



Planners prepare for public hearing

A handful of dissenters faced off with the Municipal Airport Planning Board (MAPB) during a meeting Wednesday.

"The feedback I'm getting is you don't like what we're doing," said board member Cece Griffin.

"The nine people on this board are Realtors, contractors, artists and financiers. Most trust us to have some knowledge and intelligence," she continued. "None of us enjoy the long process, but no one is trying to railroad you."

Griffin responded to audience comments on the golf course site changes presented by Dick Campbell, representative of Jim Colbert Golf.

MAPB is the village board charged with overseeing the development of the old airport land adjacent to Ruidoso Municipal Administrative Center. The group currently is reviewing a proposal from Jim Colbert Golf to develop a public golf course on the close to 160-acre site.

Campbell, in response to questions and concerns voiced by village staff and board members, delivered the new site plan Wednesday. Although the plans have changed, the concept remains the same—a private company developing the old airport site. That concept was endorsed, by resolution, by the Ruidoso Village Council at its last meeting.

Frankie Jarrell is named editor

Publisher Ken Green announced Friday his appointment of Frankie Jarrell as editor of **The Ruidoso News**. Former editor Al Stubbs will remain on the staff part-time, serving as business editor.

Jarrell has been a member of **The News** staff for more than four years, and has been on the village beat for three years. She has covered everything from local clubs to state officials and water issues.

"**The Ruidoso News** is a vital voice in this community, and I take the responsibility of covering and reporting on local events and issues very seriously," said Jarrell. "I am excited and challenged by the opportunity to serve as editor," she added.

Jarrell is a graduate of Monterey

High School in Lubbock, Texas, and attended Texas Tech University, where she majored in journalism. Jarrell won first place in column writing in New Mexico Press Association competition in 1985 and 1986, and was second place in feature writing for 1988.

She is a member of the New Mexico Press Women. Jarrell serves on the board of directors for Ruidoso Altrusa and the Family Crisis Center, and is vice-president of the Ruidoso Mountaintops Gymnastics Booster Club.

Jarrell is married to Louis "Bud" Jarrell who works for D.T. Collins Associates as a surveyor and draftsman.

The Jarrells have three children: Catherine Jarrell Hanna, an at-

torney in San Francisco, California; Charles Jarrell, a journalism major at New Mexico State University in Las Cruces; and Bethany Jarrell, a freshman at Ruidoso High School.

Green said Stubbs, because of health problems, will be working part-time.

Stubbs, a member of the New Mexico Press Association Hall of Fame, has more than 20 years experience on New Mexico newspapers. Former editor of **The Roswell Daily Record** and the **Alamogordo Daily News**, he has served as editor of **The Ruidoso News** for six months. Green said Stubbs, after his recent surgery, opted for a position requiring fewer hours and "less stress."

School Board OKs Miller's contract

Sid Miller will continue to be superintendent of Ruidoso Municipal Schools.

Following a three-hour executive session Thursday, Ruidoso Board of Education members Stormy Edwards, Don Swalander, Lynn Willard, Rod Adamson and Mike Morris unanimously approved a one-year contract extension for Miller.

School finance director Karon Snow said the financial terms of Miller's contract will be considered when the 1989-90 budget is drawn.

Meeting Thursday, rather than Tuesday (because of the board election), the board also approved the 1989-90 school calendar.

School will begin for students on Thursday, August 24. Labor Day holiday is set for Monday, September 4. Thanksgiving holiday begins with early dismissal November 22 and students return November 27.

Christmas break begins with early dismissal December 22 and concludes when students return to school on Monday, January 8, 1990.

February 23, 1990, is scheduled for teacher in-service day with no school for students. March 13-16, 1990, is spring break. And the last day of school is Friday, June 1, 1990.

Hall says session is off to slow start

State Representative Ben Hall, in a telephone interview Sunday, said things are off to a slow start in Santa Fe.

Hall, a Republican who represents the Village of Ruidoso and an area that stretches to Artesia, said House Bill 2, the budget, is set for discussion today (Monday). That's a week ahead of schedule, but the bill, which includes the entire state budget, still has a long way to go as it makes its way back and forth between the two houses and on to the governor's

office. Hall serves on the Transportation and Business and Industry committees. The Transportation Committee passed on the State Highway Department budget that is included in the proposed budget.

Hall said Business and Industry has dealt with about 20 bills so far. While there are a number of gambling bills under discussion in the State Capitol, none have had hearings before the Business and Industry Committee yet, although that's one of the committees that will be expected to rule on the various proposals before they're put to a

vote. Hall said bills vary from wide-open gambling in resort areas to a state lottery and video gaming, but he hasn't heard details of any of those proposals.

The Village of Ruidoso, in several meetings over the past few weeks, has revealed plans to ask for \$4.5 million to develop an 87,000 square-foot civic center. Village staff and officials spent part of last week in Santa Fe, but Hall said he hasn't seen a Ruidoso bill.

Hall said village officials didn't visit him, and haven't asked him for help in acquiring the funds.

