Retirees recruitment shifts into high gear

Just 10 days after the first of three advertisements appeared in national publications, the Retiree Services Division of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce has received more than 400 responses.

Roy Crocker, chairman of the division that is working to attract retirees to the Ruidoso area, is pleased with that number. He still expects to hear from 5,000 prospects—half the number that responded to Roswell's advertising campaign.

The Retiree Services Division ran ads in "Mature Outlook," the "Retired Officer" and "New Choices."

Crocker said each respondent will be sent a packet of information that includes the division's brochure, "Ruidoso and Retirees—a perfect match." The brightly colored brochure includes scenic and pictures of vibrant and well-dressed retirees golfing, fishing, skiing, shopping and generally having fun.

The "generic" packet also includes brochures from Lincoln County Medical Center, from Ruidoso Little Theatre, Community Concerts and a subscription form from **The Ruidoso News**. Also included is a check-off, postal card to return for further information on a variety of subjects from lodging to local history.

Each inquirer also gets a handwritten note from a retiree.

Crocker said each inquiry is logged, including where the advertising was seen, where the inquirer lives and any other information included.

"We can follow the thing all the way through," said Crocker, noting that on the second inquiry, where the respondent asks for specific information the information is distributed to the group that can answer that question.

For instance, when the first retiree attracted through this program purchases property in the area, the division will be able to track all the contacts from the first

inquiry to the final deal with an area real estate firm.

As of March 8, the division had received the most inquiries from California, with Illinois second, Texas third, Colorado fourth, and Florida fifth. Crocker said respondents from those states ask about the climate, environmental issues and crime statistics.

The prospects also want to know about the area's cost of living, and that has prompted Crocker's group to undertake a market survey that will compare costs of food, utilities and housing in various areas of the United States.

Crocker said retired military personnel also want to know where the nearest base is located.

Volunteers will respond to each inquiry individually on this second go-round, providing specific information that wasn't included in the first mailing.

"If we could get 100 couples to move here, think what that would do for our community," said Mildred Crocker.

Budget is on track says village manager

Finance director John Varley gave the Ruidoso Village Council a short course in accounting before presenting a mid-year budget review Tuesday at Ruidoso Municipal Administrative Center.

Varley, using formats he said are required by the Department of Finance and Administration, presented changes to the budget as of mid-year, and reported the village has increased expenses more than revenues so far this year.

"We missed the budget ... right?" asked Councillor Al Junge.

"I wouldn't agree with that," responded Varley, adding the 500 or so changes in a budget with more

than 2,000 line items wasn't unreasonable. He said budgeting will be easier in the future as he has developed a system that builds a history within funds, departments and down to line items.

He said some changes were caused by unknowns, things that didn't have any previous history, like the village's taking over the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport when the village and county canceled the joint powers agreement.

Varley also explained the way money from various funds is placed in the same bank accounts, but accounted for through the village accounting system.

Firefighters organize, train wildfire crew

The Ruidoso Fire Department, concerned over the potential for fires in this heavily forested area, is organizing an auxiliary wildland firefighting crew.

An organizational meeting is planned at 6 p.m. Tuesday, March 21, in council chambers of Ruidoso Municipal Administrative Center.

Fire Department spokesman Barry Cole said this crew will receive 24 hours of training to be conducted jointly by New Mexico State Forestry, the United States Forest Service and the Ruidoso Fire Department.

Training dates will be set at the

organizational meeting.

Cole said volunteers will have to be in moderately good physical condition, and will have to successfully complete, not only the technical skills training, but also a physical fitness stress test used by the USFS.

He said the physical fitness test will be conducted at the Ruidoso Fire Department, and anyone wanting to take a "practice" test may stop in and preview the test. He said it isn't extremely difficult and takes only five minutes.

Cole said the wildfire crew will be an auxiliary of the Ruidoso

Services planned today for former Ruidoso resident

Yank Kannady, the son of Joe and Margie Rech of Alamogordo and Jerry Kannady of Ruidoso, died Thursday at Gerald Champion Memorial Hospital in Alamogordo. He was 16.

According to published reports, Kannady was shot in the head Thursday with a .22 caliber handgun. Police said the victim was riding in a car with three to five other teens when he was shot.

