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## Sheriff gets some wings

The Lincoln County Sheriff's department recently received a twin-engine Piper aircraft that was confiscated during a drug arrest in Carrizozo in 1988.

Sheriff James McSwane said the aircraft had been in the custody of the U.S. Drug Enforcement Agency in El Paso, Texas, since the original incident, which involved a Lincoln County sheriff deputy chasing the plane from the ground from the Gran Quivira site of the Salinas National Monument, to the Carrizozo airport.

McSwane said the plane could be used in the transport and extradition of prisoners, surveying and spotting of marijuana fields, and even for chasing other planes suspected of transporting illegal drugs.

The feasibility of the aircraft's use is currently being evaluated, said McSwane, and it will be determined if the plane will be refurbished for use, or sold at auction.

In other activity by the sheriff's department McSwane reported three more automobiles were burglarized, increasing the activity of car break-ins that has recently developed. One incident was reported at Alto Lake, and two more occurred at Bonito Lake.

Jose Javier Del Rio, 40, of Ruidoso Downs, has been returned to jail by his bonding company for failure to appear in court.

Del Rio was originally arrested on Friday, May 12, during a major arrest of operators in an alleged burglary ring in Ruidoso Downs.

Del Rio was held on \$50,000 bond on charges of possession of stolen property and possession of cocaine with intent to distribute, said McSwane.

Delbert Tolbert Jr., 23, of Copper Cove, Texas, was extradited from Huntsville, Texas, on a warrant issued by Judge James R. Wheeler. Tolbert is being held in lieu of \$2,500 bond on charges of embezzlement.

# Chino won't quit early, won't run again

Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe President Wendell Chino has responded to calls for his resignation by saying he won't quit early, but he won't seek another term as president.

The next election for a new tribal president is scheduled for this November and a new president will be inaugurated January 11, 1990. Chino has been president of the Mescalero tribe for 34 years.

A group known as Tribal Concerns called for Chino's resignation. In addition to the call for Chino's resignation, the group presented the Mescalero Tribal Council with a resolution calling for the dismissal of Chino's wife from her position at the Inn of the Mountain Gods.

Following a Tribal Concerns meeting on Monday, Chino sent a letter to all tribal members on Tuesday calling the accusations against him and his family by Tribal Concerns a "character assassination."

As to the call for his resignation, Chino said in the letter that he does not intend to quit before his term is over, but added that he

"I am not running for office and the vicious opponents of mine can't hurt me as I have already and more than earned my retirement," said Chino. "I, for one, always believe that truth, justice and fairness will triumph over lies, falsehood and hate in the long run."

not running for re-election.

He added in the letter that the group has not "advanced any positive programs or ideas that will benefit the members of the tribe."

He asserted that Tribal Concerns is "on a path to self-destruct the tribe."

Chino refused to comment personally on any of the allegations and escorted a Ruidoso News reporter out of his office, adding that he will handle the matter locally and not through the newspapers.

"I'm not responsible to The Ruidoso News, the Alamogordo News, the El Paso Times—I'm responsible to the people," Chino said. "I will handle it my own way."

His wife, Rita Chino, could not be reached for comment by press time.

Chino concluded the letter to tribal members by adding that he

"always believe(s) that truth, justice and fairness will triumph over lies, falsehood and hate in the long run."

Tribal Concerns, which has been meeting since September, is made up of Mescalero tribal members who are unhappy with the way their government is currently being run.

Harily Geronimo, a member of Tribal Concerns as well as the Tribal Council, said that the resolution calling for Rita Chino's dismissal from the Inn was submitted by the group to the Tribal Council at the June 29 meeting, but it was tabled.

Geronimo said at Monday's Tribal Concerns meeting that the council postponed the next Tribal Council meeting indefinitely.

He added that the Tribal Council may not meet again until the election for a new tribal president in

## Mayor appoints Frank Kolb to council

Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr. appointed Frank Kolb to the Ruidoso Village Council Tuesday.

Kolb, who was sworn into office by municipal clerk Tammie Maddox, joined the council at the table and took part in the regular meeting. Kolb will fulfill the term of former councillor Elmer Pirelli who died last week.

Councillor Kolb, a real estate agent with Century 21, chairs the Municipal Airport Planning Board.

Also Tuesday, in the 21-minute meeting that may have set a record for speed, the council elected Councillor J.D. James to serve as mayor pro-tempore. James thanked the council for electing him, saying he regrets the circumstances.

"Elmer Pirelli loved this village dearly, and I know he will be missed," said James. The council agreed to buy a plaque honoring Pirelli to be placed in council chambers.

Also Tuesday, the council approved amendments to a legal services contract with attorney John Underwood, whose proposal was accepted during a special meeting.

It was learned early today (Thursday) that requests for proposals for legal services will be issued again. Village manager Frank Potter said they will rewrite the rfps in a simpler form.

The contract with Underwood was accepted by the council, but apparently, was never signed.

In other regular business, the council:

—Adopted a resolution endorsing annual membership in the Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District.

—Approved a Planning and Zoning recommendation dealing with a commercial development for First National Bank at the Upper Canyon traffic circle.

Councillor J.A. "Al" Junge was absent from Tuesday's meeting.

Ron Duncan, former manager of the Inn, submitted a letter to the group outlining some of the problems within the management of the Inn.

Duncan cited "irresponsible abuse" as a deterrent to the manager's ability to work with employees. He referenced Rita Chino's presence at the Inn as "intimidating to employees" and adds that the salary she draws is "questionable."

Group members were told that her position, entitled special assistant to manager, earns a salary of \$30,000 a year.

"She has no business in our affairs," said one Tribal Concerns member who wished to remain anonymous. "She's only Mr. Chino's wife."

Members of the group have also expressed concern over the contract between the Mescalero tribe and Molycorp, Inc. which grants the company the right to mine for the rare elements yttrium and zirconium on the reservation.

Geronimo said the contract was approved unanimously while he and two other members were ab-

## School board puts brakes on truancy

Ruidoso High School students who miss too much school, may find themselves without wheels next year.

Members of the Ruidoso School Board of Education, during a regular board meeting Tuesday, approved a proposed change in the high school attendance policy which would remove driving privileges from truant students.

RHS principal Tom Hansen said under the new attendance policy, students who accumulate eight or more absences will lose driving privileges at the school. After 12 absences, the student will be expelled for one semester, said Hansen.

To avoid conflict with a student's civil rights, Hansen has developed an appeals committee. Each situation would be taken on a case by case basis, he said. If the committee accepts an appeal, the student will be allowed to return to classes.

Hansen said there are students at the high school who have accumulated 28 to 30 days of absences.

The board also heard a progress report by Steve Strain of Architecture Plus, the Roswell firm contracted by Superintendent Sid Miller at the direction of the board.

Strain, whose firm also serves the Roswell school district, said his company will help promote information on a proposed bond issue which may come up in October. Architecture Plus will inform the community of the needs of the school system, indicating exactly how bond monies would be spent.

He also said the firm will organize "think tanks" made up of various school personnel and other concerned individuals to gather information on how best to meet the needs of the schools.

The firm is contracted until the bond election, and if the bond issue fails, the school board will owe a flat fee of \$1,500. If the bond issue passes, the company will be under regular contract with the school.

Miller recommended that the board lend its support to a proposed jogging and bicycle path that will be designed around a proposed golf course on the old airport property.

