



Moore gently looped a rope around the cub's neck and arm and slowly lowered the furry animal to earth.

The bear was then laid on a blanket in the back of Moore's truck and hauled to the canyon to be with mom.

Moore called **The Ruidoso News** for a final report.

"I know the people would be interested," he said. "The bear awoke about 9 p.m., and after a few minutes of orientation headed happily up the canyon."

Hospital board reviews finances with losses at \$200,000 for year

Despite a revenue/expense deficit in excess of \$200,000, members of the Lincoln County Medical Center (LCMC) Board remain optimistic.

The LCMC is a unique facility because of its high quality of patient care, the number of physician specialists available, and the high morale of its personnel, said Chairman W.C. "Dub" Williams during a regular meeting

Thursday.

"We still take care of those (who cannot pay)," said Williams.

For the fiscal year (FY) 1989, the LCMC is operating at a net loss of \$231,487. This figure is represented by some third party payments and government receipts that have not been collected, as well as \$92,000 every two weeks to cover employee pay.

Secretary of the Board, Steven Keller, believes the situation is a lot better than what had been

projected.

"At least right now we have a good, positive cash flow," Keller said.

This means LCMC has enough funds coming in to pay off creditors according to schedule, said Keller. This puts the hospital in the position to start the next fiscal year in a positive manner, said Keller.

Bad debts are still a problem.

"Our bad debts are getting more

Citizen succeeds in simplifying village reports

Have you ever seen something so complicated you said to yourself, "There has got to be a better way."

Or heard something you simply couldn't believe and had to find out for yourself?

Well, Jim Baker of Ruidoso heard something he simply couldn't believe, when a councillor at a Ruidoso Village Council meeting reported the new airport might possibly produce an alarming loss for this fiscal year.

This made Baker curious about

where the councillor's figures came from.

After asking around village hall, Baker was amazed to find council members were receiving budgetary information and figures from the same 54-page report the village is

required to submit to the Local Government Division of the New Mexico Department of Finance and Administration.

"That report is OK for professionals like (village manager) Frank Potter and (finance director)

John Varley, but impossible for a layman to find required information in," Baker said.

Baker talked with Potter and Varley about the possibility of developing a revised budget report in a more conventional form, much like that encountered in private business.

Both agreed and supplied Baker with the budgets, trial balances and whatever he needed to determine the true facts about, not only the airport operating conditions, but the entire village budget as well. He found out Sierra Blanca

Regional Airport losses were nothing as alarming as the council member had reported.

Baker does not have a background in accounting, but he had dealt with budgets in private business for almost 50 years. Baker, who has run engineering and truck service businesses in Odessa, Texas, and southern California, knew what information a businessman needed from a budget and in what form.

Baker worked with the actual

and more and our applications for charity are getting more and more," said Keller.

"Those of you who pay sometimes have to pay for those who don't," said Williams.

In an explanation directed to new county manager Nick Pappas, Williams stressed the fact Ruidoso had been blessed with such a professional, and charitable hospital.

"We are proud of this," said Williams.

"We're doing higher quality work and patient care with less employees, which brings a cost savings to the consumer," said Keller.

Pappas suggested to the board it should research the development of a transfer agreement with Chavez County with indigent care.

If implemented, residents of Chavez County who receive care at LCMC will be paid for by Chavez County.

The majority of bad debts, however, are in Lincoln County, and the hospital administration will be studying this further, said Keller.

Benefits of the remodeling project at the hospital are already being experienced, said Keller.

The new C-Arm was first used during emergency surgeries last week. The C-Arm is an X-Ray fluoroscope unit used during surgery to provide an inside look at specific targeted areas.

Presently a new trauma X-Ray

machine is being installed, a procedure that takes two weeks.

The remodeling should be completed by mid-June, said Keller.

The hospital deficit would be an even greater burden were it not for the Lincoln County Medical Center Auxiliary, also known as the Pink Ladies.

Since September 1988, the Auxiliary already spent \$23,503.52, including two scholarships of \$1,000 each, auxiliary president Inez Tanner reported.

During March auxiliary members accumulated 1,460 volunteer hours.

"Now, if that were ten dollars per hour..." said Tanner, who then looked up at the board without finishing her sentence.