Lieutenant Steve Lee of the Alamogordo Department of Public Safety was quoted as saying one of the passengers in the car took the gun from under the seat, pointed it to the back and it discharged, striking the boy in the head.

According to police, charges of involuntary manslaughter were filed Friday naming 18-year-old

William Smith of Alamogordo.

A wake was scheduled Sunday and the funeral mass was planned for 9 a.m. today (Monday), March 13, at St. Jude's Mission in San Patricio. Graveside services will be at 1:30 p.m. today at Forest Lawn Cemetery in Ruidoso. Father David J. Bergs will officiate at the services.

Kannady was born February 24, 1973, in Ruidoso. He had been an Alamogordo resident since 1979, and was a 10th grade student at Alamogordo Mid-High.

He was the manager of the junior varsity basketball team, and a lifelong athlete. Kannady played basketball at the Boys and Girls Club, was a member of the undefeated 8th and 9th grade football team and had played soccer and

"We use a co-mingled general operating bank account," said Varley. The village has accounts at Ruidoso State Bank, First National Bank, the Bank of Ruidoso, Pioneer Savings and First Federal Savings. Within those accounts are monies that are parts of various funds, some with restrictions on their uses.

Varley said since 1983 Ruidoso has seen a decline in revenues of from 15 to 17 percent. During that

same period, federal revenue sharing has been discontinued. Varley said with oil at top dollars, the village ended up with infra-structure build with boom money.

"In spite of declining revenues, we've improved our position budget-wise," said village manager Frank Potter, noting the village has cut employees without cutting services and is well on the way to reaching the year-end goal of having a 1/12 cash reserve.

He said the village payroll has decreased by 32 percent over the

past two years, and Varley and division head Leon Eggleston have been able to collect all the money owed to the village by the state for various projects.

"I think that's a first," said Potter.

"This Village Council is the most fiscally responsible I've worked with in my 25 years here," said Potter, noting all the members have taken time to ask Varley questions and find out about the budget.

Councillor J.D. James said he's heard people say they would pay off

the village bonding indebtedness early, but Varley explained that bonds have to be "callable" to be repaid early.

"And you have to have the money," he said.

The village budget totals \$13,092,313, with 26.1 percent for payroll and employee benefits, 30.1 percent for operations, 8.2 percent capital outlay, 11.6 percent special projects and 24 percent for bond indebtedness.

Volunteer Fire Department, and will be organized along the lines of a hotshot crew, with 19 members on a crew boss. He said volunteers will basically be trained to use hand tools to cut fire lines if the need ever arises.

"They won't be trained to respond to structure fires," said Cole.

"We really recognized the need on the Camelot fire—lots of people showed up to help," said Cole. "We would like to provide those people with training, proper clothing and gear so they can help even more effectively," he added.

"We do set an 18-year age limit," said Cole, encouraging all physically fit men and women over the age of 18 to come to the organizational

meeting and learn more about the group.

Cole said the wildfire fighter volunteers will follow guidelines set up by Southwest Firefighters, a coordinating agency that forms and sends out crews all over the United States.

"This is part of our hazard mitigation plan—preparing for disasters you hope never happen," said

Cole.

This area has lost thousands of acres of timber to wildfires that have included the Gavilan fire in May 1967, that burned 1,740 acres; the school fire in March 1974 that burned 208 acres; the Moon Mountain fire in May 1977 that burned 200 acres and the most recent Camelot fire in February that burned 37 acres.

Local mid-schoolers take top spots at Math/Science Bowl

Junior high students from seven schools filled the Ruidoso Middle School gym last week during the Invitational Math and Science Bowl.

Sponsored by Ruidoso Middle School (RMS), the all-day competition involved sixth, and seventh and eighth grade math and science teams from Roswell Mountain View, Holloman, Las Cruces Holy Cross, Carrizozo, Cloudcroft, Tularosa and Ruidoso.

Math team students had to answer such question as "what is an obtuse angle?" or "which is greater? .057 or .134?" within the 30-second time limits.

Science teams, with the same time limit, answered questions about geology, biology and botany such as, "what is the characteristic of a perennial plant?"

Right answers were worth five points, but wrong ones took five points from the score.

