

Gunfighters' graves found in the Mescalero area

On a hill behind a plain-looking adobe wall on the Mescalero reservation lie two graves, each unmarked, where side-by-side are buried a man and his killer.

Both died in a classic shoot-em-up gun battle like those seen in wild west movies; one man bleeding from the gut holed up in a mill office against fifteen others out to take him dead or alive.

The lone gunslinger was never taken, either dead or alive, but was quietly buried next to the man who wanted him arrested.

More than 100 years later, the graves of Andrew L. "Buckshot" Roberts, and the man who hunted him, Dick Brewer, have been discovered.

Jim Earle, professor of civil

engineering at Texas A&M University, successfully located the sites in a small cemetery in Mescalero, New Mexico at the Old Blazer's Mill.

Earle used a photograph of descendants of Doc Blazer, who owned the mill, pointing to the grave sites. On the photograph itself are detailed notes of the graves' locations and who was buried there.

The photographs were stumbled upon during a collector's show in New York, which Earle had attended. The engineer made his own photos of the site, then compared these with the Blazer photograph, taken in 1927.

There was hardly any difference, said Earle.

Blazer's Mill was the site of one of the more famous gun battles in western lore, and was one which in-

volved Billy the Kid.

Buckshot Roberts was one of the gunmen identified with the Jesse Evans gang, which was responsible for the murder of John H. Tunstall, an event credited for the start of the Lincoln County Wars.

Roberts received his nickname for the many wounds he had sustained in his life as a soldier, and from skirmishes with Indians, scouts, and other nefarious men of the old west.

Dick Brewer was a personal friend of Tunstall, and after the rancher's murder, he organized a vigilante group known as the Regulators, of which Billy the Kid was a member.

The Regulators purpose was to round up as many of those af-

Ruidoso Police take to the streets of Midtown—on foot

A policeman walking a beat is usually something you only see in the movies.

Yet on Friday and Saturday nights, people in Midtown Ruidoso are finding out an officer walking a beat doesn't just happen on the silver screen.

On Memorial Day weekend,

Chief William Newman of the Ruidoso Police Department initiated a walking patrol in Midtown on Friday and Saturday nights.

The police officers work in pairs for two four-hour shifts, from 6 to 10 p.m. and from 10 p.m. to 2 a.m.

Newman said he established the patrols because the regular patrols were having to spend a lot of time in the Midtown area and because

he had received a few complaints from Midtown merchants.

He said the walking patrol is an overtime assignment and is strictly voluntary. He had originally wanted to start the program July 1, because he had asked for funds to do the patrol in the 1989-90 village budget.

Newman said the council and the merchants thought it was such a good idea, that he started it Memorial Day weekend.

"I felt the presence of the officers would deter any problems," he said.

Chief Newman also said the walking patrol would make the officers visible in the Midtown area and give them a chance to meet people.

"It's a time to drop in the shops and talk to the merchants and meet the tourists," Newman said. "All the feedback has been positive, from the merchants and the officers."

The officers themselves see the walking patrol as an opportunity to do a different kind of police work which helps break up the monotony of the everyday patrol and it keeps them visible to the public in the Midtown area.

"That's it," said Ruidoso Police Officer Kent Berkedal, "as long as they know we are out here."

Berkedal and Officer Lou Wardwell were on Friday night's 6 to 10 p.m. shift. The officers begin and end their patrols at the police station, two blocks from Midtown. Both officers volunteered for the shift, even after pulling their regular shifts, which began at 8 a.m.

They walk both sides of the street from the crosswalk near the Contel offices to the Gazebo Shopping Center.

Neither officer has any idea how many miles they will walk during their four-hour shift.

"It depends on how fast we walk," said Berkedal.

Some spots in the Midtown area, where the sidewalks are narrow and slanted, make it difficult for the officers walking a beat.

"It is not the miles you walk, it

Local business is hit with \$1,600 in fines

A local Ruidoso businessman has been fined \$1,600 for failure to complete immigration forms required through the Immigration and Reform Control Act.

According to a news release, Ron McWilliams, owner of the Ruidoso Printing Company, was served with an intent to fine for failure to fill out I-9 forms, which verifies the employment of authorized workers.

McWilliams said 10 of his employees were affected through what he called "an ignorant mistake."

"I knew that you were not supposed to hire illegal aliens but I didn't know there was a form I was supposed to fill out," he said.

