## Teen's death is subject of investigation

Law enforcement officers are investigating the unattended death of a 14-year-old Carrizozo girl.


Susan Cupit was pronounced dead at 8:20 a.m. Monday, by deputy medical examiner Nancy Guck, according to official reports.

Lincoln County Sheriff James McSwane said his office is assisting the Carrizozo Police Department in the investigation of the apparently accidental death.

Deputy Gilbert Arhuleta responded to a call at 8:02 a.m. Monday, from George and Ray Gene Barrie of Carrizozo, who reported the unattended death of their daughter, Susan Cupit, in the bathtub of the family home, said McSwane.

The body was sent to the State Office of Medical Investigation for autopsy.

Also, the Sheriff's Department is assisting in the investigation of a

## Council will call election over petition

The Ruidoso Village Council, in a meeting cut short to accommodate a Chamber of Commerce event, set the wheels in motion Tuesday for a special election to decide if the village will change its form of government.

The council, learning from municipal clerk Tammie Maddox that the requisite number of signatures were on a petition calling for the change from mayor/council to commission/manager, set a special meeting for 2 p.m. Monday, April 3. Maddox, following state statutes, said she'll ask the council to call an election for Tuesday, June 20.

Voters will cast ballots "for" or "against" the proposed change in that election.

Also Tuesday, Councillor J.D. James, responding to statements he said he's read in the paper over the proposed change, assured the audience and council that he was the person who called a number of cities to learn what form of govern-

ment is in effect.

James said he had received information from several cities, including Ruidoso, on the accuracy of the information. Village manager Bill Guck had listed a number of cities and offices to be contacted.

"(This) process is a good one for the man as well as the voters and their peers," said James.

He described the cost of the proposed change as being about \$24,000 or more, depending on the form. Those costs would be paid through the village's budget.

James said the petition had 203 signatures, which is the required number for the election.

Also Tuesday, the council unanimously approved a resolution to enable the village to petition to promote the Village of Ruidoso through the state's process of cities with no direct representation. James said the petition would be sent to the state.

# Who REALLY wants to hear from Ruidoso?

Ruidoso citizens got the word early this week that they should call the Governor's Office and voice opinions on the video gaming bill.

Local radio announcers and the local television channel urged citizens to call the governor, saying he was asking for those calls.

But Don Caviness, spokesperson for Governor Garrey Carruthers, said Wednesday the governor wasn't soliciting calls. He said all calls are logged, according to their subject, but the governor doesn't usually see the daily call log.

The television monitor on Channel 11, as well as announcers on both radio stations, said the governor's office is asking for com-

ments on the video gaming bill and many Ruidoso citizens responded to the plea by calling the governor's office this past week and a half.

With a long distance call to the governor's office and the nature of the call given, a pleasant sounding voice asked if the caller was for or against the bill. The caller's response noted, the phone call ended.

Many citizens no doubt felt they had fulfilled their obligations to the governor's request. That may not have been true.

Parsons Productions said they did not actually receive a call from the governor's office, but from someone in Village Hall. That

someone in city hall was division director Leon Eggleston who said he couldn't remember who it was that told him of the request from the governor's office.

Eggleston said he confirmed, by a call to the Governor's Office, that calls were being accepted.

"The Governor's Office is always accepting calls," said Caviness.

Radio stations got their information from a news release provided by the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce. Referencing Senate Bill 572, the release reads:

"Governor Carruthers office will be accepting calls on Wednesday, March 29, after 2 p.m. on the video gaming bill as it relates to Ruidoso,

Taos and Angel Fire.

"If you have an opinion on the issues, please call 1/827-3000 and speak with the staff. Let them know your position on Senate Bill 572 so that the Governor can make an informed decision about signing the legislation.

"A phone call has been requested even if you have already expressed your opinion in an earlier call.

"This is your opportunity to express your feelings concerning this important piece of economic development legislation. So please call 1/827-3000 after 2 p.m. today."

Chamber executive director John Jeffers said he was asked by a chamber member, not by the Govern-

nor's Office, to get the word out. This week's call for calls was the second time Ruidoso citizens were told by the media to call the Governor.

"We've not put out a news release on video gambling at all," said Caviness. A number of Ruidoso citizens said they believed the Governor Carruthers was meeting at 2 p.m. Wednesday with some locals over the gambling legislation.