Tanner also presented to the board for approval the nominees for new Auxiliary officers for the year 1989-90. These include Emadair Jones, president; Dorothy Talley, vice president; Marcella Lotz, secretary; Thena Clark, treasurer; Pat Hume, nominating committee chairperson.

Williams began the meeting by thanking board members and hospital personnel for the flowers sent to his mother who is recovering from by-pass surgery.

Also, Keller relayed thanks from Mike Hainer who was deeply grateful to everyone who had helped, both professionally and spiritually, when his daughter was accidentally killed, April 9.

In other business:

—Keller reported the physician recruitment project is going well. The hospital is attempting to fill positions in primary care, pediatrics, and in internal medicine, Keller said.

—Williams asked for a special meeting of the Scholarship Committee for members to review the many high quality applications he had received.

—Leala Newsom reported to the board the Quality Management program is proceeding well "If we solve problems early... then we are working more efficiently," Newsom said.

A new monitoring system of follow-up care was initiated by such departments as Obstetrics, Social Services, and Emergency, Newsom said.

—Keller reported the Ruidoso Downs Fire Department hosed down the driveway at the emergency room entrance for their hose training, and the Ruidoso Fire Department hosed down the main parking lot, also for their hose training.

This demonstrated inter-agency cooperation, and the hospital is grateful, Keller said.

—The board retired into executive session, and did not reconvene afterwards.

The next meeting is scheduled for 5:30 p.m. Thursday, May 18, in the Hospital Educational Annex.

Crimestoppers board approves paying \$650 in tipster rewards

The Ruidoso Lincoln County Crimestoppers organization paid out a total of \$650 in rewards, the board of directors announced at a regular noon meeting Thursday at the Texas Club.

The \$650 total includes a reward pending on a narcotics trafficking charge.

Crimestoppers coordinator Lanny Maddox reported there were six calls to the Crimestoppers number since the last meeting.

Board members Roy Seay, Richard Silva and Maddox attended the state board meeting in Las Cruces. Maddox said the Ruidoso Crimestoppers had the most representation at the meeting.

Maddox also announced there will be a statewide Crimestoppers telethon on KOAT-TV in Albuquerque, August 26, for four hours in the evening. Each local organiza-

tion is asked to send two representative to staff the phones. This year's telethon will be different from last year's in that donations from Ruidoso and Lincoln County will go to the local organization instead of the state organization.

He also said the International Crimestoppers Conference will be in Albuquerque beginning September 19.

Maddox presented a proposal from the Otero County Crimestoppers to establish a joint 1-800 wats line with the Ruidoso and Lincoln County organization. All calls would go to Otero County first, but those involving Ruidoso and Lincoln County would be patched back to Ruidoso.

The local organization would benefit from the new service because Otero County would staff the phones and they would also list

Ruidoso and Lincoln County on all their billboards.

Maddox said the local organization would keep its local number. After an initial hookup fee, the wats line would cost the local group \$30 a month. The board unanimously voted to accept the proposal and join Otero County in the venture.

In other business, the board of directors:

—voted to place a bulletin board at Ruidoso High School

—changed the date of the annual Pistol Match from May 20 and 21 to the second weekend in June

—set the date for their Child Identification Program in Wal-Mart as the third week in July

The board's next meeting will be at noon on May 18, in the home economics room at Ruidoso High School.

Auxiliary works to help LCMC

The Pink Ladies (and gentlemen) want you!

And they would like you to bring to the Thrift Shop, at 140 Nob Hill Drive, anything you would normally consider for a garage sale.

The "Pink Ladies and Gentlemen," as members of the Lincoln County Medical Center (LCMC) Auxiliary are fondly called, are dedicated to the improvement of medical care in Lincoln County.

Each year the group spends between \$50,000 and \$70,000 on new equipment for the hospital, said Lillian Steele, treasurer.

Since September 1988, the auxiliary has already spent \$23,503.52, reported Inez Tanner, president, to the LCMC Board of Trustees.

For example, the auxiliary purchased three trauma carts for the emergency room at a cost of \$10,579.29, said Steele.

Other purchases include an IBM typewriter (\$1,500), and a CPR mannequin (\$365) for Emergency Medical Service (EMS) training, said Steele.