Hansen expressed concern over students who jog in the area without any specific track or course.


Board President Stormy Edwards said he would like to meet with the voting public on this issue before the board takes any specific action.

sent. The council is governed by 10 members.

Geronimo said the contract was approved on a 60-40 net profit basis, with the majority of the profits going to Molycorp.

Geronimo and other Tribal Concerns members argue that the tribe didn't advertise for bids from other mining companies and possibly could have gotten a better share of the mining profits.

"We could have probably gotten 50-50," Geronimo said.

The mining would take place on Pajarito Mountain and Geronimo said most of the mining would be done on the north side of the mountain.

"There goes our wildlife," a Tribal Concerns member added.

"Traditionally, the elderly and medicine people go up there to pray for guidance and health of the tribe and gather herb medicines for the sick and injured," Geronimo said. "All of this would probably be destroyed."

An overriding concern on behalf of the group is the lack of accessibility to financial records of the tribe. Geronimo said he and the tribal members therefore have no idea how much in royalties they will receive from Molycorp, Inc.

"We could have lost millions of dollars in royalties because of the method used to obtain bids," Donalyn Torres, spokesperson for the group said.

Geronimo said some of the Tribal Council members haven't seen a financial report in more than

20 years. He and other tribal members fear that their enterprises, worth millions in revenues, are operating in the red.

Members of the group also contend that Chino purchased an airplane on behalf of the tribe, but add that very few other tribal members are aware of its existence.

Les Weilacher, manager of the Alamogordo Airport, confirmed that an airplane housed there is registered to the Mescalero tribe, but he was not sure how many other tribal members use the plane besides Chino and his wife.

The group is currently circulating a petition to have Chino recalled and Juanita Makil, another member of the group, said they have over 100 signatures.

Francine Magoosh, director of

the group, said more people do not stand up to Chino because most are afraid.

"Maybe they feel so comfortable in being poor that they don't want to do anything about it," Magoosh said. "They don't know that they can improve."

Magoosh said she was fired from her job when she voiced her concerns at a Tribal Council meeting. She is now employed off the reservation.

The group is currently trying to raise money for their efforts, and members are planning a powwow to raise awareness of their concerns among the tribe.

"At one time he was a loving, caring person," a tribal member said.

"We do represent the voters," he said. He added the feeling among most of the people he has spoken with is negative toward recent action taken by the village council on the proposed golf course.

The board began reviewing personnel policy Tuesday.

The proposed new policy reads in part: "No employee will unlawfully manufacture, distribute, dispense, possess or use on or in the workplace any narcotic drug, hallucinogenic drug, amphetamine, barbiturate, marijuana, or any other controlled substance as defined in schedules I through V of the Controlled Substances Act..."

The workplace defined in the policy would include "any school building or any school premises; any school-owned vehicle or any other school-approved vehicle used to transport students to and from school or school-approved activity, event or function, such as a field trip or athletic event, where stu-

dents are under the jurisdiction of the school district where work is performed."

The policies presently under review have not been formally approved because of several questions raised by some board members.

Lynn Willard asked why alcohol was not included in the policy.

Assistant Superintendent Mike Gladden will investigate how to incorporate alcohol into the policy.

Also, Don Swalander questioned if the term "unlawfully" was clear enough to cover personnel using prescription drugs under the care of a physician.

It is also unclear if the policy precludes action by the board should an employee be convicted of illegal drug possession outside of the defined workplace.

Other policies under review deal with the superintendent's contract, other administrator's contracts, staff protection and workmen's compensation, non-certified personnel vacations, certified employee contracts, credit for course work, non-certified payment of salaries,

work days for non-certified personnel, suspension/dismissal/reemployment of non-certified staff.

The policy review process is ongoing, and the board did not take formal action on any of the policies.

Miller reported on the food service program, saying the program was \$8,000 over budget.

Expenses must be cut, or revenues raised, which could mean an increase in price of school lunches, said Miller.

He said ways to improve the situation are under consideration and at the next regular meeting he may have a recommendation for the board.

In other business, the board:

—Approved checks.

—Approved the filing of Form #37 for a routine budget increase of non-recurring monies.

—Called for bids for milk and meat for the 1989-90 school lunch program.

—Appointed Sid Miller and Mike Gladden as financial officers for 1989-90.

—Awarded a bid to Spring Crest

Draperies for the replacement of backdrop and front curtains at the mid school, pending a report from Miller on the fabric's meeting specifications on flammability. The bid is for \$6,654.


—Approved a recommendation to hire Drew Matthews as a high school teacher and coach, and to hire Kathleen Orio as a special education secretary.

—Heard reports on two grants, one written by Gladden for \$29,000 for a lower level physics course, and one written by White Mountain Elementary School principal Frank Cannella for \$67,000 for a special education building grant.

—Planned a tour of school building to prioritize needs that may be covered in a bond issue. The public is invited to the tour, which will follow a special meeting of the board at 7:30 a.m. Tuesday, July 18.

—Heard a report from Athletic Director Doug Ragsdale.

The next regular meeting is scheduled for 7 p.m. August 8, at the Administration Building.

# Texas teen accused in \$5,000 spree

A 17-year old Midland, Texas, boy faces forgery charges after passing a number of checks throughout the Ruidoso area.

Ruidoso Police Chief William Newman refused to release the name of the youth who was arrested July 8, after attempting to pass a forged check at the Four Seasons Mall.

According to Ruidoso Police Detective Lanny Maddox, the boy fraudulently acquired two checkbooks in the name of Timothy and Deandra McCarthy. The checks were from a closed account on the First City National Bank of Midland.

Maddox said the juvenile allegedly passed forged checks from June 12 to July 8 and obtained approximately \$5,000 in merchandise and services.

On Wednesday, Maddox said he discovered the young man also had a stolen U-Haul in his possession. Maddox said he also discovered additional merchandise valued at \$300.

Following his arrest, the juvenile admitted to passing forged checks throughout the Ruidoso area and several checks in the Midland area.

The merchandise obtained included a VCR, lumber, a knife, a fur rug, groceries, electronics, gasoline, a vacuum cleaner, clothing, VCR tapes, a bicycle, stereo speakers and a hot water heater, according to police reports.

Maddox said the merchandise was recovered from numerous locations on Saturday night and a pickup was required to bring it all to the police station.

He went on to say all the stolen merchandise, except for several items of clothing and the services rendered and consumables, like gasoline, were returned to the merchants on July 10 and 11.

Subsequent to the arrest of the juvenile, he was referred to Juvenile Probation, Maddox said.

Maddox stated through the cooperative efforts of Herb Brunell and the Midtown merchants allowed police to recover the merchandise before it left the area.

# MainStreet considers 'battle of the bands'

The Battle of the Bands may or may not involve MainStreet Ruidoso this year.

The MainStreet Ruidoso board of directors, Wednesday morning gave the "motorcycle group" an August 1, 1989, deadline to provide proof of insurance.

If the event comes off, it will be at the Winner's Circle on a Friday night with three bands playing. The winner in a contest would play for a street dance on Saturday night.

The Southwest Golden Aspen Motorcycle Rally, scheduled for September, asked MainStreet Ruidoso to organize the battle of

the bands to be staged during the annual motorcycle rally.

"I certainly don't want to be held liable if something happens," Mary Maul, project director for MainStreet Ruidoso, said.

