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## Get set to tee off—golf course is go!

### The petition is invalid

It was over before most people even got comfortable in their seats. In a special meeting which lasted only three minutes and forty seconds, the Ruidoso Village Council heard village clerk Tammie Maddox say there were no longer enough signatures on the petition for a negative referendum on the petition to be considered valid.

Maddox told the council there were originally 511 signatures on the petition and that she had purged 46 names. She reported that 133 signatures were withdrawn, leaving only 332 valid signatures on the petition. Since the

minimum number of signatures mandated by the law to certify a petition valid is 357, the petition submitted was no longer valid.

Maddox went on to recommend the council post the signatures of those she purged from the petition.

Councillor Al Junge made the motion and the vote was unanimous. Since there was no other business, the meeting was adjourned.


According to Maddox, only the 46 purged signatures can be added to the petition. Each person whose name was purged must come to village hall and present evidence why their name should be returned to the petition.

"They must show evidence that they were wrongfully purged," Maddox said.

She went on to say that each person will be judged on a case by case basis.

Maddox and Steve Barshov, a New York attorney formerly with the New Mexico Municipal League, will decide if there is sufficient evidence to return a name to the petition.

A list of the purged names will be posted at village hall and published in **The Ruidoso News**. The people on the list will have until September 21 to present their case.



A crowd of people at the special called council meeting on Monday night barely had time to get seated before a petition for a negative referendum on the proposed hotel and golf course project was declared invalid and the meeting adjourned.

## County commissioners flip over identical bids

What happens when a governing body receives two identical bids for the same items? The successful bidder is determined by a flip of the coin, according to the Department of Finance and Administration (DFA), and that's exactly what the Lincoln County Commission did Monday.

J-H Supply, Inc. of Albuquerque, and MCL Construction Inc., of Bosque Farms each bid \$15,190.50 to

stripe Gavilan and Fort Stanton roads.

Each company was awarded a side of the coin and Chairman Robert E. Hemphill made the flip, with J-H Supply winning the toss and the bid.

"I've been involved in more than \$40 million worth of public projects, and never have I seen two bids exactly identical down to the penny," said county manager Nick Pappas.

During Monday's regular meeting of the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners (LCBC), a public hearing was conducted on proposed changes to the Lincoln County zoning ordinance, and to the Ruidoso-Lincoln County extra-territorial zoning ordinance (ETZ).

The changes to the ETZ ordinance, suggested by commissioner Karon Z. Petty, would make the ETZ commission a decision-making body, with appeals made to the ETZ authority.

Presently, the ETZ commission makes recommendations to the ETZ authority, and appeals go to the County Commission.

Since the ETZ authority includes two county commissioners, that means on an appeal, two votes are already decided.

Petty believes the change would provide a faster and more fair approach to the ETZ zoning process; however, changes to the ordinance were tabled pending further information.

A similar change was proposed for the county planning and zoning commission (P&Z), with Commissioner Rick Simpson suggesting P&Z be a decision-making body, with appeals to the County Commission.

Because the P&Z does all the research and is able to hear from most of the parties involved, Simpson believes that appointed group is capable of making routine zoning decisions.

Petty expressed reservations that if this change was made, the P&Z would be given a free hand to zone Lincoln County.

"I'm not ready to start zoning Lincoln County," she said.

P&Z commissioner E.J. Fouratt, reminded the LCBC that the P&Z is not frustrated over not having the authority to make decisions.

"We asked for direction. We did not ask for authority," he said.

Action on the proposed change was tabled until after a workshop for the LCBC and the P&Z scheduled for 7 p.m. September 28 during the next P&Z meeting.

In other zoning business, the county rejected a joint powers agreement with the Village of Ruidoso which would have increased Ruidoso's extra-territorial zoning from its present one mile around the village, to a total of three miles, plus one-half mile on each side of Airport Scenic Drive.

Strong opposition was voiced by individuals in the audience who claimed the proposal was a way to begin annexation of surrounding county subdivisions.

