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Governor explains veto, cancels Ruidoso visit

Governor Garrey Carruthers, in a telephone call to *The News* Wednesday, explained his veto of the video gambling bill, and said he won't be visiting Ruidoso on his New Mexico vacation.

Carruthers said he was unable to include his reasons for vetoing a bill that was designed to allow video gambling in three resort areas of the state in a veto message because of legal questions involved.

"Quite frankly, about a year or so ago, the Congress of the United States passed an Indian Gaming

Act," said Carruthers, adding if a state allows something to happen anywhere in that state, then it can happen on an Indian reservation.

"In effect, my signature would have allowed gaming in 25 locations, not three," said Carruthers.

The governor said the state is not equipped at the present time to handle a new form of gambling in 25 locations. He said already two pueblos have installed video gambling, even without his signature on the bill to allow the machines in Ruidoso, Angel Fire and Taos.

"If I had signed that bill, we would have had state-wide video

gaming, period," said Carruthers. "There is no reason to believe we would have had that much control over 22 of the 25 (locations)," he added.

Although the federal gaming act is in place, a commission hasn't been appointed yet to oversee it. Carruthers said he went to Washington DC to find out more about the law.

"There is no one around who can explain it to you—there is no one," stressed Carruthers.

"I do not want to be the governor that introduces new forms of gambling in New Mexico unless I feel

we can control the circumstances," said Carruthers, recalling all his efforts to make sure the horse racing industry is operating according to the law.

"I do not want to create any problems by bringing my entourage to Ruidoso," said Carruthers, saying with the strong feelings in this area over his decision on the gambling bill, he'll postpone his visit to Ruidoso.

"We're trying to make this a very positive tour. If the community is unhappy with me, we'll be happy to come down some other time and take my pounding like I always do,"

said Carruthers.

He said his advance people did visit Ruidoso and ask for free lodging and meals on his behalf, but without his authorization and against his expressed wishes. Carruthers said the man running the state agency making the arrangements has a background in the hospitality industry and is accustomed to making such arrangements.

But on his vacation in New Mexico, Carruthers said he intends to pay as he goes.

"What I want to report to people is what it actually costs me," said Carruthers, stressing that he never

intended to ask for free accommodations.

"The focus here is on 'buy New Mexico'"

Carruthers said after hearing of the strong feelings in the Ruidoso area he changed his itinerary.

"I don't want to mix what I consider a positive advertising promotion with some policy decisions I made," said Carruthers.

He said he will definitely visit Ruidoso soon, but not on this trip.

Landfill woes worry area administrators

Representatives from Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs, Capitan and Lincoln County met Wednesday with officials of the New Mexico Environmental Improvement Division (EID) to discuss new regulations affecting the state's landfills.

According to county attorney Robert Beauvais, new regulations covering state landfills will go into effect on May 14. Beauvais said the Association of Counties is filing a lawsuit to delay the implementation of the new regulations. He said so far Lincoln County is not part of this lawsuit.

Beauvais said in order for the county and the villages to be ready

to comply with the new regulations, the current site of dumping or the pit will have to be closed and a new and different pit started. The site would have to be in the process of covering, grating and contouring to be considered closed.

According to EID officials, the operators of the landfill will be required to keep written operating records. The records will have to include the quality of waste received and the method and date of its disposal. The location, depth and quantity of all waste will have to be recorded on a map or diagram for each disposal area. In addition to these requirements, results of

Garbage agreement prompts resignations

Trustees Bill Smith and C.L. "Bones" Wright resigned Monday night from the Village of Ruidoso Downs Board of Trustees over a contract dispute.

A proposed agreement between the village and Ruidoso Downs Racing, Inc. for the sale of sanitation equipment and the collection of garbage was the issue that prompted the sudden resignations.

Smith and Wright resigned following a four to three vote on a motion calling for the village to enter into a contract with the racetrack to purchase a 1979 Ford sanitation truck and 120 garbage containers.

Under terms of the proposed contract, the purchase price for the truck and the garbage containers is \$25,000.

The contract is payable as follows:

—The village will collect and dispose of the garbage at the racetrack and charge the track \$2.50 a container. The amount charged will be credited toward the purchase price of the truck until such time as 10,000 containers have been collected. At that time the purchase price will have been paid in full and the truck becomes the property of the Village of Ruidoso Downs.

—The village will continue to pick up and dispose of the garbage

at the racetrack for a charge of \$2.50 per container for a period of two years after the purchase price has been paid. The racetrack will pay the charges incurred monthly. After the two-year period, the village will continue to pick up and dispose of the garbage at the racetrack for a charge per container of no more than 10 percent over the previous year's charges. At no time will the village charge the racetrack more than the village's other commercial customers.

The Village would also be responsible for providing insurance on the truck.

The racetrack would hold no other liens or claims against the village except for the lien on the truck. The village can use the truck for its general garbage collection service, but the racetrack would not be held harmless from any liability from the use of the truck.

The racetrack is not charging the village any interest on the purchase price and the contract renewal is subject to the availability of funds in the new fiscal year.

"I don't see how the village can lose on it at all," said Mayor Jake Harris.

The mayor made the motion to accept the contract.

Regional airport development continues

Phase one of the original airport master plan for the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport will soon be complete according to airport manager Tim Morris.

The final part of the master plan's phase one will begin next week. Several 60-foot lightposts will be installed to provided ramp

area lighting, said Morris. A six-foot chain link fence with automatic security gates will be completed by the first weekend in May.

Morris said the project was scheduled to be completed by May 1, but was delayed because of bad weather.

"Everything is just going along according to the master plan," said Morris. "It couldn't be better."

According to Morris, operations at the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport are improving over last year. There are now around 25,000 to 26,000 operations per year. An operation is defined as an airplane taking off or landing.

Airport traffic is up 13 to 15 percent and fuel sales are up 20 percent.

Morris also reported that all

hangar spaces at the airport are full and there is a waiting list for openings.