He added that most of his employees are from Ruidoso and he has never hired an illegal alien.

"I've never hired anyone that isn't a citizen of the United States," he said.

He added that because the fine was based on his ignorance, he hopes to appeal and lessen his fine.

"I know ignorance is no excuse," he said. "I just wish it was this time."

intent to fine to two other area businesses.

M.E. Hunter Concrete Contractor in Alamogordo was served notice of intent to fine in the amount of \$2,250. The Elk Cattle Company of Elk was served notice of intent to fine in the amount of \$2,500.

McWilliams said he was turned over for investigation by a former "disgruntled employee."

"He took it out on me," he said. "It was just his way of getting back at me."


McWilliams advised all area business operators to make sure that they have all the proper forms completed to avoid a similar situation.

"It really did hurt because I'm trying to run a good business here—and then they sock it to you," he said. "I'm not saying I'm not guilty, because I am. I didn't have the forms. I just wish I knew."

For business owners who are unsure that they have filled out the proper forms or want to ensure that they have been filled out correctly, the U.S. Border Patrol will conduct free audits Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. to 10 a.m. and 4 p.m. to 5 p.m. For additional information, contact the U.S. Border Patrol office in Alamogordo at 437-6960.

Payne takes fourth stakes win

Jockey Larry Payne won his fourth stakes race of the 1989 Ruidoso Downs meeting Saturday as he guided Just Like Lace to victory in the \$17,625 Aspen Breeders' Cup Handicap.

So far this season, Payne has won the Kansas Futurity Consolation aboard Special Show, the Norgor Derby aboard Jae Ego, and the Norgor Futurity with Adios Mundo.

Just Like Lace was third in the June 10 Norgor Derby. She has now won 6-of-8 starts this season. Just Like Lace, who is owned by Tommy Joe Hoyt of Powderly, Texas, ran the 5 1/2 furlongs in 1:04 4/5. She ran with the leaders down the backstretch, dropped back on the turn, and slipped through along the rail in the stretch to post a one-length victory.

"We were in good shape on the backstretch. Then there was some bumping on the turn, and we had to ease back," said Payne, who rode Just Like Lace for trainer T.E. Davidson.

"I waited on a hole and got a break on the turn. I put my whip up 20-30 yards from the wire."

Davidson also trained Adios Mundo to victory in the Norgor Futurity. Just Like Lace paid \$4.40, \$3.00, \$2.20.

Payne reflected on his season

after the race.

"I've won the Kansas Consolation before but never followed with theses kind of results," said Payne. "I expected this horse to be something. I was skeptical about Jae Ego. And Adios Mundo, I was real skeptical about. I'm so lucky, and luck counts for more than good horses in any race."

Misty Autumn was second and paid \$4.80 and \$2.60. Everoneknowsmynname was third and paid \$2.20. Hoyt did not know where the horse would run next, but was impressed with Payne's patience on the turn.

"She impressed me they way she ran at the end," said Hoyt. "I was surprised that Larry made it through on the turn."

Glen Murphy rode four winners Saturday, and was second on three horses.

"I've had a slow start, but everything's getting together now though," said Murphy, 21. "A day like this really makes you pick your head up and work harder. I expected to win a few races today. All I needed was a little luck."

The twin-trifecta carryover pool grew to \$47,683 Saturday. A crowd of 5,163 wagered \$538,857 on the 13-race card, those figures include inter-track wagering at Sunland Park.

Ruidoso Downs will be the first track chaplaincy for Rev. Swenson. He was most recently Senior Pastor at North Freeway Assembly of God in Phoenix where he held that position for ten years.

Now Rev. Swenson's main mission will be to provide counseling, emotional support and encouragement to individuals with alcohol or drug abuse. This program is being sponsored by \$20,000 donations from the R.D. Hubbard Foundation and the Ryan Family Foundation.

The R.D. Hubbard Foundation is a non-profit organization created by Ruidoso Downs majority owner R.D. Hubbard to help charitable causes. The Ryan Family Foundation is the creation of Jim and Linda Ryan of Maryland. They have pledged \$1 million in matching funds to provide drug, alcohol and gambling rehabilitation on the backstretches of American race tracks. To date, 19 race tracks have enrolled.

In addition to the substance abuse program, Swenson will officiate weddings, funerals and other occasions. Weekly chapel services

and Bible study classes also will be held.

