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Voters choose school boards, vote on bonds

Incumbents win locally

not lower than the last election in 1987.

Ruidoso voters elected incumbents Lynn Willard and Rod Adamson to positions four and five respectively. Willard received 225 votes of which four were absentee and Adamson was reelected with 268 votes (including 12 absentee).

Other candidates for position four—Eloy Candelaria received 37 votes; Wanda Lynn Moore received 15 votes and Katherine Travis received 210.

For position five, the other candidates Bernita Deaton received 49 votes and Susan Lutterman received 170 votes.

Of the 3,677 registered Ruidoso voters, 490 cast their ballots for the

board candidates.

The positions on the Capitan Board of Education will be filled by incumbent Preston Stone (position one) with 282 votes and Ron Roybal for position two with 277 votes.


The \$1.825 million bond question failed with 260 votes against the selling of bonds to construct a middle school and 179 for the sell of bonds.

Vicki Hall, also running for position one, received 170 votes and Bartley McDonough, running for position two received 167 votes.

Of the 1,532 registered Capitan voters, 462 went to the polls.

Snow-Go, a snow blower shoots median leftovers into a waiting truck to be hauled away. The used equipment, normally costing \$180,000,



Racetrack gets \$2 million facelift

Construction crews redo barns, grandstands

Ruidoso Downs Race Track is undergoing some major improvements.

Marketing director Mark Doth said last week the track is investing close to \$2 million in refurbishing everything from the barns and stable areas through the public areas downstairs to the Turf Club upstairs.

"You'll see dramatic improvements," said Doth, describing some of the construction under way as crews ready the facility for a May 13 opening.

The winner's circle has been moved from the spectator side of the track to the center where it abuts the area where horses don their colors for a race. The grandstands are getting a fresh coat of paint and some new seating.

New concession stands and additional public restrooms are being constructed, and the old restrooms are being rebuilt. A new hamburger stand and a new pizza stand are among additions to the concessions.

The mutuels windows have been removed and rebuilt with a more open concept, replacing the recessed cubicles with their small windows.

The Turf Club is getting new paint, new carpet, new and improved restrooms, additional mutuels windows and a "horseshoe bar."

In the barn area the roads are being paved and manure beds have been added in each section. The beds, concrete slabs with railroad tie walls, are expected to be an improvement over the dumpsters used to dispose of manure in years past.

"They should improve sanitary conditions," said Doth.

Old trailers in the barn area are being removed, and at least one barn has been gutted and is being rebuilt using prefabricated walls and gates.

Since the track kitchen is being moved to the sales barn, the area where the old track kitchen was housed will be used for larger offices for the track security department. The sales barn also will house new racing offices and the stewards' office.

"We're using all area contractors," said Ruidoso Downs General Manager Rick Henson. He said Ruidoso Building Corporation has the general contract for the project, with work being performed by Ben Hall, Mark's Painting, Ruidoso Electric and Townsend Plumbing. Bill McCarty is under contract to do the drainage and other work in the barn areas, said Henson.

Doth and Henson promise racing fans a beautiful and comfortable facility, as well as free general admission, when the gates open on the 1989 racing season at Ruidoso Downs Race Track.

Planners are confused over duties

Members of the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) continued to wrestle Monday with how they fit into the process of developing the old airport land.

Commissioner Frank Kolb, who also chairs the Municipal Airport Planning Board (MAPB), questioned how P&Z and MAPB fit into the whole scheme of approving and developing a use on the large tract of municipal land that once was the airport.

Cleatus Richards, planning administrator, said MAPB reports directly to the Village Council. He said a concept plan, once OK'd by the council, will then be submitted for P&Z to approve as preliminary plans.

Kolb said he has a concern that some members of the public, and even the mayor, don't understand the sequence of events that includes several public hearings.

"People would like to know the steps we have to take and when we're going to take them," said Kolb. Richards said P&Z won't consider the proposed golf course development until the concept is approved by MAPB and the council.

He said MAPB has established policies that call for a public hearing, and one is scheduled at 7 p.m. Wednesday, February 15, at Ruidoso Middle School.

If approved, then the golf course development will have to be reviewed by P&Z and compared with the Master Plan already adopted by the council. He said when the concept moves into a preliminary design plan, then P&Z will conduct a public hearing and make a recommendation to council.

If council accepts the plan of development, then the negotiations can begin, leading to a final, firm agreement between the developers and the Village of Ruidoso.

Richards said the continued involvement of both planning groups is imperative to be sure the concept is carried out as agreed.