"Perhaps they gave it to Jim Martin. I haven't seen the thing," said Hall.

The village has a contract with lobbyist Mike Runnels, but Hall said he hasn't asked him to carry a village bill.

A week ago, when village manager Frank Potter, consulting engineer John Shaw and Councillor Jess Stinson were in Santa Fe, Hall said they visited with him and said they would be coming back with the civic center proposal.

"I am going to try to get a little



money to do some more restoration at Fort Stanton Training Center and Hospital," said Hall. The state provided some funds last year to restore the historic buildings, and Hall said he's asking for more during this 60-day session.

"I'm sure teachers will get a raise—I don't know to what extent yet," said Hall.

He said the house and senate agreed on a raise for the rest of this year, but the Attorney General ruled the process they were using was unconstitutional since the teachers are already under their various contracts.

"I don't know if the legislature can come back and redo all those contracts," said Hall.

House Bill Two includes a four percent raise—money included for

local school boards to allocate—and the legislature is assuming that increase will go for teacher raises.

The budget presented by the House Appropriations Committee is \$23 million more than the revenues, said Hall. He said a tax increase would be needed to meet that budget, and Governor Garrey Carruthers already has said he'll oppose any tax increase.

"On opening day he said this is how much money we've got—take it to the limit, but don't go over that," said Hall.

"They should have come up with a budget to fit the revenues," said Hall, adding everybody in state government wants raises.

"We'll just have to wait and see," said Hall.

A bill has been introduced to provide a salary for state law-

makers who are now paid only per diem.

"It's strictly up to the voters," said Hall, adding that legislative pay would have to be changed through a constitutional amendment approved by state voters.

A bill passed through the house Friday that would allow liquor sales on election day. That bill has to go through the senate, said Hall who opposed the measure. He said most wouldn't abuse it if bars were open on election day, but there are a few that would.

"Some people might get drunk and forget to go vote."

Hall said close to 1,000 to 1,200 bills introduced in both houses.

"There's not too much excitement yet," said Hall.

The 60-day session isn't half over yet.

Handicapped skiers rely on donations

The Ski Apache Handicapped Skiers Association invites the community to warm-up with the "hot" enchiladas they're serving during a fundraiser today (Monday) at Cree Meadows Restaurant.

Lunch is served from 11:30 a.m. to 1 p.m. with dinner from 5-8 p.m. Tickets, \$5 for adults and \$3 for children under 12.

The 13-year-old association depends entirely on private donations.

Director Diana Person said Ski Apache provides a building, utilities, free lift tickets for instructors, and students under 18, and half-price lift tickets for participants 19 years and older. But equipment is the most expensive part of the program, said Person.

For example, a set of "outriggers" which are Canadian crutches (forearm) with a flip ski attached cost \$130 a pair. Skis are regular skis adapted with a hook and eye to hold them together for participants who need help in controlling the direction of the skis. The set-up costs \$40 a pair. Skis are provided by Pro Ski Sports and Mountain Ski Shop.

This year, Person said Don's Pharmacy donated

two walkers which were equipped with skis for participants who need a walker.

"Local shops and people around town help with the custom-made skis," Person said.

A lot of the equipment must be specially machined. Truman Bob at the Ski Apache maintenance shop does most of the work. "The special equipment requires a lot of repair," Person said.

The costs begin to add up. With 223 students of all ages so far this season, the 60 volunteers and three paid ski teachers are busy with their one-to-one instruction.

"With the therapy, people realize a lot," Person said.

Students get "tremendous enjoyment out of life."

The handicapped person finds a more socially acceptable position with their peers, especially school-age students.

Skiing also is one of the few sports which families can enjoy with their handicapped child, Person continued.

And the benefits continue, too numerous to count, said Person. She said support from the community is essential to the program.

meeting.

All discussion Wednesday, including the site changes, was in preparation for a public hearing at 6:30 p.m. Wednesday, February 15, in the gymnasium of Ruidoso Middle School.

Audience present at the Wednesday meeting challenged the council endorsement and demanded written proof of Colbert's and R. D. Hubbard's commitment to the project. Hubbard, the new owner of Ruidoso Downs Race Track, is a stockholder in Jim Colbert Golf, and the plan to develop a golf course in conjunction with a resort hotel is his.

At least one audience member wanted the original letter of intent from Colbert, written in September, 1988, published to make the public aware of the actual conditions. It was learned one condition set forth in the letter was a 30-year lease of the old airport land to Colbert Inc.

Village attorney John Underwood said he was waiting for action by MAPP to pursue any written proposals. "I can't do anything until I'm authorized by the board," he said.

MAPP Chairman Frank Kolb said the board would make no recommendations until after the public hearing.

However, members Jerry Shaw and Don Shaw said enough public comment has been made to go ahead with the concept. "We're beating a horse to death here," Don Shaw said.

Board member Rick Evans disagreed, saying he wants to give the public time to speak.

All members agreed the concept should be given "conditional ap-

proval," but the Village Council has final say.