He said traffic at the airport will be picking up during the next four months. The airport tower will extend hours to from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. seven days a week on May 1.

Ruidoso council considers conventions contract Tuesday

The Ruidoso Village Council dealt with business licenses, lodgers tax monies and the 911 emergency number during a regular meeting Tuesday.

Councillor Jess Stinson added his name to the agenda, and surprised fellow councillors by moving to terminate the convention and visitors bureau contract between the Village of Ruidoso and the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce.

"I don't believe we should turn over 100 percent (lodgers tax funds) to the Chamber of Commerce and the Village Council have nothing to say," said Stinson, recalling a proposal made at the last meeting by Mike Warren on behalf of the Lodgers Tax Advisory Board (LTAB).

Warren, a member of LTAB as well as a member of the chamber board and the chamber advertising committee, described plans to turn over funds that are usually allocated through LTAB to the chamber. He said the groups who have asked for lodgers tax funds for promotion will get "more bang for the buck" by using chamber resources.

LTAB, a group mandated by state statutes to oversee lodgers tax funds, would then meet only three or four times a year, instead of once a month.

Village attorney John Underwood said if the present contract is terminated then requests for proposals will have to be sought; otherwise the current contract can be renegotiated.

Warren said terminating the contract would "play havoc on promoting Ruidoso this summer." Stinson questioned Warren over his service on both the LTAB and advertising committee, and Warren said he has no conflict.

"If they don't want to listen to (requests), get them off the commission," suggested Stinson.

Warren accused Stinson of having an ax to grind, and suggested a special meeting to re-evaluate the contract.

"I don't have an ax to grind; I have a hell of a lot of people calling me to say they don't think the chamber's doing a good job," said Stinson.

Councillor J.D. James suggested a member of the Ruidoso Village Council should be on the screening committee.

In a three to two vote, Stinson's

suggestion was tabled until the next meeting.

Also Tuesday, councillors heard a request from a Capitan resident to allow free swimming for the handicapped in the Ruidoso Municipal Pool and an appeal of his business license fee by the owner of Track of the Grizzly.

Councillors tabled action on a request by Doris Cherry to allow free swimming for the handicapped, in spite of a recommendation from division director Becky Bell-Durham that the request be denied because of the state anti-donation laws.

Durham said the village can't give services free to one person, when others pay for those same services.

But Councillor Al Junge, saying it's a great idea, said things are changing all the time and some people are "getting freebies that didn't used to get freebies."

Cherry said Santa Fe has a free swimming program for the handicapped and Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr. asked Durham to check into that.

In an unrelated request,

Maurice Sowell, the owner of Track of the Grizzly, told the council his annual business license increased 400 percent over the past year—from \$25 to \$100, and asked for some relief.

Village manager Frank Potter told the council a new ordinance was adopted since last year. He said a lot of thought went into the fees that were established, with special emphasis on protecting local businesses.

Underwood said the ordinance would have to be amended if the council wants to change any business license fees.

Sowell, who operates a trading post, said he provides a service and an attraction. He disagreed with statements that he operates a pawn shop.

"In my opinion, \$100 isn't going to hurt anybody," said Councillor Tom McNeil.

In other regular business Tuesday, the council:

—Awarded the bid on 20,000 Village of Ruidoso lapel pins to the low bidder after discussion on whether the pins are worthwhile as a promotional tool.

—Approved an application for a State Library Grant to enclose the patio at the Ruidoso Public Library.

—Learned that the Eagle Creek wells were tested, and a report is expected the week of May 8.

—Renewed an agreement with Ruidoso Emergency Medical Services for ambulance services and equipment.

—Authorized publishing a request for legal services proposals.

—Approved budgeting \$5,000 for the Water Defense Association.

—Agreed to take the necessary steps to acquire enhanced 911, using the 25 cents per telephone levy approved in the past legislature.

—Approved a joint powers agreement with the State Police to share the costs of a receptionist at the Ruidoso Police Department.

—Adopted a resolution supporting the City of Lordsburg in protesting a national landfill in the State of New Mexico.

—Approved appointments to various boards and commissions and to the election board.

—Heard Junge criticize the village administration for not keeping

him informed and for the resignation of former Parks and Recreation director Daryl Obermueller.

"I guess bureaucracy got him and he left," said Junge, praising the former employee.

James told Junge there are two sides to every story, and suggested he get the other side on the Obermueller story from village administration.

"The village would have been justified had they severed him," said James.

Potter, noting that it was the first time he had seen Junge since the last council meeting, said he and other members of village staff are always available to answer questions of councillors.

"If you want to know something, we will give you an answer," said Potter.

Junge also blasted The Ruidoso News, calling their reporting "inaccurate and slanted."

Junge said a report that he was on a council that was removed from office, and then was re-elected was untrue because he was defeated twice before he won his last election, by just six votes.

waste analysis, inspections, monitoring, testing, analytical data and all closure cost for a disposal area must be kept.

Becky Bell-Durham, infrastructure division director for the Village of Ruidoso, said a new pit is already being dug, but the Village will need help from the county to get the current disposal site closed before May 14. She also informed the group, the village and the county have a maximum of two years left at the current site located on Fort Stanton Road.

She said the village will have to hire an additional person or transfer someone from another department in order to have someone at the landfill gate to record the waste coming in and out.

Frank Potter, village manager, said there will have to be a control gate placed at the landfill to control traffic into and out of the site.

Members of the group agreed there might have to be a fee or a rate hike to cover the cost of the new person and complying with the new regulations. But the group said adding a fee could have adverse effects.

"If we start charging a users fee, we are going to see a lot of illegal dumping out in the county," said Beauvais.

County manager Nick Pappas said because of the new cost, a new agreement between the county and the Village of Ruidoso will have to be drawn to ensure the cost is shared and the village agrees to comply with the new regulations.

He asked local EID environmentalists Carl Stubbs and Jim Edwards to work with the county and village to ensure proper procedures are followed in closing the present disposal pit.

"I think we have come to the conclusion that we should close the current site and start new on day one," said Pappas.

