

## Big crowds, big money set new state records

Ruidoso Downs Race Track continued its record-setting pace this weekend, breaking handle and attendance records and boasting a twin-trifecta winner of \$792,446.40. Saturday's handle figure of \$1,548,330 broke a previous mutual handle New Mexico record of \$1,485,105 set at the State Fair in Albuquerque on Sept. 25, 1983. Saturday's attendance was also up substantially over 1988's figures. A crowd of 9,715 attempted

the twin trifecta. The attendance and handle are 81.5 percent and 175 percent better than the 1988 figures set on the corresponding date.

A total of \$583,920 was wagered in the first half of the twin trifecta. There were 4,345 winning tickets in the first half, but the only winning ticket belonged to a group of Santa Fe and Albuquerque horse racing fans. The group had been playing the

twin trifecta since racing began on Thursday this week. Mike Pacheco of Santa Fe, an unofficial spokesperson for the group, said they had 725 first-half winning combinations.

"We come out to the track every day, not just on big days," said Pacheco. "We're staying overnight, and we'll be back tomorrow."

## Three walk away from plane crash

Three Texas men walked away Saturday from a crash that split their Cessna single engine plane almost in half.

The San Angelo, Texas, men were treated and released for minor injuries at Lincoln County Medical Center after the plane they were in crashed as they were taking off from Sierra Blanca Regional Airport about 4 p.m. Saturday.

Gary Hudman, 42, was pilot of the plane owned by Robert V. Kelley of San Angelo, according to State Police officer Mike Howard. Passengers in the plane were Billy Smith, 36, and Melvin Gray, 47.

Officer Howard said shortly after takeoff the Model 172M, fixed wing, single engine plane lost power and the pilot attempted to land in a small clearing. Howard said the aircraft hit a tree and came to rest in the clearing, breaking in half.

The air traffic controller told Howard he saw the crash and called the Ruidoso Fire Department. Airport personnel also responded to the scene, but the plane was difficult to see from the ground after it crashed amid the trees.

Although the plane had just taken on 27 gallons of fuel, the impact didn't cause a fire. Howard said fuel was leaking from the wreckage.

The three men were out of the plane when rescuers arrived, and they were transported by ambulance to LCMC.

"They were pretty lucky," said Howard.

He said volunteers from White Mountain Search and Rescue secured the accident scene until investigators for the Federal Aviation Administration can review the crash site.

## Biking trails could enhance village golf course project

Add a multi-purpose trail system to the varied-use plan the Ruidoso Village Council already has adopted for the old airport land, and the package is complete.

Meeting Thursday with a group of individuals interested in seeing that last item added as an enhancement to the golf course/hotel/civic center project, Ruidoso Downs Race Track owner R.D. Hubbard set the process in motion by offering to pay for the part of the proposed trail system that loops around the perimeter of the golf course.

Although the golf course development is by Jim Colbert Golf, and the hotel project by SWD Motels, Hubbard has been the major promoter of the proposal, and

serves on the Colbert board.

Hubbard and Golfsapes golf course designer John Colligan of Arlington, Texas, were on hand Thursday at the meeting arranged by Ken Green, publisher of The Ruidoso News.

"There is nothing political about this meeting at all," said Green, before sharing his vision of a network of multi-function trails that will enhance the recreational opportunities, as well as the economy of the Ruidoso area.

Predicting that the negative referendum on the proposed development will be defeated just as the recent change in government petition was voted down, Green said it's time to get on down the road and do something positive.

He said he's watched as the old

airport has developed into a light activity area, and village manager Frank Potter agreed, saying as many as 300 people a day are using the old airport land and the Cedar Creek jogging trail.

Green also described how he saw the trail system in Summit County, Colorado, grow.

"This has developed into a big business in 10 years," said Green, noting that the only major problems on those trails have been caused by user conflicts caused by the heavy usage.

"It's pretty darn neat because the cash register's jingling," he said, describing how ski shops extend their seasons by doing business as bike shops.




## Dash wins All American Trial

The Thrill Is Back was worth \$6.00 to show. Honey's Role, Tricky Stuff, Street Sweeper, Evelyn's Blade, Benmatt, Hookenonthehighway, San Rama, Creative Story, and Real Choked Up completed the order of finish.

