County manager resigns, all commissioners concur

Lincoln County Manager Suzanne Cox resigned Monday after six and a half years.

Members of the Lincoln County Commission announced the resignation during an emergency meeting called Monday afternoon.

Commissioners Bob Hemphill, Karon Petty and Rick Simpson opened the meeting, took roll and voted to go into executive session to discuss personnel. Commissioners spent more than an hour in discussion.

When they opened the meeting, Chairman Hemphill read Cox's letter, dated Monday, February 20.

"Lincoln County Commissioners: I hereby resign effectively this date.

I have enjoyed working for the people of Lincoln County for the

past six years, five and one half months. I wish you the best. If I can assist any of you, please contact me. Sincerely, Suzanne Cox."

Petty moved to accept the resignation, which was unanimously approved. Hemphill wished Cox the best in her future.

When questioned about the validity of calling an emergency meeting to discuss personnel, Hemphill said the meeting affected the welfare of county employees.

An open meetings act resolution approved by the Commission January 9 states emergency meetings are for the "purpose of considering any matter that needs emergency treatment because of a clear and present danger to the health, welfare or safety of the people of the County of Lincoln."

Hemphill said Cox's resignation directly affected the welfare of Lin-

coln County employees and citizens.

He would not comment on the emergency meeting called to discuss personnel Saturday.

Petty also reminded commissioners of the 5 p.m. February 27, deadline for applications for county manager, road supervisor and legal proposals. Applications will be considered at 6 p.m. when the regular commission meeting is scheduled.

Monday, Hemphill said current road supervisor Tommy Hall and the manager's staff will not report directly at meetings. Hall will report to Simpson and the staff to Hemphill.

When contacted Tuesday morning, Cox declined to comment about her resignation.

P&Z favors golf course concept

The Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) voted unanimously Tuesday to approve, with findings, a controversial golf course and hotel/civic center concept plan for the old airport property. The action came after the Municipal Airport Planning Board (MAPB) approved the concept plan submitted by Jim Colbert Golf Inc. last week.

The group's findings and recommendation reflected concerns raised by members of the commission, the village planning staff and the public. They will be forwarded to the Ruidoso Village Council for further action.

Key points include the retention of the Warrior Drive extension project as outlined by the Village Major Transportation Plan and Comprehensive Plan. P&Z Chairman Robert Donaldson voiced his concerns about the concept plan proposal to eliminate the east-west connector. Calling the connector mandatory, he pointed out the need for the road to provide emergency access to the area and allow for traffic circulation.

It was also recommended that the Ruidoso School Board be contacted to discuss potential impacts on White Mountain Elementary School from the Warrior Drive extension and the Kansas City Road

extension projects. It was noted that a meeting between the School Board and the Village Council has been set for the regular council meeting Tuesday, February 28.


The commission also recommended the 50-foot buffer strip proposed by the plan to encircle the airport tract be eliminated and the 19+ acres used be consolidated into a public recreation facility.

Concerns over the location of the proposed civic center were also noted and it was recommended the site be highly visible and architecturally attractive.

Other findings included a recommendation that the village negotia-

te the purchase of the Blaugrund property, a tract of land in the impacted area. Cleatus Richards, planning administrator told the group the Colbert concept plan meets Master Plan and village zoning requirements. He also told the group that an environmental impact study by the developer is required by the zoning code for planned unit developments of this type.

In other regular business Tuesday, the commission approved several variance requests and a site development plan. About a dozen people attended the regularly scheduled meeting.

Air Ruidoso appeals FAA ruling

Helene McCoy, president of Air Ruidoso Ltd., the local air carrier that formerly operated out of the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport, has filed an appeal of a Federal Aviation Administration ruling that grounded the operation last week.

According to an FAA spokesman, the federal agency issued an order

of emergency revocation on Feb. 13 that was hand-delivered to Air Ruidoso on February 14.

"This effectively puts the operator on the ground ... and they cannot operate any longer until such time as they re-apply to the FAA and meet all of the certification requirements," said the FAA public affairs spokesperson in Fort Worth, Texas.

McCoy said her attorney asked for an immediate hearing.

"We're trying to work out the allegations," said McCoy. "We hope to be back in business very soon," she added in a telephone conversation.

The FAA said last week the alleged violations of FAA rules and regulations are lined out in a seven-page document, noting two of the primary infractions listed were

use of unqualified pilots and falsification of training records.

The FAA, as well as McCoy, said such charges can be cleared up in a very short time, or can drag on for months.

McCoy, who is operating her air service out of El Paso, Texas, until the racing season, expects to have planes back in the air very soon.


SKI REPORT

Planners hear hotel marketing strategy

Emphasizing that such a project was premature at this time, the Municipal Airport Planning Board (MAPB) heard a hotel marketing plan presentation from Economic Development Advisory Board (EDAB) member Betty Beachum at Wednesday's regular meeting.

