Super Select, All American horse sales join forces


Ruidoso Horse Sales Company is a new joint venture for two area horse sales companies.

R. D. Hubbard, president and chief executive officer of Ruidoso Downs Racing, Inc., parent company of the All American Sales Company, and Richard Thompson, president and general manager of the Ruidoso Super Select Sale Company, announced Friday the joint venture of their two sales companies.

Ruidoso Horse Sales Company, with Thompson as general manager, will conduct sales at the Ruidoso Super Select Track pavilion 12 miles east of Ruidoso Downs Race Track on U.S. Highway 70.

"This venture should help strengthen our position in the horse

USFS will expand recreation areas

A group camping area planned in the Cedar Creek area will expand the facilities to form a recreational complex just a short drive from the heart of Ruidoso.

United States Forest Service (USFS) Lincoln Forest Supervisor James R. Abbott announced his plans recently to construct the group campground along Cedar Creek. The need for more such facilities was identified in the 1970s, and the concept has been a part of the Forest Plan ever since.

Three large camping units for group gatherings are planned to complement the existing forest service day-use facilities at Cedar Creek. The new 10-acre area will enhance the heavily-used facilities already available, and provide a full range of outdoor recreation opportunities in the Ruidoso area.

Sam Tobias and Richard Carlson of the USFS are working on the

project, and the two are enthusiastic about their project.

Carlson, a landscape architect, said the area has been through two or three concepts before the one he is working on now was developed. It includes three separate areas, each with spaces for parking vehicles and recreational vehicles or campers. The entire area will provide 44 car parking spaces, 19 trailer or RV spaces, three pavilions, four toilets, picnic tables and group campfire rings.

Each unit will have a fire ring with benches and a flat area with some tables and a log pavilion. Each will provide at least one section with complete handicapped access.

Located on Cedar Creek Road, midway between the day-use picnic area and the county garbage bin, the new group camping complex will carry out the rustic theme of

Governors' group gathers here

Issues and recommendations to be on the agenda for the Seventh International Conference of Border Governors-Mexico-U.S. were studied last week when that group's executive committee met in Ruidoso at the Swiss Chalet.

"We only have one chance every 12 years with two new presidents," said Marcos Martinez, representative of Governor Eliseo Mendoza of Coahuila, Mexico. Governor Mendoza was the only elected official at the conference that draws its membership from six Mexican and

four United States border states.

All of the nine members sent representatives to prepare for the official border conference February 16, in Saltillo, Coahuila. Members of the border group, besides New Mexico, are California, Arizona, Texas, Baja California, Sonora, Chihuahua, Coahuila, Nueva Leon and Tamaulipas.

Advisers at the meeting representing the United States government were John St. John, director of Mexican Affairs and Ambassador Walter Astie.

"We're here to get the final statement of this final conference which

is going to be address to the two new presidents," said Martinez.

He said the group has met four times since December 1987, with the number of issues to be ad-

ressed numbering 89 at that first meeting. He said committees have been working to pare that list down

Coahuila governor leaves via SBRA

When Governor Eliseo Mendoza of Coahuila, Mexico, told a Roswell reporter he wouldn't land in Ruidoso, it was before he learned about Sierra Blanca Regional Airport.

Mendoza, in the area for the executive committee meeting of the Seventh International Conference of Border Governors, landed in Roswell Wednesday, and was quoted as saying he wouldn't land at the Ruidoso airport.

At the Swiss Chalet Thurs-

day, Mendoza said he didn't know of the state-of-the-art airport on Fort Stanton Mesa. He said he'd heard only of the old municipal airport that was called the most dangerous in the Southwest.