Tracy Moran of the Convention and Visitors Bureau was on hand to report on advertising she has arranged on a bike magazine for the "Tour de Ruidoso" bike race next April or May.

Three ads at a cost of \$1,300 have been scheduled in the magazine the first three months of 1990.

Maul said that bike race is "MainStreet's special event."

Board members emphasized that

it is important to contact supporters for renewal of memberships.

Treasurer Alden Deyo said the treasury is low.

Moran said she would like to see all of MainStreet involved in the Aspenfest promotion this year.

"We want something going on all the way down Sudderth," she declared, adding: "Every 30 feet."

The board approved a donation to the Elmer Pirelli Fund.

The board also committed to providing "bottom brackets" at a cost of \$627 for banners which appear up and down Main Street.

The banners flap in the wind and tear. Maul said the banners will have a more dressed appearance if they are held in place top and bottom.

Teri Sodd of the Design Committee said the committee is working on a brochure which will set forth guidelines for low interest loans. Such loans, if approved by MainStreet Ruidoso and the participating bank, can be made for external improvements to business including landscaping.

"Anything seen from the street," Sodd said.

# Downs firefighters stay busy

In a short, routine meeting Monday, the Ruidoso Downs Board of Trustees reviewed departmental reports and passed traffic ordinances to comply with new state laws.

With Mayor Jake Harris and all five members of the board present, the trustees discussed fire calls, animal control and streets.

Harris commented that the Fire Department has been busy and members of the board agreed that the volunteer group is doing a good job.

The Fire Department answered a false alarm on June 3, in Silva Canyon behind the wastewater treatment plant. Four firefighters responded, along with members of other fire departments.

The department answered an early morning alarm on June 17, and fought a fire at Palo Verde Trailer Park. Nine firefighters responded to the structure blaze,

and found the trailer fully engulfed when they arrived.

According to the official report, the fire started from a cigarette.

Firefighters also fought a dumpster fire on June 16, another dumpster fire on June 26, and a brush fire on June 7.

Board members learned that in June the animal control officer handled 16 dogs, six cats, five skunks and two horses. He reported three road kills, three warnings issued, two animals report missing and 16 animals euthanized.

According to the animal control report, expenses totaled \$121.36, and \$10 in fines were collected in June.

Trustee LeVerne Cole mentioned that someone called her asking for a donation to the Humane Society, and wondered why that organization isn't supported by the Village of Ruidoso.

It was learned that the Humane Society is a county organization, and will sometimes take animals from Ruidoso Downs. The Humane Society shelter operates in part under a contract with the Village of Ruidoso.

The Police Department reported making 15 arrests in June, in the following cases: two DWI, one felony, two reckless/careless driving, one assault and battery, one minor allowing self to be served, five detox and five misdemeanors.

Police reported ongoing investigations over two burglaries, three assault and battery cases, six thefts, three vandalism cases and 68 general investigations.

During June, Ruidoso Downs Police issued 110 traffic citations, in-

cluding three seat belt violations. The village reported 11 ambulance calls, four accidents without injuries and two accidents with injuries.

Ruidoso Downs Municipal Court reported handling 65 cases, assessing \$2,101 in fines and collecting fines totaling \$421.

In regular business the trustees adopted the New Mexico Uniform Traffic Ordinance and the Penalty Assessment Program.

Members tabled discussion on an upcoming seminar in Albuquerque, with all agreeing Mayor Harris should attend. The group will take action at its next meeting.

"I wouldn't miss it for the world ... it deals with solid waste disposal," said Harris, who has been plagued with problems over where to dispose of village trash during the last few months.

Trustees learned that village streets that have been cut will be repaired after all cuts are made and the busy season is over.

"It will be a lot cheaper to get them all at once," said Harris.

Harris said he visited attorney Richard Hawthorne's office to check on an encroachment into village right of way that was discussed last meeting, but was unable to find out the status of that case. He said Hawthorne was asked to write a letter to the person whose property is believed to encroach, and he supposes he did.

Trustees Cole, Wilma Webb, Joe Smith, Alice Allison and Tony Parker were at the meeting. The board is still two members short since former trustees Bill Smith and C.L. "Bones" Wright resigned in April.

# County considers funding for economic development

The Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County (EDCLC) made another appeal to the Lincoln County Commission during a public hearing Monday to have the organization's half mill levy reinstated.

Carroll "Buddy" Bundick, president of EDCLC, told the commission the money has been well spent, attracting three businesses in one year to the area, and with a letter of intent from a fourth.

Dave Talley, of Juma Farms, Ltd., a business attracted to Ruidoso by the EDCLC, spoke to the commission, saying he chose to move his entire business to Ruidoso, primarily because of the support he has received from the group.

Talley said he was offered free land in Alamogordo, but likes Ruidoso because the cooler temperatures here will help cut down utility costs. Juma Farms' main office is in Missouri, and air conditioning expenses there are very high, said Talley.

He would like to move his entire business to Ruidoso, where he expects to hire 16 employees from the community. He also expects to double his production in three years.

George Puckett, executive director of EDCLC, said he believes tax-

payers will be willing to pay extra for this program to continue.

"I hate to see them get out into the middle of the stream and (then we) shoot the horse out from under them," said Jack Page, who introduced himself as a resident of Lincoln County.

County manager Nick J. Pappas said he would like the commission to consider more than the one mill proposed, but realized the public would not accept too much of a tax increase.

Commissioner Karon Z. Petty commented that three mills would be needed to adequately meet the current needs of the county.

The previous half mill raised by EDCLC brings in approximately \$125,000.

Pappas said the estimated cost for starting a new landfill, which the county will need after Labor Day, is \$390,000. Infrastructure needs in the road department are estimated at \$240,000.

"Is there anyone here opposed to a three mill levy increase?" Petty asked the audience.

No one in the audience of about 20 people objected.

"If three mills buys Tommy Hall equipment that won't break down every time he tries to use it, then I'm all for it," said Lester P. Lanelli of Alto.

If a three mill levy is passed by

the commission, Ruidoso landowners would face an eight mill levy tax on their property because of the five mill levy imposed by the Ruidoso Village Council.

Petty said an increase in taxes is such an important issue that all three commissioners need to be present to take action, and the commission tabled the matter until Commissioner Rick Simpson returns from his vacation.

Scott Schaefer, vice-president of the Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce said he believes the EDCLC could still function on only one quarter of a mill.

"I don't think you could find an item we've wasted money on," he said.

Yvonne Lanelli questioned Petty on her statement the commissioner made regarding waste disposal in the Alto and Sun Valley subdivision areas.

In a previous meeting, Petty said the county had been emptying the dumpsters in those areas for free, while the residents there were taxed for sanitation.

Petty suggested the county should get some of that money from the assessment district.

Lanelli said the assessment covers only water and does not pay for waste disposal.

Doris Cherry, representing residents in a subdivision west of

Capitan, requested a dumpster and waste disposal in that subdivision.

During the county commission meeting that followed, commissioners took action on three road items.

The first was under the County Arterial Program (CAP) agreement with the New Mexico State Highway Department (NMSHD) for the installation of culverts and base course on Magado Creek Road.

Under the CAP program, the state provides 75 percent of the monies, and the county provides 25 percent.

The second road item was to replace a bridge and reconstruct the approaches to that bridge on County Road B-022 under the Cooperative School Bus Route Agreement with NMSHD, in which the state provides 100 percent of the monies.