Beachum told the board her plan was the result of an earlier EDAB session where the question was raised whether or not efforts to get a civic/convention center in Ruidoso had been coordinated with work being done to attract a major resort hotel to the area.

Phase one of Beachum's plan calls for village approval of the current concept plan under consideration that includes the development of a golf course, hotel and civic/convention center on the old airport property.

The next phase calls for publicizing that the city has a prime hotel site in the middle of the city that will be coordinated with the proposed golf course and civic center complex. Beachum suggested a list of major resort hotel developers be compiled and letters be sent on official letterhead. She told the board such a marketing effort need not be

expensive if the village utilizes local resources and expertise.

The final phase involves securing an acceptable commitment from a hotel developer.

At the conclusion of Beachum's presentation board members commended her volunteer efforts in putting together the report, but noted the MAPB still hasn't had a response on their recommendation that a conditional commitment from a hotel be a prerequisite for the golf course project from either the golf course developer, Jim Colbert Golf Inc. or the Village Council.

In conjunction with that recommendation, MAPB member Don Shaw requested Chairman Frank Kolb telephone Colbert directly and clarify a possible misunderstanding in the wording of a letter sent to Colbert last week notifying the developer of the findings of the MAPB.

Shaw voiced a concern that the letter implied that the board had recommended a number of conditions to the project be made before it was accepted by the Village Council. He noted that the board had discussed a number of possible

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Village fires building inspector, process takes six months—so far

The Ruidoso Village Council Tuesday upheld village manager Frank Potter's firing of village building inspector Jimmy Neeley.

During an open hearing, the councillors heard testimony from citizens over Neeley's attitude and cooperation. The council retired into executive session and reconvened to unanimously approve the firing that occurred last summer.

Although Potter fired Neeley in July, he has remained on the village payroll all this time. The interim has included several private meetings between Potter and Neeley, two Personnel Board hearings and volumes of correspondence between the legal advisers for the fired employee and the village.

The Personnel Board, following two full hearings, recommended that Neeley be re-instated with full pay and benefits and his attorney fees be reimbursed. Potter, who has declined comment on the ongoing case, didn't return Neeley to his duties, and the council apparently agreed, adding the official stamp of approval to the action Tuesday.

"This is just a washout," said Councillor Al Junge. "Will we find (Neeley) next in the courthouse?"

Neeley, his attorney Ken Wagner and Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr. didn't attend the Tuesday hearing.

Attorney Steve Bell, representing Potter, said Neeley and Wagner were notified, and noted the council session was the final step in the due process being given Neeley.

But Wagner, contacted by telephone Wednesday, said he and his client opted not to attend the meeting for several reasons.

"That was an ad hoc procedure designed for this case," said Wagner, saying there is no provision in the village Personnel Ordinance for the council hearing. He suspected the village added the hearing to be able to claim even more due process was given to Neeley.

"In fact, we were denied due process," he added.

Wagner said he and Neeley also were furnished a list of witnesses just a week before the hearing, and didn't have time to thoroughly ad-

dress the expected testimony.

Lining out steps he believes are included in the Personnel Ordinance, Wagner accused the village of "changing horses in the middle of the race."

"Finally, I think the whole thing was pre-ordained. It would have been an exercise in futility," said Wagner.

"I believe that full due process was provided to Mr. Neeley," said Bell Tuesday.

Potter testified that he terminated Neeley for non-cooperation with the public and his fellow employees. He said two incidents brought the matter to a head. Potter told of an incident involving a "cowboy" where he said Neeley called the citizen a name, and mentioned complaints from another citizen, Gloria Payne, who blames Neeley for the poor construction on her home.

Payne and her attorney, Robert Beauvais, were on hand for the Tuesday meeting. After detailing her dealings with Neeley, Payne told the council her attorney is filing suit against Potter and the Village of Ruidoso because her deck was so poorly constructed she's been unable to sell the house.

Payne said the builder who constructed her home was a good friend of Neeley's. She said Neeley inspected the construction four times, but when she put the house on the market the real estate agent notified her the deck was falling off. Payne said her insurance adjuster told her the deck wasn't built to code.

Bell reminded the council that the only issues to be considered were those in the termination, which was based on the former building inspector's dealings with the public.

"Anything else is irrelevant," said Bell.

Asked if Neeley was polite to her during her months of exchanges over the problems with her deck, Payne replied: "He laughed in my face ... he screamed at me ... he was obnoxious ... he was rude."

"This is just another example of how he (Neeley) is able to drag things out through the bureaucracy,"

said building contractor Tim Hoyt, noting that although Neeley wasn't present Tuesday, he did have a representative at the meeting to make a videotape.

"He has an attitude ... ego problem," said Hoyt, claiming Neeley cost village contractors a great deal of money by making them wait.

"He had us all classified ... A, B, C, D, F," said Hoyt, noting that Neeley was once a school teacher.

"He's a little Caesar," said Hoyt. "I got along with him because I kissed his rear," he added.

