



# Downs trustees discuss lost fines, missing contract

A full house addressed the Ruidoso Downs Board of Trustees on several topics during a lively meeting Monday at Ruidoso Downs Village Hall.

Judge Harold Mansell reported revenues for the village from traffic tickets are down, and complained that village police officers have been sending tickets to Magistrate Court in Ruidoso.

Several irate citizens called for firing the entire Police Department. One citizen even suggested since all the village's money is going to the Village of Ruidoso, it might make sense not to even have a Board of Trustees.

After much discussion, Police Chief Skip Hazel said he would try to work out his differences with Judge Mansell so the village would again be receiving revenue from the tickets. Mayor Jake Harris suggested the situation began when officers became dissatisfied with fines being levied.

In other business, Fire Chief Mark Hazel gave a lengthy report on information he had gathered

concerning a new firetruck the Fire Department wants to purchase. He said the truck will cost \$30,000 with the department paying half and the village paying half.

According to Hazel, the mayor had given him authority to pursue information on the purchase. Mayor Harris, however, told Hazel the trustees cannot make a decision on such a purchase until the yearly budget is approved.

Also Monday, Juan Sanchez requested a sewer hookup for a mobile home. Sanchez said he has had several discussions with Mayor Harris over the hookup, which would be on a lot that does not meet the square-foot requirement the village has for mobile home lots. Sanchez said he has leased lots adjacent to his own, but attorney Richard Hawthorne informed him a lease would not help meet the requirement. Sanchez was informed he would need to apply for a variance. The board agreed to meet tonight (Thursday), February 15, to vote on his variance request.

In other business, Bret Knight-Mark complained about a water bill that was several times higher than

his normal bills. The board voted to cut the bill in half.

Also, the trustees discussed fees for building inspector Junior Behringer. The village has not had any big building projects recently, until the racetrack construction began. Since the village could not pay Behringer a regular salary in the past, a contract was signed to give him a percentage of building permit fees. Although a contract was signed, according to Harris, the contract cannot be found.

Behringer believes he is entitled to 90 percent of the building permit fees on construction costing up to \$200,000, but the trustees contend the missing contract stated \$100,000.

Although several in the audience asked if there was mention of the contract in minutes from previous trustee meetings, Harris said nothing could be produced to resolve the disagreement. The board authorized the mayor to negotiate with Behringer.

The board then went into executive session.

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"We've been suffering at city hall from lack of communication between council and administration and council and council," said Junge, noting he has suggested the administration meet with small groups of councillors.

Junge said he was furnished figures that indicated village department budgets were overspent by close to a half-million dollars, but is still waiting for a six-month budget report he said was promised by January 17.

"I've never had any difficulty getting facts or figures out of staff," said Davis.

Potter said he is one week late with the mid-year report he submits to the state Department of Finance and Administration. He said he'll report during a workshop.

"We're running on budget where we should be," assured Potter.

In other regular business Tuesday, the council:

—Approved transferring a liquor license for Wayne Wood from 663 Sudderth Drive to 212 Metz Drive.

—Awarded the bid on an 8,000 gallon steel underground storage tank with fiberglass coating. The low bidder was Besco of El Paso, Texas, at \$7,503. Three other bids were received ranging from \$8,890 to \$9,980.

—Awarded the bid on a vented infrared heating system for the large hangar at Sierra Blanca Regional Airport. One bid was received for \$12,619 from Rhoads Heating and Plumbing of Roswell.

—Retired into executive session to discuss pending litigation.

The Ruidoso Village Council has scheduled a special meeting on a

personnel matter at 6:30 p.m. Tuesday, February 21, in council chambers of Ruidoso Municipal Administrative Center.

It was learned that the meeting, to review the firing of building inspector Jimmy Nealey, was also the subject of Tuesday's executive session.

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day's meeting agree with Colbert's ideas for the municipal land.

Attorney Mel O'Reilly was first up, presenting Kolb with a petition opposing the golf course development that was signed by 372 people. Later in the meeting planning administrator Cleatus Richards told O'Reilly he'll present the petition to the Ruidoso Village Council.

O'Reilly came prepared to report on a talk he had with Cal Taylor of New Mexico State University who indicated an interest in an extension campus emphasizing arts, music and drama; and a telephone conversation he had with State Land Commissioner Bill Humphreys.

O'Reilly, pushing for another location for the golf course, said Humphreys, who oversees the 620-acre Moon Mountain property, might be interested in leasing that land to a golf course/hotel developer.

"I don't want you to take away the last open spot where we as a community can come together," said O'Reilly.

Later in the meeting O'Reilly's comments drew criticism from Philip Mote, a member of the board for the race track and Ruidoso State Bank. Mote said he was speaking only for himself Wednesday.

"Personally, I don't think Mel (O'Reilly) can go to the bathroom unless another banker tells him to," said Mote.

Mote said a drive down main street shows that half the

businesses are closed. "We've got to get something going here," he said, adding that's just what Mr. Hubbard is trying to do.

"I don't think anybody else should speak unless they own land and pay taxes in the village," he added.

Mote's remarks went unanswered until later in the meeting when Victor Alonso disagreed with limiting input to only those who own property, saying the Constitution gives everybody the right to speak.

"This is still America," added Alonso.

Ralph Petty, president of The Bank of Ruidoso, arrived late, but went to the microphone to say that the majority of the board of his bank is in complete agreement with Hubbard's plans, noting that some on the board disagree, but all have a right to individual opinions.

"I understand there were some insults passed around here tonight, and I guarantee they're going to be collected on," said Petty. "Nobody tells Mel O'Reilly what to think," he added. O'Reilly is a member of The Bank of Ruidoso's board of directors.

And so it went, with Margaret McDonald Lahey, former village planning administrator, objecting vehemently to the plan. Lahey said the golf course will not diversify the economy or broaden the economic base and provide more jobs.

She compared developing the golf course before the resort hotel with letting the "tail wag the dog."

Lahey complained that the village has no decent playgrounds, but

Robert McDonald later testified to the need for the golf course as an economic benefit, adding: "We're surrounded by a half million acres of national forest."

He said the village is developing a park near Grindstone Canyon dam, and could consider acquiring FDIC-held land around the dam for a water recreation area.

Donaldson said the village already has \$3 million invested in the airport tract, and if the runways are removed for about \$900,000 and a park is developed the citizens will own a \$4.5 million city park.

"I've lived here since 1946 and somehow we got along without parks," said Bonnie Coe. She said a national trend is to lease public lands for golf courses because they are in such demand.

"Do we need a golf course?" asked attorney Don Dutton, adding, "Folks, we need something that is going to fill those businesses downtown."

