half from the Ruidoso Downs Racing and half from the Quarter Horse Breeders' Classic awards.

The Ruidoso 550 Championship Handicap-Grade III is for three-year-olds and older going 550 yards

and runs Monday, September 1. It carries a purse of \$15,000, \$10,000 from Ruidoso Downs Racing, Inc., and \$5,000 from the Quarter Horse Breeders' Classic awards.

Nominations for the three races will close at noon Tuesday, May 9; Tuesday, May 16 and Wednesday, August 29. Cost to nominate is \$75 and he cost to enter is \$150 for each of the three races.

Nominations are up for thoroughbred futurities

Nominations for this year's four thoroughbred futurities have surpassed expectations, according to a news release provided by Ruidoso

Downs Racing, Inc.

Overall, the Norgor, Kachina, Rio Grande Double and Ruidoso Thoroughbred futurities are up a total of 8.45 percent with the highest being the Norgor Futurity which is up 31.82 percent.

Nominators for the Rio Grande Double are eligible for two futurities—the Rio Grande Kindergarten Futurity and The Rio Grande Futurity. Each race is worth an estimated \$50,000, and entries are restricted to New Mexi-

co-breds.

The Kindergarten will run on Saturday, June 3, going five furlongs. A sustaining payment of \$300 is due March 1, and the trials are \$500 to enter.

The Rio Grande will run Sunday, August 6, going six furlongs. A sustaining payment of \$300 is due March 15, and the trials are \$500 to enter. Both races have a late supplemental payment of \$2,500 due the day of entry for the trials. Horsemen who wish to pass the Kindergarten Futurity must make an additional \$100 payment to remain eligible for the Rio Grande Futurity.

The Ruidoso Thoroughbred Futurity, worth an estimated \$140,000, will run Saturday, September 2, going six furlongs. A sustaining payment of \$350 is due April 1, and the trials are \$500 to enter. A late supplemental payment of \$10,000 is due the day of entry for the trials.


Puckett also introduced guests Colly Parks, formerly of Ruidoso Fire Department, and retired member C.R. Patterson.

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
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EDITORIAL

People are still hungry.

Lincoln County residents responded with great generosity to pleas for food and cash to feed the needy at Thanksgiving and Christmas. Those food baskets were packed and delivered, leaving those who contributed feeling warm and good inside.

That food was prepared and eaten, and some of those families are right back where they started hungry.

Cupboards at the Lincoln County Food Bank are looking a little bare these days, according to the board president Charlie Reich. He said the Food Bank, a non-profit group, took part in the holiday food drive, using \$900 from the treasury.

While the people of the area continue to support the Food Bank with donations of cash and food, the need seems to be growing, and the board has been spending from \$200 to \$400 a month to keep the pantry stocked with staple food items. The Food Bank still has a little money in the bank, but that cushion won't last long.

The Lincoln County Food Bank provides food for people with emergency needs when a paycheck doesn't come, in case of family illness or some other unexpected financial problem. Clients are required to make application for food stamps, since the Food Bank doesn't have the resources to provide long-term aid.

But it can take several weeks to receive Food Stamps, even when the need is great.

So, let's not forget that the needs of the less fortunate continue all through the year.-fj

State and county offices, as well as banks, will be closed. And, that's OK with me, too.

The surprising thing for me is that the name of Martin Luther King, a man who holds a special place in my heart for his love and dedication to his people, can still raise the hackles of some people. I just don't understand it.

But Monday, when the Lincoln County Commission met in Carizozo, the most heated comments of the entire meeting had to do with adopting a holiday calendar that starts with Martin Luther King Day today (Monday), January 16.

The commission heard complaints from one citizen, angered by moving Lincoln's and Washington's birthday celebrations, but leaving "M.L. King Day" for the official day. Maybe she was just voicing a patriotic concern for the memories of those two presidents. I don't know.

I do know that I, a West Texan redneck, have the deepest respect for Martin Luther King. That doesn't add up, really. People in Lubbock used to be really prejudiced.

But I had something that my little Lubbock friends didn't have—an Indian grandmother. I think that made all the difference in my feelings toward the poor and the dispossessed.

My grandmother, Joe Jessie Mahota Love Culwell, was born in 1883 in Indian Territory. She was a member of the Chickasaw Nation, and through her registration number, so am I. My children and I, through our certificates of degree of Indian blood (CDIB) are "card-carrying" members of the Chickasaw Indian Tribe.

Granny, always proud to be an Indian, talked of the days when having a drop of Indian blood was looked on as a matter of shame. That was never so for my grandmother and my mother.

Our heritage, as a minority race, was a topic for dinner table conversation. The history of the five civilized tribes, the Trail of Tears, the Dawes Circuit Court and more.

According to some histories, getting a job hasn't always been easy for Indians.

And so, on Martin Luther King Day, I'll be working ... and thinking of how far all minorities have come.

Texans are about the friendliest people in the world, and I attribute that Texas influence to the cheerful and outgoing attitude in Ruidoso. I know you New Mexico natives might not like to hear that, but if you don't believe it, just go to a restaurant or mall in Albuquerque, where the Texas influence isn't so prevalent.

As much as I love Ruidoso, sometimes I'm especially proud to be a Texan.

Like the other night, I overheard sports editor Chuck Stallings questioning some sports guy about something during a late-night telephone interview. It was just background.

And then Stallings, who just happens to be a Hoosier, asked: "Are you from Texas?"

He had my attention. I was seriously eavesdropping then.

"No?" continued Stallings, with surprise in his voice. "It's unusual to hear someone (besides Texans) say 'yes sir' and 'no sir,'" said Chuck to the unusually polite Roswell native he was interviewing.

Texans are pretty nice folks. Stallings, who came to Ruidoso by way of Florida, said you'd never be addressed that way in Miami.

Apparently, the same is true in California. For my San Francisco daughter, in Lubbock for Christmas, said she was looking forward to a visit to a Texas mall where the sales clerks are so friendly and helpful.

As a matter of fact, while making a small purchase in one South Plains Mall shop on Christmas Eve, I struck up a conversation with the young woman at the cash register. A Texas Tech student, majoring in psychology, my new friend was deciding where to go skiing this Christmas.

You can bet I jumped on that one, and told her Ski Apache is the only choice. I gave her my phone number in case she needs any help or information when she visits Ruidoso.

"Who was that?" asked my daughter when she arrived at the end of our conversation. "It sounded like you were old friends."

That wouldn't happen when shopping in San Francisco ... or Miami ... or New York. But it could easily happen in

Ruidoso.

My best friend is working weekends in a T-Shirt shop, and tells me about the people she meets. By the time some of her customers leave the shop they've discovered mutual friends and relatives from all over Texas. (Let's face it, most of her customers are from Texas.) She is, too.

"It's fun," she says, noting that moonlighting and long hours are OK when you're having fun. I guess friendly workers make

for friendlier customers, and that makes for better business.

On the flip side, Beth and I were the only customers in a local shop last Sunday, and still had trouble getting the clerk to answer a question about an item for sale. We didn't find out what we wanted to know, and left without buying anything. I guess we didn't need it anyway.

I told Beth, "I'll bet that guy is from Miami."
