## Blaze destroys 50 acres

A fire, apparently started by an electrical short, burned between 40 and 50 acres of grass, brush and timber on the old Blood Ranch, northwest of Ruidoso, Thursday afternoon.

Cindy Hatley, who lives on the ranch, said she and some others were trying to hook up an electrical line to a nearby mobile home, but they kept blowing fuses. She said her son saw sparks from the electrical line get into nearby trees.

The fire was reported by Monjeau Lookout at around 3 p.m. Thursday.

According to Steve Makowski, local Fire Management Officer with the U.S. Forest Service, only about 10 acres were involved when firefighters first arrived.

However, strong winds began moving the fire in a west northwest direction and fire officials were worried it might get over into the Eagle Creek area.

"It's unusual to have one move west on us," Makowski said, "they usually move east."

Additional calls were sent out to activate more fire fighting crews to help fight the blaze.

A couple of bulldozers and a helicopter capable of dropping

water on the fire, were called in from Mescalero, as was the Mescalero Hot Shot crew. The local Hot Shot crew was off fighting a fire in the Coronado National Forest.

A fire bomber, out of Carlsbad, was also called to make several runs over the fire.

Eventually fire fighting units from the U.S. Forest Service, New Mexico State Forestry, Mescalero, Village of Ruidoso, Bonito Volunteer Fire Department, Capitan Volunteer Fire Department, Nogal Fire Department, Village of Ruidoso Downs Volunteer

## Questions are raised over village attorney selection

Questions concerning the Village of Ruidoso's selection process for a village legal adviser may prompt one local attorney to file a protest.

Attorney Robert Beauvais, who submitted one of the seven proposals considered, said he may file a protest with the village purchasing office.

Beauvais said he is concerned a set of rules and procedures were not followed by the council in its selection of a village attorney.

The Ruidoso Village Council voted on June 30, to retain John Underwood as the village attorney. The vote was four to one, with Councillor Tom McNeil voting "no," saying he believes the council should take the low bid. However, in the process the village used, the council is not required to take the low bid.

The village sent out a request for proposals for legal services. In the request for proposals, the following things were asked of each attorney:

—the hourly rate for legal services for attorneys, together with a description of the method for charging fractional portions of an hour.

—the method for charging for out-of-town village business other than court.

—the method of charging for expenses, such as photocopies, long distance, mileage and other such items commonly called expenses in the legal profession.

—the hourly rates, if any, charged for staff, secretarial or para-legal services, if any.

—a detailed description of the firm's expertise in local government, if any, and identification of the person or persons within the firm who will be primarily responsible for village representation.

—a detailed description of the firm's overall experience and practice.

—a detailed description of office facilities and support staff resources.

—a detailed description of the

firm's familiarity with the working of the Village of Ruidoso city government.

—a sample contract the applicant would offer to the village in the event the applicant is the successful proposal.

Seven attorneys and their firms sent in proposals, and these proposals were rated according to a tabulation system devised by village manager Frank Potter, division head Leon Eggleston and finance director John Varley. The rating scale was outlined in the request for proposal for the council members.

The attorneys were rated on five different categories from the information they sent in with their proposals. One category was their hourly rate, out-of-town village business charges, expenses and secretarial/para-legal charges.

The other categories were general reputation and experience, local government experience, facilities

## EDCLC announces industrial prospect

The Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County has a letter of intent from an electronics industrial prospect who will move a small but expanding manufacturing and assembly operation to Ruidoso if certain conditions are met.

The prospect is a company called Warp Speed which produces light pens for computers plus other electronic hardware and software devices.

The letter of intent is signed by

the president of the four-year-old concern, Craig M. Rawlings.

Rawlings told *The Ruidoso News* Friday that as soon as "credit financing like we have here is in place, we will move. The banking connection is most important."

He is working with Ronnie Paulsen, president of the First National Bank of Ruidoso.

Details concerning the company were outlined to EDCLC board members Thursday during a monthly meeting. Carroll N. "Buddy" Bundick, president of the board, gave details on the company

operation which currently is in Culver City, California.

EDCLC executive director George Puckett was in Santa Fe with a prospect, Bundick explained in making Puckett's report.

Light pens are a computer peripheral input device used to control and operate a computer by touching the pen to the selected command on the screen.

The company manufactures or assembles seven hardware and four software products, most aimed at the health and medical industry.

"Our primary target is large hos-


pitals, although we have a couple of large airlines as customers," Rawlings said.

In an outline of company operations, the company says it is negotiating a contract with IBM to become a business partner. Rawlings said his company is a supplier to Tandy Radio Shack stores.

Paulger told the EDCLC board he has checked the financial statement of the company and that "it is making a profit."

The company is looking for a site




## Accident

## Straight Reality claims Jockey Club stakes

Straight Reality won the \$12,175 Jockey Club Handicap Saturday, his second stakes win of the 1989 Ruidoso Downs season. Straight Reality also won the Memorial Day Handicap. Also on Saturday's card, Sweet Relief won an Invitational Handicap for Quarter Horses.

Straight Reality's victory was his third in seven starts. He has won \$30,065 in 1989. Straight Reality has also won the Sunland Parr Derby and was placed third in the Riley Allison Derby in 1989. Regular rider Mike Lidberg was aboard for owners Victor T. Vicki (who also serves as trainer) and Ann McCabe of Ruidoso Downs. In his most recent race before the Jockey Club Handicap, Straight Reality was a well-beaten fifth in an Invitational Handicap on June 25. Both trainer Vicki and jockey Lidberg could not understand that loss.

