Fire threatens area water

A lightning influenced fire in White Mountain Wilderness starting Friday at 6 p.m. and is about 50 percent controlled, according to Tom Guck, forest service spokesman.

Guck said the fire started near Elk Point and three crews, one from the forest service and two from the BIA, are expected to control the fire by 10 a.m. Tuesday.

Two helicopters are assisting the 83 firefighters. A tanker from Holloman Air Force Base was used on Sunday.

Guck said erratic winds and deep grass contributed to the difficulty in containing the blaze that threatens the Bonito water shed which serves Nogal, Capitan, Carrizozo and Holloman.

Hospital expands emergency coverage

Nancy Guck will join the staff of Lincoln County Medical Center (LCMC) as a physician's assistant (PA) to help with emergency room (ER) coverage.

Guck, head of the Emergency Medical Service (EMS) in Carrizozo, will begin June 26 to help relieve on-call physicians in the ER, said Jim Stover during a regular meeting of the LCMC Board of Trustees.

Doctors will provide input as to the hours Guck will be work in hopes the double-duty many doctors have faced in ER coverage can be greatly reduced, said Stover.

Dr. Lance W. Kirkegaard has said it can take at least a week for him to recover from weekend on-call in the ER.

"There hasn't been a meeting we haven't talked about ER," said board Chairman Dub Williams.

Because LCMC does not have a full time ER physician, other hospital physicians take turns as the on-call physician at ER in addition to their other duties.

The medical staff has requested this situation be changed, and the hospital administration has given its assurance the problem will be looked into, said medical chief of staff Dr. William Harrison in a previous interview.

But the problem has proven to be very difficult to solve.

"I don't mind saying we're not smart enough to figure it out," said Williams during the board meeting.

The possibility of an Urgent Care Unit (UCU) had been discussed, and a consultant came to LCMC at the end of May to make recommendations, as was discussed in the last board meeting.

However, there was no report available of the consultant's input, said Stover.

An evaluation of LCMC's X-Ray department was made by Mike Luscomb of High Plains Hospital in Clovis, and a report had been filed with the administration, said Ruth

change to a commission/manager form.

Trigo Dancer has won over \$104,000 in her career. It was her first victory in six 1989 starts.
 "We haven't had any luck this season," said trainer Clifford Lambert. "She had trouble at Albuquerque and had trouble in the gates at Sunland Park. I'm pleased with the way she ran. We really thought she'd get them today."
 Lambert, who also won the feature Friday, said Trigo Dancer will run in stakes races here this season. Trigo Dancer, who ran the 7 1/2 furlongs in 1:32 3/5, paid \$10.20, \$4.20 and \$3.20 to show. Ruffetta paid \$3.00 and \$2.40. Fearless Ego, who stumbled at the start, paid \$2.60 to show.



County commissioners settle contract dispute

Ernie Gonzales will finally get what he was promised last August. During a regular meeting Monday of the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners (LCBC), a motion was passed to upgrade Gonzales' salary to the level he was promised, including a lump-sum payment of back salary.

Gonzales, a physician's assistant (PA), came to Carrizozo to work at the Carrizozo Health Clinic (CHC) last August and negotiated a contract with Lincoln County Medical Center (LCMC) administrator Steve Keller and former county manager Suzanne Cox.

County Commission Chairman Robert Hemphill said the problem began when no one wrote down the outcome of those negotiations. He said some items negotiated may not have been legal.

Gonzales said he was promised a take-home pay of \$38,000, four-weeks paid vacation, an interim housing allowance of \$375 per month, plus 100 percent paid insurance coverage.

"The 100 percent insurance was flagrantly against the law," said county manager Nick Pappas.

A near capacity crowd came to the commissioners meeting to support the Gonzales, with many

saying they fear he will leave Carrizozo if his salary corrections are not made.

"My telephone has rung more over this than anything else," said Hemphill.

Gonzales said he talked about this dispute with commissioners for several months. He said they balked at honoring the contract without granting formal approval.