Rev. Swenson has a wide range of experience as administrator and pastor. His new office, in the old track kitchen, will be in the center of the barn area and accommodate a wide range of services.

Rev. Swenson, 58, graduated from Central Bible College in Springfield, Missouri with a Bachelor of Arts degree in Theology. He will be filling the post under the auspices of the Race Track Chaplaincy of America. Since 1971, RTCA chaplains have been administering to the needs of backstretch employees, jockeys and occasionally patrons.

Swenson will be joined at Ruidoso Downs by his wife, Lois.

Search Party finds victory

Search Party found the winners' circle Sunday in the \$10,825 Zia Handicap at Ruidoso Downs. The four-year-old colt, ridden by Bary Sumpter, ran the 400 yards in 19.91 seconds.

The twin-trifecta carryover pool grew Sunday to \$61,306. The pool has carried over since Wednesday, June 14. The next chance fans have to wager on the twin-trifecta is Friday, June 30, the next racing day.

Attendance and handle figures were up significantly for the week over 1988's figures. Including intertrack wagering at Sunland Park, the attendance was up 23 percent and the handle improved 22 percent. At Ruidoso, the attendance improved six percent over 1988 figures, but the handle was down three percent.

It was the second year in a row that Sumpter won this race. The Zia Handicap, open to New Mexico-bred Quarter Horses, was Search Party's third race of the season. He was second in an allowance on May 14, and was fourth in the El Bosque Handicap at Albuquerque on May 28. Trained by Jimmy Jones, the

colt had worked well for this race, and was sent off as the 6-1 fourth choice.

"We didn't break real sharp," said Sumpter. "Once we got rolling it was over." Sumpter has never lost on the gelding.

The combination won the Breeders' Derby at the New Mexico State Fair.

Search Party paid \$15.80, \$7.60, and \$5.20. The longshot Sparkling Sands paid \$19.80 and \$10.20. Liberty Class paid \$4.60 to show. The favorite, Queen of Aspen, finished fourth.

Jones said the horse might be back at Ruidoso later this season.

"We are in the All American Gold Cup," he said. "We'll keep him lightly raced. We just don't run often. He might like this track a bit."

The colt has won 5-of-20 career starts and \$40,989.

Half Halo won the \$5,500 Invitational Handicap Sunday. Half Halo was second in an allowance last week, but was impressive Sunday. Trainer Doyal Roberts said the Jockey Club Handicap on Saturday, July 8 is a possibility.

Genuine Knockout sees stars in \$4,000 allowance

Genuine Knockout, who's had trouble in the gates this season, broke well and won Friday's \$4,000 allowance by a neck at Ruidoso Downs.

Genuine Knockout was a 2-1 favorite on May 21 when she was second by 3/4 of a length. She returned on June 2, and was fourth in the Rainbow Silver Cup Trials. Friday, she was the 6-5 favorite.

She ran the 350 yards in 17.70 seconds in a head wind. Trainer C. Dwayne "Sleepy" Gilbreath said the horse's record has been disappointing this season.

"She got away pretty good today," said Gilbreath, who qualified two horses Thursday to the July 3 Rainbow Derby. "She's had some bad luck in the gates."

Genuine Knockout paid \$4.60, \$3.40, and \$2.80. Ducks Fly Higher was second and paid \$3.80 and \$3.40. Add A Dash was placed third and paid \$5.80. Raised Royally finished third, but was disqualified and placed eighth for interference.

The twin-trifecta carryover pool continues to grow. The pool stands at \$36,702 for Saturday's card. The

feature Saturday is the \$15,000-added Aspen Breeders' Cup Handicap.

There is also a simulcast of the Grade III Trus North Handicap from Belmont Park. The first post time is 1 p.m.







Lincoln senior Olympians win 3 medals

Three Lincoln County women are modeling the latest in exclusive neckwear.

No, it's not fashion jewelry. Dorothy Payne, Virginia Danielson Verna Rodman are wearing medals each won at the second bi-annual U.S. National Senior Olympic games that concluded Saturday in St. Louis, Missouri.

Payne's medal came after an afternoon match that lasted for several hours of 90-degree plus heat and 90-percent humidity in the Missouri sun.

Danielson was one of six New Mexico bowlers who advanced from Wednesday's preliminary play to Thursday's roll off.