"That race is still a puzzle with me," Vicki said. "He's in fine form."

Saturday, Straight Reality sat behind the leaders on the backstretch, moved up on the turn, and held off a late charge by Loose Lips Cash for the win. Straight Reality paid \$8.80, \$5.60 and \$4.40. Loose Lips Cash paid \$5.60 and \$3.60. Stewing Sid paid \$6.20 to show.

Sweet Relief, who was winless in six starts, surprised a field of 10 in a \$5,500 Invitational Handicap Saturday by paying \$53.40 to win. Ridden by Larry Layton, Sweet Relief ran the 400 yards in 19.79 seconds. She paid \$53.40, \$25.40 and \$5.80. Ossetra was second and paid \$9.60 and \$5. Okeydokey

Baby, the favorite, was worth \$3.80 to show.

Sweet Relief had not been better than third in four Ruidoso outings before Saturday. Earlier this spring, she was third in the Grade III Bandera Derby.

"She was sick (earlier in the year) and she normally doesn't like more than 350 yards," said trainer Bobby Willis. "Getting her out of the gates was the difference. When she gets out, she runs well."

## Large Sunday crowd sees Elaina Rae capture \$5,000 allowance

Elaina Rae, who was second in the 1987 All American Futurity to Elans Special, ran away from the field Sunday to win a \$5,000 allowance.

Sunday's attendance and handle were up substantially over 1988's figures. A crowd of 5,132 wagered \$503,619 on Sunday's races, an increase of 33 and 23 percent respectively from 1988's figures.

Larry Layton, who has been aboard for the mare's last four races, said she broke slowly.

"She was behind for about 150 yards, and then kicked in and pulled away," said Layton.

Winning trainer Robert Turner, who also won the July 3 Rainbow Derby with See Me Do It, said the filly will run in August's All American Gold Cup Trials. Elaina Rae ran the 400 yards in 19.94 seconds.

She paid \$6.20, \$3.80 and \$3.20. Mr Master Jet paid \$9.20 and \$4.80. Playboy Special paid \$4.40 to show.

Elaina Rae has won over \$378,000 in her career. She has won 6 of 15 career starts. El Rayito won Sunday's co-feature allowance by a head. Currirot was second in his 112th career start. Both of the horses are trained by J. Doyal Roberts.

"That's the best he's run in a while," said Roberts of El Rayito. "I knew that when he got that far in front, he'd be hard for Currirot to catch."

El Rayito, ridden by Mike Lidberg, paid \$8.60, \$4.80 and \$3. Currirot paid \$3.60 and \$2.40. Bueno Ammisita paid \$2.40 to show.

**Racing wrapup**

**Former jockey finds a new life after injury and heartbreak**

It took eight years, but former jockey Dwight Menix can finally joke about his lifeless right arm.

His blue eyes brighten and he breaks into a wide grin when he talks about kidding friends that it would be useless for a barroom usher to stamp the waxen, dangling arm.

"I told them that nobody's going to be able to see the stamp anyway," Menix said. "They started to laugh and then one of them said that this is really not funny. I told him that if I can't laugh about it, I wouldn't want him to laugh about it. But I can laugh about it now."

It was a long time coming. Menix, a 27-year-old native of Lamesa, Texas, lost the use of his right arm while riding his third career race at Sunland Park near El Paso, Texas when he was 19.

Angry and withdrawn, he endured a battle with alcohol, an unhappy nine-month marriage, a nearly fatal truck wreck and an attachment to the nerve-dead arm.

But the anger, the alcohol, the unhealthy attachment to the arm and the failed marriage are past. Menix has a job as an assistant trainer at Ruidoso Downs, has decided to have his right arm replaced by a prosthesis, he has recently completed two semesters of college and plans to become an attorney.

"I just said that's it. One day I said no more and I've never picked another drink up. But I didn't really need it, I just did it. I wanted to stay numb."

Menix said he remembers only that the filly he was riding at Sunland on May 1, 1981 was making her first lifetime start and that down the backstretch swerved into the inside rail. However, he obtained a video tape of the accident to assist in a lawsuit against the track and has no qualms about watching it.

"You can see my arm hit the rail and I keep going," he said. "It looks like it stretched my arm out about two feet longer than what it is."

Menix said he broke nine bones, including ribs, collar bone, shoulder blade and arm. Worse, he ruptured an artery and nearly bled to death.

"Some people say I died and came back," he said. "I was in the operating room twelve hours getting a nine-inch plastic tube in there. For three or four days I don't remember anything. I don't even know if I was unconscious."

Cliff Lambert, the horse's trainer, said that emergency room doctors did not realize that Menix was bleeding internally. He said Menix would have died had not Lambert's wife, Glenna, called noted El Paso cardiologist Dr. Joe Kidd. The doctor hastily examined Menix and recommended the surgery that probably saved his life.

"If my wife hadn't gotten that doctor, he would have died," Lambert said.

Menix, released from the hospital some three weeks later, spent much of the next year being exam-

ined by specialists in three states. All told him the same thing. He would never regain the use of his right arm. Simple things like writing a check and tying a shoelace suddenly became difficult if not impossible.

"It was frustrating, but I wasn't angry at the accident," he said. "I was angry that it happened and the doctors couldn't fix it. I always knew that was the chance I had to take, going down. I always knew it would happen, I just didn't know it would be so bad. After it happened, I just got mad at the world."

