



Ruidoso prevails in Mescalero water suit

A court ruling put an end last week to claims by the Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe to nearly 18,000 acre-feet of water rights.

Retired State Supreme Court Justice LaFel Oman, appointed to hear and review the case involving the tribe and water right owners throughout the Hondo Basin,

issued a 13-page document denying the tribe's claims.

Oman granted the tribe rights to 1,372 acre-feet, or about what is currently used, said Village of Ruidoso water attorney Neil Stillinger. He said the judge also granted an additional 950 acre-feet for future domestic and recreational uses.

Before Oman made his decision,

he listened to hundreds of hours of testimony and reviewed countless volumes of reports by expert witnesses.

The tribe detailed plans to extend agricultural operations into the Rinconada and Pajarito. Plans called for transporting water from the Rio Ruidoso and drilling deep water wells to obtain the 18,000 acre-feet to be used to raise high-

yield crops.

Attorneys for the tribe claimed aboriginal title to water, or if not the original right, then a priority date of 1852, based on a treaty signed that year with the United States government.

Stillinger said the tribe had to prove that an adequate water supply existed for the proposed project and that they are economically fea-

sible.

"The judge said they failed on both counts," said Stillinger. "He killed the Rinconada and Pajarito projects," he added.

Stillinger said Oman determined that practically irrigable acreage (PIA), a standard use to quantify Indian water rights, was appropriate in this case, but the tribe failed to prove that point.

"They were never going to build the Rinconada and Pajarito, it was just a way to quantify their claims," said Stillinger.

"Oman said they did not have a priority based on the 1852 treaty," said Stillinger. Oman said that treaty was not a reservation, but the treaty of 1873 did establish boundaries. Stillinger said that is. Please see Ruidoso, page 10A

Ruidoso citizens want a golf course

Members of the Municipal Airport Planning Board heard a string of citizens speak Thursday in favor of placing a golf course on the old airport property.

During a workshop meeting at Ruidoso Municipal Administrative Center with all board members present, the board heard over and over that if village citizens work together, the proposal by R.D. Hubbard, president of Ruidoso Downs Racing, Inc., will be the key to an upturn in the village economy.

All members of the board had words of praise for the speakers Hubbard brought to the Wednesday meeting that drew close to 600 people.

"This board has been issued a tremendous challenge to do something that is good for every citizen," said MAPB Chairman Frank Kolb. "Tourism is our basic industry ... we need to do things to get tourists here—they create jobs," he added.

"We need to look beyond a golf course ... it's a first step. We have to start somewhere," said Kolb.

Members of the audience ap-

plauded time after time as their fellow citizens endorsed the golf course and resort hotel concept for the airport land and some adjacent land.

MAPB member Rick Evans said that group provided a road map.

"If the community decides they want it, they can get it," said Evans. "If we become united ... we can't be divided," he added.

"They were so emphatic ... we must pull together," said MAPB member Jerry Shaw.

"We're faced by nothing but success if we do pull together," said Victor Shearer.

"When they said pull together, it sound more like get in line," said Wally Hesse, a dissenter on hand for the meeting.

"I don't understand why Mr. Hubbard is so interested in a golf course ... maybe he owns a lot of stock in a golf company," said Hesse, calling on the board to develop something for the citizens, like an events and/or teen center.

"It is time for us to call an ace an ace and a spade a spade," said John Hall, president of Coldwell Banker. "Lenders have closed the barn door

after the horse got out," he added. Hall said those that are left are paying for the lending companies' past mistakes by paying "what's known as Ruidoso prime."

Hall said real estate sales in 1985 were at \$78.6 million, but fell to \$37.9 million by 1988, a decrease of more than \$40 million and a loss in gross receipts on commissions of \$185,000. He said the average three-bedroom home was priced in

1984 at \$113,234, and in 1988 that average is \$72,243—a 36 percent decline in four years.

Hall said the proposed golf course could benefit the economy in one year by more than \$4 million, and boost gross receipts taxes by \$677,000 as that money circulates through the community.

Hall continued the village has a

Judge orders developer to build subdivision roads

Residents of a Lincoln County subdivision who have waited as long as 10 years for improved roads will receive them under a decision in a lawsuit brought by the Office of the Attorney General (AG), according to a news release from the AG's office.

District Judge Richard A. Parsons ordered Ruidoso land developer James L. Wimberly and his Alto Land and Cattle Company to obtain plat approval from Lincoln County for more than 20 parcels of land sold by the company between 1975 and 1979. In order to obtain approval, the developer will have to meet county standards for roads, water availability, sewage treatment and land drainage.

The land, situated along New Mexico Highway 48 south of Capitan, has long been the subject of controversy because of serious access problems. According to a complaint brought by the AG, the developer failed to construct and maintain roads within the subdivision, in violation of county regulations.

At trial last June, witnesses detailed instances in which purchasers were forced to leave the

area because children could not be reached by school buses and medical emergencies went unanswered because of bad road conditions, according to the news release.

The court also issued an injunction to halt any further sales by Wimberly or his company until plat approval is obtained.

Chief Assistant Attorney General Randy Childress pointed out that the platting process is designed to prevent the very problems present in the Wimberly case. Under New Mexico statutes, developers must meet county standards for roads, sewage treatment, water quality and terrain management when they subdivide land.