P&Z members discussed the extension of Warrior Drive through the property, with Chairman Robert Donaldson noting that Rick Henson, representing the golf course developers, mentioned the possibility of eliminating that public street. The extension is a part of the village Transportation Plan.

"I still think Warrior Drive is mandatory," said Donaldson, and Richards added the access to the property is critical.

"Basically, we have to tell them what we need and give it back—they're the experts," said Donaldson, joking that Richards may have a future as a golf course designer since he redesigned the plans submitted by Jim Colbert Golf Inc.

"I made a tougher course out of it than they did," said Richards.

In discussions over opponents of the proposed golf course, Donaldson said members of the public should be told that the village just purchased land near the Grindstone Canyon Dam to be used as a municipal park.

"We're surrounded by a half million acres of national forest," said Donaldson. "People can't see

beyond the golf course ... the economic impact. It's an economic enterprise that's going to benefit the community," he added.

"It's just an amenity you have to have to attract conventions," said Commissioner Greg Pertee.

"This is going to be wonderful," said Donaldson. He also commented on some of the "stupid questions" being asked about the proposal.

Commissioner John White said some conflicts may be over whether the golf course proposal is a part of a package. He said he sees it as a stage in the development.

"We're looking beyond a golf course—even beyond the civic center to transportation," said Kolb.

Also Monday the commission discussed where a hotel/convention center should be located, and voiced concern that a liquor license won't

be available to a facility located next to school property.

Richards said a plan for a 47,000+ square foot center designed by Dick Weber and Larry Goodman is being used by the village in its request for state funds.

"I don't know if we have sufficient need to support the facility," said Richards, noting the plans exceed the immediate needs of the village. "We can always scale back," he said.

"We wouldn't want to think small," said Donaldson.

In discussions over funding for a center, Leon Eggleston, village division head, explained the ordinance that established the economic development fund that matches lodgers tax collections each year. He said that money could be used for bonding, but the bonds would be hard to sell, since the general fund

Police Chief offers advice for safer winter driving

Winding curves, rain, snow, ice and heavy traffic are but a few caution signs for mountain motorists to be aware of while driving a car.

Ruidoso Police Chief William Newman discussed some basic rules for defensive driving. Some rules are familiar, but other Newman points will surprise even the veteran mountain driver.

"The most common accident we have in Ruidoso is the front to rear collision," said Newman. "Most of these occur on Sudderth, and sometimes on Mechem, when a car is making a left turn into a driveway or a private parking area and the car behind is either following too closely or just not paying attention, then rear ends the car making the turn."

Newman said following too closely or traveling at speeds too fast for the condition of the road is the biggest contributor to this type of accident.

The winding roads of the mountain demand motorists slow down below what even speed signs indicate.

"Mechem, north of Bennett's Grocery, is a good example of a posted 40 miles per hour area that leads all the way to Alto that is, in my view, a little fast," said Newman. "A good defensive technique, even if the road is dry, would dictate that you not drive that stretch of road at 40 miles per hour. The main reason for slow driving in this area is the sight distances."

"There may be someone coming out of a side street or a parking lot and when you're traveling that fast, you just don't have enough time to react."

"If you were to drive from Walmart to Alto five miles per hour under the speed limit, I doubt if you would lose more than three minutes," Newman said. "That reduced speed would go a long way in preventing accidents because of curves and sight distances."

Newman said the three most im-

portant rules in driving on snow and ice are, "slow down, slow down and slow down."

"When the weather conditions deteriorate, our bad driving habits become exaggerated. If you slow down on ice and snow, there are some things you can't prevent from happening, but the consequences won't be as serious," he said.

"You have to give yourself more time. If it takes you five minutes to drive to work, give yourself 10 minutes on an inclement day. And give yourself more distance. A safe distance following a car on dry pavement is not going to be safe in wet, icy or snow packed conditions."

"If you find yourself coming in to a curve too quickly, if there is no other traffic, use the entire roadway," Newman said. "That's better than losing control of your vehicle."

"There are signs on Alto hill that recommend 25 miles per hour. That's way too fast for snow and ice. You would have to reduce your speed to 10 to 15 miles per hour," Newman said.

"The next most important thing you can do on ice is stay off the brakes. The most efficient braking a vehicle obtains is just prior to the time the wheels lock up," Newman said. "The new vehicles have anti-locking brakes where a computer senses the correct brake times. If you lock your brakes on ice, it doesn't matter whether or not you have a four-wheel drive, you're just along for the ride on an out of control 3500-pound ice skate."

"A mistake that we see quite often from motorists with four-wheel drives, is that they think they can go faster because they can get more traction than the vehicle with a two-wheel drive. Once they hit those brakes and lock the wheels, it doesn't make any difference, the vehicle will be out of control."

