Landfill to shut down May 14,

The landfill on Fort Stanton Road, which is operated by the Village of Ruidoso, will be closed by the village and the county in order to be in compliance with new state regulations which go into effect May 14.

According to Becky Bell-Durham, infrastructure division director for the Village of Ruidoso, workers from the village's street and sanitation departments are being joined by workers from the county in closing the entire landfill site.

The closing of the landfill site was brought about by new regulations from the State of New Mexico Environmental Improvement Division governing solid waste manage-

ment. The new regulations state any landfill which is certified closed by EID officials before May 14, falls under the old regulations and is not subject to inspection or post closure care requirements.

Any landfill which is open after May 14 is subject to the new regulations. If a landfill is open under the new regulations, it is subject to inspection by EID officials and a written operating record must be kept of the quantity of waste received and the method and date of its disposal at the facility.

In addition, the location, depth and quantity of waste within the facility must be recorded on a map or diagram. Records of waste analyses, inspections, monitoring, testing and analytical data must be

kept. All closure cost estimate and post-closure cost estimates must be recorded. Any facility which does not comply with these requirements is subject to enforcement action by the EID.

According to Ray Cisneros, program manager in charge of solid waste with the EID, the process of drafting these regulations began about two years ago. He said the first draft of the proposed regulations was sent out to the counties and municipalities for their comments in May 1988. This was followed by four more major drafts which were sent out for comments. A public hearing was held on the proposed regulations in November 1988. The Environmental Improvement Board then took up discussion of the regulations and produced a

final draft during their March meeting. The regulations were then filed with the local EID offices on April 14. The regulations would then go into effect 30 days from the notification, or May 14.

"The problem they (landfill operators) are having is on May 14 they must have a closed site in order not to have the new regulations apply," said Cisneros. He said EID officials would work with those landfill operators who were in the process of closing a landfill on May 14 to certify them closed under the old regulations. In order for a landfill to be considered closed, the operator must be in the process of final covering, grating and contouring of the site.

Restrictions imposed

Fire and smoking restrictions for campers, hunters and other users of federal and state lands in southern New Mexico were in effect as of Friday, May 5, according to John Burton of the fire coordination center in Albuquerque.

Burton said the restrictions, imposed by six federal and state agencies that compose the Interagency Fire Management group, are in effect to protect forests and grasslands, as well as adjacent private property.

"Unseasonably warm temperatures, lack of moisture and windy conditions have made it necessary to impose these restrictions," Burton said.

All open fires are restricted. This includes campfires, charcoal broilers and coal or wood stoves.

Open fires are not allowed without a permit unless in developed campgrounds and picnic areas.

Smoking will be prohibited except in an enclosed vehicle or building, within a developed campground or picnic site, or while in an area around the smoker which is at least three feet in diameter and has been cleared of all flammable material.

Visitors to lands managed by the six agencies (Forest Service, Bureau of Land Management, State of New Mexico, US Fish and Wildlife Service, National Park Service, Bureau of Indian Affairs) are asked to stop by the area offices of these agencies for information or to secure permits before setting up camps.

'Cheater' Bella seeks Dudley reward

A man credited with finding the body of Tony Dudley last December claims he hasn't been given the \$20,000 reward posted by the dead man's family.

Charles "Cheater" Bella, of El Paso, Texas, believes he should have received \$20,000 from Don Dudley for finding the body of his

brother, Tony Dudley, last December along a remote ranch road north of the Capitan Mountains.

In a telephone interview last week, Bella said he hasn't received a penny so far, and as far as he can tell, Dudley doesn't think he owes him anything.

Dudley couldn't be reached for comment, but a message has been left with the private investigator

who is investigating Tony Dudley's death and disappearance for the Dudley family.

Bella said (Don) Dudley hired him to look for his missing brother. According to Bella, Dudley didn't expect to find the body because, at that time, he thought his brother had been kidnapped and was held hostage by government agents. Dudley never mentioned the

reward to him, said the helicopter pilot. It was quite by accident that Bella saw, before he found the body, a copy of *The Ruidoso News* with the reward advertised in its pages.

Expecting Dudley to say something about the \$20,000, Bella waited over a month before finally

Horse trails are dedicated

The National Center for the Western Horse was dedicated Friday at the Fort Stanton reservation.

Robert O. Anderson, of the Lincoln County Heritage Trust and Malcolm Schnichter, of the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) cut the ribbon for the new center that includes a nine-mile series of horse trails throughout the reservation.

