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Man dies in shooting

A 26-year-old man is dead and a 34-year-old woman remains in a Roswell hospital following an early morning shooting today in Ruidoso Downs.


Debra Garth remains in critical/serious condition in Roswell, but police are withholding the name of the dead man pending notification of next of kin.

Police responded at 1:39 a.m. to a reported domestic dispute at the corner of Downs Drive and Turkey in Ruidoso Downs in which victims were each shot in the head, said Ruidoso Downs Police Chief G.L. "Skip" Hazel.

The two were taken by Ruidoso Emergency Medical Services to Lincoln County Medical Center, and were then transferred to Roswell, where the male died at about 4:30 a.m.

Hazel said it is believed only the two victims were involved in the shooting, but police do not know which of the victims did the shooting.

Ruidoso Downs Police are investigating the incident as a homicide/suicide.

\$99 million railway could link area attractions

A proposed Ruidoso/Sierra Blanca Mountain Railway Project was described Thursday at Village Hall.

Ronald Sheck of the Transportation Programs Division of the State Highway and Transportation Department described a system that could link Ruidoso with the airport, race track and ski area, with stops in between.

Sheck said the study goes back a

number of years to 1984. He said the initial study was not adequate, but the present study will give everyone some idea of what might be done in the future.

The proposed railroad would use electrified cog railroad technology to link Sierra Blanca Regional Airport (SBRA), Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs and the Ski Apache Resort. The basic core trunk line would go from the airport to Alto, down Gavilan Canyon Road and then to Midtown Ruidoso. The track would

then go east to Ruidoso Downs. According to Sheck, SBRA will be the starting point for the line. "Ruidoso and Ski Apache is the only resort in New Mexico near a major airport," he said.

Sheck said there are three possible alternates off the core trunk line to get to Ski Apache Ski area.

Alternate A would have an access line to Ski Apache from Alto by way of Villa Madonna. Alternate B Please see \$99 million, page 10A

Group calls on Chino to resign

A group of Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe members are calling on President Wendell Chino to resign.

The group, Tribal Concerns, said past projects such as the development of Ski Apache and Inn of the Mountain Gods have been approved after general meetings of the entire tribe.

In an Associated Press report released Saturday, Tribal Concerns spokesperson said tribal members were not kept informed of a 10-year agreement that would allow Molycorp Inc. to mine yttrium and zirconium on reservation land, "This was done behind closed

doors, and they didn't want us to find out," Juanita Makil was quoted as saying. "It could be good, or it could be bad, but we all could have talked about it as tribal members."

"My concern on this issue is I feel this should have been brought before the whole tribe and the whole tribe should have voted on it," Francine Magoosh, director of Tribal Concerns said in the report. "I don't like the profit split either. I believe we could have gotten more than a 60-40 split."

Yttrium and zirconium are rare elements used in computers and communications technology. No

supplies are currently being mined in the continental United States.

The mine will be located northeast of the village of Mescalero in rugged terrain normally reserved for cattle grazing, the report said.

Amos Gaines, a former council member, said he doesn't believe the tribal government is operating properly. The report said he is also concerned about the resolution passed last year that forbids any council member from requesting or examining financial records of any tribal businesses.

County officials plan for regional landfill; form Trash Committee

Area officials are planning for a permanent landfill site, and agree it's in the county's best interests to operate the facility as a special assessment district.

Representatives of Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs, Capitan, Carrizozo and Lincoln County agreed during a meeting Thursday to nominate representatives to a Lincoln County Landfill Committee, scheduled to have its first meeting at 10 a.m. Wednesday, June 14, at the Lincoln County Sub-office in Ruidoso. A representative of Corona is expected to participate also.

The government or private industry will operate the facility.

Ruidoso Downs Mayor Jake Harris said it is too expensive for local government to operate the heavy equipment at a landfill site, and recommended a private contractor other than Waste Management of Alamogordo be sought.

Ken Nosker told officials his Hondo Valley land is suitable as a landfill site, and offered to lease it to the county on the condition he be designated as operator. The cost of the lease, he said, will be \$395 per acre per year.

"If I were the owner, I would want to be the operator," said Ruidoso village infrastructure director Becky Bell-Durham.