Dan Davenport of the Capitan Water and Solid Waste Department asked Edwards if a permit is required for all landfills.

"All existing landfills will have to apply for a permit from the Environmental Improvement Division," said Edwards.

EID representative Gary McCaslin from Roswell told the group about several alternatives to dumping materials in the landfill. He suggested the villages or the county consider recycling such things as pine needles and sludge and turning them into compost. He also suggested the group consider having their engineers look at each new disposal site to make sure it will comply with all new EID regulations.

Commission deals with landfill regs

Members of the Lincoln County Commission want to move quickly to close county landfills no longer in use before new state regulations come into effect in the next 30 days, said commission Chairman Robert E. Hemphill during a regular meeting Monday in Carrizozo.

The county also wants to disclaim responsibility for "bootleg" dumps on various sites throughout the county, said Bob Beauvais, attorney for the county, after the meeting.

The sites Beauvais referred to are dumps that were never registered with the county, and are places where individuals illegally dump trash on private and/or public land.

At the meeting's start, Chairman Hemphill moved that items referring to bridge replacement project number BR-0-7527(4) be tabled until the next meeting so further information can be gathered.

Because of some confusion over the language used by the New Mexico State Highway and Transportation Department, the commission

decided to table the item, said county manager Nick Pappas in a telephone interview.

Formal approval of the legal services agreement between the county and Parsons & Bryant, P.A. was made during the meeting.

Minor changes in the wording of the agreement were made by the commission with the consent of Bob Beauvais who attended the meeting representing Parsons & Bryant. Authorization for the Fort Stanton Road Reconstruction Project to resume was granted by the commission during the meeting.

The project had been discontinued November 21, 1988, because of cold weather, said a change order submitted by PAJO Technical Services, Inc. The change order included a revised contract, which involved a \$6,600 increase in the original contract.

Hemphill assured the commission members that this revision will cost the county no more money than was previously agreed upon.

Completion is to be within budget by May 30, 1989.

Seal coat on the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport access road was completed Friday, and pavement

striping has begun.

Commissioner Karon Z. Petty suggested a ribbon-cutting ceremony be planned for the opening of the road, and invitations sent to state and federal elected officials, including U.S. Senator Pete Domenici and State Senator Manny Aragon.

A professional services supplemental agreement spelling out the contents of the contract was included at the suggestion of manager Pappas because of the lapse in time in the project.

The board approved the budget submittals made by area volunteer fire departments for distribution of the 1989 Fire Protection Fund.

The proposed budget needs for each fire department for the fiscal year 1989-90 are, for Bonito Fire District, \$29,648; Fort Stanton Fire District, \$28,700; Glencoe-Palo Verde Fire District, \$15,950; Hondo Fire District, \$32,972; Lincoln Fire District, \$17,546; Nogal Fire District, \$16,038.

In other business the board:

—Approved submission of application for funds and Assurances of Compliance with Department of Health & Human Services regula-

tions for Zia Senior Citizens Center.

—Proclaimed the week of April 30 through May 7, 1989, Soil and Water Stewardship Week.

—Approved budget increase/decrease corrections in-line item transfers as requested by Mignon Sims, county bookkeeper.

—Approved budget increases and decreases requested by Sheriff James McSwane to transfer funds to Capital Outlay to purchase two McIntosh computers to be used in training and in assisting deputies in the field.

—Approved request made by Sims for authority to issue vouchers for payment, which allow the county to realize a two percent discount with some vendors.

—Approved the payroll register for the sum of \$13,057.37.

—Approved resolution 77-62 for payment of goods and services received by the county, with the addition of payment for two new dumpsters.

—Accepted the Treasurer's report.

The next regular meeting is scheduled for 6 p.m., Monday, May 8, in Carrizozo.

is out several new systems will be in operation at the airport which will make it more convenient for pilots.

The airport's instrument approach frequency will be listed on the May Federal Aviation Administration N.O.S. Chart publication.

By the end of the summer an Automatic Weather Report Station will be in place to give up-to-date weather information by phone to pilot about conditions at the airport.

Morris said sometime in the future the airport will start phase

two of the three part master plan. He said phase two will involve the construction of a crosswind runway, the widening and lengthening of the existing runway from 8,100 feet to 10,500 feet and the development of a terminal building. Phase three will involve the further extension of the main runway to 12,300 feet.

The phased development is according to the airport master plan adopted more than 10 years ago.

The multi-million dollar phase one has been accomplished with a combination of state, federal and local funds, with the bulk of funding provided by the FAA.

Texas horse racing could begin by 1990

Ruidoso Downs track management unconcerned

Pari-mutuel horse racing could begin at Lubbock Downs in Lubbock, Texas, as early as March 1, 1990, according to published reports.

The Texas Racing Commission voted Tuesday to grant a Class 2 pari-mutuel license to the track located southeast of Lubbock.

Ruidoso Downs officials aren't concerned.

"People come here to escape the heat; there's more things to do here than racing," said Mark Doth, Ruidoso Downs Racing, Inc. marketing director. Doth doesn't believe the racing planned by New Mexico's neighbors will have a serious impact on attendance at Ruidoso Downs anytime soon.

Doth said the Tuesday action isn't the final approval the new track needs, and the application is scheduled for review on May 1.

"It's going to be several years before it's going to have any impact on what we're going here," said

Doth. Lubbock Downs developers reportedly expect the pari-mutuel track to be an economic boon to the Lubbock area.

"We need it; we need it badly," said Lubbock Downs owner Jean Arnett.

Lubbock County voters approved pari-mutuel racing in a local option election last year. Those same county voters rejected the gambling issue in a statewide referendum in 1987.

The Texas Racing Commission approval placed several conditions on the track, including the stipulation that 400 stalls be in place by March 1991, and that a manager or management consultant with experience in pari-mutuel racing be hired for the first racing season.

Meanwhile, Ruidoso Downs Racing Inc. is gearing up for the 1989 racing season, and expecting to continue to draw racing fans from throughout West Texas.