"We're not a factory town—we're never going to be a factory town," said Dutton.

Some audience members voiced environmental concerns over the use of chemicals and pesticides on the golf course. Juanita Morin expressed concern over the effect of the contaminants on growing children, saying she'll move before it happens.

Morin called on the board to bring the development question up for a public vote.

Marion Warfield, in a dramatic plea, called on the village not to take the first proposal offered, saying the one use of the land won't

diversify the economy.

"The Inn of the Mountain Gods advertises nationally, and they are losing their butts," said Warfield. "We don't have to settle for the first proposal that comes along just because there's \$2 million on the table," she added.

Attorney Charles Hawthorne said he's ready to see the village booming again.

"Tourism is the one viable industry that Ruidoso has," said Hawthorne. "This is not just a golf course, it's a multi-dimensional project."


Jim Alston, Cleston Pritchett and Wally Hesse joined a parade of citizens calling on the board to look for other alternatives to the golf course.

Ron Andrews, Tim Hoyt, Joe Reeder and Dan Barrow were less adamant, but raised questions.

"I like to express my opinion on anything that I can," said Barney Rue, complaining about village zoning, mobile home regulations and the Grindstone Canyon dam.

Cindy Clayton, speaking for the Ruidoso Jaycees, said that group has endorsed the concept; and James Wright and Bill Andrus also spoke in favor of the proposal.

MAPB Chairman Frank Kolb told the crowd that the final decision is in the hands of the Ruidoso Village Council. The board will meet at 4 p.m. today (Thursday), February 16, in council chambers of Ruidoso Municipal Administrative Center.

# EDAB still seeks temporary facility

Village manager Frank Potter told the Economic Development Advisory Board Wednesday that Senator James Martin has submitted legislation requesting as much as \$350,000 for a Ruidoso municipal civic center.

Potter, distributing copies of a report he took to Santa Fe, said he also used the golf course development maps prepared by R.D. Hubbard, president of Ruidoso Downs Racing, Inc., and Jim Colbert of Jim Colbert Golf, Inc.

"They know about D. Hubbard in Santa Fe," said Potter, noting that Hubbard's willingness to invest millions in Ruidoso may help persuade state legislators to provide state funds for a center.

"The Village of Ruidoso has bought 160 acres to the tune of \$2.6 million," said Potter, saying the \$278,000 economic development fund also is a sign to lawmakers of the village's commitment to the proposed center.

"We have to be very realistic about this thing," said Potter. "This

is the beginning ... if we get this this year, we'll be in there next year.

Also Wednesday, EDAB member Bill Hirschfeld asked the group to clarify reports that plans for a temporary facility had been "scrapped." He said a temporary center, like the building that formerly housed True Value Hardware, still is needed, and encouraged the board to make that clear. All agreed, and asked Potter to continue investigating possible sites for a center to be used until the village constructs a new one.

Councillor J.D. James, chairman of EDAB, also wanted to clarify the Ruidoso Village Council position on the proposed golf course. He said the council endorsed the concept.

"Nothing has been approved," stressed James. "There are too many unknowns," he added.

James praised the Municipal Airport Planning Board for the work they are doing, and encouraged members of EDAB to attend a public hearing scheduled Wednesday evening.

# WDA will enter Big Horn water suit

The Water Defense Association board met Monday in Hondo to hear a report from attorney Richard Simms who represents the group in the ongoing water dispute between valley water users and the Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe.

The board's celebration of the recent victory was shortlived as they looked ahead to continuing the fight through the appeals process.

Simms said there are 36 similar water right adjudications currently in the courts, and explained one case set for hearing soon before the U.S. Supreme Court. The board voted unanimously to enter that case, referred to as the Big Horn adjudication, as a friend of the court.

Simms said the Supreme Court decision on that case will have an impact on the WDA case. Although there is no guarantee the friend of the court

status will be granted, Simms said the court will review the briefs even if the testimony is not allowed.

"It's very important that the Supreme Court know what's going on in this valley," said Simms, noting the association may save money in the long run by investing the \$12,000 or so needed to participate in the Big Horn case.

Simms also reviewed the number of issues in the recent Mescalero case that were influenced by the WDA witnesses and testimony.

"It's fair to say the WDA probably had the predominant affect on the court's decision," said Simms.

Members of the board also discussed finances Monday, noting the organization has outstanding debts and a need of money to continue the fight to protect valley water rights.

# County residents want state funds for studies

Lincoln County received two requests for community development grants at the first public hearing Monday for the 1989 New Mexico Small Cities Community Development Block Grant Program.

"New Mexico expects to receive \$8.4 million to be distributed statewide on a competitive basis. Eligible funding categories include community infrastructure (streets, sewers, water lines and so on); housing; public service capital outlay; economic development; emergency and planning.

Lincoln County and its incorporated municipalities were eligible to apply.

Monica O'Reilly, representing Environmental Action Group

Loving Earth (EAGLE) in Ruidoso, presented a letter requesting the county apply for a \$25,000 grant for a feasibility study regarding the aspects related to recycling solid waste in Lincoln County.

Hal Sims of Carrizozo requested the commissioners apply for a \$25,000 grant for a feasibility study to locate or build a tourist information center in Carrizozo.

The solid waste request qualified under the community infrastructure category and the tourist center qualified under the economic development category.

Two additional public hearings must be scheduled for these requests.

# Personnel Board to meet Tues.

The Lincoln County Personnel Board will have a special meeting at 6 p.m. Tuesday, February 21, in the Commissioners' Meeting Room

in the Lincoln County Courthouse in Carrizozo.

The meeting was called to conduct a grievance hearing.

# Shaw clarifies remarks

Municipal Airport Planning Board member Don Shaw said Tuesday that he didn't say in a meeting last week that enough public comment has been made on the proposed golf course development on the old airport land.

"I never remarked that 'enough public comments have been heard,'" said Shaw, who was quoted as agreeing with another member who made a similar remark.

Shaw also was quoted as saying, "We're hearing a horse to death here," but said Tuesday he didn't make that statement.

Planning and Zoning secretary Roseanna Pointer reported that the tape recording of the meeting indicates Shaw did make the statement, but was talking about details of how the review process should work being "beat to death," not about the actual review.

Pointer said Jerry Shaw, also quoted as saying enough public input had been heard, actually clarified why she made that remark in a previous meeting. Jerry Shaw went on to say she realizes why further hearings are needed.

# SCC gets update on racetrack

Service Club Council (SCC) members Monday heard Mark Doth, Marketing Director for Ruidoso Downs Race Track, describe changes being made at the track.

The track was purchased by R.D. Hubbard last year. Hubbard has since sold 40 percent of the track to Ed Allred.

