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School Board OKs \$3 million bond election

It could cost more than \$3 million to complete building renovation and construction at the White Mountain and Middle Schools.

The Ruidoso Board of Education adopted a resolution Tuesday calling for a \$3 million bond issue to be voted in October this year for construction and remodeling costs at the White Mountain and Ruidoso Middle schools.

However, Architecture Plus, the architecture firm contracted by the district, estimates those costs will be \$3,049,344.

In the architect's report, it was recommended a new cafeteria be constructed for the White Mountain schools, at an approximate cost of \$552,000, and the existing cafeteria be remodeled into classrooms.

When completed, the White Mountain schools would have four to six new classrooms from the old

cafeteria, plus six new classrooms constructed to replace the portable units now in use.

The estimated cost for six new classrooms is about \$450,000. Remodeling costs for the intermediate school are estimated at \$254,000, and for the middle school at \$377,000.

Frank Cannella, principal at White Mountain Elementary, said the new classrooms are needed to replace the portable classrooms,

and to accommodate anticipated growth in enrollment.

He said 40 new students are expected. He also said with the increase in services offered, and with the decreasing of class sizes, more class space is necessary.

Superintendent Sid Miller said additional space may be necessary to accommodate new computers and computer labs in the elementary and intermediate schools.

"We will need to look at computer classrooms and computer labs if we want to keep up with modern education," said Miller.

Mike Gladden, principal at the mid school, and assistant superintendent, said 152 sixth graders are expected this year, up from last year's 125 sixth graders.

Donny Weems, principal at White Mountain Intermediate, said enrollment was about the same for the fourth graders, and a little

down for fifth graders.

Board members also heard a report from Brian Dooley, of Computer Works in Alamogordo, on the purchase of computer equipment for Ruidoso schools.

Dooley noted computers can bring students back into the learning process through capturing their attention.

P&Z expands commercial zoning in the Upper Canyon

By a four-to-one vote, the Village of Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission sent a recommendation to the Ruidoso Village Council to rezone eight properties along Main Road in the Upper Canyon from R-1 residential to C-1 neighborhood commercial.

The commission's action took place Monday night during the second public hearing on the proposed rezoning. Commissioner John White cast the lone "no" vote.

Later in the meeting White, who

has been at odds with the rest of the commission for some time, resigned.

The issue of rezoning the properties was sent back to the commission by the village council, when councillors said property owners were not properly notified about the proposed change before the first public hearing.

Before beginning Monday's public hearing, planning administrator Cleatus Richards gave the results of the last polling of property owners.

Of the 31 affected properties,

only half of the property owners responded to the letter from the Planning Department.

In the Cree Subdivision, out of nine properties affected, no one was in favor of the change and three and one half owners were against the change. In the Central Subdivision, three properties were affected, two property owners were against the change and the other did not respond.

In the Sleepy Hollow Subdivision, Block B, six properties were

Richardson tests the waters for the '90 governor's race

Congressman Bill Richardson, a Democrat representing the Third Congressional District, told a group of local Democratic leaders at K-Bob's Restaurant Tuesday he is testing the waters for a possible run at the Governor's office.

"I think as governor, one can make a difference," he said.

Richardson, whose district is in northern New Mexico, stopped in Ruidoso as part of a nine-city sweep through southern New Mexico. He said he wanted to seek the advice of constituents on whether to stay in Congress or enter the governor's race against former Governor Bruce King of Moriarity.

"The reason I am here is to get to know you, but also to find out from you whether you are still open on this governor's race," he said.

He said he was not asking for a commitment from the Democratic leaders, but he wanted to find out whether they would be interested in the kind of aggressive and involved campaign he would run.

"I am here to ask for your advice," Richardson said.

He said he would enter the governor's race with a strong base of support in the northern part of the state.

"I don't want to be just a regional candidate," he said. "I want to get votes everywhere. I have done extensive polling in southern New Mexico. I have found that the reason I am behind Governor King in southern New Mexico is because I am not that well known."

Richardson said if he does decide to run for governor, he will emphasize three issues in his campaign: education, the environment and

drugs.

"I think we are lagging behind other states, way at the bottom," he said. "I think teacher salaries are not good. I think we need to restructure the system. I think it is going to take resources, commitment and leadership in that area."

"I will very strongly stress the environment," Richardson said. "I think our state is becoming a dumping ground for commercial and other waste that is proceeding into the state with little regulation. I support the WIPP project, but I don't think it should come here until it's not 98 percent safe, 75 percent, but 100 percent safe. Our landfill and hazardous waste regulations, in my judgment, need to be tightened up."

"The third issue I would emphasize would be drugs," he said. "We have to make a major commitment to fight them with drug education, with tougher law enforcement and

many other areas that involve both communities, parents, police and local people involved with dealing with this killer."

Richardson says he recognizes the impact of tourism on the State of New Mexico. He said he would make the tourism secretary a cabinet level position.

"Tourism is the biggest economy generator in my district," he said. "I am very sensitive to tourism initiated legislation. I would be particularly sensitive to some of the issues I know have affected you here. I represent Angel Fire and Toas, I know they have special problems depending on the topsy-turvy economy. Sometimes an infusion of some kind of properly regulated endeavor might work out."

Richardson said he will make his decision whether to stay in Congress or run for governor in September or October.

Eddie Parker is Teacher of the Year

Ruidoso High School teacher Ed-

die L. Parker has been named Educator of the Year for New Mexico and, for the third time, Market-

ing Education Teacher of the Year by the New Mexico Vocational Association.

Superintendent of Schools Sid Miller said he and the school board are elated over Parker's award.

"We have always known that Eddie was a high caliber instructor," said Miller. "We are very happy for him to have received this deserved recognition and we are also very proud to have a person like Eddie on this faculty."

High school principal Tom Hansen said Parker has consistently placed more students in state competition than any other teacher.