Only 30 bowlers made the roll off," said Danielson. "And six were

Of the seven-member Lincoln County delegation, the Carrizozo horseshoe pitchers and Capitan bowler were the only athletes to finish in the medals.

Other senior athletes representing Lincoln County were horseshoe pitcher Bud Payne, bowler Pat Bailey and table tennis players Lester Lanelli and Amy Barton.

Nearly 3,500 athletes from 47 states and four foreign countries competed in 15 events: archery, badminton, bowling, cycling, golf, horseshoes, shuffleboard, softball, swimming, table tennis, tennis, track and field events, volleyball and a 10-K road race.

Athletes must be age 55 or over and compete in six age divisions. All qualified at state and regional meets.

The 157-member New Mexico delegation was the sixth largest attending.

The Rain Frog

You have heard of the Rain Crow. On the dry hot day you will be down by the river when it is just barely running, and you are wondering whether or not it will run dry—then you will hear up in the thickest branches of a river tree, hidden by the leaves that are beginning to wilt just a little, a bird call, halfway in sound between a dove and a crow, "Cuk, Cuk, Coo." Then, maybe in two hours, maybe half a day, or a full day, you will feel a cool breeze drifting to you over mountain horizon, the beautiful white billow outline of a thunder cloud will appear over the mountain; the thunder will mumble

its mellow mountain song, and then the drops will come pattering. During dry June in the land of the Piñon and pine, you and Mother Earth are listening for the song of the Rain Crow.

I have not heard the rain crow's song yet this year, and expect to hear it any time now.

This is being sent to you on June twenty-two, the second day of summer. Yesterday here in the vale was the hottest and driest day of the year, reminding me of the June seventeenth, 1965, the day of the biggest flood in my many years here across the creek.

On that day the heat was up in the mid-nineties, and the east wind

had been blowing for several days. They were rebuilding the highway through the place here and had made me a nice crossing with large culverts.

The river was just barely running from one small pool to another, and the little frogs were there by the edge of their little ponds, saying in Spanish "Agua-AAAAGuaaaa, Aaaaaguuaaaa" (Water Waaaaaterrr. Waaaterrrr)

The Cloudburst

I was standing on my new crossing, very pleased with the world, watching the creek water flow slowly through the moss. Some men were down in the creek bed shaping up the bank. The little frogs kept up their drum-beat of chanting, calling on the rain to hurry and save their creek from going dry. Then I just happened to glance up the vale. Over the mountain was a tall column-shaped cloud, stretching up to the top of the sky.

Something told me that there was a cloudburst up the way; so

telling the men in the bank of the creek to get out. I drove up the highway.

Just as I drove out of "The Narrows" I saw a great wall of water, uprooted trees, small trailer houses, extending from one side of the valley to the other. There was a dull roar and a sound of crashing as trees were broken down.

I turned around in the middle of the highway and drove back down. The highway construction company had their camp right down the river, when I came by there happened to be some state highway fellows right next to the highway near the camp. I shouted to them to get everyone out of there and not try to save anything. Taking me at their word about the onrushing flood, they ran down to the camp.

Back at my gate I called down to the men working practically on the river to get out. They had not paid any attention to me when I had warned them before I started up the creek.

While I was calling to these men, here came a state policeman, who evidently thought I was a foreman, and shouted.

"Get your men out of there. Your camp has already washed away."

I stood on my crossing and watched the flood come crashing and booming down, snapping giant trees as if they had been saplings.

Several times before and a few times since, a warning has suddenly come to just in time. I always heed these messages, and am thankful to God that I got the message to these men in time.

When the river is low and the world seems to be drying up, and the little Rain Frogs are calling, that is the very time a flood may be on the way. The three biggest floods came in time when we are not supposed to get any rain.

Billy the Kid letters on display

Three letters are on display at the Lincoln Historical Center (LHC) which provide insight into the life of Billy the Kid.

Two of the letters are alleged to be written by the Kid himself, but this would have to be confirmed through handwriting analysis.

"The letters don't look like they were written by the same person," said Gary Miller of the Lincoln County Heritage Trust (LCHT).

The first letter is from then territorial Governor Lewis Wallace to General Edward Hatch, notifying the general of the whereabouts of Billy the Kid, explained Bob Hart of LCHT.

The letter was written on the stationery of John H. Tunstall, the English rancher whose murder sparked the Lincoln County Wars, noted Hart.

