## Gas rates may rise

Ruidoso Natural Gas Company (RNG), on May 26, 1989, filed a petition requesting authority to increase its rates in Ruidoso for natural gas utility service.

The rate increase if granted, will average about 25 percent, according to David Hamilton, president of the parent company, Natural Gas Processing Company with headquarters in Wyoming.

Customers receiving bills this month from Ruidoso Natural Gas Company will find an enclosure detailing the request for an increase and detailing how individual bills be affected.

The application was filed with the New Mexico Public Service Commission, which set a public hearing for 9 a.m. November 15, in Santa Fe.

Hamilton, from his Wyoming office, told *The Ruidoso News* that RNG hasn't had a rate increase since 1981.

He said new equipment and additional personnel are needed to serve the Ruidoso area.

Hamilton said the previous owner had "a bad philosophy for expansion." Natural Gas Processing Company has owned the Ruidoso company for about six months.

Under the proposed increase, the cost of service will be raised, while the cost of gas will be reduced. The net effect, however, will be what Hamilton admitted was a "very hefty increase."

He said the increase will be about 25 percent for the "light user" while the cost to heavy users will not be quite as great.

The public hearing will be for the purpose of hearing and receiving testimony, exhibits, arguments and any other appropriate matters to determine if the rates proposed by RNG, or any other rates, should be approved by the commission.

Rate filings and exhibits may be examined at Ruidoso Natural Gas Company on Carrizo Canyon Road in Ruidoso, or at the offices of the Commission, 224 East Palace Avenue, Santa Fe.

Anyone may intervene by filing a motion on or before August 25.

## If at first you don't succeed ... try again

After awarding the legal contract last week to attorney John Underwood, the Village of Ruidoso is starting all over on the process of selecting a legal adviser.

Administrators say a mistake in following state statutes during the selection process caused the problem.

New Mexico Statute (13-1-116) says "the contents of any proposal shall not be disclosed so as to available to competing offerors during the negotiation process."

According to village manager Frank Potter to village division head Leon Eggleston was giving out copies of a ratings tabulation to members of the Village Council, he gave one to current village attorney John Underwood and a copy to another attorney. The rating tabulation contained the hourly rate each attorney would charge the village for legal services.

The council was given this rating tabulation as a means of helping them when they interviewed the candidates for village attorney.

Potter said the legal contract the council discussed on Tuesday night with attorney John Underwood was no longer valid. He said Underwood would continue to provide legal services to the village on a temporary basis.

Potter said there had been problems with requests for proposals statewide and there was legislation in the works to provide municipalities with guidelines for selecting requests. He said the first RFP the village issued was designed from specifications from the attorney general's office.

He said, because the council wants a specific annual, he and village clerk Tammie Maddox redesigned the RFP and simplified it.

## County may haul trash out of the area

Lincoln county may be shipping all of its trash out of the county for the next several years.

That was the recommendation sent by the Landfill Advisory Committee (LFAC) to the Lincoln County Commission, during a meeting of the committee Friday.

County attorney J. Robert Beauvais introduced a motion that the LFAC adopt the entire technical sub-committee recommendation, and send the report to the commission with a recommendation to approve.

The report said Lincoln County should contract the disposal of solid waste with a private corporation as soon as possible which would entail shipping solid waste out of the county. The report cited the immediate need for solid waste disposal and the lack of time to identify a permanent landfill site.

"No matter what Lincoln County

wants to do, it would be next to impossible to have a site operational by October," said Jim Edwards, of the "Environmental Improvement Division (EID), who serves as an adviser to the technical sub-committee.

Edwards reported on what other EID officials in Santa Fe said about the county's options.

The report made four suggestions on how to solve the solid waste disposal problem in the county:

—contract disposal with a commercial operation for the next three to five years.

—establish a county-wide system of transporting solid waste and have this system operating as soon as possible.

—establish at least two transfer stations, in addition to the one already in operation by the Village of Ruidoso on Gavilan Canyon Road.

—identify a possible site during this three- to five-year interim peri-

od for a future landfill, to carry out the proper research of the site to verify its feasibility, and then to apply for a permit to operate the site as a landfill.

The one dissenting vote was by Ruidoso Downs Mayor Jake Harris, who said he opposed the recommendation because the sub-committee provided no information on costs to transport solid waste out of the county. Harris said he has never seen anything that describes costs.

He also said, after the committee meeting, that the disposal of solid waste could be accomplished for less by opening a landfill site in Lincoln county.

Regional EID supervisor Gary McCaslin said during the meeting, based on his knowledge and what he has read in the journals, Lincoln County will save a lot of money by going to a regional facility or by transporting solid waste elsewhere.

Dr. Bernhard Reimann,

chairman of the technical sub-committee, reported earlier on potential costs of disposing solid waste, using a fact-sheet he had present at the meeting.