"If this council lets him back in, you deserve what you get, because it's Hell," said Hoyt.

"Is (Neeley) on trial here for being well-educated?" asked audience member John Greening. Saying he is neither for nor against Neeley, Greening recalled disagreements he had with the building inspector, but attesting to Neeley's polite behavior during those exchanges.

Greening questioned why the personnel discussions were conducted in an open meeting, when the village usually reserves such talks for executive sessions. He said it appeared it was a gathering to "bash" Neeley.

Greening, saying he wants even his enemies to get a fair shake, suggested Neeley might have been fired for "red-tagging" a building belonging to Mayor Davis.

"I think you ought to fire the old boy—anybody that doesn't have enough sense not to red-tag the mayor," said Greening.

Ray Eidson and Bill Allen added their complaints.

"I never had any problem with him sassing me," said Eidson. "It was polite harassment."

Eidson said Neeley cost him money by requiring some things other inspectors wouldn't.

"I think the building in Ruidoso did improve under Jimmy Neeley's inspection," said Eidson.

He did have a very bad attitude problem," said Allen. Although he is not a licensed builder, Allen and his wife own Mountain Log Homes and acted as go-between for their customers and the building inspector sometimes.

"As far as I'm concerned, he was setting up his own little kingdom," said Allen, calling Neeley arrogant and domineering. He suggested Neeley's Alto building inspection job was a conflict of interest with his village responsibilities.

In the end, the council apparently agreed with the testimony, and made the long drawn-out termination final.


In previous hearings before the Personnel Board, the testimony has been a different story, with builders and real estate agents testifying to Neeley's cooperative and helpful attitude, and his competency as a building inspector.

Wagner said Wednesday he and his client will file suit, probably in federal court, against the Village of Ruidoso, Potter and perhaps, the Village Council.

Potter said the council action paves the way for the village to hire a new building inspector. Those duties have been performed on a part-time basis by Junior Behringer.

Chamber board upholds long-standing policy

The fact that Ski Apache and Ruidoso Downs Race Track are not members of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce brought about a philosophical discussion of the role of a chamber of commerce, Wednesday.

Chamber directors, at a monthly meeting, discussed at length which a chamber should serve primarily, paying members or the inquiring public.

John Jeffers, chamber executive, said it has been a long-standing policy of the chamber to mail out brochures and otherwise promote the interests of chamber members only.

The executive committee of the Chamber recently reaffirmed a policy whereby when an inquiry comes to the chamber about Ski Apache or the race track, that the inquirer be referred to either the track or ski area. The chamber, under the policy, would not mail out track and Ski Apache brochures or

specific information although information about both entities is contained in general area information disseminated by the chamber.

The executive committee requested the full board reaffirm support of the policy.

Director Ron Andrews asked that the policy matter be put to a vote of the full membership.

"If (the chamber) is not putting out information, it is not serving the public ... infighting just alienates ...," he said.

"If you think the policy is right, why be afraid to put it to a vote of the members?" he asked.

Board president Becky Durham reaffirmed that the policy was a long-standing one.

Generally brochures and such of non-members do not appear in racks in the chamber foyer, it was pointed out.

Jeffers said it appears the race track probably will come into the chamber fold, but it is doubtful if

the ski area will do so.

Both have their own promotional departments.

Director Don Shaw finally asked for a vote on the motion to support existing policy. It passed handily with Andrews dissenting.

In other business, director Rick Evans reported on the recommendations of the Municipal Airport Planning Board concerning development of that facility.

He said the MAPPB is recommending to the village council that the village insist on cinching up a resort hotel before approving the development of a championship golf course.

"We feel like there is too much risk if there is no commitment on the hotel ... community support is based on a package," he said.

In other regular business, the board:

—Learned that Jeffers and attorney Mel O'Reilly will debate Friday at 2:30 p. m. at Whispering

Pines Cabins.

The debate will be before the board of the Lincoln County Hospitality Association concerning remarks O'Reilly alleges Jeffers made concerning the quality of lodging in Ruidoso.

—Learned that former board member Charlie Smith has accepted a position as Chamber of Commerce manager at Castle Rock, Colorado.

Board member Ronnie Poulger told Smith, "You have been a good friend to all of us."

—Heard Roy Crocker, head of retirement services division, report that the first color advertisement

was out, in "New Choices," a retirement magazine.

Some 40 inquiries came in the first two days, he said. Twenty-five percent were from Florida.

—Heard a report on the Tucson Initiative, whereby some 20 or so couples will travel to that city and Rillito Park race track the end of March.

"Ruidoso Days" will be staged at the track on two consecutive weekend days.

—The board will ask that Ruidoso restaurants and motels be included in bill to authorize video gaming in resort areas of the state. Ruidoso Downs is included in the

bill, but not restaurants and motels such as are included for Angel Fire and Taos.

—Heard in a report on a bill in the New Mexico Legislature which would provide funds for civic center development and planning in Ruidoso. A committee hearing is set for Friday on the measure.

