



Bear problems analyzed

Federal and state employees have killed 20 adult black bears in Lincoln County in the past month.

Efforts to protect sheep on private ranches also resulted in one bear cub's death; that cub was killed by a Lincoln County rancher.

Larry Killgo, district supervisor for the Animal Damage Control Program (ADC) of the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA), said the ADC agents were issued permits by the Department of Game and Fish (G&F) to go out and destroy the marauding bears.

Killgo said more activity is expected. Another report of a black bear was turned in to the Roswell ADC office from a different ranch in the same area.

The area being invaded by hungry bears is to the west and north of the Capitan Range in central Lincoln County, areas that traditionally make the most calls to ADC with predator complaints, said Killgo.

One bear cub was captured alive

and transported to the Clovis zoo, said Killgo.

As far as ADC activities go, only one bear was killed in the entire state during all of fiscal year 1988.

That bear killed was listed as a non-target species in the ADC annual report, which means the bear was not an intended kill.

The one bear destroyed last year was killed with an M-44 cartridge, a spring loaded device which injects sodium cyanide into an animal when it bites into the bait. Killgo said the M-44 is normally canine specific, used mainly to kill coyotes.

The bear killed in 1988 was killed on private land according to the annual report.

The bear invasion into the sheep ranches this year is the outcome of a mild winter with minimal snowfall, and drought conditions during the spring and early summer.

"The bears have simply run out of their food supply," said Killgo.

Acorn nuts, prickly pear cactus fruit, and other staples of a bear's diet did not ripen this year.

While recent rains in Lincoln

County have improved foraging conditions for other animals, such as deer, the food supply for bears will not improve and can only get worse, said Killgo.

Bears are omnivorous, which means they will eat anything from berries, to grubs, ants, and dead animals.

"A bear will also chase down another animal to kill and eat," said Killgo.


Sheep are easy prey for bears and in the Arabela and Encinas areas of Lincoln County there are a multitude of sheep ranches.

Killgo said it was uncertain how the recent killings of bears by ADC agents will impact the resident population, but talk has started of curtailing or even eliminating the bear hunting season in the area.

Ron Porter of the State G&F said in an Associated Press article released Thursday he was leaning toward calling the bear season off all together.

Contrary to reports on televised



Five defendants appear in 12th District Court

Robert Mattson of Ruidoso Downs, appearing before District Judge Richard A. Parsons in a jury trial last week, was found not guilty of criminal solicitation.

According to assistant district attorney Scot Key, the judge also dismissed five other felony counts against Mattson.

In other action in District Court, Key said:

—Pete Maldonado was given a one year deferred sentence on Thursday after returning from a 60-day evaluation at the Western Correctional Facility in Grants.

—Bryan B. Stegall waived extradition at a hearing and will voluntarily return to California on demand.

—Barry L. Hale also waived extradition at a hearing.

—In a case of the State versus Deciderio D. Nieto, the defended

pled no contest of a charge of escape from the penitentiary. The plea was part of a plea disposition agreement where charges against Nieto in Otero County were dismissed. Nieto was given a three-year sentence, with two years suspended. He also admitted to being a prior felon and was given an eight-year habitual sentence. The two sentences will run concurrent for a total of eight years imprisonment.

news programs in New Mexico, the G&F has made no decision on the bear season in the Capitan or Sandia ranges.

A spokesperson at the Santa Fe G&F office said a decision could not be made until after a commission meeting at 2 p.m. Thursday, September 14, in the conference room of the G&F office in Albuquerque, at 3700 Osuna Road, N.E., suite 611. The phone number there is 827-7885.

Bear hunting season normally begins September 20 and runs through December 31.

"I doubt seriously this is impacting the population," said Killgo.

The ADC supervisor said the bears that were destroyed were smaller, less dominant animals, leading him to believe they were driven out of the Capitan mountains by larger, more dominant bears in the competition for food.

Killgo also said the bears killed were mostly females and had not given birth to a cub this season.

An impact in the reproductive success of the bears and other game animals could be seen next season as a result of this year's drought, he said.

Bill Zeedyk, director of wildlife and fisheries for the southwest region of the National Forest Service, said increased mortality among yearling bears and this season's cubs, as well as a drop in the number of next year's cubs, may be seen as a result of the drought conditions earlier in the year.