"I recall one time when RHS, a school of about 500, sent 27 kids to Nationals," said Hansen. "The same year Albuquerque had over 27,000 students in high school and sent only nine to Nationals. I look with pride upon our program at RHS."

The Albuquerque-born Parker, Marketing Education coordinator for the high school, has been with the school system for 15 years, teaching courses in Fundamentals of Marketing, Advanced Marketing, Marketing Internship and Computers for Marketing.

Parker was named to Who's Who in American Education for 1988-89.

A Member of the Professional Division of DECA, Parker has helped 249 students qualify for the National DECA conference since

1976. Of those students, nine placed in the top eight in the nation with the Pepsi Learn and Earn Project.

In 1989, he worked with Chris Crowley who won first place in the National Entrepreneurship Written Event in Orlando, Florida.

Another first place National winner won in the Apparel and Accessories Supervisory level in 1976.

Parker is a dedicated community man. He serves on the executive board and sings in the choir of the First Christian Church in Ruidoso, is a vice president of the Chamber of Commerce board of directors and a member of the 7 Gallon Club community blood donor.

Parker has a Master of Science Degree from Eastern New Mexico University and previous to his duties as teacher, he has been an owner-manager of a department store, a proration analyst for an oil company and a bookkeeper.

Parker's honors also include the Ruidoso Chamber of Commerce Community Service Award, United States Seventh Fleet Citation for outstanding performance of duty as Air Transfer Officer, a presidential unit citation and the Ruidoso Noon Lions Community Service Award.

Parker and his wife, Donna, have three children, Michael, Jennifer and Mandy.

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make editing written material so easy, students are more willing to rewrite their own material, hence improving their writing skills.

Ruidoso is probably at the top among schools in New Mexico with what computers are already in place now, said Dooley.

The cost of the computer enhancement program is estimated at \$500,000, and is to be covered in the \$3 million recommended by the architect.

The board also conducted a discussion on the pros and cons of keeping the sixth graders at the middle school.

Although Gladden and Weems had differing opinions, the consensus was the sixth graders should stay at the middle school.

Gladden said parents had a reason to be concerned over the sixth graders at the middle school last year, but many corrections have been made.

The sixth grade lunch will now be separate from the seventh and eighth graders, and each class of students will have its own teachers, he said.

The board needs to talk to the sixth grade teachers, said Weems, who also said he thinks the sixth graders belong at the intermediate school.

The board approved the person-

nel policies discussed at the last meeting, which include the new federally mandated Drug Free Work Place.

In discussion during the last board meeting, it was questioned if alcohol should not be included in the drug free work place policy.

Miller said during this last meeting the school attorney recommended leaving alcohol out, because it is a federally written policy.

Use of alcohol is already covered by Policy G-C, which indicates teachers are to be role models and exhibit fitness to teach.

Miller said the board could write a policy specific to alcohol if it desired.

In other business, the board:

—Recognized teacher Eddie Parker who was named the Vocational Educator of the Year in New Mexico.

—Reviewed and approved the journal transactions.

—Approved a cash transfer.

—Opened and awarded the bid for milk products to Prices, who was the low bidder with a unit cost of 0.1299 per half pint, plus an escalation clause.

—Awarded the bid for meat products to Watson Foods Inc., pending a review by the superintendent.

—Conducted a brief discussion on the cafeteria school lunch pro-

gram, in which it was announced lunch prices did not have to be increased.

—Renewed the annual contract with Great American Reserve.

—Accepted the resignations from Phyllis Morgan (5th grade teacher), Lynda Sanchez (Spanish/history teacher at high school), Susan Long Fleharty (special education/journalism teacher at high school), and Mitzi Cates (special education aide, middle school).

—Accepted recommendations to hire Ida Maldonado as a Spanish teacher at the high school; Nancy Schmidt, fourth grade teacher; Sherrie Ryan, half-time fifth grade teacher.

—Approved requests from KBUY and KRUI radio stations to broadcast athletic events, and for the local cable station to videotape, pending the board's receipt of a letter from the station.

—Accepted a donation from the Ruidoso Little Theatre to help establish a drama program and scholarship fund.

—Scheduled a time to inspect the work done at the middle school and high school parking lots, at 9 a.m. Friday, August 11.

The next regular meeting is scheduled for 7 p.m. Tuesday, September 12, at the administration office.

Council awards legal contract...again

The Ruidoso Village Council voted, once again, at its regular meeting Tuesday, to offer the contract for legal services to current village attorney John Underwood.

Councillor J.D. James said the council evaluated the four proposals from attorneys according to the points systems outlined in the request for proposals sent out by the village. He said, based on that system, Underwood was given the highest points. James said the council had a "face-to-face" meeting with Underwood and, following negotiations, found no need to talk to

the other attorneys.

James made the motion to award Underwood the contract and the council voted unanimously to accept the motion.

The council also approved a final budget resolution for the 1988-89 fiscal year and gave its approval to the 1989-90 operating budget.

Councillor Al Junge wanted the council to delay action on the budget, saying he had three different budgets and couldn't tell what was what from the mass of figures.

"I'm lost," Junge said. Councillor Tom McNeil asked finance director John Varley and vil-

lage manager Frank Potter if they were satisfied with the budget and got affirmative replies. Potter said he thought this was one of the best budgets in years and the figures in it could not be fabricated.

McNeil then made the motion to accept the budget resolution, and the council voted five to one to accept the motion. Junge cast the one "no" vote, saying "absolutely not."

In a public hearing, the council voted to transfer the ownership of a dispenser liquor license to Mike Garcia Inc. for the Bull Ring of Ruidoso Restaurant at 1200 Mechem Drive.

In another public hearing, the

council voted to adopt ordinance 89-3 which enacted, amended and repealed certain sections of the New Mexico Uniform Traffic Ordinance adopted by the village. Ordinance 89-3 amended the Village of Ruidoso Code to conform with the laws of the State of New Mexico.

In other action before the council:

—A bid for the fuel at Sierra Blanca Regional Airport was accepted from Pride Avfuel of Abilene, Texas. Transportation and Aviation Division head Tim Morris told the council, Pride was the only bidder.