Capitan Mayor Ben Coker said although Capitan's landfill has an

estimated lifetime of eight to 16 years, Capitan would like to be involved in a county joint venture to help defer liability costs.

The actual location of a site will be a minor issue compared to the costs to operate a county regional landfill, said County Commission Chairman Robert E. Hemphill.

"The days of cheap garbage are over," said Ruidoso village attorney John Underwood.

Hemphill and Ruidoso village manager both said costs will have to be covered through property taxes and gate fees.

Hemphill also said whatever site is selected, it needs to have a lifetime of 50 years to justify the costs. Complying with EID regula-

tions just to obtain a permit will be costly, said county manager Nick Pappas.

Presently, there are few private companies qualified to do the necessary site evaluations for a site to gain a landfill permit, but this may soon change.

"Some big bucks are going to be made by firms as they become experts," said Pappas.

The county manager said no rate scale has been established in the sanitation industry in New Mexico, and it would be easy for private contractors to set arbitrarily high rates.

Some cost information is available, said Potter. For example, he cited the published cost of a trans-

fer site at about \$500,000. He also said there are many hydrologists available, and a five- to six-inch pilot hole for an exploratory well costs about \$10 per foot.

"We can use our own expertise to save costs," said Potter.

County Commissioner Karon Z. Petty suggested it would be in everyone's best interest to use the federal landfill standards as their guidelines with a new landfill.

The landfill committee's purpose will be to locate a potential site, while at the same time submit for request for proposals (RFPs) to help gauge the actual costs.

Nosker said that many contractors cannot afford the potential \$10,000 cost to have their land

evaluated in order to submit an RFP if there is no guarantee they will receive the bid.

Underwood then suggested the RFPs be written in general terms, allowing a contractor to inform officials of a potential site.

There was no official consensus that a private operator was under consideration.

In any event, everyone agreed to the urgency of the situation, given the re-opened site at Ft. Stanton Road is scheduled to last only three months, and the agreement Ruidoso has with Roswell to last only five.

"Three months in this situation is just like tomorrow. We need an option now," said Harris.

Proposed government change is analyzed

With the scheduled June 20 change of government election approaching, a review of the differences between Ruidoso's present form of government and the proposed form of government is in order.

The main differences between the mayor/council with manager form of government and the com-

mission/manager form, are how the mayor is selected, his powers, the number of elected officials and the voters' ability to recall officials and propose initiatives.

According to the New Mexico Municipal League, under the mayor/council with manager form of government, the mayor is elected to a four-year term by a popular vote of the people. Under the commission/manager form, the mayor

is selected by the commissioners.

Under Ruidoso's present government, the mayor does not have the right to vote on issues before the governing body unless there is a tie vote. Also the mayor cannot propose any motions before the governing body.

Under the proposed form of government, the mayor can vote and can propose motions, because he or she is also a commissioner.

In both forms of government, the mayor cannot veto any action of the governing body.

In the mayor/council with manager form of government, the governing body consists of the mayor and not less than four, nor more than ten council members. In the commission/manager form of government, the governing body

Fires plague Lincoln Forest

Several hundred campers were evacuated from the Lincoln National Forest 15 miles southeast of Cloudcroft Sunday.

Deryl Jevons, Lincoln National Forest spokesman, said the fire started Sunday afternoon in a building at the Pine Springs church camp in Spring Canyon. The campground was destroyed.

Jevons said the fire had consumed a hundred acres Sunday.

Firefighters and volunteers from Mayhill, Weed and Sacramento had created a fire ring containing the blaze and as of Monday morning the fire had not jumped beyond that 100-acre ring. Officials were hopeful that winds would not increase before the fire could be extinguished.

No injuries have been reported and no cause for the fire at the campsite has been discovered reported fire information officer Ed Wood.

The fire is in the same area where Lincoln suffered its worst fire, the 1974 Spring Burn that destroyed 17,000 acres.

Jevons said Sunday's fire began in a valley and advanced halfway up the northern slope.

The firefighters pumped water on the fire, used shovels and a special tool called a Pulaski, a combination ax and hoe, to dig a 12 to 24-inch wide trench down to the mineral soil. A fire is then set to burn toward the existing fire.