Though bears mate in June and July, a fertilized egg does not implant in a bear's uterus until after the bear goes into hibernation, and this depends on the bear's general health at that time, said Zeedyk.

If a female bear has been eating well throughout the summer and has put on sufficient weight before hibernation, the egg will implant. But if the bear has not been eating well in preparation for winter, the egg will spontaneously abort, said Zeedyk.

Bears less than 150 pounds normally do not produce off-spring, while bears more than 175 pounds generally give birth. These rates are for bears in northern states, said Zeedyk, while bears in the southwest may give birth at slightly lesser weights.

Female bears in between 150 and 175 pounds may or may not be capable of giving birth, he said.

Zeedyk also said female bears

need to be four years old before they are capable of producing offspring.

A normal litter is two cubs every other year.

It is not a normal characteristic for bears to seek and kill sheep for food, said Zeedyk.

Normally, bears remain in a particular range where food is available. When the food disappears, the bear will migrate to areas where forage is plentiful.

In areas of sheep ranches, the bear may attempt to kill and eat livestock.

"Once they learn how, they're not going to forget," said Zeedyk.

If the bear wanders into residential areas, garbage dumpsters and trash bins become the preferred targets.

Lincoln County Sheriff James McSwane said his department is still receiving calls on bear complaints in residential areas.

If bears continue to have difficulty putting on enough weight, they tend to go into hibernation earlier than usual to save energy.

Because many young bears may end up hibernating without sufficient weight, said Zeedyk, there is a possibility they will not survive the winter.

According to reports from the G&F, more than 60 sheep in the Arabela area of Lincoln County were killed by bears.

Killgo reported that ewes sell for about \$100 each, lambs for about \$75 each, and goats for about \$65 each.

In a preliminary report issued by the ADC for the period of April 1989 through June 1989, it was indicated there were no bears killed by the agency.

Killgo said some of the bears recently killed in Lincoln County were trapped in snares first, then shot. The other bears were tracked with dogs and then shot.

Only one bear was tracked with an airplane, said Killgo.

Aircraft are used on a daily basis in Lincoln County by the ADC to track and shoot coyotes, by far the most complained about animal.

The skins of the destroyed bears, when salvageable, are either turned over to the state G&F, taken by personnel involved in the "hunts", or given to the rancher whose herd suffered from the bear's predation, said Killgo.

All skulls go to the state G&F for dental examinations to assess the population's age, etc.

The bear meat, when usable, is sometimes fed to the dogs used in

the hunts, fed to ranch dogs, or taken by those involved in the hunt, said Killgo.

ADC responds to the complaints of ranchers and homeowners of animal problems.

The ADC operates under the control of the Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service of the USDA. Monies for its activities in Lincoln County come from three sources.

The Enabling Act provides ADC with \$11,000 each year, and is a tax sheep and cattle ranchers assess themselves based on a head count of their herds.

The Farm and Range Improvement Fund provides \$39,000, which comes from a federal rebate from Bureau of Land Management grazing fees.

Lincoln County provides \$10,000 from its general fund.

Because the ranchers were complaining about bears, a game animal, ADC personnel needed to obtain permits used to "hunt" the bears and destroy them, said Killgo.

"We really don't relish removing these bears," he said. "It's a necessary evil."

Ranchers do not receive any compensation for the damage caused by predator animals, though in other states compensation is paid, said Killgo.

During the period of April through June 1989, confirmed damage to sheep herds in Lincoln County totaled approximately \$6,000, with almost all the predation caused by coyotes, and none by black bears.

During that same period, ADC destroyed 69 coyotes, nine bobcats, and seven striped skunks.

Eleven non-target species animals were killed during the period, one being a mountain lion.

There were no black bears killed by ADC during the first half of fiscal year 1989.

According to the annual report, ADC spent \$977,051 in all of New Mexico during fiscal year 1988.

Approximately \$1,800 worth of confirmed damage to sheep and goat herds was attributed to bear predation during 1988, though black bears were not listed as a targeted species during that year.

A little more than 5,000 coyotes were killed during 1988 by the ADC. More than \$60,000 damage to sheep herds and calves was attributed to coyote predation during 1988. More than \$83,000 total damage was attributed to coyotes in 1988.

vice president, Thena Clarke the treasurer, and Marcella Lotz the secretary.

Williams said during his speech that some physicians who wish to stay in Ruidoso are unwilling to do some of the extra duties that are required in rural hospitals in general.