If Wimberly and Alto Land and Cattle Company do not seek plat approval within 60 days, the court order authorizes the state to go back to court to obtain a money judgment, or to tie up sufficient property to ensure that the necessary work is done.

Wimberly, contacted by telephone Sunday, said the land is undeveloped and unoccupied.

"We're appealing that, and we're not satisfied with the judge's ruling," he added.

Chino leads gaming law fight

Wendell Chino, president of the Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe, is leading a fight to overturn a new law regulating gambling on reservations.

According to published reports, Chino and representatives of the Red Lake Band of Chippewas of Minnesota, filed suit in U.S. District Court in Washington, D.C. that claims the new law is unconstitutional and violates tribal sovereignty.


The two tribes have reportedly called on other tribes to enter the case in support of the suit.

The Indian Gaming Act was enacted last fall and will create a national commission to oversee Indian gaming, including existing bingo, lotto and

card games. It requires tribes to enter into agreements with their individual states over high-stakes gambling operations, including horse racing.

"Our treaty indicates that we will be subject to the jurisdiction only of ourselves and the federal government, not the states," Chino is quoted as saying. "This is a clear violation of the treaty and something which we cannot and will not allow. Our tribal governments predate the U.S. Constitution—we have the right to self-government into perpetuity," he added.

The Mescalero Apache Indians own and operate Bingo of Mescalero on the Mescalero reservation.

Ruidoso School Board candidates speak out

Ruidoso voters will go to the polls on Tuesday, February 7, to determine who will fill two positions on the Ruidoso Municipal Schools Board of Education.

Polls will be open from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m. in the Ruidoso Middle School gymnasium lobby, where voters will choose from five candidates.

Eloy Candelaria, Wanda Lynn Moore, Katherine S. Travis and Fred Lynn Willard are on the ballot for Position Four. John R. (Rod) Adamson, Bernita Deaton and Susan Marie (Morrison) Lutterman are vying for Position Five.

ELOY CANDELARIA

Eloy Candelaria, 43, attended the University of New Mexico and has lived in Ruidoso for five years. He is a construction supervisor for John Cornell Construction Company, doing the remodeling project at Lincoln County Medical Center.

Candelaria said the biggest reason he is running for the board is the need for better communications among teachers, parents and schools.

He has two children in Ruidoso schools and has been very involved with the schools. He has served on the Parent-Teacher Council at Ruidoso Middle School.

Candelaria considers education the most important factor in a child's life.

"I'm always pushing my kids," he said. He has never run for public office, but was encouraged to try for the board position by several teachers.

Wanda Lynn Moore, 63, earned a B.A. and M.A., completing her education at the University of Oklahoma and New Mexico State University. She also received a degree in administration and guidance and counseling.

In the 32 years she has worked in education, Moore has taught in Oklahoma, Colorado, New Mexico, Texas and Japan and Guam, where she taught at military schools. She was assistant professor of music in addition to teaching elementary, high school and college levels.

Moore has lived in Ruidoso for eight years, during which time she has substituted in the schools.

Moore said she has attended board meetings and thinks culture is as important as sports. She would like to see six music teachers, just as there are six coaches in the schools.

She wants better accounting to the board from the superintendent.

"I don't like to see the board sit there, they don't even work with the superintendent, they work for the superintendent."

Her "biggest beef" is the "hiring business" of teachers.

She advocates quality education and salary raises for teachers.

Katherine S. Travis, 58, retired last year after teaching in Ruidoso schools for 25 years. She earned her M.A. with an education administration certificate. She has lived in Ruidoso for 25 years.

As her two daughters have been through the Ruidoso Schools, Travis said she has time to work for the schools by giving back the knowledge she has gained.

She has knowledge of the working of the school system as she has worked with the schools in various capacities.

"I know what's going on," said Travis. A better balance of academics, athletics and vocational programs is needed as well as getting the most benefit from tax dollars, said Travis.

She said her leadership service on the budget, evaluation, curriculum, long-range planning, high school building and superintendents advisory board committees also gives her an insight into issues facing the Ruidoso Municipal Schools.

FRED "LYNN" WILLARD

Fred "Lynn" Willard, 43, seeks re-election to Position Four. He has served on the board for six years. He has a B.A. and a Doctor of Veterinary Medicine from Kansas State University. A resident for 16 years, he is a veterinarian.

He thinks two major issues face Ruidoso Schools: financial with dropping enrollment and better communication between all facets of the schools.

State Legislature mandates, without proper funding, have created financial problems in the schools, Willard said.

Within the last year, Willard said the Board of Education has implemented an evaluation of the superintendent. The evaluation increases everybody's accountability, from the board to the voter, the superintendent to the board and the staff to the principals. The evaluation has gotten favorable response, he said.

Since he has been on the board, the schools have been physically improved: the Nob Hill and Middle School remodeling and expansion projects and completion of Ruidoso High School.

Willard served as past president of the Ruidoso Evening Lions Club, president of the New Mexico Veterinary Medical Association and president of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce.

In Position Five, John "Rod" Adamson seeks election to the seat he has occupied for one year. He was appointed to the position after board member Lamar Osbourn resigned. Adamson, 36, has a bachelor's degree in business administration in finance and banking from Texas Tech University in Lubbock, Texas.