There is also approximately \$21,000 in pledges for future purchases which include comfortable, reclining chairs for patient visitors who may be staying in a room for a long time, said Steele.

The cost of just one of these chairs is estimated at \$1,100, Steele said.

Where do they get this money? By selling what you don't want, but what someone else might be able to use in the auxiliary Thrift Shop. The shop is operated and staffed by volunteers and has no paid personnel. All merchandise is donated.

With the summer tourist season rapidly approaching, there is a need for donations of household items to the Thrift Shop, Tanner said.

While all donations are gladly accepted, the strongest need is for

dishes, linens, kitchen items, and other household goods.

Items can be brought to the shop during business hours, from 1-4 p.m. Tuesdays, and 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Wednesday through Saturday.

Donations will be accepted on Monday mornings, but it is suggested you call ahead first.

The Thrift Shop phone number is 257-7051.

Pledges and cash donations are also accepted, said Steele. Cash donations can be mailed to the Hospital Auxiliary, PO Box 392,

Ruidoso 88345. Memorial donations are usually reserved for life saving equipment, unless specified.

The auxiliary has approximately 114 members, who put in 1,460 volunteer hours during the month of March alone, said Tanner.

Their newsletter, the "Pink Page," is edited by Sally Avery, who is also the director of volunteers. The newsletter has a circulation of about 200, and is sent to members, doctors, and to state agencies.



AAA members share views

Lincoln and Otero County motorists shared similar views about certain recent legislative issues with motorists statewide, according to a survey conducted by the American Automobile Association (AAA).

New Mexico AAA members expressed their feelings about recent legislative issues by responding to a member survey in the organization's magazine.

A majority of members favored bills expanding the seat belt law to

include pickup trucks, raising fines for speeding and allowing auto clubs to negotiate rates with towing companies for emergency road service. All three bills passed both house and senate, and now await Governor Garrey Carruther's signature.

AAA members opposed triple-trailers on New Mexico's highways and a bill which would have allowed longer trucks was withdrawn.

Other bills affecting motorists

and awaiting the governor's signature: an increase in state gas tax from 14 to 16 cents, a ban on open alcoholic beverage containers in vehicles and a 20 percent discount on auto insurance for good drivers.

A question which showed a slightly different response from Lincoln and Otero county motorists was the expansion of the seat belt law to include recreational vehicles. More than 16 percent of the members voted no on the expanded law, opposed to 12 percent state-wide.

leads the trainer standing at Sunland Park, is expected for the 1989 season, as is Oklahoma trainer Cecil Crabtree, who is bringing stakes winner Scout Beauty. Dwayne Gilbreath will be on the grounds with the winner of the first Jeep Quarter Horse/Thoroughbred Challenge of 1989 and track record holder at Sunland Park, Cherokee Lake.

Ruidoso Downs 1988 Horse of the Year and Best Handicap Horse, Crusher Run, will be under Paul Smith's shedrow. Terrell Davidson is bringing 1988 Best Sprinter of the Meet, Lightfoot Lil. Davidson is also bringing 1988 Ruidoso Thoroughbred Derby winner Musco Duck.

Doyal Roberts, the leading thoroughbred trainer at Ruidoso Downs in 1988, is bringing the 1989 New Mexico Breeders' Association Sales Stakes at Sunland Park, Fly Dragoness.

A number of horses already are on the track, including 31 trained by Arnold Simmons, who was sec-

ond in the 1988 quarter horse trainer standings. Simmons arrived on April 18, from Bandera Downs in Texas.

Simmons is well-stocked with three-year-old talents, including Super De Kas, who dead-heated for third in the 1988 All American Futurity. Simmons also trained 1986 All American Futurity winner Ronas Ryon.

Simmons is especially excited about Super De Kas, who had surgery on both knees over the winter.

"His first race will be the Kansas Derby Trials," said Simmons. "He likes the track and has been training well," he added.

Of the 15 two-year-olds in his barn, Simmons is expecting a lot from a filly named Ramble With Effort owned by Charles B. Albrecht of Newhall, California.