Compared to other rural hospitals, LCMC is in very good shape, said Williams.

Home Health Services of Lincoln County (HHS) graduated seven women Wednesday from the organization's training program for home health technicians.

HHS Administrator Verna Adams explained the course was taught by Leala Newsome, a registered nurse, and consisted of about

HHS has been in operation since 1976, and provides nursing care in the home for individuals who may be ill enough not to take care of themselves, but not so ill as to need hospitalization, said Adams.

Though there is no official hospice in Ruidoso, HHS also provides hospice care to terminal patients, said Adams.

She said a hospice is being developed but progress has been

delayed over licensing problems related to small communities.

Though the majority of patients are elderly, HHS provides service to patients of all ages, said Adams.

Board president Paul Vordermann presented the certificates of completion to the graduates. Three board members were present for the ceremony.

Medical advice is provided to HHS by Dr. Arlene Brown, a family practitioner in Ruidoso.

terrupted when he served during World War II in the Army Air Corp.





Race track solidly opposes new tax

A proposed five percent state tax on race track winnings over \$1,000 doesn't exactly thrill Ruidoso Downs Race Track owners and operators.

"Because of public interest, we're dead set against it," said Rick Henson, manager of the track, speaking for himself and for the track owner, R. D. Hubbard.

"We just got wind of it. We and our attorneys are evaluating it," said Henson.

State tax officials last week offered two proposals to the state Legislature's interim Revenue Stabilization and Tax Policy Review Committee. They want gamblers to

pay the five percent tax on winnings and, secondly, to require out-of-state businesses to collect taxes on goods they sell in the state.

According to the Associated Press, the plan to collect a state tax on winnings would apply to all gambling in the state except games on Indian reservations, which are not subject to the state tax authority, said Jim O'Neill, deputy secretary of the state Taxation and Revenue Department.

People are required to pay taxes on the winnings, but the state can't require tribal governments to collect withholding taxes, he said.

Horse racing would be the major source of gambling winnings affected by the proposal, O'Neill said.

Under the proposal, winnings of \$1,000 or more would be subject to a five percent state income tax in addition to the current 20 percent federal tax withholding, said Taxation and Revenue Secretary Gail Reese.

Henson said that Ruidoso Downs Race Track is required by law to withhold 20 percent of a bettor's winnings over \$1,000; the winner must provide a Social Security number and fill out a form.

The track, then, each Monday, must mail a check to the IRS cover-

ing the accumulated 20 percent owed Uncle Sam.

O'Neill said he doesn't know how much money the five percent proposal will generate.

The second proposal would widen the net under which the state could require out-of-state companies to collect compensating taxes for items they sell in New Mexico.

Companies that have "activity" to exploit the state market are required to collect the tax.

The new proposal would broaden the definition of "activity" to include anyone advertising through newspapers, magazines, radio or television.

The proposal would apply to cable television shopping shows and companies soliciting sales through advertising publicizing a toll-free number, but would not necessarily apply to catalog sales unless the merchant advertised through a New Mexico media.



Warriors comeback falls one point shy 14-13

A furious fourth quarter rally by the Ruidoso Warriors threw a scare into the Goddard Rockets who held on to win 14-13 in Friday's showdown at Horton Stadium.

The Warriors blocked a fourth quarter kick and James Atwood scooped the loose ball to scamper 42 yards for the touchdown, setting up a two point conversion try that would win or lose for the Warriors.

Quarterback Manny Guardiola's pass was tipped away, but Goddard was flagged for having too many Rockets on the field.

With the ball on the 1 1/2-yard line, fullback Kenny Trapp ran wide. The Rocket defense penetrated the line and Trapp never made the turn.

The game was a good defensive battle sprinkled with too many penalties and errors for the first three quarters. The Warrior offense started the game with a balanced attack, but the Warriors' second and third quarter defense was asked to camp on the field too long before Guardiola and Rue teamed up for two crucial pass plays, one of which capped a 61-yard drive for the Warriors' first touchdown with 3:24 left.

The Warriors showed more balance than in past games and it is only normal for the defense to be slightly ahead of the offense early in the season. Sophomore Manny Guardiola grew a little older in that fourth quarter and Rick Ragsdale had a fine spurt late in the third. It must be difficult for both very young quarterbacks to endure in a two-platoon system that seems to be based on "better not error."

