

RHS Warriors tame the Artesia Bulldogs, 23-13

A courageous goal line stand rallied the third-ranked Ruidoso High School Warriors from early season jitters to sting the top-ranked Artesia Bulldogs, 23-13, at the Bulldog Bowl Friday.

The outcome seemed up for grabs in the slightly ragged contest until momentum turned swiftly toward the Warriors when the defense stacked Bulldogs power runner Eric Dalton near the goal line on four straight plays. Kief Johnson made the first key fourth down hit, followed by Shane Eidson. Jamie Candelaria also made a key tackle in that great defensive stand.

Warrior head coach Doug Ragsdale was pumping his fist with joy as the large Warrior con-

tingency that made the trip gave the defense a standing ovation.

That series of plays seemed to deflate all Bulldog hopes. The Warriors knew it and the fans in the both stands seemed to know it as well.

Prior to that defensive gem, the Warrior offense stayed alive by recovering five of their own seven fumbles, scoring one touchdown on a well-disguised kickoff that Kief Johnson returned for 92 yards and a touchdown; and the go ahead 3-point 34-yard field goal delivered by freshman Shane Wells.

The durable Kenny Trapp was back to strength after a recent leg injury and was aided by outstanding backs Jose Marquez and veteran Alfred Rue on an incredible 99 and 2/3's march in the fourth quarter.

The tight ends on that drive were Rusty Silva, Zach Chavez and Brian Gray.

A clutch toss by Manny Guardiola to Rue that kept a critical drive alive was also a big play in the game.

That great defense that stopped the Bulldogs on the one deserves the game ball.

Pete Baca, R.J. Darden, David Dickinson, Shane Eidson, Jesse Guardiola, Zach Chavez, John Winans, Ryan Wright and James Gieb all stuffed the Dogs when it was absolutely necessary.

On the special teams, James Atwood, 115 pounds, cracked a Dog on a kickoff return that caused the crowd to wince and the Bulldog to fumble.

Municipal project, lease agreement are analyzed

When the Ruidoso Village Council adopted the ordinance that allows the village attorney to negotiate a lease agreement on the old municipal airport property, the stage was set for a multi-million dollar development that will include a championship golf course, a luxury resort hotel, a civic/events center, a performing arts center and a fitness trail.

Attorney John Underwood is negotiating the lease agreements on the hotel and golf course. The civic center will be built and operated by the Village of Ruidoso, the fitness trails will be a joint venture and the performing arts center has been pledged by A.N. and Jackie Spencer.

While details of the fitness trails and the performing arts center are not in the ordinance, nor will they be in the lease agreement, they are a part of the entire package.

R.D. Hubbard, owner of Ruidoso Downs Race Track, and the driving force behind the development, announced publicly that he will construct the fitness trail around the golf course.

The Spencers made their dona-

tion public, but made it conditional on the rest of the development being completed.

Following is an analysis of the project as planned.

THE HOTEL

The hotel, called the Sierra Blanca Resort Hotel, is being planned and will be constructed and operated by SWD, Inc., a corporation owned by Jim Davies. The lease agreement calls for the hotel to be a luxury, resort hotel with 200 rooms.

According to the lease, the hotel will conform to or exceed the designs displayed during a public hearing here on May 29.

"It's going to look like the drawings," said village attorney John Underwood. Those drawings showed an adobe-style hotel.

The \$6.5 million facility will be constructed on land belonging to the Village of Ruidoso, with the agreement reserving the ownership of that land to the village. If, for any reason, SWD cannot complete the terms of the lease, another operator, approved by the village, will be able to take on that lease.

The land will remain with the village, no matter who operates the hotel.

The lease calls for SWD to provide at least 200 rooms, provide a full service restaurant, in-house meeting rooms and a pro-shop for the golf course. The lease also requires the developer to install an indoor/outdoor swimming pool and spa facilities.

"The only thing we're providing on the hotel is the land," said Underwood. "They're responsible for all repairs and maintenance ... to keep the place looking at its very best at all times." The hotel operators will furnish all equipment, supplies and the like.

Underwood said if the hotel operators don't maintain the hotel to luxury-class resort standards, then the village will have the right to intervene and see that those standards are met, at the expense of the owner/operator.

Since a private developer is putting in the hotel, the village will not be responsible for any of the costs to construct and operate the facility.

The hotel developer will agree to pay \$2,000 annual rental over the life of the 50-year lease. In addition, the operator, for the first five years, will pay to the village two percent of the gross room revenues provided the occupancy rate is at 65 percent.

For years six through 10, the hotel will pay to the village two percent of the gross room revenues if the occupancy rate is at 55 percent. In years 11 through 30, the hotel will pay three percent of gross room revenues so long as the occupancy rate is at 55 percent, and the hotel will pay to the village four percent of the gross room revenues in years 31 through 50.

Underwood said the \$2,000 a year will allow the village to have some basic revenue on the land, whether or not the occupancy rate reaches the 65 or 55 percent annualized occupancy rate. He said that sliding scale allows the developer time to recoup the initial investment while marketing the new hotel.

"The reason for the 65 percent occupancy requirement in years one through five is because that's when they'll experience the most start-up costs," said Underwood, noting the developers, who operate a number of Days Inn hotels, expect this resort complex to operate at a 55 percent level.