The area is a natural for horse riding trails, said BLM district manager Fran Cherry.

Anderson described the rolling countryside as "one of the best preserved grasslands in the west," saying Fort Stanton is probably "second to none" in its known history and its state of preservation.

Lights are turned on at regional airfield

Nighttime operations at the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport will be improved thanks to the installation Friday of ramp lighting.

The new ramp lighting comes from seven, 60-foot poles with high pressure sodium lights. The poles are spread over the airport, from the control tower area to the hangar area. The number of lights on each pole varies and depends on the amount of area it lights.

Tim Morris, airport manager, said the new lighting will be controlled by a computer.

"We'll have a computer they will work on which turns them on and off or they can be operated manually," he said.

Morris said the lights are set up so airport personnel can turn on all of the light or only those needed. Morris estimates the total area of

the ramp covered by the new lighting system at around 40,000 square feet.

"I'm anxious to see what it looks like at night," said Morris.

The lighting was installed by Boone Electric of Albuquerque. According to Joe Boone, a computer and a simple plastic pipe tell the workers where to aim the lights.

"We use a computer to give us an aiming point for the lights, and mark the point on the tarmac," said Boone. "There is a plastic pipe the worker places on the light and when he sees the spot on the tarmac in the pipe, the light is aimed correctly."

The workers erecting the poles started work around 10:30 a.m. and were finished by 2 p.m. Friday. According to Boone, the lights should be aimed, tested and ready on Saturday.

During a meeting between county and municipal leaders and EID officials on April 26, village and county leaders decided to close the existing trash pit at the landfill and move to another location on the site and start a new pit, which would comply with the new regulations. However, because of the cost of records keeping, monitoring, testing, inspection, closure and post-closure cost estimates, village and county officials later felt it would be cheaper to close the entire landfill site before the new regulations went into effect.

At the April 26 meeting, Bell-Durham had estimated the landfill had a maximum of two years of use left. After reviewing the available land at the landfill site with EID officials, Bell-Durham said the vil-

lage would not be able to use the bottom area because of drainage problems.

"Even though there is land available at the landfill, it is not adequate," said Bell-Durham. "As operators of the landfill, we are not going to use it because of problems with water drainage." She said as of May 14, the landfill will be closed and the village will be making temporary arrangement to transport its trash to other sites.

"As of May 14, the Village of Ruidoso will be looking into what to do on a temporary basis with our trash," said Bell-Durham.

She said the village is in better shape to transport its trash than other municipalities because of the village's trash compactor. She said this will allow the village to make only one trip out of town a day to transport trash, instead of a trip

every time a garbage truck is full. Bell-Durham said the village is looking into the possibility of transporting its trash to sites in Roswell or Alamogordo.

However, according to Robert Beauvais, county attorney, Alamogordo and Otero County are in the process of closing many of their landfills. Beauvais, who works with Otero County on the landfill situation, said Otero County has closed four out of its five landfill sites. He also said Alamogordo might close its landfill and use the remaining landfill site in Otero County for its trash.

"The whole thing is up in the air right now," said Beauvais.

He said Lincoln County commissioners have decided to wait until the next regular meeting on May 8 to decide whether the county will join an Association of Counties law-

suit against EID. Beauvais said attorneys for the governor, Association of Counties, the Municipal League and EID are meeting to work out an agreement short of a lawsuit.

The Association of Counties and the Municipal League lawsuit would delay the implementation of the EID regulations on May 14 and have the state provide funding to help operators come into compliance with the new regulations.

According to Frank Potter, Ruidoso village manager, the village will join the Municipal League part of the lawsuit. He said a resolution will be presented to the Village Council on Tuesday night. But, Potter said the village will continue with the closing of the landfill.

broaching the subject. When Bella asked, Dudley said he would pay the pilot \$2,000, but not the reward because he was hired under a special arrangement.

Bella said he turned down the \$2,000, because he believes he earned the full \$20,000.

Bella said he has known Dudley for about ten years, and has flown members of the family for hunting trips and other excursions in the past. He said he was very surprised when Dudley refused him the reward.

Sheriff James McSwane said the Tony Dudley case is closed, since the coroner ruled the young man died of exposure. But officers are still investigating why Dudley's body was in the location where it was found.

Crews searched the area on foot and from the air before the body was spotted from Bella's helicopter.

Bella thought it was very unusual the body was so close to the truck and wasn't found earlier. A healthy man on foot could have found the body, said Bella.