"This mare has improved so much," said Blakeman. "She's a year older and she's physically sound. She loves Ruidoso. I mean this is her place."



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
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Doctors, hospital staff voice concerns over LCMC future

Will the Lincoln County Medical Center (LCMC) remain a full-service hospital, or will it become a referral source for other, larger facilities?

This is a question much of the medical staff at LCMC is concerned with, and one that has affected morale.

"The public may not be aware of everything going on," said Dr. Bill Harrison, medical chief of staff.

LCMC is "probably the most high powered rural hospital in the state," said Dr. Lance W. Kirkegaard, an internal medicine specialist.

Discussions at the last hospital board meeting indicated the administration was reevaluating the feasibility of the ICU. Critical care capabilities, especially the Intensive Care Unit (ICU), are topics

of concern with the hospital staff.

Kirkegaard said he cannot maintain his skills if the facilities, or personnel, are not available to care for his critical patients.

The potential closure of a unit in a hospital is an ongoing process in any hospital, said board member Dr. Roger Beechie.

However, the loss of the ICU would have a significant impact on Ruidoso, considering the village is actively seeking to attract a retirement-age population to the community, said Kirkegaard.

At present, if the ICU is sufficiently staffed, is a question on some minds.

Three nurses reported their feelings the ICU was understaffed, which required some patients to be transferred to other hospitals.

Hospital administrator Steve Keller said any transfers out of ICU were made for medical reasons, and

none were the result of staffing problems.

Kirkegaard, the lead physician in ICU, says this is "blatantly" untrue.

Harrison also said he received assurances from the administration that the ICU would not be closed.

"Morale is not good," said Harrison.

In a previous News report, Keller said there was no morale problem at LCMC.

All the nurses interviewed said they were upset when they read this report.

"I've never seen morale this low," said one.

Keller is out of town and was unavailable late last week for further comment.

The three nurses interviewed, all who have worked at LCMC a significant number of years, want to keep their jobs, but fear reprisals

from the administration if their identity is revealed.

The same feeling was expressed by technical staff.

Kirkegaard wondered if the board was informed of the morale problems with the medical staff.

"I know there is some dissatisfaction, but I don't know how serious," said board member Ruth McGuire.

Board member Bob Finley said no one has confronted him about major personnel problems.

"I'm sure there's a problem, but none of the rumors have been brought to the board," he said.

Sue Stearns, another board member, also said she was not aware of a morale problem at the hospital.

"We don't have any reports at the board level," said Beechie, of morale problems.

The Quality Assurance reports

presented to the board have all been excellent, indicating the overall quality of care provided at the hospital is good, said Beechie.

Kirkegaard said the hospital needs to keep this level of care, or "people will die."

The major morale issue with physicians is coverage in the emergency room (ER).

"It takes me a week to recover from being on call in the ER on the weekend," said Kirkegaard.

The way it works now is before a patient can be admitted into the hospital from the ER, the on-call physician must see the patient.

With this ER coverage system, Kirkegaard said he sometimes works 90 hours in a week.

His private practice is closed at this time.

During the last board meeting, an announcement was made the feasibility of an Urgent Care Unit

would be evaluated to relieve some of the pressure in the ER.

New programs are being developed at LCMC, which makes the facility unique among similar hospitals.

For example, an out patient adolescent drug program has been developed by Dr. Bob Walters, as well as a program for repeat drunk driving offenders.

"We want it to remain a full-service hospital," said McGuire.

Kirkegaard said three to four years ago, "things were really cooking," and he would like to see that atmosphere return.

The LCMC board of trustees has a meeting scheduled for 6 p.m., Thursday, June 15, in the hospital education annex.

"This is a county facility whose capability is significant here," said Harrison. "Let's do what we can do to prevent losing what we have."

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
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
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
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Carrizozo man removes cyanide from Superfund site

Acting on his own, a Carrizozo resident purchased six barrels of cyanide from the Superfund site there, and resold the poison to representatives of a Deming mining company.

"I wanted to get rid of that stuff," said Ralph Forsythe of Carrizozo.

Forsythe said he thought it was the only way to get the cyanide off the Cimarron Mining and Milling Corporation (CMMC) site on U.S. Highway 880 in Carrizozo.