In an area with a population of 6,000, the estimated cost for disposal of solid waste was approximately \$125 per ton, said Reimann. In an area with a population of 55,000, the price drops to \$14.55 per ton.

Nick Pappas, chairman of the LFAC, asked Reimann if the option recommended by the sub-committee was adopted by the county, would Capitan be willing to allow the use of their landfill by the entire county until the transfer stations could be in place.

Reimann said he thought that would be a good idea, but he could not speak for the local government of Capitan.

The landfill in Capitan is about 20 acres in size, and has an estimated life span of six to 12 years if only Capitan uses it.

The fact that Capitan still has a functioning landfill is, in part, the result of responsible management of the site by Wayne Hobbs, who has been contracted by Capitan to operate the facility since 1968.


Capitan Mayor Benny Coker has previously said Capitan would like to close its facility because of the costs involved in monitoring the site after it is used up, and the liability costs should a hazardous substance be illegally dumped there.

Edwards also cited the enormous cost of opening and operating a landfill as a reason for opting to transport garbage elsewhere.

According to information in the technical sub-committee report, it could cost as much as \$800,000 to obtain a permit, drill monitoring wells, have soil tests done, and pay for all other site selection costs.

## Mescalero gets \$2.7 million in housing funds

The Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe will receive \$2,700,694 through the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development for new housing developments on the reservation.

The grant is part of more than \$7 million in grants allocated to provide housing for various Indian tribes throughout New Mexico.

This grant supplements the \$218,017 given to the Mescalero tribe earlier in June. Mescalero's portion in the June allocation was from a \$1 million HUD grant to New Mexico Indian tribes.

The Navajo Nation will receive \$4.31 million through the new grant, the largest portion allocated to any of the tribes. The grants will be divided between Navajo Housing Authorities on Casamero Lake and Sheepsprings.

"It is a well-known fact that too many minorities, particularly Native Americans, live in substandard housing," New Mexico Senator Pete Domenici said in a press release.

"Hopefully, these grants will begin to rectify this community's long-standing need."

The remaining portion of the grant, \$735,391, will go to the Tesuque and Pojbaque Pueblos.

## Kolb looks forward to one term

Frank Kolb, appointed Tuesday to fulfill Elmer Pirelli's term on the Ruidoso Village Council, said he will not run for election once his appointed term is up.

"My intentions are to serve Elmer's term," he said. "I don't intend to run for the spot in March."

The position, formerly occupied by Pirelli, who died two weeks ago, and currently occupied by Kolb, will be up for election in March 1990.

Kolb is the president and general manager of Century 21-Aspen Real Estate in Ruidoso. He and his wife, Millie Ann Kolb, have lived in Ruidoso for nearly 12 years. They have six children, including one son who is a senior at the University of Arkansas.

Kolb has served on the Village of Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission and as the Chairman of the Municipal Airport Planning Board. Kolb said he sent a letter on Thursday to Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr. resigning those positions.

He said he was first contacted about the vacant council position by a group of people on Saturday morning. He said he had been out of town and was stunned because he did not know about Pirelli's death.

He went on to say he wasn't going to consider it without talking to some more people and to the Mayor. Kolb said he had lunch with the Mayor on Monday.

Kolb said even though he will not be running for the position in March, he feels he can be an asset to the council.

"I will not be looking for votes and I can do, I think, a better job on the council," he said.


In referring to the proposed golf course and hotel project, Kolb said the Village of Ruidoso has

received an offer from private investors who will invest more than \$20 million in new construction.

"I'm in favor of our proceeding with this, but I'm in favor of seeing the citizens of Ruidoso are protected in any contract we enter into with these investors," he said.


"I also want it to be done first class and architecturally done where everyone will be proud of it," Kolb said.

## Deadly Dart hits target at Grade I Rainbow Futurity

Deadly Dart, the gelding from Texas who was third in the Grade I Kansas Futurity, ran away from the field Sunday afternoon and won the Grade I \$447,030 Rainbow Futurity by a length.

Owned by Bill McMeans and Tommy Przyborski of Brenham, Texas, Deadly Dart won \$184,505 for being the first one home.

Trained by Glen Atkinson and ridden by Jerry Nicodemus, Deadly Dart has now earned \$279,899. It was the owners and the trainer's first Rainbow Futurity, but Nicodemus' third win.

"He felt awful strong today," said Nicodemus. "After 300 yards, he was running strong and was getting away from them."

Ruidoso Downs had significant improvements in attendance and handle over the weekend. The four-day weekend saw 19,195 fans wager \$2,084,475. Those figures are improvements of 15.9 percent in attendance, and 18.8 percent in handle over the same 1988 weekend.

Deadly Dart, the third wagering choice, paid \$14.40, \$4.80 and \$3.80. Strawberry Silk, part of a favored entry with My Yankee Bug, paid \$3.40 and \$3.00. Replacement Parts was third and paid \$5.60.