The competition was similar to a sports tournament with losing teams disqualified and winning teams advancing to quarter-, semi- and final competition.

As the competition continued, RMS and Mountain View seventh and eighth grade math and science teams advanced through the bracket.

RMS Science Club sponsor Jackie Branum said Mountain View and RMS have competed and shared first place in math and science since the bowl competition began a few years ago.

And again this year, the two schools were finalists.

The RMS seventh and eighth grade math team: Hemanth Pal, Jackie Jacobsen, John Estes, Melissa Curran, Brandi Pfeffer, Tracy Jarvis, Ryan Wall and Kerrie Cubberly, outscored the Mountain View team by two right answers, in


a play-off as tense as any sports competition.



The Municipal Airport Planning Board will meet at 2 p.m. Wednesday, March 15, in council chambers of Ruidoso Municipal Administrative Center. The group, responsible for overseeing the development of the old municipal airport land, meets every other week to consider proposals. Just one proposal has been offered so far for a golf course to be developed on the 160-acre tract.

Fort Stanton is included in 'Boots and Saddles Tour' bill

The New Mexico congressional delegation is sponsoring legislation paving the way for a "Boots and Saddles Tour" of eight historic forts, including Fort Stanton. Senators Jeff Bingaman and Pete Domenici, along with Congressman Joe Skeen are sponsoring a bill to establish the tour of forts that were in New Mexico during the Civil War and Indian campaigns. According to a news release provided by Bingaman, the tour would promote tourism by allowing visitors to enjoy the forts in New Mexico by automobile, foot and even on horseback. He said the tour would also result in increased protection for the forts. The legislation recognizes each of these sites for its historic significance and asks the Interior Secretary Manuel Lujan Jr. to study the feasibility of establishing an inter-agency management group to oversee tourist operations at each of these historic forts, including five in the second Congressional district. Under the legislation, the Interior Department's study will be the first step toward establishing a sophisticated tourist network between each of these forts. Travelers will know they are driving on the "Boots and Saddles Tour." Or, the less conventional traveler can hike or ride horseback along the exact historic trails which linked the forts in the 19th century, said Skeen in a news release. "Eight historic forts played an important role in the settlement of the American frontier," said Skeen. "I believe it is important to preserve these priceless treasures of our pioneer history." "Tourists in New Mexico often cite its cultural resources as their chief reason for visiting," said Bingaman. "A national study of a Boots and Saddles Tour would bring more effective interpretation and appreciation of these unique links to the past," he added. The sites include Fort Stanton, used by Kit Carson as the center for his campaign against the Apache and Navajo; Fort Sumner, in DeBaca County, was used to house Apache and Navajo captives of Kit Carson; Fort Seldon, north of Las Cruces, which served to protect settlers in the area from Apache raids and Fort Bayard, near Silver City, which played a key role in the campaigns against Geronimo. Fort Cummings, in Luna County, was the base of operations for the Apache Wars against famous Indian leaders like Cochise, Victorio and Geronimo; Fort McRae, in Sierra County, housed soldiers who fought Navajo and Apache raiding parties on the popular east-west trail; Fort Craig, near Socorro, was the largest Civil War fort in the west and Fort Union, near Las Vegas, also played a key role in the Civil War as soldiers guarded the Santa Fe Trail, the main artery of supply for the federal armies. "All these forts were abandoned for military purposes long ago," Skeen noted. "But because of the dry southwestern climate, many of them still contain interesting, physical remains." Statistics compiled by New Mexico's Bureau of Land Management show more than 35,000 tourists visited Forts Sumner, Seldon and Union in 1987. "Obviously the tourism benefits to the towns near these forts could be enormous," Skeen said.