A resident of Ruidoso for 14 years, he is a real estate appraiser.

Adamson is running for the position because he thinks the schools are the hub of the community. He said he would like to do all he can to support the schools and the community.

"Times have been hard and we're ready for a turn around," said Adamson.

"I want to be as optimistic as possible," he said about the pessimism, he sees as a "sign of the times."

Adamson, who has two children in Ruidoso schools, said he wants to help the children get the best education possible.

"I love children, from kindergarten to high school," said Adamson.

He thinks the main issue is finances and the budget.

"If I'm elected, I'll watch the budget as close as possible," he said. He enjoys watching where the dollars are being spent, but one of his concerns is the need for grounds improvements. He also would like to see teachers receive more money, but the funds are dependent on the state.

Susan (Morrison) Lutterman, 32, has lived in Ruidoso for 27 years. She graduated from Ruidoso High School where she was involved in a variety of school and extra-curricular activities.

Lutterman said she has attended board meetings for two years, and volunteered for the open position filled by Adamson. She has served on the Advisory Council for White Mountain Elementary School.

Education is foremost to Lutterman.

She thinks a "different voice" is needed on the board, one which comes from "the field." She wants communication between schools and parents, and to get parents involved with their children's education. She also is concerned for her three children who are in Nob Hill, White Mountain Elementary and White Mountain Intermediate schools.

"It all boils down to having the best education from Ruidoso schools," as some children must be ready to go out into the world after high school, she said.

"I love sports," she said. However, money going to sports and not education is "wrong."

Lutterman said she does not think the present board is doing a bad job, but she wants to put something back into the school. Both her father and grandmother served as board members.

Chamber board endorses a new proposal for civic/events center

"This is not ill-conceived; a great deal of work went into this," Dick Weber said of events center plans he presented Thursday to the executive board of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce.

Weber and Larry Goodman, both owners of lodging establishments, presented plans for a 40,000-square-foot center, with potential expansion to 87,000 square-feet. The plans are based on a pre-manufactured facility built by Fab-Crete, Incorporated of Fort Worth, Texas.

Weber said the plans have not cost anything, as the additions and changes of the original factory plans were made by Goodman.

The facility as proposed will be a pre-manufactured prestressed concrete building, constructed with local labor.

Weber said he explored the facility as no buildings or specific sites in Ruidoso were suitable to a "planned" events center. Some details of the proposed center include an acoustically perfect auditorium, with cold quartz lighting, a large open event hall, three separate meeting rooms, crafts rooms for adult activities and a kitchen for catered events.

All rooms will have pre-programmed systems to allow keys to be issued before the event, Weber said. The computerized system will be programmed to allow the key to work only at the specified time, allowing control over who uses the facilities.

The overall cost is about \$40 to \$45 per square foot, not including land costs.

The auditorium, which Weber said will be the most expensive part of the facility, also will feature fixed seating with a gradual ramp for handicapped access, wing walls for acoustic fine tuning, lighting bar which will allow little theater groups to install their own lights and multipurpose public address system. However, the low-level sound system is not designed for rock groups, he added.

Storage of chairs and other equipment will not be on-site. Weber said he preferred to see a small equipment rental business develop in the village.

Board member Roy Crocker complimented the plans and said the estimated total of \$2-2.4 million on phase one is the "best selling point in town."

Board members questioned Weber about the location for the center. He replied the facility would eventually need 10 acres for the building and parking.

Chamber executive director John Jeffers suggested the chamber support and approve the design then take it to the Municipal Airport Planning Board for placement on the master plan.

"We need a building, and not spend money on rent and renovation of junk," said Jeffers.

Discussion led to a land site at the old airport. Board member Rick Evans said the airport land would

provide a site with no cost. "Regardless of (R.D.) Hubbard, we all need this (event center)," Evans said. Weber said Hubbard has a copy of the plan.

The board, on behalf of the chamber, unanimously endorsed and supported the plans and directed Weber to present them to whatever agency will be involved.

Also related to the airport site, the chamber established a policy in support of the proposed golf course. However, the chamber recommends the events center be constructed on a portion of the old airport site.

All members agreed there is no opposition to the positive feeling expressed at a public meeting Wednesday.

Crocker also reported on the Retirement Services Division campaign which begins in about 30 days. Ads will appear in selective retirement magazines, targeting an affluent, young healthy group which will make "good citizens." A brochure, designed by Phil Price Agency, will be ready in late March.

In other business, the chamber board:

—Heard the Convention and Visitor's Bureau (CVB) report about the upcoming Connoisseur Classic. (See related article.)

—Approved the financial report.

—OK'd the CVB budget revision to cover cost over-runs for printing.

—Stressed the importance of actively seeking membership in the chamber.

Detective warns of occult

Satanic worship in Lincoln County was on review by law enforcement officers last Thursday in a seminar held at Ruidoso High School.

Ruidoso detective Lanny Maddox and assistant district attorney Scot Key said Satanic worship is a growing concern to educators and police in Lincoln County. The two officials were promoting community awareness of the occult and its symbols.

Ruidoso High School (RHS) sponsored originally scheduled for teachers only. RHS counselor Denise Hawthorne said she asked Maddox to speak because of his past interest in the subject.