In a meeting of the Board of Finance before the LCBC meeting, the board reviewed how monies are invested and where interest is deposited. The recommendation made by the board of finance, later accepted by the LCBC, was to continue to place interest payments into the general fund and not separate by

use.

The LCBC also adopted a resolution to place \$10,000 of endowment monies for the Carrizozo Health Clinic into the state investment pool, which presently is paying more interest that banks in the county.

In other business, the LCBC:

- Approved a P&Z recommendation for the replat of lot 14 in the Pine Point Estates subdivision.
- Awarded a bid for culverts and bands to Contech Construction Products, Inc., the only bidder, for the amount of \$10,663.28.
- Awarded a bid to Pat L. Huey for 7,600 cubic yards of base gravel at \$91,200.00, and to J.W. Jones Construction Co. for 3,600 cubic yards of base gravel at \$31,500.00.
- Awarded a bid for a double tee bridge to Ferreri Concrete Structures, Inc., for \$14,500.00.
- Renewed an agreement with Animal Damage Control for predator and rodent control.
- Approved an amended agreement for mill levy funds for economic development.
- Authorized the purchase of five voting machines.
- Renewed a mill levy on the Sun Valley Sanitation District.
- Approved the minutes of the previous meeting, the treasurer's report, a budget increase, the accounts payable register and the payroll register.
- Moved to accept the recommended appointments to the Lincoln County Fair Board of Gordon Barham.

### Tribal Concerns opposes Molycorp mining agreement

After visiting Molycorp's mining operation in Questa, New Mexico, members of Tribal Concerns are convinced they do not want similar activities on the Mescalero Apache Indian Reservation.

"Their manner of mining is hurting people and wildlife," said Donalyn Torres during a press conference in Mescalero.

Torres and about 21 other Native Americans from Mescalero went to Questa to see Molycorp's molybdenum mining operation there.

"What we found we were not very pleased with as a group," she said.

## SBRA is set for commercial service

Traveling to and from Ruidoso on a major airline may seem like only a dream to some people, but if negotiations with American West Airline are successful, air service could be in place by the start of next year's horse race season.

According to Tim Morris, head of the Transportation and Aviation Division, the village has been in constant communication with the contract services department of American West Airline, which is based in Phoenix, Arizona. He said the village hasn't heard anything yet, but he is hoping to have something concrete within the next 30 days or so.

"We want air service," Morris said.

He said American West is currently working on the most feasible way to get air service to Ruidoso.

"They are going to look at what is the most beneficial to them and us also," he said.

Morris said the biggest problem for American West is working out the logistics of getting an aircraft to Ruidoso within the context of their regular schedule.

"We're looking at their routing structure and seeing how we can fit in," Morris said.

He continued and said American West could bring in a flight to Ruidoso either on a charter basis or on a regularly scheduled basis.

Morris said if the airline decided to bring in an aircraft on a schedule basis it could mean the creation of new jobs.

If the airline comes in on a schedule basis, the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport would have to in-

stall a metal detector and provide a "sterile" area for passengers after they have passed through the detector. Morris said the funds for these things are eligible through the Federal Aviation Administration.

A regularly scheduled flight would mean American West would probably bring in some people to handle ticket sales, baggage and ramp duties.

If the airline comes in on a charter basis, the airport wouldn't have to provide the detector or the sterile area.

Regardless of which kind of service the airline chooses to establish into Ruidoso, the village will have to put up a letter of credit.

Morris said the airline will give

the village the bottom line amount it needs to break even on the route. The village then has to put up a letter of credit which guarantees the airline that bottom line amount. If the airline makes money on the route, there is no payment from the village. If the airline loses money on the route, the letter of credit guarantees the village will make up the difference.

He said Crested Butte, Steamboat Springs, Colorado, and Jackson Hole, Wyoming, all started their airline services in this way. But he added, the three resorts only have service in the winter months.

"We've got a good strong ten-month market," Morris said.

He said everyone would have to

be involved with marketing the area in order to make the service work. He said lots of people will have to be involved not only with promoting the racetrack and the ski resort, but also the proposed hotel, golf course and civic center.