Head coach Doug Ragsdale has made positive adjustments and will continue to do so. The season's early and district play is still weeks away. Many people thought Goddard's revenge game might add up to a big Warrior loss. It was a loss, barely. Perhaps the Warriors can even afford to be a little proud in this defeat.

Both John Winans and Jamie Candelaria played a whale of a defensive game and the Warrior players as a whole can chalk this game up as a never say die heroic effort that could have gone either way.

FIRST QUARTER SUMMARY

Kief Johnson returns the kickoff to the 32 yard line. On first down, Guardiola pitches to Jamie Guardiola for no gain. The Warriors fumble on a handoff and Goddard recovers.

Goddard runs the ball for the first two plays and then is flagged for illegal procedure. Warrior Zach Chavez nearly intercepts Vigil's first pass. The Rockets pass long and it is caught at the eight yard line. Johnson stops Vigil at the line for no gain. The Rockets are flagged for illegal procedure. The Rockets are flagged for a clip. Johnson pursues and drops the Rocket back. Warriors take over.

Trapp blasts through the right side for five yards. Trapp tries the left side and finds a hole for nine yards. Guardiola runs an option for five, but fumbles on the tackle. Rockets recover.

Goddard runs the middle and fumbles. The Warriors recover.

Trapp powers his way up the middle for five yards and then bowls over two more Rockets on the right side for ten yards and a first down at the midfield stripe.

Alfred Rue adds two yards. Trapp runs for four. Guardiola hits brother Jesse who makes a leaping catch in the middle of a crowd on the Rocket 40 and a piling on penalty adds 15 more to the Rocket 23.

A procedure penalty costs the Warriors five. Guardiola finds Jose Marquez in the flats for five yards. Another Guardiola pass misses a wide open Jesse Guardiola. On third and six, Trapp is hit at the line for no gain. Shane Well's field goal attempt is short, Rockets' ball.

The Rockets are on the move as the quarter ends 0-0.

SECOND QUARTER SUMMARY

Rockets work the Warrior middle to the seven. Two running plays later the Rockets score and convert the extra point to lead 7-0.

The Warriors take the kickoff and are stopped on the 20 after a crunching Rocket tackle stops the starburst attempt.

Trapp is stopped for no gain. Trapp is battered in another scrimmage knee pile up and it costs the

Rockets 15 yards for un-sportsmanlike conduct.

Guardiola misses Rue on the option pitch and the Warriors lose five. On a blitz, Guardiola throws the ball away to avoid a sack. Guardiola finds Rue with a pass, but Rue is out of bounds.

After an outstanding 74-yard kick that carries in the end zone, Goddard starts from the 20. Vigil's first pass is tipped and Jamie Candelaria intercepts for the Warriors.

Center Pete Baca falls on the ball after a fumble between he and Guardiola. Rick Ragsdale enters the game as quarterback.

Trapp drives the center for nine tough yards. The Warriors are flagged for holding. On first and 20, Marquez sweeps left for two yards. Ragsdale tries to find Marquez in the flats with a pass and it is nearly picked off. Ragsdale misses Candelaria in the flats and it is nearly picked off again. A high snap is followed by a field goal attempt that is low, Goddard's ball on the 23.

John Winans issues a crowd pleasing crack on the Rocket back at the line for no gain. The Rockets move the ball for huge yardage up the middle. A holding penalty helps the Warriors and the defense tightens to shut down a fourth down run. Warriors ball.

Ragsdale quick pitches to Candelaria who is nailed for a two-yard loss. A Ragsdale pass is incomplete, but a roughing the passer penalty costs the Rockets 15. Ragsdale hits Rue with three straight passes without a huddle. Ragsdale then lifts a beautiful pass to Guardiola who is wide open for a 25-yard gain down to the ten. Ragsdale hits Guardiola an inch or two outside of the end zone. Ragsdale tries the other corner of the end zone for his sixth straight pass and the ball is intercepted, Goddard's ball on the 20.

Two plays later, time runs out and the half ends 7-0, Rockets.

THIRD QUARTER SUMMARY

The Rockets return the kickoff to the 40. Winans and Kief Johnson rack the Rockets back for no gain. Vigil is intercepted by Rue, but Rue is out of bounds. The Warriors are called for an offside as the Rockets shift to punt and the miscue gives the Rockets a big first down.

The Rockets are successful on a series of runs up the middle and across the end zone line for a touchdown. The extra point is good and the Rockets lead 14-0 with 5:50 remaining in the third quarter.