February weather was wet, warm

February in Ruidoso was warm and wet. The average daily temperature of 39.3 degrees was 4.2 degrees above the long-term normal while the average daily minimum of 26.6 degrees was eight degrees above normal. The average daily maximum of 51.9 degrees was only .3 degrees above normal. Daily minimum temperatures were above average on all but three days of the month, ranging from minus six degrees on February 6 to 43 degrees on February 1. The warmest days were recorded on February 24 and 25 when a high temperature of 71 degrees was recorded, only one degree below the record maximum for February. Temperatures did not fall below freezing (32 degrees) on seven days of the month. Two significant precipitation periods, February 5-7 and 15-17, along with a minor one on February 20, resulted in a monthly snowfall total of 14 inches or 5.6 inches above normal. This brings the winter total to 38.9 inches which is 89 percent of the average winter total. The water equivalent of this was 1.72 inch or .56 inch above the February average. The greatest amount of precipitation fell on February 5 and 6 when snowfall measured nine inches; this also was the greatest accumulation on the ground. Snow on the ground was recorded on a total of 15 days, from February 6 to 20. Winds greater than 25 miles per hour were observed on seven days; February 1-5, 19 and 27.

Fort Stanton Hospital director praises state deputy director Muth

Ervin Aldaz was concerned, "very concerned" when Carla Muth's appointment as secretary of Health and Social Services was rejected by state senators. Aldaz, Fort Stanton Training School and Hospital administrator, said Muth has been very supportive of the programs and the hospital. "She has given more interest and support than others before her," Aldaz said in a telephone interview last week. Aldaz was just back from Santa Fe where he voiced his concerns over the rejection. Governor Garrey Carruthers, when Muth was not confirmed by the Senate, named her deputy secretary, where she essentially does the same things she did as secretary. "She understands our business," Aldaz said. He met with Muth Wednesday morning, and learned the restructuring in the Health and Social Service Department included no changes for Fort Stanton. Muth will continue as supervisor of Health and Environment which supervises the operation of the hospital, Aldaz said. "Muth is not out," he added. He credited Muth with a very professional understanding of health care in New Mexico, including the hospital at Fort Stanton. "She is a good, good secretary," Aldaz concluded.

Sertomans promote good hearing

Lincoln County Sertoma members have recently completed hearing tests for 1,029 school children in Ruidoso and Capitan.

Sertoma, which stands for **SERVICE TO MANKIND**, is an international organization which has chosen speech and hearing as its major focus speech. The local chapter shares that focus.

According to David Morales, president of the Lincoln County chapter, the Roswell hearing van was borrowed for tests in this area.

Students at Nob Hill, White Mountain Elementary and Interme-

mediate schools and Ruidoso High School were tested.

The group did a special presentation for the high school shop classes. Morales said many students don't realize that some tools used in the classes are loud enough to cause hearing loss.

In Capitan about 300 elementary and intermediate school children were tested. Zia Senior Citizens volunteers helped with the testing.

The local Sertoma chapter has only 15 members, according to Morales, which means a lot of work

for those few members during testing time.

"We couldn't have done it without the help of the nurses," he said. The Ruidoso school nurse is JoAnn Jameson and the Capitan school nurse is Nancy Barone.

The tests identified a half-dozen children with possible hearing problems and their names were turned over to the school nurses.

Lincoln County volunteers spent well over 100 hours with the testing.

"I really enjoyed working with all those people," Morales said.

Besides all those hours, Sertoma got help from the Lincoln County Medical Center, which donated about 1,000 ear speculas for looking into ears, and the Ruidoso Downs Volunteer Fire Department through the donation of a tune-up and oil change for the van from volunteer funds.

Sertoma has a training program to get its members certified to operate the machine, and most members are certified. The van is equipped with two machines, one specifically for preschool youngsters and the other for older children and adults who can answer questions.

The van will be seen again in the area during the health fair and preschool screening.

Morales says Sertoma is looking for new members. Anyone interested can contact him at 378-4069.

I envy people with style that command respect.

To the best of my knowledge, people who like bulldogs vacation in Deming.

Maskew praised other Warriors. "Rachel Holstein ran well all day long," he said. "She had one of the better times in the 100M dash, but because she came in second in one of her heats, she didn't make it to the finals."

"Ardena Comanche ran the 800M for the first time in her life," said Maskew. "She didn't make the finals but she had a good time 2:42 and we think she is going to be a great asset to the team in the future."

Maskew said Jennifer Jimenez bested her personal mark in the discus throw.

"Jennifer threw 99-7 which is about 15 feet further than she threw at the same time last year," Maskew said. "We have high hopes for Jimenez."