—Council gave its approval for publication of ordinance 89-4 which would revise the powers, duties and guidelines of the Personnel Board of the village. Division head Leon Eggleston said the board is a recommendation board on personnel matters. He said the decision of the board is not final. He said the final decision rests with village manager Frank Potter. Publication of the ordinance is required before a public hearing.

—Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr. appointed Jeff Maul and Doug Sidens to fill vacant position on the Planning and Zoning Commission.

He also recommended Councillor J.D. James continue to represent the village on the Extra Territorial Zoning Authority.

—Councillor Jess Stinson was designated as the voting delegate to the annual New Mexico Municipal League Conference, August 30, 31 and September 1, in Albuquerque. Tom McNeil was named as alternate.

—Because of the New Mexico Municipal League Conference, the council decided to move its next meeting to 6:30 p.m. Monday, August 28.

Sheriff seizes marijuana

Officers from the Sheriff's Office and State Police seized about 400 marijuana plants in the Hondo Valley Tuesday, said Lincoln County Sheriff, James McSwane.

Law enforcement officials served a search warrant at the residence of Orlando Gutierrez, in the Hondo Valley area, where approximately 400 marijuana plants, ranging in height from one to four feet, were confiscated, said McSwane.

He said the plants totalled about 37 pounds in weight.

Gutierrez, a resident of Phoenix,

Arizona, was not present during the seizure, and no arrests have been made at this time, said McSwane.

The Sheriff's Office received a report Friday from Chuck Dunn on vandalism at the Alto Lakes Golf and Country Club. The incident is under investigation.

A burglary in the Alto Village area was reported Saturday by Leon Duplessis III. The incident, believed to have occurred between July 16 and August 5, is under investigation.

Judge demands storage space

The Lincoln County manager's office was served Wednesday with an order from District Judge Richard A. Parsons demanding emergency storage for court records.

Administrative assistant Martha Guevara said the order was complied with by 5 p.m. Wednesday.

The foyer and all hallways adjacent to the court facilities have been declared emergency storage areas for court records

by Parsons, who ordered the county commission to provide the personnel to place the records there by 5 p.m. today.

The District Court has a storage room for records, but this apparently became full, and records were being stored in the office area, said Guevara.

In the order, Parsons said the District Court had made repeated requests for the past four years and eight months for space to store the court records.

affected, but only one owner responded and he was in favor of the change. In Block BB, there were 13 affected properties, five owners wanted the change, four were against it and one gave no preference.

Several people at the meeting voiced their opinion on the proposed change.

Hope Courier said she did not want her property zoned commercial. She said she represented the majority of property owners in the 300 and 400 block of Main Road and they wanted no further commercial zoning west of Zack's Burgers.

"We believe R-1 will maintain the value of the area," she said.

Hazel Haynsworth said the reason the owners wanted their property change to commercial was to increase their property value. She said the planning and zoning commission should not change zoning to add value to property.

"We've been through it before," she said.

Chairman Robert Donaldson said the reason the process was brought up, not to improve property values, but to give a final decision on the zoning and be done with it.

Attorney Robert Beauvais, who represents the Upper Canyon Business Association, said there has not been an infusion of business into the Upper Canyon since 1977, and the actual number of beds in cabins and lodges has decreased. He said traffic is not a problem and additional commercial property in the area would not destroy its pristine nature.

Beauvais said despite some

people's contention, the properties were never zoned commercial before, "property was bought and sold regularly in that area as C-1."

T.C. Stinson said he had commercial property all around him.

"I want mine zoned commercial," he said.

Haynsworth said this was a bad time to contact property owners because a lot of people are on vacation. She asked if the objections from the last public hearing would be considered in the commission's polling and decision.

Village attorney John Underwood said the only ones being counted were the last responses.

"The protest must be based on the last mailing," he said.

Commissioner White said the residential areas of Ruidoso should be preserved and protected.

"The basic income in Ruidoso is from property tax," he said. "Protecting residential values is important."

Donaldson said the area has a history of mixed zoning. He said the rezoning is a question of individual property owners' rights.

"Whose rights do you bridge?" Donaldson asked.

He went on to say the commission had reasons to go either way with the decision, but he said a decision has to be made.

Finally, Commissioner David Harding made a motion the commission recommend the rezoning of these properties: Sleepy Hollow subdivision, block B, lot 96A; Sleepy Hollow subdivision, block BB, lots 1, 1A, 133D, 133E, 133F, 133G and 133H. Commissioner Tim Hoyt seconded the motion, and it passed.

In other actions, the commission endorsed an amended conceptual

plan for a bike and hiking trail around the proposed golf course on the old municipal airport property.

Ruidoso News editor Frankie Jarrell told the commission about a recent meeting of a group of citizens in which the outline of the trail system was discussed. She said the trail system would be a economic benefit and an enhancement to all of Ruidoso.

Chairman Donaldson, who was also part of the recent meeting, called the trail system "a real exciting proposition."

The commission also sent a resolution to the village council requesting the council to designate the Planning and Zoning Commission as the initial hearing body on Building and Nuisance Code amendments.

Donaldson told Councillor J.D. James, who was at the meeting, there needed to be a place to hold public hearings on code amendments that would not take up the valuable time at Village Council meetings.

In other business before the commission: —A front yard variance was given to Joe Birdwell to construct a 12-foot by 16-foot open deck at 353 County Club Drive.

—A front yard variance was given to Welton Allen to allow construction of a 14-foot by 22-foot garage at 104 Encanto Road.

—Approval was given to the Village of Ruidoso for an amended site development at the village's street maintenance yard. The village will be moving several of the hangars at the old airport to the site for equipment storage, general storage and a welding shop.

Following the meeting, Commissioner John White said he is

resigning from the commission.

White said when he was named to the commission he went into it with the idea of upgrading a lot of the area in Ruidoso and protecting the residential areas.