The rest of the field in order of finish are: Blinks Comment, Lassies Gambit, Heavey Spender, My Yankee Bug, Kansas Futurity win-

ner Power Train, Native Gypsies Jet and Ramble With Effort.

Strawberry Silk was one length in front of Replacement Parts in the finish.

"She reared slightly at the start," said Jacky Martin, her regular rider. "Once she got out, she started running good. It was one of the best races of her life."

Aside from his third-place finish in the Kansas Futurity, Deadly Dart was second in the Grade II \$278,000 Graham Farms Futurity in April. He is not nominated to the Sept. 4 \$2,000,000 Grade I All American Futurity, but Przyborski said it a realistic possibility that the gelding will be supplemented.

"If we pull up Ok, and Glen says that's what we need to do (then we'll go in the All American)," he said. "Glen was high on him from the get-go."

Deadly Dart's final time was 17.43, which established a stakes race record since this is the first year the race has been run 350 yards. The track record was set by Van Too Too, who ran a 17.24 time on Sept. 3, 1973.

Atkinson was confident he had the horse to beat.

"I wasn't surprised he won," he said. "It's my biggest race. We felt today that if he left there with them, he'd be there."

## Dash for Speed clinches win in Quarter Horse Classic

The 1988 Co-Champion Three-Year-Old and Champion Three-Year-Old Filly, Dash For Speed, won her fourth consecutive race Friday running the fastest qualifying time, 21.80, in the World's Championship Quarter Horse Classic Trials at Ruidoso Downs.

In the two other trials, Elans Special, the 1987 All American Futurity winner; and Heisajoy, a winner of 8-of-12 career starts, were winners and qualifiers for the July 23 final worth an estimated purse of \$86,127.

Under regular rider Steve Fuller, Dash For Speed won the 440-yard race easily by four lengths, the largest margin of victory in the trials. Meddlin Dash, who was second to Dash For Speed, was the seventh fastest qualifier in 21.970.

Dashing Val, who was third, qualified in the tenth and final position, 22.050 seconds.

"She was coming into it real good," said trainer Larry Keiter. "She ran her race today."

Dash For Speed has also won the Grade I Rainbow Silver Cup and the Grade III Go Together Handicap at Ruidoso Downs this summer.

"I looked out the corner of my eye and didn't see anyone," said Fuller.

Elans Special won the second trial in 21.750, the third best time. Elans Special is trained by H. Don Farris, who qualified three horses for the final. She won her second race in three 1989 starts, including the Miss Princess Handicap at Los Alamitos earlier this spring.

"She ran a lot better than I thought she would with the layoff," said owner Ed Allred of Long Beach, Calif., who also owns qualifiers Dashing Val and Kidish.

Go Street Music, 21.835, and Calling For Cash, 21.885, who were second and third, also earned berth in the finals. Elans Special's jockey Jerry Nicodemus was impressed with the mare's race.

"She was strong and seems to have come back," he said.

Heisajoy led four qualifiers across the wire. Racin Vike, 21.930, Six Fortunes, 22.020, and Kidish, 22.025 also qualified. Trainer Mike Lyles has big expectations for Heisajoy in the final.

"I'm looking for him to run big next week," he said.

Heisajoy's time of 21.575 was the second fastest of the afternoon. "This is a nice horse," said Heisajoy's jockey James Lackey. "As long as were in there, we have a chance to beat (Dash For Speed)."

Dewan Who, who came from off the pace Saturday, won an allowance race impressively on July 6.

The Mescalero Apache Handicap was the six-year-old gelding's fourth win in 10 1989 starts. Dewan Who, a slight 5-2 betting favorite, ran the six furlongs in 1:11 1/5 and paid \$7.00, \$4.40 and \$3.00.

Trained by Bob Bird and ridden by Kenny Roller, Dewan Who is owned by Martin and David Carraher of Albuquerque, New Mexico and earned \$6,360 Saturday. Roller expected a big effort.

"I was sitting on a lot of horse at the 3/8's pole," said Roller. "When I asked him he responded." "When Jack De Quick led to the 16th pole. Ridden by Leroy Coombs, he paid \$5.40 and \$3.60. Kingdom Key rallied along the rail for third and

paid \$4.80 to show. Moons High, part of an entry with Two N Sweet, is trained and leased by Arnold Simmons, the second-leading Quarter Horse trainer here this season. Simmons, who leases the filly from William Ray of Ruidoso Downs, New Mexico, says she's improving.

Joy The Lady ran the six fur-


longs in 1:13 4/5. Happy Broad recently broke his maiden, and Vines of Power was second in the Petticoat Stakes at Santa Fe.