"That's the process behind the whole thing," he said. "To develop a good strong 12-month market."

Morris said the village has had talks with Southwest, American and American Eagle Airlines, but American West seems to have the best things going for it.

He said American West is a growing airline with both east and west routes. He said the airline also has an inner-airline agreement where baggage from American West is transferred to other airlines. According to Morris, that is important because someone could check their baggage in at Ruidoso to whatever their final destination might be. He said Southwest Airlines does not have such an agreement with other airlines.

American West is a fairly new airline, whose company headquarters are in Tempe, Arizona. The company was started on August 1, 1983 and currently serves 46 cities in the United States and Canada, including Albuquerque, El Paso and Lubbock, Texas. It has a fleet of 70 aircraft, including Boeing 737's, 757's and a 747 which the airline plans to use in the future on nonstop flights to Honolulu, Hawaii.

Morris said, despite rumors to the contrary, the airport can handle the 737 aircraft American West would probably use in and out of

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

"We hope the airport continues to grow as the air traffic grows," Morris said.

Morris also reported the figures for fuel sales and operations at the airport for the month of August. Landing and take-offs were down by five, from 1,625 in 1988 to 1,620

this year. Jet A-2M sales were down slightly from 14,442.7 in August 1988 to 13,543.5 gallons in 1989. But 100 octane sales were up significantly from 9,735.1 in 1988 to 12,401.2 in 1989.

"We have looked at the best year we have had since 1983," Morris said.

Mescalero Apache President Wendell Chino recently negotiated a contract with Molycorp to begin mining for yttrium and zirconium in the Pajarito Mountain area on the Mescalero reservation.

Tribal Concerns, a group of Mescalero Apache Indians that has been openly critical of Chino and his administration, is against the contract and wants the Tribal Council to cancel it. Tribal Concerns members believe the contract was not negotiated with the best interests of the tribe in mind, said Harlyn Geronimo, a Mescalero tribal councilman and representative of Tribal Concerns.

"If these people have any respect for our religious ceremonies, they will not bother this area," said a tribal elder during the informal news conference Saturday.

Geronimo, speaking for Tribal Concerns, cited these and other reasons to again call for the resignation of Chino as President of the Mescalero Apache Tribe.

"The Apache tradition is to

preserve the environment so that our lives can be fruitful," said Geronimo.

Because of the proximity of the mining site to the religious sites near Pajarito Mountain, they will be destroyed, said Torres.

"The impact into the spirit realm cannot necessarily be seen right away, but it will show its effect. It will affect our children and our grandchildren," said Torres.

Torres said pollution of the Red River, which runs adjacent to the Molycorp site in Questa, has been verified by EID.

"The state has condemned (the residential) wells below the existing tailings pond," said Juan Montes, a citizen of Questa and representative of Concerned Citizens of Questa, a group highly critical of Molycorp's activities.

He said it would cost \$1 million per mile to clean up the Red River, which runs into the Rio Grande.

"We're still living with a contaminated river which runs into our acquia, which runs into our fields and waters our gardens," said

Ruidoso. "Everything is in place to handle the 737 aircraft," he said.

Morris said the equipment, personnel and operating manuals are in place and the certificate from the FAA, certifying the airport as capable of handling passenger aircraft, is on file.

Morris said the rumor the airport has to have 150-foot wide runways before airlines will land is not true. He said the 150-foot wide runway is a requirement the Airline Pilot's Union would like to see. He said it is not an FAA requirement. He added Crested Butte operated airline service for three years with a 100-foot wide runway. The runway at Sierra Blanca Regional Air-

port is 100 feet wide.

Indeed, Fred Farrar of the Public Affairs office of the FAA in Washington, D.C. confirmed that fact to THE NEWS.

"Our regulations for airport certification do not specify any minimum width of a runway," Farrar said.

According to a Department of Transportation report, dated May 1986, entitled "Finding of no significant impact for Sierra Blanca Regional Airport", the runway at the airport will accommodate the Boeing 737 aircraft.