On the kick, Chris Torres brings the ball back to the 25. Guardiola starts the second half. Trapp finds a hole for 16 yards to the 40. Trapp is stopped at the line, but pushes forward for two tough yards. Marquez shows off some speed with a nice end sweep good for seven. Guardiola hands off to Trapp and the Rockets at the same time resulting in a Warrior fumble turnover.

The Rockets can't move and are forced to kick. Torres downs the ball on the four.

Marquez dives for one. Marquez sweeps right for two more. Trapp drives to the ten and the Warriors punt. Marquez kick is low, but with a bounce and roll picks up 60 yards as the quarter ends. Rocket quarterback Vigil is injured on the last play and limps off the field.

FOURTH QUARTER SUMMARY

The Rockets fail to move and get off a disastrous 15-yard fourth down punt to the Warrior 41.

Working out of a wacky two-platoon quarterback system, Ragsdale enters the game and throws an interception on the first down.

The Warrior defense tightens and Steve Dankert sacks the quarterback on a fourth down effort. Warriors take over on downs.

Guardiola returns to the stress-filled quarterback position and finds Candelaria with a quick pass good for four yards. Guardiola hits Rue with another pass good for eight. Trapp seems inspired and decides to run over a bunch of Rockets good for a first down. Rue picks up another six yards on a power sweep left. Sophomore Guardiola short hops the ball to Candelaria for an incomplection, but is allowed to stay in the game. Trapp picks up a first

down on a crucial fourth down run. Guardiola finds Rue with a 22-yard bullet to the ten. Trapp sweeps for no gain. Rue steps in front of a defender to make a great catch in the end zone and the Warriors are on the board. Wells converts and the score is 14-7.

With 3:24 remaining and two timeouts left, the Warriors decide to go for an onside kick. Goddard covers the kick on the 48.

With Vigil out, the Goddard offense can't move and the Rockets are forced to kick. The Warriors knife through and block the kick. Atwood picks up the loose ball and runs for the touchdown. The two-point pass conversion fails, but the Rockets are flagged and the ball is moved to the one and a half. The Rockets defense penetrates and Trapp goes nowhere on a left side sweep. Rockets lead 14-13.

The onside kick doesn't travel 10 yards and Goddard takes over, running the clock out.



Descendant of frontier hero visits Ruidoso

"Davy Crockett, king of the wild frontier."

And he was visiting in Ruidoso recently.

Not the Davy Crockett, frontiersman, but his great-great-grandson, David W. Crockett, an architect from Pennsylvania.

Crockett said there are about 200 descendants of the famous frontiersman and statesman, and they will be gathering for a reunion in Granbury, Texas, next year.

Crockett said he was born in Fort Worth, Texas, and spent most of his life either in Houston or San Antonio.

He said he was not very impressed as a young boy when he was told who his great-great-grandfather was, and continues to live a humble, low-key life.

The trait may have been passed

on. Crockett told the story of when he and his then four-year-old son met with actors Fess Parker and Buddy Ebsen for breakfast at about the time Walt Disney Studios was releasing the "Davy Crockett" movie.

Crockett said his son wasn't very impressed by the meeting either. In fact, his son's memory of the event is of how upset he was when the waitress came by and took his packages before he was finished.

But there are many who say there is a strong resemblance between the now and then.

In fact, Crockett told of an occurrence at the Alamo, where hangs a portrait of the frontiersman. A young boy present at the time ran up to Crockett and said "There he is, Davy Crockett!"

Crockett also said he has been told a similarity exists between his and his great-great grandfather's handwriting.

Crockett was visiting friends, the Phoenix's, in Ruidoso. The 65-year-old Crockett's home is in Reading, Pennsylvania, now, where he works as a project architect for Wagner Architects, Inc.

Wild Flower Cheer Late Summer Days

This is being sent to you a little before high noon on September seven. After all-night slow rain the clouds began drifting away in all directions, and the bright sun lighted up a shining green world brilliant with raindrop jewelry and distant rainbows.

The wild morning glories have covered a section of the yard fence, and the blue and purple blooms are twice their normal size sending a rich and delicate aroma into the sunny air still flavored with moisture. The morning glory vines have reached the top wire of the fence and are reaching up into the air trying to find something on which

to climb higher. Among the purple blooms is a tiny scarlet flower the same shape as the morning glories, with its vine entwined with those of the larger flowers.

