

## Gambling fans betting on video games legislation

Legalized gambling in Ruidoso will be up to local voters if a bill that narrowly passed the Senate this week is passed in the House and signed into law by Governor Garrey Carruthers.

In a 23-19 vote, senators authorized video gambling in four state resorts, including Ruidoso. The legislation, (SB 572) sponsored by Democrat Manny Aragon of

Bernalillo County, calls for a three-year experimental project in Ruidoso, Angel Fire, Taos and Santa Fe Downs.

Video gaming machines would be allowed in just one location in each of those municipalities, with each licensee to pay to the state a \$100,000 fee. Those four licensing fees would recover for the state the estimated \$400,000 start-up costs.

Each operator also would pay gross receipts taxes plus a special

20 percent tax on the retained earnings. Aragon said 80 percent of the money taken in would go back to the players, and estimated the video machines could generate more than \$5 million a year for the state.

Machines permitted under the bill include bingo, lotto, keno, blackjack, poker, roulette, baccarat and slot machines.

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## Downs annexation offer nixed

"We do not want to be in Ruidoso Downs," was the message that nearly 100 people delivered to Ruidoso Downs Mayor Jake Harris during a public hearing Monday.

"No problem," responded Harris, apparently surprised by all the furor caused by a letter he sent to property owners living near the Downs village limits.

"I don't know why this was blown out of shape," said Harris, explaining that the only way for the properties to be annexed would be

for a majority of the owners to petition to the Village of Ruidoso Downs.

"We offered you three things, annexation, sewer and water," said Trustee LeVerne Cole. The majority of the people who gathered around the large yellow fire truck in the Fire Department garage were ready to turn down all three.

A document mailed recently to property owners was entitled "annexation" and talked of sewer and water, ending by saying a meeting would be conducted to "discuss the annexation."

It was learned that the meeting referred to will be a public hearing over community development block grants.

Gerald Ames, one of a group leading the well-organized move to block annexation, told Harris that going after funds is a totally different issue than annexation. Ames displayed a color-coded map that he said indicates at least 80 percent of property owners in the county areas surrounding the Downs are opposed to joining the village. Ames

## Hooray for Hollywoods—all dozen of them...

When the Hollywood, California, Chamber of Commerce filed with the U.S. Patent and Trademark Office to trademark the Hollywood name, it may not have realized the can of worms it was opening.

Hollywoods around the country have united to fight the effort. In Hollywood, Florida, February 28-March 2, representatives from 12 Hollywoods met to discuss a plan of action. Leon Eggleston, division director for the Village of Ruidoso, attended the meeting as a representative of unincorporated Hollywood, New Mexico.

Tiny Hollywood, New Mexico, was founded in 1926 by George Friedenbloom, a Hollywood, Florida, native. All that remain today are a tavern, grocery store and Ruidoso post office sub-station. Even those would have to pay

royalties for the use of the name if the west coast Hollywood has its way, according to Eggleston.

The Hollywood Summit, hosted by the city of Hollywood, Florida, and its Chamber of Commerce, was a chance for Hollywood representatives from around the country to plan a strategy to stop Hollywood, California, from taking away their

rights to the famous name. American Airlines donated tickets to all Hollywood representatives. The Hollywood Beach Hilton donated rooms.

The effort by Hollywood, California Chamber of Commerce is basically a way to make money, according to Eggleston. Any city, store or company using the name would

have to pay for that right.

"Tinseltown" is actually an unincorporated city in the middle of Los Angeles. West Hollywood and North Hollywood are incorporated cities that have been fighting the trademark effort. When Hollywood, Florida, officials discovered other cities were opposed to the trademark plan they decided a joint

effort would be more effective.

Eggleston said the guests were treated like royalty while in Florida. Several restaurants donated meals and all Hollywood representatives received box seats for the greyhound races.

While in Florida, representatives heard plans by lawyers hired by Hollywood, Florida. The lawyers

are gathering as much information as possible from other Hollywoods to take to the Patent and Trademark office. Hollywood, Florida, is footing the bill for the lawyers. The other Hollywoods are asked to contribute nothing but information. Eggleston said some of the talk was tongue in cheek but the drive to stop the trademarking is very serious.

Representatives signed a poster to send to the west coast Hollywood. The poster shows the picture of an Egret, the mascot for Hollywood, Florida. It reads "You Ruffled my Feathers."

This is not the first attempt at trademarking. The Hollywood, California, Chamber of Commerce filed an unsuccessful application in 1987.

## Teens lead officers on high speed chase

A high-speed chase by area law enforcement officers ended a three-state ride for two juveniles Monday.

According to Lincoln County Sheriff James McSwane, a 14-year-old from El Paso, Texas, and a 16-year-old from Norfolk, Nebraska, are in the Otero County Juvenile Detention Facility after surrendering to New Mexico State Police, Carrizozo Police and Lincoln County Sheriff's deputies.

But not before the two led the officers in a high speed chase through Carrizozo, a ranch pasture and onto Highway 380 toward Capitan.

About 5:16 p.m. Monday, State Police Officer Mike Saenz was notified to watch for a 1988 GMC four-wheel drive pickup which left Vaughn without paying for gas. Saenz spotted the truck north of Carrizozo on Highway 54, and the chase was on.

McSwane said the young driver did not stop, but accelerated reaching speeds up to 118 miles per hour. Saenz alerted the Carrizozo Police and Sheriff's Department, who joined the chase.