Hookenonthehighway, the 4-5 favorite, was an early pacesetter but faded in the stretch.

The piñon and cedar and juniper are radiant with new growth, and the apricot and river trees are fairly sparkling. The little upland meadows of the hillsides are little emerald patches up near the

blue sky. The magic color, green, the color of life, overflows from the land so that the very air is tinged with this light emerald.

### Flowers and Birds Are Celebrating

Just in one week the Rocky mountain Gilia, or scarlet trumpet, has sprung up from the ground and put its bright little trumpet-shaped blooms. The wild four o'clock appears by the wayside in its crimson-purple blooms toward the evening in a spot where a few days ago there was nothing but dry ground. The sun flowers have grown their stalks rapidly, making up for lost time ready to bloom forth in celebration.

The Robins, Bluebirds, Finches, are singing serenades to the green world. The piñon Jays are flying close overhead calling out their bugle notes, their blue coats flashing in the sun as they turn dive through the air in an airborne dance of pure joy. A band of them are in an oak tree gathering the acorns.

Saturday saw 6,192 patrons pass through the gates; Friday's count was 4,414, Sunday's, 3,043.



## Main Road zoning is back

The Village of Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission will once again take up the issue of Main Road rezoning at a public hearing scheduled for 6:30 p.m. today (Monday) at the Ruidoso Municipal Administrative Center.

The commission will be discussing the rezoning of properties fronting Main Road in the Upper Canyon from the Traffic Circle to Whispering Pines. The rezoning would change the properties from R-1 residential to C-1 neighborhood commercial.

The request for rezoning was sent to the village council for a public hearing. The council took up the issue at its regular June 27 meeting.





# Waste disposal and landfill development will cost taxpayers millions in the years to come

"The days of cheap trash are over."

This statement has been repeated by so many elected and appointed officials, there's no need to attribute its truth.

Annual costs to operate a landfill site are estimated to be in excess of \$1 million for some areas. At minimum, several hundred thousand dollars will be required after up-front costs have been met.

Much of the cost is a direct result of new regulations created by the Environmental Improvement Board (EIB), and enforced by the Environmental Improvement Division (EID).

This enormous cost is the reason for the Municipal League lawsuit, in which local governments are asking the state to provide the necessary money to comply with these new regulations.

But it doesn't matter who wins the lawsuit, because compliance with the regulations will eventually be enforced, and it will not matter how the funds are raised.

"Some way or another the taxpayer will have to foot the bill," county attorney J. Robert Beauvais said recently.

This cost is already manifested through the increased mill levy passed by the county commission, and is also present in the gate fees at the temporary Fort Stanton site.

But this is only the beginning.

The financial sub-committee of the Landfill Advisory Committee (LFAC), a committee appointed by the county to research solid waste issues, unofficially estimated the cost to purchase just the land necessary for a site at \$390,000.

This amount has been criticized by others as too high, but other sources paint a no less costly picture.

An independent landfill operator

estimated after all up-front costs have been met, which includes the purchase of land, the purchase of necessary equipment, drilling of monitoring wells, site preparation, and other costs, a landfill operator could easily spend \$1 million dollars before the site even opens.

Then comes the wait for the permit necessary to operate a landfill, which can be as long as two years.

What the new regulations are in some detail, and why the wait for a permit is so long are two primary questions to be evaluated in this article.

What the county is presently doing about a landfill will also be addressed.

First, the primary reason solid waste disposal will be so costly is the content of the new EIB regulations.

It will be helpful to remember throughout this article that prior to the new regulations, there were no regulations at all, other than an operator needed to register the site and prevent it from becoming a public nuisance through odor or excessive blowing trash.

According to the new EIB regulations, the bottom of a trench in a landfill must be at least 50 feet above any ground water that has the potential to be used as a water supply.

This must be demonstrated by the operator through the drilling of wells at the operator's expense.

The site must also be located above impermeable soil, such as solid rock or clay. If the site is to be on porous soil, then the pits must be lined with plastic at an additional expense of \$30,000 to \$50,000.

A landfill will not be permitted in an area with wet lands, water-courses, or flood plains, nor in a location with a geological fault that has been active within the last 11,000 years.