At the corner of the house the vine of the Purple Clematis is full of large purple blooms, unusual in size and numbers. This is the second blooming of the vine. It had just a few flowers right in the middle of the drought, a month or so ago; now it is blooming forth in celebration of the rain. The sunflower stalks are growing in height and putting on more and larger golden flowers. One of the great favorites of the southwest on mountain and plain is the salmon colored mallow, or wild Hollyhock.

These flowers which cheer us from near El Paso, all along the roadside, all the way up into our mountains. They are blooming late this year; and the flowers are large with special radiance in their salmon-crimson color.

All this is in harmony with a celebration of the rain by the Children of Mother Earth.

Storm Pageant Of The Night Sky

Just after good dark on September five you could look away to the East and see two sets of clouds moving in through the sky like a parade of thunder storms, one following the other.

The first one came booming and banging, flashing and lightning, a mass of purple black with rounded billowy edges, extending way up into the sky. The other, following away off to the north, answered the lightning flashes of the closer one with quick blinks of fiery red down near the distant horizon, followed by the whisper of distant thunder.

You can tell how far away an ap-

proaching storm is by the interval of silence between the lightning flash and the thunder which follows. If the thunder and lightning reach you at the same time, that means you are right in the midst of the action. This will happen if you are on a high hill, or on rare occasions when the clouds lose their way and come in right down near the ground.

On they came the two storms, answering each other with the booms and flashes. The first one came charging in with loud thunder and zig-zag flashes, and red bursts which lighted up the black cloud like a red lighthouse and then maybe a tenth of a second later came the thunder crash, boom, bam, making the ground tremble under your feet. The interval of silence was so brief as to tell you the cloud was about two miles away. For reasons best known to the rain spirits and Jack Frost the great thunder cloud came to a halt. Not a bit did it move. It stood there, taking up most of the eastern night sky.

WWII army engineering group gets together here

Forty-seven years ago, in the spring of 1942, a group of men from across the United States arrived at Davis-Monthan Field on the outskirts of Tucson, Arizona.

They were there to form what would become one of the most unique companies in the Army Air Force: the 901st Engineer Air Force Headquarters Company.

In charge of these men was a West Point graduate, with almost two years of service, Captain John A. Graf. He had just received his captain's bars the day before he reported to Davis-Monthan.

With the help of three lieutenants from Texas A&M College, he began turning the recruits into soldiers.

This past weekend, about 14 former officers and enlisted men of the engineer company joined Graf and their host, Jack Barber of Ruidoso, for their twelfth annual reunion at the Swiss Chalet Inn.

The men of the company have met in reunions across the nation. According to Howard Staigl of Hamilton, Ohio, thirty-six men and their wives showed up at the first reunion, in St. Louis, in 1978. He added that about 50 of the men in the 225-man outfit ended up marrying English girls. He said there were 15 English girls at the first reunion and they had a small reunion of their own.

Besides St. Louis, the company has had reunions in Cincinnati, Ohio, Rochester, New York, North Platte, Nebraska, Memphis, Tennessee, Chicago, Illinois and other cities.

The members of the company spent the weekend playing golf, going to the Mule Races and sharing a special dinner together for the men and their wives.

The passing of the years has not destroyed the camaraderie and friendship these men feel for one another. As new members arrived for the reunion, they were wel-

comed with warm embraces and handshakes. Several members of the company brought old scrapbooks and photographs to share. There were the usual questions about what happened to such and such.

But the talk soon turned toward old times.

The 901st Engineer Air Force Headquarters Company was assigned to the Eighth Air Force headquarters in England in 1942 through 1944. The company consisted on an engineer platoon, a camouflage platoon and a reproduction platoon.

"This was the first organization of its kind in the U.S. Army," said Graf, who now lives in Memphis, Tennessee.

Graf said when he reported to Davis-Monthan, he had no idea what the purpose of the company was.

"Nobody, that I could find, knew what this outfit was supposed to do," he said. "Our job, it turns out, was to support the Eighth Air Force."

Lyle Mercer of Whitesboro, Texas, remembers the first time he met Graf at Davis-Monthan.

"I'll never forget the first time we met this man," he said pointing toward Graf. "He came out there and stood on his tiptoes and said 'My name is Captain Graf' and that hat was set just perfect. We'd just got in there and didn't know nothing."

