Airport manager reviews emergency procedures

Last Saturday's crash of a single engine Cessna aircraft near Sierra Blanca Regional Airport was an opportunity to test the airport's emergency procedure.

According to Tim Morris, Aviation and Transportation Division director for the Village of Ruidoso, the personnel at the airport performed well.

"I don't feel anything went major wrong," he said.

Morris said the airport had just gotten its own fire equipment and airport personnel were at the crash scene within a few minutes. He said the one area he sees that could be improved was the coordination between the airport and county emergency (EMS) personnel.

Morris said currently two members of his staff are EMS qualified and that eventually all his staff will be.

He added the thing which could hurt the airport's emergency procedures is its location away from any municipality.

"That's why we have our fire truck and our equipment," he said.

He said in an emergency, he would contact the Bonito and Fort Stanton Fire Departments for additional fire fighting support.

"We'll help them, if they will help us," he said.

According to Morris, the first thing which should happen in the event of a crash is either the tower or someone should notify Lincoln County Sheriff's Office dispatch. Then airport personnel should proceed immediately to the area with the airport's fire truck.

The fire truck is capable of carrying 400 gallons of water and is also capable of spraying foam on a fire. The truck is equipped with a spray nozzle that can be controlled from inside the truck and can spray water or foam on a fire from 100 feet. It also has all the equipment necessary to extract a person from a wreckage.

Morris said the airport personnel would provide immediate care to the victims of a crash until ambulances arrive from Alto, Capitan, and even Ruidoso, if necessary.

He said last Saturday, outside assistance got to the airport in about 15 to 18 minutes. One of the

Senate leader confirms candidacy on visit here

State Senator Les Houston, in Ruidoso Friday, said even though he has not made it official, he is a Republican candidate for governor of New Mexico.

"I plan to announce on either October 7 or 8," Houston said. "I made a decision about a month ago to run."

The Albuquerque Senate leader was in Ruidoso for a reception in his honor Friday at Carrizo Lodge.

Houston said once he makes his candidacy official, he will go forward with an aggressive hard hitting campaign.

Houston said he decided to run after looking at the other candidates for governor and the problems of New Mexico. Houston says his work ethic, his success with dealing with tough issues and par-

ticular his knowledge of the legislative process would help him as governor.

"Occasionally we elect governors who are uncomfortable with the legislative process," he said. "One cannot be a really successful governor without understanding that process."

Houston said the major issues in this campaign will be the same issues he first heard as a boy, education, crime, economic development and health care.

He said he won't be afraid in the campaign to discuss the tough issues and he won't skirt around the edges of an issue.

"As governor, there's not any issue I would hesitate to take on," he said.

"We have got a tremendous problem with drugs," he said. "I would do anything possible to com-

mit this state to a point to continue the fight against drugs, as we must all through the United States."

Houston also said the rise in residential burglaries has him concerned.

"I intend to press and make that a top priority, to do everything we can to make it safer for people to be in their own homes," he said.

"There are some very serious crimes that go on. I don't know that anything can be more serious than going into someone's home, violating their home and taking their items and things they have accumulated over the years and cherish."

He said even though there has not been a lot of emphasis put on residential burglaries in the past,

Patients benefit from LCMC improvement

Big dollars made good sense with Lincoln County Medical Center's (LCMC) building project.

Already various departments are benefiting from improvements and new equipment purchased with the capital outlay mill levy funds.

In this, the first in a series of the improvements at LCMC, the medical lab and X-Ray department will be highlighted.

The medical lab facilities at LCMC are totally new, and can turn out 10,000 raw results per month, said Larry DeBeer, lab manager.

The unit is staffed 24 hours on four days each week to assist in emergency tests, and to do quality management inspections on the equipment prior to rush periods in the mornings, said DeBeer.

This speeds up results for inpatient tests for hospital physicians, and helps prepare the lab for outpatients who generally arrive early in the morning, he said.

The most common tests are complete blood counts (CBC) and chemistry tests for glucose levels, cholesterol and triglycerides, as well as urinalysis.

Some tests are sent to other labs

for completion because they are not done frequently enough at LCMC to maintain the capabilities, he said.

The lab also keeps a large supply of blood on hand, though DeBeer said more blood is used than what area residents usually donate.