## Employers learn of form deadline

The Taxation and Revenue Department has mailed the 1989 Workers' Compensation Personnel Assessment forms WC-1.

Taxation and Revenue Secretary Gail Reese said he is announcing the mailing in response to calls asking if the once-a-year assessment is still in effect.

The WC-1 was mailed to all employers registered with the department to pay withholding tax. The fee structure remains the same as in the past year: \$6 per covered employee on the payroll as of June 30; of the \$6, \$3 is paid by the employer and \$3 by the employee. The payment is due July 31.

All New Mexico employers subject to the Workers' Compensation Act are liable for the workers' compensation fee; this includes employers with three or more employees unless those employees are

farm or ranch laborers, domestic servants or real estate salespersons. If you receive a WC-1 and are not subject to the fee because you employ fewer than three employees or you employ exempt persons, return the form with zeros.

Secretary Reese points out that employers, such as federal and state governments, churches and other nonprofit organizations, are also subject to this fee.

The Workers' Compensation Administration is funded by the fee. Its function is to protect injured workers' rights, to protect workers from uninsured employers and to protect insured employers from unfair competition by uninsured employers.

The Taxation and Revenue Department, 827-0700, can answer any questions.



## Cree Meadows borrows putting green

The classified notice last fall read that a putting green was for sale.

It was Cree Meadows putting green, their only putting green, located a few steps from the pro shop.

Benny Aday of Ruidoso Downs bought the putting green and if members or anyone else is going to use it, they will have to get an okay from Aday.

How is it possible, Cree members are asking, that they do not own their own putting green?

Previously, T and P Enterprises owned the club, they borrowed about \$70,000, using the putting green and a lot as collateral.

Subsequently, T and P Enterprises went into foreclosure and that particular parcel was moved to a separate package and was apparently overlooked when four Ruidoso businessmen, Ralph Petty, Ben Lanford, Sam Dazzo and Johnny Durham, co-signed for the purchase of the club from the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC) and the T and P's certificate of redemption.

When Aday saw the FDIC notice in the paper, he talked to board president Stormy Edwards about buying the green to keep it in friendly hands. He was thinking only of the club.

Several board members also made calls to the FDIC. The club offered \$5,000 for the green, but the FDIC turned down the offer. Aday had made two offers. He purchased the putting green from FDIC for \$15,000.

Aday told Edwards he wanted to purchase a lot and a half in question that was originally linked with the putting green. He owned a lot next to it and he was a builder.

All of the lots that the club owned were part of the collateral for the new loan with Sunwest; therefore, the club could not sell anything without the approval of

the bank at Albuquerque.

The board would sell that property for \$20,000 to Aday and Aday would pay the closing fees. The board asked Sunwest for approval of that sale.

Aday, seeing no reason for the sale not to be completed, released his option on several lots he reserved for possible building.

By the time the board received approval to sell the lot and one half, they had received a greater offer of \$30,000 with another party.

The board discussed the new offer and made the determination that since there was nothing in writing regarding the sale of that lot and one half to Aday, there was no legal obligation to follow through with the sale.

Some members of the board felt

there was a moral obligation to Aday; however, through a majority vote, the board elected to finalize the sale for \$30,000.

The club, previous to the sale, had received a letter from Aday informing them he needed \$300 a month rent for the use of the putting green. That was in early spring of this year. The board declined to pay the rent and nothing happened.

Aday attended a board meeting earlier this year. The board made an offer of \$15,000 to Aday, but he declined.

Aday allowed the club to use the green over the Fourth of July. The cups have been pulled from the green since that date.

In a new development last week, the Cree Meadows putting green was available for use.

Rick Riddle, new general manager of Cree Meadows said the club had reached a temporary and verbal solution with Aday.

Riddle said he thought it would be inappropriate for him to comment on any further agreement with Aday regarding the putting green until he had an opportunity to talk with the board.

Riddle said that Aday has been very cooperative in the club's effort to resolve the matter. Riddle said he was sure that a satisfactory solution for all parties would be forthcoming.

Riddle, a Ruidoso resident of two months, has lived in Tucson, Arizona, for the past seven years.

In the meantime, Bennie Aday owns Cree Meadows' putting green.

# Ruidoso blacksmith takes pride in work

"The whole idea of the profession is to get the shoe and the foot together to allow the horse to perform in the desired manner."

That's how Charlie Reich of Capitan describes his profession, that of a farrier.

"The whole object of shoeing horses is to have the animal usable for whatever the owner wants,"

Reich said, when he displayed his talent of making handmade horseshoes at a special demonstration Wednesday afternoon at the Ruidoso Public Library. He says he is a blacksmith, but

he primarily shoes horses. He went on to say he doesn't have the time to do any ornamental blacksmith work. He says his work is seasonal but he estimates he works on 600 to 1,000 horses a year, including resets and clippings.