The company moved to Pendleton Field in Oregon in May of 1942.

After more training at Pendleton Field, Staigl said one day Graf put up a notice for anyone wanting a leave to sign up.

"The whole company signed up," he said.

But before anyone could even think about a leave, the company was ordered to Fort Dix, New Jersey, and eventually to Liverpool, England, in August, 1942, on the U.S.S. West Point.

Graf said the enlisted men had to travel in the front of the ship, but he had a stateroom, which he shared with 13 other officers.

The outfit settled into their headquarters at Brushey Park, just outside of London. It was there, the company began displaying the skills for which it was organized.

Barber said the camouflage platoon was put to work trying to deceive the German Luftwaffe.

He said during the invasion of North Africa, the Air Force sent fighters from England to capture airfields in North Africa.

"When those fighter aircraft left southwestern England, we immediately erected dummy aircraft on all those airfields so German reconnaissance wouldn't know they had left," he said.

According to Barber, part of the other duties of the camouflage platoon was to set up defensive lights. He said the idea was to light an area to look like an airfield, so the Germans would bomb it instead of the real airfield. He said the trick apparently worked because of the final outcome of the war.

"It must have worked, we won," he said.

Being with the camouflage platoon on these assignments paid off for Barber. He said one day he and some others returned to the company to find everyone else sick. He said the cooks told him someone had apparently left a bar of soap in one of the pots of food.


The reproduction platoon was in charge of reproducing maps and other materials. According to Charles Strodbeck of Tucson, Arizona, the company printed up all the material for the D-Day invasion.

"We knew where every outfit was going to land two weeks before the invasion and nobody said a word," recalls Strodbeck, who was company commander at the time. The company itself would eventually move to France in August of 1944.

Staigl said the engineer platoon was responsible for building the air raid shelter used by the Supreme Allied Commander General Dwight Eisenhower. Staigl also remembers that because of the drilling Graf had made them do when he was the commander, the outfit was always pulling honor guard duty for someone.

Not all the work done by the engineers was heavy construction work, Elmer Forbes, who now lives in San Clemente, California, came up with a simple solution to a problem.

According to Forbes, Captain Graf wanted everyone's clothes neatly hung up, but that was hard to do in a tent. One day, he got some of the wire used by the camouflage platoon for their mock-ups and made his own wire coat hanger. He said Graf eventually found out and told him to make six for every man in the company. He said that wasn't that bad, but every Air Force squadron wanted some and there were a thousand men in



Why not feed the bears?

No, not in the back yards or on the streets of Ruidoso or Albuquerque, but way back in the remote areas where the four-legged creatures are used to foraging for food. It seems such a waste to endanger the area ranch herds and the lives of hungry bears by leaving the creatures at the mercy of their need for food.

We understand there is a concern that providing food, even in remote areas, would disrupt the animals' natural instinct for foraging. But, if that instinct isn't already changed, what do you call the raids on garbage cans in urban areas and on herds in rural areas? These poor hungry bears are already confused.

So, we would suggest dropping "bear chow" or some such suitable food in natural forage areas to keep the bears out of inhabited areas and out of ranchers' grazing areas. After this dry summer, we can expect a wetter spring and summer next year, and the bears will stay up there where they belong—especially if they learned this year that if the berries don't appear then some other source of food may.

At least 21 bears have been destroyed in the Capitans this summer. We understand some are caught in foot snares before they are shot. The loss to ranchers precipitated this drastic action. If the hungry bears had an emergency source of food, they wouldn't be coming out of the Capitans.

Besides the continuing loss to ranchers and the danger to urban dwellers, the present situation also could endanger the sport of bear hunting. Whether you're a sportsman or not, it's clear to all of us that hunting is just one more element that plays a part in the state economy.

Under the present conditions bears are being killed, domestic animals are being eaten and the government is paying the bills. Why not feed the bears?—fj

DEAR EDITOR:

Several letters in *The News* this past week obviously were from individuals pushing the negative referendum. I sincerely hope your readers will see through attempts to divert attention from the REAL issues, substituting non-issues as the referendum's purpose.

Specifically, Grindstone Dam was portrayed as a taxpayer-financed boondoggle directly analogous to the airport development project. Other writers have characterized the petition and referendum as "striking blows for freedom, the right to vote, and the American way," obliquely branding those opposed as insidious partisans of subversive elements "right here in River City!" Non-sense!