"It's painfully obvious the rest of the commission is not concerned about enforcement and broadly speaking, residential property values," he said.

White stated he is not anti-commercial, but he said there has been no village-wide leadership on enforcement and the talk of cleaning up the town is just that, "all talk."

He said he doesn't mind the role of being the voice of dissent on the commission. But, he said the right questions still have to be asked.

"My feeling is the P&Z is not ready to make hard decisions," White said.

He said he felt this was a good time to control of things while building and construction is down. He said he feels the council is at fault for breaking up Mainstreet by allowing the commercial zoning of a residence and for not properly funding the planning staff. He said a part-time code enforcement officer is not enough to do the job.

White also said he gets the feeling things are not important. He said it is difficult to get the commission to understand that because of turnovers, there is a need for a policy manual and unfinished business on the agenda.

He said he has failed to persuade the commissioners to pay attention to the nuts and bolts of the commission. He said commissioners have let the bureaucracy run the commission, instead of the other way around.

Ruidoso construction totals remain near 1988 levels

The value of building permits issued the first seven months of 1989 is running very close to the value of permits issued the first seven months of 1988.

Total value for the seven months this year is \$3,733,806 compared to \$3,878,856 for the same period last year.

Value of permits issued in July of this year was \$960,245. The figure for June of this year was \$292,075.

However, one permit for a single family dwelling issued in July was for a home valued at \$500,000. The permit was issued to R.D. Hubbard, owner of Ruidoso Downs Race Track, for a dwelling at 102 Willis Horton Drive in White Mountain Unit 5.

Permits issued in July of 1988 had a value of \$881,225.

Permits for single family dwellings issued in July totalled \$716,700, compared to \$175,000 in June of this year and \$501,335 in July of 1988.

Residential additions and alterations in July of this year totalled \$168,820; June's figure was \$100,475.

The total for July of 1988 was \$339,870.

One permit was issued in July of this year for rebuilding a fire-damaged house and deck. This was for \$65,000.

A boiler building and piping at White Mountain School is to cost \$4,700, according to the permit. A storage shed for track equipment at

Ruidoso High School is listed at \$4,000.

The only other permit was for a foundation, listed at \$1,025.



Skiers turn to biking

The series of biking/hiking trails that have taken hold in Summit County, Colorado, were used in 1987 by more than 70,800 people.

They rode bicycles, walked their dogs, jogged, hiked and even rode horses on the extensive network of paved and signed trails that extend through the more than half a dozen towns in the resort area.

Summit County planners, faced with a popular trail system that was being used beyond its capacity, gathered information in July 1987 through a survey of trails users.

They found out that the typical user is a 30-year-old male from the Denver Metropolitan Area. The survey showed that men were just slightly ahead of women, with 53 percent of users surveyed being men and the other 47 percent women.

Many of the Denver residents have a second home in the Summit County recreation area.

The survey showed that the typical trails user has an income of more than \$40,000 a year, and can be expected to spend a little more than \$38 a day while visiting Summit County.

On a visit to Summit County this summer, it was apparent that those figures have increased since the 1987 survey, with county planners estimating the use has

doubled.

Summer visitors, according to license plates and talk on the streets, are coming from all over the state, as well as from Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico.

A visit to Team Managers Ski and Bike Company, with locations in Frisco and Denver, offered a chance to watch a mother and her three young sons, all from Missouri, get outfitted with rented bikes and helmets for a ride through the trails.

The youngsters, from two to eight years old, and their mom were vacationing in Colorado, and took a few days to ride the trails of Summit County.

Stewart J. Voutour, operations manager for Team Managers, said that's not unusual. He said biking the trails is really a family sport, and his shop rents equipment for all ages and levels of expertise.

Voutour couldn't be happier with his new season. Before the trails became so popular, Team Managers was a very successful ski shop—open just during ski season.

These days he closes after ski season, completely reorganizes his shop into a bicycle shop, and reopens for a brand new season.

"It's great," said Voutour.

That season, according to Summit County figures, is from June 15 through September 20. Planners say that \$2.7 million in retail sales is generated because of the trails system, which is also credited with generating \$108,000 in sales tax revenue.

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County may take trash to Otero County site

Lincoln County is seeking to send its garbage to Otero County. The Lincoln County Board of Commissioners (LCBC) adopted a resolution to petition the Otero County Board of Commissioners for permission to transport and dump solid waste in Otero County.

The resolution is from November 15, 1989, to May 31, 1990, pending an answer from Waste Management Inc. if the Dog Canyon landfill site can handle solid waste from both counties.

There was no problem with the Dog Canyon site accepting garbage from both counties for the next six months, but the site would have to be evaluated before accepting any more solid waste after that time, said S. Louis Sanfilippo, regional landfill manager for Waste Management.

"We've been fortunate to have a good neighbor county," said Nick Pappas, Lincoln County manager.

The county acted on the recommendation of the technical sub-committee of the Landfill Advisory Committee (LFAC) that Lincoln County seek to contract with a private solid waste disposal company and transport the county's solid waste elsewhere.

The sub-committee's report cited as a primary reason that Lincoln County does not have enough time to properly locate, research, and then permit another landfill site.

"We seem to be hitting deadlines and are under extreme pressure," said Pappas, who also chaired the LFAC.

Bill Scott, county manager for Otero County, was present at the special meeting of the LCBC Tuesday at the village council chambers of Ruidoso Village Hall.

Scott said the Otero commissioners would not lift the ban on out-of-county solid waste unless they were certain the Dog Canyon site could handle the increased load.

"Waste Management would have to advise, if not guarantee, the site could handle both counties' trash," said Scott.

Sanfilippo said an answer could be given in four weeks, but based on information he already had, the site can handle both counties' trash for the next six months.

Pappas recounted the history regarding the county's landfill situation at the start of the special meeting.

He mentioned the county will not be able to use the landfill at Fort Stanton hospital after the first of November, and that shortly after that, Ruidoso's contract to haul solid waste to Roswell will expire.