Apparently the Kid heard about the letter and wrote a response to Gov. Wallace indicating he could provide useful information on the murder of Huston Chapman, Susan McSwane's attorney, in exchange for a pardon, said Hart.

The third letter is also from the Kid while he was in jail in Santa Fe two years later, requesting the pardon he was promised, but never received.

This last letter could have been dictated by the Kid to another person, which was a common arrangement for jail inmates, said Miller.

It is believed Billy the Kid went to school as a boy in Silver City, where he learned to write, which means it is possible he wrote at least one of the letters.

The claim made by a Brushy Bill Roberts, of Hico, Texas, that he was the real Billy the Kid has been discounted because Roberts was il-

literate, Joe Bowlin, of Taiban, New Mexico, said in a previous interview.

The letters came to Lincoln from William Wallace, of Westport, Connecticut, the great-grandson of the late Gov. Wallace.

The letters from Billy the Kid are the only ones attributed to the hero of western lore on display anywhere, said Miller.

Miller also said he was very pleased Wallace had decided to send the letters to Lincoln.

"People coming to the museum are attracted to the letters," he said.

The letters can be seen at the LCHT Museum Center in Lincoln. They have been on display since early May.

filled with the Evans gang as possible, and that meant Roberts.

For some reason history has not been able to explain (the reasons offered have been many), the Regulators were at Blazer's mill eating.

Roberts rode up to the mill and was seen—an easy target, but Brewer asked Frank Coe, who knew Roberts personally, to go out and talk the outlaw into surrendering.

Coe made every attempt to persuade Roberts, saying he didn't stand a chance alone against fifteen. But Roberts, whose one arm was so deformed he could not raise his rifle, refused to surrender.

Charley Bowdre, another Regulator, came out and demanded Roberts give up. The outlaw jumped up to stand his ground and was shot in the belly by Bowdre.

Roberts then retreated into the

mill office where he barricaded himself and soon began to shoot back.

In the first few moments of the battle, Roberts shot off the trigger finger of George Coe, Frank's cousin, and let off enough rounds to make the posse of fifteen retreat.

Lucky for Roberts, he not only had his own gun, but in the office was Blazer's gun and 1,000 rounds of ammunition. It would not have been a long battle except Roberts got off a shot at Brewer just as the Regulator raised his head above a log. Brewer was shot clean between the eyes at a distance of a hundred yards.

With their leader dead, the Regulators became frantic and eventually left. Roberts died the following day and the Blazers buried him next to Brewer.

Though the graves are surrounded by reservation land, the Blazer family still has a lease on the property.

The meeting will be at Sally Black's house in Lincoln, on the river. There will also be gospel music performed by Mandy Morton, of Lincoln.


Barrett is noted for his animated style of storytelling. His tales are captivating to audiences of all ages.

is the slant that gets to you," said Wardwell.

Friday night is Wardwell's first time on the early shift and Berkedal said he has never worked the late shift. Both agreed the two shifts are not the same.

"Six to 10, it doesn't matter, it is the same for all nights, so far," Berkedal said.

He said the officers on the early shift check in with the merchants and do a few security checks after they close. He added there are not a lot of problems on the early shift.

"Ten to two, Friday's are crazy," said Wardwell.

She said one would think Saturday night's would be the most hectic, but Friday nights usually are.

She went on to say there aren't many major problems, usually just a few little fights.

Both officers feel the walking patrols have helped keep minor crimes down in the Midtown area.

"We haven't had as much petty stuff, no vandalism, stuff taken out of cars," Wardwell said, "things like that is has cut down a lot."

Midtown merchants feel the walking patrols are a good idea and they say it makes them feel a little more secure.

"I think it is a good thing for Ruidoso," said Edward Fowler of Win, Place and Show. "because of the fact, if there is going to be a problem, we can turn around and have somebody right on hand immediately."

"And as far as all the cars

parked in Midtown, we don't have a problem now," he said. "Used to, I had to come out and check the parking lot. But now I'm really not worried about it because the police are doing the job. I think it is good and I appreciate them very, very much."

"I believe it is a good idea," said Clyde Barker of the Silver Eagle Trading Post, "they are real friendly."

Lisa Bernard sells roses at night in the three bars and a restaurant in Midtown. She said seeing the police officers on the street makes her smile.