The site is registered on the National Priorities List (NPL) of the Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA) Superfund section because of cyanide contamination discovered in the ground water there.

The six drums of cyanide at the site, believed to be the source of contamination, have been there for eight years, since the CMMC filed for bankruptcy in 1981.

Forsythe said the court-appointed trustee, Nathan Mann, of Albuquerque, required cash for the sale.

Forsythe used his own money to buy the cyanide at \$100 per barrel, and then turned the poison over to Kent Nichols of the Tarahumara Mining Company in Deming, he said.

William Rowe, of the Superfund's enforcement division, said the EPA does not object to equipment or supplies sold from the site, as long as proper arrangements are made.

Individuals removing equipment

or chemicals from the site must have appropriate training in the transportation of hazardous substances, he said.

Rowe also said buyers need to contact the EPA before taking anything off site.

"We hope they haven't removed the materials yet," Rowe said in a telephone interview on Thursday, May 26.

Forsythe said the cyanide was removed Wednesday, May 24, and permission from EPA had been obtained.

Sandra Sevier, EPA media spokesperson, said the transaction was handled in a manner acceptable to the EPA. She also said there was no EPA representative involved in the transaction, or present when the cyanide was removed.

The EPA hired a contractor, Camp, Dresser, and McKee, to conduct a Remedial Investigation (RI) to confirm the presence of the cyanide contamination at the site.

The last on-site inspection of well water was conducted by the state Hazardous Waste Bureau (HWB) in August 1987.

During that inspection it was determined that total cyanide levels in the groundwater exceeded state standards in two wells, said Ron Conrad of HWB.

Whether or not the site needs to be on Superfund's NPL has been contested by representatives of the Bureau of Mines and by local residents.

Critics claim that cyanide is such an unstable compound, it is possible the contamination has dis-

appeared.

"I agree that under ideal conditions there is a potential for cyanide degradation," said Paul Sieminski of the EPA.

EPA's priority in the RI is to redo previous well water tests to see if their results are valid, said Sieminski.

"To say there is nothing out there is one thing. To document there is nothing is another," he said.

The contractor prepared a workplan for approval by EPA, which is expected by the end of this week, said Sieminski.

Sevier said the work plan, when approved, will be available for public inspection in the Lincoln County Court House in Carrizozo.

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Economic development group worries about funding

Faced with a funding crisis which could put the Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County (EDCLC) out of business, board members Thursday night took a long look at the multi-faceted problem.

But first the chairman of the board and president of the EDCLC, Carroll (Buddy) Bundick, and several members of the board spent considerable time criticizing *The Ruidoso News*.

Bundick lambasted *The News* and editor Frankie Jarrell over reporting on a public hearing on a proposed golf course/hotel/civic center development on the old airport land in Ruidoso. During that hearing, after developers revealed plans to build a golf course and hotel, EDCLC executive director George Puckett rose to announce that EDCLC had received 100 inquiries from businesses wanting to use that same land. Puckett said the old airport land is the only suitable spot for the businesses who have made inquiries.

In an opinion column, Jarrell questioned why Puckett made his announcement during the public hearing over the other development plans, and reported that those inquiries had not been channeled through the airport land planning group, the group charged with overseeing development on the airport land.

EDCLC is a county organization, with a goal of attracting industry to all areas of Lincoln County, while the airport planners are specifically directed to oversee development of the old airport land in Ruidoso.

Puckett prefaced his remarks by commenting that his board already had endorsed the golf course development, and EDCLC members complained because that statement, which previously had been reported in *The News*, was not included in the report of the public hearing.

Don Shaw said the article and

column "bordered on yellow journalism."

"We get held responsible for what we say ... I don't believe we have yellow journalism ... sometimes we don't give enough information ... it's tough covering so many meetings," countered board member and village manager Frank Potter who said he deals often with the news media.

Bundick read a two-page statement to board members setting forth his objections.

"Because of Mr. Puckett's remarks, and remarks made in *The Ruidoso News*, the EDCLC has received numerous complaints. While Mr. Puckett's remarks may have been inappropriate at that particular time, there were no untruths in them. In any event, George is entitled to his opinion," Bundick said.