And Friday, Mendoza had his pilot move his large jet to SBRA. Mendoza and his group left from SBRA Friday, and according to airport representatives he was impressed with the regional air facility.

to three that were identified from the seven main areas of concern. "Each state made one recommendation," said Martinez, who said the final three major issues being address are individual development including the financing of infra-structure needs; environmental, including the quality of water in the Rio Grande and the disposal of waste; and international ports of entry, with the 10 states working together on a 12-year plan for the ports. Martinez said the group intends to make a difference at the work level, by promoting the entire bor-


der area. He said governors and their representatives are working for more jobs and more investments along the border. Governor Garrey Carruthers wasn't at the Ruidoso meeting, but was represented by Russell Autrey. Carruthers was in Washington, D.C. attending inaugural activities, but, according to his press aide, Carruthers will attend the conference in February in Mexico. The Ruidoso meeting drew about 70 people. Besides time spent in meetings and meals at the Swiss Chalet, the representatives took time to drive around Ruidoso and the surrounding area during the short meeting.

The leg circular table, resistive circular motion that improves circulation in the lower body while it slims the inner and outer thighs.

sales industry, and it will be great for both buyers and consignor alike," said Hubbard. "For the first time all the horses will be in one place and the sale companies won't be competing for sale dates and times," he added.

"This site appears to be less congested than near the race track, and it doesn't rain as much as in Ruidoso, which is important when you are trying to show your yearlings," said Thompson. "In addition, Mr. Hubbard and I both feel there will be a considerable cost savings in regards to duplication of efforts on sales catalogs, postage, advertising, travel and personnel," he added.

Lowel Neumayer, director of sales for All American Sales Company, will now be director of the horse selection committee for Ruidoso Horse Sales Company.

"At present, we will conduct yearling quarter horse and thoroughbred sales, but we also have plans for breeding stock sales in the future," said Neumayer.

Sales, pending approval of the dates, are set for the last week of July for thoroughbreds and August 23-26 for quarter horses, according to a news release provided by Ruidoso Downs Racing, Inc.

The format for quarter horse sales will change because of the new organization, with the All American session on Wednesday through Friday, August 23-25, and the super select session on Saturday, August 26. The super select will be limited to approximately 100 quarter horse yearlings selected by the horse selection committee.

Deadlines for consigning yearlings to the super select session will be March 15, and to the All Amer-

ican session May 15. Yearlings not accepted for the super select session will automatically be accepted for the All American session without re-application.

The All American Sale pavilion, located at Ruidoso Downs Race Track, will now house the new racing, stewards and New Mexico Racing Commission offices. A new track kitchen will also be installed.

"The new area will be great for our personnel and our horsemen as well," said H. Rick Henson, general manager of Ruidoso Downs. "It will replace old outdated facilities and will be a part of our overall effort to improve horsemen and employee relations."

Ruidoso Warriors lady cagers drop two to top two

'Miller-less' Warriors hang tough

For the second night in a row the Ruidoso Warriors girls hoopsters played a top-ranked team in the state, losing to the tall Oñate Knights in a hard-fought game 54-40.

Tara Miller, scoring ace for the Warriors with a 20-point game average, did not play because of an ankle injury incurred during the Socorro game.

Warrior head coach Jody Hopkins was proud of the much smaller Warriors.

"We played our game tonight with great enthusiasm," she said. "We didn't have Tara, but it was very gratifying to see the team pull together and put forth such a balanced effort defensively and offensively. I'm very proud of tonight's effort. I think it proved a lot to the girls."

Oñate, like Socorro, is ranked within the top five in New Mexico girls basketball. The team's leading shooter is 6-2 and there are two other girls on the team that are taller.

Even at the imbalance of height, the Warriors were able to grab an equal share of the boards because of their skill in blocking out the opponent.

The first quarter ended with a one-point edge by Oñate 10-9. The hot and cold Warriors were hitting .500 the first quarter, but dropped to .200 the second quarter. The half ended 22-16 in favor of the Knights, but it was the Warrior's aggressive

glass work that proved they could hold their own with the giant Knights.

The Knights began to connect in the second half and nailed several long shots to increase their lead to eight points. The Warriors dipped into that lead several times, but with time running out, the girls were forced to foul and the Knight's burned the nets from the free throw line.