The third road item was for improvements on county roads B-018 and C-047 through the Cooperative Agreement with the NMSHD, in which the state provides 60 percent of monies, and the county 40 percent.

Schlarb Road was initially included in the requests made by the county to the state, but was removed by the county manager when it became apparent sufficient monies would not be available.

In the initial request, Magado

Creek road was to be done under the school bus route agreement, and \$401,000 was requested. Schlarb road was requested under CAP.

Pappas said the state only approved \$35,000 for school bus monies, and because the final request needed to be turned in immediately, he withdrew Schlarb road from the request, and moved Magado Creek road to the CAP program.

"At the time it was either drop one or lose both," he said.

Both county roads B-018 and C-047 received their monies under the Co-op program. The road that ultimately will receive the school bus route monies, B-022, is north-west of Hondo.

The commission retired into a closed session to discuss personnel contracts at the Carrizozo Health Center, and for a legal services contract.

No action was taken on the health center contracts, but the commission did reconvene to announce a new interim contract will be offered to J. Robert Beauvais for legal services.

The decision was to employ Beauvais for six months or less for an amount not to exceed \$19,500 based on a pro-rated salary of \$65 per hour, with instructions sent to the county manager's office to have

requests for proposals (RFPs) advertised and ready for inspection by the commission by 6 p.m. September 25.

Beauvais' contract was to start on July 11.

In other business, the commission:

—Appointed Beverly Hammond to the Lincoln Historic Preservation Board. Gary Morton had resigned his position on the board.

—Approved the \$5 minimum penalty for delinquent taxes.

—Proclaimed July 14, as Billy the Kid-Pat Garrett Day.

—Will review a request made by the Lincoln Fire Department for an old ambulance no longer used by the village of Corona.

—Approved the automated voter records system agreement.

—Approved a contract and notification of grant award to the Senior Citizens Center.

—Approved and renewed an annual agreement with the South-eastern New Mexico Economic Development District.

—Passed resolution 78-2 for final budget adoption.

—Approved budget adjustments.

—Approved the accounts payable register.

The next regular meeting of the commission is tentatively scheduled for 2 p.m. Monday, July 24.

# Chamber will ask county for \$10,000

The Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce Advertising Committee will press for allocation of \$10,000 from the Lincoln County Commission to match a like amount from the state.

Roy Crocker, chairman of the retirement division of the Chamber, told the committee at a postponed monthly meeting, Tuesday afternoon, that \$10,000 is available from the state if it can be matched.

As suggested by member Mary Maul, the ad committee will write letters to individual county commissioners requesting the match if funds become available through a mill levy. Included with the letter will be statistics on the effectiveness of an advertising program by the retirement division.

Crocker submitted a report showing a breakdown state-by-state of replies from ads published in several publications. The most responses were from California, with a total of 643. New York state was second with 381, Illinois, 295; Texas, 273; right down to Wyoming with three replies.

Responses also came from Canada, Japan, Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands, West Germany and Mexi-

co. The ad committee adopted a preliminary media advertising budget of \$73,770 for submission to the Chamber of Commerce board of directors.

Tracey Moran, director of the Convention and Visitors Bureau, said the state is providing \$16,000 in matching funds this year.

Present for the meeting from Phil Price Advertising Inc. of Lubbock were Phil Price and Chris Allison, senior vice president. The Phil Price agency handles chamber advertising and promotion, including brochures.

The total budget of the committee is \$101,770 which includes \$57,770 for media advertising; \$6,000 for public relations; \$22,000 for a brochure reprint and \$16,000 in matching funds.

Moran pointed out that the total does not include separate designated funds for Aspenfest and Connoisseur Classic which are CVB (Chamber Visitors Bureau) projects or Wurmfest and Arts Festival which are chamber projects.

Committee member Tom Dorgan asked what follow-up occurs when replies are received from media advertising.

"When we get responses, do we

know what these people want? What are they interested in?" he asked.

The advertising committee authorized the Phil Price Agency to prepare a press release for general distribution on the offer of Dr. and Mrs. A. N. Spencer to build a performing arts center for Ruidoso if a quality hotel and golf course become realities.

Citing contributions to the area economy by Ruidoso Downs Race Track, member Bill Hirschfeld asked that the committee recommend to the board that the question of the track's chamber membership assessment be resolved.

Apparently a figure of \$750 annually has been suggested.

The committee voted to recommend that the chamber board resolve the matter immediately.

Price pointed out that a \$2 million art auction planned by the race track will draw "1,000 people to Ruidoso who haven't been here before. Some 40 artists, he said, will compete for a \$250,000 award from R.D. Hubbard and the race track.

He solicited help from the chamber in promoting the event and in furnishing separations for brochures and such.

Allison said a great deal of inter-

est has been generated in Tucson, Arizona, in the Ruidoso area through advertising.

Kelley said West Texas remains the "core market" for Ruidoso. He said cattle, cotton and oil prices are up.

Moran reported that the May 1989 walk-ins at the Chamber totaled 843, compared to 1,342 last year. The June figure was 998 compared to 1,240 in June 1988.

She said the lack of Saturday staffing this year is the reason, but printed material in the foyer at the Chamber answers most questions asked by visitors.

Phone inquiries are way up this year, she reported.

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
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# Capitan trustees talk about water

A Capitan resident complained for the second time about his water rates to the Capitan Board of Trustees during Monday's regular meeting.

David Cox said he has been charged the out-of-town rate for water when he should be charged the in-town rate according to a verbal agreement he had with the village.

Cox said he has been paying the in-town rate for water for the past nine years, in exchange for providing the village a right of way.

However, his rates were recently changed to out-of-town rates and he wants the old rate reinstated.

Cox complained about his rates to the trustees in last month's meeting, and Mayor Benny Coker said the situation would be looked into, and might easily be corrected.

During Monday's meeting, Coker told Cox he needs to provide documentation the agreement exists before the rates will be switched back.

Coker said he doesn't want the trustees to set a precedent in which

anyone can claim a verbal agreement on water rates allowing them to pay less than normal charges.

Trustee David Rouleau said it is not unusual for the village to provide an incentive to a resident to obtain rights of way.

Village clerk Janet Keel, said records show Cox was paying the in-town rate before the recent correction.

Village attorney, Don Dutton, said he wants to review copies of the easement, adding a decision may be made on the issue at or before the next regular meeting.

Coker reported the village was required by the Environmental Improvement Division (EID) to file a letter of intent before allowing Hamilton Construction remove water from the sewage pond.

The village had previously allowed the construction company to remove untreated sewage from the pond to water down the highway construction site for dust control.

EID stepped in and required the letter of intent which was to indicate the water had been chlorinated and would not contaminate ground-

water supplies, said Dan Davenport of the water department.

The trustees accepted a bid from the Lincoln County Sheriff's department for animal control.

Two bids were submitted, the other from Brian Wilmeth who had taken care of animal control for Capitan in the past.

Both bids were for \$5,000 for a 12 month period. Trustee Rouleau cast the only dissenting vote.

Coker said during the meeting the village is using more water than ever before. He repeated the need for residents to conserve water.

All water for Capitan has been coming from a well because Eagle Creek is dry. Davenport reported the pump for the well operates an average of 13 hours and 15 minutes every day and pumps more than seven million gallons.

In other business, the trustees: —Approved the accounts payable.

—Renewed an annual agreement with the Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District.