He also wrote, "In Frankie Jarrell's article in *The Ruidoso News* on June 1, 1989, and her column 'On the Record,' and in her editorial, she completely ignored George's opening statement about the EDCLC's endorsement of the hotel-golf course and questioned the integrity of the EDCLC by insinuating that our recent inquiries were fabricated in an effort to justify continued funding in the county. She also questioned why the MAPB had not heard of these inquiries."

"I would like to state that I, as president of the EDCLC, resent very much Ms. Jarrell's insinuation. All the inquiries George mentioned are real...."

Later in his statement, Bundick said, "I still believe that a multi-use concept should be strongly considered.... However, if the hotel-golf course plan proceeds and has the backing of the majority of citizens of Ruidoso, I will support it 100 percent."

"What we don't need in deciding what to do with the old airport property are vicious attacks from one group upon another or misleading articles in the newspaper..." he

declared.

After reading the statement, he replayed a video of Puckett speaking to the Village Council.

Later in the meeting, Puckett gave a rundown on contacts made by the EDCLC to show that the organization has been working.

Puckett, pointing to a stack of inquiries, described several without revealing the names of the inquirers. Those inquiries are confidential, and may be seen by the director and a few members of the board. That confidentiality also was discussed during Thursday's meeting.

Public versus private funding of the corporation also was debated.

County commissioners, during a budget workshop, indicated they may drastically reduce funding for the EDCLC next fiscal year. Currently the group is funded through a 1/2 mill levy implemented by the previous commissioners.

"My hope is that the county will fund us in some manner," Bundick said. He said he is not willing to stick around if the EDCLC is going to be ineffectual and if it runs out of funds.

"Let someone else carry the ball," he declared.

"Why come to us for money ... go back to all the (private sector) people to get funding," suggested board member Karon Petty at one point. Petty is a county commissioner, but stressed that her remarks were as an individual, not on behalf of the commission.

"We can raise taxes, but that may not be in the best interests of the county," she said.

"You are saying that purchase of a D-9 (road equipment) benefits the whole county ... we individually and as a county all benefit from economic development," board member Ronnie Paulger told Petty.

"We have to understand the ballgame we're in. Nobody is for taxes. The responsibility of the county commission is to step up and take the heat of viable

projects," Paulger said.

"I don't believe you can justify not funding because you don't believe the EDCLC benefits the whole county."

Petty commented that the EDCLC wants funding "with no strings attached."

"We are doing economic development work for the county by contract," responded Bundick.

"I don't think the board can assume that the majority of the people are for EDCLC," Petty said.

"I can understand that after that article in the newspaper," Paulger said.

Bundick said if funding for EDCLC came to a vote it would pass. He said the corporation will live with any decision by the county commission.

"We may have to close our doors, and we'll be terribly disappointed," he said.

Petty asked if villages could tax to support the EDCLC.

Potter said yes, but cited economies that are in trouble, not only in Ruidoso, but in many cities in southeastern New Mexico.

"If we are going to be saved, we've got to recognize we've got to save ourselves," said Roy Grocker, head of the Retirees Services division of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, who decided not to ask for funds from the EDCLC, Thursday night.

He said broad-based community support is needed, adding that funding the EDCLC is good use of tax money.

"I don't think there is any better," he said. "We can't get it from the private sector. It isn't there."

Dorothy Smith, of Capitan, said people used to hear that "Ruidoso is for Ruidoso" and won't do anything for the county. "This is not true anymore," she said. She cited a spirit of cooperation throughout the county.

In his written statement, Bundick continued: "I have heard recently that we pay our director

too much, and we pay too much for luxurious office space. I challenge those that say that to come forward and learn the facts. What would they suggest we pay? Why wait until now to bring it up? Are those issues justification to do away with this organization?"

A statement of assets and liabilities was passed out and approved by the board early in the meeting. The report shows that Puckett is paid \$3,333 a month, and his secretary receives \$900 a month. Offices in the Ruidoso

Financial Center are rented for \$400 per month. An automobile allowance of \$450 a month is among operations line items.

Total current assets run \$95,738. The organization received approximately \$130,000 from the county for this year's operation.

Total receipts from January 1 through May 31 were \$114,632. Disbursements were \$58,593.

Bundick had said the organization could continue about six months without further funding.