The developers will be responsible for all their own utilities, including water, which they'll acquire through the local utility companies at the going rates. The developers also will pay property

taxes on their facilities.

The hotel operators will carry all their own insurance. After 50 years, all improvements revert to the ownership of the village.

Underwood said Davies is not looking to join a major resort hotel chain, since the franchise would cost right at \$100,000 a year. Instead, he'll use that \$100,000 to market the Sierra Blanca Resort Hotel. While his Days Inn facilities are not of the luxury class that he plans for the Sierra Blanca Resort Hotel, he'll still be able to network and advertise through those operations.

Underwood said Jim Davies is signing a personal guarantee for \$6.5 million, but since he'll act as his own general contractor, he expects to construct a facility worth \$7.8 million. Davies will sub the work on the hotel out to local contractors.

Rates for Sierra Blanca Resort Hotel will be from \$60 to \$100 a night. Guests will pay lodgers tax and sales tax, and those revenues are expected to immediately benefit the village, even before the occupancy rates reach the 65 percent first year goal.

The hotel and golf course projects are contingent on one another, with Jim Davies and Jim

Colbert coordinating their construction schedules to open at the same time. The two companies will cooperate on marketing and will distribute brochures advertising both enterprises.

The hotel also is contingent on the village building a civic center.

CIVIC/EVENTS CENTER


The Village of Ruidoso received state funds during the last legislative session to help build a civic/events center. That \$275,000 has to be spent by June 30, 1990.

The hotel developer believes the center is vital to the success of the resort hotel, and village leaders agree that the village needs such a hotel to make the civic center a viable operation.

With the state funds and the village building fund that has accrued through matching lodgers tax funds, the village has available \$668,000 to build a center.

Village manager Frank Potter and attorney Underwood said that amount will build a center of from 10,000 to 15,000 square feet, adequate to the size of this village and the projected needs of the new hotel and other area lodging establish-

Two Crimestoppers tips led police Thursday to arrest four Ruidoso residents on drug charges.

Detective Lanny Maddox of the Ruidoso Police Department said information obtained from Crimestoppers led to the issuance of a search warrant for #9 Mystic Pines Condominiums. The warrant was issued by Magistrate Judge Gerald Dean and approved by assistant district attorney Scot Key.

Maddox said police arrived at the residence at 9 a.m. and before the execution of the warrant, two suspects were arrested.

According to court records, 27-year-old Loy Van Askew was charged with three counts of possession of a controlled substance, including cocaine and one count of possession of drug paraphernalia.

Also charged by police was 35-year-old Angela Romans. According to court records, she was charged with one count of possession of controlled substance.

Racing wrapup

See Me Do It does it again Sunday!

Jean Dillard's brilliant filly, See Me Do It, lived up to her name Sunday afternoon winning the \$330,812 All American Derby at Ruidoso Downs over a very sloppy track.

The filly ran the 440 yards in 21.25 seconds, the second fastest All American Derby. It was her fourth victory of the season, and her ninth victory in 10 career starts.

The race also gave jockey Larry Layton a sweep of the 1989 Derbies at Ruidoso Downs. He began by winning the Kansas Derby with Floyd De Great, and won the Rainbow Derby and Sunday's race with See Me Do It.

"She got off a little bad," said Layton. The gray horse (Mitey Easy Dash) maybe had her beat a length but I was never worried. I think I hit her once 50 yards from the wire. I had too much confidence. She's that kind of horse."

See Me Do It was second, beaten a head by Mitey Easy Dash, at the

halfway mark. She gradually pulled even with that one and drew off to win by 1 1/2 lengths.

Trainer Robert Turner said the filly was awake much of Saturday night because overnight rainfall made her nervous.

"She's been training real good, but the rain's real hard on her," said winning trainer Robert Turner. "She gets nervous, and you can make it a little easier but the rain gives her a nervous stomach."

"She's had a lot of pressure on her and it makes it tough," said Turner, who was awake all night with the filly. "I'm glad it's over. I just love her, but I just want to show. Sig Hanson, Super De Kas, Power Effort, Jeweled Cash, Zevistator and Wicked Wind completed the order of finish. Smashed

See Me Do It paid \$3.20, \$2.80, and \$2.40. Mitey Easy Dash paid \$7.00 and \$4.20, while Brace It survived an inquiry to pay \$4.60 to show. Sig Hanson, Super De Kas, Power Effort, Jeweled Cash, Zevistator and Wicked Wind completed the order of finish. Smashed

Cat was a late scratch. Jeff Williams who rode Mitey Easy Dash was proud of his colt's race.

"We got away great," he said. "I thought they'd never catch us, but she just kept coming at us. What a great filly!"

Dillard, of Ringling, Oklahoma, said she and Turner are unsure of the filly's next start.

"We'll let several days pass before we decide," she said. "I haven't thought about it."

In 1988, See Me Do It won 5-of-6 career starts, with her only career loss a second-place finish, by a head, to Merganser in the All American Futurity.

Sunday's race was run on an incredibly sloppy track that saw several horses withdrawn throughout the afternoon. Layton did not feel the track would bother See Me Do It.

"Great horses run on everything," he said.