He also noted the present, temporary site on Fort Stanton road could possibly be used until October, but the contract with the Village of Ruidoso expires on September 7.

Pappas commented it is not clear what every governmental entity intends to do about solid

waste disposal.

"I'm not sure where you are with what you want to do," Pappas said to Ruidoso Downs Mayor Jake Harris. Pappas commented that Harris may be planning to begin his own landfill, but Harris did not respond to Pappas' statement.

Representatives of various solid waster disposal companies were present and presented information on their operations to the LCBC.

Sanfilippo, of Waste Management, said the smaller communities and counties will have to band together to dispose of solid waste because the costs will be too high.

"The daily operations will be enough to choke a cow," he said.

He said Waste Management operates in anticipation of the imposition of new Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) regulations known as the Subtitle D regs.

In his presentation, Sanfilippo noted the expense involved in operating a landfill, which could run anywhere between \$100,000 to

\$500,000 each year.

Enormous liability costs would be levied should anything go wrong, because the operator would be responsible for clean-up.

"Did you ever try to clean up an aquifer?" asked Sanfilippo.

He also said an operator would need an annual income of at least \$500,000 to \$700,000 to cover operational expenses.

"We are in a new era of trash management," said Chris Barton, of Tri-Sect Landfill in Valencia County.

Tri-Sect's landfill has a compacted clay liner which provides protection 100 times better than the minimum standard for disposal of hazardous waste, said Barton.

"I don't think it's quite as deadly as it seems," said Lynn Stokes, who operates a landfill in Sunland Park, New Mexico.

Stokes noted because of the dry climate in this area, the creation of methane gas is not as critical as it might be in wetter climates.

Lincoln County is considering the development of a series of transfer stations for solid waste disposal, a system that has both assets and drawbacks, said Stokes.

"What do you do with the dead animals?" asked Stokes. "You have local people here who I think are capable of running a landfill," said Stokes.

There was also a brief discussion on expanding the capabilities of the transfer station in Ruidoso.

The county is still reviewing how to establish a series of transfer stations for solid waste that will be convenient for the entire county.

Bill McCarty said if free disposal isn't made available, people will start to dump illegally.

Jim Edwards, from Environmental Improvement Division, disagreed. He said before new EID regulations users paid no fee to dump garbage, and still there were instances of illegal dumping.

Story on Ruidoso Downs legal problems is corrected

In a story published Monday in *The Ruidoso News*, it was incorrectly reported that Ruidoso Downs municipal clerk Janice Polk was appointed to her position after Wilma Webb served in that job.

In fact, two women, first JoAnn Jenkins and then Jean Stillman, were appointed to the job before Polk, who was deputy clerk before she was promoted through an appointment by Mayor Jake Harris.

Also in that story, attorney Gary Mitchell is quoted as saying that former Downs employee Nick Cleckler received a settlement of \$30,000 in a suit alleging wrongful termination.

Mayor Harris provided a copy of the findings of fact signed by District Judge Richard A. Parsons that indicates Cleckler was awarded only \$13,279.73 plus interest and costs.

Mescalero offers Heritage Day events

Much of the history and culture of the Mescalero Apaches is unknown to the non-Indian population.

In an effort to highlight and educate both the non-Indian and the Mescalero youth, the community services subcommittee of Mescalero is sponsoring the first-ever Apache Heritage Day on August 19.

"The ceremony is aimed at reviving some of the cultural things so the children can carry them on," Heritage Day coordinator Evelyn Breuninger said.

She added that the day will be devoted to the history of the three tribes that comprise the population on the Mescalero reservation.

The three groups include the Lipans, who migrated from Mexico in 1903, the Chirichihua, who moved to Mescalero from Fort Sill in 1913, Oklahoma and the Mes-

calero Apaches. The festivities will run from 9 a.m. until midnight in front of the museum building across from the Mescalero Cultural Center.

Various booths and teepees will line the parking lot, with some of the tribal members displaying their skills and/or special knowledge.

Breuninger said some of these skills include a demonstration in Tiswin making, an alcoholic drink derived from corn.

Other activities include an Apache dress contest (prizes based on the most authentic), a display and demonstration of beadwork and a lesson in how to dry and skin a hide.

"Apache Heritage Day will revitalize many of the cultural practices," Breuninger said. "It's to bring to light what it means to be Apaches."

The Plant Corner

The rains have finally come to old Lincoln town. The moist, cool air has turned our brown countryside to a luscious green and the flowers to vivid colors.

Joe Baca, an expert dahlia grower, has been bringing fresh-cut dahlia bouquets to Ellen Faye, our Lincoln postmistress, for all to enjoy. Joe's flowers make a bright spot for all who visit the post office.

I had guests for lunch today and Joe gave me a large bouquet of yellow dahlias. I got out my ruler for one that measured more than nine inches in diameter. It was obvious Joe had driven many stakes, had done lots of tying, thinning and pinching to accomplish such beauty.

Joe cuts the flowers very early in the morning and if he wants them to last a little longer time, he places the cut stems immediately in two or three inches of hot water to stand in the gradually-cooling water for several hours or overnight.

Again, he may stop to pick a few flowers on his way to the post office. All cut flowers will last longer in water if foxgloves are incorporated in the arrangement. If their presence is not considered suitable for a particular artistic affect, add foxglove tea to the water: pour boiling water on a handful of leaves and flowers, or just the leaves alone if the flowers are not in season, and allow the foxglove tea to steep overnight. Another trick is to put a few copper pennies in the water.

A very big "thank you" to Joe Baca from all who enjoy his labor of love. With Joe's absolutely beautiful flowers and Ellen Faye's in-

credible smile, our trip to the post office is the high point of the day.

Perhaps, because of Joe Baca and his success growing dahlias, a couple of large gladioli farms have been planted in the Old Lincoln town area the last couple of years. Last year's crops were very successful and this year would have been just as good had a neighbor's cattle not broken into the gladioli fields and eaten the plants to the ground.