Menix refused rehabilitation and said he began to drink heavily. He insulted friends and family. Once, friends noticed that a splint on the injured arm had caused a deep infected sore and tried to convince him to have it treated. He asked them to leave his apartment and withdrew into his room.

"I was too scared to go to the doctor," he said. "I was afraid I would lose my arm right then. I don't know if it was despair, anger or what. I would just bite people's heads off for no reason. I didn't want anybody to care because I didn't."

In March, 1985, he won a \$1.5 million out of court settlement from Sunland Park which has since installed a wide padded safety rail. On May 19, 1986, he married a person he refuses to name. Nine months later, the marriage ended. With it, he said, went much of the settlement.

"I got taken for a lot of money," he said. "But she didn't take it. I just dished it out. But I loaned a lot of money to a lot of people and never got it back."

He said that after the divorce, the drinking got even worse. Early in the evening of April 23, 1987, Menix and a former friend left a Ruidoso bar for the friend's home in Arizona. Both had been drinking heavily in the bar all afternoon and near Magdalena, New Mexico, Menix fell asleep at the wheel.

The friend was badly burned, broke a vertebrae in his neck and nearly died. Menix broke the femur bone in his left leg and underwent surgery to have a rod inserted. He also tore his forehead open so widely his face still bears a long horse-shoe shaped scar. The friend sued, and according to Menix, collected \$275,000 from him personally.


Menix drank heavily after the wreck, but about five months later decided enough was enough.

"I just woke up one morning with my seventh hangover of the week," he said. "I just said the hell with this."

He says he has not drunk since that day. Last fall he enrolled in New Mexico State University at Alamogordo. He began going to church and was recently confirmed as a Lutheran.

"It wasn't like a big light shined or drums or thunder or anything," he said. "It was a gradual thing. I just started going to church and things started picking up."

He got a job working for trainer Matt Farmer who now considers

him his top assistant.

"His attitude and capabilities are just amazing," Farmer said. "I've never seen anybody as dedicated. After you're around him for a while, you're the one that feels handicapped—mentally. There is not a doubt in my mind he'll achieve his goal."

Farmer, who trains 16 horses, said that Menix can clean a stall and put the saddle and bridle on horses. Ruidoso Downs jockey Mike Lidberg, who shares an apartment with Menix, said Menix is easy to get along with these days.

"He's been through a lot," Lidberg said. "He had turned away from everybody. It's nice to see him back."

Menix said he will go back to college this fall and carry a full schedule of courses. He said he plans to have the lifeless arm replaced by a prosthesis as soon as he save enough money.

"Now I look back and say, 'you were sure dumb,'" he said. "Those people were just concerned. I thought I had all the answers. But I was a fool. I'm not going to do anything like that again."

Menix, still jockey size at 110 pounds, said he misses racing every day. It hurts, he said, because he lost his career in its infancy and never had the chance to learn how good he could have been. Now he can only wonder.

Still, self pity has been replaced by confidence.

"When I made up my mind that part of my life was done, it was done," he said with determination before smiling.

"I'm wearing out my guardian angel."

Scott Muhn is the manager; his father, Jack Muhn, is one of the new owners and is active in the business recently purchased from Bill Jones.


Scott Muhn says some new services are being instituted for the convenience of Ruidoso area residents and visitors.

Pan-O-Rama's hours are 10 a.m. to 10 p.m. Sunday through Thursday, and 10 a.m. to 11 p.m. Fridays and Saturdays.

Holiday Carpet Golf, on Sudderth across from the Lincoln County Medical Center charges \$3 for adults, and \$2.50 for children 12 years and under.

Holiday Golf is in a garden setting with trees, shrubs and flowers throughout the course.

Rainbow Lake Fun Park has a variety of amusements available, including miniature golf.

The Executive Golf Course at Rainbow is \$2.75 per person.



within Ruidoso.

Initial employment would be six employees with a projection of 16 to 20 by year's end.

Rawlings said there are several reasons the company is seeking a move. Competition for competent, trainable employees in the Los Angeles area is "fierce," he said. "We can't afford to compete."

Another factor is real estate. Employees can't afford to be home owners in the Los Angeles market.

Key employees have agreed to the move because "they can own their own places," he said.

Rawlings said he has figured his overhead would drop 5.8 percent immediately upon a move to Ruidoso.

That would result from lower rent, lower utilities and lower overhead costs generally.

"We don't require much space," he said. Product distribution would be by UPS or mail. The boxed light pens weigh only a pound, he said.

The company has been operating at a 15 percent profit margin. Gross sales in 1986 were \$104,299, while as of March of this year, the figure for the previous year was \$408,325.

Rawlings said that, because of markets opening up, he expects to see that figure double, as a minimum, within a year. He owns 90 percent of the stock in the company.

He learned about Ruidoso because a minority stockholder had retired and is buying a place in Ruidoso, he said.

Rawlings was reading the Los Angeles Business Journal and saw an ad by EDCLC. He said he thought to himself that Ruidoso is where his stockholder friend was moving. He said he decided to check out Ruidoso on that basis.

"Our company can locate anywhere we want it," he said. He commented that both he and his wife were impressed by the amenities

found in Ruidoso, the restaurant and service industries. He said such amenities only are found in big cities generally.

Rawlings is from Preston, Idaho, and is a graduate of Idaho State University.