The Plant Corner by Sally Black



DEAR SALLY:

I have just received, as a gift, a lovely plant with very large leaves labeled "Ficus family." Please help me with a better identification and how to care for the plant.

HARRIET B.

DEAR HARRIET:

This is an easy one. You have just received one of my favorites. It is commonly known as a fiddle leaf fig plant—reason being the fiddle-shaped leaves (some folks call them violins). Often the leaves reach the size of the back of a fiddle. The leaves are very dramatic with dark green, prominently veined with a glossy surface. They are highly effective as indoor pot plants. Other more popular Ficus plants are the

Ficus Benjamina, Ficus Elastica (rubber tree), Ficus Microcarpe (Indian laurel), plus many, many more. All require about the same care, they are hardy and bug-resistant, probably why your label said "Ficus Family."

To increase branching, pinch back when young. Soon the plant will need to be pruned to keep its leaves from crushing against the ceiling and turning the stem downward, that is, if you have an overhead light, such as a sky-light or gro-bulb attached to the ceiling directly above the plant. When the plant gets too tall, make new plants by air-layering.

Do not use chemical spray or leaf polish on this plant. To discourage

pests and to keep the exotic leaves glistening, wash with a soft cloth and soapy (not detergent) warm water. Let the suds remain on both sides of the leaves for two or three minutes and rinse with warm, distilled water. Hard water will dull the leaves. This plant loves its bath for cleanliness and extra humidity.

Soil—Good, fast drainage is absolutely essential. Oxygen must get to the roots. If not, the leaves will yellow and drop. Use a mixture of 1/3 sharp sand, 1/3 peat or finely ground bark, and 1/3 #2 potting soil. Add vermiculite to help air to circulate among the roots. Use a large pot to allow plenty of room for the roots.

Water—Water year-round allowing the moist soil to become dry to the touch on top between waterings. Never overwater or let stand in a tray of water. Too dry or drowning will cause leaves to fall. Water is the major cause of death for this plant.

Light and Temperature—A good, bright light is needed. A southern exposure with an overhead light is

required for the plant to thrive. The fiddle-leaf loves warmth. It prefers a constant temperature of 60 to 85 degrees, but will tolerate a wider range. Never place this plant near a forced air vent or a tobacco smoker.

Fertilizer—Dilute a good liquid plant food, such as Peters or BR-61, to 1/3 the recommended use on the label, once a month. This plant also loves organic fertilizer to prevent salt build-up.

Pests—Red spider mites are the enemy for the fiddle-leaf. A good preventive is a root treatment with isotory water two or three times a year. Follow instructions on package. Also, red spider mites loath clean, shiny leaves.

Good luck with your new plant and if it is in a small pot, repot now to a large pot and don't forget to put lots of plastic packing do-dads in the bottom for the good drainage, and do not fertilize the newly-potted plant for at least six months.



State Police conduct EMT training

Officers Marshall Warren and Danny Kiper of the New Mexico State Police presented a program on cold water near-drownings to emergency and hospital personnel recently.

"Two hundred fifty people have drowned in New Mexico since 1982; a lot for a state without much water," observed Warren, who coor-

dinates State Police diving recovery teams.

He pointed out that drownings in this state occur in lakes, rivers and ponds, as well as ditches, bathtubs and swimming pools.

"Drowning is the second leading cause of death in children under the age of 13," said Warren. "And 88 percent of the victims are

young," he added.

Warren then explained how to access diving teams and offered current theories in the resuscitation of near-drowning victims.

Survival depends on many factors, among them the age: "the younger the victim the better. Second is the length of time in the water. Obviously shorter is better.

And third is water temperature—the colder, the better."

The class was sponsored by Lincoln County Emergency Medical Technicians Association as part of its continuing education program.



Capitan teacher receives award

Capitan second grade teacher Mary Shanks received the 1988 Earth Team Volunteer of the Year Award from the Soil Conservation Service of the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Shanks earned the award by developing a conservation education curriculum suitable for all elementary grade students, said the award winning teacher.

The program is named Project Soil, and was first presented at the New Mexico Association of Conservation Districts' annual meeting in November, 1988, said a release.

In the release, Shanks stated "If Project Soil proves successful, it will be presented to the State Board of Education for possible inclusion in mandatory state curriculum."

Project Soil has been so well

received that Shanks has been nominated by the Soil Conservation Service to be the 1989 Conservation Teacher of the Year.

The course's simplicity has been its major appeal.

Project Soil can be taught in one week using 30-minute daily sessions, according to information provided by Shanks and the SCS.

Presently, the course is being field tested in four schools in New Mexico.

"The program makes effective use of visual aids which personalize and facilitate understanding of basic soil concepts," said Shanks.

"These materials are conveniently packaged in a box, and teachers can use them with minimal outside help or prior preparation," she said.

Topics in the lesson plans include "the importance of soil, types of soil, soil erosion and its control," plus a review.

The New Mexico Museum of Natural History has plans to use Shanks' curriculum in the museum's outreach activities with small, rural schools throughout the state.

Initially, Project Soil began as a curriculum for fourth graders, however, Shanks has successfully taught the course to her second graders, thus widening the course's appeal.

Today's schools have been criticized for lacking hands-on type of activities to involve students.

Project Soil heavily involves the students with hands-on activities, increasing their interest and enhancing their learning.

Convenience of materials is another plus for the course.

"The attractive part of this program is that everything the teacher needs is included in a box...teachers will like this because they will not have to spend a lot of time searching for material or scheduling speakers," said information provided by the SCS.

The idea for Project Soil began with a suggestion from the Reverend Ken Cole, former chairman of the Upper Hondo Soil and Water Conservation District, and a former long-time Ruidoso resident.

Shanks became a member of the district's Earth Team in January of 1988 to write the curriculum.

Assistance came from the local SCS, "other teachers, farmers and ranchers."

Development of the course occupied approximately 153 volunteer hours on Shanks' part.