These gladioli farms supply cut flowers to El Paso, Albuquerque, and other nearby florists. It is truly a beautiful sight to see acres of gladioli in bloom. Many tourists were seen standing by the fences with cameras clicking.

Everyone is invited to come to Old Lincoln town to see the beautiful flowers, enjoy a delicious meal at the Wortley Hotel, and make a day of happy memories.

Should you return home inspired to plant a bed of gladioli, these are a few hints my mother passed on to me. Mother told me that many people planted gladioli in their vegetable garden simply because the stakes that they need look ugly in the flower beds. However, in the vegetable garden one must be careful where the gladioli are planted for it is extremely bad for peas and beans to have them near, and so bad for strawberries that they will suffer if the gladioli are not planted at least 60 feet away from the berries.

The miniature gladioli are a favorite source of winter cut flowers when grown in a cool greenhouse. They are just as lovely as the larger varieties and take up less room.

More than 6,000 attend '89 Old Lincoln Days

Lincoln swelled to more than 6,000 people this past weekend during the annual Old Lincoln Days.

Cars were parked along the street throughout town, and up to a half mile on each side of town.

There were more entries in the parade, also, than in previous years, said Rosalie Dunlap, a parade organizer.

With an estimated 6,000 to 8,000 visitors over the weekend, this year's attendance at the Old Lincoln Days was the largest ever, said Dunlap.

Traffic in town frequently slowed to a stop from the congestion of horses, pedestrians, cars, and through-traffic.

"It's given us all something to think about," said Bob Hart of the Lincoln Heritage Trust.

Lincoln experienced an overall increase in visitation this year which may test the village's ability to deal with large crowds.

Visitors to the museums operated by the Lincoln Heritage Trust (LHT) totaled 6,178 during July. In 1988, the number was 4,336, and in 1985 the number was 2,956.

The total of visitors recorded by the LHT during 1988 was 18,012. This year, the total number is already 14,834.

Hart said the LHT is advertising more than in the past, with metals in the Ruidoso area being targeted. The LHT also has a public service announcement on local television stations.

Movies like "Young Guns" and the recent episodes on "Unsolved Mysteries" regarding the Brushy Bill Roberts story, help to keep interest high in Billy the Kid, and may also contribute to the increase in the number of visitors to Lincoln, said Hart.

At some point, issues such as parking, visitor amenities, and traf-

fic flow, will have to be addressed, he said.

"I hope we do not end up reacting and plan instead," said Hart.

"There's a saturation point and we're already reaching it," said Jack Rigney of the Lincoln State Monument. Rigney said visitation recorded by the State Monument is already up 70 percent this year and is expected to double last year's visits.

There was no shortage of attractions in Lincoln for visitors.

Food vendors and other street sellers were present to serve the many tourists who came to experience some of the history pertaining to Billy the Kid and the Lincoln County War.

Exhibitions of spinning, weaving, blacksmithing, and other craft activities of the old west were available.

The Texas 4th Army Cavalry and the New Mexico Territorial Militia were present, and provided demonstrations for the visitors.

The Danza Matachin Pavo Real Dancers, of Clint, Texas, performed on Saturday on the grounds of the San Juan Church.

The headline attraction, of course, was the performance of "The Last Escape of Billy the Kid," also known as the Pageant.

An independent film crew was present covering the event, and who hope to sell their documentary to PBS for broadcast next year.

The lead characters included Bill Shrecengost Jr. as Billy the Kid, Dan Storm as Buckshot Roberts, Thomas Shrecengost as John Tunstall, Bill Wise as Alexander McSween, Katherine Sanchez as Susan McSween, and Lanny Maddox as Sheriff Pat Garrett.

One hundred years ago, pony express riders endured danger, hardship, and mishap while riding through the rugged American west to deliver the mail on time.

It wasn't any different during Saturday's 21st running of the Lincoln County Pony Express Race, which had one contestant scratched after he was bucked from his horse, and another who ran four miles because his horse wouldn't.

For the second year in a row, Jamil Hindi, of Hindi Arabians in Duran won the event by riding the rugged 35-mile course in 1:48:10, better than his time last year of 1:50:25.

"It's getting rougher every year, or maybe I'm getting a little older," Hindi said after he dismounted and turned in his mailbag to make his time official.

Though the second place team arrived just less than 13 minutes later, they were bound and determined to challenge Hindi to the end.

Grant and Kordell Vigil, from Dulce placed second in 2:01:08, but the teenagers worked hard for their position.

At the start, Grant rode out to the front, but his horse began to buck. After the horse was back under control, the Vigil team led the race to the first exchange by five minutes.

But things started going bad for Kordell. First the 13-year-old was thrown from the horse because it was spooked by a cattle guard, he said.

Then, between the schoolhouse

and Robinson exchange, his 28-year-old horse wouldn't run any more.

Kordell carried the mail pouch over his shoulder and ran for four miles in cowboy boots, leading the horse to the next exchange.

"You're only 17 minutes behind, go!" said Grant to his brother, according to a Hindi team member who was at the exchange.

At the end of the race, the Vigil brothers finished 12:58 behind Hindi.

The third place team was Lori Bell and Krista Braught, from Bosque Farms.

Hindi received a hand-tooled commemorative saddle, made by Harlan Webb of Carrizozo. Each of the teams received a cash prize.

There were no other entries in the race.

A rodeo with about 300 participants went on throughout the afternoon.

One of the more comical events was the rescue race, which had one participant ride full-tilt down the arena to lift another onto the horse without stopping.

Outside, the practice field housed clutches of blue clad jerseys huffing and puffing to protect a pigskin.


The first week of high school athletics was in progress.

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Best at Downs rival in Derby

Saturday's 22nd running of the Ruidoso Thoroughbred Derby has drawn the best field of three-year-olds that have raced here this season, including 1989 local stakes winners Straight Reality, Fast Trick, Jae Ego and Just Like Lace. Saturday's purse of \$25,000-added was recently raised from \$20,000-added as part of an August purse hike. This one mile event will be the 12th race on a 14-race card.