The entire group whizzed south through Carrizozo and followed the truck which turned east, across the railroad tracks in the southern part of the village. The speedy caravan continued out of town, into a pasture on the I-X Ranch and drove across the pasture about six miles,

before the driver of the truck, followed by law officers, turned north again, McSwane said.

The two drove through the closed Water Canyon Gate, past the Carrizozo Country Club and broadsided a tree, before heading east on Highway 380.

About six miles east of Carrizozo, and about twenty minutes after Saenz began the chase north of Carrizozo, the suspects stopped the vehicle and surrendered.

McSwane said the incident began in Northfolk Sunday, when the juveniles allegedly stole the truck with a .22 caliber rifle in it from a private garage. At some point, McSwane said, the juveniles allegedly stole a .270 rifle.

Because of the weapons, the juveniles were considered armed and dangerous, McSwane continued. However, McSwane said the suspects disposed of the weapons while in the I-X pasture and had only ammunition for the .22 when stopped.

McSwane said no drugs or alcohol were found and the juveniles were not under the influence.

Booked on possession of a stolen vehicle, criminal damage to private property and evading police officers, the juveniles were detained in the Lincoln County Jail for only

Senators voting for the bill said the measure is an economic development plan to attract more tourists and create more jobs in resort areas. The bill was reportedly created to aid northern New Mexico, and Ruidoso was included in an amendment.

Senator James Martin who represents the Ruidoso area couldn't be reached for comment Tuesday or Wednesday.

John Jeffers, executive director of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, said the chamber board endorsed video gaming when it was introduced last year.

A group of citizens, led by Bud Vuichich, has been lobbying state lawmakers to approve gambling during this 60-day session as a boost for the area's economy. Vuichich has gathered hundreds of signatures on a petition favoring gambling.

The Senate bill is just one of a host of proposals over legalized gambling and lotteries that have been offered this session.

State Representative Fred Peralta, a Democrat from Taos, is sponsoring a slot machine bill in the House of Representatives.

Peralta said his proposal is for machine gambling in up to 50 locations throughout the state. He said the state would own the equipment and run the operation through local contractors. He said profits would be shared 50-50 between the state

and the local operators.

The bill (HB 724) establishes a State Gambling Commission to enforce its provisions and oversee the operations, and it calls for 90 percent of revenues to go to indigent healthcare and 10 percent to state tourism.

Peralta said machine gambling could raise \$12 million for the state, providing the Tourism and Economic Development Department with more than its entire present budget.

Answering opponents who worry that gambling will be an invitation to organized crime, Peralta said keeping the operation under state control will guard against that. He said the state will own all the equipment, maintain it and keep the keys, thus taking on responsibility for the security of the gaming devices.

"It's not going to be set up in every bar and backroom in the state," said Peralta, noting the commission will set up parameters, approve licensees and act as a watchdog for the entire operation.

An additional economic benefit will be the gross receipts and income taxes the contractors will pay to the state, said Peralta.

While the bill doesn't preclude Indian reservations, which currently have lucrative bingo operations, from participating, Peralta said his intent was to have operators in more accessible locations.

"This will also enhance bringing tourists into the state and making

them stay longer," said Peralta. His bill is making its way through House committees.

State Representative Ben Hall said recently the gambling bills introduced this year also include lottery proposals and some proposed changes for racetracks. In the past racetrack operators have opposed lottery bills, but Hall said that wasn't the case this session.


One racing bill calls for increasing the track's share on exotic wagering from 21 percent to 25 percent. (Exotic wagering is any bet other than win, place or show.)

Doc Wyler, lobbyist for R.D. Hubbard, president of Ruidoso Downs Racing, Inc., said recently that Ruidoso Downs opposes that increase, and by the time the bill was introduced an amendment was added to make the increase by local option rather than mandatory.

The percentage the tracks keep is used to fund track operations with a certain percentage to horsemen and to the purses.

State law also imposes a 10 cents a head tax on the gate of each race track. Hall said Ruidoso Downs Race Track is asking for relief from that charge because the new owner, Hubbard, is waiving admission charges at the track, and will admit racing fans free this year.

Most of the gambling, lottery and racing bills are still in committees, with the session more than half over.

wood, Florida, learned of the latest application two days before the deadline for protesting the move. After getting a 30-day extension of the deadline, officials decided to put together the summit.

Hollywood, Florida, is a beachfront resort city of 125,000. If the trademarking effort is successful the city will have to pay every time it advertises. Eggleston said many tourists come to the Florida city from Canada.

also has a petition signed by property owners against annexation.

"I think you're working this thing backwards ... you don't petition not to annex," said Harris.

"Where is that high-priced lawyer?" asked one audience member, reminding Harris that village attorney Richard Hawthorne said in a meeting last week there are three ways to be annexed. "If he's going to pull something ... we want to be in on it," added the man, wondering if Harris would be asking for the attorney's advice.

"If I need a legal opinion and he has it, I'm going to ask him for it,"

said Harris.

In spite of demands for a motion or some sort of guarantee that the annexation issue is dead, Harris contended that such a motion would be out of order. He ruled a similar motion, offered during a regular meeting last week by Trustee C.L. "Bones" Wright, out of order.

Harris said if the majority of property owners petition for annexation, then the board will vote.

"We don't want to show up every week," said Ames, pushing for a assurance that his and his neighbors' properties won't again be the subject of annexation talks.

"I don't want you to show up every week," responded Harris.

One audience member recommended the petitioners take their document to the board during Monday's regular meeting.