Doth said \$2 million in improvements are being made at the track in preparation for the 1989 season. Among other things, there is new construction in the barn area and improvements are being made to

the grandstand area and turf club. Roads to the barns are being paved and everything is being repainted in a new color scheme.

This year the track will have free general admission. Doth is also experimenting with new advertising ideas, working with the Inn of the Mountain Gods and the Ruidoso Chamber of Commerce. His advertising campaign is targeting Phoenix and Tucson, Arizona, Mexico and Albuquerque.

The track is also planning various concerts, including a free Michael Martin Murphy concert Memorial Day weekend.

Doth told the SCC that he and

the track want to work with service organizations in the area to benefit various benevolent causes.

He said since the All American Sales Building is vacant the track is considering establishing a center for teen activities, such as weekly dances.

Doth mentioned the possibility of fun runs, programs for the handicapped and canned food drives. He asked for suggestions from the service organizations.

The track will be sponsoring a drug, alcohol and gambling-abuse program. Matching funds of \$20,000 each will be obtained from the Ryan Family Foundation and

the D. Hubbard Foundation to begin this program. The track will be working with the Racetrack Chaplains of America, who will send a chaplain here to help with the program.

Also, during the meeting President Barbara Duff said she was pleased that 16 organizations were represented at the meeting. Duff said a new roster, listing members, is being prepared.

The next meeting, March 6, will feature two speakers, George Puckett, new Economic Development Board Director and Betty McCreight, Lincoln County Home Economist.

# County Commission reviews airport access road

Once again roads occupied much of the Lincoln County Commissioners meeting Monday in Carrizozo.

Commissioners Bob Hemphill, Karon Petty and Rick Simpson discussed an information gathering trip they made on the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport access road that afternoon with county engineer Bill Vreeke.

Commissioners and Vreeke met with representatives of the New Mexico State Highway Department, Twin Mountain Rock (the road contractor) and the airport, to drive the road and examine problem areas, Petty said.

The contractor and highway department representatives are aware of minor problems, Petty continued. The contractor will replace certain problem areas in the pavement.

Twin Mountain is scheduled to begin the final phase of the project March 15 by replacing problem areas. The highway is scheduled to be complete by May 12.

"The road looks great," Petty said. The contractor intends to have

a quality product when completed, she continued.

Lincoln County road supervisor was invited to oversee the work.

Commissioners also took action on three road review committee recommendations. A request by Walter Jones to close county roads E-015 and F-003 located northeast of Capitan was denied because the roads provide the only access to a block of public lands.

County manager Suzanne Cox said Levi Dike of the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) requested the roads remain open to provide the access to the BLM lands.

Commissioners tabled a request indefinitely by land owner Richard Thorpe to open Forest Road 9012A, located south of State Road 37 on Nogal Mesa. Thorpe, who was present at the meeting, said he plans to construct a guest ranch but needs a passable road to make the business succeed. He also said he cannot finance the road improvements.

"I think we're all in the same boat," Petty said.

Commissioners also approved a request by Wayne Hobbs to close

Sandia Court in Capitan North Subdivision, as recommended by the Road Review Committee.

Commissioners reappointed the review committee of Bill Rawlins, Leota Pfingsten and Patsy Sanchez to review a request to open two school bus routes east of Corona.

Commissioner Simpson called for a resolution to study the repair and research funding for improvements of the Bonito Lake Road. Simpson and Petty traveled the road and found major problems with the well-traveled route to the scenic area.

Petty also called for a six-month study of a three-, five- and ten-year master plan itemizing and prioritiz-

ing road and other county needs.

In other regular business, commissions:

—Approved waiving requests for proposals for legal and technical services for the Water Defense Association. Executive Director Hubert Quintana asked the New Mexico Department of Finance and Administration to waive the state purchasing requirements to continue the services of attorney Richard Simms in the water rights litigation against the Mescalero Apache Tribe.

Quintana explained the impossibility of preparing an "Amicus Brief" for the appeals case scheduled to go before the United States

Supreme Court if the association must meet the RFP requirements.

—OK'd the Lincoln County liquor license fees (outside of municipalities): \$400 for Dispenser, \$25 for club, \$250 for retailer; \$250 for canopy and \$250 for restaurant special permits, beginning July 1, 1989 and end June 30, 1990.

—Approved Resolution 77-43 listing the maintained county roads, as required by the New Mexico Secretary of Highway and Transportation.

—Appointed Pat Hume, John White and Noema Page and

alternates Dorothy Talley and Opal Mills to the Board of Registration. The main duty of the board is to purge names from the voter registration list.

—Approved contracts for voting machine technicians Joe Gesting, Paul Baca and J.N. McDaniel. Lincoln County Clerk Martha McKnight Proctor complimented the technicians for their "reliable" assistance.


—OK'd routine payroll and accounts payable registers.

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# Construction is off to slow start this year

Building permits issued during January of this year by the Village of Ruidoso topped \$200,000 but were considerably less than during January of 1988.

The trend toward upgrading of properties through additions and remodeling as opposed to new construction continues. Commercial construction is battling zero.

Total figure for January of this year was \$203,855, compared to \$246,420 a year ago January.

The figure this year was about \$14,000 more than January of 1987.

Total building permits for 1988 in the village added up to \$4,599,763. That figure compared to \$5,656,929 during the calendar year 1987.

Residential additions and additions accounted for the bulk of permits issued last month in the village. Those accounted for

\$133,355. Only one permit was issued for a single family dwelling, in Pinecliff No. 3 subdivision. This was for \$55,000.

One permit was issued for fire damage repair in the amount of \$10,000. A grading permit was issued for \$500. Another grading permit did not have a designated figure.

Also, one permit was issued for replacement of a roof. This was for \$5,000.

March and June were big months for permits last year. March permits totalled \$359,393. June totalled \$938,900. Of that, \$642,728 were for single family dwellings.

April of 1988 was the slow month. Only \$126,606 in permits were issued.

Single family dwellings for 1988 accounted for \$2,881,572 of the total. Residential add-ons and alterations added up to \$1,238,218. New commercial came

in at \$71,700. Commercial add-ons and alterations, added up to \$247,952.

Permits issued in January of this year were as follows:

Wingfield Addition, Two-car garage with studio, \$32,455.

McCarty Subdivision, addition of three bedrooms and bath \$34,400.

Juniper Hills, fire damage repair, \$10,000.

Ponderosa Heights, room addition and covered deck addition, \$50,000.

Ponderosa Heights, room addition, \$5,000.

Palmer Gateway, replace roof, \$5,000.

Pinecliff, single family dwelling, \$55,000.

Mt. View Estates, grading only \$500.

Gavilan Hills, deck addition, \$2,500.