He continued to work at CHC thinking the terms of the contract would be honored in time. He is on call 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

Gonzales said he heard a rumor after the last budget hearing that CHC employees are not considered county employees, and became concerned.

"We're not doing anything to damage the health center," said Hemphill, noting that in a small community rumors escalate.

Commissioner Karon Z. Petty said the incident proves the county needs to review all contracts, past and present. When discrepancies in Gonzales' contract surfaced, it was unclear who runs CHC, said Petty.

Hemphill said LCMC makes administrative decisions, while the county provides the funds.

Also during the discussion, commissioners voted to include CHC

full-time employees in the pay raise adopted for other county employees.

Commissioners tabled a resolution to reorganize the offices of the county manager and the treasurer that included a recommendation to upgrade finance director and administrative assistant positions and county manager positions, and a salary enhancement of \$20,500 for the finance director and administrative assistant.

Petty questioned the language of the resolution, saying it locked the commission into a specific salary, regardless of any future employee's qualifications.

After the resolution was tabled, Petty asked staff to provide job descriptions when the topic is considered next.

At the start of the meeting, Sam Sasser, of Waste Management of Alamogordo, showed a brief video on landfill operations.

Sasser said it would cost about \$20,000 per acre to prepare a site as a landfill, \$50,000 per acre if a plastic liner is needed.

He said, based on the volume generated in Lincoln County, it isn't feasible for the county to have its own landfill.

He said Waste Management's proposal, presented for information only Monday, covers only the opera-

tion of a landfill, not collection services.

Commissioners also fielded a question on a pending lawsuit with the county treasurer named as a defendant, and the plaintiff represented by an attorney from Parsons & Bryant, the firm under contract to provide the county with legal services.

County attorney J. Robert Beauvais said he drafted a letter Monday to notify the county manager's office.

In other regular business, the commissioners:

- Heard a brief update on the formation of a Lincoln County waste disposal committee.
- Heard a report on the Association of Counties from Donna Smith.
- Approved a joint powers agreement between Lincoln and Chaves counties and the Department of Finance and Administration for \$142,000 in legislative funds in the water rights suit with the Mesquero tribe.
- Adopted the Federal Fair Labor Standards Act as it applies to county law enforcement personnel.
- Adopted a resolution to have Gavilan Canyon Road striped with monies through the cooperative school bus route agreement with

the New Mexico State Highway Department.

- Sent a new form developed by the road review committee to the county manager's office and the county attorney for review.
- Accepted a request for a road closure made by Shirley Goodloe in the absence of John G. Robinson.
- Approved a budget increase of \$5,598 for the Lincoln County Fair Board to pay for grandstands. It was reported the funds came from donations.

- Approved the payroll and the accounts payable register.
- Accepted the treasurer's report.
- Approved budget increase for the Zia Senior Citizens center, using left-over money from 1987-88. The money will be used to pay electric bills.
- Adopted resolution 77-78 stating Lincoln County will not at this time participate in the enhanced 911 fund because area telephone companies do not have the capabilities for this service.

Do you believe operating expenses for the proposed course could be only \$500,000 for the first year? Mr. Colbert suggests they would (with almost no details given).

We believe these are unreachable goals and given the facts, this course would be doomed from the start.

Do you believe the developers and our city officials have answered all questions concerning this proposed development openly, honestly and fairly? If not, please come to the public hearing tonight and express your views to your representatives.



Clancy said although Alto residents represented the majority of demand metering victims, other consumers from the Capitan, Nogal, Carrizozo and Hondo area were affected.

This has allowed for some full-time nurses to have their hours reduced when in the past some nurses had overtime scheduled into their hours, she said.

Kaitfors also said the nursing administration has been working very hard in nursing recruitment to replace seven registered nurses (RN) who have left LCMC.

The beginning of summer is a traditional time to lose nurses, she said.

Two graduate nurses have been recruited who are expected to become RN's in mid-August, she said.