In other EDCLC business, Bundick said some 40 economic development people from across the state will gather at Carrizo Lodge July 19 for a two-day "Idea and Business Quarter Meeting." The EDCLC will host a reception the first evening.

Board members were urged to attend a Monday county commission meeting where budgets will be considered.

County Commissioner and EDCLC board member Karon Petty pointed out that the 1990 census operation is very important to Lincoln County regarding funding.

She said the percentage of minorities in counties determines to some extent the level of financing through development grants and such.

She indicated that the county commission could organize solicitation of information for the census although no funds have been earmarked at the federal level or in the county budget.

The EDCLC is facing a financial crisis as the county has indicated that funding may be drastically reduced because of other demands on public funds.

Bundick said there is no matching money from the state this year, that funding is "going to regional entities."

"We did apply," he said.

Petty said CDBG (Community Development Block Grants) people threw out applications by Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs and that Capitan, Corona and Carrizozo were "rated real low" for such grants.

"The census is real important for future funding," she declared.

# Cree Meadows elects new directors

Stockholders of Cree Meadows Country Club, at an annual meeting at the club, re-elected Leo Mitchell to the board of directors and elected two new members to fill expired terms.

Elected were Bill Wooley and Jack Warlick to replace Mary LeCrone and Tony Parker whose terms expired June 30.

The new board members join Charlie Griffin, president; Bill Payne, vice president; Judith Howard, secretary; Ted Durham, treasurer, and Mike Massey and Clarence Pollard, directors.

Pollard was recently selected to fill an unexpired term on the board.

During the meeting, the new Cree Meadows manager, Rick Riddle, was introduced.

Originally from Oklahoma, Riddle spent the years since junior high in Tucson, Arizona. He played on the University of Arizona golf team and eventually became a golf professional. His first job was at Pinehurst, North Carolina.

Riddle worked for eight years with the Club Corporation of America, and for the past seven years was in real estate sales in Tucson.

During the two months he has been in Ruidoso, Riddle said he has witnessed a "love for the club" on the part of many stockholders and members.

Much of the meeting Monday morning was spent in devising a way to incorporate amendments into by-laws. A new set of by-laws was approved by the stockholders but will not go into effect until members can suggest amendments, through July 15.

After July 15, the board of directors will have 90 days to submit a revised set of by-laws to the membership.

On the financial side, Griffin said the corporation now has a long-term loan after renegotiation with a local bank.

The bank asked that a "watchdog" committee be named to review club operations each month. Griffin said a committee has been appointed and is designed to consist of three board members and three stockholders at large.

The club was affected severely financially by the faltering economy in Ruidoso, according to information provided at the meeting.

Mike Massey, chairman of the finance committee, reported that gross sales are up at the pro shop by 23 percent. The net profit from

golf, he said, is up 52 percent.

He said a lot and a half were sold.

"We made a few dollars," he said, adding utilities, salaries and insurance premiums are all up. The club operated in the red the past six months.

Stockholders were urged to sell memberships. A special task force has been working on selling memberships, with 51 shares sold since the first of the year, stockholders were told.

The stockholders were advised that the club grounds are being surveyed for location of a new putting green.

The present putting green is owned privately since a B.J. Aday of Portales purchased the land (about two lots) from the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation.

Griffin said the club has offered the owner a 33 percent profit in an offer to purchase the land, but Aday declined.

Under deed restrictions, the land can't be used for any other commercial purpose, and no structures can be erected on it, Griffin said.

Aday served written notice recently to the club not to let anyone use the putting green, but later agreed verbally that it could be used through July 4.

That parcel of land, Griffin said, was inadvertently omitted in the legal description when the FDIC was involved after Moncor foreclosed on the property. The FDIC subsequently offered the small parcel of land for sale.

# Lincoln County Landfill Committee reviews 7 inquiries

The Landfill Advisory Committee (LFAC) received seven responses from parties either interested in operating a landfill for the county, or having land available for sale or lease to the county for a landfill.

Of the seven, six were offering land in Lincoln County in parcels between 200 and 300 acres, it was announced during a meeting of the LFAC Friday.

Most of the sites were in the Carrizozo area. One was near Glencoe.

One response came from Tri Sect Landfill in Valencia County, a site already permitted under the new Environmental Improvement Division (EID) regulations.

The responses were turned over to the technical sub-committee for review before the next meeting of the LFAC at 1 p.m. Friday, July 14, at the Lincoln County Sub-Office in Ruidoso.

The LFAC listed five options on how Lincoln County could meet its solid waste needs. They are:

—The county owns or leases the land at the site, and operates the landfill.

—The county owns the land at the site, and a private enterprise operates the landfill.

—The county leases the land at the site, and a private enterprise operates the landfill.

—Solid waste is transported out of the county and there is no landfill in the county.

—Lincoln County negotiates with other area counties on a regional landfill site.

Steve Green, representing the international waste disposal corporation, Browning-Ferris Industries (BFI), said it may be in Lincoln County's best interest to transport waste out of the county.

He said landfill operating costs are dispersed over the population, and because of the county's sparse population, residents here probably would experience a greater cost burden than in an urban area.

Green also said, even if the county only owns or leases the land, and a private enterprise operates the site, the county can still be held liable for anything brought into the site.

The LFAC has not made up its mind which option it will choose. It is planned for the next meeting that after all the responses have been reviewed, specific requests for proposals (RFPs) will be written and bids accepted.