Revisions included yardage reduction on the golf course, deletion of the extension of Warrior Drive from Hull Road across the old airport site to Highway 37 (Mechem Drive); extension of Kansas City Drive to White Mountain Drive, ingress and egress locations from Highway 37 and Kansas City Drive, relocation of the proposed hotel, civic center and parking.

Site Concept Plan 2 shows the proposed golf course to have less yardage than the first proposal. However, Campbell said the course still would qualify as a "championship" golf course.

The layout and quality of the course is not a determining factor in bringing professional golf association tournaments, Campbell said. Support amenities such as sponsorship, economic incentives, television broadcasts and other resort facilities determine the locations.

Ruidoso village manager Frank Potter explained the extension of Warrior Drive was deleted because three land tracts would have to be acquired, a process requiring a minimum of four years and funds the village does not have.

The extension of Kansas City Drive, the street east of Village Hall which intersects with Cree Meadows Drive, will be along the east side of the proposed golf course to intersect with White Mountain Drive, west of the White Mountain School complex. The street will allow access to the proposed golf course without intersecting the facility. Also no condemnation or acquisition of private lands will be involved in the extension, Potter said.

The biggest change involved the

location of the proposed hotel and civic center. The first proposed site plan showed the hotel/center complex on the Blaugrund tract. Because of the close proximity of the tract to residential areas and a school, the site was eliminated. Zoning laws prohibit the sale of alcoholic beverages within 300 feet of a school tract, and the Blaugrund tract is located just south of the White Mountain track field.

The new site proposed for a hotel/civic center complex is on the south and west side of the proposed golf course, with easy access to Mechem Drive. Campbell said the complex and large parking areas will be close to Fire Station Number Two. The entire complex, including parking, will require about 20 acres.

Other concerns included the utilization of removed runway materials, environmental impact, economic feasibility, marketing of the golf and hotel facilities, green fees, hotel amenities and definition of debt duties for the golf course.

Campbell said his company was considering the course in Ruidoso only at R.D. Hubbard's request, not because of the village's population. Hubbard requested the course to stimulate interest in the area and as a marketing tool for the Ruidoso Downs Race Track. He also assured environmental studies would be made.

A time limitation for the project also was considered. The project could begin in May, if the concept is accepted, Underwood said.

Campbell said golf course projects are dependent on growing seasons.

After Campbell concluded his presentation, MAPP reviewed the

"critical path" for the proposal consideration, which will be presented at the public hearing.

"All development proposed for the Municipal Airport must be submitted first to the Municipal Airport Planning Board which is responsible for overseeing the planning, marketing, and development of the Municipal Airport property. As the Municipal Airport Property is designated as a Planned Unit Development area, the Planning and Zoning Commission is required to review, hold public hearings, and recommend to Village Council on such development with respect to conformance to the Comprehensive Plan, Transportation Master Plan, zoning Code and Subdivision Regulations," reads the critical path document.

The step by step procedure for consideration of the golf course, hotel and civic center development and street system was given to all members. The procedure provides for board, commission and public reviews of the concept, preliminary and final plan.

P&Z will review the concept plan at 3 p.m. Tuesday, February 21, during a regular meeting.

Items of consideration at the public hearing Wednesday include the golf course development by Jim Colbert Golf/Golfscapes; area for civic/event center; area for hotel development and street system to serve proposed development.

Recommendations, with attached possible conditions and comments, will be made by MAPP for consideration by the village council following the public hearing. Recommendations also will be directed to P&Z.

Review by P&Z will assure con-

formance to applicable codes and ordinance and to advise the developer of conditions and comments in preparation of the Preliminary Plan submission. P&Z will advise the village council and MAPP of their recommendations.

The village council will review all recommendations and may further instruct developer on preparation of preliminary plans.

The preliminary plans include phase one, the golf course development and phase two, the hotel development. Phase one including the lease arrangement, project schedule, a proposed performance bond, public improvements and/or expenditures required to support proposed use and the economic impact of the proposed development.

Phase II includes the development of the hotel covering the scope of development, assurance, marketing to determine economic feasibility, public improvements and economic impact of proposed development.

The final plan approval and issuance of a Planned Unit Development permit occurs when all specifications have been approved by village staff and planning administrator; the lease agreement is approved by the village manager and attorney; a performance bond or other financial guarantee is deposited with the village and complying plat of the proposed development is presented for approval.

Work on Phase I can start when the permit is issued. The minimum time for completion of all required actions by MAPP, P&Z and the village council is approximately 100 days.

Schedule and time may vary depending on the developers' response time to approvals and conditions of the various reviews and

hearings.

Campbell assured all members and audience at the Wednesday meeting, "for peace of mind," Colbert would build and equip the course and provide references. Campbell said his company is "well-known" for its integrity. "We've had no problems anywhere."

MAPP members discussed the format for the upcoming public hearing. Comments will be limited to three to five minutes for each response, with no second comments allowed from the same person until all have spoken. A podium and microphone will be located near the audience.