For the most part, it was a running game on both sides with Artesia throwing a few more passes than Ruidoso. Most of the game was played up the middle. In the final game statistics, the Bulldogs actually had more yardage in all departments than the Warriors with 269 yards of total offense to Ruidoso's 199.

In the first half, the Dogs were more than 200 yards in total offense to the Warriors' less than 50 yards. In the second half, the stats reversed and it was the offensive time spent on the field by the Warriors that killed the Dogs. When the big play was needed, the Warriors, not the Bulldogs, rose to the occasion.

Ragsdale, a born and raised native of Roswell, was elated.

"I grew up hating Artesia on Friday nights," he said. "Roswell and Artesia was always the game, and it feels good to finally beat them. You just can't believe how high I am."

"But I want to shake Cooper's (Henderson) hand. He's a heckuva coach and will be great for the program."

Ragsdale said he was tickled to death by the fan support.

The Warriors' side of the field nearly matched Artesia's as many boosters traveled the two and a half hours to see the Warriors open the season and get a glimpse of the ex-Warrior coach Cooper Henderson who put nearly the same gang of kids in last year's state finals.

Henderson was equally gracious about Ragsdale and his coaches.

"I commend the Warrior team and particularly Doug and his coaching staff for a fine effort and a great Warrior win."

Asked about playing against the team he coached, Henderson responded.

"I would have preferred not to have opened with them," Henderson said. "I still have so many close feelings with the kids, and it's kind of tough because I like them so much. But I'm glad that it's over, and now I can root for them every game the rest of the year—unless we meet again."

FIRST QUARTER SUMMARY

The Warrior's first defensive play of the year occurs on the kickoff when the Bulldogs grab a short kick at the thirty and cough up the ball after three Warriors stuff the runner on the 35-yard line.

Kenny Trapp, working from a T-formation, gains seven yards, fumbles, but recovers. Trapp then bulls his way to the 21-yard line for a first down.

On first down, Trapp is stopped for a short gain before Alfred Rue turns the corner on the left side for five yards. On third and short from the 13, Trapp batters his way up the middle, through two Dogs, and into the end zone for a Warrior TD.

Freshman Shane Wells converts his first varsity extra point ever and with 9:07 left in the first, the Warriors lead 7-0.

The Bulldogs start their offensive play with a short pass completion and then move to a series of runs, mainly delayed draws by Chris Reynolds and some hard running by fullback Eric Dalton. Dalton caps the six-play drive with a touchdown run over the right side of the line. The Dogs' center flubs a hike and the Warriors lead 7-6.

Warrior Kief Johnson grabs the ball on the kickoff and after two fakes turns up field. Johnson, an unheralded running secret, lets the crowd see his magic as he races 92 yards on the return for a touchdown. The extra point attempt sails

just left of the bars and the Warriors up their lead to 13-6.

The Bulldogs mount a short drive that stops with a failed field goal and the Warriors take over on the 20-yard line.

The Dogs manage to hit quarterback Manny Guardiola in the backfield for a 4-yard loss. On second down, Jose Marquez knifes his way through the line to pick up 12 yards. Trapp then carries a couple of Dogs past the 33-yard line for a first down and the first quarter ends: Warriors 13, Bulldogs 6.

SECOND QUARTER SUMMARY

The Warriors open the second quarter with a student body right pitch to Alfred Rue who turns the corner for six yards.

Trapp then powers his way over center for an inch shy of four yards and a first down. Trapp repeats the play for several yards and a Warrior first down.

Trapp, running again, gains a yard. A mixup in the backfield allows the Bulldogs to drop Guardiola back on the 42-yard line. Manny Guardiola tries to hit brother Jesse in the flats, but a Dog coming from nowhere breaks up the play and the Warriors are forced to kick for the first time.

Jose Marquez drives the ball a mile high with his punt and the ball rolls dead at the 24-yard line.

The Dogs begin their drive which appears short-lived when Rusty Silva picks off an errant pass. Silva, however, attempts to change hands and the ball squirts forward. The Dogs recover on the 34.

The Dogs, on the strength of Javier Jaramillo and Dalton, eat big chunks of field. A Warrior offside gives the Dogs another crucial first down on the 13-yard line. Two plays later, Artesia scores on a two-yard Dalton run. Ex-Warrior Micah Whitlock converts and the game is knotted 13-13 with 1:03 left in the first half.

The Warriors razzle dazzle nearly backfires when they fumble and then recover the kickoff deep in their own territory.

On the first play from scrimmage, the ball falls loose again and the Dogs recover with :38 seconds remaining in the half.

The Dogs run a draw up the middle to the Warrior 15. On second down, a backfield in motion penalty nullifies a touchdown pass. A second motion penalty moves the ball back to the 22. The Warrior defense stiffens and another center snap flub stops a field goal attempt and the half ends tied, 13-13.

THIRD QUARTER SUMMARY

The Warriors start the second half just inside the 20-yard line.

Marquez punches through the line for a 9-yard gain. Bread and butter Trapp plunges for three more yards and a first down. Speedy Rue skirts the left end for 10 yards and another first down.

New Ruidoso quarterback Rick Ragsdale slips on the option and loses a yard. Rue carries for a five-yard gain. Ragsdale tries a pass in the flat to Jamie Candelaria that is tipped at the line and falls incomplete.

The Warriors are forced to boot the ball and the Bulldogs start from their own 19.