Of primary concern for Bella now are the legal bills that are running up and running him out of business. Bella's wife said her husband could really use the reward money, because of his legal problems.

Bella is accused of flying his helicopter into the recreation yard at state prison in Santa Fe to help three inmates to escape.

He's also in trouble with the Texas Parks and Wildlife for allegedly transporting antelope across state lines.

"I myself didn't know we had crossed a state line," said Bella of the Texas incident. He said two Parks and Wildlife officers were in his copter giving him directions on that flight.

According to a copyrighted story in Sunday's Albuquerque Journal, Bella has signed the title to his helicopter over to noted attorney F. Lee Bailey, who has agreed to defend Bella in the Santa Fe case.

Bailey is famous for defending Dr. Sam Sheppard in his appeal for the alleged beating death of his wife. The trial served as a model for the hit television series "The Fugitive."

Bailey also defended Albert DeSalvo, more commonly known as the Boston Strangler.

In another phone conversation on Sunday, Bella said he owns two

helicopters, one of which had been confiscated after his alleged prison break. This helicopter has since been returned.

Bella used his own helicopter in searching for the body of Tony Dudley.

He described the value of his two helicopters at about \$180,000 for the smaller one, and \$220,000 to \$250,000 for his larger aircraft.

A Vietnam veteran, Bella said, because of his legal expenses, he may have to give up many of his philanthropic activities, including a rehabilitation center he operates for endangered species.

Don Dudley is presently offering a \$50,000 reward for any information regarding his brother's disappearance.

The executive miniature golf course will be quite a challenge with its water hazards and sand traps posing problems for the recreational putter.


The bumper boats, too, will be great fun, with their two horse power motors humming gaily during the warm summer nights ahead.

The New Mexico State Highway Department has won approval for the Devil's Canyon gravel pit to be used for the Fort Stanton project, 3.2 miles of road.

The United States Forest Service (USFS) asked for public opinion in the use of the gravel pit. A meeting on Wednesday, April 19, was a forum for discussions on the highway department's future use of the pit.

Attending that meeting were: Robert Beavers, Beaver's Sand and Gravel; Sam Tobias, USFS; Ben Hall, New Mexico State Representative, District 56; Peg Crim,

USFS; G.B. "Red" Hancock, Valley Transit Mix; Jerry Hawkes, USFS district ranger; Richard Nye, New Mexico State Highway Department; Jim Yarbrough, New Mexico State Highway Department.

Yarbrough expressed the need for gravel and its quality and quantity.

Beavers said he believed that an adequate quality and quantity was available from private sources.

In discussing cost savings and economics, Hall stated that he felt the potential savings needed to be weighed against the advantage of the money being turned over as

much as seven times in the local area when paid to local businesses and local employees.

After a lengthy discussion, the decision was reached to use the Devil's Canyon pit for the Fort Stanton project, 3.2 miles in length, because of its close proximity to the pit.

One other project, Angus Hill, 4.0 miles in length, will be given added consideration in the future. If agreed upon, at that time, the Devil's Canyon pit may be used. The project is about three years away.

The other projects will use com-

mercial pits. The main reasons for the decision were haul distances (cost savings to the state), utilizations of private enterprise and local economics. All parties agreed to the decision.

Hawkes said the success of the meeting could lead to future meetings with public input.

"We feel the New Mexico State Highway and Transportation Department, local public and concerned businessmen showed an excellent spirit of cooperation in arriving at a compromise that will best resolve this difficult issue," Hawkes said.

Apple growers benefit from irrigation system

With the help of the Soil Conservation Service (SCS), orchard growers in San Patricio have an improved irrigation system capable of delivering 1,475 gallons of water per minute (gpm).

The project cost \$20,081, and was paid for by the SCS and with cost share funds provided by the Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation Service, said Greg Haussler, district conservationist for the Upper Hondo Soil and

Water Conservation District.

Members of the Mes Community Ditch realized their old system did not meet their irrigation needs.

Between 75 and 80 percent of the water was lost through leaks in the system along the way, and sometimes came out of the pipe in just a trickle, said Louis Kincaid, one of the community members.

At its best, the old system delivered between 100 and 150 gpm, said Haussler.

The group, which includes Kincaid, Michael Hurd, Olivia Sedillo,

Sixto Sedillo, Raymond Sedillo and Estrella Sanchez, contacted the SCS for help.

Tags-Richards, of Ruidoso, was the contractor in the project, which took about one month to complete, said Haussler.