Reich, who has been shoeing horses for 12 years, said people always say horseshoeing is a dying art, but he said because more people these days own horses for pleasure, "horseshoeing is about to reach turn of the century proportions."

He said towns used to have a whole block of just blacksmiths. But today's farrier has to be mobile.

Indeed Reich's truck has everything he needs to shoe horses anywhere. He carries all his tools, material and his 130-pound anvil in the back of the truck. He also carries a portable propane forge in the back.

Reich said some people still carry small coal fired forges, but he prefers the propane forge because it heats to 2,300 degrees, which is right below the temperature at which steel burns, and he can throw a horseshoe in it and walk away.

He said, even though there are now manufactured horseshoes you can buy in wholesale quantities for about \$1.50 a pound, the process for making handmade horseshoes is the same as it was 100 years ago.

Reich started his demonstration by taking a straight piece of steel about a foot long and putting it in the forge.

Once the piece of steel was heated to an orange-hot glow, Reich began hammering it into the shape of a horseshoe. As he hammered away at the steel, he would tap the anvil with his hammer to establish a rhythm.

When the steel began to cool, Reich would place it back in the forge until it once again glowed hot.

"There is something about hitting on cold steel which shakes your whole body," he said. "When it gets a little hard to hit, I'll heat it up."

After shaping the steel in to the familiar shape of a horseshoe, Reich began to make the holes for the nail using a head stamp and a tool called a pritchell.

He said the holes have to be clean and well designed or the shoe will not attach to the hoof properly. He said six nails is all it takes to

hold a shoe on a good horse.

Next, Reich heated the horseshoe again and then proceeded to put a crease on one side of the horseshoe. He said the crease is put in the horseshoe to help improve traction.

Reich then put a clip into the edges of the horseshoe. The clip is simply a turned up edge of the horseshoe which lays against the hoof wall to prevent the shoe from rotating and tearing out the nails.

Once he finished with his horseshoe, he brushed it off with a steel brush, dipped it in water and passed it around through the crowd.

He said there are three reasons for shoeing a horse, to protect the foot, to aid in traction and for therapeutic reasons.

He also said horseshoeing is an art and a science. It is a science in the fact, the farrier has to have a

knowledge of the anatomy of a horse's foot. It is an art form, because of the skill and art of making a horseshoe.

Reich, who learned his craft at a school in Steamboat Springs, Colorado, is the president of New Mexico's professional horseshoeing association.

He said you have to have patience to be a good horseshoer. He also said, in order to shoe horses and not get hurt, you have to find a way to be friends with the horse.

Reich said it usually takes him around an hour and a half to two hours to shoe a horse, depending on what has to be done.

Reich is proud of his work and his business card proclaims him as Lincoln County's oldest professional horseshoeing service.

"It's turned into a good profession," he said, "it's been good to me and I'd like to be good to it."



# Final loss is estimated at 69 acres

Units from almost every fire department in Lincoln County and several units from Mesalero battled the blaze late Thursday afternoon and evening until it was finally brought under control. Firefighters stayed at the scene throughout the day on Friday.





# Tribal Concerns continues to criticize Chino

Tribal Concerns of Mesalero responded to Mesalero Tribal president Wendell Chino's criticism of their group by citing high unemployment and their quest for an overall improvement of the economy as their purpose—not a desire to destroy the tribe.

Tribal Concerns wrote and sent out letters July 13 to tribal members in response to a letter sent to all tribal members from Chino's of-

ice. Chino also sent tribal members copies of an anonymous note he had received criticizing his administration and attached it to his own letter. Chino attributed the anonymous note to Tribal Concerns.

Tribal Concerns denied authorship of the note in the July 13 letter sent to tribal members.

According to the Tribal Concerns letter, "Mr. Chino used tribal employees, postage, materials, xerox

and official letterhead for his personal campaign for re-election to falsely accuse Tribal Concerns of mailing out a letter criticizing Mr. Chino."

The letter did address some of their concerns, including the income level of tribal members. The letter from Tribal Concerns to tribal members stated that "only 350 members of the tribe receive more than \$7,000 per year ... only 350 tribal members are above the poverty level."

They added that Tribal Concerns "is more concerned with improvement of the economy, more loans, development of fair elections, constitutional rights, a decent court system, development of free enterprise, more scholarships for education, free speech without fear of losing our jobs and the return of our families to the reservation."

Tribal Concerns also sent a letter to the ten Tribal Council members in order to clarify that two resolutions introduced at a recent

council meeting are distinct and unrelated.

The letter to tribal council members stressed that the Tribal Concerns resolution calling for the dismissal of tribal president Wendell Chino's wife from her position at the Inn of the Mountain Gods "is not based upon color, creed, sex or ethnic group."

In the conclusion of the letter to Tribal Council members, Tribal Concerns restated their desire for Chino to resign his position as

tribal president, calling upon council members to "act in the best interests of the entire tribe."