On the first Artesia play in the second half, Jaramillo fumbles and Warrior Shane Eidson recovers.

Trapp wipes out three would-be tacklers as he moves to the 16. Trapp drops a yard on second down. Ragsdale misses Jose Mar-

quez in the flat and soccer-style kicker Wells trots onto the field.

Wells splits the uprights from 34 yards out with plenty to spare and the Warriors break the tie, 16-13.

Wells kicks an onside kick that is picked up by the Dogs on the 44-yard line.

Artesia moves the ball easily to the Warrior 5-yard line where they hit a solid defensive wall. Dalton tries the middle four times, including a dive toward the end zone. His deepest penetration is to the Warrior one.

Trapp powers the ball out to the 10 for some breathing room. An offside, pushes Ruidoso back to the five-yard line. Marquez bounces through Bulldogs like a bowling ball and races to the 23-yard line for a first down as the third quarter ends.

FOURTH QUARTER SUMMARY

Trapp and Marquez show their looseness on the field by doing a little dance while the Bulldog band is playing.

Rue starts the final frame with a hard five-yard run around the corner to the 27.

Guardiola runs the option and is hit for no gain. Rue then slams through the Dogs on his own in a determined run good enough for a first down.

The Warriors are flagged for illegal motion. On first and 15, Rue picks up 4 yards. Trapp takes a pitchout for no gain. On the important third and 10, Guardiola completes a clutch pass to Rue who takes it to the Warrior 48. Trapp, smelling victory, rips off five more yards. Trapp gains another four yards as the clock ticks away with seven minutes left in the game. Trapp gains another five yards to the 36 for a first down.

The Warriors are flagged for motion. Marquez gains a yard and then blasts through the line for a big 9-yard gain. Trapp fights through the right side of the line four inches shy of a first down to set up another big play of the game.

Trapp dives over the line of scrimmage for another first down.

Rue slams over the right side for seven yards to the Artesia 20. After a long delay for a Bulldog injury, Trapp runs for three yards. The Dogs are flagged for offside and the Warriors are first and 10 on the 12-yard line.

Rue skirts the right end and flies into the end zone for a TD to complete a 99-yard drive that eats up all but 3:38 seconds in the game.

Wells drives the ball through the uprights and the score reads Warriors 23, Bulldogs 13.



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County P&Z wants answers from county commissioners

The Lincoln County Planning and Zoning (P&Z) Commission is dismayed by the lack of direction and mixed messages they've received from the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners (LCBC).

The problem is whether or not the LCBC wants the P&Z to begin a process of proposing zoning ideas in Lincoln County.

"Why don't they just come belly-up to the bar and say 'we don't want to do it'?" said P&Z member E.J. Fouratt.

P&Z asked the LCBC during its last regular meeting for help in defining P&Z's role.

"I thought we were going to have a direction, but I guess that's not the case," said P&Z Chairperson Patsy Sanchez during Thursday's P&Z meeting.

At the August 14 meeting of the LCBC, Sanchez approached the commission on what steps the P&Z should take in terms of zoning the county.

County Commissioner Karon Z. Petty suggested P&Z begin with the one-mile area outside the two-mile extraterritorial zone by researching the restrictive covenants there and chose the best zoning that would apply.

Any conclusions made by the P&Z would not become law because the commission is not a decision-making body, but would be presented to the LCBC.

Petty said the P&Z could start with any area in the county, that to start in the vicinity of Ruidoso was just a suggestion.

At that meeting of the LCBC, the commission also authorized the county manager to establish a date for a public hearing on changing

the role of the P&Z from that of an advisory panel to a decision-making body.

When Petty made her suggestion, Sanchez asked the other members of the commission, Chairman Robert E. Hemphill and Rick Simpson, if they agreed with the idea.

Sanchez received an affirmative answer, though the commission did not take formal action on the suggestion.

But Petty apparently heard some rumors concerning P&Z's activities, and dictated a memo by phone to the P&Z, which was presented to Sanchez by county manager Nick Pappas just before Thursday's meeting.

The memo read "Karon has been hearing rumors that the P&Z is going to start zoning the county. The commission has no desire to start zoning anything—we are working on our own ordinance. Before they (P&Z) have any public hearings they (P&Z) should just start thinking on how to zone the county, and then present it to the commission before any public hearings are held."

Sanchez said the P&Z had no intention of zoning the county, nor was it planning to conduct any public hearings in the near future, but was asking for guidance from the county commission as to P&Z's role.

"At this point I don't think I can say what our role is," Sanchez said.

"We've been hashing this since January and I'm sick of this," said Fouratt.

Members of the P&Z expressed a desire to begin mapping and to propose various zoning restrictions which could ultimately be effective for the entire county, but the members do not want to do this process one area at a time.

"I don't think we'll ever get it done unless it's done all at once," said LaMoyné Peters.

Fouratt said P&Z has been waiting for an answer on the zoning ordinance from the county commission.

He said P&Z cannot proceed without direction from the county, and if that direction doesn't come soon, the ordinance will die from not being used.

The county attorney was not present during Thursday's meeting.

Pappas said, under instructions from the LCBC, the attorney would not be present in order to save the county money.

"If they're talking about money, it's slipping through the cracks," said Fouratt.