Plans are to expand the course's use to ten other schools next fall.

"If the program is well received, the New Mexico Association of Conservation Districts will promote this on a statewide basis," said information provided by the SCS.

Shanks has been involved in other conservation education projects, including Project Wild, and Project Learning Tree.



Warriors brace for district — Lovington last regular meet

The Ruidoso Warriors track season is nearing an end.

This Saturday's Lovington meet signals the end of regular season and a preparation for the district tournament in Las Cruces on Saturday, May 6.

Warriors head track coach Ronny Maskew is very proud of this season's squad and says he was blessed with a few surprises.

"Steve Dankert throwing the javelin so well and Luisa Tam coming on so strongly in the distance runs were both beyond expectations," Maskew said.

Maskew said a disappointment so far is the relay teams that have not progressed to the point he expected.

Maskew said three of the best performances this season, so far, have been Dankert's 171-6 javelin toss that placed him on the school's all-time top 10 list, Chantel Bowen's 5-4 leap in the high jump that tied her own school record and Ira Sago's 2:01.30 in the 800-meter dash that raised him to fifth on the all-time top 10 list of the school.

Maskew said it was difficult to assess all of the runners and field specialists relative to best performance. He said many athletes excelled.

"This young Warrior team has outstanding talent not as yet developed this season. It may take several seasons for some of the younger athletes to reach their potential. There will always be one or two hard working athletes that put it together one day and surprise us all. It happens all the time and could happen at any meet," Maskew said.

Maskew named Amy Wishard, Jennifer Parker and Nick Nanz as three athletes that have improved tremendously through the season.

Maskew is optimistic about the upcoming district meet for both the boys and girls divisions.

"We are as strong as anyone, stronger than most in the district," Maskew said. "If the boys get after it, perform their best, we'll win the district."

"Several keys to the girls' victory will be in the 300-meter hurdles and the relays. Also, there are several performances in the field events that must be elevated," he said.

The difference in altitude between Ruidoso and Las Cruces, where the district is scheduled, will have an effect on times Maskew said.

"There were good times recorded for runners, 400-meters and down in our Ruidoso meet," said Maskew. "The altitude can be a hindrance to distance people. When we go down in elevation, our distance people always do well at lower altitudes. They also have a better recovery factor and are able to compete in other events better than the

athletes trained at lower altitudes," Maskew said.

Maskew said he doesn't believe altitude effects the high school field events at all.

Maskew said one event, the javelin throw, is under consideration as a girls event for next year's New Mexico track teams.

Maskew said much of this year's

progress could be credited to the dedication of his field lieutenants.

"We were not spread thin this year and were able to devote more time to the individual athlete,"

Maskew said. "John Ussery trains the pole vaulters and has helped me a good deal at meets with the sprinters. Borde Williams has done an excellent job coaching the javelin throwers and long jumpers.

Dennis Davis has devoted many hours to the discus throwers and shot putters and Clifton Neal trains our high jumpers and hurdlers. This coordinated effort has helped both the coaches and the athletes."

Warriors run and gun into the record book

In the last two weeks 20 Warrior tracksters have entered the school's all time record books.

Dusty Beavers hit the records three times this year in the shot put, claiming positions 8, 9 and 10 on the all-time list. Lon Nunley heads the list.



El Paso horse lords it over the field Saturday at Sunland Park

Lord Rubic's rider David Lidberg waited until the last possible moment before rallying his charge and the pair just caught Black Badger at the wire to win Saturday's \$9,500 El Paso Times Handicap in dramatic fashion.

Owned and trained by Charles Allison of El Paso, Texas, Lord Rubic was far off the pace for much of the race and didn't begin his move until midway through the final turn, but, when he was asked by Lidberg, the gelding responded in the final furlong to run the mile in 1:38.3 and win by a head. A multiple stakes winner of more than \$170,000, Lord Rubic had not won in four previous tries at Sunland, but the seven-year-old proved he still had some run left even though most of the public didn't like his

chances and sent him off at better than 18 to 1 to pay \$39.00, \$12.40, and \$11.20.

For Charles Allison it was his first owner's trophy in the race, but he is no stranger to El Paso Times Handicap championships as the veteran trainer has now saddled four winners in the race's 18 year history. Coincidentally, Allison's last winner in the race was 1980's Wonder Lark—the sire of today's winner Lord Rubic. John Dixon's Black Badger was assigned high-weight of 119 pounds, led for much of the race and looked like the winner until the final jumps to pay \$3.80, \$3.00.

Willah, owned by Las Cruces resident Mike Weatherly, hung on for third to pay \$5.00 while Curribot closed for fourth position in

the nine horse field.

Also on Saturday, Quando Victory won her fourth straight race at Sunland as the mare blistered the track to run a 1:10 flat for six furlongs under Mike Clark. The timing was the fastest 3/4 mile of the current meet at Sunland.

Sunday's feature race will have afield of three-year-olds led by Just Like Lace, Fly Dragoness and Straight Reality battling for first prize in the \$36,000 Riley Allison Derby at one mile.

The simulcast feature will have Great Communicator, a winner of \$2.5 million, going against Frankly Perfect and Nasr El Arab in the San Juan Capistrano Handicap (Gr I) from Santa Anita.

Longshot Loose Lips Cash wins Riley Allison Derby

Loose Lips Cash couldn't find any racing room on the inside as the field neared the finish, so rider David Lidberg took the runner completely to the outside and the pair drove to a stunning upset victory in Sunday's \$36,568 Riley Allison Derby.

Traveling the mile at almost 35 to one odds, Loose Lips Cash won the eighth running of the event by covering the route in 1:39.1. The win was his first in eight starts as a

three-year-old and he paid back \$70.20, \$44.20, \$8.40.

Straight Reality took the lead briefly in the stretch, but the runner veered to the inside in the final sixteenth to finish second, but the stewards ruled that Straight Reality interfered with Rixdal Jr. in the stretch and he was disqualified and placed third.