"We're going to have it again," said Hawthorne.

Ruidoso Police Chief William Newman, contacted by telephone, said the opinions expressed by detective Maddox at the presentation were his own, and don't represent the position of the Ruidoso Police Department.

"In my opinion, they don't accurately describe the state of what the kids of Lincoln County call 'devil worship,'" Newman said.

"The symbols and rituals of Satanism have been around for centuries. I don't see our kids' relatively recent infatuation with them as anything more than a fad which the music and movie industries have catered to for a very simple reason, money," he added.

"That's not to say the danger of the infatuation should be taken lightly," said Newman. "A few kids, and I emphasize few, will be caught up in it in a desperate attempt to 'belong' to something, even something evil if that's their only choice. Parents should be informed and be aware of the danger, but should not be unduly or irrationally alarmed."

Nearly a hundred people crowded into the small meeting room at RHS to witness the presentation. The program was based heavily on information gleaned from the "Geraldo Rivera Show," a loosely-structured slide show and several of Maddox's own experiences, interviews and interpretations.

Maddox said no arrests were ever made in Lincoln County for practicing Satanic rituals, such as sacrificing animals or humans, and said most of his information is based on hearsay.

Maddox said he didn't believe in Satanic powers, but other people who did might act on that belief.

"What we have now is a very complex organization," Maddox said. "An organization that is not only in every state in the United States, but also overseas. We have a type of controlled and very educated hierarchy that is running this system. People who become involved in Satanic cults are governed by their peers everyday. Once you get in, you don't get out."

"These are victims that are also called survivors. My concern right now is that the occult, Satanic influence on our kids, is happening right now. It's happening to this school. It's happening to schools throughout

the United States and most of the parents of these children are not aware of it."

Maddox asked the crowd if they were familiar with Anton Lavay, the founder of the first Satanic church in the United States.

"If you haven't hear it before you heard it on Geraldo. Everybody saw that show. I think more people saw that than the Super Bowl," said Maddox.

"He's (Lavay) got his own bible printed. You can go to the Waldenbook store and buy the Satanic bible. You can also go to the Waldenbook store or almost any other place that sells magazines and books and you can find procedures on ritualistic black masses, witches covens, spells, incantations, how to do away with your parents if they really get on your case. There's an unbelievable media out there, easily accessible to anybody that wants it."

"Young people know more than we do about it. I'm really new into the Satanic and the occult investigations. I started about a year and a half ago and tried to gather everything I can so I can finally pass it on to the people that really count. This is the first type of seminar that has been given in Lincoln County. Hopefully, I'll be able to pass on a little information that will be helpful to you in determining if we have a problem in Lincoln County. Personally, from things that I've seen, I'd say we do."

Maddox handed the crowd

several pieces of literature. He said he believed the old peace sign has a new meaning.

Directing the audience to the cross of Nero, Maddox said it's no longer known as the peace sign of Woodstock days.

"There's a change. It's a broken cross, a blasphemy to God. It's an inverted cross with the arms broken off. It's not for peace anymore, people. This now is a direct symbolism showing that they are involved or very interested in some type of the occult," said Maddox.

Detective Maddox displayed photographs taken of vehicles parked in the RHS parking lot that bear different Satanic symbols. One was of two necklaces with the "old peace sign/new Satanic symbol" hanging from a rear view mirror.

"These signs were on several vehicles," he said. "In fact, one week I passed through the parking lot and there may have been 15 to 20 cars that had different Satanic symbols on it. I don't know whether the people that own the cars put them on. In one case, where you got them hanging off the rear view mirror inside the vehicle, I'd say yes, that's the owner's personal property."

"The thing that we are concerned about right now is that these things are not being run by young people. They're being run by knowledgeable, usually prominent, wealthy people that have dominant powers over the children," Maddox said.

"Let me explain something else. Religion is a freedom. We can't discriminate against. Just because someone worships Satan doesn't mean that they're a criminal or that they're committing a crime, unfortunately," Maddox said.

"The reason we're getting involved in this area is because usually Satanic-influenced people commit crimes."

"The first thing is that black masses have to have a sacrifice," Maddox said. "It has to be a live sacrifice whether it be animal or human. Fortunately, from what our statistics show, we are not aware of a human sacrifice in this particular area. Unfortunately, there are a lot of areas that have direct proof that humans have been sacrificed. The only thing they have to show for that is burned bones. The bones have been analyzed and yes, they are human."

"Statistics also show that, other than parental kidnappings, which is the majority of the children missing, they're saying right now that over 60 percent of them are possibly being sacrificed in some type of cult group," Maddox said.

He said the problem will build unless concerned individuals, like those at the seminar, do something about it.

"And the way we can do something about it is to educate our children," he said.

"For you people who saw Gerald, remember seeing Dr. Michael Aquino, our infamous Lieutenant Colonel with the United States Army" Maddox asked. "The United States Army provides him a building to have his Satanic worship each week. It's real neat. They (U.S. Army) don't condone the black masses where he sacrifices something, but he doesn't have to tell them about that. But he can do all of his recruiting, all of his mind boggling propaganda about the Satanic cults. He can do that on government time and our tax dollars are paying for it. You figure it out. Yes, we've let it go to that point."