Underwood suggested the original Hubbard proposal (of September 1988) be the starting place, then the council's intent of endorsement will be considered.

"All have the right to say their piece and address the long-term use of public lands," Evans said in response to an argument between Don Shaw and Underwood about the council's recent endorsement. Underwood said the council's intent was not to take away any power from MAPP, Shaw said the endorsement did not appear that way.

Corrine Swearingin, audience member, challenged the board to be "Devil's advocates" and look at all aspects of the proposed development.

Audience members David Morin and Joe Reeder also said the board needs to consider all proposals before acting.

On a final note, Morin said he was impressed by what has been done so far, but he sought a "clarification."

"I haven't heard quite enough," he said. The public hearing begins at 6:30 p.m. Wednesday, February 15, at Ruidoso Middle School gymnasium.

Mountain Intermediate School teacher Phyllis Morgan and consisting of staff from all schools, proposed the calendar based on a questionnaire given to all personnel. The results of the questionnaire were tallied and the majority thought school should begin two days earlier than in 1988; the half-day before Thanksgiving be retained; a full two-week Christmas vacation be included, spring break occur in March between the end of the third semester and the beginning of the fourth semester; a long weekend at Easter and the basic time frame of the school year, beginning at the end of August and ending at the first week of June be retained.

Board member Adamson complimented the committee for their efforts.

Sandy Gladden and Likis Bowden presented the agenda for the region-wide in-service day scheduled for Wednesday, March 1, at Ruidoso High School (RHS).

Gladden said personnel from all schools in Region IX; Capitan, Carrizozo, Cloudcroft, Corona, Hondo Valley, Ruidoso and Tularosa, have been invited to attend the all-day workshops. Programs designed for all staff—teachers, administrators, secretarial, custodial and bus drivers—are planned.

Programs include AIDS research, Elementary writing skills, beginning photography, Project Wild (by the New Mexico Game and Fish Department), Apple Computers in the classroom, car care for

the mechanically handicapped, Lost Treasure of Victorio Peak, "Hot" legal issues in education and so on.

Gladden said she expects up to 600 people to attend the seminars.

In other business, the board: —Certified the board election results as correct, verifying the election of Rod Adamson and Lynn Willard.

—Approved hiring Bonna Dell Ortega as the Johnson and O'Malley (JOM) aid at Ruidoso High School, with money from the \$14,000 JOM fund. Simon Simms, JOM representative, also requested some type of communication network be established to inform isolated Mescalero students about delayed school on snowy days. Simms will work with Don Weems and Mike Gladden about this situation.

—Hired Bob Arnett as RHS custodian, after approval of Gabe Marquez's resignation.

—Approved Charles Imo as half-time bus driver. The board discussed the qualifications of bus drivers. All drivers must meet certain requirements on their driving records, completion of first aid courses and the defensive driving course before being licensed as certified bus drivers. Imo will drive for contractor Earl Allison.

—OK'd special operation budget increases for textbooks; and budget transfers for the Drug Free program and special education.

The next board meeting will include installation of new board members and is scheduled for 7 p.m. Tuesday, March 14, at the administration office.

Exercise is RX for good health

Classes are just what the doctor ordered

Many medical problems originate with lifestyle, including overweight conditions and headaches, according to Jeannie Whitwam, owner and operator of Ruidoso Athletic Club (RAC).

Increasingly, modern medicine is looking toward preventing problems before they happen or to abate problems before they become serious.

That's why Whitwam said she has invited guest instructors to teach special exercise classes.

Candy Jacobson began a class Tuesday geared toward persons 50 years and older and who are overweight. Jacobson said many have minor medical problems and have limited movement

abilities.

She thought about this kind of class for about a year and began developing a program.

The class philosophy is to preserve the quality of life for all ages. With the current focus on youth, Jacobson would like to shift that emphasis.

"Vitality comes from movement. I want to get these people back into certain kinds of movement."

Part of the class will involve aerobic conditioning, with the other segments dealing with flexibility and strength training.

She plans personal contact for the first 30 minutes of each class—for an exchange of ideas and to act as a catalyst on what the students need.

The most important part of her class or any other exercise program is self-motivation, said Jacobson.

Making wellness a part of lifestyle is of great importance, she said.

"I believe we're better citizens as a whole if we're healthy, in a holistic manner; with nutrition, physical and spiritual assessments," Jacobson said.

Although the class is brand new for her, Jacobsen has studied and taught Yoga for a number of years.

Her class is scheduled at 10-11 a.m. every Tuesday and Thursday, in the aerobics room at the RAC. Memberships are available from the club.

Elaine Garrity will teach a somewhat different exercise class—one where students are referred by a doctor.

Most of her students will be women who suffer from headaches.

Dr. Lance Kirkegaard contacted Garrity and asked her to develop a class to help people who suffer from severe headaches. Kirkegaard suspected many of the headaches, which often have little relief with medication, are associated with a lack of upper body strength.