The landfill operator must also submit with the application for permit a plan of operation at the site, which includes the locations of gas and water monitoring points, location and content of disposal pits, provisions made to conceal the site and curb blowing trash, prevailing wind directions, an analysis of surface water flow with a demonstration the landfill will not discharge contaminants into surface water, the expected life of the site, and a post-closure plan.

This final requirement, the post-closure plan, may be the most expensive.

After a landfill is closed, the site must be monitored for a minimum period of 25 years to assure that ground water is not contaminated by toxic leachate, and any buildup of gases, such as methane, is being dispersed in an appropriate manner.

During this post-closure period, the landfill operator is liable for any contamination that may occur, which necessitates an insurance bond.

The day-to-day operation of the site is also heavily regulated, but generally employs many common-sense practices.

For example, types of solid waste must be separated. Infectious waste, which includes dead animals, must be separate from household waste.

Access to the site must be limited to prevent unauthorized entry by the public, entry by large animals, and to prohibit scavenging.

Wayne Hobbs, the contractor at the Capitan landfill, has followed guidelines similar to the ones required by EIB for the past 20 years.

Because of his responsible management of the site there, the Capitan site was eligible to continue operation.

Similar management techniques were not employed at the Fort

Stanton landfill, which was owned and registered by the county, and operated by the Village of Ruidoso.

Landfill operators will also be required to operate some sort of recycling procedure, which may include the daily separation of recyclables from deposited solid waste.

Periodic inspections of the site, with documentation of these inspections made, will also be required.

The primary reason for all these new regulations is for the protection of ground water from irresponsible parties.

The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) is constantly doing battle in the cleanup of areas all over the United States contaminated by irresponsible disposal of toxic substances.

Love Canal, a neighborhood in Niagara Falls, New York, is abandoned now because toxic chemicals were dumped under the subdivision prior to its creation. Eventually the chemicals leaked out from their drums and into the homes of the residents there.

The entire community of Times Beach, Missouri, had to be evacuated and leveled after flood waters contaminated with dioxin, the deadliest chemical known to man, covered the town near St. Louis.

Several water wells south of Tucson, Arizona, were closed in the early 1980s when it was discovered that trichloroethylene (TCE), a known cancer-causing chemical, had found its way into the drinking water supply from a dump alleged to have been operated by the Air Force.

The citizens of New Mexico are very concerned about protecting our environment and the quality of our scarce ground water," said Governor Garrey Carruthers in an Associated Press article.

"In the interest of protecting ground water resources we must move forward with implementing

these rules and regulations," said Carruthers.

The establishment of a landfill site will take time to be done properly, said Gary McCaslin, district IV manager for EID.

Hence the recommendation by the technical sub-committee of the LFAC that the county establish transfer sites for solid waste disposal and contract with a commercial entity outside of the county.

Should the county decide on a landfill operation, it may be prudent to establish a regional facility because the larger the operation, the less expensive it becomes, both private and corporate individuals have said.

While doing this, the county can take the time to research properly the location of a new landfill site and be prepared for the long wait to obtain a permit.

Until the state legislature provides money for more personnel, there are only three people to review all applications for permits to operate a landfill site, and the process will be slow, said McCaslin.

"It is an unbelievably large task for so few people to accomplish," he said.

If a site were located today, it would still take 16 to 24 months to obtain a permit, McCaslin said.

County officials plan to meet at 10 a.m. Tuesday, August 8, in council chambers at Ruidoso Municipal Administrative Center to discuss landfill issues, as well as hear a presentation from Waste Management of Alamogordo, the company which operates the Dog Canyon landfill in Otero County.

The county may take action at this meeting.

County commissioners have also asked the county manager's office to send a letter of intent to the state EID office, informing the agency Lincoln County intends to operate a landfill at some point in the future.

Some elected officials disagree over the best long-term solution for the county.

"I would rather haul to a landfill than to a transfer site," said Ruidoso Downs Mayor Jake Harris at the last regular county commission meeting, July 24.

Both Harris and David Bollschweiler, an environmental engineer, claim a landfill serving only the county's needs can be operated more cheaply than sending the garbage out of the county.

Harris said the example of Ruidoso's operation of the landfill at Fort Stanton is not a good one and should not be used to estimate costs.