However, a member of Chino's staff reportedly told a KBIM-TV news reporter in a telephone call Friday, Chino, who has been president of the tribe for 34 years, intends to run for another term.

According to a KBIM report, Chino denied authorship of the letter that bears his name and a signature.

## Construction declines in June

June building permits in the village of Ruidoso fell sharply compared to June a year ago and compared to May of this year.

However, total building permits issued from January 1 to June 30 of this year are down only slightly from the same period last year.

Permits totaled \$292,075 for June 1989, compared to a whopping \$938,900 in June 1988.

Single family dwellings accounted for \$642,728 of the total in June last year, while only three permits were issued this June for single family dwellings for a total of \$175,000.

Total building permits through June 30, 1989, total \$2,773,560. For the same six months last year, the figure was \$2,997,631.

dwellings in June of this year totaled \$175,000 compared to \$304,000 in May of 1989.

Residential alterations and additions for June of this year totaled \$100,475; the May figure was \$121,415.

Commercial additions and alterations for June 1989 were \$12,000, compared to \$8,000 in May.

Commercial alterations and additions in June 1988 totaled \$7,000; the May figure that year was \$200.

The only other building category in June this year was a permit issued for a foundation in the amount of \$600.

Bollsweiler Engineering, questioned if having an EID official making recommendations on a sub-committee was legitimate. "Why is it this agency that everyone is suing is telling us what we should do?" he asked. Bollsweiler said EID is seeking to close existing landfills, to force the opening of new sites under more strict regulations. "They're not giving Ruidoso

Downs a choice in anything," said Harris. Bollsweiler said he was hired by Ken Nosker to oversee the activities at Nosker's land regarding a dump site which EID considers illegal (see related story). "Should the county accept the recommendation by the LFAC to contract waste disposal with a private corporation, this does not exclude the county from opening a landfill site in the future, said Ed-

wards. McCaslin also said cost analysis will take time, and that time should be taken to ensure the county is making the best possible decision. County Commissioner Karon Z. Petty asked the committee if the LFAC plans to continue meeting. Pappas replied that although the committee had served its purpose,

which was to make a recommendation to the county commission on how best to solve the solid waste disposal issue, the LFAC would remain intact until it is formally dissolved by the county. The technical sub-committee will meet again to organize specific cost information for the development of a series of transfer sites, and will present this information to the county commission.

## Auto caravan announced

An auto caravan to White Sands National Monument's Lake Lucero, the source of the white sand, is scheduled for Saturday, July 29. The trip will begin at 9 a.m. at the Small Missile Range Gate intersection with U.S. Highway 70/82, 25 miles west of White Sands National Monument Headquarters, between mileposts 174 and 175. Park rangers and military police will brief the group on regulations that apply during the trip. The caravan will proceed over paved roads, through the White Sands Missile Range, to the trailhead to Lake Lucero. Approximately two hours at the lake area allows time for the half-mile conducted walk to the lake, picnic, photograph taking and then the return to the vehicles.

The caravan will then be escorted back to the starting point, on U.S. Highway 70/82, arriving there about 1 p.m. All vehicles should have a spare tire and sufficient gasoline for the 35-mile roundtrip to the Lake Lucero trailhead. Each person should have sufficient drinking water, a lunch if desired, sunglasses, stout walking shoes and suitable dress for the weather. Cameras may not be used while passing through the Missile Range, but are encouraged for use while at the Monument lake area. All persons will need to be at the Small Missile Range Gate intersection by the departure time of 9 a.m. No vehicles may join the caravan once it leaves for the lake.

## Neighbors oppose site in San Patricio for landfill

County manager Nick Pappas had his mediating skills put to the test when a standing-room-only crowd turned out for Friday's meeting of the Landfill Advisory Committee (LFAC). The meeting room at the Lincoln County Sub-Station was filled to capacity, mostly with residents of the San Patricio area who came to question the LFAC in general, and Ruidoso Downs Mayor Jake Harris in particular, on dumping activity in the Hondo Valley that the EID has ruled is illegal. The questions referred to Hondo Valley resident Ken Nosker allowing Ruidoso Downs to dispose of solid waste on his property. The Environmental Improvement Division (EID) has considered this action illegal and has requested Ruidoso Downs to remove all the trash dumped there. "The garbage has not been moved," said George R. Mendoza of San Patricio. "It has been moved," said Ruidoso Downs Mayor Jake Harris, shaking his head. EID gave Harris a July 10 deadline for removal of the garbage; but this was extended to July 25, to give Harris time to contract someone to haul the trash, said Gary McCaslin, regional director of EID. "As far as I know, it's been removed," said Nosker after the LFAC meeting. While he was not at the site during the removal stage, he has visited the site and said it looks fine. "I would have been smoking to high heaven if they left a mess," said Nosker. "It was effectively removed, at least in part," McCaslin said when asked if all the garbage Ruidoso Downs had dumped on Nosker's land had been removed. McCaslin said EID has not conducted a final site inspection. Nosker has attended each of the committee's meetings, informing its members his land was available to the county as a landfill site, and offering to help the county solve what was termed a crisis when the Fort Stanton landfill had to be closed. During past meetings, Nosker said his