Considering the head weighs an average of 12 pounds, Garrity said some women who have long, thin necks lack upper body strength to prevent tension. Lifestyles and sedentary work, such as long hours at a computer or driving, injuries and other various reasons, contribute to the headaches caused by muscle contractions.

The tension in the muscles cuts the blood flow to the head, tightening the whole area which can lead to the headaches worse than migraines.

"I believe women need to improve upper body strength," Garrity said.

Men are conditioned to develop their upper body strength, but women tend to neglect that part of their bodies, she continued. The neglect can lead to back problems

and headaches.

Garrity's class will concentrate on the upper body; the back, upper chest and neck. She plans to teach relaxation also, and each student will be advised to take a jacuzzi or a hot shower after the class, to aid relaxation.

Dr. Kirkegaard will take information from each student during the first class. Kirkegaard and Garrity will keep information for two to three months about how students are responding to the classes. The information will be compiled with hopes of publishing the study, Garrity said.

Garrity echoed Jacobson's holistic philosophy of taking responsibility for one's own life.

"There will be a lot of individuality in this course," she said.

Garrity has taught aerobic classes for 13 years in the Ruidoso area. A professional dancer in her youth, she has studied with various certified aerobic instructors, including Kenneth Cooper.

She has worked with the University of New Mexico on a study on how exercise affects men and the level of high-density lipoproteins in the system. The study was published in the New England Journal of Medicine. She also will consult Saint Joseph's and Lovelace Hospitals in Albuquerque on her upcoming class.

The class will meet at 6:45 p.m. Monday and Wednesday beginning February 20 at the RAC. Presently the class is filled with doctor-referred students. However, Garrity said if she receives enough response she might consider another class.

Whitwam said she is excited about the two classes as the RAC has never before focused on people with medical problems. She hopes the classes will create a community awareness of options for preventing medical problems.



It seems one village planning consultant, a retired oil derrick operator, had been to California and noticed that if a street had a pothole, the city was obliged to put up a sign, "beware of potholes."

Sudderth and Mechem had signs all over the place. Next to the Sierra Cinema theater in the middle of leftover construction was a sign that read, "Look other way." At the old Safeway building was another sign that read, "Soon to be cleaned." One road side sign in a clump of weeds read, "Soon to be cut." There were also various signs that read soon to be renovated, painted, washed, swept, fixed, etc.

Back at the hotel, the director of guest services made arrangements through the local fishing guides for a trip to Grindstone lake. The lake was drained at the time and the guides merely pointed to the flopping fish. The fishermen were very happy.

Ruidoso Downs Race Track was jumping. Bettors were huddled around the new monitors, sipping mint juleps, hundred dollar bills hanging out of every pocket.

Some of the money was compensation from the federal government that allowed the village to condemn 1,000 bankrupt units and to tear down the properties in an effort to restore Ruidoso to a stable community.

The dream suddenly turned to a nightmare when Alto residents, already outraged because of a petition to rename that community Ruidoso North, demanded more from Lincoln County for their tax dollar. They wanted two dumpsters for every house.

Counselors discuss teen suicide, list warning signs

Teen suicide is on the rise. Different theories exist why this unfortunate situation haunts American teens: more pressures such as drug use, sexual involvement at an earlier age, success in school and career choices at an earlier age.

"Teenagers can't really see themselves," said Eric Hankla, counselor at the Counseling Center in Ruidoso. "They tend not to talk about their problems."

Sometimes one teen suicide in a community or school will lead to others.

"Especially if a whole lot of attention is given to the suicide and the teen was a popular person," Hankla said.

A tendency not to talk about problems is characteristic of teenagers as a group.

"Peer counseling is used in some areas," Hankla said, explaining that peer counselors encourage teens to discuss problems.

At Ruidoso High School, suicide touched the students' lives recently. The suicide death of popular

athlete Guyman Kaydahzinne, alerted many to want to learn more about the danger signs of a teen who is considering such drastic measures.

Hankla said parents should look for certain warning signs, including: depression, irritability; withdrawal from peers and family; lowered school performance; insomnia (or staying up later than usual); lack of appetite or too much; dropping out of normal activities or any other behavior unusual for the person.

However, Hankla said some of the warning signs are not present in teens.

"Teens are more impulsive, they see the world differently."

Often teens cannot see themselves getting through their problems. Minor setbacks are often seen as major hurdles in life.

"Suicide happens more quickly with teens than

with adults."

At RHS, Denise Hawthorne is counselor. Following the recent suicide, she called in counselors familiar with the Apache culture. About 50 students gathered in the school community room and discussed their fears and concerns about suicide. As an on-going counseling process, video tapes concerning suicide are being shown in the classrooms.

The list of warning signs also was reviewed with the students. Hawthorne encourages students to "break the bond of confidentiality" when they suspect problems with their peers: If friends detect problems, help is available.

When a student who is contemplating suicide comes to Hawthorne, she first finds out the facts behind the student's problems, then gives them hope and concludes by telling the student that suicide is a "manipulation" to gain attention.