—Accepted the one bid for gravel from Lanell Sand and Gravel in Glencoe.

—Directed a request for annexation made by Jack King and Jody Roberts to be written in formal plats with intent of use described, and then to be reviewed by the planning and zoning commission.

—Heard a report from Ralph Dunlap on the Smokey Bear Stampede, which Dunlap described as the most successful ever. Approximately \$4,800 was collected by the Lincoln County Fair Board.

—Renewed the contract for solid waste disposal with Wayne Hobbs for one year.

—Extended the contract for the Smokey Bear Museum Curio Shop with Willie Hobbs for one year.

—Passed a motion to begin purchasing gasoline from a commercial dealer.

—Approved an insurance policy through the Municipal League in the New Mexico Self Insurers Fund. This means Capitan will not have an agent, saving the village approximately \$900.

# Chairman Hemphill denies conflict

County Commission Chairman Robert E. Hemphill, does not believe his offer to sell the county land for a landfill site represents a conflict of interest.

Hemphill was one of the seven who submitted expressions of interest to the Landfill Advisory Committee (LAC), notifying the committee he had three parcels of land available that may meet the county's need for a landfill.

The expressions were accepted by the county with the understanding that the contents of the submissions would be kept confidential as to details and prices.

Ken Nosker, who also submitted an expression of interest to the LAC, said he didn't want his competition to see all the details of his submission.

Because Nosker wished to keep his information confidential, his packet was removed from the letters of interest given to The News. Only members of the LAC were able to review the entire packet.

Hemphill is a member of the LAC and attended the meeting of the technical sub-committee which was instructed to review all the proposals.

The technical sub-committee was instructed by Nick Pappas, the LAC chairman, to review the

proposals and determine their feasibility.

The technical sub-committee will provide a report at the next LAC meeting, 1 p.m. Friday, July 14. At this meeting, the LAC is expected to write a request for proposal (RFP) asking for specific bids on whatever option the LAC recommends for the county.

Hemphill would be involved in the drafting of the RFP because of his standing on the LAC. Also, because Hemphill is county commission chairman, he would be involved in the final acceptance of any bids submitted as a result of the RFP.

Hemphill said Monday he would

probably withdraw the offer of his land from the LAC because he didn't think it could meet the new regulations imposed by the Environmental Improvement Division (EID), not because he thought it represented a conflict of interest.

He said legally he was allowed to sell land to the county even though he sits on the county government.

"I have been a very prudent commissioner," he said. "I would abstain from any vote if I were to sell (my land) to the county."

Hemphill anticipated he would send a letter to the LAC removing his land for consideration.

## Billy the Kid-Pat Garrett days this weekend in Lincoln County

News flash! The Billy the Kid Outlaw Gang (BTKOG) will ride to Lincoln this weekend, but there's no need to board up your houses and protect the women and children. Because this gang will arrive bringing fun and good times for old west enthusiasts of all ages.

So get ready, folks, for the 1989 Billy the Kid-Pat Garrett Days in Lincoln County, Friday, July 14 through Sunday, July 16.

Of special interest to the Billy the Kid aficionado will be the original tin-type photograph of the Kid, wearing that famous smirk of his, on display at the Lincoln Historical Center, said information released by the BTKOG.

This photograph is the only authenticated photo of the Kid in existence, and has been used in a project to verify others alleged to be of the Kid.

A demonstration of the techniques used in the photograph verification project has been organized by the Lincoln County Heritage Trust, and will be conducted by Dr. Tom Kyle at 2 p.m. Saturday, July 15.

Kyle and Dr. Clyde Snow, have been involved in a two-year project using photo-enhancement techniques with the computer to verify photographs purported to be of Billy the Kid.

Using the tin-type as the

master, the computer enlarges areas in the photograph of specific facial features, such as cheek bones or the nose, which do not change over time.

These features on the tin-type are then compared to the same features on other photographs, enabling the researchers to authenticate other photographs.

On Friday, July 14, the Ruidoso post office will offer a special stamp cancellation commemorating Billy the Kid. This feature, only available in Ruidoso on that day, will provide the special cancellation on any U.S. postage stamp, and is not the same as a first-day cover.

Special cache envelopes featuring the cancellation will be on sale from BTKOG members throughout the weekend for \$1.25 each. These limited edition cache envelopes, also, are not the same as first-day covers, but should be of interest to any collector.

The Billy the Kid, Pat Garrett, Deluvina Maxwell, and Susan McSween Look Alike Contest will be conducted at 3 p.m. Sunday July 16, in Lincoln, and will be judged by Helen Garrett Garner, the granddaughter of Pat Garrett, the legendary sheriff who shot and killed Billy the Kid, and by Michael E. Pitel, a travel writer for the Economic Development & Tourism Department for the state of New Mexico.

An entry fee of \$5 will be

charged for adults, but entry is free for the children's Billy the Kid Look Alike contest at 5 p.m. the same day.

Individuals or businesses may still enter the Stinking Springs Stew Cookoff, which is scheduled from 3 to 6 p.m. Saturday, behind the Montano Store.

Contestants cook any combination of meat, potatoes and onion over an open wood fire, and may use any assortment of spices for seasoning. A \$10 entry fee applies, and the event is limited to 21 contestants.

## Ruidoso's Kent Beatty helps home town athletes

Kent Beatty is a hometown hero to many Ruidoso High School athletes, and for good reason. He has shown over and over that he cares about them.

When the Beattys moved to Ruidoso, Kent was in the fifth grade. He graduated a Warrior and lives in Ruidoso mixing his time between the miniature golf course he owns, calling the races for the Ruidoso Downs track, announcing all high school sports on radio and occasionally driving to Las Cruces where he is a partner in an audio business.

Beatty's passion for golf is legend. As we conducted the interview for *The Ruidoso News*, we were sitting in a car at the end of the first fairway in a downpouring rain. It was misting while his four-some stood on the first tee. It was raining the minute they teed off, pouring as they walked off the greens and the only reason they were not teeing up on the number two hole was a powerful lightning bolt and subsequent loud clap of thunder that jarred them back to reason, at least temporarily.

Beatty started working on the Ruidoso High School golf program when this year's graduates, Chris Long and Eric Eggleston, were freshmen beginners.

"Gene Segura was the basketball coach and he asked if I would help with the golf team," Kent said. "I coached the boys and he coached the girls."

When the door swung open for Beatty to talk about his game, he seized on the opportunity.

"Golf is just a great game for kids to learn because of the environment surrounding it, usually successful people. These people can form positive role models," he said.

"As an example, the group of golfers I play with, Danny Wimberly, Reeves McGuire, they were successful athletes in other sports like football and basketball. Now they're out of school and they play golf."

"The appeal to me for kids to play is because it is so much easier for a kid to learn at a young age, 10, 11 or 12."

"Over the years I've had dozens of kids who were very successful high school athletes express regret for not playing golf in school so they could play better golf today. After high school, football, basketball or track suddenly becomes limiting."

"Football, basketball and track teach valuable team lessons, but as for as enjoyment from age eight to 80, nothing beats golf."

Beatty said Leroy Gooch was his golf coach and the coach of many successful Ruidoso high school golfers.

"I was never a very good golfer in high school, but I became a pretty fair golfer in college when I played everyday," he said.

"You don't have to be a super athlete to play golf. I'm proof of that. You also don't have to depend on someone else to excel."

Beatty plays golf every non-race day.