The system collects water from the Mes spring as well as from the Rio Ruidoso, then feeds the water through a pipe and into an open ditch further downstream to irrigate about 36 acres. The entire system is approximately 4,500 feet in length.

Under the shade of box elders, elms, and even an old black walnut, the system delivers the water to mostly apple orchards in the San Patricio area.

Presently, SCS officials estimated the volume at 400 gpm, still a great improvement over the old system.

All that is needed now is some rain to raise the Rio Ruidoso's level and the full capacity of the system can be realized.

Today is state Cooperative Extension Day

Today, May 8, has been declared Cooperative Extension Day by Governor Garrey Carruthers in celebration of the 75th anniversary of New Mexico's Cooperative Extension Service (CES), said a news release.

The enactment of the Smith-Lever Act in 1914 created the CES, which then created "bonds with land grant universities, and county, state and federal governments," said the release.

Land grant universities were created with federal support to educate "mainstream Americans."

New Mexico State University in Las Cruces, is New Mexico's land grant university, out of which the Lincoln County CES operates.

The CES has "committed itself to preserving environmental quality, community development, volunteerism and leadership development, teaching family life skills, human nutrition and health, and financial management and consumerism."

However, all three agents at the county courthouse in Carrizozo think their skills and expertise are greatly underused.

Sid Gordon is the 4-H agent and has discovered the Ruidoso area to be a challenge because of the

transient nature of its population.

Although 4-H is still involved in many of the core agricultural activities that many of us identify the organization with, Gordon explained 4-H is responding to the needs of the increasing population of urban youth.

4-H has diversified itself to include projects for youth in computers and leadership skills, as well as guidance in many life-time leisure activities.

Betty McCreight is the extension home economist, and this area, too, has expanded beyond what many would consider its traditional boundaries.

Besides cooking, sewing, and other activities, this department has a wealth of information on subjects such as marketing crafts, family budgeting, and home nursing care.

And if the information isn't on hand, "we know who to ask," said McCreight.

Barry Herd, the head county agent, is well known by area ranchers and orchard growers, because he is the one people go to with questions about insect problems, plant diseases and other agricultural issues.

But urban homeowners can also

benefit from the knowledge he possesses on everything from evergreens in the yard to growing cash crops that may do well in this area.

Periodic workshops offered by the CES are designed to benefit all residents of Lincoln County.

County planners stand firm on subdivision regs

The Lincoln County Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) is standing firm on subdivision requirements.

P&Z, in a special hearing Thursday, denied Empire Holding Company's request for a variance on road construction regulations in the proposed McKnight Subdivision.

Charles Hawthorne, attorney for Empire, said those regulations prohibit successful development in Lincoln County.

If approved, the variance would have paved the way for Empire to construct roads 30 to 40 percent narrower than required by county regulations.

These regulations require a subdivider to build roads 28 feet in total width, driving surface and sloping shoulders included.

Subdividers cannot afford to build such roads, which is why

there are 14 incomplete subdivisions in Lincoln County at this time, said Hawthorne. The cost is so prohibitive that it interferes with a developer's constitutional right to develop his land the way he sees fit, said Hawthorne.

The variance requested by Hawthorne would allow roads with 18 feet of total driving surface.

"You don't get my vote if you want 18 feet of driving surface and no shoulder," said State Representative Ben Hall.

County attorney J. Robert Beauvais recommended P&Z proceed with caution and wait until more information is available, as he has some very strong concerns. One of those concerns is solid waste disposal, especially in light of the new Environmental Improvement Division (EID) regulations, said Beauvais.

He alleged that Hawthorne had misrepresented information that

indicated the county regulations encouraged people to adopt practices to avoid compliance.

Hawthorne countered that he did not misrepresent any facts, that he had no intention of doing so, and he greatly resented Beauvais' comment.

Hawthorne said the strict regulations governing roads in subdivisions encourage people to sell parcels up to the legal limit without subdividing. These parcels will in turn be sold off in four or five more smaller parcels, on down the line, said Hawthorne.

Beauvais said this practice was illegal, that parcels could not be further divided until a minimum of three years had passed.

He continued to say there are too many issues for P&Z to consider, that to recommend a variance at that time would be premature until the county engineer could make a report.

Hawthorne claimed that the economic situation in Lincoln County demanded that action be taken.