Of the five thoroughbred stakes races run at Ruidoso Downs this season for three year olds, all five winners are in Saturday's race. Straight Reality has won two of those stakes races this season: the Memorial Day Handicap and the Jockey Club Handicap. Trained by Vicki McCabe and ridden by Mike Lidberg, Straight Reality was most recently third in an Invitational Handicap behind Half Halo on July 23. Straight Reality breaks from the rail Saturday. Half Halo, who was also fourth in the Jockey Club Handicap, will be ridden by jockey Richard Bickel.

Hondo Valley Handicap winner Fast Trick has won both of his starts here this season. Aside from his stakes win, he won a July 1 allowance. With regular rider Eugene O'Neill, Fast Trick, trained by Eddie Milligan, will attempt a mile for the first time in his career.

Jae Ego won the June 10 Norgor Derby. Since then, he is winless against some of the top three-year-olds at Ruidoso Downs. Just Like Lace is the only filly in Saturday's race. She has won the First Lady Handicap and the Aspen Breeders' Cup Handicap here this season, both sprints. Regular rider Larry Payne, who has won five

Thoroughbred stakes this season, will be aboard.


Just Like Lace won the one-mile Las Senoritas Stakes at Albuquerque earlier this spring.

Bradley's Khalie has been chasing Key To Charisma in his two most recent races. On July 21, he was sixth in an allowance, and was third behind Key To Charisma on July 16. Bradley's Khalie was also third in a June 25 Invitational Handicap. He is winless in five starts here this season, and will be

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Patients can range from boas to sheep at area veterinary clinic

Their specialties range from performing ultra-sound on pregnant sheep to treating anorexic boa constrictors.

It's not unusual to see a mare limping around the barn wearing a fiberglass cast or a racehorse riding away in a trailer with braces on his teeth.

Injured racehorses and pregnant sheep are just a few of the cases veterinarians John Harlacker and Warren Franklin of the Greentree Veterinary Hospital have taken on.

And how do you cure a boa constrictor of a loss of appetite?

Franklin, a graduate of Colorado State University, said the cure is a bowl of water, a wetter environment and a warm rock to curl up under.

Harlacker said the Greentree Veterinary Clinic has been treating food and companion animals since 1984.

Most recently, Harlacker and Franklin have begun paving the way in New Mexico in diagnostic ultra-sound techniques in sheep.

The technique is used to scan ewes in order to initially diagnose a pregnancy and then to determine whether or not the ewe is carrying twins.

"It's a human instrument that

has been adapted to animals," Franklin said.

The ewes carrying twins can be separated and the tendency to produce twins can be more carefully monitored, Harlacker said. The trait can then be used to increase the size of the herd.

A location of the vet hospital so close to the race track has helped them to establish a reputation for working on large animals and horses, but Harlacker said they are equally equipped to handle small animals.

Harlacker primarily works with the horses and Franklin said he works with most of the other animals.

The facility, located just up the hill from Ruidoso Downs Race Track, houses a large animal surgery unit. The room is padded from the floor to midway up the walls so the horse will not injure itself when it comes out of the anesthesia, Harlacker said.

The anesthesia is administered to the horse after it enters the room, and falls asleep on the hydraulic table so neither the horse nor the veterinarians have to endure the strain of lifting the immense weight of the animal.

"The horse walks in and the horse walks out," Harlacker added.

If necessary, the animal is then

moved into an intensive care unit, where someone can keep a constant watch.

A long intravenous unit can be attached to the horse so that it can remain standing and moving around without fear of pulling it out.

Both veterinarians came to the Ruidoso area from farms in New Mexico, and both credit their love of animals as the reason for making this career choice.

Franklin cites the lower pay scale as one of the only disadvantages of choosing animal medicine over human medicine.

He added that the job is unique and is constantly changing.

"You have to be real adaptable because you treat many species—not just like human doctors," Franklin said. "You treat everything from the warm-blooded to the cold-blooded."

But Franklin and Greentree receptionist Lynn Hutchison agreed that the most difficult part of the job is losing an animal or having to put one to sleep.

"Thank goodness it doesn't happen that often," Franklin said.

"It's hard if it's an animal we've been taking care of a long time," Hutchison said. "You have to like it (veterinary medicine) to do it."

FACT 7. The Village cannot lose the land. The lender will only have the right to assume the obligations of the lease should default occur.

FACT 8. Adequate land at the site will be set aside for the construction of a Civic Events Center by the Village of Ruidoso with adequate room for expansion when needed.

FACT 9. The acquisition of land for the Performing Arts Center will be paid for by our benefactors and not by the Village.

FACT 10. This project will mean a projected 20 million dollars being poured into the Village for construction costs alone over the next two years—all at no cost to the Village. The project will insure our future as a first-class tourist resort. Without it, we will be lagging far behind our competitors.

If it is necessary to go to a vote on this ordinance, it will delay the progress of this project for at least nine months. If we proceed now, we can begin to break ground in September.

Hazel Haynsworth noted this week that the good relationship between the village animal control department and the Humane Society is one reason the local organization is so successful in educating the public, sheltering and caring for animals, placing those animals in good homes and promoting and spaying and neutering program.

When enough funds are available, the Humane Society will expand its shelter to provide services for stray and abandoned animals from throughout the county.

The non-profit organization started the month with a puppet show fundraiser, and it will continue with the annual flea market sale August 18-20, at Wal-Mart. Besides providing a place for the sale, Wal-Mart also matches what the Humane Society makes.

Ruidoso Downs Race Track will donate the proceeds from Ladies Day at the Turf Club to the Humane Society after the last Thursday of the season. For a special \$7 admission, women can enjoy the races in the comfortable Turf Club, while helping the Humane Society. For each \$7 admission, Ruidoso Downs donates \$5 to the designated charity.

Here We Go Again...