land could meet EID standards for a landfill. Ernest McDaniels, one of Nosker's Glencoe/San Patricio area neighbors, questioned Harris about a statement he made in The News, June 15, saying the dumping of garbage at Nosker's land posed no health hazard, and that the site was 600 feet above water. McDaniels wanted to know where Harris got his information, saying his well, on property adjacent to Nosker's, is only 65 feet deep. "I didn't measure the well," said Harris. "I don't know where the well is." Harris repeated his claim that Ruidoso Downs was in a crisis situation with no place to dispose of solid waste. "I went to Ken Nosker who was gracious enough to allow Ruidoso Downs to store their garbage there," he said. "It is an illegal dump site, there's no question about it," said Harris. Nosker was one of the seven who submitted expressions of interest to the LFAC, which described the land he was offering. His proposal was withdrawn from the packet given to the news media because he requested his information be kept confidential. However, according to section 206 of the Solid Waste Management Regulations issued by EID, only trade secrets can be kept confidential. Nosker's expression of interest was prepared by Bollsweiler Engineering of Las Cruces, a firm which provides civil, structural, environmental, and geotechnical engineering services. Dan Bollsweiler, proprietor, said he was hired by Nosker to oversee the operation of activities at the dump site, which, according to the EID, turned out to be illegal. Bollsweiler said he was paid a "consideration" by Nosker for his service. Bollsweiler also said all the garbage had been removed from Nosker's land. Nosker said he did not receive any money from Ruidoso Downs for allowing the village to dump on his land, or for the operation of equipment.

In his expression of interest, Nosker cited this arrangement with Ruidoso Downs as background for future landfill operations. "This situation provided Mr. Nosker with not only an academic understanding of the complexities of landfill permitting and operational regulations; but, most importantly, provided hands on experience with the physical and legal realities of landfill operations." The land which Nosker proposes to lease to the county is located about 18 miles east of Ruidoso along U.S. Route 70. In the expression of interest, the parcel is described as being wholly located within (three quarters) of a mile of U.S. 70. The expression of interest noted a second option of selling the land to the county, the price to be negotiated between Lincoln County and Nosker Incorporated. Sale would be contingent on Nosker Incorporated being the operator of a landfill there. Nosker has filed Chapter 11 in the U.S. Bankruptcy Court in Albuquerque, and has his property listed among his assets. The LFAC, during its meeting, recommended the county postpone the development of a landfill site in the county and, instead, contract the disposal of solid waste with a private enterprise outside of the county (see related story). Jim Edwards, of EID, noted Lincoln County does not have enough time to properly evaluate any proposal for feasibility as a landfill. The transport of solid waste out of the county would be a temporary measure until a landfill site could be thoroughly researched and fully permitted, said the LFAC in its recommendation to the county. Expressions of interest were also submitted by Robert E. Hemphill, S.B. Boykin, Teresa and Mike Baca, Francis E. Sidens, W.D. LaMay, and Tri Sect Landfill of Los Lunas, New Mexico. None of the other locations listed in the expressions of interest were questioned by members of the audience.

The RFP which Potter and Maddox designed calls for attorneys to submit the following:

- the yearly rate for routine legal services for attorneys, for 1,040 hours per year; together with a description of the method for charging for complex legal services, including charges for fractional portions of an hour.

- a detailed description of the firm's experience in local government, if any, and identification of the person or persons within the firm who will be primarily responsible for village representation and that persons experience in local government, if any.

- a detailed description of office facilities and support staff resources.

- a sample contract the applicant would offer to the village in the event the applicant is the successful proposer.

- a list of references (minimum of three) the village would be free to contact.

- acknowledgement of receipt of any and/or all addendums.

The RFP defines routine legal services as providing consultation and advise to the administration and officials on legal problems, examining complaints or claims and advising as to rights to effect settlements.

It also says the attorney shall perform important detailed work in the compilation of ordinances, rules, regulations, decisions, contracts and precedents relating to administrative management. The attorney will also prepare drafts of proposed legislation and prepare rules and regulations covering intricate detail of village operations not covered in the substantive law.

Complex legal services are defined by the RFP as any legal action in which the village is a party and no other legal representation is provided through any insurance carrier, Risk Management, New Mexico Self Insurers, or other similar entity.

Maddox said an additional form will be attached to the RFP asking the applicants to list the above items on the form. She said the form will help in identifying specifically what each applicant is proposing.