Fouratt said the P&Z has no fee schedule at this time, nor are there any clear policies or procedures to follow for the P&Z when making decisions.

He recommended the development of such policies, to be reviewed by the attorney, and others in the private sector who may have pertinent input.

"We had two actions tonight, but nothing was collected," said Fouratt.


James Sanchez said a response in writing from the county commission should be requested that clarifies how P&Z is to proceed.

In other business, the P&Z:

—Approved a replat of lots three and four in Alpine Village, requested by Jerry Kennedy.

—Approved a replat of lot 14 in the Pinepoint Subdivision.

—Requested legal advice on a request for a special use permit made by Johnny Meigs, who wishes to construct a mausoleum on his property.

WDA regroups for appeals

The Water Defense Association Board of Directors (WDA) met Wednesday in the Hondo School Cafeteria and heard a report from executive director Hubert Quintana on the status of the appeals to Justice Lafel Oman's decision.

Quintana told the board about the appeals filed in the New Mexico Court of Appeals by the United States and the Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe.

He said the WDA is waiting for the United States and the tribe to file docketing statements describing what in Justice Oman's decision they are going to appeal and why. The United States and the tribe have until September 11 to file the statements.

Quintana also gave the board a tentative rundown of dates when various parts of the appeal process should occur. He said the association has received \$225,000 from the New Mexico legislature to cover the cost of the appeal.

He reported the recent Supreme Court decision in a Wyoming case, which the WDA was a friendly participant, would not have an adverse effect on the association's case. He said one of the good things that came out of the Supreme Court decision was the court said the burden of proof to establish a reserved

right is on the United States.

Justice Oman, in his decision, said the United States and the tribe failed to sustain their burden of proof.

Quintana told the board there had been no official word from the court when the case will go back into the "Inter-Sese" phase.

The board reviewed an audited financial statement from 1986, 1987 and 1988 on the association's account.

President Phelps Anderson told the board the audit was a good idea because a lot of money had been run through the checking account over the last few years and it was always good to have an independent view of the account.

Quintana said all the money raised by the WDA has gone back into legal fees or research.

"The WDA has raised \$900,000 for this case and we've spent about \$900,000," he said.

He added after the WDA pays one more legal bill in the next few weeks, the association has no other bills outstanding.

"For the first time since the beginning of this association, all the bills are paid," said Anderson.

Quintana discussed with the board a draft of a letter to the New Mexico congressional delegation asking them to try and get the federal government to help with the WDA

side of the case or at least slow down with the other side.

He said, despite the "tremendous self-sacrifice" of the public in fighting this case, the federal government has not helped any on the WDA side.

"We are funding the United States to take away our property rights in this case," he said. "How far is the United States going to take this process?"

He said Justice Oman's decision was a just and right decision that everyone could live with. He added it would be a sad commentary if the WDA eventually loses the case because it doesn't have the money the United States has.

"Our coffers are no match for theirs," Quintana said.

The board, Quintana and Anderson discussed the inability of the public to find out how much the United States and the Tribe have spent on the case.

"We are entitled to know how much the United States has spent on their case," said Anderson. "That's public money; we are the public and we are entitled to know how much has been spent."

During the meeting, Joe Salazar of Lincoln was nominated to the board to replace Lincoln McTeigue, who recently died.



Harper and his wife, Fae, and son, Robbie, have lived in Ruidoso since May, but they have had a place here for a number of years.


Robbie is a junior in Ruidoso High School. A second son, Brad, is a sophomore in high school at New Mexico Military Institute in Roswell.

Within the area of the civic center, enough land has been reserved to enlarge the facility when the need arises and the money is available.

"Basically, we're back to where we started out—a 12,000 square foot civic center," said Potter, recalling how planners originally estimated that size would be adequate, but some individuals then submitted a much larger design. That larger plan was taken to Santa Fe, but Potter said the state funds can be used for the smaller civic center.

Although the civic events center will be connected to the Sierra Blanca Resort Hotel with a porte cochere, the ownership and management will remain with the Village of Ruidoso.

"The lessees are amenable to however we want to manage and operate it," said Potter, noting the village or the Convention and Visitors Bureau could take on the civic center management.

The fund created in 1985 to be used for building and operating a civic center generates from \$90,000 to \$100,000 a year, said Potter. He said the new hotel will provide a new source of lodgers tax, so that amount will increase. That means the village will have a larger share to match from general funds, but those revenues, too, will be boosted by sales tax paid at the hotel and golf course.

Potter said the village has lost a number of meetings and conventions because there was no place for meetings. He said the civic center will be a revenue generator.

All area lodging establishments will be able to use the civic center, with reservations to be made through the management. It will never be limited to use by only the connecting hotel, said Potter.

"Scheduled air service is next," said Potter. "It's a one, two, three

deal; you've got to have the facilities, event center and ski packages, and then you have the scheduled air service."

GOLF COURSE

A lot has been said lately about the proposed lease agreement between Jim Colbert Golf Inc. and the Village of Ruidoso.

Many people have said certain items were not included in village ordinance 89-2 and therefore would not be included in the lease, however the final lease agreement is not limited to just those items lined out in that ordinance.