Ardena Comanche and DeAnna Swanner played like six-footers on the boards, forcing their taller opponents to jump over their backs for rebounds. The scrambles for the ball on the court were rugged with the Warriors usually tearing the ball free, but then getting a traveling call by a hair trigger whistle.

The score was close all the way except for a couple of cheap baskets at the very end of the game when the Warriors were desperately trying to close the gap.

Several girls turned in good shooting performance to take up the slack by the missing Miller.

Melinda Schut nailed several 20-footers that hit nothing but nylon.

The girls were great at working the ball for a clean shot. Several open shots were missed, but not because they were bad shots. Hopkins has this team working like a well-oiled machine on both offense and defense.

The Warrior zone was killing Oñate the first half, particularly with missed shots from the base line. Each time Comanche or Swanner would be in the position to

swallow the rebound.

Norma Murillo was a block of granite in the middle, and although the stats didn't reflect her free throw shooting, she sank at least four important free throws down the stretch.

Jennifer Parker grabbed her customary five fouls, three of which were pretty cheap. This is one of the hardest working most improved players you will ever see on a Ruidoso's basketball team this year, boys or girls.

Sarah Kazhe played a great game, bringing the ball down the court, working the middle to find the open man. Kazhe also showed some fine speed on several fast breaks.

Comanche led the Warriors in scoring with 10 points. Swanner followed with nine, Parker with eight and Schut with seven.

Stephanie Torres, Parker and Schut all did a good job beating Oñate's press. The Knights were fast, but the Warriors kept pace.

Warriors edging upward despite loss

The Ruidoso Warriors girl cagers are coming on strong. Ask the fourth-ranked Socorro Lady Warriors. Ruidoso kept pace with Socorro for 3 1/2 quarters before faltering 56-46.

Ruidoso ace scorer Tara Miller suffered a severely sprained ankle midway through the third period and the bench performed admirably.

Ruidoso opened the first quarter hitting over 50 percent of their shots. Socorro was shooting hot as well and the first quarter ended 14-12. Norma Murillo hit 2-2 field goals the first quarter, Tara Miller hit two buckets and Stephanie Torres and DeAnna Swanner sank a basket each.

Ardena Comanche established herself on the boards quickly with three straight rebounds.

Socorro also picked up its shooting. The quarter ended with Socorro gaining another basket, but the Warriors losing Tara Miller with a sprained ankle.

Coach Jody Hopkins has her team playing so well that Miller's

absence, although missed, was not a devastating blow to the team. They still played a well-organized game, back quickly on defense, tight zone, good rebounding, good blockouts, with Schut, Parker and Stephanie Torres bringing the ball down the floor.

Without Miller, the Warriors were in new territory and it might have affected their shooting. The Warriors only shot seven times the final frame, hitting two shots. The exciting game ended 56-46 Socorro, but a tremendous moral victory for the young Ruidoso team that realized they can play good b'ball with anyone.

The Ruidoso girls are not known to be hot shooters at this stage of the season. The exception is Tara Miller who averages over 20 points

per game. The girls are fighters under the basket and can hold their share of rebounds with anyone in the state.

Ardena Comanche and DeAnna Swanner are not particularly tall girls, but their block-out skills improve with each game. Both are good leapers with excellent timing.

Norma Murillo is deceptively stong in the center. She has good instincts as to where and when the ball is coming off the rim. All three are very aggressive underneath.

Miss Aggression for Ruidoso is Jennifer Parker. She seems to take it as a personal insult if an opponent tries to steal the ball; consequently, Parker has fouled out several games, but she has improved immensely in her handling of the ball down the court as well as in number of steals. Parker also possesses good leaping abilities.

The Ruidoso team has been steadily improving and should start being considered for a ranking within the state.

The Warrior record is now 3-11. Oñate's victory moves the new high school team to 6-6.

The Warriors will host Tularosa on Tuesday.

In other district games Silver blasted Cobre 75-47 and Socorro beat Deming 61-49.