"She seems like our best two-year-old so far," said Simmons. "We didn't want to run her in Texas. We feel she's a little immature and we wanted to give her a little time."

Simmons said he, as well as

other horsemen, is excited about the new management and the changes in the barn area at the track.

John Goodman's stable arrived April 17, the first day the stable area was open. Goodman's assistant trainer John Pape brought nine horses from Manor Downs near Austin, Texas. Eventually, the Goodman stable will have 20 horses at Ruidoso Downs.

Included in the first set of arrivals was Financial Aid, a six-year-old gelding who won the Gene Hensley Handicap at Ruidoso Downs in 1987 and 1988. Financial Aid had chips taken out of his knees over the winter, and Pape expects the gelding to bounce back.

"We started back on him a month ago," said Pape. "He's an old horse, so it doesn't take much to bring him back," he added.

Trainers are working their horses on the track, crews are putting final touches to the remodeling and painting in the stands and the countdown has begun for the 1989 racing season.

The Grade I event will be run Sunday, April 30, and has a \$191,480 purse. Value to the winner is \$76,679.

Trials were Friday, April 14, with 11 divisions. Post Oak Farm's Do No Wrong, won his division with a 350-yard time of 17.650 seconds, the second fastest time of the day.

Special Project had the fastest time of the day, 17.545 seconds. Do No Wrong was purchased at the Ruidoso Super Select Sale for \$22,500.

The third fastest time went to Timely Rhythm who ran 17.685 seconds. The filly was repurchased for \$5,000 at the 1988 All American Yearling Sale.

Strawberry Silk posted the fourth best time, 17.705 seconds. The filly, sired by Beduino, was purchased for \$100,000 at last year's Ruidoso Super Select Sale.

Power Train, who was sold to

Billy Pittman of Jacksonville, Florida, for \$23,000 at the All American Yearling Sale, ran the fifth fastest time of the day with a 17.755.

Staunch Haunch, owned by Homer Garza of Mesquite, New Mexico, also ran a 17.755. The colt, sired by Staunch Avenger, sold for \$5,000 last year at the Ruidoso Super Select Mixed Sale.

Obelisk, owned by Jackie Spencer of Alto, New Mexico, ran the eighth fastest qualifying time, 17.815 seconds. The colt, sired by Dash for Cash, was purchased for \$92,000 at the All American Yearling Sale.

Three horses qualified for the Sun Country Futurity Consolation that passed through the sales ring last summer. The Hooking Bull and Race Car Red were both purchased at the All American Yearling Sale for \$15,000 and \$5,000 respectively. Le Tusk, who was purchased for \$9,700 at the Ruidoso Super Select Sale, also qualified for the consolation.

The 1989 Ruidoso Horse Sale Co. has scheduled its sale for August 23-26. The sale will be at the Ruidoso Super Select Sale Pavilion in Glencoe, New Mexico.

Village staff said a director will be hired, but meanwhile employees are continuing department opera-


tions. "We have a great bunch of employees who know exactly what to do and when to do it," said Durham.

The piñon, cedar and all the Mountain Children of Mother were conserving their moisture, patiently waiting, knowing from long experience that April is a dry month in the mountain land—that oftentimes rain does not arrive in the vale un-

til July and sometimes even August.

And then—are you dreaming? Just over the hill to the northwest came the rumbling, reverberating, deep base voice of the approaching rain. One of the sweetest sounds in the world to our mountain homeland—surely the answer to a prayer by Mother earth. Again the melodious voice from the sky sounded and the gray cloud appeared over the hilltop. A cool

breath swept down through the vale, and all the trees responded with singing among their leaves and branches as trees, bushes and flowers immediately took on new life, breathing in the moist air approaching before the rain. And you, along with these fellow dwellers in these hills and glades and dells, inhale this breath of life from the advancing clouds.

Now the great large raindrops pattered on the roof, beating a joyful tattoo; and a few drops of hail added to the volume of the drum beat on the roof. The raindrops beat hosts of tiny clouds of dust from the meadows and slightly larger tan-colored puffs of fine sand from the road.

Rome Beauty Late Bloomer

This may be the year of the Rome beauty, latest of the main apple varieties to bloom. The other varieties here on the slopes of the White Mountain are red delicious,

golden delicious, several kinds of winesaps and Jonathan.