According to New Mexico Statutes, the following items of the lease must be included in the ordinance:

- the terms of the sale or lease,
- the appraised value of the municipal utility facilities or real property,
- the time and manner of payments on the lease or sale,
- the amount of the lease or sale,
- the identities of the purchasers or lessees and
- the purpose for the municipality making the lease or sale.

"The ordinance allows the village to enter into a lease agreement with the basic terms spelled out by the ordinance," said village attorney John Underwood.

According to Underwood, the actual lease with Colbert Golf is 37 pages long, contains 37 different articles and 108 different subheadings under these articles.

A draft of the lease was sent to Colbert Golf for review and their attorneys looked at it and made a few changes and sent the draft back to Underwood for any changes he might make.

According to Underwood, it is spelled out in the lease, the proper-

Crimestoppers tip led to another drug arrest that afternoon.

At 3 p.m. Ruidoso police officers, assisted by the Lincoln County Sheriff's office and New Mexico State Police, served a search warrant at 211 Wingfield Street and arrested two suspects.

Arrested were 22-year-old Michael Ross Smith and 19-year-old Yvonne Eugena Swickard, Mad-dox said.

According to Magistrate Court records, Smith was charged with one count of possession with intent to distribute a controlled substance, identified as psilocybin mushrooms, a hallucinogenic. He also was charged with three counts of possession of controlled substances, identified as crystal methamphetamines, marijuana, xanax and amphetamine sulfate, otherwise known as white crosses, and one count of possession of drug paraphernalia.

Court records show Swickard was charged with one count of possession of a controlled substance and one count of possession of drug paraphernalia.

Smith, Swickard and Romans are free on their own recognizance, while Askew is free on \$5,000 bond.

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

ty shall only be used for the construction and operation, maintenance, management and improvement of a golf course, a putting and chipping green, a driving range, a snack bar/grill, a golf cart storage and maintenance area and related golf course activities and functions. There can be no other use without the written permission of the village.

The village will still own the mineral rights to the property. Colbert accepts the property "as is" and agrees to make no demands upon the village for any improvements or alterations. Colbert also assumes all risk of loss on the property on the date it is turned over.

Underwood said the lease terms are exactly as they were spelled out in ordinance 89-2.

The initial term of the lease will be 15 years. Colbert will pay the village a percentage rent equal to 20 percent of the revenue generated from green fees, golfmobile and golf cart rentals, the driving range and food and beverage sales after Colbert's gross revenue exceeds \$1,500,000 per lease year.

Underwood said the reason a percentage rent will only be paid to the village if Colbert's gross revenue exceeds \$1.5 million is because the golf course will be amortized over a 15-year period.

The lease also contains two optional lease periods. The first, will be for 15 years and during that time, Colbert will pay the village a percentage rent of 10 percent of the revenues from gross receipts and six percent of the revenues received from pro shop receipts. The second option period is for 20 years and the figures call for payment of 15 percent of the revenue from gross receipts and six percent from pro shop receipts.

Colbert must provide a statement of gross revenue, along with any percentage rent due, to the village on or before 90 days after the end of the year. The village maintains the right to have an independent audit of Colbert's books and records.

At the end of the lease, or in the event of termination, the golf course, all facilities and equipment

become village property, free and clear of any claims.

Underwood said after the land is turned over to Colbert to begin construction, Colbert is responsible for the total cost of construction, including the cost of demolishing, covering up and removing the runways.

Underwood stated that Colbert is responsible for all repair and maintenance to the golf course. But he said if something is not repaired or maintained properly, the village has the right to go in and fix it and then charge Colbert for it.

Environmental concerns have also been addressed in the lease.

According to Underwood, if the appropriate regulatory authorities deem it necessary, Colbert agrees to line the lakes in order to reduce the possibility of contaminants being released into the ground water supply. Colbert must maintain the lakes in such a manner as to inhibit the growth of noxious weeds and algae. Colbert is to be mindful of environmental concerns and shall take special care and precautions in the selection and use of pesticides, fertilizers and other substances used on the course. A list of these substances, their manufacturer and all other pertinent information will be supplied to the village.

As far as water for the course is concerned, Underwood stated the lease says the village agrees to provide Colbert 200 acre feet of effluent water credit rights per annum, at no cost, for the irrigation and maintenance of the course. He said it clearly states the water rights belong to the village and not Colbert. Underwood said in years of severe water shortage, "the priorities will always be for domestic use."

Colbert is responsible for all costs of the irrigation system including the cost of drilling, casing, equipping, pumping and maintaining any water well. Colbert is also responsible for paying for and installing all other utilities including water for public consumption and sewer.

Village manager Frank Potter has issued a memo to any interested parties stating anyone interested in obtaining information

pertaining to the water for the proposed golf course, should call Richard Cibak at the State Engineers' Office in Roswell, at 622-6521.

Underwood said in the article covering the mortgage of Colbert's interest in the lease, it clearly states the lender only has the right to come in and take over the lease, not the property.

Nowhere in the lease does it state anyone but the village owns the property.

He said Colbert will have to pay any and all taxes, special assessments or gross receipts taxes including personal property taxes. Players will pay sales taxes on their play and purchases.

According to Underwood, the lease covers many areas of the golf course operations from public protection to toilet facilities. Colbert must state in any advertisement the course is a village public golf course. The golf course is a public facility and will remain open to the public except in the event of a tournament or exceptions which the village and Colbert agree to.