"I think someone is pulling someone's leg," said Caviness, concerned over the wording of the memo that implied the request was from the Governor's Office. "No, the Governor's Office has no knowledge of that memo or that informa-

tion."

Caviness said he had received requests for funding that were being added to the governor's budget. He said he had received labor union requests for groups of people to be added to the budget.


Since the video gaming legislation was introduced, the Governor's Office has received 614 for and 614 against signatures.

## Commission considers rural addressing system

A rural addressing system proposal got mixed reviews Monday in Carrizozo, before the Lincoln County Commission referred it to the new county manager and tabled action until the next commission meeting.

During a regular meeting of the Lincoln County Commission, Sue Turner of U.S. West Communications, described a system designed to serve as a tool for emergency agencies, utility companies and law enforcement agencies.

Turner, using a slide presentation and written materials, described an optional system that would pinpoint the location of every county resident. She said all addresses are logged and available for emergency response.

Cost of the addressing system is estimated at from \$12.50 to \$20 per dwelling, with financial help available from Contel and U.S. West to implement the program.

Two county officials who would use the system voiced support for the plan, but Treasurer Shirley Goodloe disagreed.

Emergency Medical System (EMS) director Nancy Guck said the system would save lives in Lincoln County, and Sheriff James McSwane said it would help his department.

But Goodloe said emergency personnel are well-trained and can find rural residences. Guck contended EMS often receives calls with limited location information, resulting in delays to emergency services.

Goodloe said many rural residents, like ranchers, would not need or want the addresses, noting it could result in alerting people to isolated homes and contribute to increases in thefts.

Goodloe said other agencies need funding, and she would prefer they be funded instead of allocating money for the addressing program.

If approved, the county will be required to provide the road list and, perhaps, a consultant to coordinate volunteers to contact rural residents.

New county manager Nick Pappas, on hand for the first meeting since he was hired last week, recommended looking at the "pros and cons," noting Chaves County recently undertook an addressing program that cost more than expected.

Turner said Chaves County failed to do enough fundraising and coordination before the system was initiated.

Commission Chairman Bob Hemphill said he attended a rural addressing system workshop and approves of the system. Commissioner Karon Petty suggested the proposed system could help with the 1990 census and the implementation of a new county zoning ordinance.

Pappas will report next month. In other regular business, commissioners:

Acknowledged the withdrawal of a request to open a road east of Corona. Road Review Committee member Patsy Sanchez recommended a fee or bond be established for requests to open or close roads. She said the three-person reviews are conducted at some expense to the county, adding the last two reviews resulted in withdrawals. Sanchez said landowners, not managers, should make the requests. Petty agreed.

Approved the Law Enforcement Protection Fund for \$21,800 to repair and purchase law enforcement equipment.

# Forest service seeks input on gravel pits

The Smokey Bear Ranger District of the Lincoln National Forest is considering re-opening the Devils Canyon gravel pit.

Not all citizens are in favor of the opening of the pit, located about 14 miles northeast of Ruidoso, and the forest service is seeking public comment.

According to a news release, the pit will be opened at the request of the New Mexico State Highway and Transportation Department.

James Yarbrough, field exploratory and testing section, said a sampling of material found in the pit was of a quality that would allow the use of Devils Canyon site for all surfacing.

The proposal would extract 200,000-300,000 tons of gravel to be used on at least three highway projects near Ruidoso. The state estimates a saving of \$100,000-\$150,000 by using the pit.

"This represents a significant savings of tax monies and is certainly to the advantage of the taxpayer," Yarbrough wrote in a release to the forest service.

The forest service listed seven issues, concerns and opportunities related to the proposal. One of these seven issues was a concern as to the competition with private gravel operations.

State representative Ben Hall was not that enthusiastic about the project.

"I certainly don't want to cost taxpayers money for the construction of the highway, but if you're talking about a \$160,000 saving on 300,000 tons of material, you're talking 50 cents a ton and that's not very much savings in my opinion. We would probably put more than that back into the community if a local person had it."

"Anytime you issue a person a paycheck and he lives right here, that money is turned over four or five times in the community. I understand they are not going to charge at all for the gravel this time. The last time they charged 70 cents a ton. Any payment to the forest service will see that money go back to Washington and we won't benefit at all."