"I think it is great, this is the first time I've seen these guys walking a beat and I feel safe," she said.

"I love it, it makes me feel better to see them out there, you don't know everyone on the street," said Cliff Macsac of Hamburger King.

"By the time we close up and walk to the car," he said, "it is dark and it makes me feel better to have them there."

"There is a certain sense of value in feeling secure and a uniformed police officer makes you feel secure," Macsac said.

Not only are the merchants feeling more secure, but according to the officers, people who have had too much to drink are beginning to notice the presence of the officers.


"They are realizing now on the late shift, if they know they have had a few too many, they're more aware we are out here," said Wardwell. "They are not taking as big of a chance and driving, they are calling and asking for rides."

She said not only is this sense of presence good for the people, it is good for the officers.

"It's good for us because, while everyone else is waiting around for one guy to get a ride, they are saying, man this is really neat, big city police departments don't do that," Wardwell said. "It is just good PR"

According to Chief Newman, the walking patrols will continue until Labor Day. He said at that time he will review the program and one of the things he will consider is if the program be continued throughout the rest of the year.

"We'll look at it after the summer and see if it is needed through the fall and winter months," Newman said.

Petitioners call for election on plans for the old airport land

A petition has been certified by Village Clerk Tammie Maddox which, if enough signatures are obtained, would call for a referendum on the Village Council ordinance leasing the old airport land.

The petition was turned in on Tuesday, June 20, by local attorney Mel O'Reilly.

According to Village Clerk Tammie Maddox in order for a referendum to be called, the petition must be signed by 15 percent of the qualified voters in Ruidoso.

She said there are 2,338 registered voters in the village and the group would need 351 signatures on the petition.

She went on to say the petition must be turned back in to her, with the signatures, within 60 days of the adoption of the ordinance—August 18.

O'Reilly represents Citizens in Action, a group which has said the

Master Plan should be followed in the use of the old airport land.

The group is not opposed to the use of the old airport land, but they are opposed to the proposed golf course and hotel project.

Members of the group believe the terms of the lease are not in the best interest of the village of Ruidoso and the proposed project does not diversify the use of the land.

The petition was filed in response to the Village Council passing an ordinance, during a public hearing on June 19, which called for the village to enter into a contract to lease the old airport land to Colbert Golf, Inc. and SWD Motels, Inc. for a proposed golf course and hotel.

Colbert Golf would construct and operate an 18-hole, 6800-yard championship golf course on the land. SWD Motels would construct and operate a 200-room hotel on the property.

Clarification

Members of the group who submitted a negative referendum petition to call for an election on the proposed development on the old municipal airport land say they did not start circulating that petition until after the ordinance was passed and the wording on the form approved by the municipal clerk.

It was reported in *The News* that efforts were made to obtain signatures to the petition before the council took action on the plan last week.

However, members of the group say they did not ask for signatures before the petition was approved to form.

People walking and exercising on the old airport land said they were contacted by members of the group. Some of those people said they were asked if they would be willing to sign a petition, while others said they were stopped and asked if they knew about the plans.

If signatures had been affixed to the petition before it was approved, they would be invalid.

A spokesperson for petitioners stressed that no signatures were gathered prematurely.

Senators seek funding for a Boots and Saddles trail

A trail linking eight historical forts in New Mexico, including Fort Stanton, is being considered by Congress, as well as other public land bills of interest in the state.

Sen. Jeff Bingaman (D-NM) introduced legislation in March authorizing a study of a "Boots and Saddles Tour," a trail linking forts in New Mexico involved in the Civil War and Indian campaigns, said a news release from the senator's Washington office.

Co-sponsored by Sen. Pete Domenici (R-NM), the trail would connect Fort Stanton, Fort Craig, Fort Cummings, Fort Union, Fort Sumner, Fort Seldon, Fort Bayard

and Fort McRae.

Representative Joe Skeen also is backing the Boots and Saddles Tour legislation.

"If established, the tour would promote tourism by allowing visitors to enjoy the forts in New Mexico by automobile, foot, and even on horseback, and would also result in increased protection for the forts," said the release.

The Senate Energy Subcommittee on Public Lands, National Parks and Forests heard testimony on Wednesday on the legislation, as well as other New Mexico land bills.

Larry Woodard, state director of

the Bureau of Land Management of Santa Fe, was scheduled to testify in support of the Boots and Saddles Tour.