Once an RFP is advertised, the process must remain open for 30 days.

County manager Nick Pappas, also the chairman of the LFAC, noted that time is the most important consideration.

The present landfill site operating near the airport will remain

open under a contract between the county and the Village of Ruidoso until at least September 6.

At that time, Lincoln County must have a replacement site ready for operation, said former county attorney J. Robert Beauvais at the last LFAC meeting.

Whether or not the county wants to operate a landfill or privatize the operation, the county must be involved in the start-up phase of a new site.


Local EID official Jim Edwards said Governor Garrey Carruthers issued a moratorium on opening new landfill sites, which means a new site must be replacing one already in existence.

Because Lincoln County was the party registered under the old Fort Stanton landfill, the county must be involved in some manner with any new facility, he said.

This means the county cannot simply drop its responsibility in providing a landfill and allow a private corporation to come to Lincoln County and start a new site.

One of the possibilities, said Pappas, is for the county to open a new site, and then transfer the site to a private corporation after it has been in operation.

Pappas also said the LFAC has not precluded any of the options at this time. Options will be eliminated when the RFPs are written during the next meeting.

Fire Department, Lincoln Fire Department and Fort Stanton Fire Department were all involved in fighting the blaze.

Makowski said Forest Service personnel estimated there were 200 people fighting the fire from the different agencies.

"That's the great part about all of this, everyone pitches in and helps each other," said Ruidoso Fire Chief Virgil Reynolds.

The main problem fighting the fire was the lack of water. The larger pumper trucks were used to

transfer water to the smaller trucks. A holding tank of water was set up for the trucks to fill their tanks from.

Bill Rosler, a relief pilot from Fresno, California, who was replacing the regular pilot during his days off, said he estimated he made about 40 trips between Alto lake and the fire, dropping 140 gallons of water on the fire each time.

Some residents, campers and hikers were evacuated from the Eagle Creek area around 8:50 p.m. State Police and a Lincoln County deputy sheriff were stationed at the intersection of Highway 48 and Ski

Run Road.

State Police officer Michael Howard said most of the people were out of the area, but they were allowing some people to go back in and look after pets and animals.

By 7 p.m., firefighters had contained the fire and were beginning to mop up the hot spots. Firefighters would remain in the area all night and all day Friday.

Chief Reynolds said a three-man crew from Ruidoso remained all night with one of the trucks and a relief crew replaced them Friday morning and would stay all day.

and staff and knowledge of Village of Ruidoso legal matters.

The Village Council was given this rating tabulation and then interviewed the candidates for village attorney.

Beauvais said he was concerned that the proposal specifications which were originally set forth in the request for proposal appeared to have changed after the proposal amounts were made public. He was also concerned that once the proposals were opened and the amounts for legal services known to all attorneys, that negotiations might have taken place.

Village manager Frank Potter said he asked the members of the council if any negotiations had taken place during the interview and they all said none had.

Beauvais said he is evaluating whether he should file the protest and said if he does it will be this

week. He said he was ranked second overall in the evaluation process and the only applicant whose proposal amount was within the amount budgeted by the council for legal services in fiscal year 1989-90.

Beauvais said he hopes a resolution can be found which will please all parties involved, but if one can't his only recourse is in District Court.

Underwood, who has represented the village for the past four years, is a member of the firm of Underwood, Dutton and Griffin Ltd. He will charge the village \$85 an hour for legal services.

# Artist creates a magical world in the Hondo Valley

A visit to the San Patricio studio/home of artist Linda Miller is like a headlong tumble into a multi-colored kaleidoscope.

Miller, with the energy of a dynamo and the calm spirit of a gentle cloud, captures the full gamut of emotions in her art. And that enigmatic range is evident throughout Miller's San Patricio property—from the horse barns to Miller's comfortable home.

A trip to the Miller home, tucked away in a garden setting off U.S. Highway 70, starts with a walk down primrose lane. That's right—the brick walk from the drive to the adobe studio is lined with a profusion of hot pink primroses.

Dressed in boots, jeans and a cowboy hat, Miller met us at the car to lead a whirlwind tour through the home and studio she built herself.

But first, we took time for an introduction to Lily, the longhaired sheep who loves to eat geraniums and primroses. The lovely Lily has posed for the artist, and is featured in some of her work. She came out of her house long enough to get acquainted and have a fragrant and, apparently, tasty floral snack.

"Lily came to live with me when she was a week old ... she thought she was a dog," said Miller, laughing when she recalled how the dainty sheep used to chase cars.

Lily is part of an unusual menagerie of wild and domestic animals that roam the San Patricio Miller land. These creatures inspire, and even pose, for some of Miller's intricately detailed works.

On the door of the studio is a bird's nest, unoccupied this year, but the home of a family of birds last year. Having that tiny family living on her front door made getting in and out of her studio a complicated process, recalls Miller.

Bird nests, with their complex designs and sophisticated engineering, are one of the artist's fascina-

tions. Her picture of a robin's nest with its blue eggs has been one of Miller's most popular prints.

In her studio, on a rough wooden table, is a line of various bird nests. Miller said she takes just one nest each year to use in her work, and repays the birds by feeding them all year long. The birds seem to feel their welcome there, for along the side of Miller's studio is a line of 70 barn swallow nests.

So far this year, Miller has used 55 pounds of sugar to keep the multitude of hummingbirds that hover in her area well fed.