The chemistry equipment presently in place was the second unit in New Mexico when it was installed two years ago, said DeBeer.

The cost then was \$75,000, while the replacement cost for the equipment is now \$125,000 or more.

While the inpatient population at LCMC may at times be low, the lab stays busy with an average of 400 outpatients per month.

Future goals for the lab include upgrading the hematology section and computerization of records.

The lab must keep records for up to seven years in the event previous tests need to be traced, said DeBeer.

Quality control is kept through routine calibration of the instruments by the lab staff, and by blind surveys conducted by independent agencies.

Every two months, the lab receives a test to complete and is graded, along with other labs throughout the state, on the ac-

Airport manager reviews emergency procedures

Last Saturday's crash of a single engine Cessna aircraft near Sierra Blanca Regional Airport was an opportunity to test the airport's emergency procedure.

According to Tim Morris, Aviation and Transportation Division director for the Village of Ruidoso, the personnel at the airport performed well.

"I don't feel anything went major wrong," he said.

Morris said the airport had just gotten its own fire equipment and airport personnel were at the crash scene within a few minutes. He said the one area he sees that could be improved was the coordination between the airport and county emergency (EMS) personnel.

Morris said currently two members of his staff are EMS qualified and that eventually all his staff will be.

He added the thing which could hurt the airport's emergency procedures is its location away from any municipality.

"That's why we have our fire truck and our equipment," he said.

He said in an emergency, he would contact the Bonito and Fort Stanton Fire Departments for additional fire fighting support.

"We'll help them, if they will help us," he said.

According to Morris, the first thing which should happen in the event of a crash is either the tower or someone should notify Lincoln County Sheriff's Office dispatch. Then airport personnel should proceed immediately to the area with the airport's fire truck.

The fire truck is capable of carrying 400 gallons of water and is also capable of spraying foam on a fire. The truck is equipped with a spray nozzle that can be controlled from inside the truck and can spray water or foam on a fire from 100 feet. It also has all the equipment necessary to extract a person from a wreckage.

Morris said the airport personnel would provide immediate care to the victims of a crash until ambulances arrive from Alto, Capitan, and even Ruidoso, if necessary.

He said last Saturday, outside assistance got to the airport in about 15 to 18 minutes. One of the

mit this state to a big effort to continue the fight against drugs, as we must all through the United States."


Houston also said the rise in residential burglaries has him concerned.

"I intend to press and make that a top priority, to do everything we can to make it safer for people to be in their own homes," he said.


"There are some very serious crimes that go on, I don't know that anything can be more serious than going into someone's home, violating their home and taking their items and things they have accumulated over the years and cherish."

All American Derby trials will showcase the top three year olds

Eight divisions of the All American Derby trials are scheduled Wednesday, August 16, at Ruidoso Downs, with some of the nation's top three-year-old Quarter Horses expected to compete. The 10 best trial times earn berths in the August 27 final that will carry an estimated purse of \$423,400. The trials and the final will run at 440 yards. Last year's winner, Dash For Speed, also won the 1988 Kansas and Rainbow Derbies. This season, she has won the Go Together Handicap, the Rainbow Silver Cup and the World's Championship Quarter Horse Classic. See Me Do It, the Grade I Rainbow Derby in her last start, will

run in the first trial. Wicked Wind, who was eighth in the Rainbow Derby, and Smashed Cat, the Kansas Derby Consolation winner, are her toughest opponents in that trial. Floyd De Great, who won the Kansas Derby and was second in the Rainbow Derby, is the likely favorite in the second division. He will face Sig Hanson, who was seventh in the Rainbow Derby; and Okeydokey Baby, the 1988 Kansas Futurity winner. Merganser, the 1988 All American Futurity winner and the 1989 Rainbow Derby Consolation winner, will be the favorite in the third trial. Kin To Cash should get support in the fourth division. He won the 1988 Northlands Futurity and

the 1988 Blue Ribbon Futurity. Two horses that dead-heated for third in the 1988 All American Futurity run in the fifth division: Sky Fire and Super De Kas. In his most recent start, Sky Fire had a troubled start in an August 3 allowance and finished tenth. He was also fifth in the Firecracker Derby at Delta Downs in July. Super De Kas ran second to Merganser in the July 2 Rainbow Derby Consolation. He was fourth in the Kansas Derby, but was third in a July 23 allowance. Fabulous Figure is the likely favorite in the eleventh race Wednesday, the seventh trial. She won the Remington Park Quarter Horse Derby in July.