Ruidoso's school record for the discus throw is 101-10 by Lori Walker.

Maskew said his chief disappointment was in the relays where the performance in handoffs could have been better. Maskew said it was just a matter of experience.

Although this was Ruidoso's first meet, most of the Texas teams in-

involved had already participated in three to four meets. Maskew said 1,700 rivals can be a little intimidating if you haven't been in the West Texas Relays before.

"We had to get a number for one runner that we didn't previously have entered in the event. His new number was 1792.

"We knew there would be some problems," said Maskew. "Now that we have identified the area of work, we will start correcting those problems."

Maskew said although the Warriors only scored three points for the boys and a half point for the girls, there were many teams that

didn't score any points. Del Rio, Texas, finished sixteenth out of 63 teams with only six points.

Maskew said Odessa has one of the nicer high school stadiums in the nation. He said all the athletes and the level of competition created a desirable atmosphere for the future to get better in a hurry.

"We don't see any problem of improving every area of our team within the next couple of weeks," said Maskew. "Some of our kids were in shock over the size of this meet. They'll be over that now. I don't think there is much that could impress them any more. I think you'll see our distance events come

along nicely as well as a few field events. The greatest need will be to work on our sprints."

Maskew said several of the Warriors special events were not included in Texas meets. Missy Gosdin did not run her 300M hurdles, and Texas also eliminates the javelin throw.

The Warriors next meet will be Saturday, March 18, at Carlsbad.

Maskew said Roswell, Goddard, Artesia, Lovington, Carlsbad and Hobbs will all participate.

"I would characterize my feelings for this year's team so far as cautiously optimistic," Maskew said.



ABC group promotes high academic standards

A group of Ruidoso Middle School parents have met several times this year to organize a club to help foster a learning environment in the school.

The Ruidoso Middle School (RMS) Academic Booster Club (ABC) organized in January and with the support of RMS principal Mike Gladden, began working toward goals and philosophy for the club and a set of rewards for honor roll, merits and positive referrals.

Officers of ABC are chairman Ron Wall, treasurer Clydene Hull, secretary Marilyn Ward, phone chairman Linda Currin and publicity Kris Beehner.

The basic philosophy of ABC is to: support the present reward system for honor roll or principal's list students; expand the reward system with a "signature program" which will include students who are working to their capacity and/or who have shown a marked improvement in performance; recognize students who show exemplary behavior, positive attitude and citizenship through the school's merit and positive referral program; develop a volunteer tutor/mentor program and sponsor a year-end Academic Booster Banquet for all honor roll students and

their parents.

ABC began rewarding honor roll students with buttons which give the students permission to head the lunch line. Honor roll students also were admitted to the Valentine Dance free and all students receive a coupon for a free sundae at Baskin-Robbins 31 Flavors, compliments of the owners.

Parents said they were concerned with students' attitude and behavior at RMS, especially the use of bad language, and put-downs during school. They supported the continuance of the merit/positive referral system, but at the suggestion of ABC chairman Ron Wall, a "Signature Program" was instituted.

The program involves students' gaining teachers' signatures through exemplary behavior, effort, citizenship, self-esteem, self-control, responsibility, loyalty and kindness to others.

Another reason for ABC was to support the merit program initiated at Ruidoso Middle School last fall. The merit-demerit and positive referral system works on the basis of accumulation of the merits or demerits per semester. A set of criteria to determine these or the positive referrals were issued to all teachers. The positive referrals are harder to receive than merits.

Merits are rewarded on a curve or percentage basis, with the positive referral equal to three merits.

The volunteer tutorial program, with a June target initiation date, will incorporate a one-to-one situation between student and tutor, possibly senior citizens, to encourage students to improve academic skills and management of their time.

Help will focus on students who have learning problems and also provide gifted children an opportunity to learn from a "mentor," with high school students as mentors.

May 23 is the date set for the Academic Booster Banquet for all students named to the honor roll, principal's list (3.7 grade point average), merit/positive referral and signature program at least once during the school year, and their parents.

ABC currently is sponsoring a poster contest for RMS students, with a choice of nine topics, such as cooperation, to promote an understanding of the merit system.

Top winners in each grade will receive \$10.