SLIDE PROGRAM
Accompanying Maddox introductory speech was a slide program that began with dramatic eerie music and a moderator saying "We will present you with some facts, then you decide if it is fact or fiction."

A series of slides depicting the different faces of the devil are projected on the screen with his/her many names, i.e., Beelzebub, the Serpent, the Dragon, Lord of the Flies, Lucifer, etc. Most of the pictures were taken off heavy metal rock albums.

The slide then condenses the path of Satan from the beginning of time through a path that eventually leads to El Paso, Texas.

The music builds in intensity as the moderator warns, "The spirit of Babylon is here. It is now. Perhaps its strongest influence is felt right now in the U.S. where, like a hurricane, it's full fury has been unleashed upon our youth."

"They are made to eat the flesh and drink the blood of animals and humans in perverted mock communion."

"Halloween is the largest of these celebrations. Human sacrifice is almost always a part of this

ritual. "The ultimate human sacrifice for a Satanist is an infant or a small child because of his purity."

The slide presentation then offers a series of slides depicting graffiti in the El Paso area. At times a picture of cow bones is followed by a picture of a young child holding his parent's hand.

A direct link to Soviet Communism follows: "Joseph Stalin said, if we can enslave just one country, that country will fall to Soviet Communism. The way to enslave that generation is by means of immorality, music and drugs. Joseph Stalin, world leader of atheistic soviet communism, accused murder of untold millions of human beings, probably never knew what a prophet he was."

"The rise of heavy metal rock music with blatant Satanic messages, both audible and visible, has truly enslaved the lives of many of our youth."

The program then turned to a series of slides depicting more symbols before it jumped to a section of purported "lures and enticements" to the occult. Astrology and the Ouija board were mentioned.

"Demon possession is often the result of a Ouija board," the moderator warned.

Levitation, the act of raising an object or person from the ground and causing it to float in the air through supernatural power, covered two slides that showed both an individual and a small table floating in the air.

Astro projection, removing the body from the spirit and sending it great distances was said to be "dangerous to the practitioner and leaves the body open for demonic possession."

Dungeons and Dragons, the fad game at its popular peak five years ago was mentioned.

"Dungeons and Dragons, a seemingly harmless role playing game. Yet the game includes the use of demonology, witchcraft, voodoo, rape, blasphemy, suicide, assassination, insanity, sexual perversion including homosexuality and prostitution, Satan worship barbarism, cannibalism, sadism, summoning the dead and other occultic teaching and practices."

The slide presentation gave several other examples along the same line and concluded that role playing must be observed by the parent to determine conclusions to violent actions.

The last part of the slide presentation dealt with more children's pictures, dead animals and graffiti in the El Paso area.

The moderator announced, "An estimated 20,000 to 40,000 children have been criminally abducted and sold on the black market, rented out for use in pornographic snuff films, used in white slavery and become victims in Satanic ritual abuse."

The presentation concluded by requesting the audience to stand up and join the fight against Satanism "for the future of tomorrow."

MADDOX AND KEY
"Let me emphasize," said Maddox, "That just because a child listens to heavy metal music, it doesn't make him a Satanist."

Maddox said, "If people pray to God, like 'God, I know I got cancer, please let me be cured,' sometimes prayers are answered sometimes not. If you pray to Satan, you're usually always answered. He doesn't have anything to lose. So these people take that into consideration, pass it on to our young people and they're doing it right now through this heavy metal music."

"I have the (good) fortune to have a recording studio at my home," Maddox said. "I've taken some of this heavy metal music and processed it through some of my equipment and in doing so, this stuff has subliminal messages in it."

Albums mentioned in the literature included AC-DC, Fleetwood Mac, Pink Floyd, Kiss, Rush, Motley Crue and Rolling Stones.

Maddox then explained subliminal messages to the crowd, saying they couldn't be heard but entered the subconscious. No tape of such messages was made available. He then read a subliminal message he said came from a record from an album by Venom.

"Look at me, Satan's child," Maddox read. "Born of evil, brought to life by Satanic birth, and that's continuous throughout this song. It also has a portion in there that says make love to the dying whore, Satan is my master incarnate. Hail, praise to my unholy host. This is going over and over, maybe 50 times through this song, through your kids head. Maybe he's not aware of this happening. I'm sure he's not. Venom is a real pure group, making millions. But this stuff is coming through the sub-

conscious. "The influential people certainly are not going to come up to you and say I'm a Satanist and if they did tell you that, they'd be lying to you because everything that is occult related like this is usually in reverse. So when you saw Dr. Michael Aquino on Geraldo say we don't sacrifice babies or humans, what he's actually telling you is 'yes, we do.' An inverted cross is the opposite of a white cross, black is white, white is black, yes is no, no


is yes. "We have about nine different covens of witches in New Mexico." "I'm not an authority by any means," Maddox said. "I got some answers and if I don't have answers I usually have connections that I can call and somebody will come up with something that I think is feasible. "Mr. Scott Key is aware of the situation. We've gone out to several of these seminars and heard different things and we know it's hap-

pening." Maddox encouraged parents to communicate with their children to elicit information leading to the whereabouts of practitioners. **SCOTT KEY** ADA Key said 75 percent of the kids are hearing heavy metal groups, and some are involved in Satanic worship. Key said he has confiscated necklaces bearing Satanic symbols. A question that inferred the jeopardy of constitutional rights by

such confiscations was answered by Maddox. "Most were taken with the parents' consent," he said. One teacher in the crowd said she was happy for the information and thought it should be made public. A preacher in the crowd said, "Praise God!" Another woman in the crowd compared Satanism to televangelists and that she was now more informed.