"If the trustees and mayor don't take that and make it a matter of record, then we pretty much know where he stands," he said.

"I guess we've accomplished what we wanted," said Ames.

The Ruidoso Downs Board of Trustees will have a regular meeting at 7 p.m. Monday, March 13, in the Municipal Building.

## Pyramid game could net 18 months in jail for players

District Attorney Bert Atkins confirmed Wednesday that a pyramid-type scam making the rounds in Ruidoso is a violation of state law.

"The '24-hour madness dash' as the scam is referred to calls for a \$10 investment and assures participants a \$40,000 return," said Atkins.

Atkins said New Mexico law defines "a pyramid promotional scheme as any plan or operation by

which a participant gets consideration for the opportunity to receive compensation which is derived primarily from a person's introduction of other persons into participation in the plan or operation rather than the sale of goods."

Any violation of the state law, which includes establishing, operating or promoting a pyramid scheme, is a fourth degree felony with possible penalty of up to 18 months in jail and/or from \$1,000 to

\$10,000 in fines.

Civil penalties also may apply for violations of the Pyramid Promotional Act.

Atkins said enforcement is through the Attorney General's office. The AG may, in appropriate cases, delegate that authority to the DA.

"All area residents are cautioned against participating in this," said Atkins.

## P&Z approves three requests

The Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z), during a short session Monday, approved a replat, a variance and a conditional use before discussing the continuing issue of the old airport land.

Commissioner Frank Kolb, who also chairs the Municipal Airport Planning Board, reported to P&Z that the Ruidoso Village Council created an ordinance to initiate negotiations with the developer who has proposed a public golf course development on the 160-acre tract. He said Don Shaw, a member of the airport planning board, will appear before council next week to ask for answers to some questions the

board has raised over funding and marketing.

Chairman Robert Donaldson noted that the planning board was established as the marketing arm for the municipal property.

"That's there job ... right or wrong," said Donaldson.

Kolb said his board will ask for a small amount of help to buy stamps and stationery to begin that marketing task.

In other regular business, the commission approved a variance for M. Nixon and H. Lucerne to construct a bathroom and laundry room addition on property at 238 Ridge. Commissioner John White cast the lone dissenting vote after the group heard objections from a

neighbor, Robert Gomez.

Gomez said he has made similar requests for variances and they have been turned down.

"It creates an additional precedent ... encroachment on properties there is severe enough as it is," said Gomez. He recommended the addition be placed elsewhere on the lot.

Also Monday, the commission: —Approved a replat on lots 1-5 and the east portion of Lot 6, Block D, Ruidoso Pine Lodge for W.R. Bauska. Agent Tim Collins said the replat would make six lots into four.

—Approved a conditional use for A.T. Corona to have a residence in a commercial district at 143-149 Carrizo Creek Drive.

## Water is subject of disagreement

Questions over water for the proposed golf course on the old municipal airport land continue to be asked of village staff.

Not everybody is satisfied with the answers.

During a regular meeting of the Ruidoso Village Council on Tuesday, village manager Frank Potter responded to a question over the ownership of water under that land by saying the water belongs to the public.

Some members of the audience disagreed, with at least one citizen saying that New Mexico water law states that New Mexico owns it.

Potter, questioned Friday, stood

by his answer, repeating that the water belongs to the public—not the village or the state.

According to a report entitled "New Mexico Water Rights" published by the New Mexico Water Resources Research Institute, New Mexico law broadly states that all natural waters belong to the public and are subject to appropriation.

"The law further classifies all underground water as public," continues the publication.

The book explains that in New Mexico an appropriation or water right, like equipment or furniture, is considered property and can be owned separately from the land. The appropriator owns only the right to use the water, not the

water itself.

Potter said Friday the old airport land is on the Pecos River Basin, with all the water in that basin "fully appropriated" through the State Engineer Office. He said the village owns 249.14 acre-feet of sub-surface rights that currently aren't being used to meet municipal water needs.

He said the village could, if the need is identified, drill a well on the old airport land and move 220 acre-feet of rights to be used in that location. That would allow the village to use or sell that water, with one acre foot being equal to 325,850 gallons of water.

# Building permits are up in February—top \$1/2 million

Building permits for February totaled almost \$200,000 more than in February last year.

Total for February this year was \$511,970, compared to \$317,390 in 1988. The figure for February of 1987 was only \$221,339.

A storage warehouse to be constructed by the Forest Service at 901 Mechem accounted for \$120,000 of the February permits.

Five single family dwellings were included for the month, ranging in cost from \$86,000 to \$48,000.

Additions amounted to \$47,700, while roof and roof repair amounted to \$20,270.

Permits for January of this year were down slightly from January of 1988, but the total for two months puts 1989 ahead of 1988 by about \$150,000.

Spring and summer months are the big months for building permits in Ruidoso.

In 1988, the best month was June with \$938,900 in permits issued by the building inspector's

office in village hall.



## Tourism inquiries on the rise

The New Mexico Tourism & Travel Division has seen a 92 percent increase in inquiries during the first two months of 1989, Eddie Smithson, state tourism director, has announced.

In Ruidoso, January inquiries were more than double what they were in January 1988, John Jeffers, executive director of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, reported to the board of directors recently.

The number in January of this year was 4,806 compared to 2,260 in January of 1988.

On the state level, "the division handled almost 26,000 inquiries in the first 60 days of this calendar year," Smithson said. February ranked second in volume only to April 1988 when the division processed a record 20,151 inquiries.