"The proper braking technique for downhill traveling is to slow down even more. If you have a standard shift, gear down rather than use brakes. If you have an

automatic transmission, I think it is best to put your car in neutral and then be very gentle with your brakes," Newman said.

"You can feel when the wheels lock up and you begin to slide. When that happens, ease off. You can ease yourself down a hill without problem unless you lock the brakes. It takes practice and it also takes a lot of self discipline. You don't want to make any sudden moves. Always think gentle movements, with your steering wheel, your gear shift, with your clutch and your brake. That ties into giving yourself more time to start with."

"I don't think the rules of defensive driving are any different whether you're driving on a freeway or a New Mexico mountain road. Conditions may profile the importance of good defensive driving," he said.

Newman said to be careful of assumptions.

"Never assume the other driver is going to do the right thing. That becomes even more important with inclement conditions. That other driver may not be able to stop at a sign under certain conditions, regardless of their intentions."

Newman said driving too fast or too slow can make you a hazard.

"Another good defensive driving technique is to move at the speed with the flow of traffic. That's why freeways have minimum and maximum speeds," he said. "Changing lanes is very dangerous, whether you're doing it or causing other people to do it."

Newman summed up thoughts for defensive driving in inclement conditions.

"If motorists would slow down during adverse road conditions, give themselves more time and more space than normal; don't make any sudden movements in braking or steering; and lastly, don't assume anyone is going to do anything. They might not be able to."

Hudson trial delayed, DA asks for extension

Jury selection, slated to begin last Monday in the Steve Hudson murder trial, was canceled because of snow, and District Judge Richard A. Parsons has continued the trial.

Assistant district attorney Scot Key said he's asked for a six-month extension because of the weather. The case was nearing the six-month rule limit, so Key said he will ask the New Mexico Supreme Court to allow the extension.

"We didn't want to have any tragedy with a juror," said Key.

He expects the Supreme Court to act favorably on his motion, noting weather is something beyond his control.

He said defense attorney Gary Mitchell has agreed to the extension.

Hudson, accused of killing his brother, remains in the Lincoln County Jail. Magistrate Judge J.R. "Jim" Wheeler freed Hudson on bond after binding him over for trial in district court, but Judge Parsons revoked that bond and returned the suspect to jail.

Congressmen comment on Lincoln Report

Allegations in a recent study critical of United States Forest Service (USFS) management of the Lincoln National Forest is the target for discussion this week in Washington, D.C., by Senator Pete Domenici, Republican, Senator Jeff Bingaman, Democrat, Representative Joe Skeen, Republican, and New Mexico Department of Agriculture Secretary Frank DuBois.

The report alleges that Lincoln Forest service managers have ignored private property rights, spoiled the environment, harassed opponents of forest policies and used favoritism to distribute federal range improvement funds. The report also alleges that Lincoln Forest officers have alienated many forest service users including ranchers, sportsmen, business people and environmentalists.

"The Lincoln Report has raised serious questions about forest service management and I believe these allegations must be thoroughly investigated," Domenici said. "The forest service has now initiated its own review, which is being conducted by the forest service review team. I trust that the report from this task force will be as thorough and professional as the Lincoln Forest Report. These problems must be solved and I am confident they can be resolved," he added.

"The information contained in the state's review of the forest management is very serious," Skeen said. "I will not ignore the complaints of ranchers and private citizens who feel the management of the forest is often unfair and over zealous. But we must maintain an open mind toward the situation until the forest service's own review comes out. At that time, I will decide what further action, if any, needs to be taken."

Bingaman mirrored Domenici's and Skeen's views and expressed confidence in the review team to produce a comprehensive report.

"I have spoken with regional forester David Jolly," Bingaman said. "I have confidence in his office's commitment to thoroughly and fairly explore and respond to the allegations, should they prove valid."

The review team, appointed by the Southwest Regional forester, is made up of two private citizens and two USFS employees.

Their findings are expected to be published in April.

Councillors want a golf course, planners list questions/concerns

The Ruidoso Village Council is unanimously in favor of a proposal to build a golf course on the old airport land.

After hearing in a public meeting a proposal from Jim Colbert Golf, Inc. and R.D. Hubbard, presi-

dent of Ruidoso Downs Racing, Inc., the council last week unanimously adopted the following resolution:

"Whereas, the Village of Ruidoso has been offered a Jim Colbert Golf Course to be built on the Ruidoso Municipal Airport Land; and,

"Whereas, the Village of Ruidoso, Governing Body, believes

that the Golf Course along with a hotel, and air service will bring the economy out of its current slump; and,

"Whereas, the Village of Ruidoso, Governing Body is going forth with plans for a Convention Center to also be located on or around the Ruidoso Municipal Airport Land.