It states, "a primary runway length of 8,100 feet will accommodate takeoff and landing of critical aircraft currently operating in the Ruidoso area at an economical percentage of their use-

ful load. Forecasted user aircraft are assumed to be B-737's, DC-9's, executive jets, turbo prop aircraft and single and twin engine aircraft."

"The 8,100-foot initial primary runway can accommodate the B-737 at a takeoff gross weight of 94,000 pounds, including a 16,000 pound payload."

The runway at Sierra Blanca Regional Airport is 8,100 feet long. It is the sixth longest non-military runway in New Mexico, surpassed only by Albuquerque International, the Roswell Industrial Air Center, the Hobbs Industrial Airpark, the Santa Fe County Municipal Airport and the airport at Angel Fire.

Phase two of the airport expansion, which is listed in the airport Master Plan, involves the widening

of the primary runway to 150 feet and extending it to a length of 9,700. When that is done, only the runways at Albuquerque International and the Roswell Industrial Air Center will be longer than the main runway at Sierra Blanca Regional Airport.

Morris said the only thing the airport will need to do for the airline is have four personnel standing by on the taxiway in two fire trucks, 15 minutes prior to arrival and 15 minutes after departure. He said the FAA requires 1,500 gallons of water be standing by. Since the airport's fire truck only holds 400 gallons of water, he said the airport could call in a pumper truck from either Fort Stanton or Ruidoso.

"The airport is ready," he stated confidently.

Robert Vigil, a spokesperson for Concerned Citizens of Questa.

But there has been a long history of controversy over the source of the pollution in the Red River.

Leroy Apodaca, a spokesperson for Molycorp, said geologic formations exist in the Red River drainage system that contribute to its pollution.

This is termed non-point source pollution because the pollution cannot be pin-pointed to one specific source, such as toxic waste coming out of a pipe.

Molycorp's property in Questa is on this same type of geologic formation, said Apodaca.

He said, while the pollution may come from Molycorp's property, it cannot be attributed to the mining or milling activity at the site.

In fact, Apodaca said EID studies pinpoint the first source of pollution to the Red River to be six miles upstream from the mill site.

In any event, EID and the U.S. Justice Department alleged violations of the Clean Water Act by Molycorp through direct spills into

the Red River from the slurry transport lines.

Twelve spills were documented between May 1978 and March 1981.

This led to a consent-decree agreement between Molycorp, EID and the Justice Department which would assess a civil penalty of \$2,500 per spill into the river, plus Molycorp would be required to donate \$6,000 for each spill to a fund for environmentally beneficial projects approved by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and associated with the Clean Water Act.

The consent-decree was operational between 1981 and 1984, and Molycorp was required to pay for spills two or three times during that period, said Apodaca.

Geronimo said an environmental impact study (EIS) is to be conducted by the Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA) on Molycorp's proposed mining operation on the reservation.

In accordance with all EIS conducted, a period of public comment

is supposed to be part of the process.

The EIS conducted by the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) for a proposed new tailings pond near Questa has been flooded with negative comment by residents of both Questa and the community of Cerro.

The process of conducting an EIS and allowing for public input is normally lengthy, but Geronimo said Molycorp could begin operations on the reservation within the next six months.

Geronimo said Molycorp would have to drill wells in the area to have enough water to do the mining.

He said he is concerned over the operation's impact on the reservation's cattle industry in the area.

Also, there are numerous springs in the area which are downstream from the proposed mining site and he is fearful they may become contaminated.

Currently a petition for a referendum to overturn the contract has been in circulation on the

reservation, said Geronimo.

At least 490 signatures are needed. About 200 signatures have been gathered at this time, said Geronimo.

He also said there are plans to bring a guest speaker from Questa to speak to the tribal members about Molycorp's activities.

Geronimo declined to identify who the speaker might be. But the group which visited Questa was very impressed with Joe Sisneros, a former employee of Molycorp who has battled the mining company for many years, and whose activities were the inspiration for the novel *The Milagro Beanfield War*.