"Our telephones these past four weeks went absolutely crazy," he said.

There were 8,719 inquiries in January and 17,240 in February, Smithson explained, compared to 13,507 during the first 60 days of 1988.

The increase in January was 30

percent, and in February the increase was 153 percent.

"Our \$240,000 advertising program didn't begin until March, so this increase is virtually independent of any advertising boost," Smithson said.

Smithson noted the February volume of inquiries from California (4,263) was more than twice that of those from Texas (1,936).

Those from Illinois (780), New York (726), and Pennsylvania (725) were third, fourth and fifth in volume.

## Driver is jailed after rollover

A Ruidoso man was uninjured Wednesday in a one-vehicle rollover on Sudderth Drive near Don Victor's.

Police said Ron Bergeron, 33, was in jail this morning, charged with DWI and careless driving after he was arrested at the scene of the accident about 7 p.m.

According to police, Bergeron was westbound on Sudderth driving a Ford Bronco II. Police said Bergeron left the traffic light at Sudderth and Mechem traveling at a high rate of speed and leaving 75 feet of skid marks. Police said the vehicle went into a sideways slide, reversed directions and slid for 20 feet before impacting with a curb. Police said the vehicle overturned onto the driver's side and slid another 13 feet.

Ruidoso Emergency Medical Services responded to the accident, but Bergeron had no visible injuries and refused treatment, according to the report filed by Officer Laura Standridge.

Police said Bergeron is scheduled to appear before the judge this morning.



# Big birds are big business



Caretaker-owner Julie Peebles (above) said ostriches are as easy to care for as chickens, with exactly the same rules, but far different costs. A newly-hatched ostrich averages \$1,000, and after six months of growth is worth about \$5,000. An ostrich foot (below) has only two toes. The ostrich can run 50 miles per hour and defends itself with a powerful kick forward.



Julie displays a basketful of empty ostrich eggs. One egg is equivalent to two dozen hen eggs. Before the eggs reach their 42-day incubation period, the egg is illuminated to determine fertilization. At right, the birds hunt and peck their way around the yard in search of chicken feed. All of the ostrich needs, as well as a market, can be found in the industry's ostrich magazine.



The strutting ostrich becomes regal in appearance. Its hide can produce enough leather for four pairs of very costly boots. Ostrich feathers and eggs are equally expensive and the industry is promoting ostrich meat, which they say tastes like beef, not poultry. Recent legislation has been introduced to create and regulate ostrich races, complete with saddle and a very small jockey.



## Lodgers tax group OKs \$1,500 to correct Lincoln brochure

"One of the problems with Lincoln is nobody knows it's there," said Gary Miller, representative of the Lincoln County Heritage Trust, to the Lincoln County Lodgers Tax Committee (LTC).

Miller requested \$1,500 of lodgers tax funds to correct inaccurate wording in the Visit Historic Lincoln brochure at the regular LTC meeting Wednesday, at Ruidoso Municipal Administrative Center.

Committee members Bob Finely, Rich Seeley, Kay Dennis, Walter Henn and Carolyn Cantrell considered and approved the request.

LTC funds originally financed the brochure, published by DataCo of Albuquerque last year. However, member Henn found fault with some wording and facts listed on the colorful brochure and requested correction.

"I'm a purist," Henn said about the wording.

Dee Miller, also representing the Trust, said they attempted to in-

clude as much information as possible about Lincoln, and its history, in the brochure. She pointed out that some of what Henn called mistakes were for the sake of design layout, such as reversed photos.

After consulting their budget, LTC approved the \$1,500 request.

Members asked Miller about the feasibility of a sign board about Lincoln to be located in the Silver Dollar Restaurant area, along Highway 70, east of the Lincoln turnoff. Because of funding left in the budget, LTC directed Miller to explore the possibility of the sign and report at a later meeting.

Also, LTC approved the tentative 1988-90 budget for the same amount as last year's—\$12,900 total for the committee line item in the county budget. \$1,000 is budgeted for postage, \$500 for mileage and per diem and \$11,400 for advertising and promotion. Seeley expects collections of lodgers' tax next year to closely match those of last year (1988-89).

LTC also financed a brochure entitled "Tour Lincoln County in

Historic New Mexico." The brochure lists different sites of interest in the county including Ruidoso, Ruidoso Valley, Bonito Valley, Lincoln, Fort Stanton, Capitan, Carrizozo, White Oaks, Ancho, Corona and the drive from Ruidoso to Nogal.

Businesses paying lodgers tax in Lincoln County include Twin Spruce Trailer Park in Ruidoso Downs, River Ranch KOA on Highway 70 east of Ruidoso Downs, High Country Lodge, Track and Ski Lodge, both in Alto, Trout Lakes Campground in Ruidoso Downs, Arrowhead Motel in Ruidoso, TLC RV camp west of Capitan, La Junta Lodge in Alto, Wortley Hotel in Lincoln, Sierra Mesa Lodge in Alto area, Casa de Patron in Lincoln, Monjeau Shadows on Nogal Mesa, Rancho Ruidoso Condominiums, east of Alto and Circle B RV Mobile Home Park in Ruidoso Downs.

The next meeting is scheduled at 10 a.m. Wednesday, April 19, in Carrizozo. LTC will finalize the budget at that meeting.

## New bleachers up at fair arena

When summer arrives and rodeo activities begin, patrons will find changes at the Lincoln County Fairground arena.