The one and three-quarter mill levy recently passed by the county commission contains a three-quarter mill provision to cover landfill and solid waste needs.

The estimated total yield from this is \$210,000 which has been characterized by the county commission as a start.

Discussion of recycling techniques has been gaining momentum at many of the meetings. Some of these techniques can be easily initiated at the homes of Lincoln County residents, say EID officials.

Education must become a part of any approach to solid waste, said McCaslin.

People can no longer expect to simply throw something away and never have to worry about it again, he said.

"Respect for our earth must begin with education of young school children," he said.

McCaslin also said that education techniques against smoking have been very effective to induce children to try and encourage their parents to stop smoking.

The same techniques are needed to educate people about solid waste and pollution, he said.

## Mescalero looks to October elections

Mescalero Tribal President Wendell Chino appointed an election board at the Tribal Council meeting on August 2, according to a synopsis of the meeting compiled and circulated by Tribal Concerns.

The tribal presidential primary is scheduled for October 6, and the deadline for candidates to enter the primary is September 20; according to a group of tribal members.

According to the synopsis, those appointed to the election board are: Elizabeth La Paz, chairperson; Charlotte La Paz, clerk; Reginald Tortilla, judge; William Magoosh III, clerk; Davis Spitty, interpreter; Amos Gaines, Olive Rose Smith, John Hubbard, Donavan Bignouth, judge.

Director of Tribal Concerns Francine Magoosh said the purpose of the election board is to count votes and ensure that the election is run fairly.

Chino has served as president of the Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe for 34 years, and it was reported previously that he won't be running for re-election. Some readers believed wording in a letter dated July 11 indicated Chino wasn't running.

However, F. Randolph Burroughs, attorney for Rita and Wendell Chino, said in a letter to

the editor of The Ruidoso News that the comment was taken out of context in news reports.

"The thrust of the comment by Mr. Chino on page 3 of the letter is that he is not presently running for office and therefore any attacks are not the kind of attacks that would concern him during a political campaign," wrote Burroughs. "You need to be advised that the intent of the letter was not to state the Mr. Chino is not considering running for the office of president of the Mescalero Apache Tribe," he continued.

Tribal Concerns was organized in September, and is made up of tribal members who have voiced concerns over the way their government is being operated.

Also, according to people who attended the August 2 meeting, the Chirichihuas were granted an additional \$3,000 on top of a designated \$2,000 to send the group to the dedication of the bust of famed Apache chief Cochise.

According to the unofficial account of the meeting, about 200 Chirichihuas are scheduled to attend the dedication which will take place at the Hall of Fame in Oklahoma.

The Chirichihuas are part of the third group of Apaches who reside on the Mescalero reservation.

## Legal problems plague the Village of Ruidoso Downs

The Village of Ruidoso Downs currently is the subject of an investigation led by the District Attorney's office, adding to an already litigation-plagued village government.

The DA's office, aided by officers from the Sheriff's Department and the Ruidoso Police Department, served a search warrant last Monday at the Ruidoso Downs Municipal Building, conducted a search and seized several items. Leandro Vega of the DA's office is lead investigator in the case that involves allegations over village purchase practices.

Neither DA Bert Atkins or

Mayor Jake Harris were willing to discuss the investigation last week.

Harris has been under scrutiny since August by the Environmental Improvement Division (EID) for his decision to create his own landfill without informing EID or making application prior to dumping trash at the site.

Mayor Harris began to dump the village's garbage on the property of Ken Noeker, citing an "emergency situation" following the closing of Fort Stanton landfill that was operated by the Village of Ruidoso.

The decision to establish what the EID later declared an illegal dump was made by the mayor, apparently without any action by the Ruidoso Downs Board of Trustees.

Harris was ordered by EID officials to clean up the land, and is currently working on finding an alternative to the Fort Stanton site.

Fort Stanton, although operated by Ruidoso is owned by the County of Lincoln, and will be closed due to new solid waste disposal regulations imposed by EID.

In other litigation, Village of Ruidoso Downs trustee and former village clerk Wilma Webb filed suit against the village and Ruidoso Downs Mayor Jake Harris, alleging "wrongful termination."