"Now, therefore, be it resolved that the Governing Body, Village of Ruidoso, meeting in Regular Session, Tuesday, January 31, 1989, endorses the concept presented by Mr. R.D. Hubbard, on January 25, 1989, at the Municipal Airport Planning Board public meeting, to develop the Ruidoso Municipal Airport Land."

The golf course plan, complete with the council's stamp of approval, is being reviewed and discussed by the Municipal Airport Planning Board (MAPB) and the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z).

The MAPB has identified a preliminary agenda of issues over the golf course proposal. They include:

1. Retention of land for convention/events center, hotel site, easements, roadways, trails and other uses.
2. Infrastructure/utilities

3. Water
4. Package versus stand-alone golf course

5. Incentives including tax abatements, utility extensions, lease terms
6. Sell or lease

7. Safeguards to village
8. Acquisition of adjoining lands

9. Proposed development as it relates to Transportation Master Plan
10. Simultaneous development of golf course, hotel, convention/events center and the beginning of scheduled (subsidized) air service

11. Financing of facilities/items that would be paid for by the Village
12. Environmental concerns

The board, on January 27, sent a list of issues and questions to the group that is proposing the golf course. Besides the above issues, that list included a list of questions submitted by the public.

Those concerns range from water issues to questions about projects in other towns and impacts on village residents and businesses.


Citizens will have a chance to comment on the proposal during a public hearing at 7 p.m. Wednesday, February 15, at Ruidoso Middle School.



Pendergrass were the two successful candidates for the two open positions on the Hondo Valley School Board of Education. Gomez received 114 votes and Pendergrass 75. Ballots were cast by 166 of the 438 registered Hondo voters.

Eugenia O. Vega and Nick Serna were the successful candidates for the two positions on the Carrizozo Board of Education. Vega received 132 votes and Serna 161. Votes came from 357 of the 937 registered voters.

Corona voters passed the ballot question imposing a school district tax. Board winners are Sherry Luera with 95 votes and Melvin Johnson with 104. Of the 256 registered voters, 187 voted in the Corona election.

Lincoln County Clerk Martha Proctor said no problems were experienced during the election.



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

Time runs out for agreement

Time is running out for an agreement between the city of Alamogordo and the village of Capitan.

The two municipalities have been embroiled in a seven-month dispute over the use of a water line which transmits Bonito Lake water to the city, and which carried Eagle Creek water to the village.

A major problem is the determination of how much Eagle Creek water flows through the lines, as it mixes with the Bonito Lake water.

Alamogordo sent a bill to Capitan in June charging the village for the water.

Outraged, Capitan Mayor Benny Coker, refused to pay the bill and the argument between the municipalities began. The village claimed the 1957 agreement with the city for use of the waterline was still valid. Alamogordo claimed the agreement was outdated and no longer in effect.

The arguments culminated with Alamogordo closing and removing the water line valve to Capitan, effectively shutting down the village's water filter.

Several meetings between the elected officials of both municipalities have created much rhetoric but few results. Water was restored to the village filter, but no new agreement was reached.

The latest round of arguments, in the form of letters exchanged between the municipalities, accentuate the stalemate.

After an executive meeting in mid-January, the Capitan trustees told Alamogordo (by correspondence) they considered the terms of the 1957 agreement still valid.

Alamogordo quickly responded with a letter saying the 1957 agreement was terminated and the city was operating under a 60-day negotiating period agreement, which was extended 30 days to February 20.

The letter further read the city would disconnect the Eagle Creek/Capitan water tap February 21 if no agreement was reached.

However, before any agreement for Capitan to use Bonito water, Alamogordo insisted the village seek approval of a temporary permit for an alternate place of use by the State Engineer. Alamogordo said Capitan should bear the cost of the "citizens efforts to obtain approval." The estimated cost of the permit is \$1,500.

If an agreement is reached, the city will undertake "good faith efforts" to obtain the permit.

Alamogordo acknowledged the Bonito water was used to maintain the Capitan water filter in the past, however, the city stated certain technology exists which would permit Capitan water, from other sources, to be cycled through the filter plant.

The letter addressed the city's well pumping schedule and the Fort Stanton water supply. Capitan claimed Eagle Creek water, as well

as Bonito Lake water, is supplied to Fort Stanton.

Alamogordo asked the village to produce copies of the metering records reflecting the water provided to Fort Stanton during 1988. The city also requested a copy of the contract for furnishing water between Eagle Creek Intercommunity Water Users Association and Fort Stanton, which has existed since at least 1964.