Thanks to a National Park Service grant, the arena now sports a new set of bleachers at the southwest end. Last year commissioners approved the bid from Sturdy Steele of Waco, Texas, and the company completed installation of the bleachers last week.

The bleachers have 15 rows of seats, a handicapped access ramp and a place for wheelchairs. The entire unit is elevated three feet from the ground which will allow better viewing of the rodeo.

The original grant was \$7,500 with local matching funds to be

\$2,500. However, the cost of the installed bleachers totaled \$13,498,

which means the cost above the \$7,500 must be raised locally, said Ralph Dunlap, a member of the fair association board and former Lincoln County commissioner.

Recently, Dunlap and several Future Farmer of America members and 4-H members visited the New Mexico State Legislature to request \$270,000 for seven additional bleacher units, a new concession stand and bathrooms, additional barn facilities, insulation and heaters for the exhibit hall and office.

Dunlap said the hall could become a "mini-civic center" for the Village of Capitan and the county, if insulated. Currently, the building is only usable during warm


weather.

Although legislators gave little encouragement to the group requesting funds for the fair grounds, Dunlap said Representative Ben Hall was more optimistic.

Dunlap said the association will know if funding is approved by March 20, after the 60-day session adjourns.

The arena is used by various rodeo groups year-round and always is open for anyone wishing to practice their horses, Dunlap added.

The fair association formed in 1956 and meets quarterly during the year. It oversees the county fair and the Smokey Bear Stampede Rodeo, the annual fundraiser.



## Fly Dragoness soars over the finish line

Fly Dragoness had not been on a race track since last November, but the multiple-stakes winner showed her class to win going away in Sunday's \$11,500 New Mexico Horse Breeder's Association Sale Stakes.

The filly was making her debut as a three-year-old and looked sharp in defeating seven other New Mexico-breds and was clocked in 1:11.3 for six furlongs to win by a two and one half length margin. Owned by Fletcher Hall, Fly Dragoness was bred by V.J. Callaway and is the daughter of Full Choke out of the Draconic mare, Tomisty.

Under rider Glen Murphy, the filly won her eighth race in 13 starts and pushed her career earnings over \$87,000.

Trainer Doyal Roberts has seen his bay-colored speedball win six of her last seven races, including the Rio Grande Futurity at Ruidoso Downs and a New Mexico-bred filly futurity at Albuquerque. Her only defeat since last July, was a second place finish to Wise Blade in the Sunland Park Thoroughbred Sale

Futurity here as a freshman last October.

Fly Dragoness went off as the solid favorite to pay \$3.20, \$2.40, \$2.40.

Homer Garza's Nu South led the pack for most of the race, but was clearly second best to earn \$2,530 of the purse and pay mutual returns of \$2.60, \$2.40. Dr. Reconiter was a steady third to pay back \$3.00.

The rest of the field across the wire was Nitter Pitter, Loose Lips Cash, Little Time Left, Sissy's Pocket, and Ramboette.

Jockey Joe Martinez rode three winners on Sunday's card to pull within three of leader Mike Lidberg.

Martinez's winners included Table Thime in the third race who paid \$46.00 to win. Martinez now has 99 wins from 465 mounts while Lidberg's record shows 102 wins coming from 659 trips.

Racing resumed Wednesday, March 8, and the track's Tri-Super carryover was \$22,319.



## Spring's Promise Is In The Land

This is being written to you on March seven just at midday, and Mother Earth is rejoicing under a sky of purplish blue, while a balmy and mellow breeze floats the colors of the American flag - rippling in the sun against the pure sky above the mountain horizon.

The snow of a few days ago is just what the Children of Mother Earth needed to begin their late winter preparation for Spring time. Most of the snow is gone from the golden mountain meadows, with just a trace left under the pinon Cedar and Juniper on the hillsides to the South.

However, the thirsty ground drank gratefully of the snow melt water, and there are still tiny snow-springs flowing over the mossy rocks and among the earliest Spring herbs. The apricot tree is the darling of all trees to the bees. Many a year after a cold and snowy mid-winter, there will come a warm spell as early as mid-February. And the apricot fruit buds will come out in bloom.

Then the bees will come flying in from everywhere and begin working among the white and pink blossoms, singing their little humming hymns of thankfulness.

### The Fruit Picture

With the apricot blooms holding back, and the mountain full of snow, something tells me we are going to have a good fruit year. The apricot is the pacesetter for the other fruit trees which follow usually in this order: plum, sweet cherry, peach, pear, pie cherry and apple. They tell me that down the river the apple trees are loaded with fruit buds, ready to make up for last year's slim picking.

The north wind off the snowy mountains to the north will keep

the air cool, and then the west wind from the Sierra Blanca will bring a cool breath to the fruit belt. This will hold back the fruit blooms.

### Little Milk Face

When Little Felix, the black cat who came to the house, crippled, years ago, a new chapter was opened in my book of life. I will never forget the look of gratefulness Felix gave me out of his green eyes. He was my first cat.

Then years later when Corina, the Storm Ranch cat of today, lay dying at the front gate, where she had waited all day crying at each breath. She was about seven inches long, skin and bones. I nursed her back to health, and never dreamed a little cat could wrap itself around your heart strings the way Corina has mine. I think I told you some time back that a mother cat had four little kittens in a bushel basket behind the house. Pat Crawford, my little friend just up the way took one of them, an orange tiger striped kitten

she named Stormy.

Three are left here, a male orange tiger, another male green-eyed-gray and a little pure black female with golden eyes. She has a white marking around her mouth and lower jaw which gives her a comical look when she looks at you through those golden eyes.