...With the battle-of-the-assumptions about the state trust lands. State Land Commissioner William Humphries wants to charge the State Game Department \$250,000 to sell permits for hunters to hunt on state trust lands. (P.S. He settled for \$50,000 for this year.)

Some game commissioners are outraged that there should be any charge. Christine DiGregorio of Gallup said it was wrong — "That wildlife belongs to everyone."

But it doesn't...

It's A Common And Understandable Assumption...

...And even abetted by Humphries's official title — "Commissioner of Public Lands" — but the truth is, he's not overseeing public lands. He's overseeing trust lands.

And that's a critical difference.

Every acre of those lands is ascribed to a particular beneficiary, and it is Humphries's job to get a maximum return on those lands for the beneficiaries, while not allowing the lands to be destroyed or permanently damaged.

It's even conceivable that he could be sued by the beneficiaries if they caught him allowing hunters

to wander about killing the wildlife without any return to the beneficiaries... *****

It's As If Your Mama And Papa...

...Left you some land in trust and the First National Bank of Wherever was the trustee. If that bank allowed someone to use that land without any return to your trust, you'd be pretty peeved, wouldn't you?

You might even charge the executive officer with dereliction of his fiduciary responsibility, which is lawyer/banker-talk for "fell down on the job" ... *****

Well, The Land Commissioner...

...Has the same responsibility. "Mama and Papa," i.e., the United States government, gave the State of New Mexico those lands at the time of statehood, under the terms of a Congressionally-approved enabling act.

The enabling act, and corresponding language in our 1911 State Constitution, defined the lands as being in trust to serve certain beneficiaries. Three percent of the revenue runs the State Land Office. Ninety-seven percent of the revenue from those lands goes into the state Permanent Fund

to be invested, and the income is distributed annually among the beneficiaries. *****

And Who Are These Mysterious Beneficiaries?...

...The beneficiaries of the trusts Humphries serves are:

— The "common schools," which are the state's 88 public school districts.

— New Mexico State University in Las Cruces, and, indirectly, its branches.

— Western New Mexico University in Silver City, and its branches.

— Northern New Mexico Community College in Espanola/El Rito, and its branches: the only two-year school that is a direct beneficiary, because it was the state normal (teacher's) school at the time the constitution was written.

— Eastern New Mexico University in Portales, and its branches.

— New Mexico Institute of Mining and Technology, in Socorro.

— New Mexico Military Institute, in Roswell. (NMMI, although supposedly a private school, got on the gravy train in 1911, and that's why the state could force the Institute to accept female cadets after the passage of the 1973 Equal Rights Amendment.)

— New Mexico Boys' School, in Springer.

— Miners' Colfax Medical Center, in Raton.

— Las Vegas Medical Center (the state hospital).

— Department of Corrections (the state prisons).

— New Mexico School for the Deaf, in Santa Fe.

— New Mexico School for the Visually Handicapped, in Alamogordo.

— State Engineer's Office, for water reservoirs and Rio Grande improvements, specifically.

— Carrie Tingley Hospital (for crippled children), in Albuquerque.

— State Parks and Recreation, for upkeep of state parks.

...Even as I wrote this, was in Washington persuading federal Health and Human Services Secretary Lewis Sullivan to lean on the Health Care Finance Administration to give New Mexico more time to bring Los Lunas Hospital and Training Center up to snuff.

And the good news is, he apparently succeeded. Los Lunas now has through December to meet the federal standards, and it will be done under state authority.

On the other hand, Carruthers said, this agreement "in no way reduces the continued requirement to perform" at the school.

And it in no way reduces the pressure from patient advocate groups to (a) improve services and (b) put more of the patients into mainstream or semi-mainstream living situations. *****

By the Way, The Governor Says...

...He didn't send a letter to Santa Fe Police Chief Ray Sisneros asking him to clear skateboarders off capital complex property. And John Dendahl says he never told Wilson Learning he was canceling a Cabinet retreat there because of their anti-WIPP stance.

Actually, Carruthers says, he...um...he never signed the letter about the skateboarders. It was over his signature, yes, but it was signed by something called an "auto-pen" after being written by the General Services Department and approved by his chief of staff, Maralyn Budke.

But, he says, Ms. Budke assures him he's "on the right side of the issue."

The police chief, meanwhile, says he still doesn't have the manpower to worry about skateboarders, no matter which governor or which machine signed the letter.

Forest Service opens fuelwood areas

The Smokey Bear Ranger District has several areas open for personal use fuelwood gathering, according to the district office.

The Big Pine area will be for dead-down fuelwood and is located near Ancho. Dead-down fuelwood is generally scarce and hard to locate. The area that will be open is located

in a juniper push area which provides a somewhat heavier concentration of material.

Two green fuelwood areas will be opening on July 31. The east Capitan divide area is located 7 miles north of Capitan and east of State Highway 246. The north Capitan area is located approxi-

mately 28 miles northeast of Capitan near Copland Canyon.

The harvesting of standing trees, as fuelwood, creates opening in the piñon/juniper type. This provides additional forage for livestock and wildlife, which is the management emphasis for the area as directed by the Lincoln forest plan.

WRITE IT AND REAP!



Although you may be tempted to cut down on the cost of your ad by using abbreviations, surveys indicate that many people don't understand such abbreviations as EIK (eat-in kitchen) or WSW (white side wall tires) and won't take the time to figure them out. A confused reader is a disinterested reader. Get the most for your money and use complete words.



4. Include phone number and specify hours. Be sure to let potential customers know when and where to call. Surveys show that even if a person is very interested in your item or service, he or she will not call back after the first attempt. Stay near the phone during the hours you indicate you will be available. Don't risk missing a sale!



5. Run on consecutive days. Your ad will not get results if people don't see it. Therefore, it is important to set up a consistent and consecutive ad schedule with your telephone salesperson or outside sales representative. Run your ad for at least one week. Remember, you can cancel your ad as soon as you get the desired result!