"It certainly is not fair for a government subsidized agency like

the forest service to get into competition with private enterprise. Private enterprise is what pays the bills in this country and if you kill the small business by letting the forest service or other federal agencies get involved in things that private enterprise should be doing, then you have no little man out there working to pay taxes to pay bills."

Two sand and gravel operators issued a strong thumbs down on the project.

Robert Beavers, owner of Beavers Sand and Gravel, doubts that any accurate savings figure could be placed on the job before bidding.

"It is infringing on my rights as a private citizen," said Beavers. "That's the business I'm in. The Devils Canyon pit was supposed to be a one-time deal the last time it was opened for the airport."

John Stowe, owner of Valley Transit Mix of Ruidoso, also believes it is government intrusion into private enterprise.

"With the economy as depressed as it is in Ruidoso and the people who are already there who can

supply the product, going into that pit would be ludicrous," Stowe said.

"I plan to respond to the state and to the Governor's Office. Since I'm on the governor's business advisory council, I'm going to respond personally to the governor. I also intend to get a letter off to Dewey Lonsberry of the highway department with copies to Congressman Joe Skeen and Senator Pete Domenici. I don't like the looks of it. It's taking business away from Ruidoso. Businesses that are already in place."

Before issuing a decision, the forest service is requesting public input.

"We would like to receive input from the public by April 14 in order to make the decision on a timely manner and allow the State Highway and Transportation Department to finalize their plans," said Jerry Hawkes, district ranger.

Hawkes said comments can be submitted to the Smokey Bear Ranger District, 901 Mechem Drive, Ruidoso.

## County officials tour area road projects

The Lincoln County Commission checked out the recently improved Fort Stanton Road and part of the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport access road Tuesday.

Commissioners Bob Hemphill, Karon Petty and Rick Simpson, along with project engineers and county engineer Joe Shain, drove Fort Stanton Road to see if large trucks hauling gravel to the new highway site have damaged the road.

After the tour, the group agreed to seek an opinion from the State Highway Department. Commissioners will ask the Highway Department to perform compaction tests to determine the extent and cause of damage to the gravel surface. If the damage is caused by the gravel hauling contractor, the surface will be replaced, said Jay Corazza, a representative of J.R.

Hale Construction Company of Albuquerque, a subcontractor on the project.

Corazza said Fort Stanton Road improvements should be made after the new highway is opened to avoid detours and to keep traffic to a minimum. He said materials used to seal the gravel road need minimum night temperatures only reached in the summer.

Engineer Bill Vreeke of Bonanan Huston said the new access road will be completed within four weeks. The road must be completed by June 30, to obtain funding, said commissioners.

Commissioners and Shain also inspected the Mountain Lakes Subdivision low water crossing. The developer is seeking an extension on the deadline to complete the crossing, and commissioners will act on that request at their next meeting.

would have been appropriate for the Lodgers Tax Advisory Board.

Bobby Parsons, making the request, said he is a member of that board, so he took his request to the council. He said the chamber, because of an agreement made before he was in business here, has a policy that precludes spending promotional funds with local businesses.

Potter said the lodgers tax fund has the \$6,000 unbudgeted, but added lodgers tax revenues may fall short of the \$150,000 projected budget. He said the difference will be made up from the village general fund if that happens.

—Heard from Potter that testing on the Eagle Creek wells is expected to be completed within two weeks.

—Heard Councillor Jess Stinson complain of reading in the paper a suggestion from a village committee.

Councillor Larry Simon was absent Tuesday.

Just three of the six councillors attended the workshop before the regular meeting. Councillors Al Junge, Elmer Pirelli and J.D. James discussed agenda items and the proposed convention center during the informal session.

Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr., and councillors Simon, Tom McNeil and Jess Stinson didn't attend the workshop.

## State gives tentative OK for 1989 racing season

The State Racing Commission on Monday approved 10 administrative officers and 20 racing officials for the 1989 racing season at Ruidoso Downs Race Track.

But commissioners gave only tentative approval to the company under a \$300,000 contract to operate as concessionaire at the track. The five-member group is withholding approval pending completion of background investigation of Southwest Sportsservice and its parent company, Delaware North.