Highway Department to spend \$33 million in Lincoln County

The New Mexico State Highway and Transportation Department will expend \$33.1 million on highways in Lincoln County, according to a news release.

The expenditure is included in highway construction plans for southeastern New Mexico, which total \$172.031 million over a five-year period from July 1989, through June 1994.

These projections are contained in the state Highway and Transportation Department's \$965.767

million Five-Year Construction Plan approved by the New Mexico State Highway Commission at its meeting January 20, Department Secretary Dewey Lonsberry said.

Lincoln County is one of the eight in District 2 which is headquartered in Roswell. Expenditures in Chaves County total \$16.597 million and \$21.03 million in Otero County.

The Five-Year Plan is revised each year based on annual review

of road conditions in each highway district. The plan for the next fiscal year becomes the department's Annual Construction Program and newly proposed construction is classified under the fifth year of the plan.

Construction detailed in the plan is contingent on realization of state and federal funding projections. Cost estimates are subject to inflationary factors during the five-year period, Lonsberry said.







The Ruidoso Wrestling Tournament is history and so is any further opportunity to see the Warrior grapplers at home this year.

Warrior coach Gerald Ames said he would be back and better next year. He said there were two more away meets this season, one at Alamogordo and one at Roswell, before the District Tournament on February 18.

"In this tournament, Henry Kayitah lost his first match to Carlsbad, but he wrestled very well. Henry has improved all year. Now he's winning matches. When he meets a tough kid, he doesn't get pinned like he did in the early season."

James Atwood, after a bye in the first round, met a very tough Carlsbad opponent, Vernon Lee, who technically fell Atwood 16-2.

"Something happened late in the match and Atwood picked up in intensity," Ames said. Sometimes teaching a young kid to wrestle hard on the mat is very hard to do. The first time it happens is a major victory. Atwood is one of those kids that's going to be very good, he just has to learn how to wrestle tough all the time on the mat. I have a lot of confidence in Atwood's ability in the future."

Fernando Lopez, 119 pounds, lost 6-4 to Carlsbad.

"It was a good match, Fernando lost," said Ames. "Fernando made a few small errors, but he still wrestled very well. We were very pleased in his performance."

At 125 pounds, Eric Collins started off like a ball of fire and won his first match, pinning his opponent.

"This is typical for Collins," said Ames. "He usually picks up a victory in the early rounds."

Mario Portillo drew Ron Seeburg

from Carlsbad who won the tournament. Portillo was pinned.

Alfred Rue wrestled Oñate's Ron Sisneros and was pinned. Rue has wrestled Sisneros three times this season. In their first meeting Sisneros decided Rue. The second time they met, Rue pinned Sisneros.

Craig Sears, 152 pounds, wrestled Oñate's Jose Rivera and lost.

"Rivera is an excellent wrestler," said Ames. "One of the best in the tournament. I was very proud that Craig made it into the third period against this guy."

"After the Sears match we entered what we call the consolation wrestle backs," said Ames. "They've got to wrestle their way back into the tournament. There were four matches."

Fernando beat Sam Kluth of the New Mexico Military Institute. Fernando pinned Kluth, and it was the first victory for him this year."

Mario Portillo then beat Rolland Rameriz of Goddard.

Alfred Rue then pinned Mario Ruez of Austin.

"This was Rue's second win, which letters him for the year," said Ames.

Collins then lost to Ralph Bloug of Oñate.

"Collins didn't wrestle that badly," said Ames. "The Oñate wrestler got a five-point foul and that was the game."

Bubba Lane beat Greg Lampier 4-0. Lane jarred his knee which is still recuperating from off season surgery.

Henry Kayitah then lost to James Navieo of Carlsbad 13-3.

Collins then lost to Rudy Hernandez from Jefferson 5-0.

"Eric has beaten this kid before," said Ames. "He just didn't wrestle well this match."

At 130, Portillo pinned Norman Trujillo of Oñate.

"That was a good match for us," said Ames. "And it was good for Mario. I think he's coming on. That was a good district match. Maybe Mario can make it to the state."

At 140 pounds, Rue lost to Robert Perez of Roswell. Rue had Perez nearly pinned on several occasions, but Perez was able to reverse and pin Rue.

"Rue wrestled nearly six minutes," said Ames. "For Alfred that's important. You have to be out on the mat as much as possible. It was just a matter of technique and, again, typical of a first year wrestler."

Sears lost his match with a Carlsbad opponent.

Atwood wrestled for fourth place against Sam Laker of Carlsbad and lost a close match 5-4.

"Atwood said he was tired," Ames said. "He talked himself into being tired and then he came on strong at the end which proved he wasn't that tired. That's a sophomore problem. You've got to wrestle a lot to get used to being out there for six minutes. It is so hard."

"Fernando wrestled well," Ames said. "It was 2-0 at the end of the first period and Cruz is a darn good wrestler. Fernando is getting better all the time and we really like what we see in both Lopez and Atwood."