—Durham appointed a task force to work on creating more rapport between the Chamber of Commerce and lodgers in Ruidoso. Board members named were Rick Evans, Ron Andrews and Buster Hill.

Ex-officio member Roy Crocker was named.

Suzanne Cox served Lincoln County more than six years

Suzanne Cox has left the office in the Lincoln County Courthouse she occupied since September 1, 1982.

After an executive session Monday, the Lincoln County Commissions accepted Cox's resignation effective immediately. Although Cox already had resigned, she had agreed she would remain as interim manager until April 1. At that time commissioners, who have advertised for a new manager, were to announce their selection from applications received by February 27.

Cox has seen many changes in county government since she was hired by commissioners Ben Hall, Cotton McKnight and John Allen Hightower. They selected her from 19 applicants to fill the position left open by retiring manager Truman Billingsly. And she became the first woman manager in Lincoln County.

In her six and a half years as county manager, Cox is credited with computerizing the road

maintenance list, helping all county offices computerize record keeping and other clerical work, improving the county volunteer ambulance services to its current prize-winning status and working to improve healthcare for Lincoln County citizens.

Always maintaining an open door policy when information or assistance was needed she worked for the commissions of

Bill Elliott, Ken Nosker and A.J. Gnatkowski; John Allen Hightower, William Karn and Ralph Dunlap.

Elliott said Cox established the best county computer system in the state, upgraded the school bus routes and was excellent at applying for and receiving grants.

"She was one of the most capable, dedicated persons in her job," Elliott said. "She's the best there is in the state."

After the November 1988 election, when all new commissioners were elected, Cox attempted to resign effective December 31. However, at commissioners Bob Hemphill, Karon Petty and Rick Simpson's request, she agreed to an interim term until April 1.

Neither the commissioners nor Cox would comment why she left before the term ended.

Cox, a resident of the Capitan area, is a native New Mexican and worked for county government in Sierra County (Truth or Consequences), before coming to Lincoln County.



Wood roofs pose fire hazard warns forest service officer

Wood shake shingle roofs pose a significant fire hazard according to Steve Makowski, fire management officer for the United States Forest Service.

"A number of years ago, the Village of Ruidoso drafted an ordinance that required wood shake shingles to be treated. For some reason, the ordinance was delayed and then withdrawn," said Makowski.

He said many forest fires occur

in spring weather with high winds. Makowski said when shake shingle roofs burn, they often break into thousands of fire brands and are carried great distances by the wind.

Makowski said some counties in California have passed that state's toughest regulations regarding roofs: Class A noncombustible roofs were required on all new construction. Existing wood shingle roofs were not affected.

The 49er fire near Sacramento, California, last year consumed 33,500 acres and caused 22.7 mil-

lion in damage. A roofing ordinance instituted six months earlier did not effect many of the older structures lost.

"If instituted years earlier," Makowski said, "the Class A roofing might have proved a worthy adversary to the fire. The need for Class A roofs developed as more city dwellers moved into the California foothills. I think all foothill counties should enact stronger regulations to cope with a growing population."

The Plant Corner

Dear Sally: Will you please write about the appropriate conditions for growing and blooming the night-blooming cereus. Thank you, Donna R.

Dear Donna: I will do my best for you. Thanks for your question. The night-blooming cereus is a tropical plant growing in Mexico, the Caribbean Islands, central America and in LeVerne Cole's home in Ruidoso. I also have one, recently repotted, and it has not yet bloomed. These night-blooming plants are responsible for giving cacti, in general, a bad name for flowering once every seven years. The Queen of the night unfolds its beautiful blooms in the evening and they last all night, but they are produced much more frequently than every seven years. The blooms are very large and have a marvelous vanilla fragrance. There can be from one to two dozen flowers open at one time and the fragrance can captivate you. The flowers usually come in June or July. The trailing stems can be six feet long and the plant MUST have warmth all

winter in order to produce buds.
Soil: Do not use a rich potting soil. You need a very porous well-drained type soil. Use a #2 potting soil for 1/3 of the mixture, add 1/3 sharp sand and the for the rest mix peat or finely-ground bark with vermiculite. Add the plastic packing do-dads in the bottom of the container and pack the soil mixture firmly around the newly-potted plant. Use at least a five-gallon size pot and be sure your Queen of the night has her throne. Allow the plant to sit high off the floor on a sturdy stand because of its trailing nature. It should be placed, alone, in front of a large picture window. The plant will be about six inches long and about four inches wide - truly spectacular.
Light and temperature: Cereus require good bright light. Place near the south or west window and have an overhead grow-bulb directly above the plant. The little extra warmth from the grow-bulb will be good for the cereus. The temperature should not fall below 50 degrees - ever. The winter

warmth is essential for flowers in the summer. The plant can stand a rather high heat of 90 degrees.