This white blotch makes her look as if she has been drinking from a bowl of milk. I will think up a better name but for now I call her "Milk Face."

Did you ever notice that among a group of dogs or cats, one of them will take a liking to you, come running to you, or begin following you around.

Little Milk Face is first to come running when I call to feed, and she steps into the house when I open the door, and then steps out to join the others. By doing this she seems to be telling me that she belongs here for keeps.

The cats like to stay out in the garage most of the time. Milky stays up in the little attic that Mark built in the garage. On a couple of cold nights I went out to see how they were doing and here was Milky cuddled up between

## Area horse sale grads qualify for WT Futurity



## Two are hospitalized after Wed. roll-over

Two men remain hospitalized with injuries they sustained in a one-vehicle accident early Wednesday in Capitan.

## New computer equipment enhances Ruidoso Public Library services

The New Mexico State Library has awarded the Ruidoso Public Library an LSCA Title III grant in the amount of \$6,242 for the purchase of a complete BiblioFile Catalog Production System.

According to a news release, the State Library is making it possible for twelve libraries, including the Ruidoso Library, to begin building machine-readable data necessary to participate in any regional or statewide automation project.


The equipment purchased under these grants provides access to computer technology for those libraries with limited experience in this field.

The complete BiblioFile Catalog Production System includes an IBM PC XT compatible computer, an international standard CD-ROM drive, a printer, LC MARC English language laser disc, with three years of monthly updates, and complete support, including software updates, toll free 800 line assistance, and hardware replacement for three years. In addition to the support given by BiblioFile, the State Library will provide training in the use of the equipment and consulting in cataloging, where there is a need.

In offering this equipment free, the State Library is making the fol-

lowing conditions: 1. that the library be willing to continue subscribing to BiblioFile's laser disc updates; 2. that the library use the LC MARC records which comprise BiblioFile's database for your local cataloging, and; 3. that after a reasonable length of time, the State Library will ask the library to download current cataloging for possible use in a regional or statewide automation project.

The Ruidoso Public Library has taken the first step into the world of technology, continues the release. The BiblioFile has great potential value to the library community.

## The Plant Corner

by Sally Black



Dear Sally: My schefflera is large, about eight feet tall and is in a 20 gallon pot. My question is: do these plants die of old age? It doesn't look well. Thanks for your help! Jo Ann C.

Dear Jo Ann: The answer to your question is, no. Outside, as in southern California, they grow to about 20 feet tall and live as long as 100 years. Inside, under recommended conditions, they will grow to the top of the ceiling rapidly, about eight feet tall and four feet wide and may be ideal for filling a large gap quickly.

Remove the "growing tip" for a very attractive but more of a shrub plant. The plant will soon reach the ceiling again and again.

Your plant may look unhealthy because of an invasion of red spider mites. These tiny pests can go undetected until they have a stranglehold on the plant. Do not fail to check weekly, while wearing your glasses, looking on stems and undersides of the leaves.

This natural enemy of the schefflera can do irrevocable damage in two or three weeks time. If mites are on the verge of killing your plant, it is usually best to destroy the plant, soil and sterilize the pot with bleach. Do not use the pot for at least a couple of months and sterilize again with all new soil.

Three rather similar plants, all of which reach a substantial size quite quickly, are *Cussonia spicata*, *Heptapleurum arboricola* (sometimes sold as *Schefflera venulosa arystrostachys*) and *Schefflera actinophylla* (commonly known as the Umbrella Tree but also called *Brassaia Actinophylla*). They all have palmate leaves that radiate like fingers of a hand from the end of the leaf stalk.

The umbrella tree possibly is the most attractive of all the larger indoor foliage plants, combining elegance and beauty. The umbrella tree is a native Australian and often called an Octopus Tree because it has so many "hands."

They also produce flowers in clusters that are narrow and up to two feet long and spread horizontally. After the flowers comes a tiny dark purple fruit.

Don't be afraid to prune this plant. Should it become too leggy and overgrown, the plants can be cut to nearly the soil level; they will branch and take a better form as it grows right back to the ceiling top. February is the best time for

propagation when you prune the tree and use the cuttings for new plants.

**Soil:** The soil must have a loam base. Oxygen must get to the roots. Use one-third sand, one-third peat and one-third number two potting soil. Add vermiculite to help air to circulate among the roots. Use a large pot the equivalent to a half-barrel and best placed on a good, strong dolly or if using a half-barrel you can attach casters directly to the barrel. Use at least five casters to prevent tipping.

Place a lot of plastic do-dads in the bottom of the pot as fast drainage is absolutely essential.

**Water:** Water throughout the year. Allowing the moist soil to become almost dry between waterings. Never overwater or let stand in a tray of water. This would be a loud, clear call to the mites to invade. Wash leaves with soap suds occasionally and mist to discourage mites.

**Light and temperature:** Here we need a good bright light. A southern exposure with an overhead skylight or fluorescent tube go-bulb attached to the ceiling directly above the plant.

The schefflera must be kept warm. The plant will thrive at 60 to 90 degrees but can tolerate a lower temperature.

**Fertilizer:** Give a dilute liquid feed once every month in summer. Cut the solution to one-quarter the manufacturer's recommended use. This plant likes organic fertilizer to prevent salt build-up and hates cigarette smoke. Keep an electric fan near if there is a smoker.