The next meeting of ABC is 7 p.m. today (Monday), March 13, at RMS Library. Any interested parent is invited to attend.

The Dreamer

Arbor Day

This is being sent to you just at midday on March eleven, just the day after Arbor Day. You could not ask for a more beautiful day, with the temperature at a summery eighty degrees with a mild breeze out the northeast — just enough cool breath to keep the fruit blooms from coming out too rapidly.

All the air is filled with the springtime aromas of new grass blades, and sweet Pinion buds, and yes — what is that honey fragrance, that delicate aroma floating in the yellow air, that brings a little leap of joy to your heart every year?

Sure enough the first fruit blossoms of the year are out in bloom — the pure white trimmed in crimson with golden centers: the apricot flowers on their bare branches, cheering the world like something in a dream.

The apricot blooms are about two to three weeks later than usual this year, and the blooming of the apricot is always a special day, with the sun shining through the delicate petals turning them to transparent silvery little tree flowers sending their fragrant message of cheer all through the vale, with spring just nine days away.

The apricot blooms tell us that the time is here to dig in the ground and plant trees. There is an old saying that you can plant a tree in any month that has an "R" in it, especially in the temperate zone. That means here in our Mountain land.

Arbor Day, the tree planting day, was established March ten, 1872 in Nebraska. It was established by J. Sterling Morton a member of the state board of Agriculture and later U.S. Secretary of Agriculture. In 1885, Arbor Day was made a legal holiday in Nebraska.

Arbor day struck a responsive chord in the hearts of Americans; and the day and all that it means spread throughout our country and also world-wide. From a day for appreciation of trees, the concept spread to reforestation, soil conservation, wind erosion control, clean air projects and other environmental concerns.

Just now a golden yellow butterfly flew by the sunroom window and settled in the lilac bushes, which are showing their purple clusters among their new leaves.

This reminds me of something:

when you plant a tree around your home, be sure that you give it enough room for its future growth. A pine, spruce or fir tree will reach giant size. If you do not have a lot of room around your house, you could plant a small type evergreen, such as Arbor Vitea "tree of life", or a lilac bush, or even smaller bushes, or a rosebush. No plant is too small to help celebrate this special day.

A while back I said you can plant a tree in any month with an "R" in it. If you buy the trees with a ball of soil around the roots from a nursery, you can plant them anytime.

Dwarf trees

One of the great developments in fruit trees during the last few decades is the perfection of the dwarf and semi-dwarf fruit trees. These little fellows will bring you fruit in your yard or small acreage. The fruit is regular size and fine flavor.

Trees are some of our very best friends, and dearly beloved children of Mother earth, a tree can be a friend through three and four generations. On many a location of a pioneer dwelling, here stand the old pear tree and the apricot tree, giant in size and one hundred or more years old.

So plant a tree and bring a lot of happiness into the world. New Mexico has its Arbor Day on the original date, although the day is celebrated April and early May in the northern states, and December, January and February in the southern states.

March and April are ideal times to plant a tree here in our Mountain land.

The poem by Joyce Kilmer comes to mind.

"I think that I shall never see

A poem lovely as a tree

A tree, whose hungry mouth is pressed

Against the Earth's Sweet Loving breast
Poems are made by fools like me,
but only God can make a tree.

A tree that looks at God all day,
and lifts its leafy arms to pray."

We want to be a resort town ... right? Well, it's Spring Break time, and our chance to shine for spring breakers from throughout Texas, New Mexico and Mexico.


Let's put our best foot forward, and welcome all those spring visitors to the cleanest, friendliest town they've ever visited.

DEAR EDITOR:

I use my very first letter to the editor to express general agreement with the letter written by Margaret McDonald-Lahey published on March 6.

I particularly point out and emphasize the following comments in the March 6 letter:

"...The implementation of the master plan which calls for use of the land to diversify the economy and stabilize the seasonal nature of the area's economy."

"...The plan stated that the single-use option was the least desirable of all the options presented."

"Approving the golf course development slams the door shut on all future opportunities." (Underscoring Supplied)

Advocates of the golf course proposal are reaching for a quick fix, a free lunch, pie in the sky; when as anyone who's been around the block at least twice knows, there is now quick fix, free lunch (or golf course), or pie in the sky.