Rixdal Jr. paid \$27.00, \$4.60, while Straight Reality returned \$3.60 to show. The quinela in the

race paid \$454.00 and the 3-6-10 Trifecta returned \$12,394.30 for a one dollar ticket.

Owned by Dallas McCasland of Eunice, Loose Lips Cash was trained by Cliff Lambert and for Lidberg it was his second longshot feature race winner in as many days.

Loose Lips Cash won \$18,284 for the victory which more than

doubled his previous moneyline. Joe Mann's Rixdal, Jr. led for all but the final furlong to earn \$8,045 with Straight Reality getting

\$4,388 for show.

The rest of the field finished; Just Like Lace, \$2,194; Fly Dragoness, \$1,462; Avena Dancer, \$731;

Gramma's Demand, \$731; Belle Of Blujeans, \$731; and Glowing Image. Aztec Native was scratched prior to the race.


Friday's cool for Five R.'s Koolady

Five R's Koolady emerged as the star of last Friday's Riley Allison Futurity trials as the filly overwhelmed her competition to record a seasonal fastest five furlong time of :58.1. With the three length triumph over Copper Kenny, the two-year-old is now undefeated in two trips and will go into the \$154,969 final as one of the favorites.

Owned by George Rancich of El Paso, the New Mexico-bred daughter of Irish Conn is under the guidance of trainer John Jamison and has been ridden exclusively by Duane Sterling.

The first two finishers in each of the five divisions qualified for the final, meaning that runner-up Copper Kenny has now made two futurity finals in his career having already finished fourth in a division of the Jean Lafitte Futurity at Delta Downs.

Fifty freshman competed for the 10 spots available and other trial winners included Callaway and Hitt's Catonic Choke, Kelly and Mattox's That Special Time, Caroline Dodwell's Monkeysee Monkeydo, and James Lewter's Fancy Falacy who is also undefeated after two starts. Monkeysee Monkeydo was the only trial winner to come from off the pace and by unning an impressive :58.2, the jet-black Texas-bred will have a good shot at putting a Riley Allison trophy on Dodwell's mantel for the second year in a row. Dodwell became the first woman to train a Riley winner in '88 when Stephen Head's Silent Reflex won the event.

The 26th running of the event will take place on Sunday, May 7, and the field will include: Catonic Choke, Overhead Smash, That Special Time, Joyfully Mine, Fancy Falacy, Spirit Weaver, Monkeysee Monkeydo, Armed Response, Five R's Koolady and Copper Kenny.

The third and fourth place finishers in each heat qualified for the \$10,000 consolation on May 6. Five R's Rampage, Murrderous, All Ahead Full, Moving Tiger, Aces And Faces, Sherri's Ego, North Waco, Running Warrior, African Shadow, and Acey Ambassador make up the consolation field.

Merganser, 1988 World Champion Running Quarter Horse, will return to the scene of past glories as the colt will parade at Sunland Park on Saturday, April 29.

Owned by Ronald Shalz and Jerry Wells, the runner was purchased for \$9,000 and earned over \$1.3 million last year in winning the West Texas, Sun Country, Rainbow, and All American Futurities.

Fans will be able to see the World's Champ between races along with Hall-Of-Fame trainer Jack Brooks.

Saturday's live feature races will include the \$27,604 Sun Country Futurity Consolation and the \$7,500 added Santa Teresa Stakes.

The 350 yard Sun Country Consolation will have Shirleys Stardust, The Hooking Bull, Masters Lady Jet, Ina Real Pie, Le Tusk, Bonito Chickie, Satins Easy Jet, Race Car Red, Rate Me, and Contessa Cash.

The Santa Teresa Stakes are conditioned for three-year-olds going five and one half furlongs. At the close of nominations last Sunday, 12 head had indicated a willingness to race including: Clayton's Clue,

Everyoneknowsmyname, Northern Hawaii, The Fiery Fireman, Aztec Native, Watch My Hat, Try To Beat Me, Paso Popeye, Nu South, Stewing Sid, Trupass, and Reckless Winds.

The way has been cleared for New Mexico intertrack wagering to begin June 17. The state Attorney General's Office has ruled that

Senate Bill 560 can take effect 90 days after the closure of the Legislature which means the first simulcast wager ever bet between two New Mexico tracks will be placed at Sunland.

Sunland Park and Ruidoso Downs have an agreement in principal that simulcast wagering will begin on that day between the two tracks.

Plans for the summer session at Sunland include the simulcasting of the entire race card from Ruidoso, including their imported races, and the addition of air-conditioning and giant screen TVs for greater fan comfort in the Sunland grandstand.

Special Project set the fastest qualifying time and looms the favorite for this Sunday's \$191,480 Sun Country Futurity.

The two-year-old looked magnificent in his trial heat, winning by over three lengths and clocking a :17.545 at the 350 yards.

The son of Special Effort was making his first start ever and the colt took center stage for owners Burbank/Douglas.

Trainer Iris Buchanan and rider Gary Sumpter teamed up for both the Special Project win and another trial victory by Timely Rhythm.

Florida-based owners Shaw, Pitman and Shaw have given notice that their state is to be reckoned with in the future as a quarter horse breeding ground as they qualified Timely Rhythm and Power Train, both Florida-bred St Bar offspring, for the Grade I final.

Ten runners out of 107 trial entrants made the Grade I final with the winner in line to earn a first prize worth \$76,679.

The second fastest qualifier was the Post Oak Farms' Do No Wrong. The colt lived up to his name by running a near-flawless race to record a two length-win to put another Special Effort-sired colt into the final.

The other trial winners to make the cut were Strawberry Silk, Obelisk and Tellin Stories.

Strawberry Silk (Beduino Painted Bug) and Rockin Alens both qualified for rider Jacky Martin and trainer Jack Brooks. Owned by Jacqueline Spencer, Strawberry Silk rocketed to a two length win, her second straight.

Darla Davidson's Obelisk (Dash For Cash - Winter Dreams) will also carry a perfect two-for-two record into the finals.