Criticism has also been raised over the type of contract negotiated by Chino, which gives the tribe \$50,000 each year over the next ten years.

"The tribe could be losing millions of dollars in royalties because of this contract," said Geronimo.

Tribal Concerns is planning a powwow in October to provide more information to tribal members on the issues of concern.

## Council OKs lease agreements

An ad hoc committee, charged with reviewing the leases for the old municipal airport land, recommended during the regular Tuesday night meeting the village council approve the leases as submitted.

The committee was made up of Ralph Petty, Bill Carrigan, Johnny Durham, Ron Andrews and Ted Bennett. Bill McCarty was originally appointed to the committee, but asked to be excused because of a possible conflict of interest. Bennett was added to replace him.

Speaking for the committee, Petty said the group had reviewed all the leases and was recommending the council approve them as submitted. He also asked that since the committee had fulfilled its purpose that it be disbanded.

Councillor Jess Stinson made the motion the council accept the recommendation of the committee, but added the committee should serve until the contracts are signed.

The motion was approved by a unanimous vote.

Petty said committee member Ron Andrews, who is a member of the Citizens in Action (CIA) group, was an important part of the committee. He said without the input from members of the CIA some things could not have been done.

He made a recommendation to the council that members of the CIA be appointed to a committee to review alternative uses of the available land at the new airport.

"We need to thank the Citizens in Action for speaking up and making everyone dot their 'i's' and cross their 't's,'" Petty said.

Petty said the community needs to get together behind the hotel/golf course project to make it work.

"We need to get everything on a positive note in Ruidoso," he said. Councillor Al Junge asked why the Municipal Airport Planning Board couldn't be expanded to include the members of the CIA.

Village attorney John Underwood said a new committee needed to be formed because the MAPP was charged with planning at the old municipal airport.

Mayor Lloyd Davis said the formulation of the committee would be taken up at the next council meeting.

In other business during the meeting, the council held public hearings on an ordinance dealing with the village's personnel board and the transfer of two liquor licenses.

Division head Leon Eggleston presented Ordinance 89-4 to the council and made a few changes in the wording of the ordinance. The ordinance would revise the powers, duties and guidelines of the village's Personnel Board to be more explicit. The council unanimously adopted the ordinance with the amendments.

The council approved the transfer of the transfer of ownership of a dispensers liquor license to Allsup's Convenience Stores, Inc. The dispenser license will be used at the Allsup's store at 2820 Sudderth Drive.

The council also approved the transfer of ownership of a dispensers liquor license to John D. Petty Trust. The dispenser license will be used at the Winner's Circle, 2635 Sudderth Drive. Councillor Stinson abstained from voting due to a possible conflict of interest.

The council also gave village staff permission to seek bids on snow removal equipment at Sierra Blanca Regional Airport, to apply for Community Development Block Grant funds for Main Street project renovations and to seek request for proposals for an architect to begin the designing of the proposed convention center.

## Downs trustees discuss drainage and garbage

The Ruidoso Downs Board of Trustees, meeting with one member absent and still two members short, talked of drainage, streets and trash during a regular meeting Monday.

On the heels of a complaint lodged last month over drainage into private property, the trustees were presented with a petition Monday from the residents on North Parnell Drive and Hilltop Road.

Ben Jeffery, speaking on behalf of himself and his neighbors, asked the board to repair the street.

"My daughter's got to walk through water to get to the bus stop," said Jeffery, saying there has been no work on the road for more than a year.

"It does need repair," said Mayor Jake Harris.

"Grading would help a lot," said Trustee Tony Parker who checked out the area before Monday's meeting. He said one of the three manholes is too high.

Trustee Alice Allison said the drainage problem was caused by some other property owners who filled in an arroyo, changing the natural flow. "And people telling them not to," said Allison.

"The BIDs we concerned about our garbage, we called them and told them about it ... they didn't do anything," said Trustee Wilma Webb.

"What can we do about the water washing his street away?"

asked Trustee LeVerne Cole.

"Go down there and cut you a ditch ... that's what they do," suggested Allison.