Portillo then pinned Art Guardiola from Jefferson to take third place in the tournament.

Lane ended Warrior wrestling for the tournament against Greg Sears. This time it was Sears who won on two fireman take downs.

"It was a typical match for the two," said Ames. "Both good wrestlers, Bubba just needed to shoot first on Sears. You can't sit back and wait. The good news is that we made it through the tournament without any more difficulty for the leg. That should give him confidence."

three to five year oversupply of housing on the market, and added that four restaurants closed just last week.

"If this committee could grant carte blanche and Mr. Hubbard started construction tomorrow, recovery would take two years," said Hall, predicting if the board fails to act there will be a mass exodus from Ruidoso.

"The urgency cannot be downplayed," said Hall, urging the commission to set a public hearing immediately.

"It's time for us to decide whether we want to remain a sleepy village or become a resort," said Hall.

"It's like a Hubbard cheering section back here," said Tim Hoyt. "I'd like to see us get together on an events center as much as everybody wants to get together to give Mr. Hubbard carte blanche," he added.

Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce executive director John Jeffers, speaking on his own behalf

rather than on behalf of the chamber, said things have reached a point where something has to be done.

"We have no control over what happens at the ski area—we can't force the owner to offer mid-week packages," said Jeffers.

He said the village needs a major organ transplant instead of continuing the band aid approach to economic problems.

"If we turn our back on the opportunity for an organ transplant... we have all lost a great opportunity," said Jeffers in support of the golf course plan.

"I think we're a darn bunch of fools if we don't consider the thing seriously," said Councillor Tom McNeil, noting the hotel would create from 200 to 300 new jobs and the golf course would employ from 20 to 100 people depending on the season.

The board previously heard a lengthy presentation from Dick Weber over the Ironhorse Railroad project he's proposing. Although MAPB didn't act on his first

proposal, and didn't dedicate land for the railroad, Weber said Thursday the Ironhorse Railroad is willing to "give up" the 10 acres he asked for on the airport land.

"Ironhorse Railroad generously gives way to the Hubbard project," said Weber.

During board discussion, members delved into details of the golf course placement, hotel site and parking for a civic center. They talked of air service, and wrestled with how to proceed.

Evans asked Ruidoso Downs Race Track general manager Rick Henson if Hubbard could designate a representative to attend the board's weekly meetings and answer questions.

"Until such time as the questions are well-defined, these people can't come in here every Wednesday," said Henson, offering to relay questions and try to attend the sessions himself.

Cleatus Richards, planning administrator, recommended the MAPB set a public hearing to review the proposal for a positive

recommendation to the Ruidoso Village Council with the condition that the developer, dedicate about 10 acres for a municipal events center.

Since the Thursday meeting was a workshop, and no official business could be conducted, Kolb scheduled a special meeting for 2 p.m. Tuesday, January 31, in council chambers of Ruidoso Municipal Administrative Center. Happy Birthday To Willie Randolph

I was up at the grocery store on the twenty-sixth and met two old friends, Abran Chavez of San Patricio and Willie Randolph of Ruidoso.

Abran said, "Willie here is eighty-nine years old. His birthday was yesterday. He has lived in Ruidoso for seventy-four years."

Willie was born in Hondo on January twenty-five, 1900, to Frank Randolph and Catarina

Brady, daughter of Captain Brady, prominent in pioneer Lincoln County pioneer times, but also on back into the lore and traditions of Spain.

He can recite legends and true stories handed down for generations, speaking for hours at a time, carrying you back one hundred two hundred or more years.

At the age of fifteen Willie began delivering the mail, from the post office at White Mountain Inn to Hondo and back. For twenty years he carried the mail, the first five years by horse and buggy, and the last fifteen in a model T. Ford.

Willie remembers; "We would start at the White Mountain Inn at five in the morning arrive in Hondo about at eleven. Then with the mail that

came from Roswell we would start back, and arrive at what is now Ruidoso Downs after dark. I delivered the mail on this route all winter and my brother, Andelario, all summer. It was a rough road all the way, all dirt."

Later Willie says the post office was moved from The White Mountain Inn to near the Reservation. This is when the Model T for days began. The White Mountain Inn still stands today, a landmark of the days when it was a stopping point between El Paso and Roswell, and the location of the first post office of the Ruidoso area.

Willie is remarkably youthful and cheerful after having lived through most of this century. His clear and alert mind is a treasure house of memories and stories; and he is widely beloved and admired. Surely he must be Ruidoso's most senior of all senior citizens after living here for seventy-four years. We will hear more from Willie later on, meanwhile we wish him many happy returns of the day and all God's blessings.

the earliest date that can apply, noting that many valley water users have water rights senior to 1873.

Some of the water right owners, concerned at the possible diversion of 18,000 acre-feet a year, banded together by organizing the Water Defense Association (WDA) to fight the Mescalero water claims. Members of that group have said for months that the loss of that much water would be the death of the Hondo Valley.

Besides individual water right owners, WDA is made up of Lincoln and Chaves counties and the villages of Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs and the city of Roswell. WDA executive director Hubert Quintana said Thursday that members of his group are pleased with the ruling.

They're gearing up for an appeals process, that Stilling predicts could take the case all the way to the U.S. Supreme Court.