Ponderosa, mobile home grading, no designated figure.

January is traditionally a slow

month because of winter weather.

Permits seem to pick up starting in March when the weather warms.

Building permits by month last year compared to the same months in 1987 were as follows:

January 1988, \$246,420; 1987, \$188,943.

February 1988, \$317,390; 1987, \$221,339.

March 1988, \$859,383; 1987, \$1,274,546.

April, 1988, \$126,606; 1987, \$510,137.

May 1988, \$508,932; 1987, \$456,366.

June 1988, \$938,900; 1987, \$656,638.

July 1988, \$881,225; 1987, \$1,279,943.

August 1988, \$396,665; 1987, \$340,992.

September 1988, \$324,240; 1987, \$728,020.

Itemized figures for the last quarter of 1988 were not available.

# The Plant Corner

This column on ferns is continued from last week.

Those of you who keep these columns, as many of you say, please refer back to September 1, 1988, column for Boston Fern and to November 10, 1988, for Asparagus Ferns.

Davallia Fern also is known as Ball, Deer's Foot, Rabbit's Foot and Squirrel's Foot. These Davallia species are characterized by creeping above-ground stems, or rhizomes, covered with coarse tan or brown hairs that make them look like feet of animals.

Because the rhizomes (a horizontally growing underground stem, serving a similar purpose of bulbs and tubers) eventually extend over the edge of the container. The plants are especially suited to hanging baskets.

The dark green fronds tend to be feathery and will grow about 12 to 18 inches tall, except the Ball Fern, which grows to only seven inches tall.

Adiantum, known as the Maidenhair Fern, one of my favorites, is a very lacy and dainty plant. In fact, Maidenhair Ferns are unexcelled in daintiness, holding aloft clouds of wedge-shaped leaflets about one-fourth to one-half inch across on glossy, black, wire-like stems. The plant is a little more difficult to grow than many others, but as I've said before, worth all the effort.

The Maidenhair Ferns grow six to 20 inches tall and have exceedingly delicate fronds. I do hope I have talked you into growing one of these beauties.

Asplenium is known as Bird's Nest, Mother Fern and Mother Spleenwort. These ferns all have a feather-like with shallowly scalloped leaflets. They produce tiny bulbs on the upper surfaces of their leaves that develop into miniature plants. The fronds rise from a black, hair-like center resembling a

bird's nest. Humidity is absolutely essential for growing.

Cibotium is known as the Hawaiian Tree Fern and Mexican Tree Fern. Tree ferns spread as much as six feet, but in spacious homes and offices they are superb, allowing a tropical effect hard to achieve any other way. Hawaiian Tree ferns often are sold as four to eight foot trunks without leaves or roots. They send out shoots so tightly curled they are called "crossers," after the bishop's staff they resemble.

The fronds eventually become four to six feet long. These plants are among the few that live for years if set in water with pebbles and rocks to hold them erect.

The Mexican Tree Fern usually is sold without any discernible trunk. Its light green airy two to three foot long fronds rising directly from the soil and spreading up to five feet across.

Platyserium is known as the Staghorn Fern. In proper growing conditions they are truly a show-piece. Often seen in big offices of the "yuppy" executive, or in the kitchen or bathroom, or where humidity is higher, of most any little ole' lady such as I.

The Staghorn Fern is an air-growing, or epiphytic plant, which grows naturally on the rough bark of a tree rather than in soil. It sends its roots into the tree bark until they make a tight bond.

As a house plant they generally are grown in a wall container or hanging basket on moisture-retaining organic matter such as a bark-covered slab of wood, a piece of cork bark, a section of a trunk of a tree fern or a clump of Osmunda fern root. All these materials generally are available at garden supply centers. The fronds are antler-shaped, thus the name Staghorn.

I have offered you a variety of ferns. There are many others just as easy to grow. Good luck.

# Forest supervisor transfers amid questions, complaints on Lincoln Forest management

Lincoln National Forest supervisor Jim Abbott will transfer to the Coronado National Forest as forest supervisor at that headquarters in Tucson, Arizona, according to regional forester Dave Jolly.

Abbott has been forest supervisor of the Lincoln National Forest in Alamogordo since 1976, and will begin his new position on March 12. Abbott will replace Bob Tippeco who recently transferred to national headquarters in Washington, D.C.

Public Affairs officer Art Morrison said a replacement for Abbott could take more than a month. Morrison said candidates are selected from a national skills file and then recommendations are made by the regional forester. Morrison said these procedures customarily require a minimum of a month.

Jolly said Abbott requested the new assignment to help relieve administrative tensions on the Lincoln National Forest personnel that have resulted from the "Lincoln Report." This report was critical of management practices on the

forest. The report is currently being analyzed by a team of forest service personnel and private citizens.

The team reviewing the "Lincoln Report" will meet in Alamogordo, February 21-25, to conduct additional interviews and continue review of the issues raised concerning management of the Lincoln National Forest.

Review team leader Neil Paulson said, "We would like to give people another chance to participate in the review. I encourage those who would like to speak to the team about the report to contact me at (602) 527-7400 before

February 21."

Paulson said the team has already spent 10 days conducting interviews and studying information.

"We expect to complete our work and make recommendations to Jolly in April," Paulson said.

Private citizens Aubrey Dunn from Alamogordo and John Fowler from Las Cruces are on the four-person team appointed by Jolly. Forest service members of the review team include Paulson, who is forest supervisor of the Coconino National Forest and Darrol Harrison from the regional office in Albuquerque.

# Chamber plans March idea fair

The time and place are yet to be announced, but the Ruidoso Chamber of Commerce is planning a mid-March Idea Fair.

Sunny Hirschfeld, of the Chamber, and Tracy Moran, of the Convention and Visitors Bureau, said the two will combine to sponsor the event.

new 12-minute video which highlights attractions of the Ruidoso area. The video can be purchased or checked out by Chamber members at the Chamber office.

The Idea Fair will be patterned after a recent statewide Idea Fair.

Included will be competitions among Chamber members where members will enter logos, for instance, in competition.

for Henderson immediately.

Henderson said the decision to leave the community was not easy.

"These past five years in Ruidoso have been the best in my life. My daughter was born here. My son grew up here. I'm sure my wife agrees, these have been our best years. The community's response to us has played a big part in our lives. I don't believe that it is all tied to winning or losing. I believe we were fortunate to live in a community with caring people. We've developed good relationships that will be lifelong. We want the next years to be the same. I realize there are no guarantees.

"From a professional viewpoint, I was very fortunate to be surrounded by coaches that are loyal and hard working," said Henderson. "I'm not talking just football staff."