According to published reports, Chairman Dan Myers said staff will continue to assemble information from various investigative agencies. Concern has reportedly been expressed about the company's involvement with a defunct New York company whose officials were convicted in the early '70s on federal conspiracy charges.

R.D. Hubbard, president of Ruidoso Downs Racing, Inc., whose license to operate the track also has been delayed pending completion of

a background check, said last week that everything will be in order and racing season will go forward. He and officers of Delaware North have said they welcome the investigation.

Hubbard was recently granted a license to operate a new racetrack he is constructing in Kansas. He said he underwent the closest possible scrutiny before being granted that license.

H. Rick Henson, general manager of Ruidoso Downs Race Track, said the concession contract calls for about a half million dollars in improvements and equipment with \$300,000 to be underwritten by Southwest Sportsservice.

Henson said the contract would be renewable annually over 10 years, subject to State Racing Commission approval.

Myers told reporters in Albuquerque the commission hopes to have the background investigations completed in a month.

## Elderhostelers study at La Junta

A group of students who gathered last week at La Junta Guest Ranch for the Eastern New Mexico University (ENMU) outreach program weren't typical college students in the mountains for a relaxing spring break.

In the area to study Southwest Indian culture, were 27 elderhostelers, participants in an international program offering "learning vacations" through colleges and universities all over the world.

Most elderhostelers at the La Junta gathering were between the ages of 60 and 70, but there were two in their 80s and one 92-year-old.

They came from 10 different states, Canada and England, and took time out from lectures to visit Three Rivers petroglyph, shop Ruidoso and enjoy the mountain scenery.

"I'm from Lincolnshire, England," said 92-year-old Joan Forbes. Since "shire" is the English equivalent of "county," Forbes said she came to Lincoln County from Lincoln County.

It wasn't the first visit to the area for Marjorie Lewis of Logan, Utah. She remembered attending Girl Scout camp here as a child. "Yes, Ruidoso has certainly changed," said Lewis, who hadn't been back since her Girl Scout days.

The minimum age to take part in the Elderhostel program is 60, although a spouse or companion who is 50 or older may be allowed.

Elderhostel courses cover every conceivable subject, and the classes fill quickly even though students don't receive college credit, according to Del Landis, who was here from Ohio. Participants at La Junta recalled past offerings that ranged

from excavating a pre-historic kiva in Cortez, Colorado, to staying in a monastery in New York or attending art workshops in Arizona.

ENMU professors Phil Shelly, Barbara Bishop and Betty Campbell taught courses on archeology, creative writing and textile and natural dyes to form the core of the La Junta study; with supplementary lectures by local speakers Katherine Finley, Dr. Arlene Brown, Emergency Medical Technicians Yvonne and Lester Lanelli and David Saum of Lincoln County Ambulance-Altos.

Five more Elderhostels will convene in the area this year. For further information on area programs, contact Dr. Janet Roehl at ENMU in Portales.

ment apparatus and equipment and for advanced law enforcement planning and training. McSwane said he received a letter from Howard Graff of New Mexico Traffic Safety Department stating the county can keep the vehicles acquired with a grant during former sheriff Don Samuels' administration.

—OK'd a \$433.18 budget increase for senior citizens for cash in lieu of commodities.

—Adopted the Board of Finance Investment Policy with an amendment on procedures detailing the county manager's duties in consulting with the commissioners and treasurer on recommending rules, methods, procedures and reviews necessary to ensure the policy is consistent with state laws and regulations.

The policy applies to all financial assets of Lincoln County including

general funds, special revenue funds, capital project funds, enterprise funds, debt service funds and agency funds. The treasurer will report monthly on current investment and those which matured the month before the report.

A collateral policy, which becomes effective April 1, requires each financial institution holding county funds to pledge only those types of securities as provided for in state law, with the amount pledged no less than the total of county funds on deposit, less the \$100,000 FDIC or FSLIC insurance coverage. The formula requires a 100 percent pledge for uninsured county deposits.

—Tabled action on Planning and Zoning's recommendation for a time extension for completing a low water crossing on Stag Road in Mountain Lake Subdivision.

—Approved accounts payable and payroll register.

# Young scientists get set for fair

White Mountain Elementary School will host its second annual science fair April 13 and 14, according to school principal Frank Cannella.