Miller's find last year was a tiny hummingbird nest, one that she is recreating on canvas. The artist says she paints simple things, and recreates them in emotional details that she can't capture by painting from a photograph.

That's why, she depends on the animals she paints to pose for her. And they do.

The fast-moving Miller told how she quietly and calmly tempted a hummingbird to light on her ring and pose there for sketching. The beautiful little bird returned for four days, said Miller.

Scarlet O'Hare, a lush gray rabbit who lives in a hutch outside Miller's studio, also posed for her portrait which the artist named "Just a Hare."

The painting of Scarlet was hard to let go, but Miller said the buyer loved it so much, she had to have it.

"I feel like I have been given a gift to share with people," said the artist.

Miller has a great rapport with animals, and said when she paints her animals, they sit quietly on a wooden pedestal.

One of two chicks she was painting felt so relaxed with Miller that the little bird fell asleep on the pedestal and fell over on its side.

A sketch of a brand new colt hangs on one wall of the bright, airy studio. The life-size drawing is so realistic that it fooled a group of adult horses when it was carried out into the fields.

The talent that Miller has for painting animals was spotted 19 years ago by her mentor, Henriette Wyeth. Miller said Wyeth predicted she would become famous for her animal paintings.

That prediction is coming true, and Miller is enjoying more and more recognition for her work. All the pieces she has under way now are already sold.

"I have sold everything off my easel the last three years," said Miller, noting that she doesn't paint to sell.

"It's always been a great drive that I have ... some inward drive," she added. Miller, who is being featured soon in New Mexico Magazine, and whose studio was included in a tour last month sponsored by the Roswell Inn, admits that her popular success gives her a good feeling.

Miller doesn't limit her creations to animal likenesses, and her studio bears witness to her eclectic interests and tastes.

"You don't have to paint something beautiful," said Miller, who finds beauty in the most mundane.

For instance, "Migration Ended" is the stark and touching picture of a dead robin in the snow.

"It shows that death is not really the end," said Miller of the painting that moves many to tears. "You can tell how it struggled," she added, looking quietly at the stark picture of the fallen robin.

A jewel among the various objects in Miller's studio is a little pony she found at a carousel show in Rapid City, South Dakota. The pony was not for sale, but Miller was so drawn to it that the owner gave her the quaint little pony before she left.

Miller said the former owner knew the pony was made in Germany and was brought to the United States from England before the turn of the century. She later traced the origins of the wooden pony to one of a matched pair belonging to the crown prince of Germany.

Tossed over a screen in the studio is an antique lace wedding gown, its ivory tones mellow in the lights that come through the large windows that form most of one wall. Hanging in the studio are an assortment of hats, surely waiting to be included in some future painting.

Miller, originally from Snyder, Texas, got her start as a protégé of Peter Hurd and his wife, Henriette Wyeth. She met the famous couple 19 years ago, and credited them with some of her success. Hurd and Wyeth backed Miller's first museum show before she turned 21.

That show, at Texas Tech University in Lubbock, Texas, sold out in 45 minutes.

Miller, who has been painting seriously since she was just 14, has been in the Hondo Valley for 17 years.

Her valley house is akin to the land on which she constructed it. She had the adobe bricks made on the property, and even cut the vegas for the ceiling.

Miller's house, as well as her studio, is a comfortable mixture of things she has gathered from here and there.

"Everything reflects me, how I feel," said Miller, pointing out stained glass she retrieved from her grandmother's house and an amethyst doorknob she found on an outkouse. Beams in her house are from leftovers of the Inn of the Mountain Gods construction, and a cast iron grill room divider was found in the old Midland Court House.

Miller's tour ended with a quick trip to the stables for a ride in her pony cart and a visit with the horse and pony.

Using those strong hands, the same ones that can recreate the finest detail of a hummingbird or a hummingbird nest, Miller quickly and deftly hitched up the pony with all his leather goods took the reins and drove the little cart round the

corral and up the drive. "Come back," invited Miller, waving as we drove away. The sun seemed to cast a bright glow over that spot in the valley inhabited by the vivacious artist and all her animal friends.







## Reporter's Round

I have never been to Alaska, but I hope I will get the chance someday. But even if I never do, I'm glad to know it is there.

One of the places in Alaska I would like to visit is the Alaska National Wildlife Refuge (ANWR), called America's Serengeti because of the area's diversity of wildlife. It is an area worthy of wilderness designation. It is an area, too, that Big Oil would like to drill in.

Why is Big Oil interested in the ANWR? Because there "might" be oil there, enough that "may" last for 10 years. The area needs to be explored, says Big Oil, because our national security is threatened by foreign oil, and the coastal plain of the ANWR might lessen our dependency.

In the midst of all this uncertainty, there are many facts which are ignored and discounted. Our own government has been

involved in altering reports on the area because the original drafts contained information which suggested oil exploration in the ANWR was a bad idea.

For example, the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) issued a report critical of operations in Prudhoe Bay, citing many examples of environmental violations. The amount of hydrocarbon air pollution there is equal to New York City. Yet, the Prudhoe Bay operation is presented as a model of oil production communities.

Then came the Exxon Valdez and the pitiful effort by Alyeska, the oil consortium in charge of operations at Valdez Harbor, to clean-up our nation's worst oil spill in what has been described as the worst possible place.