"The reason I'm so interested in junior golf is because I enjoy it so much, my friends enjoy it and those athletes that were so successful in high school enjoy it. They tell me if they had it to do all over again,

they would put a greater emphasis on golf. Think of it. Every age group can be competitive with golf for 90 percent of their life."

"The golf team has a lot of competition at Ruidoso. We have the finest coaches in different sports as any school in the state. I know this was true with coach (Cooper) Henderson and I'm confident with coach (Doug) Ragsdale. I know (Ronny) Maskew is the best track coach in the state and (Gerald) Ames is the best wrestling coach and (Mike) Crocker the best in tennis. These coaches will recruit good athletes and the results will come fast. Golf is a sport where you can't excel in a year, it takes a long time."

For Beatty, his reward came last week when some of his golf pupils joined him for a game at Cree.

Beatty said that in all the time that he spent with these students, the disappointments at state, nothing could take away the happiness of that moment because they were on the course together, not for any special event, but just to play golf and enjoy each others company.

Beatty said his interest in announcing sports for radio was always present.

"Ed Hyman who used to own KBUY let me help him with football games in high school. It was a lot of fun, and now I do the play by play for Ruidoso basketball and football."

"As for as horse racing, growing up here in the summers, going to the track was a treat."

While in college, Beatty sat behind an owner of a racetrack in Oklahoma where he used to practice calling the races. The owner asked

if he could call a race for real. He said he needed an announcer for a race that afternoon. Kent accepted and was there for four years.

"I was always fascinated at the way Bob Dudich called the races for the Downs. I began to mimic him, and my style today is virtually the way he used to call the races. This is my third year at the Downs."

Beatty said mistakes can be made calling races, especially during very busy moments, but there is always ample time to correct the matter.

Beatty said the announcer is a high profile job; therefore, if he makes a mistake everyone knows it. Sometimes, he said, everyone tells him.

"Being a track announcer gives you some sort of celebrity and that feeds the ego which isn't bad," Beatty said.

"Quarter horse racing is a tremendous sport. I just enjoy being around the people you meet at the track."

Beatty's Pan-O-Rama miniature golf course is a miniature landscaped forest that resembles a well maintained city park that has a game running through it.

"I worked for Stormy Edwards and Cree Meadows all through high school. At age 18, Stormy gave me the opportunity to buy the miniature course from him and it turned out to be quite a good experience."

"Credit for the landscaping and

flowers should go to my brother who is quite a gardener. We get people to come and look rather than just play."

Beatty said many former and present Ruidoso High School athletes work on the course to maintain its appearance.





rooms, clubs and other activities of Ruidoso high school."

Ragsdale said Ruidoso has the talent and coaching staff with the ability to produce a championship football team.

"Our goal is to return to that state championship game and win," he said.

Ragsdale said the offensive premise is that the Warriors are going to force the defense to make a choice.

"Their defense will have to decide how strongly to commit to our strong side. Our audible system will hopefully cause the defense to be wrong if they decided to overplay one side or the other.

"We want to be able to throw the football just like we run the football, sweep for seven yards or throw for seven yards with high percentage passes. Within our pass attack, if people guard us too closely for the short pass, we have a bomb in our

arsenal." Ragsdale said defense will lead the team.

"I'm looking forward to defense being the backbone of the team," he said. "We were a good solid defensive team last year and we're looking to try to improve on that defense this year. Offense is what catches the headlines, defense is what wins the championships. We emphasize a program of rapid improvement on an existing sound defensive team."

Ragsdale said the school will not skimp on athletic equipment.

"In today's day and age the public has to expect us to be fiscally responsible. On the other hand, any parent in this school system that places his or her student in our athletic program deserves to have their child have the best equipment. We will get the best equipment we can for our dollar in every sport."

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
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

## Big races set to run on Saturday

Dewan Who will carry 121 pounds and jockey Kenneth Roller.

Fearless Ego, who was second to Just Like Lace in the First Lady Handicap, drew the rail and 112 pounds. Carlos Rivas is the rider. Governor's Handicap winner Ack Stage will carry 116 pounds and jockey Duane Sterling. Si A Bit, who was ninth to Ack Stage, is also entered.

The Rainbow Futurity Consolation has a field of 10, who ran the 11th through 20th best qualifying times in the Rainbow Futurity time trials. (The \$447,030 Rainbow Futurity will be run Sunday.)



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# P&Z sets another hearing on Main Road zoning

The Village of Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) met in a regular meeting on July 10 and approved at items on the agenda and rescheduled a public hearing on the Main Road rezoning, from the traffic circle to Whispering Pines in the Upper Canyon, for August 7.

The commission was forced to reschedule the hearing after the Ruidoso Village Council, at its regular meeting on June 27, remanded the consideration of the rezoning back to P&Z for proper notification to the property owners.

Planning Administrator Cleatus Richards and commissioners discussed the text change in a proposed letter which will be sent to the property owners. Richards said the letter will clearly indicate the P&Z wants a response. Chairman Robert Donaldson asked if the letter could determine what preference individual property owners

want their property, either residential (R-1) or commercial (C-1).

The commission voted to schedule the hearing for the rezoning during its regular meeting August 7.

P&Z considered a conditional use expansion and commercial site development for Lot 3 Block 1, Airport West second addition, Fox Plaza, 1216 Mechem.

Donaldson asked the applicant, Tom Garber, if he was aware of the problems which had been associated with the previous operation.

Garber said he was hoping a proposed fence around the property would alleviate the problems.

Commissioner John White said he had heard the same statements the last time the previous owners appeared before the commission. He said the proposed business was not that appropriate for that area of Mechem, and allowing it there would be "block busting". He went on to say the area was extremely restrictive and the proposed busi-

ness involves too heavy traffic and equipment.

Several people expressed their concerns over the proposed business.

Garber, asked what kind of material his business will sell, answered: shingles, lumber, carpet, cabinets and nails; primarily bulk material with 90 percent of sales to contractors.

Because the previous owners had disregarded the requests of the P&Z, certain restrictions were placed on the commercial site development.

The commission said the fence around the property must be eight feet high, there can be no displays outside the fence and no material can be stacked higher than the fence.

The operators cannot have a commercial entrance on Leon Farrar Drive, they can keep the entrance on Leon Farrar for fire safety purposes, but they must provide a solid gate for the entrance

and they must eliminate the employee parking on Leon Farrar.

The operator can only sell pre-sold materials or retail sales items and cannot provide general retail sales, such as paints, brushes and tools. The operator has 60 days to meet the conditions and, if the operator leaves the site, he must take down the fence and the conditional use on the property dies when the requester leaves.

P&Z approved the conditional use expansion and the commercial site development by a five to one vote, with White casting the one "no" vote.

In other action Monday, P&Z:

—Approved a variance for C.D. Bolton at 117 Lark Drive on the side and rear lot lines to allow construction of a 12 by 20 foot room addition.

—Approved a variance for Douglas and Sandra Betts at 100 Cedar Creek Court for a front and rear yard variance to allow con-

struction of a 28 by 20 foot garage addition.

—Approved a variance for Mr. and Mrs. Hal D. Yoder at 226 Glade Drive for a side and rear yard variance to allow construction of a 20 by 10 foot addition.

—Approved a replat for Salvador and Amelia Martinez on Lots 120 and 121 Block 1, Ponderosa Heights, Unit 5, into one lot, so Martinez, who owns both lots, can expand the residence located there.