Cannella expects projects from more than 300 students from kindergarten through fifth grade. The deadline for submitting applications is April 4.

The Montessori School and Ruidoso Christian School will have participants in the fair.

Cannella says the projects can be positive experiences for the students' entire families. He believes the fair is one of the best in the state. The projects will be judged by 30 judges made up of teachers, high school science students and parents. The parent council will host a breakfast for the judges.

Categories for the fair are: behavioral, botany,

chemistry, earth/space, engineering, environmental, math/computers, medicine/health, microbiology, physics and zoology.

The projects can be a maximum size of 30 inches deep, 48 inches wide and 108 inches in height from the floor. No animals or micro-organisms may be used and the project must be free-standing.

The projects will be judged on creative ability, scientific thought, thoroughness, skill and exposition.

Cannella said the projects should ask a question and seek to find the answer. Some titles from past projects are "How fast can a mealworm go?", "The effects of moisture on woods?" and "Does temperature affect the growth of plants?"

An exhibition of projects will be open to the public.




The 400-meter relay team of Rosser, McCarty, Gallegos and Marein finished second and the same team finished second in the 800-meter relay.

## New Capitan village hall to open soon

Capitan Village Trustees closed the deal on the new village hall last week, according to village clerk Janet Keel.

Trustees, during their regular March meeting, approved buying the unoccupied Old Corrals and Sagebrush western wear store a half-block south of the present village hall.

Keel said village employees are constructing counters and other furniture to convert the store into municipal offices. Keel said she expects to move within a month.

Mayor Benny Coker said he hopes to have the April 10 town meeting in the new facility.

In other recent village business, Coker said he met with village attorney Don Dutton Wednesday on negotiations between the village and the City of Alamogordo concerning the dispute over transmitting Eagle Creek water through the Bonito Lake pipeline to Capitan.

Dutton, Coker and Alamogordo attorney Valerie Salisbury discussed the newest proposed agreement, which contains changes pre-

sented by the Capitan trustees, who refused earlier agreements due to wording about time limitations and transmission fees.

The newest proposal presents guidelines for the next five years, Coker said. At the end of the five-year limit, the village must complete a pipeline from Eagle Creek to transmit the water and no longer be dependent on the Alamogordo water lines.

Another change in the agreement is to have water transmission fees established by an independent

arbitrator.

Coker said he thinks the village trustees will approve and sign the document. Ultimately the village will benefit from the new pipeline, he continued.

The next step will be for the Eagle Creek Intercommunity Water Users Association to apply for funds to construct the pipeline within the five-year limit as defined in the newest proposed agreement, Coker concluded.

## New AD vows to bring total winning program

Doug Ragsdale, Ruidoso High School's new athletic director and head football coach, met with his coaches and the various high school teams for the first time last Friday.

The series of meetings were brief and in "touch base" fashion before arriving full time on April 24.

Ragsdale re-enters the coaching profession after a two-and-a-half year absence. His last six years of coaching have been at Kerrville Tivy.

Prior to Tivy, Ragsdale was a coach at Roswell-Goddard from 1973-1976, and at Hobbs from 1977-89.

In what direction will Ragsdale lead the Warriors?

"I see no change in the discipline established by Coach (Cooper) Henderson," Ragsdale said. "I don't think you can run a program without winning. The things

athletic programs teach can be learned best by winning."

"It's important that in student participation, whatever sport, basketball, football, wrestling, golf or tennis, the player must give everything they've got. That's our job as coaches, to get that out of them. To push them to that point.

"A student has to have a concept of what they can do if they set their mind to it. That's the direction we're going to head."

Ragsdale was asked about his particular style of football.

"Our style will be geared around a run offense. I have had the opportunity to watch some of Coach Henderson's film. There will be some different-looking plays from what Henderson ran, but basically, the new plays will attack the same kind of strengths and weaknesses of that program.

"I believe in throwing the football. I don't believe that you can be

successful with the old wishbone attack where you throw one time a ball game and run 60 times. We're going to throw the football."

The school's press release didn't include the new coach's record.

"My overall record as a head football coach, including the JV teams that I had and everything else is 62-51," Ragsdale said.

Ragsdale said he is comfortable in talking about his record.