He said under state rules, the tribe could file objections to court

findings within 10 days. "After judgement is entered they could ask for a new trial," said Stilling, noting their next step would be to file in appeals court.

Village manager Frank Potter, in Santa Fe on other water-related business, said he was in the State Engineer's Office when the ruling was delivered. He said it was good news for Ruidoso, since none of the diversion allowed in the ruling comes out of the Rio Ruidoso.

Potter said the judge used Ruidoso's economic report as part of his findings.



EDITORIAL

Sometimes the truth hurts; and the truth is the village economy is depressed. It will take heroic measures to turn it around.

During a meeting Thursday of the Municipal Airport Planning Board (MAPB), a member of the real estate community presented some devastating figures to show that real estate sales have declined more than \$40.5 million in Ruidoso in the past three years. That's a 52 percent decline, a large loss in revenues through taxes on commissions and a pretty good indicator that this little village needs a boost.

"Don't publish those figures," advised another real estate agent at the meeting. Maybe he was kidding. But maybe he wasn't.

We must not bury our heads in the sand and, like ostriches, pretend everything is going to be all right. It's time to face facts, make some difficult choices and move forward.

The depressing figures were a prelude to some optimistic projections related to a proposal to develop a golf course on the old airport land. The presenter, along with almost everyone in the audience, asked the MAPB to take advantage of a "chance in a lifetime" to have an outside developer bring new money into the community and develop a golf course. He projected the course could benefit the village economy to the tune of \$4 million a year.

Members of the MAPB are in danger of mirroring themselves in the details of the development of a golf course and resort hotel. They talked Thursday of which comes first—airline service, a hotel or the golf course. They began dismantling the golf course plans to make room for this and that on the property. This could take a long time.

We believe the function of the MAPB is to accept or reject concept proposals, make recommendations to the Village Council and then proceed with site development, zoning and other considerations. Negotiations can't proceed without council approval of any project.

And, the truth is, we need to get on with it. It's not everyday that a developer offers to invest millions in a town with little or no risk to the community. We'd better take advantage of that offer.

It's time for the MAPB to make a positive recommendation to council, so the multi-million dollar project can begin to benefit the village economy.—fj

Letters to the editor

DEAR EDITOR:

I've been intending to write a protest letter for several years now, but just haven't gotten around to it—partly in hopes that the problem would go away and partly because I realize that trying to get the problem corrected would be as difficult as curtailing the IRS's ability to issue "rulings." The problem, very simply, is that I (we) am being forced to pay for service that I am not receiving, to a company by law, does not have to be competitive. Under most circumstances such business practices would be highly illegal, but not when it's done by the U.S. Postal Service!

Throughout most of the United States and its possessions, delivery of one's mail to one's home or place of business is taken for granted. In fact, the cost of providing such service is a part of any request for postal rate increases. Even our farmers and ranchers way out in the boondocks receive a form of home delivery, but I don't. In fact, I have to pay extra for a mailbox in a location convenient to the Postal Service but not to me, plus the cost of my transportation to and from that inconvenient location, for me to receive my mail. When all the mileage and other costs are figured, it would be just as cheap for me to arrange for home delivery in El Paso or Albuquerque and drive there once a month to pick it up.

Historically, a private box in the post office for the receipt of one's mail was for security and confidentiality for the customer who preferred picking it up rather than having it delivered somewhere else. It was then an "extra" service, for which one rented a box. And all because I live in Ruidoso or some other Smalltown USA that has no political benefactor insisting that the Postal Service deliver the service it's being paid to provide. If the Postal Service was truly a private business, it would be investigated for deceptive advertising, fraudulently charging for services not rendered and violation of anti-monopoly laws. I wish it could be so investigated.

I am not unreasonable about most things and would even be willing to compromise on this one. If the Postal Service absolutely cannot provide the service here locally that they do almost everywhere else, then I would be agreeable to a decrease in local postal charges to pay them for the service actually provided and to reimburse me for my inconvenience and direct costs in helping them transport the mail. Of course, to make it really equitable, anyone mailing anything to Ruidoso or Smalltown USA should also receive a discount for lack of service to be provided as they will be mailing the item to the town, not to the individual. Before I get off

the subject, one other annoyance comes to mind. Yesterday, after standing in line to have a letter weighed so I could affix the proper postage (over 40 cents), I open my box and received an unsolicited letter advertisement weighing half again as much for which the company had paid the bulk rate of 13.2 cents. That really made my day, especially when I stopped to think that even that piddly amount was a legitimate business deduction from their taxes!

I intend to mail a copy of this letter to my elected representatives to solicit their support in correcting an unfair situation. I hope everyone who agrees with the rationale will do the same by simple clipping this letter out the paper and mailing it.

Before I get off my high horse, why is there a telephone toll charge to and from Capitan—a distance of less than 20 miles? Moriarty, Mountainair, Estancia and Pena Blanca are all within the Albuquerque local rate area. Hondo, Dexter and Hagerman are all within the local rate area of Roswell and all across the state, most of the smaller communities within a reasonable distance of a telephone central office enjoy being within the local call area. Even Bent and Glencoe are within our local call area, but not Capitan. It appears that, not only the quality, but also level of telephone service one receives is dependent upon who provides it—US West or Contel. I believe that is an-

other business practice that someone should look into.