The finalists and their qualifying times are: Special Project, :17.545; Do No Wrong, :17.65; Timely Rhythm, :17.685; Strawberry Silk, :17.705; Power Train, :17.755; Peg Ego, :17.755; Staunch Haunch, :17.755; Obelisk, :17.815; Rockin Alene, :17.83; and Tellin Stories, :17.835.

The Sun Country Futurity will take on a western flavor at the track as an outdoor barbecue, complete with country and western music, will be offered for fans.

Mickey Burleson and The Right Kind Of People will provide entertainment in the grove area to go along with a BBQ Chicken dinner that is being offered for \$5.25 and a BBQ Rib dinner for \$5.50. A combination of the two will be sold for \$6.00. All dinners will come with cole slaw and potato salad.

Rider David Lidberg lit up the toteboard this past weekend as the reinsman brought in 18 to one Lord Rubic in the \$9,500 El Paso Times Handicap on Saturday and then came back the very next day to bring in 35 to one longshot Loose Lips Cash in the \$36,568 Riley Allison Derby.

Lidberg beat brother Mike by a

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

Trustee Bill Smith said he had some points about the contract he wanted to debate. Smith said this kind of contract is a lease-purchase agreement and, according to the Municipal League, it has to be approved by the Attorney General. He then gave an estimated breakdown of the cost per year of operating the truck. Smith figured in driver salary, insurance, landfill, compactor and maintenance cost and came up with an estimated operating cost of \$27,500 a year.

"My own personal opinion is the track has been doing a fine job, but now they want to add an additional expense to the village," said Smith.

Trustee Wilma Webb asked how much the actual cost of insurance, maintenance and salary will be.

"We don't know how much it is going to cost, because it has never been done before," responded Harris.

He stressed that no money was changing hands and there would be no debt to the village on the purchase.

"I would like to help the track, but why not help the village residents," said Wright.

Rick Henson, Ruidoso Downs Racetrack manager, asked to address the board, and said the idea was formed to help the village. He said the track would be providing 120 garbage containers and an additional 20 containers which were not in the best of shape, but still usable. He said out of the 120, the racetrack would retain 20 for their use and the rest would go to the village.

"We are not here to split the trustees, we are here to help both parties," said Henson.

Smith said the contract was illegal because it first had to be ap-

proved by the Attorney General. Village attorney Richard Hawthorne said, because there was no money exchanging hands at the end of the agreement, it was not considered a lease-purchase agreement and therefore not illegal.

Several citizens at the meeting expressed their concerns about the appraised value of the truck and dumpsters and asked what would happen if the truck broke down on a holiday weekend.

Mayor Harris and Trustee Joe Smith both said they had inspected the truck, that it had a new engine in it and was in good working order. Both believe the appraisal of the truck and containers was fair.

Henson, asked how many times a week the track would need garbage pickup, said the track would like to have pickup seven days a week during racing season. He said on the weekend only the grandstand containers needed to be picked up.

Trustees Wright and Webb expressed concern about paying garbage collectors overtime to work seven days a week.

Trustee LeVerne Cole said despite these things, "this will be a step forward for the village." She again made the motion to accept the contract.

A roll call vote was taken with trustees Cole, Alice Allison, Tony Parker and Joe Smith voting for the contract and trustees Wright, Webb and Bill Smith voting against it.

After the vote, Bill Smith said he would not be part of any illegal contract and was therefore resigning as a trustee. Trustee Wright said, "I've had enough too, I think I will join you, I resign too." Both men then walked out of the meeting.

The board then voted to accept the verbal resignations in a four to

one vote with voting "no." "I've had it up to here, this is not going to put this little village \$25,000 in debt, it is more like \$100,000," said Wright outside the meeting.

Both Wright and Webb said this same contract had been voted down at the last meeting.

"No matter what we vote on he (the mayor) goes ahead and does it anyway," said Webb. She said she did not vote for the contract because she believes the village cannot afford it.

"I don't feel the village can afford the expense," said former trustee Bill Smith. "The Village will be out expenses from the word go."

Smith said there is no way the city could ask their garbage collectors to work seven days a week without paying them more or paying them overtime.

"You can't ask someone to work six or seven days a week on the same rate of pay," said Smith, who still believes the contract between the racetrack and the village is a lease purchase agreement and is illegal.

"You can look at it anyway you want, it is a lease purchase agreement," said Smith. "I feel my reasons for resigning were justified, I didn't want to be part of the contract."

"I don't think the contract is fair and I don't think the residents of Ruidoso Downs should subsidize the racetrack," said Smith.

"There are a lot of questions which should have been answered," said Ruidoso Downs resident Bob Power at the meeting. "I'm all for picking up the track's garbage, but I would like to see it a little bit more fair to the residents of Ruidoso Downs," he added.

"For five years we are going to pay expenses. I think there should

have been some money in the deal to cover expenses."

Cole said she likes the contract and believes it will be good for the village.

"I thought it was a good business deal and I still do," said Cole. "The village is growing and the Sanitation Department is in the black now. I think we could put these dumpsters out at new businesses and make some money."

Cole said this is the first time she can remember there has been a good relationship between the track and the village and she feels the village should try and keep that relationship going.

Mayor Harris said he believes the contract is good deal because there will be no money involved and no interest. He said also the village should be responsible for picking up the trash at the racetrack.

"Legally, ethically and morally the village has an obligation to pick up the trash inside the Downs," said Mayor Harris. "And for the first time we have the ability to do it."

Mayor Harris said he had no idea how much it would cost the Village down the road. "We are going to have to play this by ear and see what happens," he said.

Before the discussion on the contract with the racetrack, the Board took the following actions:

- approved all account payable
- approved the move of Ruidoso Natural Gas Co. to tract 4 in the Mountain Home subdivision. The tract is zoned commercial and the company will have a new warehouse and office space at the location

- considered committing \$15,000 in next years fiscal budget to the Water Defense Association.