The letter concluded the city would reach an agreement with Capitan only as a total package which addresses all concerns. Any "point by point agreements would need to be considered in relation to the whole," the letter read.

Since the Bonito Lake water was disconnected, the village has used its well as the sole source of water. Saturday, Capitan village water supervisor discovered the water level in the village storage tanks was lower than expected when the well is pumping. Suspecting problems with the submersible water pump, Davenport checked.

Sunday, the village had Reamy well drilling Company pull the pump, and discovered the motor burned.

Mayor Coker said the problem is a routine pumping problem and will be repaired before storage in the three large village tanks is depleted.

By Wednesday, the parts were received by the village and the pump was being repaired.

The Capitan junior varsity team defeated the Lake Arthur JV 57-45. Owen Russell scored 10 points and Nathan Fuchs scored nine.


The Capitan-Weed home game Saturday night belonged to the Tigers 76-54.

Family food facts available

When it comes to food and eating habits, parents are teachers, providers, directors and models, points out Betty McCreight, New Mexico State University Cooperative Extension home economist in Lincoln County.

"Unfortunately, we aren't born knowing how to teach our children good eating habits that will last for the rest of their lives. Parents are often unsure about how to interest children in new foods or don't know what nutrients a growing child needs," McCreight said.

Now there is help from the NMSU Cooperative Extension Service in a new learn-at-home pro-

gram called "Food for Tots," a series of four letters that will be mailed to parents of preschool children each week beginning March 10.

There is no charge for the letters, however those wishing to receive them must register with the Lincoln County Extension office, in the Lincoln County Courthouse Annex by February 20. Registration can be by writing the office at PO Box 217, Carrizozo, New Mexico 88301, or by calling the office at 648-2811.

The letters discuss the many roles that parents play: as models, pointing out that children often copy what they see and hear; as

directors and stage managers, noting that pleasant mealtimes encourage good eating habits; and as providers, parents control what food comes into the home. The final letter answers a series of commonly asked questions about child feeding. The answers are based on nutrition research.

Priscilla Grijalva, NMSU Cooperative Extension food and nutrition specialist, encourages parents to talk about their own food habits, likes and dislikes, as well as involve children in discussions about food choices and food preparation tasks as the child is able to perform them.

The Warriors had to forfeit the 125-pound class.

The Warriors were forced to put an inexperienced Chris Salas in the 130-pound class and Salas lost his three matches.

Nick Herrera followed and lost two matches and won one by forfeit.

The Warriors forfeited the 135-pound match because of Rue's absence. The 145-pound class has been forfeited all year by the Warriors.

At 152 pounds Pete Baca lost all three of his matches.

"Baca just didn't have any intensity in the tournament," said Ames. "He wrestled hard, but he's another wrestler who has been ill lately and has not fully recovered. Pete could beat those kids."

The Warriors had a total of six forfeits.


"We've been here before," said Ames. "That's getting me through this year. Next year everyone is going to wonder what happened because these kids will be so much better. I know that."

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Valley church has colorful history

No one would be surprised to see signatures from around the world on a registry in any of the formidable churches in big cities throughout the country. Many might be surprised, however, at finding such signatures at a tiny church in Glencoe.

St. Anne's Chapel, the Episcopal church on Highway 70 in Glencoe, has seen visitors from every state in the union as well as many countries throughout the world.

The stately little chapel is the oldest in the county, according to Father John Penn, rector of the Episcopal Church of Lincoln County. It was built in the early 1930s and dedicated in 1934, according to Nellie Jones, whose family founded the church.

Jones said in one week there were signatures from Hong Kong, Germany, Yugoslavia and Scotland.

One couple from Denton, Texas, stops by several times a year. When their sons were small they began taking yearly pictures outside the church by the pillars to record the growth of their sons. Now the sons are grown with children of their own.

Jones' grandparents, Frank and Helena Coe, along with the J.B. Tully family, founded the church. Tully was Mrs. Coe's brother.

The Coes first came to Lincoln County in 1882, before there was a church building, said Jones. Area residents conducted services at 'Grandmother' Coe's house, she added. The Tullys and others would sometimes host the congregations.

Dan Storm, whose family came

to Glencoe in 1924, remembers attending services in the Coe home. Storm's mother, Bertha Kennedy Storm, was the first organist for the church, and Dan Storm has been one of the church's lay readers since 1946.

In the beginning the group depended on circuit ministers or ministers who happened to be passing through on horseback to lead the congregation. When St. Andrews was built in Roswell, the rector, Father Frederick Howden, drove to Glencoe Sunday afternoons to lead services in the homes.