Water: Spraying is very beneficial to keep the stems dust-free and will discourage pests. Use distilled water at room temperature. Maintain a 'slightly moist' condition in the winter resting period, increasing to a 'moist condition' in spring and summer.

Fertilizer: Use the same as for cacti and succulents, one which contains light potash and in late spring feed with a mixture of tomato food cut to one quarter the package recommended use, about once a week to get more flowers. Your own mixture of organic fertilizer or Peters Special will do.

Pests: Spider Mites and all sucking insects, with the ugly little cotton-headed Mealy Bug again being the most troublesome. Check often for pests. Upon locating them, place a plastic sheet on the floor under the plant and get after those little suckers. Dab the Mealy Bugs with rubbing alcohol and spray the others with warm soap suds. Let stand for a few minutes to dry and rinse with clear, warm, distilled water. Repeat as often as needed.

Make new plants at any time of the year from cuttings.

Thomas Jefferson My Favorite Patriot of the American Revolution, by Malini Fuangvuthi

Thomas Jefferson was born on April 13, 1743. He was born at Shadwell in Albemarle County, Virginia. Shadwell was the family farm. Thomas was the third child and has six sisters and three brothers. Two brothers died when they were babies.

Thomas was fond of hunting and fishing. He also enjoyed other country boy activities, such as horseback riding and canoeing. He loved music and later in his childhood learned to play the violin.

Thomas started his schooling under the tutor that taught his sisters and most of his cousins. Thomas learned Latin, Greek and French with a nearby clergyman at age nine.

Thomas was fourteen when he faced his father's death. He became head of the house because he was the oldest son.

From Thomas' father he inherited about 2,500 acres of land and about twenty slaves. This land was located in the hills of Virginia.

Thomas was a tall, slender

boy. His face had the look of a confident, firm person. At the early age of sixteen, Thomas entered the College of William and Mary at Williamsburg, Virginia. After college he studied law. Although he was a successful lawyer, he spent most of his time in public service.

Jefferson married a widow named Martha Wayles Skelton. They settled in Monticello in Virginia. After ten years of marriage, Mrs. Jefferson passed away. During their marriage they had six children, only two children lived to adulthood. Their names were Mary and Martha Jefferson. Jefferson never married again.

Jefferson believed slavery was wrong. He believed and wrote, "Nothing is more certainly written in the word of human destiny that these people are to be slaveless and free."

When Jefferson was twenty-six years old he was elected to the House of Burgesses and served six years. He was not a good speaker, but proved that he could write laws. His talent was simple English that legislators could recognize easily and quickly.

Jefferson was asked to draft a "Declaration of Independence,

Necessity of Taking Up Arms," but Congress found this draft "too strong." Jefferson was on the committee and was asked to prepare the draft again.

Jefferson wrote the Declaration of Independence when he was 33 years old. The Declaration of Independence was approved on July 4, 1776. Even today the Declaration of Independence is still Jefferson's best-known work.

Jefferson was elected Governor for a one-year term from 1779 to 1780. While he was in office, the state suffered from the effects of the Revolutionary War. British troops invaded Virginia in 1781. Jefferson was criticized for lack of resistance against British invasion.

That was not all Jefferson was. Six years later he was appointed Minister to France. In 1789, he became Secretary of State. In 1796, he was elected Vice-President, and then later elected third President in 1801.

Jefferson died in 1826. He contributed much to the United States. However, the greatest contribution I feel he made was the Declaration of Independence, because it made our country and lives free.

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



In the first round of boys District 5A play Monday, the Capitan Tigers defeated the Weed Bulldogs 75-52.


Warren Russell was top scorer with 15 points, Owen Washburn and Anthony Sanchez scored 10 each. All players but one scored at least three points in the game.

Bobby Griego scored 19 points, Tom Cox scored 14 and Aaron Russell scored 13.


The junior varsity lost to Tatum's JV 49-57. Owen Washburn scored 18 points, Sean Seay scored 16 and Nathan Roybal scored six.

Trustees request sewer plant funds

Capitan village trustees will request a Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) to upgrade the sewer plant.

During a special meeting Tuesday afternoon, trustees chose the request from various items suggested at a special CDBG hearing last week. Other proposals included acquisition of property for a new village hall, low-income private housing and street improvements.

Coker said the village will need at least \$300,000 in CDBG funds to upgrade the village sewer system and plant.

The village sewer system has been on a priority replacement list with the New Mexico Environmental Improvement Division (EID), Coker added. The main objective is to get all village homes onto the sewer system and discontinue pri-

vate septic systems.

If the grant is approved, a sewer plant upgrade will be accomplished in several phases, with village consulting engineer Jack Atkins supervising. Coker said Dr. Bernhard Reimann, a member of Capitan Planning and Zoning (P&Z), suggested Atkins complete the application for the CDBG proposal.

The application is due to the Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District by early March to be eligible for part of the \$8.4 million available for projects.