An investigative report in *The Wall Street Journal* listed numerous violations, short-cuts, and misrepresentations by Alyeska.

and still the company claims it can be trusted not to let another Exxon Valdez-type accident occur.

The historical perspective is alarming.

In the 19 years Big Oil has been in Alaska, \$45 billion dollars in profits have been made. And ever since the construction of the Trans-Alaska Pipeline, Alyeska has been involved in deceit and negligence.

The pipeline was more than \$5 million over budget because Alyeska had submitted false X-rays of welds.

The pipeline was terminated in Valdez, rather than continued through Canada, to save money. The U.S. Senate was locked in a tie on the issue. Environmentalists at the time urged congress to vote to continue the pipeline, to avoid a certain catastrophe should a tanker split. Then Vice President Spiro T. Agnew cast the tie breaking vote, citing Big Oil's promise that a major spill was unlikely, and the response would be quick and effective in the event of any spill.

Alyeska knew as early as March 1988 it was ill-prepared to handle a

spill, when an inventory discovered half of the required length of six-inch hose missing, and 15 percent of the required amount of boom length was also missing.

Coordinators for Alyeska described their practice drills as "farces." In 1980, the boat carrying top Alyeska officials to observe a drill ran aground. The first day of the Exxon Valdez spill found Alyeska with only one man able to operate a forklift and a crane. The man had to run back and forth between machinery to load materials for the emergency response until relief could be found.

Alyeska used to have a team of 12 persons specifically trained to respond to emergency spill situations, but this team was disbanded in 1982, and the duties reassigned to other employees who routinely carried out other tasks. Alyeska claimed this would be vastly superior to the 12-member team, because there would be 120 "trained" individuals available to respond. Several of the "trained" 120 told *The Wall Street Journal* they had not received any training for

response to oil spills.

In spite of all this, there is a strong desire by Big Oil and the present, as well as past, administration to open yet another area in Alaska for oil exploration. We are asked to believe Big Oil has learned its lesson and another disaster could never happen again.

Just look at all the oil that's come out of Valdez without mishap, says Alyeska.

But ignore the EPA report which indicates Alyeska routinely discharged oil sludge into Valdez Harbor.

Disclaim the fact it costs too much to have tankers fitted to burn low-sulfur fuel while in port to reduce air pollution, when most of the tankers that come to Valdez already have the capability to burn low-sulfur fuel. It costs too much, and who wants to whittle away at \$45 billion?

New Mexico senators Pete Domenici and Jeff Bingaman are both in positions to either endorse oil exploration in the ANWR, or preserve the area as wilderness. Each one is on the Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee.

Bingaman is chairman of the Mineral Resources Development and Production Sub-committee, as well as a member of the Public Lands, National Parks & Forests, and the Energy Regulation and Conservation sub-committees. He has voted against oil exploration in the ANWR in the past, but his position still remains unclear.

Domenici is also on the Public Lands, National Parks & Forests sub-committee, as well as the Energy and Water Development, and the Energy Research and Development sub-committees. He has voted for exploration in the ANWR, and his stance is clearly pro-development.

These senators need to be urged

to protect the ANWR from exploration. In fact, our government needs to show some leadership in this area through the promotion of energy conservation and the discouragement of consumption. Even Mobil Oil Corporation acknowledges this.

In an advertisement Mobil said "there seem to be only two practical options: conservation in the use of fossil fuels, and vigorous development of alternative energy sources..."

Domenici should know this, based on his membership on the Energy Research and Development Sub-committee, yet his voting record indicates he supports consumption rather than conservation.

In a report by the National Audubon Society, if gas mileage requirements on new vehicles were increased by just one and one-half miles per gallon, more oil could be saved than what might be found in the ANWR. But it was during the Reagan administration that gas mileage standards were reduced by this margin.

The death toll in the Prince William Sound continues to rise. By mid-May, 9,900 birds and 613 sea otters were dead as a direct result of the oil spill. On May 10, Exxon President William D. Stevens said all would be cleaned by mid-September. On June 14, he was not so sure.

The first wilderness area designated in the United States was in New Mexico in 1924. It is the Gila Wilderness. It was a New Mexico senator, the late Clinton P. Anderson, who used his influence to push through congress the Wilderness Act of 1964. Two New Mexico senators presently hold the fate of an Alaskan wilderness that is like no other in the world. Will New Mexico be known as the state which gave birth to wilderness, and then later killed its offspring?

"Everything reflects me, how I feel," said Miller, pointing out stained glass she retrieved from her grandmother's house and an amethyst doorknob she found on an outhouse. Beams in her house are from leftovers of the Inn of the Mountain Gods construction, and a cast iron grill room divider was found in the old Midland Court House.

Miller's tour ended with a quick trip to the stables for a ride in her pony cart and a visit with the horse and pony.





## Reporter's Round

I have never been to Alaska, but I hope I will get the chance someday. But even if I never do, I'm glad to know it is there.

One of the places in Alaska I would like to visit is the Alaska National Wildlife Refuge (ANWR), called America's Serengeti because of the area's diversity of wildlife. It is an area worthy of wilderness designation. It is an area, too, that Big Oil would like to drill in.

Why is Big Oil interested in the ANWR? Because there "might" be oil there, enough that "may" last for 10 years. The area needs to be explored, says Big Oil, because our national security is threatened by foreign oil, and the coastal plain of the ANWR might lessen our dependency.

In the midst of all this uncertainty, there are many facts which are ignored and discounted. Our own government has been

involved in altering reports on the area because the original drafts contained information which suggested oil exploration in the ANWR was a bad idea.