"I'm very proud of what we did at Hobbs in light of what other people have done at Hobbs in the last 10 years. Other than Doug Jones, no one has been successful at Hobbs since 1974.

"At Kerrville, we had a situation when I took the head football job that we had four tough years ahead of us. The year we were 1-9, we did not have a team in our program which was winning, all the way down to the seventh grade.

"A group of parents and teachers

asked me to apply for the head coach's job and I did. Our district, five of the last seven years, has been in the state semi-finals. We

were extremely competitive. We didn't win them all, but our kids always played as hard as they could."

As athletic director, Ragsdale

will report to the principal and not the school board. Ragsdale believes there is an advantage in this.

"In my past experience, where the athletic director and principal work hand-in-glove, the athletic program becomes stronger not weaker," said Ragsdale.

"I believe in an overall strong program. I think if we're going to win in football, we should win in girls basketball and boys basketball, tennis, everything we do.

"I'm here to make things better, not to do away with anything. There's going to be some changes because I need to make my mark."

"Our girls' programs are going to be as strong or stronger than they have ever been because I believe in an overall program.

"In this state, or other states, in talking to people you will find I am a quality person and we will continue to have a quality program."

## Standish takes the reins of the U.S. Equestrian Team


Ruidoso's Robert C. Standish has been named executive director of the United States Equestrian Team (USET).


According to a news release provided by the Jaycees, Ruidoso business owners and operators are being asked to make donations to

## EDITORIAL

Taxpayers beware when the government jumps into the private sector.

The Smokey Bear Ranger District of the Lincoln National Forest is seeking public input on a plan to allow highway construction contractors to use a forest gravel pit on three area highway projects. The forest service estimates a savings of \$100,000 to \$150,000 if these private companies are allowed to extract gravel from public lands instead of purchasing it on the open market and figuring that cost into the project bid.

Taxpayers, we are told, will reap the benefits from the savings to the contractors on the raw materials they normally buy to do their road projects. Maybe so.

But the contractors, knowing the State Highway Department has budgeted for a project, may just adjust their bids and take the savings to the bank.


Meanwhile, private gravel companies are faced with stiff competition from a government agency offering to supply their product free. The private suppliers, who have operational expenses to meet, are shut out and our system of supply and demand is disrupted.

The private companies, faced with such competition, can be expected to lay off employees, cutback on local purchases of diesel, oil and other supplies, and perhaps even sell off equipment or go out of business. That kind of long-term economic impact should be weighed against the short-term savings of free gravel to a contractor.

In a similar, but unrelated move, the Ruidoso Village Council voted Tuesday to subsidize a local company when members authorized a \$6,000 payment to Parsons Productions for start-up costs on the Talking Yellow Pages.

Councillors, cutting through the normal process for allocating promotional funds, voted unanimously to hand over \$6,000 of public funds to a private business. The vehicle for such promotional ventures is the Lodgers Tax Advisory Board, the group charged with allocating lodgers tax to non-profit organizations for promoting Ruidoso.

We believe the government should stay out of private enterprise.—fj



## Letters to the editor

DEAR EDITOR:

This letter is a response to Mrs. Jeanie Clancy's letter printed in the March 27, 1989, issue of your paper. Mrs. Clancy accurately describes the situation leading up to the New Mexico Public Service Commission's action with respect to the Otero County Electric Cooperative, Inc.

However, she goes awry when she emphatically states that "the cooperative is the only electric utility in New Mexico that imposes a demand charge on residential customers and overlooks the fact that residential rates with capacity charges are in general use in Arizona, Colorado, North Dakota and Ohio just to mention a few."

Likewise, all of the residential customers certainly are subject to a demand charge. The rate engages the capacity charge once an account exceeds 10 Kilowatts. On an average, 95% of our residential consumers either do not require this

volume of power, or are effectively controlling their load in order not to incur the added charge for capacity.

The ability to control the electrical capacity for a given facility is one of the advantages of our current rate design. A number of our consumers have installed automatic demand controllers and others are limiting their demand requirements manually. Either choice is a cost savings to both the consumer and the cooperative.