In other business, trustees: —Heard a filter plant update. The filter has been opened and all interior media removed. If the filter passes inspection by Atkins, the interior will be sand-blasted, coated and the media replaced. Atkins, who will supervise, will inspect the

work and final approval must be made by the EID before it will be operational.

—Approved the P&Z Master Plan. The plan had no changes from the one presented to the trustees last year.

—OK'd maintaining the retiring police car for the village fleet. A new police car will be delivered to the village soon, Coker said.

—Met in executive session for a litigation update from village attorney Don Dutton about the water situation with Alamogordo.

No new deadline has been set by Alamogordo as long as negotiations are ongoing, Coker said.

The next regular meeting of the village trustees is Monday, March 13.



Ruidoso Downs is track of champions!

Ruidoso Downs Race Track is the track of champions.

This past month, five quarter horses that raced at Ruidoso Downs in 1987 and/or 1988, were selected champions. Merganser, See Me Do It, Dash For Speed, Bully Bullion and Florentine have been named champions by the American Quarter Horse Association Racing Committee.

Merganser, the winner of the \$2.5 million 1988 All American Futurity, was named 1988 World Champion Quarter Running Horse. Merganser, owned by Jerry Wells of Sulfur, Oklahoma, and Ron Shalz of Colby, Kansas, was also selected champion two-year-old colt and champion two-year-old.

Merganser is the first two-year-old world champion since Special Effort in 1981. Merganser, by the thoroughbred sire Duck Dance and out of the mare Hip Hugger, was purchased by Wells out of the 1987 All American Yearling Sale for \$9,000. Last year, he went on to win 10 of 13 starts, including the West Texas, Sun Country, Rainbow and All American futurities for career earnings of \$1,323,169.

Another champion who raced at Ruidoso Downs last year is See Me Do It. This filly, bred and owned by Jean Dillard of Ringling, Oklahoma, was named champion two-year-old filly.

See Me Do It, by the sire On A High and out of the mare Rita Seis, was outrun only once in her racing

career, and that was by Merganser in the All American Futurity. She had earnings of \$376,909.

Dash For Speed, the only filly to ever win the sophomore Triple Crown at Ruidoso Downs, was selected champion three-year-old filly and shared honors as champion three-year-old. Dash For Speed, owned by Bob Blakeman of Fort Worth, Texas, and Tom Bradbury of Byers, Colorado, won the Kansas, Rainbow and All American derbies in 1988.

Dash For Speed is the daughter of the sire Dash For Cash and the mare Mighty Speedy. She won seven of nine starts last year for earnings of \$502,898.

Named the Champion Aged Stallion, Bully Bullion, going off at odds of more than 21 to 1, scored a major upset by winning the \$249,374 All American Gold Cup at Ruidoso Downs. By the World Champion Quarter Running Horse in 1981, Special Effort, and out of the mare, Mary Poppins, Bully Bullion earned \$157,464 for his breeder/owner Jean Chavers of Broomfield, Colorado.

A lifetime earner of more than a quarter of a million dollars, Bully Bullion is now retired to stand at stud.

Florentine was selected the Champion Aged Mare and the Champion Aged Horse for 1988. Owned and bred by White Oaks Ranch of Lake Hughes, California, Florentine won the 1987 Rainbow Derby.

Last year Florentine, the daughter of the leading sire, Dash For Cash, and the mare Trippy Dip, won five of seven starts for a total of \$230,755 in earnings.

Florentine has now been retired

as a broodmare after a racing career in which she earned \$1,230,000.

In December 1988, the Racing Committee compiled the list of champions using the following criteria: Grade I stakes winners; top money earners in each category; and earners of \$200,000 or more. A minimum of five horses was required in each category, with preference given to a horse's stakes record.

A ballot was then given each member of the 68-member racing committee. Balloting was divided into three age categories which were further divided into three sex

categories. The champion in each category was the winner of a hypothetical race, at 440 yards and at level weights, against all horses in that category.

The divisional champion was selected from the winners in each age bracket. The World Champion was then considered the horse who would win a 440-yard race at level weights against all horses that started in 1988.

In 1987, a net category was designated called the Champion Distance Quarter Running Horse. This category is for quarter horses that have excelled at distances further than 440 yards.

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

EDITORIAL

We don't get a lot of chances to be heroes these days. It's not often we get to save a life.

But many of us can do just that next week when the Lincoln County Medical Center Auxiliary, along with United Blood Services, conducts a blood drive at the Ruidoso hospital.

Donating blood takes less than a half hour, doesn't cost a cent, carries no risk of contracting any disease and could be the difference between life and death for an accident victim or a medical patient. It hurts for just a moment, but it feels good for a long time ... just knowing that somebody may be healthier because of our gift.

Blood drive planners say there is a critical need for all types of blood, and they're asking all healthy Ruidoso citizens to show up between 11 a.m. and 6 p.m. Tuesday, February 28, at the hospital to give the gift of life.