Also, four other RN's have been hired, but not all have arrived, said Kaitfors.

Two of the new RN's are married and their husbands have accepted jobs here in Ruidoso, she reported.

This typically is the case, and the spouse finding employment in another community is a prime reason why many nurses leave, she said.

"Nurses have a very portable skill," said Williams. "And when there's an RN attached to the name they can go anywhere."

Kaitfors said float nurses were not used at all during fiscal year (FY) 89, and the float nurses used now represent the first time they've been used during FY 90.

She also reported in FY 88, LCMC spent in excess of \$30,000 on float nurses.

Chief Reynolds thanked everyone for being careful and asks for continued caution with the dry con-


ditions. "Be sure and keep your eyes open and be aware of fires," he said.

Archaeologists investigate historic sites along U.S. 70

Six hundred years ago a man stirred the ashes to his fire, then looked southward across the Hondo valley. He was pleasantly full, his face covered with grease, after eating a young bison he had killed.

Rain fell heavily but he was protected beneath a limestone overhang. A pebble, loosened by water seeping through cracks in the rock, fell on his shoulder. He turned and scowled at the stone.

Stepping into the rain, he raised his face to wash the grease and dirt away, but a loud crash startled him. The overhang had collapsed onto his small camp just after he stepped into the rain. He looked nervously at the sky, then decided to move on.

That was the second time the site had been vacated because of a roof collapse, said archaeologist Regge N. Wiseman.

The pre-historic site, and some others, were recently excavated before improvements on U.S. Highway 70 in the Picacho area are completed. When the construction is finished, these sites will be under the centerline of the new highway.

Working for the Laboratory of Anthropology at the Museum of New Mexico, Wiseman and two others excavated three digs about 600 years old, plus one other 2,000 years old, as is required by law.

Because the archaic sites lie within the right-of-way of the construction, work is delayed until the archaeologists recover as much information from the sites as possible. Then they will be destroyed.

The sites had been known for a year, but no one expected the amount of information that would be recovered, said Wiseman.

Though they are artifact-poor, the digs are information-rich, having the potential to answer many important questions archaeologists have about the development of agriculture, said Wiseman.

"What we have found here are characteristics of both a hunter-

gatherer lifestyle as well as an agricultural lifestyle," he said.

Such information could indicate the transition period man went through when he dropped the nomadic ways of the hunter-gatherer and began to adopt the more sedentary life of agriculture.

"Even if all he did was cast a bunch of seeds out hoping they would grow, if he came back to harvest what was there, then we have our first farmer," said Wiseman.

Man had occupied the area of southeastern New Mexico for at least 10,000 years. The famous Clovis site, where a mass bison kill had been discovered near the town of Clovis, is believed to represent the earliest presence of man in North America. The Clovis site is estimated to be 13,000 years old.

At the time of the occupation of the sites near Picacho, agricultural products were available, said Wiseman.

"That doesn't mean they were appreciated," he said.

The small, 600-year-old sites are at the base of a limestone cliff, a mere twelve feet from the edge of the highway.

Two fairly large metates, or grinding stones, were found, as well as "mano" fragments, the grinding stone held in the hand. The size of the mano stones, said Wiseman, indicate hunter-gatherer ways had not yet been completely abandoned.

Collapsed limestone buried in the soil indicated the site had at least two occupations, both probably ending when the roof caved in, he said.

Wiseman pointed out the tell-tale black lines in the soil which indicate fire pits. This soil, called anthropogenic because it is man-made, can yield extremely important information, he said.

Organic matter identified in the soil samples can tell what kind of wood was burned, can detect animal remains, and even plant matter, said the archaeologist.

"If we can find corn then we know they were farmers," he said.

In one of these 600-year-old digs the skeletal remains of a yearling bison were found, a significant find. But the soil is more important, says Wiseman.

"This is the best site for burn remains I've ever worked in," he said.

Gathering the soil samples is a delicate matter and can be easily damaged by capricious pot-hunters.