Last year the McKnights paid only \$278 in taxes on the ranch, said Hawthorne. In the first phase of the subdivision, property taxes collected will bring in \$1,600, thus enhancing the tax base for the county, said Hawthorne.

The subdivision would create needed jobs, bring in dollars from outside the county, and could play a part in the economic revival of the county, said Hawthorne.

Agriculture does not have a future in Lincoln County, but land will remain unused if the developer is expected to carry the burden of building roads to county specifications, said Hawthorne.

"He can't afford to subdivide and put in 28 foot roads," said Haw-

thorne. Hawthorne said in Otero County, the regulation requires roads of 20 feet, and there are 24 subdivisions all being completed.

"I don't care what Otero County allows," said Hall, emphasizing the concern of the commission is what is best for Lincoln County.

Hawthorne maintained that he was only asking for a reduction in the width of the roads, not in the quality of the roads. The roads would still be plenty wide enough for emergency vehicles, and traffic flow would be minimal because the majority of people buying property there would be weekenders.

Beauvais called the idea that buyers would be predominantly weekenders "preposterous."

Chairperson Patsy Sanchez questioned Hawthorne about Philip Kaplan's association with the Vera Cruz Ranch subdivision.

Both Hawthorne and Kaplan explained that Kaplan was a salesman in the project, but was not a shareholder in Vera Cruz Ranches. Kaplan was an officer, but the title did not reflect any specific responsibilities.

Toward the end of the meeting a compromise seemed to be reached in which Hawthorne said a variance allowing 20-foot roads would be acceptable.

However, Commissioner James Sanchez moved for a vote to deny the request for the variance, and it passed in a unanimous vote.

Superfund site is subject of Carrizozo open house

An Open House conducted by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) is scheduled for 5 p.m., Tuesday, May 9, at the United New Mexico Bank board room in Carrizozo, to discuss the impending Remedial Investigation (RI) at the Cimarron Mining and Milling Corporation (CMMC) site in Carrizozo.

The CMMC site qualified for addition to the EPA's Superfund National Priorities List (NPL) because of cyanide contamination in the site's groundwater and tailings piles as well as the presence of other toxic heavy metals.

"The Superfund program provides funds to take action at the nation's most serious hazardous waste sites," said an EPA Superfund fact sheet.

There are ten Superfund sites in New Mexico.

The EPA said CMMC, also known as Southwest Minerals Corporation, operated a mill at the Carrizozo location which recovered metal from ore using a process of cyanide salt solution and metal stripper.

Before that, Sierra Blanca Mining and Milling operated at the site extracting gold with cyanide solution.

The state Superfund section of the Hazardous Waste Bureau (HWB) of the Environmental Improvement Division (EID) conducted an on-site inspection in 1984 which discovered two cyanide solution tanks, a discharge pit, a tailings impoundment, an uncovered tailings pile, and a drum storage area.

The EPA said the solution tanks are concrete lined, but the other facilities are not and lack leachate or seepage collection systems.

Analysis conducted by HWB revealed cyanide and heavy metals in the groundwater, soil, sediment, and tailings at the site.

Ron Conrad of the HWB in Santa Fe said two wells tested in the fall of 1987 revealed total concentrations of cyanide in the well water at levels of 0.35 mg/liter at one well and 0.38 mg/liter at the other.

The state standard for total cyanide in ground water is 0.20 mg/liter, said Conrad.

Conrad said these statistics can be misleading because total cyanide readings indicate the sum of free cyanide, which is toxic, and cyanide attached to metal ions.

In most cases, said Conrad, the bulk of cyanide in a sample is represented by cyanide attached to heavy metals, such as iron.

Conrad said the state recommended to EPA that further monitoring of the groundwater is necessary to ascertain if the cyanide contamination has moved off site.

Groundwater moves, said Conrad, and there have been no further tests conducted since the state's in 1987.

New wells should be drilled to discover the direction and extent of the cyanide's movement through the groundwater system, said Conrad.

At this time there is no threat to community water supplies, said Conrad.

It is the standard procedure for the EPA to identify a Potentially Responsible Party (PRP), usually the owner of the site, who is then required to carry out and pay for the clean-up of the site.

However, CMMC filed for Chapter 11 Bankruptcy on January 23, 1981, and in 1984 filed Chapter 7 for complete liquidation.

The site is now overseen by court-appointed trustee Nathan Mann of Albuquerque.

This means the EPA must use monies from the Superfund to pay for the clean-up of the site, unless someone buys the site and agrees to pay for the clean-up themselves.