"I'm also proud of the relationships I hold with athletes we've coached," he said. "There's nothing more important than to have an athlete come see you and want you to know what they're doing."

Henderson stressed the personal side of athletic relationships.

## Trustees OK VFD bylaws

Capitan Village Trustees brought the Capitan Volunteer Fire Department (VFD) Bylaws off the table and unanimously approved them at the regular meeting Monday.

VFD members present did not protest when village attorney Don Dutton said certain changes in the bylaws, including the deletion of lending VFD equipment to members, were needed to comply with state statutes. Dutton will revise the bylaws and return them to the village for final approval.

All trustees, Jack Pogue, Myrl Ray, Norm Renfro and David Rouleau, and Mayor Benny Coker reviewed the bylaws and passed them with the conditions proposed by Dutton.

Paul Crown, of Lincoln Cablevision, answered questions concern-

ing the recent cable television rate increase. He said rate increases are possible without trustee approval as the rates were de-regulated in 1984. Crown also said the company can only transmit as many channels as are received.

In other business, trustees:

—Declared February as American History Month.

—Adopted the revised Open Meetings Act requiring three days notice for regular meetings, instead of the five as previously required. Notices for emergency meetings (no notice) and special meetings (72 hours) were not changed.

—Approved the official 1989 Holiday Calendar for the village: Martin Luther King Day observed Monday, January 16; Lincoln's Birthday on Friday, November 24; Washington's Birthday on Friday,

December 22; Memorial Day on Monday, May 29; Independence Day on Tuesday, July 4; Labor Day on Monday, September 4; Columbus Day on Monday, October 9; Veteran's Day on Friday, November 10; Thanksgiving Day on Thursday, November 23; Christmas Day on Monday, December 25 and New Year's Day on Monday January 1, 1990.

—Appointed Bernhard Reimann and Dick Beck to the Planning and Zoning Board and David Rouleau as Village Safety Chairman.

—Approved a call for sealed bids for used village dump truck and pickup truck.

—Announced Mayor Benny Coker's election as Southern New Mexico Economic Development District Chairman, February 7.

## Tigers get new trip bus

Capitan Board of Education Thursday extended the contracts of principals Jerry Newsom and Larry DeWees.

Board members James McDaniel, Preston Stone, Tom Trost, Hollis Fuchs and Ken Cox unanimously approved the two-year contract extensions after an hour and a half executive session at their meeting Thursday. The contracts are scheduled to expire June 30, 1991.

Much of the open meeting concerned an activity bus contract with bus contractor Frankie Silva. Presently Silva operates a 1977 56-passenger activity bus for the school. Since the bus has extensive miles on it and is considerably crowded on activity trips, the board requested Silva inquire about a new bus.

Silva presented several options, including All-American buses (Greyhound-type) which are very expensive and can carry no more students than a regular route bus. After consideration of different models, Silva said he preferred the Blue Bird model because of its

quality body construction.

The activity bus includes high-back seats with arm rests, overhead racks on both sides of the bus and a luggage compartment under the bus. Total price quoted for Silva was \$38,094. However, he said the price could be reduced when competing companies are approached.

Silva, who has contracted the Capitan school buses for 52 years, offered a five-year contract with Capitan schools which will allow him to purchase the bus. "If I can pay expenses, you pay insurance, we can leave it for Dr. Childress to figure the profit," Silva said.

Silva also said he has a "good operation" and credited much to his mechanic.

Board members and DeWees also praised Silva for many activity trips when bus transportation was provided at no cost above fuel to the school.

"I owe it to the kids to do something for the school," Silva replied.

Following discussion, the board unanimously approved a five-year contract for Silva to purchase a 1989 Chevrolet 52-passenger activity bus. The school guarantees the bus will be driven 18,000 miles

each year. Per-mile fees will be negotiated annually.

Childress said the contract will create a maximum activity travel budget increase of \$5,000 annually.

In other business the board: —Defined the responsibilities of the head coach, assistant coach and high school principal. The board abolished the position of athletic director.

"I will monitor this new plan very closely," Superintendent Scott Childress said.

—Accepted a \$10,000 endowment from deceased Jessie Faye, to be established as an ongoing scholarship fund for Capitan minority students.

—Approved Section 15 of the board policy which defines policy on communicable diseases, including AIDS.

—OK'd out-of-state travel for DeWees and Bill Stowe for eighth annual Microcomputer in Education Conference, March 5-7.

—Acknowledged the accuracy of the board election and bond issue.

—Presented a plaque of appreciation to retiring board president McDaniel for his eight years of service on the board.



## Coop's winning record—a tough act to follow

Ruidoso High School Athletic Director Cooper Henderson will soon leave the community to become the head football coach at Artesia.

Henderson said the past five years in Ruidoso have been the best years of his life and reflected on some of his favorite football highlights as head coach of the Warriors.

### 1984

"Our first year was 1984. We were the Cinderella team that had only won one game in a couple of years. Someone looked over our shoulders and we started on the right track and made it to the playoffs. Our most memorable game that year was against St. Michaels in Santa Fe.

"We played in a mud bath and the players had more fun playing than any day I can remember. We wound up with a player at quarterback that had never played the position before. The players really had a good time and all the younger team members had playing time. We won 28-0.

### 1985

"In 1985, there's no doubt the highlight that year was the Silver City contest for state championship at the Aggie Memorial Stadium in Las Cruces. It is a big stadium and the weather was perfect. Silver had beaten us by four points during the regular season and that was the only loss we had all season. The score was 21-19 and Silver threw a pass. The pass was caught within their field goal range, but the player couldn't get out of bounds to stop the clock and time ran out. It

was as exciting as any high school football game I've ever been associated with.

### 1986

"In 1986 we had a very strong team. We lost two games that season, both to Lovington. One game was in regular season, the other game was for the state championship.

"The most memorable game that year was with Belen. If I were to choose one ball game that was the most perfectly executed by a Warrior team in my coaching years, it would be that semi-final game here in Ruidoso against Belen. We beat them 42-20. We put our younger players in near the end and they scored against our second team. If I had to pick one game where you felt the training and skill of offense and defense was at it's finest, it would be that ball game.

### 1987

"We were weak in 1987. We ended 3-7, but that group improved all year long and it took an overtime loss by Silver City to deprive us from going to the playoffs. The highlight of the season that year was our win against the district champion Cobre Indians in our last game of the season 34-15. We started out a poor team and we kept getting better. We just didn't get better fast enough. Our team didn't get discouraged. They liked to play and the last game win seemed to measure our improvement.

### 1988

"There's no question as to which game was the highlight this season.