The fee schedule will be set each year by Colbert to be competitive and comparable to other golf courses. Residents of Ruidoso will receive a 25 percent discount on green fees. Senior citizens (over 62) of Ruidoso will receive a 50 percent discount on green fees. Resident junior golfers will also receive a 50 percent discount on green fees.

Underwood said there is an article in the lease which says Colbert is to promote Junior Golf programs by providing, during less busy times, free of charge group lessons, range balls, general golf instruction and junior tournaments.

He continued that Colbert will provide a full-time PGA golf professional to manage the pro shop and a full-time certified golf course superintendent to supervise grounds maintenance.

FITNESS TRAILS

Golfscapes, the Arlington, Texas, firm that has been commissioned by Jim Colbert to design the 18-hole championship golf course, also is designing the jogging/hiking/biking trails to be built

in conjunction with the course.

John Colligan of Golfscapes was in Ruidoso recently for a meeting with a group that has taken on the task of ensuring that the fitness trails are included in the project. Colligan lined out a trail system that circles the golf course and extends past Ruidoso High School to make about six miles of paved trails.

Hubbard pledged to pay for the three miles that go around the golf course.

Bill McCarty, who owns some of the land in the area outside the golf course, agreed to provide easements and/or right of way for the trails to cross his land, and the Ruidoso School Board endorsed the concept.

School athletes also are expected to use the 12-foot wide asphalt trails instead of running on public road and being in the path of traffic.

Potter agreed to oversee the trails project, noting that the village might be able to build part of the trails, since the Street Department has the equipment needed.

Potter also talked to State Highway Department District Engineer Lou Medrano and learned that some state funds may be available for parts of the trail as it is extended into other areas of town.

Members of the United States Forest Service have indicated a willingness to work with the village and developers to extend the trails into forest lands.

The trails will begin to take shape as the golf course building begins.

PERFORMING ARTS CENTER

A.N. and Jackie Spencer, of Alto, have pledged from \$8 to \$10 million to construct a first-class performing arts center and amphitheatre on the old airport property.

Details and plans are not yet available for the center.

Spencer said Sunday that her donation is still very much conditional on the rest of the proposed package, and she won't go forward until the project is assured.

The negative referendum that has delayed the golf course and

hotel, also could delay or stop the performing arts center. For without the golf course and hotel, the Spencers say they will not develop the performing arts center.

Spencer, who said she has wanted for years to build a performing arts center, said the airport land is the ideal spot.

"We're just waiting to see if they go ahead with it," said Jackie Spencer.

NEGATIVE REFERENDUM

Even as negotiations continue on the hotel and golf course, the project is on hold because of a negative referendum petition turned in at Village Hall last week. That negative referendum petition was signed by about 150 more than the 351 registered voters needed to prompt an election over the ordinance.

The village clerk has 14 days to certify the names on the petition, and the council then has to set an election over the question. With the upcoming school bond election, the soonest the election can take place is November 10.

Developers may or may not want to continue with their plans, since they say the election puts them about a year behind schedule for opening their new businesses here in Ruidoso.

"The consensus when the petition was first filed was probably to cancel the project, strictly due to the delay before the project could be built," said Hubbard.

"I am definitely not against anybody having the right to vote; it's strictly a matter of the developers and their financing," said Hubbard. "I do not feel I want to ask them to wait another year ... they were not that eager to come here in the first place."

Concerned over losing the multi-million dollar economic development in the area, a group of citizens began a drive to get names off the petition; and as of Friday afternoon they were within about 50 of getting the number of signers below the required amount, according to Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr.

Davis and others said some people were provided with incorrect information over the lease, water

and taxes when they signed the petition. Some signers said they were told the village will pay for the development by issuing bonds and/or raising taxes, neither of which is true, said Potter.

Also, Potter said incorrect information has been circulated about water.

"I haven't talked to Colbert or Davies in the last week, but the big concern is the delays it will cause and whether the financing that's been arranged can be kept in place," said Hubbard.

Anxious to get the project on track, Hubbard said he reviewed the tape of the public hearing where the project was discussed. He said it looks like most of the concerns voiced then have already been addressed.

"The big issue is, what do we want for the Village of Ruidoso ... we all want more full-time employment."

"I feel strongly that people in this community don't want a smokestack, heavy industry. Tourism is the number one industry," said Hubbard, adding he believes, when the quality of life is enhanced through the proposed development, some service industries can be attracted to the area.

"The development we're talking about, these are the things people are looking for when they relocate," he said.

Hubbard said if the development isn't constructed on the old airport land, he and the other developers have no plans to put it elsewhere in the Ruidoso area.

Hubbard said the entire project will have a construction cost of about \$21 million, an amount he estimated will have an economic impact of from \$120 to \$150 million over the next two to three years.

"That alone will generate so much more development," he said.

"So many people love Ruidoso and want to stay here and make it their home. If this project doesn't go, they won't have any way to make a living ... any way to stay here," said Hubbard.

We've had reports of pressure and of threats to boycott the businesses of those who have signed the petition. We are confirming these and need your help.

If you have had anyone phone or approach you in what you consider a threatening or intimidating manner regarding your decision to sign the petition, let us know.