"We still need help in a lot of the classes," she said. "Some of the classes still need assistants."

Schmitz said in addition to the summer classes, there will be several special programs throughout the summer.

A Hug-A-Book summer reading program will be going on throughout the summer until August 5. The program is open to youngsters in kindergarten on up and is designed to get children to read and use the library.

"They were standing in line on Monday morning to sign up," said Schmitz, who already has 68 young readers participating.

Three more programs will be offered.

consists of five commissioner.

In Ruidoso's present form of government, half the councillors are elected every two years. In the proposed form of government, three commissioners are selected after two years and the other two are selected two years later.

In other words, if Ruidoso changes government, three of the commissioners will serve two years and then be up for re-election. Two years later, the other two commissioner would be up for re-election.

Under the commission/manager form of government, the governing body must divide the municipality into five districts. Those municipalities that have not done this in the past, have faced lawsuits. In municipalities over 10,000 population, commissioners must reside in and be elected from each district. In municipalities under 10,000, each district is represented by a commissioner who is voted on at large.

"We haven't decided until

recently, whether municipalities with under 10,000 and the commission/manager form have to district in regular terms," said Diane Lang of the New Mexico Municipal League. "If you read the statute technically, you don't have to do it. But we feel it would be prudent to go ahead and district." She said it only makes sense, that once you have commission districts, to go ahead and elect commissioner from them as single member districts.

The commission/manager form does have a few things that the mayor/council with manager form doesn't have. These are the recall, referendum and initiative statutes.

Under the recall statute, all elected officials in the commission/manager form of government are subject to recall. In order to recall an elected official, a petition must be signed by more than twenty percent of the average number of voters who voted in the previous four regular elections or more than twenty percent of the number who voted at the previous regular municipal election, whichever is greater. The commission must call

an election on the question of a recall, unless the regular municipal election occurs within sixty days. If a majority of the voters favor recall, the majority must equal or exceed the number of votes the official received when elected.

A referendum to reject a commission-adopted ordinance or resolution can be called under the commissioner/manager form of government. Once a valid petition signed by a prescribed number of qualified voters is filed, the governing body has thirty days to conduct an election which will determine by majority vote whether the ordinance or resolution will be approved or nullified.

Voters in a commission/manager municipality may of their own volition propose an ordinance, resolution or regulation for the municipality. A prescribed number of voters must petition the commission which must act on the measure within thirty days. If the commission fails to act, acts adversely or amend the proposed measure, the commission must then call a special election, within thirty days, to sub-

mit the measure to the voters. If the majority is in favor of the measure, the commission must adopt it.

Currently, the New Mexico Municipal League recognizes 74 cities and villages in New Mexico which have a mayor/council form of government, including every municipality in Lincoln County except Ruidoso.

Fifteen villages and cities have the mayor/council with manager form of government. This includes Ruidoso and cities like Roswell.

Only nine cities and villages in New Mexico have the commission/manager form of government. They are: Alamogordo, Aztec, Clovis, Hobbs, Las Cruces, Lovington, Raton, Truth or Consequences and Tucumcari. Of these Alamogordo, Clovis and Las Cruces have home rule and Aztec, Raton, Truth or Consequences and Tucumcari have populations below 10,000.

would have an access line from Gavilan Canyon Road to Ski Apache by way of Cow Mountain. Alternate C would go from downtown Ruidoso to the Inn of the Mountain Gods and then to the Ski Apache Ski area.

Sheck said service between Alto, Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs would be on about a half hour basis with less frequent stops at the airport and Ski Apache, depending on the season.

He said the equipment in the plan is the same type of electric small gauge railcars used throughout Europe. The railcars function in two group units and are served by raised platforms at each station for easy entry and exit. Local fares are expected to be around 80 cents and distance fares, like to the airport or the ski area, around \$5. Tickets will be sold by a ticket machine.

Sheck said the original study called for a capital outlay of \$75 million. This proposal would cost around \$83 million for the core track line and Alternates A and B. Alternate C is estimated around \$99 million.

The cost of operating the railroad is projected around \$2.5 million a year with labor about half the cost of operation. He said at first the cost will outweigh the revenue generated, but with time the railroad could make a profit. He

said the railroad should be viewed as a public service, just like a police force or fire department.