A recent power poll study rates the top 100 boys high schools in all divisions. District 3-AAA teams listed placed Socorro 16th, Deming 24th, Oñate 48th, Silver 50, Ruidoso 78th and Cobre 90th.

Athletic budget struggles along—at the bottom

Anybody that says Ruidoso's athletic program spends too much money isn't looking at the figures. In fact, given cuts and inflation, the athletic program's budget is in a downward spiral.

For many Ruidoso residents, school athletics is the best entertainment bargain in town. Can it remain competitive with the rest of the district with a substantially weakened budget?

Athletic administrator Cooper Henderson was non-committal on the school's chances of continued athletic excellence under the current budget. He did provide statistics to allow an examination of athletic expenditures.

New Mexico high schools have submitted their athletic budgets for 1987-88 to the state. A sampling of schools within the Class AAA reveals several startling statistics.

For starters, Ruidoso's school system budget total for the year is approximately \$6.5 million. The athletic program represents approximately one percent of that amount, according to the New Mexico Public School Finance Statistics published by the State Department of Education.

The athletic budget sent to the state from Ruidoso was \$32,800, and represents equipment, transportation and general expenditures.

There are three separate major revenue areas concerning athletic programs: the athletic budget for equipment and transportation; salaries including coaching increments; and the gate receipt fund.

SEEKING COMPARABLES
The graph examines and compares the athletic budgets for equipment and transportation among Ruidoso and nine schools with student enrollments similar to Ruidoso.

The graph includes all of Ruidoso's District AAA's opponents with the exception of Oñate, a first year school.

Several schools were selected because they represent a geographical mix of AAA schools with similar enrollments.

Tularosa is a neighbor and the only 2-A school on the graph. It is interesting to note that Tularosa's athletic budget is greater than the Warriors.

In 1984, Henderson was hired as the athletic director. The same budget listed on the graph at that time was \$48,000.

Two years ago the school board was prompted by an economic decline in the Ruidoso area to create several budget cuts that resulted in a reshuffling in academics and sports.

The sports program was cut to \$32,800. Last year, Gate Receipt Fund money compensated the

equipment and transportation costs when the \$32,800 ran out. This year Henderson said the Gate Receipt Fund is also in good shape.

"The danger in using the Gate Receipt Fund to always supplement an insufficient budget is that you are depending on unstable money," said Henderson. "Other schools also have a Gate Receipt Fund on top of their regular budget. As an example, Artesia's budget is \$73,525 in addition to a Gate Receipt Fund."


MONEY IS GONE
How is the athletic budget holding up to date?

"Our money in the Athletic Fund is gone for this year," said Henderson. "We've spent it. Transportation and any athletic costs for the rest of the year is dependent on our gate receipts."

"Our gate receipts in football were good, so I think we can make it this year. It's a little scary. What if we don't bring in the gate receipts?"

A comparison of other schools would seem to support Henderson's contention that the school's budget is insufficient if the Warriors are to stay competitive in the district.

Since Henderson became athletic director for Ruidoso municipal schools, a number of sports have been added to the athletic program, in spite of a reduced budget, including girls golf, JV wrestling, freshman girls vol-



leyball, freshman girls basketball and boys and girls cross country.

Henderson said other considerations must be addressed that aren't included in a static budget.

"In addition to adding sports, inflation, the cost of equipment, transportation and meals continue to rise each year," he said.

"The athletic department drafted a study for the 1978-88 school year. Our athletic expenditures in that study including salaries

represented only 1.4 percent of the school's total budget."

STAYING COMPETITIVE

"School money from the state is based on enrollment," Henderson said. "We're a small AAA school. Raton and Socorro represented on the chart are both small with approximately the same enrollment as Ruidoso. Silver and Deming are larger so they get more state money. If we are in the same competition bracket as these schools, it

seems fair to make a comparative analysis to their costs.

"Sure, I would like to have a larger, more competitive budget," said Henderson. "But my immediate goal is for residents of the community to be educated and informed when discussing athletic budgets."