—Approved a replat on Lots 11-14 Block 3, Wingfield Subdivision and Lots 111-116 Block B, Sleepy Hollow Subdivision for the First National Bank of Ruidoso and The Weber Corporation. The purpose of the replat is to effect dedication of additional public right-of-way for improved alignment of Main Road. The approval is subject to the approval by the Village Council.

—Approved a commercial site development for the First National Bank of Ruidoso on Lots 11-14 Block 3, Wingfield Subdivision, to allow placement of a 10 foot by 40 foot modular drive-in bank structure with two drive in teller windows and related driveway and parking areas.

—Approved a preliminary plat extension for six months on White Mountain Plaza.

Richards presented, for inspection and discussion at a later time, a list of prioritized activities for the Planning Department in fiscal year 1989-90 and a draft of numerous proposed amendments to the Zoning Code.

This was the first P&Z meeting for new member Shirley Atwood, who replaced former member Cameron Jordan, who moved from Ruidoso.

## Manager gives 'state of the village' report

Ruidoso has virtually no serious crime, village manager Frank Potter told Ruidoso Valley Noon Lions Wednesday.

Potter touched on most aspects of village government during the noon luncheon meeting at the Ruidoso Inn.

He said the Ruidoso Department of Public Safety targets certain areas.

"You've got to know who the good guys are and who the bad guys are," he said. "The system seems to work."

"We put a lot of trust in our department heads," Potter said of village government. "If you don't surround yourself with good people, you are in a heck of a lot of trouble," he declared.

The city manager said the village policy is to send department heads to every school the village possibly can.

He cited a communications satellite system to train village police personnel. He said the village has joined in a six-city financial governmental accounting system which is benefiting the village.

Potter said change is the key word in all areas of government on the village level.

He said aviation has changed dramatically since he was associated with the airport here many years ago. He said the airport is selling approximately \$300,000 in jet fuel annually now, compared to \$200,000 in high octane gasoline. The types of aircraft are changing,

he said.

He said the trend is toward more corporate aircraft from Mexico, Texas, California, Canada, from all over.

The new airport on the Fort Stanton Mesa is costing about the same to operate as the old airport in town, Potter said. He said the old airport required and the new one requires about \$140,000 in a village subsidy each year.

He said the parking area at the airport and the t-hangers are providing income. About 150 transient cars are based there. Owners pay a monthly fee, he said.


Potter, who will become president of the New Mexico City Managers Association in September, said the city managers group has grown in stature.

He said some 40 city personnel from across the state show up for state meetings where it used to be three or four persons would attend.

The city manager said sanitation is one of the biggest headaches New Mexico cities and towns are experiencing.

He said "our guys are looking at Otero County or Carrizozo" for a landfill. "We really don't know," he said. Currently village trash and garbage is being trucked to Roswell.

Other cities always have trouble with animal control and ambulance service, but Ruidoso's subsidized ambulance service is the "best yet," according to Potter, who added that "some things must be subsidized for efficiency."

Potter said that Ruidoso hasn't been nearly as hard hit by the drought as have Alamogordo, Las Vegas and even Santa Fe.

He said the sophisticated water systems of today "are kind of scary."

He said that there is no real track record for Eagle Creek wells.

"We're dealing with a bunch of unknowns."

The village manager said the village has been saving nickels for a

new fire truck which will be purchased soon.

The village manager said Grindstone dam should have expansion joints caulked in three or four weeks, that some 600 to 800 acre feet of water should be retained behind the dam in six to eight months.

A contract was let for \$45,000 to caulk the joints through use of a special, proven material, he said.

# Ruidoso dancers could have danced all night ...

"Don't sit under the apple tree with anyone else but me. Anyone else but me. Anyone else but me. No, No, No. Don't sit under the apple tree with anyone else but me, till I come marching home."

To today's generation of rock and roll and heavy metal fans, these song lyrics might sound a little old fashioned.

But to anyone old enough to remember Tex Beneke, it is the music of their heart. It is the music they grew up with and danced to when they were young.

It was music from the "Big Band Era", the 1940s, with artists like Glenn Miller, Tommy Dorsey, Benny Goodman, the Mills Brothers, Johnny Mathis and Harry James.

Music which featured the sweet sounds of the clarinet, trumpet and saxophone all blended together into a well orchestrated melody.

But sadly, this type of music is almost lost in today's world. Replaced by the wail of the electric guitar and the artificial sound of the electric synthesizer.

Yet, the sweet, smooth sound of the 1940s was not forgotten, partic-

ularly by a group of local residents who get together regularly to listen to and dance to those melodies.

About five years ago, a small group of local people were sitting around talking about how much they missed the music of the '40s and how they wished they had a place to dance.

So they called a few other couples and got together at Carrizo Lodge to play "their kind of music." Thus was the start of the Ruidoso Dance Club.

The group has grown over the past five years from a group of six couples to an average of 20 to 30 couples.

"It sure has grown," said dance club member Bill Hostetter.

"A lot of these people don't know each other," said Finley "but they meet here and become friends."

But despite the friendship and fellowship they get from the meetings, it is the music which draws them all together.

"If you look at our age group, it's the big band sound you hear and not rock and roll," Mickey McGuire

of Ruidoso said. "Mostly it is the swing, the music of the '40s."

"It's just a group of people who grew up with this kind of music and they have danced to it all their lives," said J.W. Cox of Ruidoso.

Obie and Delores O'Brien just moved to Ruidoso from Heidelberg, West Germany, and were attending their first dance club meeting.

"I love it," said Obie O'Brien, "we'll be back."

As the smooth, soothing sound of Glenn Miller's "Moonlight Serenade" ventures forth from the tape player, it becomes obvious to the casual observer, that most of these couples have danced together for years.

Their movements and steps are

in perfect unison as they seem to float around the dance floor.

June Cox and her husband, J.W., have been married for 44 years and, according to June, they have been dancing together for 45 years.

She said having danced together for so long, it is easy to follow her husband.

"I know what he is going to do next and if I don't he steps on me" she said with a grin.

# Good deeds may not be so good for wild animals, says game officer

As a young woman walked in the woods, the last thing she expected was to find a fawn lying on the side of the road.

As she approached, the creature remained still. When it didn't run or shrink from her touch, she petted it. Thinking it abandoned, starving and in danger of being run over, she picked it up and carried it to a nearby house.

This act of apparent kindness may have sealed the fawn's death.

Every year, this scene is repeated many times over the state, according to New Mexico Game and Fish District Wildlife Officer Terry Scarafioti, who was called by a neighbor.

"The worst things a person can do is to pick up the animal," he explained. The baby animal probably is not "abandoned," even though—to the human—its mother is not in sight.

"In times of danger, the mother deer signals to the fawn to drop in its tracks and freeze. The mother then either distracts the danger or lures it away. When danger has passed, she will then return to the same spot to reclaim the youngster. She may also leave the fawn while she herself looks for food and water."

In either case, removing the fawn from where the mother left it is wrong.

"Once people pick up a baby wild animal," he continued, "the chances of its survival are less than 10 percent. We cannot adequately nourish the fawn because we cannot duplicate its mother's milk."

Even if it could be fed, the animal cannot be returned to the wild because its mother is not there to teach it how to survive.

"Finally the animal loses its fear of humans and then becomes a nuisance, and we are called upon again to dispose of it."