Chuck Bernhard, executive director of the Carlsbad Department of Development Corporation, was scheduled to testify on a bill introduced by Bingaman to establish a cave research institute at Carlsbad Caverns National Park.

Bernhard also planned to speak on another Bingaman bill authorizing a study on ways to protect and interpret the Lechuguilla Cave at the park.

Dan Dee Cabins—still going strong at 51 years

Life was a little primitive in 1938 in Ruidoso considering today's standards.

Dan Swearingin, whose father, Dr. D.D. Swearingin, a Roswell eye, ear, nose and throat specialist, built Dan Dee Modern Cabins that year, remembers the early years.

The elder Swearingin built the cabins on Main Road in the Upper

Canyon so that his teen-age son would have something to do in the summer months. Dan Swearingin was 15 years old when he managed the cabins which were the first commercial cabins in Ruidoso to have indoor plumbing. His mother was in the background to help him with the management chore.

Dan Dee Modern Cabins also had the first neon sign in Ruidoso. This was in a time period when the power company shut off power during the daylight hours in the village; there was no power from 10:30 p.m. until 6 a.m., either, Swearingin recalls.

The Swearingins kept proceeds from cabin rentals in a Prince Albert tobacco tin inside an old radio.

This is in a day when Dr. Swearingin charged \$2 for an office call and \$3 for a house call.

The current owners of Dan Dee Cabins, Clark and Anita Carpenter, are fascinated by the early history of the complex. The original cabins still are in use. Furniture fashioned by Dan Swearingin and the late Cap Cowan—who lived directly across the river—is still in use in some of the cabins.

In the early days special arrangements had to be made for electricity if a housewife had ironing to do at midday. Another oddity was that guests at motels almost always brought their own mattresses and bedclothes. There were no commercial laundry facilities in the village.

Telephone service was atrocious, Swearingin remembers.

People would place a call at the telephone company office and then have to wait hours for the call to go through. Many times the calls didn't go through.

On "heavy weekends" like July 4, "stores would run out of bread and milk," Swearingin recalls. Since the power was off during the daylight hours, people would run out of water because their submersible pumps couldn't operate.

Still people flocked to Ruidoso, especially during the war years of 1942-45.

Servicemen from Roswell Army Air Field (later Walker Air Force Base), Cannon Air Force Base, Clovis, Alamogordo Bombing Range (later Holloman Air Force Base) and Fort Bliss at El Paso, Texas,

crowded into Ruidoso.

But after Labor Day, the town emptied—completely. The village was shut down until spring for all practical purposes.

Oh, there was a ski area up Cedar Creek, and Hull's bowling alley near what is now Mechem and Sudderth stayed open along with a restaurant in that area.

Ruidoso had open, illegal gambling, during all those early years. Poker row was the street just north of what is now Sudderth. Law enforcement practically didn't exist. Slot machines were everywhere. This condition continued until Gov. Ed Mechem shut down gambling in New Mexico about 1951. Red River also had open, illegal gambling.

Originally, Swearingin had offices across from what is the old Whispering Pines Restaurant. That office has long since been torn down.

After serving in the infantry in Europe during World War II, Swearingin returned to Dan Dee in 1945.

The Swearingin family purchased The Singing Pines cabins right after the war. There were six cabins on the river and six on Whir-

laway Drive. By that time, Dan Dee had 16 cabins, making a grand total of 28 cabins.

Amelia Church had built Singing Pines in 1923, for \$4,000 for 12 cabins. She sold them to Swearingin over 20 years later for the same amount.

Mrs. Church was the widow of Josh Church. She was a Bolton whose family came to Lincoln in 1872, long before the Lincoln County War. Her father worked for the Murphy-Dolan store in Lincoln. Mrs. Church lived to be very old.

There was no indoor plumbing in the Singing Pines cabins in the 1920s and 1930s. These were added later.

Swearingin operated all cabins out of one office for a time, but that became too much. The Singing Pines cabins were soon put under separate management.

The grocery store in town was the Alta Vista. A Mrs. Doughty bought her groceries wholesale from the famous Titsworth wholesale outlet in Capitan.

Accounting was simple. She would order groceries throughout the summer. At the end of the sea-

son, she would take inventory. She paid the difference between everything she had ordered all summer and what she had on the shelves, which she returned to Titsworth.