Henderson said he welcomes discussion by any interested persons regarding the school's athletic program at any grade level.

Economic Development Corp. reports on first year

"We can see signs of the whole county working together," said President Buddy Bundick during the annual meeting of the Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County (EDCLC) Thursday.

During the public meeting, committee chairpersons reported on the past year's activities and progress, with Bundick stressing the importance of the unified effort the group has led.

Bundick said EDCLC's goal was to try to create 10 jobs—a number that would have more than put back into the county economy the amount of public funding received.

"We have exceeded that," said Bundick.

"Even in our infancy we have managed to have some successes," said Prospects Committee chairman Don Shaw. He said EDCLC lured a recycling company away from El Paso, Texas, to operate in Ruidoso Downs. That effort brought five new jobs to Lincoln County.

Shaw said a wood manufacturing plant is operating in Ruidoso, with plans to employ as many as a dozen people.

"We've had some very exciting close calls," said Shaw, mentioning a Brooklyn, New York, firm and a Loveland, Colorado, company that have come very close to opening operations in the county.

"All in all, without benefit of much advertising, we've accomplished a lot," said Shaw.

Bundick said members of the executive committee called a meeting of the county's state legislators to discuss a number of issues regarding Fort Stanton Hospital and Training School, with Representative Ben Hall the only official attending.

"If Lincoln County is going to be heard at the state level, we're going to have to do more of this," said

Bundick.

Roy Seay, chairman of the Business Retention and Expansion Committee, reported his committee has made 87 contacts in the county, presented programs for seven service clubs and co-sponsored two seminars with Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development Corporation.

Seay said his group set a goal of reaching 80 percent of county businesses, and expects to finish that task soon.

Commenting on financing possibilities for county businesses, Seay said, "We're cut out of a lot of special financing on the state level because we're not depressed."

Cindy Lynch, reporting for membership chairperson Mildred Crocker, said EDCLC has 149 certificate holders and 12 members on the payment plan.

"We'll continue to strive to get new members," said Lynch.

Dorothy Smith, chairperson of the Research Committee, reported on the statistical information her group has gathered and compiled. Smith said results of her committee's telephone labor survey are being compiled using a computer program at New Mexico State University.

"As I understand it, it's the first honest to goodness labor survey that has been done in the State of New Mexico," said Smith.

EDCLC is continuing its search for an executive director, and John Jeffers, head of the search committee, detailed efforts of his group. In spite of the process taking longer than expected, Jeffers said all have agreed to wait for someone with the right qualifications.

He said if the right person is hired then the corporation and the county will immediately begin to benefit.

Also Thursday, EDCLC: —Reviewed a proposed budget submitted by Dan Bryant.

—Elected Frank Sayer and Buddy Bundick to terms completed by Rod Adamson and Bundick.

—Presented appreciation plaques to Adamson, Ralph Dunlap, Bundick and Billy Harrison. Dunlap will be replaced by a new member of the Lincoln County Commission. Harrison resigned, and Bundick said he'll appoint the runner-up from Thursday's election to complete the unfulfilled term. Pat Huey was runner-up.

—Heard Dick Weber announce

that the Iron Horse Railroad is alive and well with plans to someday build a \$60 million railway in Lincoln County. He volunteered to make a presentation to EDCLC.

—Adjourned the public meeting and convened an executive board meeting to elect new officers.

—Announced that regular meetings are at 7 p.m. the first Thursday of each month at the EDCLC office. The public is invited to attend.





I have no answers, only observations. However, shouldn't the village leaders be just as concerned about the work force leaving the area as they are in bringing more in? Doesn't this community need to attract a stable industry base that does not depend on weather or season for its survival. How can you tell someone the economy is on the upswing when more and more businesses are closing their doors and they are out of a job and there is no work available.

Seems to me Ruidoso needs to take a hard look at itself and make decisions that will best serve the needs of the individuals that support and maintain the community.