Sheriff investigates shooting

The Lincoln County Sheriff's Department (LCS D) is investigating an alleged shooting reported at 12:07 a.m., Monday, April 24, said Lincoln County Sheriff James McSwane.

Tito Salcedo reported about 10 shots were fired from what he believed to be a handgun. The shots were reportedly fired from the passenger side of a pickup and directed at a vehicle driven by Jackie Mays. The Mays vehicle was heading east on U.S. Highway 70 in the Hondo area, McSwane said.

There were no injuries, nor was the Mays vehicle hit, said McSwane.

The LCS D also is conducting a routine investigation of the death of William Lockridge, of Carrizozo, said McSwane.

Lockridge, who was 65, was discovered dead in his apartment at the Midtown Apartments in Car-

rizzo by Human Services Division (HSD) worker Dawna Reyes, on Monday, April 24, McSwane said.

Reyes was making a routine check of Lockridge when she discovered the body, said McSwane.

Mayor proclaims energy week

Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr. has proclaimed this week, April 23 through April 29, Energy Appreciation Week in Ruidoso.

In his official proclamation, Davis said the energy age is upon us and the life of every United

States citizen is influenced and affected by the type of energy and its resources which will serve our needs.

"Our success, community welfare and national security is dependent upon a sound self-sustained

domestic petroleum industry, and energy is everyone's business," continues the proclamation.

Davis urges all citizens to recognize the importance that energy plays for personal, community and national welfare.

Skeen explains grazing fees

Congressman Joe Skeen says grazing fees on government-owned land is a volatile, on-going issue in congress that divides western members from eastern members and ranchers from environmentalists.

Lincoln County ranchers are concerned.

The United States Forest Service (USFS) for Lincoln County has 121 permittees and 731,878 suitable grazing acres. The Bureau of Land Management (BLM) lists another 130 permittees for Lincoln County and an additional 518,924 suitable acres for grazing.

Members of congress from eastern states say current grazing fees amount to a multi-million dollar subsidy to ranchers and that fees must be raised to compete with fees charged on the open market.

Congressman Skeen disagrees and concludes that eastern mentality is uninformed.

Skeen was an original co-sponsor of legislation that would make permanent the current grazing fee formula. The fee formula is based on the "ability to pay" concept. When beef prices are low and production costs are high, the fee adjusts downward. When beef prices are high and the cost of production remains stable, the fee goes up.

Skeen believes the formula is a proven winner. Livestock markets have improved considerably in the past few years and an increase has been warranted.

Last month, grazing fees were raised by 20 percent to \$1.86 per head month. Last year, grazing fees also increased signaling a stronger ranching industry. Skeen said New Mexico ranchers and cattlemen did not complain about the increase because it is fair and based on the formula their industry endorsed.

An alternative bill has been introduced in congress that would make private lease rates one of the key components used in establishing federal grazing fees. Skeen called the idea "ludicrous" noting federal grazing fees and private lease rates have nothing in common.

"More than one-third of New Mexico is owned by the federal government," Skeen said. "These ranchers depend on federal leases to provide a viable base for their livestock operations. A dramatic or unfair increase in federal grazing fees would be disastrous for the ranchers, for the New Mexico economy and for our public lands."

"The fight is not for lower grazing fees," Skeen said. "The fight is for a formula that offers ranchers fair and stable fees. The best way to accomplish this is to retain the current grazing fee formula," he said.






Elderhostelers visit the area for "learning vacation" at La Junta

Local talent combined with scenic beauty to give visiting elderhostelers a lasting memory of their week in Lincoln County.

Walter Rawley and Katherine Finley presented two major topics studied this week by elderhostelers, who are persons aged 60 and older on a "learning vacation."

Elderhostel is a non-profit educational program that began in 1975. More than 1,700 elderhostel programs are now offered worldwide, and last week La Junta Guest Ranch in Alto was the site of a New Mexico Elderhostel program.

Rawley, at his Crucis Art Bronze Foundry, gave a workshop explaining the lost wax process of bronze casting.

"This is hard work," said Rawley, explaining the many steps to the finished work of art. Members of the group expressed surprise that the process was so intricate.

"It gives a new appreciation for the complexity and work involved," remarked elderhosteler Irv Kaplan

as he snapped photos of the artist at work.

T.S. Eliot and Robert Frost were the focus of Finley's presentation on twentieth century poetry.

"After studying major works, students will write their own poetry. On Thursday night, we'll share our poems as well as the art work they created in their watercolor workshop earlier in the week," said Finley.

In addition, local emergency service personnel offered suggestions to those unused to the altitude. Lincoln County Emergency Medical Technicians (EMTs) Lester Lanelli, Sally Meador, Dave Saum and Ray Vowell touched on ultra-violet protection, altitude sickness and hypothermia prevention.

"We want you to enjoy your stay in the mountains," they said during their first night's lecture.

This group of 40 is only the second elderhostel group to visit the area. They came from several states and Germany. Although one couple had driven through the area before, none had ever stayed.

"We love it here," was their uni-

versal comment.

Elderhostelers commented on the clear air, woods, preservation of Indian culture and the wildlife in the area.

"I spotted a golden eagle," said one member of the group, gesturing with his binoculars toward Sierra Blanca.

Elderhostel offers week-long "learning vacations" to those aged 60 and older under the auspices of colleges and universities around the world. Topics vary, and students earn no credit, but merely enhance their knowledge and appreciation of diverse subjects.

Retinitis pigmentosa is an inherited disease which affects receptors in the retina. Its first symptom, night blindness, usually occurs in early youth and adolescence. After that, vision loss spreads to peripheral vision. Soon, the visual field constricts until only gun-barrel vision is possible. In time, that may also disappear, but not necessarily. Although retinitis pigmentosa is not curable, hope persists in the fact that it is an inherited disease. One person in fifty carries the defective gene that spreads the disease. Males, by virtue of the fact that they have only one X chromosome, are much more likely to suffer severe retinal damage than females. However, it is possible for women to test for the gene responsible for this sex-linked disorder. Therein lies the hope of preventing it.