After more discussion on the street, its drainage problem and related garbage problems, the trustees agreed to have a contractor estimate the cost of repairing the streets on the petition, as well as the street complained about last month.

"See what it would cost to do it right," said Parker.

Also Monday, the trustees reviewed reports from the Police, Animal Control and Fire departments and from the Municipal Court.

Trustees also discussed what to do about the accumulation of garbage around the dumpster near Mom's Kitchen on U.S. Highway 70. departments, with a member of the audience standing and offering to talk to the people in the area.

Harris announced the village received just one estimate, for \$2,457.35, to repair the roof on the old shop building, and trustees agreed to seek further cost estimates on the repair.

Trustees approved a sign permit for the Texas Cafe to sign something to their windmill.

The Ruidoso Downs Volunteer Fire Department, represented by Mark Baral, presented Bernie Lammers, a village employee, with a certificate and a fire department jacket in appreciation for his contributions to the village and to the department.

## Sheriff reports on rocks and visits by bears

The Lincoln County Sheriff's Department cautions drivers to be aware of rocks washing onto roadways from all the recent rain.

Rock slides may be particularly hazardous in construction areas, where large boulders become loose

from all the work.

The Sheriff's Department has also responded to three bear calls in the last week, two in residential areas of Alto.

In one case, a bear was reported

to be inside a residence raiding a refrigerator until the occupants returned. The bear escaped through a window.

In another incident, a bear was reported to be on someone's porch.

In the third incident, a bear was overturning trash cans in the Bonito Campground area.

In each case, Sheriff's deputies frightened the bears away. None were shot.

# School taxes could go up and down

Taxes will go up slightly, then sharply decrease if the voters approve the school bond issue in October.

This will result in the net decrease in taxes for Ruidoso residents that was previously stated by Ruidoso Municipal School administrators.

Caron Snow, business manager for the Ruidoso schools, said during a regular meeting of the Board of Education on Tuesday, if the bond issue passes, a slight increase in taxes will be realized by homeowners during the first few years while other bonds are retired.

This will be followed by a sharp decrease in taxes during the remaining years, which will result in the net decrease in taxes reported by The News on August 14.

It was reported at that time the net decrease would be \$11.16 on a \$60,000 house. Recent decreases in the property valuation have increased this amount to \$11.19 over the life of the bonds.

Superintendent Sid Miller repeated that taxes overall will go down with the passage of the bond issue.

For the first 13 days of school, enrollment was above projections, said Miller.

Projected enrollment for grades one through 12 was 1,601 students. Actual enrollment is 1,668.

In the principal's reports, enrollment was up at the high school by 33, with the increase shown in the ninth and eleventh grades.

At Nob Hill Elementary, 136 kindergarten students were enrolled, below the projected 170.

There were 180 first graders, which was over projections. Students in the developmentally disabled programs had also increased, said principal Roger Sowder.

Donnie Weems reported 130 fourth graders and 135 fifth graders are enrolled at White Mountain Intermediate School, with the total one student above projected enrollment.

Frank Cannella reported that enrollment at the White Mountain Elementary school is exactly as projected, with 180 second graders and 153 third graders.

Mike Gladden reported at the Middle School there are 132 sixth graders, 124 seventh graders, and 125 eighth graders.

The 13-day enrollment figures are approximately 200 students less than the 40-day enrollment reported in 1985. This time last year The News quoted Miller as saying the Ruidoso schools were in a no-growth situation.

During Tuesday's meeting, Miller cautioned the board the 13-day count is not a reliable estimate of total enrollment. A reliable count will not be available until the 40-day count, the numbers used for school funding.

In a report presented by Gladden, federal project monies were described for the school year 1989-90.

Total federal monies for this year are \$589,626, about five percent less than the \$625,853 last year.

The difference is from a substantial decrease in PL 874 monies for Indian education. The explanation for the decrease was the formula used by the government is extremely complicated and uses figures based on enrollments in previous

years.

The board approved the federal projects monies.

In the architect's report, drawings of the proposed construction and renovation at the two sites was presented to the board.