Each proposal will be evaluated on four categories, the yearly rate for routine legal service, the rate for complex legal services, the attorneys' experience as a legal counsel for local government and the office facilities and support staff.

The experience as a legal counsel for local government will only apply to the lead attorney, Potter said.

Potter said the village administration will stay out of the evaluation process as much as possible. He said he will discuss with the Village Council the possibility of their doing the evaluation themselves with the help of village purchasing head Fonda Hazel.

Maddox said all RFPs have to be turned in by 2 p.m. Monday, July 31, when the council meets to open the sealed proposals.

She said the council will award the contract for village attorney at the regular meeting on Tuesday, August 8.

# Final order is filed in ongoing water case

The final order, by Judge LaFel Oman, on the Quantification and Priority Phase of the lawsuit involving the Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe, the United States and many state water users was issued Tuesday, July 11, in the District Court of Chaves County.

The final order was filed in the District Court in accordance with the January 25 ruling in the case.

That order, signed by all the attorneys involved, clears the way for any appeals or post judgment motions which might be filed. Spokespersons for the Mescalero tribe have already said they will appeal the decision.

In his January 25 decision Judge Oman said, "the 1852 Treaty was one of peace and amity between the United States and various tribes which constituted the Apache Nation. In express terms it did not establish a reservation for the Mescalero Apache Tribe. As a matter of law, the treaty cannot be used as the basis for any federal reserved water right."

He went on to say, "the Mescalero Apache Reservation was first established by the federal govern-

ment in the Executive Order of May 29, 1873, which reserved specific lands for the Mescaleros. Until that time, no water was implicitly reserved for the Mescalero Apache Reservation.

"If practically irremediable acreage method of quantification is appropriate in this case, the United States and the tribe have failed to sustain their burden of proof. The proposed Rinconada and Pajarita projects are not economically feasible, nor is there sufficient water available to supply the proposed Rinconada project," Judge Oman said.

Judge Oman's decision granted 1,347.4 acre-feet of water a year to the Mescalero tribe for municipal, commercial, industrial, agricultural, recreational and domestic uses.

The tribe contends it is entitled to 17,931.7 acre-feet of water a year from the Hondo basin for special projects.

Village water attorney Neil Stillinger said the final order was good for the Village of Ruidoso.

"It is a favorable decision to Ruidoso, it's removed a serious threat to the village's water supply," said Stillinger.



The reunion was in an old airplane hanger. There was a stage in the back of the hangar and a band out of Los Angeles played '40s music. We had a wonderful time and one of these days I hope we can go back.

As I watched the couples dance at La Junta, I couldn't help but marvel at how gracefully they danced with each other. They seemed to move as one. Both knew what the other person was going to do before they did it. I guess that comes from dancing together for many years.

As Melodee and I danced to the only song we both knew the title to, Glenn Miller's "Moonlight Serenade," I told Melodee I hoped in 40 years we would be able to dance together as gracefully as these couples.

But then I thought to myself, what in the world would we dance to?

These couples were dancing to the music they grew up with. The music we grew up with in the 1970s is not exactly the kind of music that lends itself to smooth graceful dancing.

We grew up listening to what radio stations are now calling classic rock and roll. Some of the groups which were considered heavy metal back then wouldn't even cut it by today's standards.

### Liquor Licenses and Health Insurance...

...Were the subjects of interim legislative committees here last week. The new Liquor Reform Review Committee met and discovered that the Carruthers administration has an official, hitherto unannounced policy against issuing new liquor licenses, even for local option districts that don't meet their license quotas now.

That, said some incensed solons, probably will be challenged in court before the end of the year...

### The Legislative Insurance Committee, Meanwhile...

...Is wrestling with the health insurance needs of retired public employees, some of whom make less in retirement benefits than their insurance premiums cost... and that's when they are eligible to join a plan at all!

What the retirees are concerned about is an insurance plan they can afford. I've never had them ask me for insurance for free," Elmer Peterson of Las Cruces told the committee. Peterson is the current president of the Retired Public Employees of New Mexico.

Peterson added that he thinks the state Public School Insurance Authority plan is one most public employment retirees could afford, if the Legislature would just make it

possible for retired city, county and state employees to participate in that plan.

Can't say I blame him for being enthusiastic: "My own premium would drop \$100 per month under this plan," Peterson said...

### The Liquor Committee...

...Is mostly looking at possible changes that need to be made in state statutes before the final phase of the 1981 Liquor Reform Act commences in 1991.

But the committee also will listen to testimony over the next few months about the alcoholism problems in New Mexico among all races and conditions of people.

I suspect they'll be hearing more than one suggestion that the state should spend more money on all of its alcoholism prevention and treatment programs...

### It Might Not Be A Bad Idea, Investment-Wise...