F. Newton Hays wins Friday feature

F. Newton Hays won his second consecutive allowance race Friday as he circled the field and held off Key To Charisma in the stretch. F. Newton Hays paid \$6.80, \$2.80, and \$2.40. Favored Key To Charisma paid \$2.60 and \$2.40, while Bradleys Khalie was worth \$2.80 to show. Dream Of Tomorrow, Painted Indian, and Lovia Ego

completed the order of finish. The time for the six furlongs was 1:11. "He's been having some tough luck," said winning trainer Bob Arnett. "We decided to take him outside and stay out of trouble. I do think he'll run a route of ground, and that's where we'll try him next." On July 16, F. Newton Hays

clipped heels at the quarter-pole and eventually finished sixth in that allowance. He was a one-length winner on July 27, his most recent out before Friday's race. Also Friday, a crowd of 4,662 wagered \$532,091. There were no winners in Friday's twin-trifecta, so the carryover for Saturday was \$11,081.

Just Like Lace runs just like white lightning

Just Like Lace beat the boys Saturday as she took the lead from the start and drew off impressively to win the \$30,850 Ruidoso Thoroughbred Derby. It was the Texas-bred filly's fourth consecutive stakes win. This season at Ruidoso Downs, she's won the June 24 Aspen Breeders' Cup Handicap and the July 2 First Lady Handicap before winning the July 29 Las Mujeres Handicap at the Downs at Santa Fe. Trained by T.E. Davidson and ridden by Larry Payne, Just Like Lace ran the one mile in 1:40 on a very sloppy track in front of 6,838 fans. Davidson said the filly will be pointed to the August 26 Ruidoso Oaks Handicap for three-year-old fillies at six furlongs. Just Like Lace paid \$8.00, \$5.40, and \$4.40. Longshot Our Straight Arrow paid \$24.00 and \$9.80. Clever Leader paid \$9.00 to show. Loose Lips Cash, Straight Reality, Half Halo, Jae Ego, Special Set, Fast Trick, Reckless Winds, Stewing Sid and Busted Choke completed the order of finish.

EDCLC believed facing three rocky road choices

George Puckett, director of the Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County (EDCLC), says the group has three alternatives regarding future operations.

From a budget of \$159,604 for this calendar year, the organization has in sight only \$52,000 for next year because of decreased support from Lincoln County.

The \$52,000 comes from a 3-16th mill levy approved recently by the Lincoln County Commission.

There has been dispute within the county commission whether or not the first year's funding was "seed money" or whether county

support would be a continuing thing.

Some critics see the EDCLC as a private corporation funded, in part, by public monies.

Puckett stated his view of the alternatives at a regular monthly board meeting, Thursday night.

The first alternative, he said, is to continue "full speed at the current level of expenditures with the possibility of running out of funds." He said EDCLC would have to "hope for the best" under those circumstances.

Alternative two, he said, would be a scaled-down economic development effort in the county.

The disadvantage, he said,

would be that residents would "question the effectiveness of the organization in the meantime."

Alternative three, he said, would be to change the EDCLC philosophy a little bit to allow the current staff to engage in side activities to supplement reduced income.

"It's clear any approach we take now will involve seeking funds from the private sector."

"While those funds are going to be scarce, for a long-time benefit, businesses and citizens are going to have to bite the bullet," he said.

Puckett said there are about 13,000 communities in the United States that fund economic development efforts.

"It's not an easy time, but it gets done. Some of the communities are a lot smaller and worse off than Ruidoso, like Borger, Post, Big Spring, (Texas)," he said.

Puckett said that in addition to a prime prospect, Warp Speed, which manufactures electronic devices, two other companies are looking good for a move to Lincoln County.

EDCLC board members, headed by Carroll (Buddy) Burdick, voted to let bids for a certified audit of expenditures to comply with provisions of a contract EDCLC has with the county.

Also, Ovella Estes was presented a plaque for loaning art for the ED-

CLC offices. Estes recently put her Artisan's Shop and Gallery on the market so that she can attend Eastern New Mexico University this fall.