Village officials need to look at the master plan developed by experts (and not for free) and display some vision and long-range thought before giving away the public's birthright for a mess of potage. It is time for city hall to lead instead of allowing itself to be lead. That kind of leadership will require a great deal of "moxey" (a quality composed of equal portions of brains and guts).

The present proposal is that the village will make available to a promoter land for which it paid

\$2.6 million from funds provided by and increase in the sales tax; and there is no guarantee of any return on that land for 50 years, at which time the land with its golf course will revert to the village. We can't see that far into the future, of course, and have no way of knowing what the property or money will be worth in 50 years.

But, consider this: \$2,600,000 invested at the modest rate of 6.5% for fifty years will amount to more than \$60.5 million at the end of that time; at 7%, the accumulation would be over \$76.5 million, at 8%, it would be \$121.9 million. Speculation? To an extent, but it's something to ponder on.

Many proponents of the golf plan say that something must be done with the airport land now.

Why? It won't spoil, and a slower, carefully-planned, orderly development of a non-replaceable citizen-owned asset will produce better and more productive facilities than a hastily-conceived golf course.

Give the Economic Development Corporation some time and a chance to deliver something really worthwhile.

To quote a bit of old wisdom, "Don't undertake vast projects with half-vast plans."

Yours for less haste, more thought and some constructive leadership.

This week. Seems a quartet of Catholic bishops in New Mexico is asking Governor Garrey Caruthers not to veto a bill increasing the minimum wage if it reaches his desk.

Can't think that'll sway him; the guy's a Methodist. But what's interesting about the letter from Archbishop Robert Sanchez and Bishops Ricardo Ramirez, Jerome Hastrich and Donald Pelotte is their argument.

The good fathers contend that an increased minimum wage would not only be morally right—the current minimum wage by any stan-

dard of justice is unacceptable—but also could be an economic development measure.

It will, they say, stimulate the state economy. At last hearing, the governor remained unpersuaded.

They're mostly Republicans, but some Democrats, and they're mostly people in business for themselves who never belonged to a union or knew anyone who did, but that doesn't stop them from knowing that Organized Labor is an invention of Satan, or at least the communists...


What's happening in the House is enough to prove it to them. Just look here. Right to work killed, shelved in committees. A bill to allow—not mandate, but allow—public employees to organize

Track 'n Tack

Shalz and Irvine's Feel Like Streakin began his career impressively as the colt rocketed to a 1/2-length win in his maiden voyage to set the fastest qualifying time in last Friday's West Texas Futurity trials at Sunland Park.

The two-year-old's time of :16.715 for 330 yards was the best of all 102 trial entrants and assured the runner a berth in the \$168,699 final on March 19th.

The son of Streakin Six out of a Cash For Dash mare, Feeling Right, Feel Like Streakin went right to the front in the seventh division trial and beat Karen Pitcock's The Hooking Bull and W.L. "Sunny" Edwards's Real Bar Forth, who both qualified.

Feel Like Streakin will have his work cut out for him in his quest for first prize of \$67,556 as only .15 of a second separated all 10 finalists.

Rider Jacky Martin and trainer Jack Brooks qualified both Feel Like Streakin and Howard Moore's Telesis Too for the Grade I event.

Brooks, Martin and Shalz are the defending champions in the West Texas having sent out eventual World Champion Running Quarter Horse, Merganser, for the win in last year's event.

Willie and Dolores Talley's Gabardine started the day with a sizzling performance gaining the lead quickly under veteran Jerry Nicodemus and pulling off to out-finish Mason Standley's Rent A Wreck in :16.755. Just behind Rent A Wreck was Homer Garza's Staunch Haunch who qualified as one of two supplemental nominations.

Gabardine was the only entrant trained by H. Don Farris, but it might be all Farris needs as he seeks his fourth West Texas trophy.

Scott Peterson's Lotta Fiesta and Suzann Marney's Johnnys Night both won their respective divisions in identical :16.855 timings.

The upset of the trials was pulled off by rider Randy Wilson and trainer Alberto Dominguez when they teamed to bring Colucci and Half's Highfalutin Shawnee in at 20 to one odds to pay \$42.40 to win.