"When someone comes to me proudly with a pot shard, I quickly point out to them they have only brought maybe 10 percent of the available information," said Wiseman.

Pot-hunting, besides damaging important soil analysis, is illegal on public lands.

After a local television news crew filmed the sites, Wiseman said he had to watch the sites overnight because attempts had been made to dig for pots.

To the east of the 600-year-old sites is the Sunset Archaic Site, which Wiseman said is probably 2,000 years old.

The site sits atop a rise bisected by the highway when it was originally built, and has six storage pits which indicate the occupiers were processing food, said Wiseman.

Four fire pits were discovered, but they do not all date from the same period, he said. Rather, the site was periodically occupied over many years.

Many important questions still remain unanswered, said Wiseman.

For example, despite plentiful water, why are there only four known sites in the Hondo Valley?

But Wiseman is certain of one thing. The results from the analysis of the soil samples he collected can have significant archaeological importance for all of southeastern New Mexico.

"And if the work is done properly it can provide significant data for the whole southwest for decades," said the Roswell-born scientist.

Continued from page 1A and would feature multiple tees for all levels of players.

Jeff Brauer of Golfscapes said the Scottish design was chosen because it would reduce the total amount of maintained turf and therefore reduce the water used. The Scottish design would feature mounds around the fairways to protect the golfers from the wind, and plans call for several double greens. The runway material would be buried under the mounds.

The proposed hotel would be zig-zag shaped with a southwestern mission style look. The hotel would have 200-rooms in the first phase, with 40 percent suites.

The proposed hotel would feature a restaurant, an indoor/outdoor swimming pool and a 200 square foot meeting room. The proposed pro shop for the golf course would be located in the hotel and would have a separate entrance and parking area.

According to the announced plans, the village would build a 12,000 square foot civic/special events center adjacent to the hotel, if the funds are available.

Bill Davies, CEO of SWD Motels

Inc. said the hotel would employ about 75 people during the peak season and around 20 people in the off season.

Under the terms of the proposed lease, Colbert Golf would lease the land for an initial term of 15 years. The village would receive 20 percent of all gross sales after Colbert's gross exceeds \$1.5 million. There are several optional extensions to the lease term.

Colbert would pay for construction of the golf course and would be responsible from drilling and maintaining a well on the course. The village would be responsible for providing the water, around 200 acre/feet per annum, to Colbert Golf free of charge. Colbert would also be responsible for maintenance and upkeep of the golf course and all buildings located on the course.

Under the terms of the lease with SWD Motels, Inc., the lease period would be for 50 years. The village would receive a varying percentage of the gross room revenue during the lease period, after the hotel occupancy rate reaches 65 to 66 percent.

The village also would agree to subordinate SWD Motels interest to the first mortgage of the property.

Letters to the editor

DEAR EDITOR:

We have before us three major items of business that will have a considerable long-term effect on Ruidoso and Lincoln County. They are in a sense, inter-related. They are causing a good deal of division in the community.

First: As to the County and the funding of EDCLC. It should be terminated. The appropriate marketing agency should be the professionals hired by the Chamber of Commerce through Lodgers Tax, R.D. Hubbard through the race track, the Inn of the Mountain Gods and, if it is approved, the new golf course/hotel complex. The \$100,000 of taxpayers' money could be better spent by the County to strengthen its own service capabilities and improve basic services including road maintenance. To unload on the community allegations of hundreds of inquiries as to the use of airport land one week before the council is to act is either obstructionist in motive, self-serving in the extreme, or a poor management decision. At the inquiry level, information could and should have been shared with MAPB. Later, if negotiations ensued, confidentiality could be preserved but at least some of the MAPB should be involved. They were not initially to be a marketing board—simply a review board as to projects to be considered.