St. Anne's was built from local rock taken from Devil's Canyon,

which runs behind the church. The building has survived two floods. One, in 1965, came when Eagle Creek, which runs through Devil's Canyon, flooded. A building next to the church and a house across the highway were washed away.

About 50 communicants attended the church when it was built. Howden, still at Roswell, became the first rector.


Howden left the church to enter World War II with New Mexico's 200th Artillery. He was in the death march at Bataan and died in a prisoner of war camp.

After Howden left, the priest from the Mission of Transfiguration

at Fort Stanton conducted services. Fort Stanton always had a priest who was chaplain to the merchant marines stationed there.

The connection with Fort Stanton eventually left St. Anne's with a historic gift. When General Black Jack Pershing was stationed at Fort Stanton he donated his field kit to the chapel there. When the chapel was closed, the field kit was given to St. Anne's and the pewter chalice from that kit is still used for services.

Father Penn, from Ruidoso, is the current rector for the chapel, as well as the other Episcopal congregations in Lincoln County.

WDA will meet Monday in Hondo

The Water Defense Association, scheduled to meet Tuesday, has rescheduled that meeting for 7 p.m. Monday, February 13, in the Hondo Schools gymnasium.

Attorney Richard Sims will be present for the meeting to discuss the recent ruling in the water suit involving the association, valley water users and the Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe.

Sims and members of the WDA board have said they believe the decision, which limited the tribe's current water rights to just over 1,372 acre feet with 975 for future needs, is fair. But President Wendell Chino, in a news conference last week, revealed plans to appeal that ruling.

The WDA has incurred expenses of more than a half million dollars in defending water rights of individuals throughout the Hondo basin. It's estimated the appeals process could take the case into the 21st century.

The Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe is asking for 18,000 acre feet of water rights and has described plans to extend agricultural operations into the Rinconada and Pajarita. Retired Supreme Court Justice LaFel Oman ruled the plans aren't economically feasible.

Meetings of the WDA are open to the public.



The Plant Corner

Dear Sally; I really have enjoyed your two columns on Palms. Thank you for the many helpful details. I would appreciate similar information about Ferns. I believe ferns and palms would make great "companion" plants. Thank you, Billie Jones.

Dear Billie Jones; You are right about ferns and palms making good companion plants. They both love humidity as well as many other similarities.

Ferns are among the oldest groups of plants in existence and can be found practically anywhere from just at sea-level to the tops of mountains.

There is evidence of a renewed interest in growing ferns, both as house plants and outdoors. For Ruidoso we will consider only indoor plantings.

Most ferns are decorative and undemanding. They are grown for the grace and beauty of their fronds, which more than compensates for the lack of flowers.

There is a very wide range, from the stately, slender blade of the Heart's tongue (Scolopendrium Vulgare) to the fragile, lacy beauty of the Maidenhair (Adiantum Capillus-veneris). Yet when compared with the rich, exotic appearance of many other kinds of house plants, almost all ferns create an air of relaxation and delicacy. Ferns look their best when grouped together in individual pots or planted in one large container. Ideal growing conditions would be to place them just under and along side your palms, which you have already provided with proper light and so on.

Soil: Repotting is done only when the roots completely fill the pot, preferably at the beginning of the growing season. If repotting is not indicated, just remove the surface layer of soil and add a top-dressing of fresh potting mixture. This will help to eliminate some of the salt build-up and potential pest hide-outs.

A good general mixture is made up of one-third peat moss or finely ground bark, one-third coarse sand and one-third potting mix number two. To this add some vermiculite to help maintain a moist conditions and also allow oxygen to get to the roots.

Water: Ferns should be watered regularly with small, frequent waterings, to keep a good moist condition. Never allow the soil to become water-logged as this may

cause rotting of the roots.

Humidity is essential for their well-being, and you can provide this in a heated room by standing the pot on a large saucer of pebbles or gravel that is kept constantly wet. Frequent spraying with distilled water adds humidity and cleans dust from the fronds.

Light and temperature: All ferns recommended here will grow well in a minimum temperature of 50 degrees, although some can, in fact, stand even colder conditions. No fern can survive for long in hot dry air.

Since their natural home is in shady places, ferns should be kept away from too much sun, and can be positioned almost anywhere in the room except on a sunny window sill. They love the overhead light of a sky-light or a tube gro-bulb.

The fronds will be prettier if allowed to reach up to the light before they make their arch. They prefer a good bright light but out of the sun.

Fertilizer: Add bone meal at least once a year at the beginning of each growing period as you add the fresh soil on top or when repot-

ting. They love organic fertilizer and will show a deep green color if they get proper feedings. Let the fronds tell you when to feed.