Highlights of a Lincoln County labor survey were presented to the board by Dr. Robert Czerniak, a faculty member at New Mexico State University in the Department of Earth Sciences.

The report was prepared especially for the EDCLC under his direction with Louie Alfaro, a student in NMSU's Urban and Regional Planning Program, tabulating the data and preparing the final report.

A financial report approved

Thursday night shows total current assets are \$77,901 monies and \$2,146 in furniture and equipment. Total disbursements for the first seven months of 1989 were \$68,194.

For the seven months, the director's salary was \$17,899; secretary's salary, \$5,282; payroll tax expense, \$1,303; office rent, \$2,800; auto expense, \$1,478; office supplies, \$759.

Dues and publications, \$1,493; telephone, \$2,487; postage, \$400; travel and prospect development, \$3,729; insurance, \$515; printing and advertising, \$26,198; office equipment \$1,187; contingencies, \$3,694.

Labor study shows county boasts mature work force

Figures resulting from a Lincoln County labor survey show that the area has a "mature and stable work force," according to the sponsors.

Highlights of the survey were outlined to the board of the Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County (EDCLC), Thursday at a regular board meeting.

Summarizing the results was Dr. Robert J. Czerniak, assistant professor in earth sciences, New Mexico State University.

The survey, prepared for the EDCLC, was directed by Dr. Czerniak with Louie Alfaro, urban and regional planning student at NMSU, compiling and organizing the statistics.

The project was sponsored by the US West Communications-New Mexico State University Community Economic Development Project. Additional funding was by the EDCLC.

More than 20 community volunteers telephoned 600 randomly pre-selected households in Lincoln County to obtain responses to a questionnaire. Communities surveyed include Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs, Capitan, Carrizozo, Corona and Hondo.

Information obtained is intended to assist potential employers in identifying the quantity and quality of the work force.

TRENDS

The average amount of time a survey respondent resides in the county is 16 years.

The modal age group is from 35-45 years.

On the average there is at least one family member working per household.

On average the work force is willing to accept on-the-job training

and is willing to attend vocational-technical school. The survey indicates that those interviewed have the desire to travel longer distances for higher paying jobs and the desire to obtain better employment positions.

The survey also indicates that most individuals are seeking full-time employment in order to better their present working conditions.

Although the population gave a low response to the use of a day-care center, "we speculate that the demand for a day care center is moderate," the preparers state.

According to the 1980 census, 73 percent of the population have stayed in Lincoln County and lived in the same house since 1970. Those figures indicate a relatively stable and mature work force, the report states.

Seventy-six percent of the respondents indicate they are part of the labor force. Twelve percent said they are seeking work. On the average there are 1.1 workers per household.

On the average respondents have 16.9 years of work experience. Some 60 percent work full-time; 20 percent are retired from the work force; 12 percent work part-time.

The remaining eight percent are divided among five separate categories: student, student nonworker, student worker, not seeking work, and no answer.

The average worker in Lincoln County travels 14 miles to work.

Some 52 percent of respondents are willing to accept on-the-job training; 11 percent are not willing to accept training. Thirty-seven percent did not respond to the question.

Forty percent are willing to attend a vocational-technical school.

The average respondent has an education of 13 years.

"Lincoln County should recognize that the education level of the work force is a positive factor for economic development opportunities," the report says.

Seventy-three percent of the respondents work in the service sector while 10 percent labor in construction. Six percent work in finance and insurance. Less than one percent work in manufacturing. Transportation claims 3.4 percent, wholesaling, three percent. Others work in non-classification establishments.

Schools superintendent explains bond election

If district voters pass a \$3 million school bond election later this year, the Ruidoso School District will actually show a decrease in taxes over the next several years.

"We just don't want to stay up, we want to be at the top," said Lynn Willard, member of the Ruidoso Board of Education.

The bonds will be used for capital improvements at the White Mountain campus, and for the middle school.

Superintendent Sid Miller ex-

plained the upcoming bond issue Friday to representatives of the village government, chamber of commerce, banking institutions, and others.

The school board wants to inform key people in the community about the bond issue so when these

individuals are questioned by other members of the community, factual answers can be given, said Miller.

A report presented during the briefing said the net effect the bond issue will have on a \$60,000 home is a decrease in property taxes of \$11.16.