**Pests:** Red spider mites are the very worst enemy of this plant. The little mites cling to the plant as if the schefflera was their mother. The plant and the mites seem inseparable.

The Hawaiian variety seem to be more resistant to the mites. The little cotton headed sap-sucking mealy bug also is a "worst enemy." Use rubbing alcohol on these little suckers, and treat the mites with Malathion spray and give the soil a good leaching with Isotox periodically.

Just remember the old saying "an ounce of prevention" is worth a bird in the bush, or something like that.

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
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

Meanwhile, petitions against annexation were circulated; neighbors contacted neighbors, maps were drawn and on and on. And the whole thing could have been avoided.

So, when speaking or writing on an issue that really matters, take the time to think it through and say what you mean. Listeners are only going to hear what you really say.-fj

These cities, as confirmed by a reputable individual, have mayor-council-manager form of government, just like Ruidoso currently is governed.

I have some mixed emotions about the proposed golf course. Someone said that we are a country of growing elderly. Why do I see so many pregnant women, new babies and children everywhere? What are they going to do? Do they have to wait until they are elderly to have

This gentleman also stated that a group of concerned citizens met and concluded that the village property taxes had doubled and even tripled in the last few years. Property taxes are not set by the Village of Ruidoso governing body alone. These taxes are a result of county, schools and special districts and some by bond elections funding these entities. The Village of Ruidoso implemented a 3 mil levy this year due to the county's failure to uphold their part of the joint powers agreement to fund capital improvements at the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport. This is only for

the 1988-1989 fiscal year.

The State of New Mexico requires the County Assessor's Office to reassess all property every two years, so in 1988 we are paying property taxes for the 1986 assessment.

This gentleman pointed out that the Village of Ruidoso's gross receipts tax was the highest in the State of New Mexico. This is true, however, this was the voters choice. The implementation of each increase went before the voters of the Village of Ruidoso.

Another true fact was stated that the engineers estimates all

came in too low; however, he failed to mention that those engineers no longer work for the Village of Ruidoso.

And last, but certainly not least, this gentleman criticized the enforcement of village ordinances. The last couple of years, there has been positive enforcement of the municipal ordinances by village staff that is exemplary. As a matter of fact, Bud and the kids and I spent a week once at Lake LBJ in an area populated mainly by retirees who, you guessed it, played a lot of golf. We got a big kick out of watching those folks sitting patiently in a long line of golf carts awaiting their turns to tee off.

And then as we passed by the golf course, we noticed those golfers beating the bushes for lost golf balls.

It didn't appeal to any of us. But I've never forgotten what a big bunch of folks there were wanting to play golf ... wanting to badly enough to sit for hours waiting for their turns.

I hadn't thought too much about those patient sportsmen until all the talk about a golf course on the old airport land—do we need it or don't we? If we get it, will the gol-

fers come? And, if they do, will they spend enough money to boost the local economy? And what about those dangerous chemicals used to keep golf courses green?

First off, I just can't get too upset about the chemicals since golf courses all over this nation are surrounded by high priced homes. The most exclusive subdivisions in towns all over this nation are built on golf courses ... and people are spending top dollars to live there ... they're taking their children with them.

So, I really don't think the school children of Ruidoso will be endangered if a golf course is built next to the playground.

As to the economic impact of golfing, I have to look to others for such information. And just as I was about to begin my research, I received some information in the mail from Ray W. Johnson of

Hurst, Texas. I haven't met Johnson, but he said he, too, isn't a golfer, but thought the statistics and projections he had from the February 20 publication of the National Institute of Business Management might be helpful to the people of Ruidoso.

Here's what Paul Hencke, editor in chief, has to say:

"Golf is on the verge of becoming a national mania, a sport reshaping lifestyles, spending habits, real estate development and investment patterns..."

"Golf's growth has been remarkable, is running at five to seven percent annual rate. Some 21 million American are golfing now, 40 million are expected by 2000. (The) Game is a \$20 billion industry that should double over the next 12 years ... Clubs, balls, apparel, shoes? Sales already top \$2 billion a year.

"\$7.8 billion is being spent annually on golf travel—and lodging. ... Game-related real estate, new golf courses, second homes with views of a fairway costing \$500,000 or more, generate \$4 billion in yearly sales. Golf course fees and memberships in golf clubs? They run up to \$3.9 billion.

"...Golf course opera-

tions—upkeep and maintenance—another \$1.8 billion. TV money? Corporate sponsorship of the tour comes to a half billion dollars.

"Business opportunities in golf abound, range from apparel to publishing. Game-related gadgetry is booming..."

"Wall Street analysts see golf as a big plus for sports equipment makers..."

"The nation's 12,346 courses can't handle demand, so 150 new links are planned or under construction annually—already stretched out to year 2000. U.S. has only 2-300 driving ranges, far too few, and here, too, building is up.

"Finally, (the) game is major incentive many businesses offer customers, e.g., hotels, rental car agencies giving a free round of golf to weekend travelers.

"Added fuel for this second American golf boom—first was in 1950s—comes from 75 million baby boomers, as they grow older and gain in affluence.

"... Net, an amazing story of growth and opportunity—and one far from over."

Thanks, Ray. That's pretty interesting stuff, and food for thought for Ruidoso citizens as we deal with what to do with the old airport land.

Do we really want a guy to come in here and build us a \$2 to \$3 million golf course?

... ..

Say it again, Sam. I love that deep voice, booming out decisively, "but Mr. President..."

My hero, Sam Donaldson, has moved to Lincoln County, and things will never be the same.