Pests: If kept clean and in the proper environment they are hardy and resist pests. However, ones to watch for are aphids, white flies, spider mites and scales. Should any of these pests persist after washing the plant with soap suds and a clear water rinse a few times, the plant and pot should all be destroyed.

The pest must not be allowed to travel from one plant to the others. All ferns look best if groomed; remove dead or injured fronds. These are hiding places for pests to get their start.

Propagation: The simplest way to increase your fern collection is by dividing thick clumps when repotting. Some ferns send out rhizomes which root and grow new plants. Others produce little bulbils on the fronds. These grow into young plants with roots; they can be detached and planted elsewhere.

Growing ferns from spores is slow and rather difficult, but can be done at home given proper conditions.

Next week I will give you instruction on a few of the more popular species. So hang onto this column and I will finish next week.



DEAR EDITOR:

I would like to thank Tammy Bairmann for her January 30th "Letter to the Editor", about the safety and security of our children at school. Being the Mother of 4 beautiful children, I too share similar concerns.

The major concern I have at this time is the location of an 18 hole golf course right next to White Mountain Elementary and Intermediate School.

My husband is Greens Keeper for the Alto Condominiums which are located around the Alto Golf Course. He is very familiar with the application of fertilizers and herbicides that are frequently applied to keep a golf course green and weed free. Many tons of fertilizer and herbicide are applied frequently throughout the growing season to maintain these desired conditions. On every bag of the fertilizer/herbicide, (AKA WEED & FEED), mixture, there is a warning to wear protective clothing and the use of a respirator when applying this product. Also on every bag are precautionary statements:

HAZARDS TO HUMANS AND DOMESTIC ANIMALS! Specifically: DO NOT INHALE DUST! Environmental Hazards: Do not apply directly to water. Do not apply when weather condition favor drift from target area. Do not contaminate domestic or irrigation waters. WOW, what kind of warnings are these?

Do we want our children running and playing next to a golf course that is frequently applying these hazardous chemicals, not knowing from one hour to the next when a gust of wind might further distribute these chemicals to the surrounding areas, and subject our growing children to a potential hazard? I think not!

I have heard my husband complain of dizziness, itchy skin, burning eyes and an overall weakness after being exposed and working around these chemicals. It saddens me to think about the sacrifices to his health (and the environment. He says that not only weeds are killed by herbicides, but any broad-leaf plants in the area can be affected by a wind drift. Also, the potency of commercial WEED & FEED is much higher than domestic brands. The state requires a license to distribute these potent chemicals and golf courses use commercial grade.

What about the ground-water contamination? Where does the run-off of these herbicides go?

There is surface water running all the time in front of White Mountain Schools, Ruidoso High School and eventually ends up in Rio Ruidoso on its way down for irrigation purposes. Have you ever been around a pond on a golf course? There is very little if any LIFE in it. Why do you think that is? If we have heavy rains like last year, where will the rain from the golf course run off to?

I hope all these questions can be satisfactorily answered so there is no doubt in our minds that a golf course adjacent to our children's school playground is not in any way a potential health hazard.

I'm all for economic growth in Ruidoso, but not if it's a method that forfeits the health of our children and environment. As responsible parents we need to look at the whole picture. The heartland of our community is at stake here. In many ways we are building the future of our village for the children. Has anyone asked them what they would do with the land? I did, here are some of their answers: "I want to ride horses there and grow more trees where lots of birdies can live." "I want to visit my friends in their treehouse and ride my bike there." "Tell people not to drive their cars around here because I want my grandfather to play with me." Words of Wisdom! I wonder if the land would agree with the children?

Will future generations find that chemical hazards near schoolyards outweigh the financial gain?



Food bank feeds the needy

"We try to make sure children get fed," said Charlie Reich, president of the Lincoln County Food Bank.

Reich was recently re-elected president of the group of volunteers that uses all donated funds and food to stock a pantry in donated space at the First Presbyterian Church on Nob Hill. Since October, the Food Bank has served 600 people.

"We've just been besieged in the past four months," said Reich, adding the average number of people receiving food is 120 to 150 each month. All the cash donated to the Food Bank is used to purchase food for the needy in the county.

"We don't support people, but we do help people with temporary needs or in an emergency," said Reich. He said volunteers try to give applicants about a week's supply of food, since it currently takes from two to three weeks to get food stamps.

"Every donation goes to the people," stressed Reich.

And donations are always needed. Among items needed are peanut butter, canned soup, fruit, vegetables and tuna, spaghetti sauce and noodles, juice, breakfast food, eggs, condiments,

coffee, tea, cocoa, baby food and toiletries.