Webb said when Mayor Harris came into office, she was handed a letter stating that she was to take a "leave of absence" as village clerk. She added that she was never

called to return to the office of village clerk, and Janice Polk was hired to fill her position. Polk is still the current village clerk.

Polk, along with Ruidoso Downs employee Bobby Zamora, was named in the search warrant served last week, with her residence the site of a search for a water heater and an electric heater allegedly purchased by the Village.

Webb said she was told that the incoming mayor has the right to appoint a new clerk, but she contends a merit ordinance overrides the mayoral right to hire new staff.

"The merit ordinance says you have to have a reason to terminate," Webb added. Another hearing for the case is

set for August.

Ruidoso attorney Gary Mitchell said the Village of Ruidoso Downs was also sued by former Ruidoso Downs employee Nick Cleckler for wrongful termination.

Cleckler received a judgment of \$30,000 in the suit, said Mitchell. Aside from wrongful termination allegations, Village of Ruidoso Downs employee Raymond Silva and Mayor Harris are currently awaiting judgment in a case involving a land dispute.

District Judge Richard A. Parsons told The Ruidoso News in July that Mayor Harris tried to persuade Silva to sign a dedication of a street to acquire Silva's property

adjacent to Mayor Harris'.

"The plaintiff testified that if he didn't sign the dedication, he would be fired—and he was," Parsons said.

Parsons added that he is not sure when he will render a decision in the case.

"It's a very complicated case," Parsons said.

The Village of Ruidoso Downs is still short two trustees since the resignations in April of C.L. "Bones" Wright and Bill Smith. As members of the seven-member board, Wright and Smith were often at odds with Harris.



## Flag is raised over Ft. Stanton memorial

The American flag was raised Friday over the cemetery at Fort Stanton to honor the American Merchant Marine Memorial.

Lynn Ditto and Joe G. Sandoval, representatives of Senator Jeff Bingaman's office, were present for the ceremonies.

Captain E. Victor Schaerer, retired master mariner of the United States Merchant Marine, along with other volunteers, initiated a maintenance project which led to the restoration of the cemetery, located east of Fort Stanton Hospital and Training Center.

More than 300 crosses were set by the volunteers, along with more than 100 perennial flowers planted to beautify the grounds.

The project began when the grass was as tall as the crosses, said Schaerer.

The 71-year-old Schaerer said he

would like to see the memorial recognized as a national treasure.

"I know of nothing like it in the country," said Schaerer in a press release.

More than 1,000 American and Scandinavian merchant marines are buried at the cemetery, as well as three German sailors. Former residents and staff from the hospital are also buried there.

Fort Stanton was created through an act of Congress in May 1859 for protection of early settlers from Apache raids.

In 1899 the fort established the first U.S. Public Service Health Hospital for merchant seamen with tuberculosis.

In 1953 the property was turned over to the state as a hospital and training center for the developmentally disabled.

Fort Stanton is also the location of the National Center for the Western Horse.

"What's wrong with being the biggest tourist town in New Mexico?" asked Green. "Let's capitalize on what we have."

Green said people, including athletes from the Ruidoso schools, are out jogging, walking and riding bicycles on the open road, and one of those bicyclers, Ronnie Taylor, said he and others on the roads often fear for their safety.

Green outlined his vision for a biking/jogging trail beginning with the golf course, looping back by the school or by Ruidoso Village Hall, continuing down Warrior Drive to Gavilan Canyon. He said the initial trail could provide a trail of about six miles.

The trails would extend over

municipal and school lands, as well as a small amount of privately owned land.

The Ruidoso School Board already has endorsed the concept, and board member Rod Adamson said Thursday he believes the board will continue to support the trail system. Board member Don Swalander also was on hand for the Thursday meeting.

School athletes are among the expected users of any trail system.

Ralph Petty announced that Bill McCarty, owner of the private land in the area of the proposed trails, has agreed to give easements and rights of way as needed.

"Bill said they'll cooperate 100 percent," said Petty Thursday.

"The golf course is still in a state of flux... now's the time to bring it in," said Colligan, who drew the proposals onto a village map.

Hubbard said the trail construction would be no problem around

the golf course, as the grading could take place as the course is built.

"I walk the airport a lot and there are a lot of people using it," said Hubbard, noting the addition of the trails to the rest of the development would make a lot of people happy.