The Rome beauty blooms from ten days to sometimes two weeks later than the others, and many a year this is just enough time to beat the hard frost that tells the other varieties to wait till next year.

This seems to be an unusual year in several ways—speaking of apples. The last hard freeze of a few days ago came in the middle of an unusually heavy apple bloom. Sometimes, when the bloom is heavy, there will be a second blooming when the main crop of blooms is taken by frost. In some of the orchards I have noticed that on the golden delicious and on a few of the red delicious, new blooms are appearing among the leaves. I am not sure how many apples will result

from this, and will let you know later.

However, one thing is sure, at this writing, April twenty, the Rome beauty trees in the orchards are solid white, and if the weather holds, will produce heavy crops. I am almost sure there will be some golden delicious, and maybe a few of the other varieties, especially in the upper reaches of the Bonito Valley where the trees bloom late. These are old favorite varieties like black twig, Virginia winesap and Pearsmain.

However, it looks as though the old faithful Rome beauty will carry on its tradition and bring a bountiful crop. I will keep you posted on the apple picture.

Let us thank God for the recent rains and all our many other blessings.



Smith announces for governor

Las Cruces resident Ruben Smith is a candidate for the Democratic nomination for governor.

Smith, in Ruidoso last week to speak to the Lincoln County Democrats, stopped by *The News* to announce his plans. Smith and his wife, Liz, have a travel agency in Las Cruces, where he also serves as president of C.B. Smith & Sons and is managing partner for the Central Loan Company.

After seven years in the House of Representatives, Smith said he believes he has proven his leader-

ship ability. After seeing the politics played between the legislators and governors of both parties, Smith said he has drawn his own conclusions.

"The next governor is going to have to understand and respect the process," said Smith, who believes his knowledge of and ability to work with the system are in his favor. "The next governor is going to have to have credibility with both parties," said Smith, adding that he believes he has developed that bipartisan respect.

Smith said he has carried a lot of legislation on correctional and children and youth issues.

"I can go back and show you what I've done on economic development at home," said Smith, noting that education and economic development are two issues that are closely tied.

While the Smiths, who have three children, have committed themselves to winning the gubernatorial race; the candidate admitted the decision to run prompted him to give up one of his first loves. Smith has been a member of the El Paso Symphony Orchestra for 21 years, where he was principal bassoonist until he resigned last week to concentrate on his campaign.

During the past 60-day session, Smith said he voted against the video gambling bill that was supported by a great many Ruidoso residents. Smith said he has never supported a lottery or any kind of gambling.

"There are more positive ways to achieve economic development," said Smith.

As Smith embarks on the campaign trail, he promises to wage an unusual and innovative campaign that he says he is optimistic enough to believe will end for him on the fourth floor of the Roundhouse.

"You'll see things happen that you've never seen happen in any campaign," said Smith.





EDITORIAL

Three cheers for the Lincoln County Commission!

When commissioners Robert Hemphill, Karon Petty and Rick Simpson were elected, they said they would keep close tabs on county legal costs. The three took immediate action to do just that.

They told the county attorney to stay home from meetings, arranging to contact their legal adviser with specific questions, instead of having him sit through hours of routine business.

The Lincoln County Commission and county manager Nick Pappas, after advertising for proposals on legal services, negotiated a legal contract with a monthly ceiling of \$3,000. The group set up guidelines for asking for legal advice that should control the hours the county attorney is called on to spend on county business.

"We're getting a dollar's worth of service for a dollar paid out," explained Pappas, noting the legal contract is for \$60 an hour, 50 hours a month—no travel, no overhead and no extras.

In a time when some municipal and county leaders seem hesitant to make a decision without legal advice, it's refreshing when elected officials are willing to take responsibility for their actions. All too often we see city and county attorneys sitting in on every meeting of, not only the governing bodies, but also appointed boards and commissions. The practice of having an attorney present for every meeting can get very expensive. That's not going to be happening under the current county legal contract.

The Lincoln County Commission should be commended for this big step to curb the escalating costs of county government. Way to go, commissioners!—fj



Guaranteed, mind you. Guaranteed how?—If there's an accident, you get twice the waste back??