If the animal is placed in a zoo, its chances of survival have not improved. Disease, poor nutrition and other factors work against the wild creature.

"People who pick up wild

animals never see the end result, Scarafioti commented in a sad voice.

"We do—and it's almost always death."

What should the would-be Good Samaritan have done?

"Left the fawn alone. Walked away. Or called Game and Fish," replied this man who obviously cares about wild animals.

"If the fawn was in danger of being run over, she could have nudged it out of the way with her foot, keeping human contact to a minimum. If the mother returns and detects human scent on her fawn, she may abandon it. The best thing is to leave it alone."

When the woman heard of the consequences of her act of kindness, she was horrified. As one who takes in stray cats and dogs, she thought she was genuinely acting in the

fawn's behalf. She was also shocked to discover that she could be cited for picking up a wild animal, subject to a fine of \$50 to \$500 and being liable for up to six months in jail.

One can also be exposed to disease.

"There have been incidences of exposure to rabies reported through contact with baby skunks and raccoons," said Earl Leslie, DVM, of Ruidoso's Mountain View Animal Clinic. His office receives occasional calls from persons who have "found a wild baby animal."

"We always refer them to Game and Fish," he advised.

It's human instinct to pick up and cuddle a baby animal, so how do we learn to do no harm?

New Mexico Game and Fish works to educate the public on the enjoyment of wildlife. They publish

a monthly wildlife release which is sent to local newspapers. These articles explain situations such as this and suggest proper procedures. They also participate in Project Wild, a national educational effort which teaches school children to observe and enjoy wildlife but not to handle. Perhaps this will prevent situations such as the above.

And what of the fawn? After an hour of rest, the animal accepted some water, staggered to its feet and took a few tentative steps, gaining strength, it trotted off into the woods, the humans making no attempt to restrain it.

"Since the incident is a few hours old, the mother probably is still in the area, looking for her fawn. She may find it and accept it. If not..." Scarafioti's voice trailed off. "This story may not have a happy ending..."



The frightened fawn was "helped" to a neighbor's deck where it attempted to hide as best it could. Nature's touch altered by human interference, the fawn finally wandered from the deck back to the forest to a fate, as yet, unknown.

If any citizen has any questions concerning the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport or its operation, I would be more than glad to answer those inquiries at anytime.

### DEAR TIM:

I have recently noted letters to the Editor in The Ruidoso News questioning the location of the site of the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport and the orientation of the main runway on that site. I realize that such questions will finally settle on your desk and I thought my comments may be useful to you.

As you recall, the search for a new airport site to replace the old Ruidoso Municipal Airport began in early 1976, under a master study funded by the FAA and sponsored by the Sierra Blanca Airport Development Committee. That study was initially concerned with the forecasting of airport needs in the area for the next 20 years and the analysis of all possible airport sites to accommodate the forecasted traffic to be located within a 25-mile radius at the center of the Village of

Ruidoso. The study later expanded this radius to research any potential sites within a reasonable (about 30 minutes) driving time assuming good road conditions. Some 22 potential locations were designated on U.S.G.S. quadrangle maps and were field investigated and evaluated on the following basis:

1. Aircraft operations including approach - departure surfaces, airspace obstructions, wind coverage, and conflicts with others airports.
2. Engineering factors including soils and geology, earthwork and site preparation, drainage, paving, ground accessibility, and the availability or developability of utility systems.
3. Community planning, concerning compatibility with existing and planned land uses, relationships with community growth patterns, expandability, proximity to passenger destination areas and availability of land.

The analysis of all sites resulted in the elimination of all but two locations which were found to be engineering and economically feasible to develop, and which had air-space conditions in substantial compliance with Federal Aviation Regulations. These two sites were subjected to further exhaustive evaluation with the site on which the present airport is located found to be superior.

In connection with the runway orientation on the airport site, the master planning effort found that significant long-term statistical wind data was not available for the Fort Stanton area. Wind records were examined for Roswell and for

Holloman Air Force Base recognizing that distance and terrain influence could significantly alter the reliability of these data when used for Fort Stanton. Also, the dominance of the Sierra Blanca mountainous terrain to the west would be expected to dictate that winds would be highly variable. Consequently, two runways were included in the airport master plan with the dominant runway alignment being determined by site topographic conditions and by the general dominant wind vectors for southern New Mexico as being west by southwest. The planned secondary runway also was oriented by topographic determinants combined with alignment deviation from the main runway to substantially cover any crosswind conditions.

As stated in the master plan "At the earliest possible date, on-site detailed wind data recordings should be initiated so that in the future the magnitude of crosswind components and the degree of crosswind development requirements can be defined."

Since opening the airport, you have so recorded the wind data and it shows that no single runway orientation can provide the necessary wind coverage. Construction of the secondary runway as planned should be programmed for development as soon as funds are available.

Ruidoso voters that supported the Village Council in the recent change in form of government election got a small reward in the quiet aftermath of the election. In the same meeting that the election results were certified, the governing body voted in a net 2.425 mill increase in our property taxes (5.425-3.0).

Hardly worthy of editorial comment by THE RUIDOSO NEWS, the tax increase will be used to help cover a projected \$615,000 deficit in the village's 1989-90 budget. The

kicker is that an unspecified portion of the revenues will go to fund a 5% across the board raise for village employees in this upcoming election year.

With the recent election showing less than total support for village hall, the upcoming elections, in March 1990, must have our leadership very nervous. And, what better way to further cement political alliances among the village employees (and the estimated 200-300 votes they represent) than to offer up a nice raise at our expense.

Political motivations aside, I do

not think a property tax increase is in keeping with our efforts to attract new residents to Ruidoso. Nor, do property tax increases help our very depressed real estate values.

Since most municipal elections in Ruidoso are decided by fewer than the 200-300 votes cast by village employees (and their families), we can probably look forward to more of the same. On the other hand, village hall may succeed in riding a good horse to death.

# The Plant Corner

### DEAR SALLY:

I have read your marigold flan recipe with interest today and I have a couple of questions. What is flan, and when are the marigold petals added to the mixture? We enjoy your column here in Fort Wayne, Indiana.

### DEAR VERN AND L.J.:

Flan is a Southwestern dessert given us from the Mexicans. You see, Mexican food is a favorite here in the Southwest and we often use the Mexican name of the foods we eat in these parts. Actually, "flan" is nothing in the world but plain old fashioned custard, made the very same way. My mother made the same recipe different by chang-

ing the flavor from vanilla to rum and on and on. All I can say is, I have never eaten a flan I didn't like, just some better than others. I do hope you will find the time soon to make this truly delicious dessert.

I usually add the marigold petals along with the eggs, but they can be added any time. When the petals are folded in the mixture at the very last it gives an entirely different texture to the custard.

The marigolds were brought over from England and they came from France to England.

I recall asking my mother why she planted marigolds in her garden. She had every bed in her garden edged with the miniature marigolds and the large beds had

rows of them down the middle as well. She told me, while the scent might not be attractive to humans, "they're good for everything." I never dreamed of questioning that explanation. She also told me the excretions from the roots are very valuable. She didn't tell me why, that I recall. We do know now that marigolds are good to eat, and they kill nematodes in the soil, as well as whitefly. Potatoes and tomatoes need them badly as a companion plant in the garden. As a matter of fact, in ancient Mexico the marigold was sacred to the goddess of agriculture.