More importantly, if someone has tried to get you to remove your name from the petition by use of questionable tactics, please let us know.

We are here to support and help you because you had the courage to stand up and be counted.

Can you believe that as a citizen of this community in this great country there can be people who DARE to use scare tactics and threatening measures against neighbors?

Don't let someone pressure you into removing your name from the petition and relinquishing your right to vote in a free country.

Here is how the law defines intimidation and the penalties for it:

"E. Intimidation consists of inducing or attempting to induce fear by use of or threatened use of force, violence, infliction of damage, harm or loss to any person or property or any form of economic retaliation, upon any person voting or intending to vote, precinct board member, challenger, watcher or municipal clerk to impede or prevent the free, fair and secret exercise of the elective franchise or the impartial and legally correct administration of the election pursuant to the Municipal Election Code (Chapter 3, Articles 8 & 9 NMSA 1978) (emphasis ours).

F. A person who commits intimidation is guilty of a fourth degree felony."

Should you have removed your name, reinstate it.

This is still the United States of America.

It's back to school time, and time to remind ourselves to take extra precautions while driving.

It's time to slow down and watch for schoolchildren boarding and getting off buses and crossing the streets.

Ruidoso Police Chief William Newman said motorists are required to stop for a school bus when the driver has the lights flashing and the stop sign displayed. He said motorists traveling in both directions are required to stop when those signals are displayed, unless the bus is traveling on a divided roadway.

"Ruidoso has no divided roadways, but by policy, we treat Sudderth Drive and the four-lane portion of Mechem as a divided roadway," said Newman.

Newman said there are occasions when a bus leaves the roadway to load and/or unload passengers, and in those cases, the driver usually won't display the flashing lights and stop sign. Motorists need not stop in that case, said Newman.

"With the approach of a new school year we all have to redevelop our habits, paying particular attention to schoolchildren," said Newman. "Even if the law doesn't always require yielding the right of way it's always best to do that because we don't know what a child may do," he added.

Let's all work together to have a safe school year.—fj

Reporter's Round

Here we go again, another school year is under way. Motorists need to be aware of kiddos getting off school buses, and that 15 m.p.h. in school zones is the law.

With the advent of the new school year, the National Education Association of New Mexico (NEA-NM) has released some information on how parents can help their children improve their chances for a quality education. The first is on how to harvest couch potatoes and turn them into critical television viewers.

"Helping children and young adults become intelligent and critical viewers of television is a top priority for the NEA-NM," said Ima Lee Well, president of NEA-NM. "We'd like to share some tips to help make television a positive supplement to our children's learning."

And I would like to add some of my own comments to the ten tips.

1). Encourage your children to become selective in the programs they watch. Set aside a time each week to schedule what programs your children will watch. Limit the amount of television they view. Help them plan ahead to avoid conflicts with homework, hobbies, sports, or other activities.

This is actually several tips in one, but the bottom line is clear: teach your kids how to organize their time. The danger is they will organize their time around the television, when the box needs to take a back seat to other activities. Getting kids to read the TV Guide first can help them to select programs ahead of time, rather than just switching on the tube, and being drawn into viewing inanity.

2). Discuss TV programming with your children. Talk about whether programs realistically portray life.

One of the popular programs with kids in the early eighties was "The Dukes of Hazard." It didn't occur to many people at the time the program glorified a convict on parole who made a habit out of humiliating the local police force, which was portrayed as a bunch of bumbling idiots. "The Dukes" may no longer be on the air, but check the listings. The formula is still there.

3). Encourage your children to watch special programs, news and documentaries. Discuss with your children what is shown in these programs.

You may have to do some careful bribing to get your kids to watch some of these "dull" programs, but they will become interested also when you show genuine interest.

Discussion is important because even in those programs designed to provoke thought, TV still does most of the thinking for us.

4). Take time to watch your children's favorite programs with them. Check the messages the programs send. Are they the types of messages you want your children to receive?

But save your comments for after the program. Even if the show offends you, watch it all. Your kids like it for some reason. Find out what that reason is, and use discussion to get your point of view across. It will be more readily accepted if your children think they are making up their own minds, rather than having to comply with an edict. Just because you say they can't watch a show at home, doesn't mean there aren't other parents out there who don't care and will let your children, as well as their own, watch the forbidden show.

5). Learn to turn the TV off. Help your children learn to enjoy reading and other activities without the constant "background noise" of television.

You'd be surprised by the number of people who watch television, and are not really paying attention to what is going on. The TV occupies time and space for some. It needs to become a source of information. When it cannot provide this, turn it off.

6). Discuss TV commercials with your children. Point out how commercials may use emotional appeals to sell products. Ask your children to evaluate commercials that they see. Point out how color, sound, camera-angle, and other techniques can make a product appear more appealing than it really is.

Bob Dylan said it best when he sang a line about commercials, "Advertising that cons you into thinking you're the one/ that can do what's never been done/ that can win what's never been won/ meanwhile life goes on outside all around you."

7). Ask your school to develop activities that help children understand how TV programs are produced as well as projects that will develop critical thinking skills about TV commercials.

Just because your child may be able to ignore commercials does not mean the shows he or she watches are not actually a protracted commercial hidden in some drama or sit-com. Popular television programming follows a formula, and careful analysis will show that most all network programs are the

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