Sheck said the railroad would be compatible with the environment because it does not pollute and does not take up much road. He said the tracks could be laid beside existing roadways or in the middle of the street.


"Where do you go from here," he asked?

Sheck said the project should be looked at in terms of economic development.

"Economic development was one of Governor Carruthers main thrusts when he was elected. The state does not find it appropriate for us to move forward with it. The ball is in the court of Ruidoso and the (Mescalero Apache Indian) Tribe."


He suggested an organization be made up of all parties to be served by the railroad. Second he suggested additional studies before any kind of funding is sought.

Attending the presentation were village and county officials, members of the Municipal Airport Planning Board, Planning and Zoning Commission and Lincoln County Transportation Corporation. Also attending were Dewey Lonsberry, cabinet secretary for highways and transportation and John Dendahl, cabinet secretary for economic development and tourism.

EDITORIAL

The golf course developers want it all, and a group of local citizens want to tell those big money folks to forget the whole thing and take their plans elsewhere.

Can't we compromise? Let's hope so.

The golf course development may not be the answer to all our economic problems ... and the hotel and civic center, too aren't panaceas for an ailing business climate. But they are surely a start, and with the right marketing and promotion, we believe they can provide a badly needed boost.

But we believe the golf course, hotel and civic center can be accomplished on somewhat less than the entire tract of land. The people of Ruidoso have spoken, loudly and clearly, telling leaders that we want to retain some of that valuable land for public use.

As the development plans have progressed, the amount of land dedicated to a jogging/walking/biking path has decreased and decreased until it disappeared in the last plans we saw. We see people walking and jogging around golf courses all the time, and have a hard time believing that some kind of path can't be included in the final plans.

We believe a jogging/walking/biking path could somehow be included in the overall development. That's where the compromise comes in.

Let's at least talk about it.—fj

Al's Musings

Every community has its "radicals" and "hotheads." Some folks seem to enjoy being the squeaky wheels that constantly need oiling where municipal matters are concerned.

Ruidoso has its share of residents who are unbending, quarrelsome and argumentative to the Nth degree. It also has its share of saints.

We've lived in Roswell which has a mayor-council type of government. And we've observed the operations of government in Alamogordo as a resident there. Alamogordo has a commission-manager government with home rule.

Home rule means that the city commission of Alamogordo can adopt any laws which do not put it into conflict with state statutes and federal law.

It sure seems to us that a municipal government where it is relatively easy to recall any city or village council member makes it very difficult to talk highly qualified people into running for office. The commission-manager type government has the recall provision.

No one wants to be "fired", so-to-speak, from a job, and recall is just that—being fired.

Under our present form of government, voters should use their native intelligence to elect people in whom they have utmost confidence. These people should be supported by the electorate that put them in office even if, occasionally, they vote contrary to the wishes of a few of their supporters.

If they consistently go against the wishes of a majority of the electorate, vote them out of office the next election.

It would appear that under the proposed new form of government for Ruidoso, a minority of the electorate can start a campaign which could oust a councilman over very petty issues. A loud minority often can have a very strong influence, unfortunately. The unbending, argumentative, quarrelsome element of the population would have a field day.

Another weakness we see in the commission-manager type government is that the mayor becomes a figurehead only. He has very little power beyond that of any other member of a commission.

The power under the proposed form of government rests almost entirely with a city manager.

The mayor is not elected by the electorate, but is appointed by other member of a commission or council.

In our book, that's a weakness. We like to see a municipality where, if the mayor says something, people listen. In economic development, this could be vital. An overworked city manager, who assumes the powers of a mayor plus all his other duties, may not have the time or energy to meet all of the demands made upon him.

We'll vote against changing the form of Ruidoso's government, but our opinion is that of one person.

The big thing is, vote, June 19, as an informed citizen.

May the will of the majority be realized.

Ruidoso voters will go to the polls on June 20 to decide whether or not to change the form of government from the current mayor/council to a commission/manager. The election was prompted by a petition signed by the required number of registered voters and verified by Municipal Clerk Tammie Maddox.

The question on the ballot will be very simple—do you favor the change? Voters will cast ballots either "for" or "against."