In 1938, cabins were rented for \$20 per week, with \$1 extra for linens if desired. It wasn't until 1943 that the owner started pricing cabins with linens.

A man by the name of Maurice J. Boretz upset the economic balance in the motel-hotel industry in Ruidoso in 1938. He built the Navajo Lodge and charged \$8 per day per person. "American plan," Swearingin recalls.

"This was unreal," Swearingin says. Boretz was quoted as saying early in World War II, "If the war keeps going, I'll be a rich man."

Swearingin operated Dan Dee Cabins (the Modern had been dropped years before) until 1953, when they were sold to Jesse and Eva Pertect, Tommy Pertect's parents.

Later they were sold to Col. Ken Knapp, then to Mike Waldron, and, 10 years ago to Clark and Anita Carpenter.

Clark Carpenter came from Fort Stockton, Texas. He was brought to Ruidoso by his parents at an early age; the family stayed at Dan Dee Cabins.

"I feel we have been good stewards of the property," Carpenter says. They are an experience for the visitors. We try to do everything to see that they have a good time."

A member of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, Clark Carpenter comes by that naturally. He was executive vice president of the Chamber of Commerce in Oklahoma's third largest city, Lawton, for many years.

He says he wearied of "trying to please so many people."

Anita is originally from El Paso, Texas. They met in the choir of the First Baptist Church of Ruidoso.

The Carpenters have expanded Dan Dee Cabins to 13 separate, independent cabins, including a "honeymoon cottage." The acreage has grown from the original four to six and a half acres.

In the early days, people would come to Ruidoso and stay for two weeks or many weeks.

The automobiles, Swearingin says, "has made Ruidoso into a weekend town."



Mary Maul, project director, for the MainStreet Ruidoso project, can be seen just about any day making the rounds of Midtown, working with the merchants to transform the project area into a beautiful and vital force. She says MainStreet members have dubbed her MainStreet Mary. And that's OK with Mary, who invests huge amounts of time and energy in her job.

MainStreet Ruidoso is a public/private partnership funded through a combination of local, state and federal grants and individual pledges. And that coordinated effort is working, as shown in part through the way Midtown Ruidoso buildings have filled up this summer with new and old businesses, providing a busy look to Midtown and producing new jobs.

The brightly colored banners that wave from poles through the MainStreet project area are a visible sign of the organization's activities, with surveys, architectural design assistance and other projects always going on behind the scenes. The new faces on several Midtown businesses, as well as the observation deck at The Gazebo are MainStreet-inspired.

Started by Lieutenant Governor Mike Rannels, New Mexico MainStreet has grown and expanded under Lieutenant Governor Jack Stahl. And the action-oriented program has avoided the usual government agency pitfall of adding more employees and establishing a bureaucratic base. With just an executive director, architect and one secretary, MainStreet is working to revitalize downtowns all over New Mexico.

It's working, and it's working on a shoestring. MainStreet Ruidoso has a budget of just \$42,000.

It just shows what a dynamic project director and a dedicated and energetic group of volunteers can do with a well-developed and well-managed program of work.

DEAR EDITOR:
We are recent retirees to the Ruidoso area from California and we love it.
One of the attractions that originally sold us on the area was the good medical care locally available. However, recently we have become aware of a disturbing trickle of departures by some of the better doctors and nurses, apparently largely because of morale and other problems at the local hospital.
At a time when Ruidoso is

making a determined effort to attract new visitors and residents, and in particular retirees, this drain and the underlying reasons for it seem at best unfortunate. The hospital board, whose responsibility it is to maintain the best level of care possible consistent with not just available but also expected funding, should take note that if this level is high, retirees will come, bringing with them the patronage required to maintain or even improve that level. The converse is

equally true—as that level declines, so will the retiree influx and the level of patronage.
Another thought with regard to the attraction of retirees—who, it should be duly noted, have considerably higher than average incomes and would also provide a year-round, not just a seasonal, economic impact is that they are unlikely to be attracted by a new \$99 million (!!) railroad, a resort hotel, or another golf course. On the other hand, many with tastes like ours

might well find the idea of a local performing arts center—with emphasis on classical music (perhaps featuring a regular summer festival here in these beautiful mountains?)—an almost irresistible lure. I have heard that such a possibility is in the works, and am hoping it will turn out to be true. We personally would be more than willing to work for such a proposal in any way we could.