The negative referendum is exactly what its name implies: an expression of opposition to the proposed hotel-golf course-civic center-hiking/biking trails development of the old airport land. It has NOTHING to do with freedom of expression (except to those who want their opposition to carry more weight), the right to vote, or democratic processes. Indeed, it could be regarded as a last-ditch effort to thwart legitimate processes of representative democracy, by overriding actions of the duly elected, democratically empowered Village Council.

The REAL issue of the referendum is two-fold:
1) Referenda are both expensive and usually unwarranted. As a

citizen, one has a duty to communicate one's concerns, regularly, to our duly elected representatives. If one opposes what they do or how they vote, then one should get out and campaign against their reelection. Better yet, run for their office(s)!

2) Delay of starting these projects for a year is not the casual, minor interruption some would have us believe. Such a delay keeps much-needed capital from flowing to our already damaged economy for a year. It also can add such significant costs to the projects as to make them economically unfeasible for the developers to pursue.

As for the issue of "rights," it is the right of any petition signer to WITHDRAW his or her name. We

have a right to change our minds. Going through a costly negative referendum can only hurt the village—it holds out NO prospects for improving the economy, it provides NO jobs or investment capital, it brings in NO new business or industry to "diversify the economy," it does NOT help Ruidoso fulfill its promise as a resort playground. It will not even improve anyone's voice or influence in village affairs.

If anyone signed the petition under some such misapprehension, I urge them to withdraw their names from this negative, destructive drive. The referendum is "negative" not only to the proposed development projects; it is negative toward Ruidoso and its future.

DEAR "JOE PUBLIC" (whoever you are):

I just wanted to drop you a note and thank you for the anonymous letter you slipped onto my desk on Wednesday. You're, apparently, either very modest, or not too proud of what you had to say.

As you know, I always sign my name to my writings, and affix my signature to the stands I take. I research, study and think a lot about the issues I write about, and so I'm happy to claim my writings.

When you say, "I would gladly sign my name, but I already know the consequences so must remain anonymous. Sorry," that just doesn't wash with me. What do you think those consequences would be? I know of no one who has been threatened, manipulated or coerced to sign or to remove their signature from the negative referendum petition.

I do know of several people who were presented with the petition by their bosses. Do you suppose they felt pressured into signing the petition? It makes you wonder, doesn't it. You accuse a village supervisor of calling his employees and their wives on the carpet for signing the petition, and apparently you believe a boss can intimidate his employees and their families quite easily.

"I guess we will just have to let him walk on us," you say.

You're right about one thing, I am in favor of the proposal backed by R.D. Hubbard for a multi-million dollar development on the old airport land. Just since Labor Day, I've learned of three local businesses that are closing—not just for the season, but for good; and so I'm even more convinced that we need some new money in this town.

As it turns out, you are mistaken in your accusations that village employees, while on the village

payroll, prepared and mailed a letter to petitioners using village postage. The letter you received was from a group of business people who are working to secure the economic future of our community. They drafted and had the letter you received copied in a private office, and mailed it out from a number of local business offices using each office's posting machine or postage stamps bought by those individuals. The postage meter number you so quietly slipped me is not the village's number. Village clerk Tammie Maddox did not write or mail you the letter, but the people who did included her return address because that's where names had to be sent for those who wanted to be removed from the petition.

I find it intriguing, judging from the letter you sent me and the similar anonymous letter received by Tammie Maddox, that you have the time to know who drinks with whom and where they all hang out. You're way ahead of me in that department.

But on the ordinance adopted to lease the airport land, you're not so well informed. The village property, no matter if the developers go bankrupt or make a million dollars, will never be lost to the Village of Ruidoso. The title to that land is not included in the lease, and is in no danger of being lost. Your claim that the property will go to the mortgage holder, and your assertion that Hubbard will control that company is just baloney! Read the ordinance again.

It's interesting that you're so concerned about how the McCarty family would feel about the lease on the land they donated to the village, since Bill McCarty is 100 percent in favor of the plan. Check with Bill if you're feeling bad about his family's feelings over the lease.

In your letter you claim to be 100 percent for Ruidoso, saying "money talks and the public suffers." Yes, money does talk, and when there isn't enough to go around, you bet the public suffers.

And you end with: "What a travesty." That would make me believe you feel pretty strongly about all this, but you didn't bother to sign your own name.

Again, thanks for the letter.