Hawthorne said two peer counselors, freshmen Linda Hankins and Keith Henson, are available to talk with classmates. However, the school does not have a peer counseling group which deals only with suicide. Peer counselors have roundtable meetings for drugs, sexual abuse and other topics.

Many times problems begin with the family, Hankla said.

"Parents should be accepting of the teen's interests. Even if they think it's strange, they should show an interest."

Even though teens prefer to be with their peers, parents should try to get the teen into family activities. Hankla acknowledges the activities will be different than with small children.

"Don't push the teen aside, make an effort to communicate."

Most of all, Hankla stresses acceptance of the teen. Trust and acceptance are the two most important factors in opening family communication.

And with that communication teens hopefully will not seek attention in the most tragic of ways—suicide.

Small sportsters enjoy SkiWee

Everyone in the family is eager for a ski vacation, but one. What do you do with a four-year-old?

Or—you want your small child to grow up loving skiing as much as you do, but what can you do?

The answer: Ski Apache Ski School's newest program for four- and five-year-olds, Junior Ski Wee, an all-day program that includes supervised indoor activities as well as ski instruction.

In the Ski Wee Hut behind the Lincoln Burger Stand, kids are playing "Walk Like a Duck, Rocking Chair," and other games in their stocking feet in front of a mirror or with their skis on carpet.

"These games are really exercises to develop awareness of their feet and balance," says instructor Sally Canning.

Later, when they're outside in their private snow area, those

motor skills transfer to actual skiing. The kids are balanced, maneuvering uphill and downhill.

Utilizing Montessori concepts, Canning and her assistants guide the children through the concepts of equipment, balance, edge and safety. The kids don't know that, however; they're having fun walking like a duck, making the letters I, V, or A with their feet, and other games.

After an included lunch and rest, it's "Adventure Time." The children are riding lower lifts and skiing, still thinking they're playing games. "In 'Cops and Robbers,' for example, the only way to get away is to turn."

"Our main intention is to teach children to ski. We're not a daycare or babysitter," emphasizes Canning. "We're a pre-school ski program."

"The quality of instruction that the student gets is very good," af-

firms Rick Vincent, Ski Apache Ski School director.

As in regular ski school, the emphasis is always on having fun and being safe. For example, when a parent enrolls the child, an on-the-spot check is made for appropriate clothing, gloves and goggles.

"Many parents aren't aware that fuzzy mittens aren't suitable or that goggles or sunglasses are needed even on a cloudy day," advises Canning.

"We even teach the Skier's Responsibility Code—in their own words, of course, such as we stop on the side of the street, we don't run into anyone or ski over their skis."

Each child receives a progress card at the day's end with any of 30 skills noted as accomplished.

"The parent can bring the card back here or to another area offering Ski Wee and the new instructor knows what the child can do and where to progress."

A regular Ski Wee program for six- to eleven-year-olds has been at Ski Apache for several years as part of a nationwide children's teaching standard. Junior Ski Wee for younger children, however, is unique to this area.

In its first year, Junior Ski Wee was originated by Ski School Supervisor Carla Grover who saw a need for those parents who wanted their children to grow up as a skiing family.

Cost of the program is \$50 per child per day. This includes all day supervised on-snow instruction and indoor activities from 9 a.m. till 3:30 p.m., a hot lunch, snack, and lower mountain lifts. Ski area equipment rentals are an additional \$6.

Space is limited, so reservations are advised but not required. To ensure a spot for your budding skier, call Ski Apache at 336-4356 and ask for the Ski School Desk.

Conservation staffing is explained

Greg Hausler is the district conservationist of the U.S. Soil Conservation Service, with a field office located in full-time.

A full-time federal employee, he provides technical assistance to the Upper Hondo and Carrizozo Conservation Districts in Lincoln County and to private individuals. Soil surveys, consultation for the appropriateness of proposed subdivisions, septic tank and leach field for homes and other projects are made by Hausler's office.

The districts' annual projects are planned by unpaid boards of supervisors. Their plans include different agricultural and residential land-use projects.

Funding for the districts, which are state agencies, was formerly provided by different state and federal funds. However, with recent deficits, the districts were faced with getting operational funds from other sources. In 1985, the districts placed a referendum on the ballot to allow a levy of up to one mill be placed on all properties outside of county municipalities.

Until the 1988 budget was drawn, the mill was not considered. But lack of funds lead the boards to request the levy funds for their operational budgets.

Howard Harke is the volunteer supervisor of the Carrizozo Soil and Water Conservation District. That office is located in the Lincoln County Courthouse Annex in Carrizozo.

The Ruidoso News, on February 6, listed Harke as a full-time employee. Harke is a volunteer, not a paid employee.

Clerical work for both conservation districts and for the Soil Conservation Service office in Capitan is done by Sue Stearns. In past years, her salary was financed by county funds, but with cutbacks, this budgetary item will be covered by the mill levy funds.

Stearns is paid, and carries the clerical load for both districts, and the Conservation Service.