Second: The commission form of government. There is nothing in their mailing that suggests any taxpayer or citizen benefit over our current form of government. The weakening of the role of the mayor has its downside as a mayoral function may conflict with the person's duties as a commissioner. The fact recall might be made easier is something that could be accomplished by simply changing the city charter to provide for direct recall of any individual, including the

mayor. If a change in government is being sought because of displeasure with our current council and/or mayor, we do have elections coming up. This is not a defense of our current administration, simply suggesting that there are simpler and less drastic measures that can be taken. No form of government is going to solve the problems of ethics and of getting a more positive view of public service and thereby attract persons who are willing to stand for election and truly serve the public.

Third: The airport land. No matter what use is made of the airport land, it will present the same environmental concerns that are now being raised. If the entire area was made into a park, the water would be at taxpayers' expense; there would be maintenance and upkeep (probably with some herbicides), all at taxpayer expense. Still have to tear up the runway and dispose of it; another huge expense. Imagine the environmental concerns if it became a theme park (one of the unsubstantiated allegations of EDCLC)? Environmentalists, you are dead wrong on this one. The proposed golf course may not be the absolute highest and best use of the land, but do we have any REAL other proposals? If so, they should be presented. The golf course will have to have an environmental OK in any event.

What are the taxpayers giving up? Leasing the land for a certain number of years with no immediate tax benefit is pretty standard for any enterprise zone. Giving the hotel tax benefits for a time is also standard. Most of these matters seem acceptable. What needs to be addressed are the terms of the contract and especially a reversion clause that returns all properties to the City if the enterprise fails. That would include the improvements. And the contract should

call for some minimal water charge initially. As to water - there is enough, according to studies. If a water shortage occurs, simply curtail business use of water over-all...citizens first.

What if the entire golf/hotel/civic center eventually fails as a project? THEN we have a park and a complex quite suitable for any industry, not built at taxpayer expense. Let us, for a change, look to the future in terms of a few years rather than simply tomorrow. Not much to lose in proceeding with the current proposed use of the old airport land.

Finally, as to the relationship of these items one to the other. It is not realistic to expect a large employer to locate here because of transportation limitations as to shipping, and because of higher utility costs as to climate. In any event, a business in deciding to locate looks at some basics: what kind of public services are provided, and to what degree? What is the overall quality of life, including educational opportunities? And what are the amenities? Whether we like it or not, golf is the number one attraction at the business level and carries considerable weight as an amenity.

So the County should strengthen its basic services; so should Ruidoso and stop spending all the tax money on advertising an area that has not yet begun to function appropriately at a very basic level. Let us reason together and make this a community where people want to come because it is a great place with good services. If we have people willing to invest under current conditions, we had better be more encouraging instead of the continuing divisiveness and petty squabbling that is now occurring.

Grindstone Dam was to have been a turnkey project which would have included a treatment plant for emergency water to alleviate water shortages during drought periods. Currently twelve million dollars has been allotted the dam alone, and it doesn't hold water. During 1988 the Village, according to the finance director, paid an additional \$127,000 (not including the dam) into this imperfect edifice without any money coming from the contractor or engineer responsible. Why are we paying for their mistakes?

It is estimated that if the dam is to ever hold water and be of value to the village another \$4 million dollars must be spent.

The new airport runway doesn't face into prevailing winds like it should. The runway is actually built with crosswinds. Planes taking off and landing should be heading into prevailing winds. Why was the runway built in the wrong direction? An outside audit of this years operation of the airport indi-

cates a minimum operating loss of \$241,000. All subsidized by tax dollars. It is in the plans to build an expensive control tower. Alamogordo has many more landings than Ruidoso and they don't have a control tower. With the current loss can we afford one?

Why do we have such costly errors in every project? Did you ever think it could be lack of proper planning and management.

Ruidoso is big business. Our current operating budget is \$11.2 million. It must be run by professionals with the proper skills to run a big business. When you invest in stocks or bonds you want to know that you have made a secure investment and the companies are operating with efficient sound management. Shouldn't our city be run the same way?