Taxes will decrease even if more bonds are purchased, said Caron Snow, business manager for the Ruidoso school district.

She also noted this tax decrease will be realized because three other bonds will be retired.

The school board chose a two-sale method for the bonds to enhance the benefit experienced by the taxpayers, said Snow.

The first sale will be in 1990 for \$1 million, and the second sale will be in 1991 for \$2 million.

In her report, Snow said the interest rate on the bonds was estimated conservatively. Actual rates are currently at 6.5 percent.

The trend for these rates is downward, which provides an excellent time for the district to sell bonds, said Snow.

Miller said the school is not bonded to practical capacity, which must be done in order for the dis-

trict to receive critical capital outlay.

"School districts just don't get the money they used to from the state," said Miller.

Miller also said, although the overall enrollment in the district is decreasing, an increase in the elementary age population may occur after new housing on the Mes-calero reservation is completed.

Young families with young children tend to move into these housing facilities, which may contribute to an increase in enrollment in Ruidoso's elementary schools, said Miller.

Willard said the board wants to plan five to ten years into the future for the district.

"We're talking nitty-gritty basic education needs," he said.

The bond election is scheduled for October 10, 1989.

problems with last Saturday's crash was there was no smoke or dust to tell emergency personnel exactly where the aircraft went down.

Once emergency assistance was rendered to the aircraft's occupants, airport personnel began the investigation part of their emergency procedures.

Morris said the first thing done is the tower will take weather observations and document them. Next, airport personnel cordon off the area and make sure every piece of the aircraft remains in the area. Aircraft personnel then obtain information about the aircraft and its occupants.

Morris went on to say, as long as there are no fatalities, airport personnel do the investigation of the crash. He said statements are obtained from anyone who might have witnessed the crash, the tower personnel on duty and anyone who serviced the aircraft. Fuel tests are run on the airports fuel supply to make sure there was not a problem with the fuel. The spark plugs are pulled from the engine and examined to make sure they did not fail

and cause the crash.

Once all this information is obtained it is sent to the Flight Standards District Office of the Federal Aviation Administration in Albuquerque. Morris said they make the final determination of the cause of the crash in about six months.

He said after everything is complete, he sits down with his staff and they critique what happened.

One of the things Morris is considering to improve emergency procedures is holding a mock disaster. The mock disaster would not only test the skills of his own personnel, but also those of area emergency personnel.

Last Saturday's crash of the single engine Cessna Model 172M was not the first crash at Sierra Blanca Regional Airport.

On March 13, 1988, a Cherokee 140 crashed under what Morris said were similar circumstances. In both crashes, there were no fatalities.

Morris said he believes there would have been deaths if Saturday's crash had been at the old airport in Ruidoso.

"There is room for error here, where at the old airport there wasn't any room for error," he said.

Recycling could be the answer to the state's growing mountains of trash

What does not go into a landfill eventually saves everyone money.

This idea has been expressed by many local officials, and indicates recycling will play an increasingly larger role in solid waste disposal.

In this last article in a series on landfills and solid waste, issues in recycling will be evaluated, and ideas presented which the average resident can use.

The new regulations issued by the Environmental Improvement Board (EIB) of New Mexico already include a clause on recycling.

According to section 301, paragraph K, a landfill operator shall conduct recycling operations in a sanitary manner, confined to an area remote from the operating face of the landfill, and in a manner which does not interfere with, or delay the operation of the landfill.

And in paragraph L, an operator shall remove all recyclable materials recovered from the landfill daily, or store them so as not to create a nuisance, vector harbor, or public health hazard.

Municipalities which encourage recycling in their communities strive for a 25 percent reduction of total household waste through the removal of recyclables, said Jim Edwards of the Ruidoso Environmen-

tal Improvement Division (EID), and a member of the environmental group EAGLE.

It is possible that up to 50 percent of household garbage can be recycled, said Edwards.

Residents can do a great deal on their own to reduce the amount of solid waste to be disposed.

H&H Enterprises is currently the only local recycling firm, and is located in Ruidoso Downs.

Large fluctuations in the recycling market have caused H&H to reduce the types of materials accepted to only aluminum. The next closest recycling firm that will accept other materials is in Alamogordo.

Earlier in the summer, aluminum could be exchanged for 50 cents per pound, but recently the price dropped to 40 cents.