The Goddard game will always be a highlight in coaching to me because it exemplifies how much of the game is mental. When you can be defeated as soundly as we had ever

been beaten since I've been here. It was the worst we had ever been beaten 38-0. Then the turn around. It was barely a win, but it counted 24-21 in a most dramatic finish. If I

had to pick two games that were the most exciting, it would be the Las Cruces state championship and the Goddard game. I can still see everyone spilling out onto the field

after the winning field goal."

### PROGRESS

As athletic director Henderson said the entire athletic program has been steadily gaining strength at Ruidoso. He pointed to the seven district championship banners that hang in the gym. Prior to his arrival there had been one basketball banner.

Henderson said he was especially pleased at the establishment of a seventh grade intermural program.

"This is a key area in providing an early interest in sports which builds on the numbers concept," he said.

"Football may get a lot of attention," he said. "But our girls program has come further than any other segment of sports in school. The people working within this area are doing a fine job. There was a time when the girls program was not structured at the lower levels for the girls to have any skills when they reached the high school level. I'm pleased that that has changed and that this program is on such a sound footing.

"One of the areas that I'm very proud of is the way we have structured our track program. It's unique. We're utilizing coaches more effectively. Everybody in the past thought boys and girls should remain separately. I really believe a track program with boys and girls working together utilizing coaches in specialty areas is going to make our track team continue to be a lot better than other teams."

Henderson said the athletic department has always encouraged participation in multi-sports by school athletes. He said he was very proud that quite a number of students have taken advantage of the various programs."

Dorgan also qualified for the Invitational Governor's Cup to be in Vail.



The Indian coach called for one shot, win or lose. Cobre worked the ball in as the seconds ticked away. At seven seconds the ball left center court for the base line and it appeared the girl didn't quite know what to do. Finally, with time running out she shoved the ball like an overhead pass toward the net and swish, it was over. The Indians win 48-47.

## Ruidoso Downs Racetrack offers free concert, big purses for Memorial Day weekend

Fast horses and Texas-style music add up to a big Memorial Day weekend celebration at Ruidoso Downs Race Track.

Michael Martin Murphey, appearing in a free concert at 8 p.m. Saturday, May 27, at Ruidoso Downs Race Track, will be just one feature of the weekend celebration that will include big money racing with the \$75,000 added Ruidoso Downs Budweiser Breeders' Cup and the \$300,000 estimated Kansas Derby.

"This weekend will give people a great opportunity to come out and see all improvements that have been done at the track, enjoy some great races and top it off with a live performance by a well-know country western artist," said general manager H. Rick Henson.

Ruidoso Downs Race Track, under the leadership of new owner R.D. Hubbard, president of Ruidoso Downs Racing, Inc., is being improved and remodeled in a \$2 mil-

lion project. All those changes will be unveiled when racing begins on May 13.

Michael Martin Murphey, whose eclectic musical style has been influenced by Hank Williams, Bob Wills and Woody Guthrie, has had hits on both the pop and country charts. His style varies from the Austin sound to more traditional folk sounds.

According to a news release, Murphey is one of America's most cherished singers. While living in the San Gabriel Mountains and Mojave Desert, Murphey wrote songs for the Nitty Gritty Dirt Band, Flatt and Scruggs and a 22-song album for Kenny Rogers called "The Ballad of Calico." When fellow Texas and friend Michael Nesmith became one of the Monkees, Murphey wrote one of their smash hits, "What Am I Doin' Hanging Around."


In 1971, Murphey moved back to Austin, Texas, where he came

part of that city's burgeoning and energetic music scene, along with such prominent singer-songwriters as Willie Nelson and Jerry Jeff Walker. Amidst an infusion of different music styles going on at the time, Murphey was able to develop his own style—a blend of old time country and contemporary pop

which was later known as "Texas outlaw" music.

Murphey, who now lives in Taos, is involved with Indian rights and his song, "Geronimo's Cadillac," has become an anthem for the Indian Rights Movement. His respect of Indian people continues to be a strong influence in his life today, according to the news release.

The Michael Martin Murphey concert will be on the Ruidoso Downs Race Track grounds following the Saturday, May 27, racing card, and will be free to all track patrons.



## Joint venture is on the right track

A joint venture horse sale enterprise made up of the Ruidoso Super Select and the All American sales companies is going well, according to general manager Richard Thompson.

"Things are progressing quite smoothly right now and I am very excited about the sales for this summer," said Thompson, adding he is very pleased with the transition.

Last year the Ruidoso Super Select Sale Company hosted five sales with 431 horses passing through the sales ring for a total of \$4,302,100. These sales were highlighted by the Select Yearling Thoroughbred and Quarter Horse sales.

The Select Yearling Thoroughbred Sale on July 29, saw 68 head sold for a total of \$256,800.

The Selected Yearling Quarter Horse Sale on August 27, resulted in sales of 108 head for a total of \$2,925,900.

According to a news release provided by Ruidoso Downs Racing, Inc., the Ruidoso Super Select Sale Company, since its beginning in 1981, has a history of producing top quality quarter horses.

That year, Make Mine Cash, a yearling filly, was purchased for \$120,000. Make Mine

Cash went on to win seven of 26 lifetime starts, including the Faberge Special Effort Futurity, Grade I All American Derby and Grade III Miss Peninsula Handicap for a total of \$1,142,428 in lifetime earnings.

In 1982, Sixty Chick, a yearling filly, was purchased for \$16,000. Sixty Chick went on to win 11 of 15 lifetime starts, including the Faberge Futurity, Grade I Sun Country Futurity and the Grade I Dash For Cash Derby for a total of \$751,283 in earnings. She was awarded Champion Two Year Old Quarter Horse Filly in 1984.

In 1985, Florentine, a yearling filly, was a repurchase for \$90,000. Florentine was recently awarded Champion Quarter Horse Aged Mare and Quarter Horse Aged Champion in all divisions, beating Aged Stallion Bully Bullion and Aged Gelding Chingaderos. Her list of 16 wins from 30 lifetime starts includes the Grade I Golden State Derby, Grade I Rainbow Derby and Grade I World's Championship Classic. She had earnings of \$1,123,101.

In 1986, four yearling colts: Special Shake, Dashing Val, Sayin Adios and Runaway Winner went for \$29,000, \$62,000, \$10,500 and \$42,000 respectively in the Super

Select Sale. These four colts have racked up 21 wins for total earnings of \$1,165,106. Dashing Val was voted 1988 Champion Three Year Old Quarter Horse Colt.

The All American Sale Company conducted four sales last year, with 510 horses passing through the sales ring for a total of \$3,287,050. Those sales were highlighted by the All American Yearling Quarter Horse and Yearling Thoroughbred sales.

The Yearling Quarter Horse Sale was September 1-3, and 315 yearlings were sold for a total of \$1,898,050.