United Blood Services is the regional center that keeps LCMC supplied with a continuing stock of blood. LCMC patients benefited from approximately 500 units of blood supplied by the regional blood bank last year. That same year, local blood drives provided about 400 units of blood. Area residents' blood donations fell about 100 units short of the local needs.

Larry DeBeers of LCMC said the local hospital keeps from 20 to 28 units of blood in stock for emergencies. He said, without a regional blood bank, LCMC couldn't keep a constant supply. DeBeers said with blood donations down nationwide, because of mistaken fears that there is a danger of infection from giving blood, the need is even greater; the needs have grown as the giving has decreased.

"There is no risk," assured DeBeers.

So, take a half hour Tuesday to be a hero. Donate blood.-fj

As I was driving back from Hondo the other day, looking at our beautiful white mountain, I reflected on how my opinion of Ruidoso has changed since my family and I moved here from Lubbock 10 months ago. My husband was never happy in Lubbock so he was thrilled with the idea of a move. Our friends were envious of us. After all, who wouldn't want to live in the cool pines, skiing in the winter and attending horse races in the summer?

Mel That's who. A nice neighborhood and close friends had made me very content with my life in Lubbock. We had the perfect neighborhood with perfect neighbors. Our neighborhood was similar to something you'd see on a television program - a cross between 'Ozzie and Harriet's' neighborhood and the cul-de-sac on 'Knots Landing'.

Our street was actually a little cul-de-sac with seven houses. My 3-year-old daughter's two best friends lived next door and across the street. Everyday the three of them got together to ride their tricycles on the sidewalk. (Yes, folks, I do mean sidewalk). Our neighbors (none of them were seasonal) got together for ice cream parties and enchilada dinners. If I needed to go somewhere for a few minutes I just sent the kids to one of the neighbors. If one of my neighbors needed to go somewhere, then I had an extra child at my house for awhile.

From early spring until late fall, some of us were always sitting out front in lawn chairs as we watched the younger kids ride trikes or the older ones play ball in the street. My 18-month-old was just learning to push her tricycle up and down the sidewalk when we discovered we were moving.

Our first visit to Ruidoso was not very pleasant for my 3-year-old and me. We searched, with our Realtor, for a house that would suit our needs. The first thing my daughter discovered was that there are no sidewalks in Ruidoso. For a child who spent several hours a day on a tricycle this was a 'revolting development', as Sylvester the Cat would say.

Several days of looking at two- and three-story houses with eight-foot decks left me nauseous. An overprotective mother with a 3-year-old and an 18-month-old doesn't like to be more than a few inches off the ground. Needless to say, there are no hills and few multiple-story houses in Lubbock. Also, every home in Lubbock is built with a fence. It's part of the building code. With four dogs and two kids I knew I needed a fenced yard.

A bottle of dramamine made me realize that part of the nausea was car-sickness from driving, down and around all the hills.

At every house we viewed, my daughter wanted to know where the neighborhood kids were. It

seemed that all the available houses were in neighborhoods with mostly seasonal homes.

We rented a small, temporary house while we looked for a bigger one and began trying to feel like Ruidosans.

The first thing I noticed was how courteous drivers were in Midtown. They stopped for pedestrians, even those not in cross-walks.

The second thing I noticed was how willing everyone seemed to help make me feel at home. Since I had worked at the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal several years, when I needed information I visited Frankie Jarrell here at the Ruidoso News. I needed to find a dance teacher since my 3-year-old swore she would run away from home if she couldn't continue dance lessons. Frankie put me in touch with dance teacher Nancy Shaver.

When I needed a baby-sitter, Nancy told me about Flo Buchanan. Flo has not only been a wonderful sitter, but a good friend who has helped me feel more at home here.

One night I got stuck on some ice up in White Mountain and ended up cross-ways in the street. Two very nice men actually pushed my car sideways until it was off the ice. I appreciated them more than they could imagine.

I've made many new friends through church and work. One lady I hardly knew asked if I needed her to bring my family food when she found out I had the flu. Another friend, an old acquaintance from years ago, took me to the store and pharmacy that same week, during the first big snow. My husband was out of town, my car was stuck and I was sick. "No problem," she said. She was there in a few minutes.

I've discovered, since moving here, that neighbors don't necessarily have to live next door to be

good friends.

We finally found a one-story house with a huge pine-covered fenced yard. It does have a deck, but the kids mastered the steps in about 10 minutes and it provides a perfect place to ride tricycles.

Though our closest neighbors are seasonal, two older girls down the street sometimes come to play. My oldest daughter still misses friends and family, but she would rather they come here to visit now, instead of us going back to Lubbock. Every morning I look out the door at the mountain and trees and wonder why anyone would want to live anywhere else.

DEAR EDITOR:

I have found Ruidoso to be a very interesting town in the few weeks I've just spent here. Before I leave I'd like to make a few comments about what I've seen, liked and disliked about the scenic Sierra Blanca Mountains and its people.