EDITORIAL

State legislators are considering two bills dealing with open meetings and the public's access to public records. House bills 136 and 137 received do-pass approvals from the House Consumer and Public Affairs Committee, and are set for hearing in the House Judiciary Committee.

We believe those bills are important, and should be passed during this 60-day session.

Public access to information is a constitutional right that is constantly under siege. As members of the press guard that right, the citizenry should remember that public officials are serving only themselves when they choose to perform their duties behind closed doors. It's not a "media" problem when facts are hidden or public matters are dealt with in private. It's a "constitutional" problem and it affects the public's right to know.

We believe the State Legislature should pass house bills 136 and 137 as a message to municipalities, counties, police departments, hospitals, schools and every organization in the state that spends public money. An affirmative vote on those bills is a vote to ensure that public officials perform their duties in the open.-fj

I get pretty tired of all the folks who say "Now, this is off the record." Especially when they are uninformed enough to believe that any comments in an open meeting can ever be "off the record."

So, from now on, I'll be writing a column entitled "On the record..." I have no secrets. Well, if I do have any secrets, I won't be spouting off about them in a public meeting or in print.

In his "Joe Bob Goes to the Drive-In," my buddy J.B. writes just like I talk. And he wears a cowboy shirt, bolo and cowboy hat with a feather hatband. Not to mention, one of the biggest silver belt buckles I ever saw.

Anyway, old Joe treats everybody and everything with complete irreverence. I love his flippant, maybe even rude answers, to letters from his loyal and masochistic correspondents.

I like to read about his friends and relatives, especially big old Wanda Bodine (that's pronounced Bow' Deesen). I'll never forget when Wanda and her sister, Nadine, got stuck in a Mrs. Field's Cookie Shop. The rescue operation that followed paralleled the great whale rescue last year.

But those Bodine girls, according to Joe Bob, really made matters worse by scarfing down cookies and cookie dough even as rescuers tried heroically to find a way to get those women out of the shop.

Sometimes his friends have problems that mirror those of people right here on the mountain.

Just this Friday, ole Joe introduced me, via the El Paso Times, to his cousin, Cletis (that's Cleet' us) Coverdale, of Waxahachie, Texas. Cletis is just one of J.B.'s friends and relatives with great expectations for employment opportunities with the superconducting super-

collider.

A lot of Joe Bob's friends are out of work, and looking for jobs.

Joe Bob said that federal project is supposed to create 17 million jobs in a giant tunnel under Waxahachie. Cletis wants to run the superconducting supercollider. Cletis says he's a "people person," and that, along with his past experiences hauling dirt, taking inventory at the Gulf station and unloading Elks Club Christmas trees, qualifies him for the position.

Isn't that all it takes? As silly as that sounds, it kind of reminds me of the great expectations we often have for employment opportunities. I know New Mexico went after the superconducting supercollider with hopes of getting those 17 million jobs.

Right here in Ruidoso, we sometimes get a little too optimistic about employment associated with a new business. It doesn't always pan out. But then again, sometimes it does.

I've been promoting the golf course project on the old airport land, not because I think we need another golf course, but because I think we need a project to bring jobs and money into the community. I thought a golf course would employ lots of people, and would take a year or two to build.

I'm told now that a golf course is built in stages, with the earthwork being first, water system next, final dirtwork, seeding and landscaping and finishing. While the growing time will extend the project to two years, talks with a couple of golf experts indicate the construction project will equal the equivalent of a year of full-time jobs for from 10 to a dozen people—maybe a little more.

That may not sound like a lot, but I'm still impressed.

Let's put some people to work building the prettiest golf course in the state. And if those thousands of golfers don't show up to play, then the Village of Ruidoso will have a great park and a brand new water well.

By the way, I'm telling Joe Bob to send his cousin's resume along. He may be just the guy we need on the golf course project.

DEAR EDITOR:

Some may be confused, but I'm not! Mr. Cleatus Richards sold P&Z and the MAPB a load of crap about the duties, authorities and responsibilities of those boards and about the sequence of decision making regarding the use of the old airport. Prior to those boards even meeting to discuss the issue, the Council had already voted in favor of accepting the offer made by Jim Colbert to build a golf course. It's obvious, to this old boy at least, exactly how much input those boards have. **JUST SHUT UP AND AGREE WITH THE COUNCIL!**

On the issue of those boards, I hereby call for the resignations or the involuntary removal of Robert Donaldson, P&Z Chairman, and MAPB member Cece Griffin, who were quoted as decrying the "stupid questions" and "expressing outrage at the negative feedback" of opponents to the golf course proposal. It is quite apparent they are not objective and therefore unfit to hold judgmental positions.

Over the years, the voters of this town have been asked to support bond issues for water acquisition and improvement, and most recently for monies with which to buy the old airport. Except for the upkeep of our municipal park, not once has it ever been even suggested that part of that costly water would be used for agriculture (yes, watering a golf course is agricultural use), nor that once acquired, (using long-term and unpaid-for municipal bonds) the land the public voted to retain for public use would be turned over in its entirety to private enterprise. What happened to the promises and plans made for a youth activity center, picnic areas, nature trails, a little lake, light industrial development, etc? Not only are those to be scrapped, but now the Village is having to negotiate the purchase of adjacent properties, at inflated prices I'm sure, because that private enterprise wants even more. Where's the money coming from?