**DEAR EDITOR:**

This letter is in response to all of the people who want this golf course so badly that they are fabricating falsehoods to get it. I'm talking about all of the misinformed, unenlightened, people who keep insisting that the chemical fertilizers, pesticides, and herbicides used on golf courses are not harmful or damaging to the environment or its inhabitants. I beg to differ, and I resent being told this when I know the facts! There has got to come a time when people will stop being environmentally negligent and stop dumping these toxic substances into our air, soil and water!

We have become so complacent in our habits that we choose to ignore the facts at hand. We have been told time and time again by the so-called "experts" that chemicals used on golf courses are "safe" or "harmless." Well, within these "safe" chemicals themselves there are sinister, and little-understood interactions, transformations, and ultimate effects. In the presence of air and sunlight, dangerous substances may be born of parent chemicals labeled "harmless." The reactions between two or more "harmless" chemicals is not only unpredictable, but beyond our control!

With the torrential rains that we inevitably see each year in Ruidoso, does it really surprise people to know that these chemicals are washed from the area in which they

are sprayed and end up in our water?! That's a fact! In the entire water pollution problem there is probably nothing more disturbing than the threat of widespread contamination of our ground water! It is not possible to add pesticides or fertilizers to land anywhere without threatening the purity of water everywhere!

They tell us not to worry, that the chemicals that will be used are all water-soluble. Let me give you an example of a water-soluble compound: arsenic. Arsenic, which happens to be the basic ingredient in a variety of weed and insect killers, is water-soluble. Being water-soluble, it dissolves in water. It does not, however, lose its toxicity in water. Arsenic is an environmental substance clearly established as causing cancer in man. Soil sprayed with arsenical insecticides becomes poisoned. Rains then carry part of the arsenic into streams, rivers, and reservoirs, as well as into the vast subterranean seas of groundwater! The most obvious hazard with arsenic or other chemicals is that of acute poisoning of people applying sprays or accidentally coming in contact with drifting spray, such as children playing on a school play-ground located near a golf course. I have yet to hear of an air-soluble chemical!

I don't appreciate the unmitigated, unsubstantiated propaganda that these golf fanatics are spreading around about a subject they know very little about! A

## AARP members talk healthcare

Members of the Ruidoso chapter of American Association of Retired Persons (AARP) heard about the Medicare Catastrophic Coverage Act at their recent monthly meeting.

Bob Waters, professional consultant for Edward D. Jones Company of Clovis discussed the eligibility, benefits, costs and tax-saving strategies of the act.

According to a news release provided by the club, the monthly premium for Medicare part B has increased 37 percent with the remaining 63 percent paid by the surtax on federal income tax.

Waters gave an example of a premium for 1989 of \$24.80, which

will increase each year to \$35 until 1993. Medicare surtax, figured on \$150 of federal income tax paid, will be \$22.50 for 1989 with an \$800 limit for individuals with a joint limit of \$1,600.

The tax is based on a \$52,000 pay limit and anyone paying more than \$52,000 will pay the same amount. The joint limit will rise each year to \$1,050 and \$2,100 for 1993.

Waters gave other examples of federal income tax to figure the current premium and surtax rate. He told the group to use half of the income tax to figure the amount of surtax. The Medicare surtax is based on the federal income tax

liability. The right investment strategy could reduce that liability, Waters said.

He listed several ways to obtain tax-free income, including owning individual municipal bonds, unit trusts composed of municipal bonds, and mutual funds composed of municipal bonds.

Also present at the meeting was Opal Lankford, assistant state director of AARP. She told the group of a district meeting on housing scheduled for March 31 in Hobbs.

The group concluded the meeting with a covered dish luncheon.



Shartelle Lester received honorable mention in Behavioral and Social Sciences.

All above students were first-place winners at the Ruidoso science and engineering fair.

Last year, Ruidoso was rated the top school system at the Regional Science and Engineering Fair, based on the awards received by the Ruidoso students. Overdorf said the system may receive the rating again this year; however, he will be notified in a few months.

## Republicans compare municipal government forms

"Ruidoso is big business. It should be run as a big business," declared Ruidoso resident John Schuller, addressing the Federated Republican Women of Lincoln County (FRWLC) at a regular recent monthly meeting in Ruidoso.

According to a news release, the retired businessman presented a program comparing a commission-manager form of municipal government to a mayor-council form. The latter currently is in use in Ruidoso.

According to Schuller, a commission-manager form is more efficient because "there is no elected mayor and the enmity be-

tween the mayor and council is eliminated."

Instead, five elected commissioners hire a manager based on qualifications such as education and experience. The manager then is responsible for all administrative aspects of that municipal government.

Schuller compared the commission-manager arrangement to that of a corporation.

"Voters are like stockholders who elect a board of directors who then hire a president to run the business. Ruidoso is big business and we should demand it be run like one," said Schuller.

Changing the form of existing municipal government is prescribed in state statutes.

"First, voters must sign a petition. Twenty percent of the number who voted in the last general election are required. Then a special election can be called so all voters can decide if they want a change or not," he said.

Schuller told the club that anyone interested in signing a petition or in further information may contact him directly.

"Our purpose is to inform the community so that they can make their own decisions as to whether they want it or not," said club pro-

gram chairman Genevieve Sewell. "The better informed voters they are, the more intelligent decisions they can make," she added.

In other business, legislative chairperson Rhonda Johnston informed members of pending state legislation concerning pharmacies and Medicaid.