The Yearling Thoroughbred sale was on July 22, and 105 yearlings went for a total of \$282,250.

Since the advent of major quarter horse sales, only the All American Yearling Sale has sold a winner of the Grade I All American Futurity and has done so on three different occasions. In 1970, Mr. Kid Charge sold for \$4,100; in 1976, Hot Idea went for \$4,000 and in 1988, Merganser sold for \$9,000. Merganser was recently voted Two Year Old Quarter Horse Colt, Two Year Old Champion and World Champion Running Quarter Horse for 1988.

## Classy Comment

Rider Mike Lidberg and Classy Comment return after winning the \$9,050 John Phillips Memorial Handicap at Sunland Park. The six-year-old was timed in :19.58 for the 400 yards and

went off at better than 13-to-one odds to pay \$26.80 to win. For Classy Comment it was his second win in a row at Sunland, and for Lidberg it was his fourth win of the day.

Owned by Allen Petersen and trained by Roy Love, Act Easy rebounded from a fifth place finish in the Jeep Challenge on January 7th. In that race, Act Easy was two lengths behind Cherokee Lake who

## EDITORIAL

If village officials from Capitan and Ruidoso Downs want to attend meetings of the Lincoln County Commission, they're out of luck. Just about the first act of the recently-elected commissioners was to change the meeting time from 10 a.m. every third Tuesday to 6 p.m. every other Monday of each month.

The Monday evening meetings often conflict with meetings of Capitan and Ruidoso Downs, and that means those elected officials, village staff members and some citizens can't attend commission meetings, even if they want to. That's especially regrettable when citizens of those villages have issues they want to present to both their municipal leaders and the county commissioners.

For more than six years county leaders conducted their business during business hours, allowing people in the county to attend meetings and take care of other business in the County Courthouse at the same time. But the new commissioners said they heard complaints that working people couldn't attend the daytime meetings, and made the change to accommodate those people. We haven't heard of increased crowds at the evening meetings, but we have heard complaints over the conflicting meetings.

At least one commissioner reportedly said taking off work for the daytime meetings is a problem. That would be more understandable if the commissioners weren't paid \$8,700 a year to serve—not a fortune, but adequate compensation for taking off work to spend every third Tuesday in the Courthouse.

We urge the three new commissioners to re-evaluate their meeting time. If evenings are determined to be the best time, then we would encourage the commissioners to find a day and time that doesn't conflict with other governing bodies in the county.

Capitan and Ruidoso Downs residents are a part of Lincoln County, too; and they should be able to attend both their village and county meetings. —fj

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

DEAR EDITOR:

Having lived in Ruidoso for 28 years, and having seen many ups and downs in our village, I may not be qualified to speak up, but I have to!

We have a great asset in the old airport land, but let's not fumble the ball. There's no big hurry to rush this thing without looking at all the options. Once we commit, there's no turning back. Does anybody really believe another golf course and luxury hotel will make people flock in here? Seems like I remember one local businessman telling me, "when that new airport gets built, there will be jet planes full of tourists with pockets full of money landing every half hour!" Now there's not even a scheduled commuter plane out there. And don't forget, some of the people who pushed so hard for that airport don't even live in Lincoln County anymore. The airport is every

much a "White Elephant" as Grindstone Dam. If Ruidosians have not learned anything in the last few years, surely we have learned we cannot rely on tourism alone. It doesn't take an economics professor to figure that out. There has been such a mass exodus from this community, like has never been seen. Why? No jobs, and no hope of any jobs. What kind of jobs at the proposed hotel? Bus boys and maids? So what's left? We have got to diversify. Look for other ways to draw people. People who will live here year-around, not just visiting. I remember when Walker Air Force Base left Roswell, everybody said Roswell would dry up. Did they build another golf course? No, they went out and drummed up businesses to relocate there. How many people are working full time at the different companies out at R.I.A.C.?

If we could attract a few non-polluting, assembly-line type of factories, how many locals could afford to stay here? I've heard it said that a community's most valuable resource are their children, where will we be when all the working people that are left, flee and take their kids with them? Maybe we could shut down the middle school and turn it into Polo Grounds to go with the hotel and golf course.

And remember a poll that the Ruidoso News ran a couple years back? They wanted to know what the local people wanted to see on that property. Two of the most popular choices were a college of some kind, and parks and trails, etc. So why not have both? We could build a beautiful community college or brand of a university with room for a park-like atmosphere, with ponds, trees and bike trails. I'm willing to bet there's lots and lots of college-age people who would love to go to school here.

Just think for a minute. Almost all of the skiers who come up here

on the week-ends are college-age. Why can't we keep them up here all week? That would be a boon to local restaurants, clothing stores, etc. Where would Portales be without E.N.M.U.? Durango has a wonderful school, and Ruidoso more easily identifies with Durango than Aspen or Palm Springs. And that would give locals a chance to improve their education without driving to Alamogordo or Roswell. And it would give Ruidoso a shot in the arm just having vibrant young people back again.

If I had money to toss around like Mr. Hubbard, I'd rather have my name on a science building or dorm hall, than on the letterhead of country club stationary. And I'm just willing to bet the State of New Mexico, and maybe the nation could benefit more from a college grad than from a caddy. I just refuse to believe a golf course and hotel can pull Ruidoso out of this economic slump.

I would just like for the people of Ruidoso to think hard and long about what will happen to the land under each of the choices offered. Ruidoso cannot and will not survive under tourism and real estate development alone. The oil patch of the late 50s and through the 60s will never be a Palm Springs in our lifetime. Money is tight all over the nation, not just Ruidoso. Build something that people not only want but need. I think that need in the future will be a college education, not a set of golf clubs.

Every year something comes up in Ruidoso that reminds me of that old story. You know, the one where a country boy goes up to New York City. He can't believe his luck when some slick sells him a deed to the Brooklyn Bridge. Well, Ruidoso has already bought that bridge a time or two. We sure don't need another.

People are upgrading properties at a pretty fast clip. Room additions are common, as are the additions of decks. These two items enhance the value of any property.

The village doesn't need a whole lot of new single family dwellings or condos or townhouses until some of those on the market are moved. This will come with time.

Realtors and merchants eagerly await the return to widespread prosperity in the real estate market here.

We had a real estate license for

three years after moving to Ruidoso from Roswell in 1979. The real estate market was strong at that time up into 1982 when the market fell apart. That's the year we (that's the editorial "we" which circumvents the use of "I" so much) went back to newspapering, our (same deal) first love. The real estate years were interesting in Ruidoso, to say the least.

It was said at the time that a Realtor was hiding behind every tree in Ruidoso. The number in reality was about 250. Some were rolling in dough, others starving.