For example, the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) issued a report critical of operations in Prudhoe Bay, citing many examples of environmental violations. The amount of hydrocarbon air pollution there is equal to New York City. Yet, the Prudhoe Bay operation is presented as a model of oil production communities.

Then came the Exxon Valdez and the pitiful effort by Alyeska, the oil consortium in charge of operations at Valdez Harbor, to clean-up our nation's worst oil spill in what has been described as the worst possible place.

An investigative report in *The Wall Street Journal* listed numerous violations, short-cuts, and misrepresentations by Alyeska.

and still the company claims it can be trusted not to let another Exxon Valdez-type accident occur.

The historical perspective is alarming.

In the 19 years Big Oil has been in Alaska, \$45 billion dollars in profits have been made. And ever since the construction of the Trans-Alaska Pipeline, Alyeska has been involved in deceit and negligence.

The pipeline was more than \$5 million over budget because Alyeska had submitted false X-rays of welds.

The pipeline was terminated in Valdez, rather than continued through Canada, to save money. The U.S. Senate was locked in a tie on the issue. Environmentalists at the time urged congress to vote to continue the pipeline, to avoid a certain catastrophe should a tanker split. Then Vice President Spiro T. Agnew cast the tie breaking vote, citing Big Oil's promise that a major spill was unlikely, and the response would be quick and effective in the event of any spill.

Alyeska knew as early as March 1988 it was ill-prepared to handle a

spill, when an inventory discovered half of the required length of six-inch hose missing, and 15 percent of the required amount of boom length was also missing.

Coordinators for Alyeska described their practice drills as "farces." In 1980, the boat carrying top Alyeska officials to observe a drill ran aground. The first day of the Exxon Valdez spill found Alyeska with only one man able to operate a forklift and a crane. The man had to run back and forth between machinery to load materials for the emergency response until relief could be found.

Alyeska used to have a team of 12 persons specifically trained to respond to emergency spill situations, but this team was disbanded in 1982, and the duties reassigned to other employees who routinely carried out other tasks. Alyeska claimed this would be vastly superior to the 12-member team, because there would be 120 "trained" individuals available to respond. Several of the "trained" 120 told *The Wall Street Journal* they had not received any training for

response to oil spills.

In spite of all this, there is a strong desire by Big Oil and the present, as well as past, administration to open yet another area in Alaska for oil exploration. We are asked to believe Big Oil has learned its lesson and another disaster could never happen again.

Just look at all the oil that's come out of Valdez without mishap, says Alyeska.

But ignore the EPA report which indicates Alyeska routinely discharged oil sludge into Valdez Harbor.

Disclaim the fact it costs too much to have tankers fitted to burn low-sulfur fuel while in port to reduce air pollution, when most of the tankers that come to Valdez already have the capability to burn low-sulfur fuel. It costs too much, and who wants to whittle away at \$45 billion?

New Mexico senators Pete Domenici and Jeff Bingaman are both in positions to either endorse oil exploration in the ANWR, or preserve the area as wilderness. Each one is on the Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee.

Bingaman is chairman of the Mineral Resources Development and Production Sub-committee, as well as a member of the Public Lands, National Parks & Forests, and the Energy Regulation and Conservation sub-committees. He has voted against oil exploration in the ANWR in the past, but his position still remains unclear.

Domenici is also on the Public Lands, National Parks & Forests sub-committee, as well as the Energy and Water Development, and the Energy Research and Development sub-committees. He has voted for exploration in the ANWR, and his stance is clearly pro-development.

These senators need to be urged,

to protect the ANWR from exploration. In fact, our government needs to show some leadership in this area through the promotion of energy conservation and the discouragement of consumption. Even Mobil Oil Corporation acknowledges this.

In an advertisement Mobil said "there seem to be only two practical options: conservation in the use of fossil fuels, and vigorous development of alternative energy sources..."

Domenici should know this, based on his membership on the Energy Research and Development Sub-committee, yet his voting record indicates he supports consumption rather than conservation.

In a report by the National Audubon Society, if gas mileage requirements on new vehicles were increased by just one and one-half miles per gallon, more oil could be saved than what might be found in the ANWR. But it was during the Reagan administration that gas mileage standards were reduced by this margin.

The death toll in the Prince William Sound continues to rise. By mid-May, 9,900 birds and 613 sea otters were dead as a direct result of the oil spill. On May 10, Exxon President William D. Stevens said all would be cleaned by mid-September. On June 14, he was not so sure.

The first wilderness area designated in the United States was in New Mexico in 1924. It is the Gila Wilderness. It was a New Mexico senator, the late Clinton P. Anderson, who used his influence to push through congress the Wilderness Act of 1964. Two New Mexico senators presently hold the fate of an Alaskan wilderness that is like no other in the world. Will New Mexico be known as the state which gave birth to wilderness, and then later killed its offspring?

Picture a dozen pairs of ink-blackened hands, and you've got a good idea of how the inserters looked. Their hands and arms were black up to their elbows, and those young workers may never be the same flesh tones again. By the time

the kids got through inserting, stacking, labeling and loading 50,000 newspapers, they looked like survivors from some refugee camp.

But they got the job done, and close to a quarter million Texans got a chance to learn lots about Ruidoso.

We expect to be seeing some of those new readers in Ruidoso this summer. You'll probably be seeing them, too.