The field for the 18th running of the event, and their qualifying times are: Feel Like Streakin, :16.715 (104 speed index); Gabardine, :16.755; The Hooking Bull, :16.775; Telesis Too, :16.795; Rent A Wreck, :16.815; Lotta Fiesta, :16.855; Johnnys Night, :16.855; Staunch Haunch, :16.860; Highfalutin Shawnee, :16.860; and Real Bar Forth, :16.865.

The \$24,320 Consolation will be run on Saturday, March 18, and the

qualifiers include Rocky Smash, Devil's Dagger, Stravato, Coco Sweet, Swayce Brown, Talented N Lucky, Mr. Flynn Approach, Fancy Vittoro, Lady Of Leisure, and Shes Joyous.

Fly Dragoness had not raced since last November, but the multiple-stakes winner showed her class to win the \$11,500 New Mexico Horse Breeder's Association Sale Stakes going away.

Run last Sunday at six furlongs, the filly made her three-year-old debut an impressive one as she looked sharp in defeating seven other New Mexico-breds, winning by two and one half lengths.

With the first prize, the Fletcher Hall-owned daughter of Full Choke won her eighth race in 13 starts and has now earned over \$87,000. She is trained by Doyal Roberts and was ridden by Glen Murphy in a time of 1:13.3.

Musco Duck turned in a seasonal best six furlong time under Joe Martinez last Wednesday as the runner powered his way to a four length win in his 4-year-old debut to log a 1:10.2.

Orbit's Flight scorched the track last Sunday while tying the seasonal best time of 1:38.1 for one mile. Competing for owner Ronnie McGlothlin, Orbit's Flight won by 6 and 1/2 lengths.

Mary and Joe Bowden of Spring, Texas, had one of the most spectacular spurts of luck last Saturday, March 4th.

Learning that Mary's horse, Alberta's Dancer, would not be allowed to compete unless Bowden had a racing license, she and her husband came to the track especially for that purpose. While waiting for the horse to compete in the seventh race they spent \$2 on the track's Tri-Super wager and hit the first half that, in itself, is no small accomplishment, but they then took their one exchange and proceeded to be the lone consolation winner that day and collected \$17,786.40!

Alberta's Dancer finished second in his race, but Mary and Joe didn't seem to mind too much.

The Sunland Park Boxing Invitational was deemed a huge success.

More than 1,200 people jammed the Turf Club and grandstand on Monday, March 6, to see four live exhibition matches and the closed circuit match between "Boom Boom" Mancini and "Macho" Camacho.

The Sunland Park car window screen giveaway will be on

Saturday, March 11. The first 1,000 cars with paid admission will receive free car window shades compliments of Sunland Park.

Smooth And Perfect, a qualifier for the Spring Breeder's Futurity final and runner-up in the San Juan Downs Lassie Stakes, will head up an overflow field who have been nominated for the New Mexico Horse Breeder's Association Quarter Horse Sale Stakes.

Three-year-old New Mexico-bred sprinters will travel 400 yards for a \$10,000 added purse this Sunday, March 12.

West Texas Weekend is March 17-19, at Sunland Park with many events scheduled in anticipation of the 18th running of the West Texas Futurity.

In honor of St. Patrick's Day on Friday, March 17, anyone wearing green clothing will get free grandstand admission. Plus, every time the green-silked jockey wins (#5), the track will offer special discount beer prices in both the grandstand and Turf Club. One lucky fan will strike gold on that day as everyone will be eligible to win one ounce of pure gold that will be given away. No purchase is necessary, but you must be present to win.

Friday night, March 17, in the Turf Club is the setting for the first Sunland Park "Sport Of Kings Art Sale and Auction."

Beginning with cocktails at 7 p.m., 60 pieces of equine-related art created by two dozen world-renowned artists will be shown and will go up for bid later that evening.

Nominations up for Rainbow Futurity

Nominations to the \$600,000 estimated Rainbow Futurity are up over last year, with 786 two-year-olds being nominated by the February deadline.

"We believe interest as increased for this race due to the fact the distance has changed from 500 to 350 yards," said H. Rick Henson, general manager of Racing Downs Racing, Inc.

"This change is based on the guidelines established by the Amer-