However, not everyone is interested in making a lot of money in recycling different materials, said Edwards.

Composting is a popular method of recycling that can be done in any back yard.

Compost is created through the rotting of organic materials, such as grass clippings, pine needles, food wastes, leaves, wood chips, etc.

The material is piled in a corner of the yard, and does not have to be in a special container.

With periodic coverings of dirt

and applications of moisture and a few stirrings, composted fertilizer can be made in one year with minimal effort.

Non-animal food materials can be added to the compost, such as coffee grounds, egg shells, lettuce leaves and other vegetable greens, without worry of attracting unwanted animals.

Bacteria begins to grow in the compost which speeds up the rotting process and also generates heat, which kills off any harmful bacteria.

The compost can be used as lawn mulch, or worked into gardens.

Some municipalities establish large dumpsters to accept bulkier recyclables, such as glass, plastic, and newspaper.

These items return very little money, and generally require large quantities to make their collection worthwhile.

Average prices for glass and newspaper go from two cents per pound, to as low as one-half cent per pound.

The average citizen or municipality is not going to make money recycling, but in the long run, money is saved because the land used for a landfill lasts longer because less is going into the pits, said Dan Davenport recently, from the Capitan water/wastewater department.

Recently certain plastics have shown a potential for recycling.

Soft, flexible plastics from milk jugs and soft drink containers can be shredded and used in the manufacture of synthetic fibers used as fills for sleeping bags and winter coats.

The plastic rings used on six-pack containers are also recyclable, which Edwards strongly urges because of the item's hazard toward wildlife.

Birds and other small animals frequently get tangled up in discarded six-pack rings and die from choking.

Edwards suggested if someone doesn't want to recycle the rings, cutting them up before disposal will at least eliminate their hazard to wildlife.

Business will respond to market demands, and if buyers look for items in the stores that are packaged in recycled containers, manufacturers will use these containers more often, said Edwards.

MacDonald's, in response to the growing concern over the depletion of ozone in the atmosphere, recently changed all its packaging from polystyrene foam to cardboard, a recyclable material.

In any event, local officials are recognizing the important role recycling is to have in future methods of solid waste disposal.

"I have watched candidates year in and year out try to divide this state and set one section against another to pick up a vote, and I will not do that," Houston said. "I will not do that during the campaign, because I know once one is a governor, you need to work 24 hours a day, seven days a week to bring this big state together."

curacy of results, said DeBeer.

The X-Ray department has a new room adjacent to the emergency room which enhances services for patients there, said Lou Ann Dawdy, department head and a chief technologist.

The old lab area was remodeled to accommodate the X-Ray department, and includes a new film processing lab.

The department has ultra-sound and nuclear medicine diagnostic capabilities, as well as the two X-Ray machines.

A new mammography machine is expected in two months, and will cost \$65,000, said Dawdy.

New furniture is also expected for the recently remodeled patient waiting area.


More than 500 patients are served by the X-Ray department each month.

It is staffed by three technicians, one full-time secretary, and one radiologist.

New storage facilities were installed to accommodate films which are generally kept for five years, and then sold for silver content. Film records for children are kept until the juvenile is 21 years old, as required by law, said Dawdy.

Both the new lab and X-Ray facilities have improved patient care at LCMC, according to hospital staff. They were a major part in the recent remodeling project.

EDITORIAL

New Mexico has reason to celebrate the decision last week to allow the state to repay Texas just \$14 million for water misappropriated from the Pecos Basin.

During the longstanding legal dispute between the two neighboring states, Texas was demanding to be reimbursed in water—water that would have to be taken from water right owners throughout the basin in such amounts that it might have dried up the farming from here to the Texas border.

New Mexico never backed down, insisting that the debt be repaid with money instead of the life sustaining and limited water supplies.

And New Mexico prevailed, not only through the agreement that Texas would accept money in place of water, but also in the amount of money.

Throughout the trial, expert witnesses banded about figures on the amount of water lost to Texas, the economic loss to that state and the economic benefit to New Mexico. Damages as high as \$900 million were claimed by Texas for New Mexico's liability for breaches of the 1949 Pecos River Compact.

We believe the negotiated settlement, including the \$14 million cash payment, is fair to both parties.—fj