This is unlikely because of the

cost EPA says is required to clean the site appropriately, said Mann.

Mann said he had one prospective buyer who had made an offer to clean up the site, but the EPA did not accept the offer.

"They have in mind a much more extensive cleaning operation," said Mann.

"I don't know for a fact that there is any great cyanide contamination," said Mann.

According to information obtained by Mann from an independent adviser, the site could be cleaned for a few hundred dollars.

Sandy Sevier, media spokesperson for the EPA said the agency hasn't been in any position to determine the cost of the clean-up.

This determination would not be made until after the remedial investigation, said Sevier.

Information that is available states that "groundwater contamination in the first water bearing zone appears fairly widespread in relation to the site," said an EPA document.

The contaminants in the uncovered tailings piles do have the potential to become airborne, said the document, but air sampling has not been conducted.


The site itself is rather inconspicuous looking. In fact, there is a highway rest area and historical marker near the site's front gate.

At the west side of the site are about four dozen drums within arms reach of the chain-link fence. Several of these drums show signs of leaking; corroded holes in the sides and some lids not secure. The fence itself has fallen partly over, making access to the site very easy.


Weather-worn signs adorn the fence at various locations, some disclaiming responsibility by different corporations, others making bold warnings, such as "Absolutely No Animals Allowed." Around the corner from this sign is the body of a dead cat.

The open house scheduled for Tuesday is to inform the public of the remedial investigation to be conducted. Results from this are not expected until September.

The EPA encourages public participation in the site's clean-up and will provide more information at the open house.

The Lullaby of the Leaves

Years ago there was a popular song called "Lullaby of the Leaves." And today, May four, just before high noon, you can hear the gentle warm breezes singing with many soft melodious voices among the many different kinds of leaves, now out in glorious shades of new green, bright and shimmering under a golden sun shining from a sky of pure springtime blue.

The new leaves, growing rapidly in the warm air, bring a lift to your spirits that grows more joyful day by day. The cattle and the creatures of the wild rest at midday in the deep and grateful shade under the singing leaves; and the breeze brings the coolness of the shady places across the dry and sunny fields, carrying many a leafy incense through the vale blending with the honey fragrance of the Golden Algeira bloom.

Ruidoso Downs Race Season opens in the new and improved facilities on May 13. Track operators promise the 1989 season will be the biggest and best ever.

Famous forensic scientist Clyde Snow, Los Alamos National Laboratory researcher Thomas Kyle and representatives from the Lincoln County Heritage Trust met last Wednesday in White Rock (near Los Alamos) to take the next step of a project which might offer some possible answers. The project will involve examination and comparison of vintage photos alleged to be of Billy the Kid by utilizing computer photo enhancement capabilities. And as Kyle showed those gathered in White Rock, the computer will be a valuable tool in the determination process.

All the photos, including two most recently obtained by the Trust, will be compared to the enhanced copy of the Kid authenticated by the Trust's photo. It shows the Kid leaning on his rifle with the drunken smile, taken in Fort Sumner in 1879.

According to Trust historian Bob Hart, the photos are a part of the Billy the Kid legend, independent of the true historical character.

"We have latched onto Billy as an antiestablishment person, good gone wrong-to-homicidal individual, but essentially on the side of good," Hart said.

As the experiment progresses, Hart said results will shed light on controversial claims that Pat Garrett did not kill Billy the Kid in Fort Sumner and he survived to die of old age.

The final product of the project—a Billy the Kid exhibit—is expected to take two to three years to complete.



EDITORIAL

And then it was learned that the landfill was used to capacity, with the last pit officials thought was available located in a drainage basin and unsuitable for disposing of garbage. We don't have the luxury of months or years to identify a new site and open a new landfill. The Village of Ruidoso learned this week that the present landfill must close this month. And then what?

Village and county staffmembers are working on that question-seeking out a suitable location for a new landfill.

Meanwhile, we should all take this opportunity to begin what many of us already knew we should be doing-cutting back on the amounts of garbage that are consuming more and more open spaces in this nation. Each one of us can do something right now, today, to make a major impact on the garbage problem.

If even half the families in this community began recycling aluminum, glass, paper and the like, just imagine the decrease in volume we would have to go to the landfill? When shopping, look for the recycling label on cartons and containers; and when purchasing anything that will be used for a short time, think of the ultimate disposal of that product or its packaging.

Yes, we have a crisis. Let's do our part to see that this world never becomes buried in trash.—fj