I'm from Alaska and have many daily contacts with native Alaskans or Eskimos. They are very proud people and are always warm and friendly toward strangers, tourists or anyone from outside their circle. Whether or not they were genuine is a matter of opinion or individual experience. Here in New Mexico, I personally have seen nothing but courteous and friendly gestures from the Apache Indians. Most noticeable was at the Ski Apache Resort where smiles and good vibes abound. Local restaurants and the ski shops I visited seemed pleased to have a new face walk through the door. I must admit the economy looks a little depressed for this time of the year... I had no problem on the golf course except to find someone to play with; no matter, the balls do roll further on brown grass, don't they?

I visited Alamogordo, El Paso and Albuquerque. I really enjoyed the adventure as much as I did the visit to Carlsbad Caverns two weeks ago. Sounds too good to be true, well here comes the other side.

As I stepped out of the plane I just landed here in Ruidoso, I informed the airport lineman, I intended to buy fuel. He came back with the remark "for what?" Well, a bit confused, I looked around to make sure there wasn't another airplane nearby, then I told him, for this plane. Not for this plane, he said, "They don't buy gas here." But if you want gas, it'll be cash only. Then he drove away without another word.

At first I wondered, maybe it was because my plane was a Navaho and he was Apache or something like that. Then as I was leaving I went inside to discover that he and the other personnel didn't like who they thought owned the airplane. Well after telling them that was too bad and that I

could wait to buy 100 gallons of gas at my next stop (cash by the way), I left. Not really the worst experience of a lifetime, but surely a totally unexpected one at least.

Then only the next day came the experience that highlighted my visit to this quaint ski resort. After having a terrific supper at the local country club restaurant I was introduced to a table of seemingly cordial people. The ladies were very well-dressed and seemed to be enjoying this Friday night out. After shaking the gentlemen's hands I told them briefly how much I've appreciated the beauty and charm of the Sierras and how I looked forward to returning next winter. The lady whom I was with that evening thought I should share my airport experience with one gentleman in particular at this table, the mayor of Ruidoso. At this very same instant he insulted her and in less than 25 words, five of which cannot be printed, embarrassed his table and certainly made a real spectacle of himself as within minutes this man had started a regular barroom brawl with others in the club.

I personally didn't get nearly as upset by his vulgar expressions as others did, mainly because I've seen too many drunk Eskimos do the same sort of thing.

Ruidoso, if this is your Leader, you've got a lot more problems than many of you know about.

DEAR EDITOR:

I write this to clarify what I perceive to be some misconceptions regarding my position about what should be done on the old airport land in Ruidoso. I attended the public hearing last Wednesday (Feb. 15) at which time my husband delivered to the Board petitions which we and several other people in the community had been circulating. This petition states that we are opposed to our public lands being used for private enterprise, specifically, the development of a golf course and hotel on that land.

I am aware that the trend these days is to lease public lands to private enterprise. I am not suggesting that all private enterprise would be offensive to me. I would prefer that if we are to lease said land for private enterprise it would be to concerns that would do more for more people in this community than a golf course would.

I am also not so greedy as to suggest that the park I would love to see out there needs to consume the entire 160 acres of land that the golf course is demanding. I think that a variety of things could be accomplished on that land, things which conform to the master plan our government adopted a short time ago - a park being a unifying and beautifying theme. A campus, a civic center, an amphitheatre, light industry, a hotel, all could someday be placed on that land and be surrounded by a "park" - not just a jogging trail. It is my understanding that on surveys done regarding hotels, fitness centers inside the hotel, and opportunities for exercising and playing outside the hotel rank higher on the list of priorities of guests than do golf courses. The proposed fitness trail that would surround this golf course would not accommodate swings, any ball playing, picnic tables, space to throw a frisbee, space to fly a kite or an airplane, activities that we who live here and that people who vacation here with their children might also enjoy doing. And I wish to emphasize that once that golf course is out there, consuming the entire 160

acres, there will not be room for any of these other possibilities.

I listened to all the speakers at the public hearing last week, (unlike our Mayor who left quite early) and I heard some good ideas. But I will always quarrel with the assertion that we have always been, are, and always will be nothing but a tourist town. I too, was here when this town was booming. This town is still reeling from many of the projects that were part of the boom. If we choose to believe we can never be anything but a tourist town, we doom ourselves to perpetual periods of boom and bust. And that is terribly hard on all of us, on all our families. My family too, is weary of saying goodbye to friends who have left for greener pastures. Maybe, just maybe, we can come up with something to do with that land that will begin to add some stability to this community - stability that tourism can't offer because neither our weather nor the economies of other areas of the country can be controlled by us. I am tired of hearing that just because it's never been done before it can't be done now. And tired of hearing that just because we never had parks here we don't need them now. We never had this golf course either - do we really need it now?

I would like to see the Board table this first and only proposal and either advertise for other proposals, as was suggested last evening, or do a lot more legwork and research to come up with something with which to compare this golf course proposal.