Why have cities, large and small, like San Antonio (one of the most progressive cities in the country), Dallas, San Diego, Las Cruces, Hobbs, Lovington, Clovis and 2,800 other cities changed to the most innovative modern form of government?

Because it's more efficient, the

citizens have better representation, and the management of the Village is provided by a competent manager educated in city management and is experienced in city management.

In the coming years we will need strong leadership to tackle the serious problems with which Ruidoso will be confronted. Only with discerning judgment can we ensure our future is being guided by the best qualified, unbiased and forthright people.

ORDINANCE 89-02,
CONSUMPTION OR POSSESSION OF ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES IN OPEN CONTAINERS IN A MOTOR VEHICLE PROHIBITED (86-8-138 NMSA)

A) No person shall knowingly drink any alcoholic beverages while in a motor vehicle upon any public highway within this State.

B) No person shall knowingly have in his possession, on his person, while in a motor vehicle upon any public highway within this State, any bottle, can or other receptacle containing any alcoholic beverage which has been opened or had its seal broken or the contents of which have been partially removed.

C) It is unlawful for the registered owner of any motor vehicle, to knowingly keep or allow to be kept in a motor vehicle, when the vehicle is upon any public highway within this State, any bottle, can or other receptacle containing any alcoholic beverage which has been opened or had its seal broken or the contents of which have been partially removed, unless the container is kept in:

- 1) the trunk of the vehicle or in some other area of the vehicle not normally occupied by the driver or passengers if the vehicle is not equipped with a trunk;
- 2) the living quarters of a motor home or recreational vehicle;
- 3) a truck camper; or
- 4) the bed of a pick-up truck when the bed is occupied by passengers.

A utility or glove compartment shall be deemed to be within the area occupied by the driver and passengers. This section does not apply to the driver or owner of or any passenger in a bus, taxicab or limousine for hire licensed to transport passengers pursuant to the Motor Carrier Act or proper legal authority.

D) The provisions of this section do not apply to:

- 1) Any person who, upon the recommendation of a doctor, carries alcoholic beverages in that person's motor vehicle for medicinal purposes;
- 2) Any clergyman or his agent who carries alcoholic beverages for religious purposes in the clergyman's or agent's motor vehicle; or
- 3) Any person who is employed by a person licensed by the Alcoholic Beverage Control Act, while discharging his duties as an employee.

PENALTIES.
 A) Whoever is guilty of a second or subsequent violation of any provision of Section 66-8-138 NMSA 1978 is guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be punished as follows:

- 1) If guilty of a second violation, by a fine of not less than fifty dollars (\$50.00) or more than one hundred dollars (\$100.00); and
- 2) If guilty of a third or subsequent violation, a fine of not less than one hundred dollars (\$100.00) or more than three hundred dollars (\$300.00) or by imprisonment for not more than thirty days or both.

B) In addition to any other penalty to law, upon conviction for a second or subsequent violation of the provisions of Section 66-8-138 NMSA 1978, the convicted person shall have his driver's license revoked for a period of three months upon a second violation and for one year upon a third or subsequent violation.

C) This section does not affect the authority of a municipality under a proper ordinance to prescribe penalties for possession or consumption of alcoholic beverages while driving a motor vehicle. A violation under a municipal ordinance prescribing penalties for possession or consumption of alcoholic beverages while driving a motor vehicle shall be deemed to be a violation under this section for purposes of determining second, third and subsequent violations of this section.

Section 4. Section 66-8-140 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1978, Chapter 35, Section 548) is amended to read:

66-8-140. ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES DEFINED. As used in Sections 66-8-138 through 66-8-140 NMSA 1978, "alcoholic beverages" means distilled or rectified spirits, potable alcohol, brandy, whisky, rum, gin, aromatic bitters bearing the federal internal revenue strip stamps or any similar alcoholic beverage, including all blended or fermented beverages, dilutions or mixtures of one or more of the foregoing containing more than one-half of one percent alcohol but excluding medicinal bitters.