Less than 1/2 of 1 percent of Americans play golf more than twice in their lives and only a small fraction of those make overnight out-of-town trips to do so. As 75 percent of those who go out-of-town to golf do so in conjunction with business or shopping trips and Ruidoso has no business or shopping attraction, the numbers just don't add up. Let's quit beating around the bush and identify this project for what it really is - a publicly funded COUNTRY CLUB for the affluent and status-conscious. Perhaps Robin Leach will do a piece on it, although an investigation by 60 Minutes or 20/20 would be more appropriate. It may very well turn out that a golf course on the property is a good idea, but it might also prove to be another Bonito Lake fiasco or Grindstone

Dam debacle - both perfect examples of action without proper planning - which cost the public millions of bond and tax dollars needlessly. Let's take our time, plan it out with input from everyone, try to foresee the problems involved and then take collective pride or blame in the outcome! I repeat, if it is such a good deal now, it still will be two or three months from now.

Do all Dam, Airport, Golf Course, Used Car and Aluminum Siding salesmen attend the same school of creative bookkeeping? Why do we keep putting blind faith in the numbers they create? Remember the exaggerated number of aircraft passenger boardings that was projected to sell us the new airport? Anybody want to guess at the actual number now that we don't even have a commuter service, much less an airline? Remember how the new airport was going to be a Countywide investment and asset? Like to guess who's paying the bills now? How will our projected luxury hotel and convention center fare against the Inn - a first class joint that still has less than an economically desirable occupancy rate much of the year and a top notch golf course that is not over-utilized? If we get a luxury hotel, how will the small motel and cabin operators compete? Will the hotel pay more lodger's tax than all the little operators it drives out of business? All luxury hotels have dining facilities to match - what will happen to what small restaurants we already have? Can their owners get on the same bus out of town as the cabin operators?

Any money that I might have for legal fees is presently tied up, but if anyone can come up with the wherewithal to begin a class action suit to stop this action, I'll be glad to sign my name to it. Mr. Donaldson, my questions may be "stupid" and Ms. Griffin, I may "outrage" you with my opposition, but I'm just as dedicated to this town as you are and I don't want to see another damned expensive mistake made just to placate special interests. Actually, it may be academic anyway as it looks like the Council has acted true to form - hearing the evidence after passing sentence - and as usual, the public too apathetic to speak out. The true American sports are "passing the buck", "dodging confrontation", "avoiding responsibility" and "formulating alibis". People, get off your duffs and be heard - your ideas and opinions are just as valid as those of the "instant experts" we elected and they appointed - probably more so. Support Monica O'Reilly's petition and show up at the meeting on February 15. If you don't, then forever hold your peace, you have no bitch coming later.

DEAR EDITOR: (Part I)

An army instructor I once had said that if we were ever caught in an ambush that we should do something, even if it were wrong, as to do nothing was the worst course to take. Taking the old airport land and turning it into a resort hotel and golf course is starting to remind me of an ambush. When times are tough, perhaps we should do something, even if it is wrong, as to do nothing will allow economic conditions to wipe out even more of our Ruidoso businesses. The trouble is that when I evaluate the idea of the resort hotel and golf course, I see a few ambushes that lie ahead and which have not been addressed. To react instinctively at such times is normal because we're all feeling the pressures of the economy and we get all involved in the novelty of doing something even if it's wrong.

First off, what is being proposed is not really new or creative. We already have three golf courses within a fifteen-minute drive of the proposed new one. The rationalizations for its uniqueness really don't stand up. It won't be the largest, the most scenic or the most accessible to the common player. The resort hotel isn't unique either, as we have a bunch of hotels, cabins, motels and condos that we're not currently filling. The uniqueness comes in the fact that the hotel will get Ruidoso into the convention business; but this is not without duplication as hosting conventions is an established business already.

The real implications that I see are that jobs and income that are being projected are not additional or new but are derived from impacting established businesses. Those marginal motel owners will lose business, lay off employees who will then go to fill those jobs which are projected. Restaurants likewise will be impacted as will the existing golf courses and con-

vention facilities. There will be a redistributing of wealth away from established businesses toward this new proposed enterprise, but there will be no net gains. The same happened when Wal-Mart came to town. They offered new jobs, but when I shop there I see largely people who were here before Wal-Mart came. Wal-Mart carved up its share of the retail business at the expense of Ben Franklin, Gibsons Etc. The displaced employees were laid off and now work at Wal-Mart. The gains of one were taken by impacting others. That's the American way as long as it's done in a free market with private investment. What is being proposed is not private as taxes are required to provide the land and probably water. So those of us that are paying the taxes will be supporting the very business enterprise that will cause us economic impact. But to do nothing is the worse course of action! So what is the solution? Please look for Part II.