As Colligan lined out the proposed course, Hubbard indicated the 17 acres of McCarty land the Spencers are buying as the site for an amphitheatre and performing arts center they have pledged to construct and donate to the village.

The dozen people meeting together Thursday agreed that the trails are the key to a successful development on the land. Although the first phase doesn't extend into

United States Forest Service land, visions for a network of trails go into that area. Jim Rogge and Peggy Crim, recreation specialists with the USFS, were at the meeting to offer advice and information

on trails.

Hubbard said Governor Garrey Carruthers will be in the area in early September, and predicted he'll support the project.

"He's ready to mend some fences," said Hubbard.

Petty said that Lieutenant Governor Jack Stahl already has pledged his support and offered any help he can give through his office.

Potter, Harvey Foster and Frankie Jarrell agreed to coordinate the project; and Robert Donaldson, chairman of the Planning and Zoning Commission, offered to take the concept to the commission during a meeting Monday.

In continuing discussions over possible routes, costs, funding sources and future development, Green noted that phase one is basically done.

"Someone's going to buy it for you," he said.

## EDITORIAL

Main Road, the major artery into the historic Upper Canyon area of Ruidoso, will be up for discussion before the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission during a public hearing at 6:30 p.m. today.

Zoning in that area has been discussed and reconsidered no less than a dozen times over the past few years. Some of the property is commercial and some is residential—and that designation often has no relationship to the use of any particular property.

The debate over adding more commercial zoning along the narrow street has continued through public hearings before planners and the Ruidoso Village Council. P&Z made a recommendation to the council last month, and councillors, tired of reconsidering the same questions, sent it back to the commission.

It would seem reasonable if property owners, too, are tired of the continuing uncertainty over the official zoning designation of their properties. Some long distance owners have made more than one trip to Ruidoso to make their wishes known as to the zoning. Who knows when they'll hear of yet another public hearing to consider zoning on their property?

We hope that this latest series of hearings will be the last, and Upper Canyon property will be zoned one way or the other. At some point somebody is going to have to make a decision, even if some of the Upper Canyon residents are displeased.

P&Z members and councillors have heard hours of testimony, and we're sure they'll hear more this week. Listen, discuss and then take action, for this zoning question has been batted back and forth long enough.

Let's put the issue of Upper Canyon zoning to rest.—fj

DEAR EDITOR:

The executive committee of the Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County was very surprised and disappointed that some members of the County Commission expressed doubts as to the integrity of the EDCLC at the commission meeting on July 24.

The main points in question were the proper disclosure of the EDCLC's finances and the commission's understanding that the EDCLC was to be funded only once by the county.

As to the complete disclosure of how our funds are spent, we have always provided the county representative a monthly statement. That representative sits on the board of directors and that position was meant to be a liaison between the EDCLC and the County Commission. Apparently this has not worked. It was stated that numbers were changed on the last statement received. It was explained at the board meeting that May's statement was inadvertently presented to the board by our temporary secretary instead of the current month's statement for June. The correct June statement was delivered the following day.

At no time has any representative from the county gone to our office to inquire about clarification of any statement. The offer was made by our executive director, George Puckett, at a previous board of directors meeting to allow anyone from the county to obtain any information they sought. In addition, an audit of our finances is scheduled to be performed within the next two weeks as per our contract with the county. This should prove beyond doubt there is nothing to hide as far as the EDCLC is concerned. The only thing confidential is information on prospects; which

does not concern our financial statements at all, in spite of what was printed in the local news media.

It has also been reported in the local newspaper that it was understood by the commission that the county was to fund the EDCLC only once. It was never promised by us that we would never go to the county for funds again. It was understood that the funding would be one year at a time and that we would have to ask the county each year for continued funding. All reports to the contrary are erroneous. One of the previous commissioners, Ralph Dunlap, indicated that he was misquoted in The Ruidoso News. His understanding about funding the EDCLC is exactly our understanding, that funding was for one year at a time—not one year only.

We sincerely appreciate the funding we have received from the county. It shows that Lincoln County is one of the most forward looking counties in the state. But let's not tear each other apart with innuendo and misconceptions. Let's communicate properly and work for the betterment of Lincoln County.