Locals get a 'Close Up' view of D.C.

"You don't see it until you start walking down. And you see only black granite. I felt so sad; I didn't know anyone whose name was on there, yet it touched me to see how many people had lost their lives."

As she spoke of her first visit to the Vietnam Memorial in Washington, DC, Rhonda Johnston grew reflective. This experience and visiting the Supreme Court remain in her memory after a week-long visit to the nation's capital during Inaugural Week.

"The Court was in session," she said, "and it was fascinating to see how the Justices questioned the lawyers about the constitutionality of their cases. It wasn't like an ordinary courtroom; those Justices are really impressive."

Her expression brightened. "When I was in law school, way back when, I never dreamed I would witness an actual Supreme Court session."

Johnston and Ronnie Maskew were two Ruidoso teachers who went with nine high school students who experienced a week in DC as part of Close Up Foundation, a program for teachers and students to learn about government face to face.

Johnston, who substitutes in the Ruidoso schools, learned about her program through her daughter Sarah, one of the nine. Johnston presented a program to the January meeting of Federated Republican Women of Lincoln County. Sarah has been invited to speak at First Monday, area Republicans' monthly social.

A self-described patriotic person, Johnston eagerly accepted this opportunity to visit the nation's capital during this history-making time.

"It's the highlight of all the things I ever studied in school or did in politics," she observed.

For example, "the streets were hung with huge drapes of bunting, it could have been main street in any home town. Kids were everywhere, all the people were out smiling—everyone had such good feelings. We all felt proud that this was our America."

Close Up is a combination of sightseeing and seminars. Among the historic places they visited were the Library of Congress, the Smithsonian, Kennedy Center at night, Capitol Hill, Lincoln Memorial and the National Archives, resting place of the Constitution and Declaration

of Independence.

"They're fading!" she exclaimed. "You can barely read them or make out John Hancock's famous signature." She paused, "I hope they never fade from our memory."

At the Vietnam Memorial, Johnston wasn't prepared for the emotions she would feel.

"Mementos were everywhere, including flowers, notes, even a helmet. We were told the mementos will be collected and put in a museum. Those two things, the Supreme Court and the Memorial—I'll always remember."

A member of the Episcopal Church of the Holy Mount in Ruidoso, Johnston looked forward to visiting the National Cathedral, the largest Episcopal church in the nation.

"What fascinated me was all the furnishings were made and donated by the people of the nation," she said. "I was particularly taken by the needlepoint kneelers. Each depicted a famous American except one, Winston Churchill. And they have a Children's Chapel where everything is scaled down. And it was all hand-made. It was really touching to think of everyone creating and donating these beautiful objects."

She also was surprised to learn that the Episcopal cathedral "holds services for all faiths. Even Jewish services were held there when their synagogue was being remodeled."

Since this was not just a tourist trip, Close Uppers attended seminars with various political leaders including Congressman Joe Skeen and Senator Pete Domenici.

Topics discussed included the proposed Congressional pay raise of 50 percent, bail-outs of the savings and loan associations, recovery of the oil-producing state and nuclear waste disposal.

Skeen discussed the Waste Isolation Pilot Project (WIPP) slowdown, saying "problems are coming from Albuquerque and Santa Fe, not from the Second District (Skeen's district)."

Domenici discussed "at-risk" legislation that would allocate funds to school districts having problems with drop-outs.

Close Uppers also attended a media seminar geared toward the classroom. University of Maryland professor John Splaine demonstrated the effects of TV pictures on viewer's perceptions of

new events.

"It was eye-opening," observed Johnston.

Johnston, Republican County Chairman, was quick to point out the trip was non-partisan.

"In fact," she quipped, "I was the only Republican in with lots of Democrats."

She was highly complimentary of Close Up.

"It's a large program, but not well-known. And they have programs for everybody, not just teachers or students. I'm collecting information for anybody who's interested."

"The program is outstanding. You learn so much about government and you see so many things that were part of your history class—it's a very patriotic experience."

Costs to participants are kept low because the project is funded by corporate sponsors such as RJR-Nabisco and others.

"I'd like as many as possible to take advantage of these programs. It makes a well-rounded citizen when you're presented with all sides of an issue," said Johnston.

Looking back on her DC week, Johnston sorted out her impressions.

"Seeing the transfer of power—it was peaceful, so smooth, no trauma involved. The system works like it's supposed to. It was so marvelous to be a part of it. To think that our government functions so well—and is in place after two hundred years and is still working! You can study it all your life...but when you see it, it really means something."