I'm wondering how teachers will handle these changes. Having these birthday dates moved so close to Thanksgiving and Christmas can certainly be a problem. How will they be able to keep each event separate and not have it be confusing the children. Christmas and Thanksgiving are so exciting for them. How can they possibly absorb any more?

I can visualize a five-year old coming home on November twenty-fourth and saying, "We learned about President Lincoln today. I don't know if he came over on the Mayflower boat with the Pilgrims or not?" or, "George Washington was our first President. He must have been born before there was a Christmas or a Santa Claus!" Far-fetched? Well, maybe, but I hope it makes my point.

Are these changes to be National, or just in Lincoln County? Ironic that our county has that name.

Well—it makes me feel disgusted and disgruntled at the dishonesty of these changes.

What will be next? -- Celebrating the Birth of Our Lord in July?

"It's still under investigation..." describing everything that ever happens.



And:

Dance fever hits Ruidoso!

Toe-tappers of all ages take part in dance program

Last March a group of Ruidoso residents—from tots to teens to adult toe-tappers—began instruction that could someday lead to some new rivals for those dance greats.

Ruidoso, as of last March, has a dance program that is going strong in the Village of Ruidoso Parks and Recreation Department Activity Center.

Nancy Shaver had thought of starting a dance studio in Ruidoso for years, but it took her daughter's interest in dance to get the ball rolling. When Shaver, a professionally-trained dance instructor, questioned gymnastics coach Robyn Johnson about plans for adding dance to the full schedule at the center she learned the interest was there, but no qualified teacher.

"Would you like to?" Johnson asked Shaver, and within a couple of months the first two classes were under way.

Shaver, a member of Dance Masters of America, began her training in Levelland, Texas, at McKay School of Dance. She attended Texas Tech University in Lubbock, Texas, graduating with a physical education degree. During and after college, Shaver taught dance and gymnastics at Briercroft Dance Academy and Lubbock Fine Arts School of Dance, in Lubbock. She also taught gymnastics in Levelland.

The Ruidoso dance program ranges from three-year-olds to a 62-year-old, and Shaver said age isn't a limitation to enjoying dancing.

Currently, Shaver is teaching tap and ballet classes for young people, and a tap class for adults. This fall she taught jazz privately to two students, Gail Floyd and Bethany Jarrell, who wanted to compete in the Junior Class Talent Show.

Jazz classes for teens, adults and young people are in the works.

Shaver also teaches ballet to gymnastics students, who use the dance movements in the competitive routines.

The number of dancers have doubled since Shaver offered her first two classes last March. If a class is full, she makes every effort to offer a private lesson or create another class.

Local dance students are enthusiastic in praising Shaver.

"It's the best exercise around for

a 45-year-old man," said Leon Eggleston, a member of the adult tap class. He said he had heart surgery just over a year ago, and his doctor recommended dancing for exercise.

Eggleston and the other members of the adult class enjoy dancing so much that they performed recently at a carnival for a local school.

Johnson said Shaver and her successful dance classes have added a great deal to the center, and she's thrilled to have her as part of her full program of classes and activities.

Dance students are now working on routines to perform at a recital in late May. Although Shaver offers classes in the summer, the recital will be performed by students in the September through May program.

It's not too late to get into the dance program and be included in the program.

Shaver is as happy about the program as her students are about her.

"It's exciting to take these students who have not had any dance, to see they way they worked in September, and then see where they are today," she said.

"It's so much fun to be a part of the development of these children," she added.

There's a saying that Shaver likes to quote: "If you want children to have strong minds, give them a chance to educate their bodies."

She likes to think she's a part of that education.

Shaver said as her program grows, she hopes to offer students a chance to attend conventions in the area and elsewhere.

"As we develop more talented students, they can go into competition at these conventions and have opportunities to earn dance scholarships and things like that," she said.

"I would like to be able to offer them what they would be offered in the larger cities—a totally well-rounded dance program with no limitations—and then offer them the opportunity to travel and attend these conventions and compete," said Shaver.

Plans also include a Ruidoso dance group that can entertain for clubs and civic events.