Many people think Realtors just sit back and rake in commissions without doing much work. Not so.

We can recall a few experiences which would tend to knock down that notion.

We sold a relatively cheap lot up above Brady Canyon in Ponderosa to a family from Odessa one time. The commission was minimal.

The couple wanted to put a double-wide mobile on the property which was fine. The man of the family called one day to say the mobile would be sent up from Texas and would we arrange for dirt work on the side of the mountain where the lot was located. We contacted Ed Hazel, and after much travail and work, a level lot and steep driveway were carved out of the hillside.

Next came the double-wide. The lot owner called and asked if we could get someone to put it on site from where it would be parked in the lot above the old convention center in Ruidoso Downs.

We arranged for that project, but it would be weeks before the mover could find time to tug the double-wide to the site.

So, almost daily we drove to the Downs to check on the double-wide to see if it was OK and that vandals hadn't stripped it.

Then came arranging for city water to the lot, a butane setup, electricity, etc.

That was accomplished. We kinda expected some remuneration or at least gas money from all this activity, but it wasn't forthcoming. But it added to our real estate experience. Live and learn.

In another instance, we sent a personal check to a company for house plans for a client, expecting to be reimbursed. The client decided not to build on an Alto lot, and we were stuck with the \$145 we paid for the plans. Anyone want five sets of neat house plans?

Then there was the time the seller wanted to keep a \$1,200 refrigerator in a house we sold. Our buyer insisted on having it also. We wound up paying for half of a new

duplicate of the refrigerator in question. That's pretty common in real estate. That did clinch the deal, and half a loaf is better than none.

Those were boom days in Ruidoso. Wealthy citizens of Mexico were paying cash for condos and townhouses, mainly, and Texans, from farmers to oil company presidents, were buying or building in our community. Prosperity will return if we play our cards right. We are just beginning to tap the Arizona market. Ruidoso is easy to sell.

On another front, we are happy to report that the Ruidoso Chamber of Commerce and the Visitors and Convention Bureau down there captured some first and honorable mentions in a statewide Idea Fair relatively recently.

The C. of C. took three firsts and five honorable mentions. First were for: 1. a neat brochure booming the Aspenfest; 2. print media photog-

raphy, and 3. a ski promotion on radio. The latter was a humorous presentation, according to Tracy Moran of the Convention and Visitors Bureau who showed us the stack of certificates.

Also the Phil Price Advertising Agency received two Addy media awards on behalf of the Ruidoso Chamber recently. One was for a four-color brochure, the other for a four-color advertisement in the Southwest Airlines in-flight magazine.

This writer is happy, very happy, to be back in circulation after a rough couple of months involving major surgery. We don't especially recommend Presbyterian Hospital in Albuquerque for a vacation. ## Retirement life is elusive for 'retired' minister

When is retirement not retirement? When the Reverend Dr. Jim Carroll, Presbyterian minister, is involved, that's when.

The Reverend Carroll supposedly retired as pastor of the 2,400-member First Presbyterian Church in Amarillo, Texas, in 1984. He and his wife Mildred moved to Alto in the fall of that year to what had been a vacation home they built there in 1976.

Carroll looked forward to retirement activities, cutting weeds, doing woodwork and learning how to paint "like Grandma Moses." But retirement didn't last long for the native of Pennsylvania who had pastored the Amarillo church for 20 years.

Today Carroll is serving as interim pastor of the First Presbyterian Church of Ruidoso.

He accepted that responsibility when the Reverend Winston Presnall and wife, Brynda, and children moved to Roswell last fall. Presnall had accepted a call to serve the First Presbyterian Church of Roswell as pastor.

Soon after his arrival in Alto in 1984, Carroll was asked to preach each Sunday at the Corona Presbyterian church. He accepted.

He had a little time for retire-

ment activities until the spring of 1985 when he was asked to serve as interim pastor of the Alamogordo First Presbyterian Church when the Reverend Ken Lester retired. He accepted that challenge.

He served that church until February of 1986 when a permanent pastor was installed there.

There was to be no rest for the Carrolls.

He preached his last sermon in Alamogordo the last Sunday in February of 1986. The next morning, in two cars, the Carrolls traveled to Grosse Pointe, Michigan, where Carroll served as interim pastor of the large, affluent church for a full year.

Then came a year of retirement in Alto and travel to Europe and a visit to Florida.

A year ago, Carroll was asked to serve half time in Lubbock, Texas, as "interim general Presbyter" which equates to Synod executive in New Mexico.

This involved commuting weekly to Lubbock from Alto.

The Carrolls have no plans after the church in Ruidoso locates and installs a permanent new pastor.

"Perhaps I will get around to painting and spending more time on the golf course," Carroll said.

He has already told the session

of the church here he will be gone the first Sunday in June. That's when friends in Amarillo stage the Jim Carroll Classic golf tournament. Both he and his wife are avid golfers.

It's only a stone's throw from their Alto home atop the mesa to the Alto Country Club course.

Carroll also hopes to collaborate with a son in writing a book for the clergy.

The son is John Carroll who teaches philosophy and religion at Louisiana State University.

The Carrolls here are both natives of Pennsylvania. The couple was wed in June of 1944 in the chapel of Grove City, Pennsylvania, College. They both are graduates of that college.

Carroll took his seminary training at Princeton Seminary.

His first church was one established in 1711 in Lancaster, Pennsylvania. He received the call on Pearl Harbor day, Dec. 7, 1941.

He served for 16 years as assistant, associate and senior pastor of the Central Presbyterian Church in Buffalo, New York.

The Carrolls moved to the Southwest and Amarillo in 1964 when he became pastor of the Amarillo church.

Mildred Carroll was a music teacher in Pennsylvania. This in-

cluded instrumental and vocal. Her instrument is the bassoon.

"Mildred and I have enjoyed the people of all churches. We are fortunate in having served in three different places," Carroll said.

"I have never regretted going into the ministry and serving the church," he said.

The Carrolls became acquainted with this area when they brought their daughter to church camp at Camp Chimney Springs out of Cloudcroft in the 1970s.

"We fell in love with the area," Carroll said.

The daughter is Judy who lives with her husband, Woody, in Lubbock, Texas. He is a school administrator, and she teaches violin. She plays in the Roswell and Lubbock Symphony orchestras.

Another son, James Carroll Jr., lives in Houston where he attended Rice University. He is unmarried.


John Carroll and wife, Cindy, have two children, Andrew, 5, and Anna Lynn who is almost two years old.

Of the family Carroll says, "We try to get together once a year."


That is if Jim Carroll and Mildred aren't in Grosse Pointe or somewhere else serving a church.