Contrary to Mrs. Clancy's contention, the cooperative has not raised or in any manner altered its filed rates for three years. In fact the average selling price per kilowatthour was almost one cent lower in January 1989, than it was in January 1988. Our continued increase in sales, as well as a decline in the wholesale cost of power have enabled us to provide power to the consumer at a lower price. Also a fact, the rates charged by the cooperative are lower than or very

competitive with most of the other cooperatives and investor-owned utilities in New Mexico.

Mrs. Clancy adequately portrayed the impact of tourism and vacation enterprise upon our service area. Several paragraphs later she favorably hailed the NMPSC rate proposal as having only a 1-4% increase and completely overlooked the second half of the NMPSC proposition that imposes an 18% increase for the second home (vacation cabin) consumers. I cannot believe real estate sales will be enhanced appreciably if this class of consumer is created.

The cooperative's current rate design has evolved from a philosophy and the dedication to provide reliable power to our consumers at the most reasonable and fairest pricing. The demand charge, which gives the consumer some options, provides a portion of the revenue required to operate the cooperative, and has been a part of our tariffs

for more than 25 years. When this portion of the revenue disappears, the cost of a kilowatthour has to be increased accordingly. Furthermore, the consumer loses the ability to control a part of his costs when the billing is keyed to kilowatthours alone.

We appreciate Mrs. Clancy's diligence and attention to detail and have grown to respect her persistence. On the other hand she has not done any favors for about 95% of the members of the electric cooperative.

## The Plant Corner

Dear Sally: I would like to try my luck growing a Bromeliad, but have heard they are exotic and difficult to get to bloom. Would you please help us? Thanks—Karon K.

Dear Karon K.: In spite of their exotic appearance, bromeliads are not difficult to grow. They are commonly known as "Silver Vase" plants and their main need is to keep the "vase" filled with water. Not only does the bloom emerge from the center of the vase but the actual nourishment of the plant's food is found at the base as well as through surfaces of the leaves. Remember to empty the vase and replace with fresh water weekly. They are natives of Central and South America.

In the home, bromeliads present few problems, provided they have reasonable light and warmth. They will tolerate considerable temperature variation but will not thrive and will not flower if not given proper light.

Soil: Bromeliads are not conventional plants and when it comes to the kind of potting mix to use, this is also out of the ordinary in that it contains lots of humus in the form of peat or leafmould, but NO soil. A good mixture would consist of equal parts of fibrous peat and coarse sand.

Bromeliads will probably need

repotting ones during the summer, but it is important not to "overpot". Their small root system means that the pot need only be large enough to balance the top growth, and will be smaller than that required for a normal, broad-leaved plant of the same size. Clay pots are probably better because their weight can counteract that of the plants top growth and keep it upright.

Water: These plants love humidity. Keep the vase filled with fresh water weekly but on the other hand the root system should be kept only slightly moist; avoid over saturation at all costs. Keep the leaves clean and shiny with soapy water. Spraying the plant will moisten the leaves as well as allow the water to run down the leaves into the vase as rain would; use rain water or distilled, not hard water and, of course, add humidity.

Light and temperature: Direct sunlight can be damaging, so choose a position where the bright sunlight is filtered or provide a good grow-bulb. The fluorescent type may be preferred by the Bromeliads. Do not hide away in a dark corner - not enough light means no blooms.

The temperature should never fall below 55 degrees and they can take a good deal of heat - up to 90 degrees; however, they love to

remain at about 65 to 70 degrees at all times.

Fertilizer: The amount of food that Bromeliads require and the way in which they absorb it is also associated with the "vase". Nutrient is taken in through the leaves as well as the vase. You may give a liquid nutrient solution, provided it is half strength. Spray the leaves and let run down into the vase. Feed about once a month when plant is in active growth.

Pests: Bromeliad's troubles are not many at all, but they can be attacked by Scale and Mealy Bugs.

"Finger and thumb method work" will remove most of these. Use a cotton ball soaked with methylated spirits on the Scale and cotton soaked with rubbing alcohol on the mealy bug. Should the plant become badly afflicted, destroy by burning pot, soil and plant or seal in a plastic bag and drop in the dumpster.

The mother plant produces "Pups" which root easily to make new plants - I think you will love growing this plant. It is not as hard to grow as I make it sound.

The state officials, in Ruidoso for their official visit, will be present for the 7 p.m. meeting. All Eastern Stars are welcome.