A brief video for broadcast to advocate the bond issue was also shown to the board.

In the video, it is stated approval of the bond issue will include improvements at the cafeteria at the White Mountain School, however present proposals under consideration have the White Mountain cafeteria replaced with a new building, and the old cafeteria remodeled into classrooms.

When asked if the video might be misrepresenting what actually will be done, Miller said the proposals are not final and have not been approved. He also said the construction of a new cafeteria constitutes an improvement to the existing one.

Presently, no other options at the White Mountain site are under consideration, nor have any requests been made for proposals which keep the existing cafeteria.

The bond election is scheduled for October 10.

In other business:

—Accepted the resignations of Paula Reed, Maggie Hawthorne, Jan Mullican, and three food service employees.

—Approved the recommendations to hire Jackie Abels-Tobias, Michelle Castillo, Phyllis Platta, Barbara Graham, Nelda Montes, Diane Newsom and Robert Mager.

—Scheduled a special board meeting to open and award bids for janitorial supplies at 8 a.m. September 26.

# County will pay top PA salary in New Mexico

The county commission took action Monday that may make Ernie Gonzales the highest paid physician's assistant (PA) in the state of New Mexico.

In a split vote the commission approved a net salary of \$38,000 per year, which translates into a salary of about \$61,000 before taxes.

Commissioner Karon Z. Petty voted against the resolution.

Gonzales' salary is approximately \$20,000 more than the top salary paid to a PA at either Lovelace Medical Center, or Presbyterian Hospital, both in Albuquerque.

The top-end salary at Presbyterian for a PA is \$40,292, and at Lovelace it is \$41,641, said administrative officials at these facilities.

When asked about this discrepancy, Lincoln County Medical Center (LCMC) administrator, Steve Keller, said the PAs at larger hospitals generally work only 40 hours per week and are not required to pull hospital on-call time.

Gonzales is considered to be on-call 24 hours a day, seven days a week, which are unusual circumstances, said Keller.

The \$61,000 salary for Gonzales includes a four week paid vacation.

"That's a handsome amount," said Antonio Medina, director of the Mora Valley Community Health Services in Mora, New Mexico.

Medina employs a Family Nurse Practitioner (FNP) at the Mora health clinic. An FNP is also a mid-level medical personnel similar to a PA.

Medina pays his FNP \$33,000 plus benefits, for working eight hours per day, plus on-call when available.

Medina explained that "when available" means the FNP is always on call unless previous arrangements are made in which the FNP can ask for blocks of time to be off.

The Mora health clinic is a rural health clinic which serves a largely Hispanic and low income area in northern New Mexico.

The News contacted five medical facilities in New Mexico to ask about salary ranges for PAs. Three of the facilities contacted were rural health clinics.

Liz Baca, the executive director for the health clinic in Grants, New Mexico, said she had only employed three PAs in 17 years. The longest one stayed was two years.

Baca said a PA would start at a base salary of \$24,000 or more, depending on qualifications and experience.

"For \$60,000 I would buy a physician, not a mid-level," said Baca.

Ruth Vollmer, nursing recruiter at Presbyterian Hospital, said \$60,000 for a PA would be very unusual unless the PA worked along with an MD in a private practice that had a large patient load.

She also said she thought \$60,000 for a PA in a rural health clinic was too high a salary.

But there are many people who believe Gonzales is worth it.

Since his arrival to Lincoln County, 68 percent of the senior citizens in Corona will now see Gonzales about their medical problems, whereas before they all were taken to Albuquerque, said Dorothy Bradley, a site manager at the senior citizens center in Corona.

"He is an excellent, excellent physician's assistant," said Keller.

"This has been the biggest can of worms I've ever had to deal with," said commission chairman, Robert E. Hemphill.

"I am not convinced that was the understanding when Ernie Gonzales was invited to Lincoln County," said Commissioner Petty in reference to the salary agreed on during Monday's meeting.

The salary negotiations between the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners (LCBC) and Gonzales began when the PA complained he was not receiving the salary he was promised when he was recruited during the previous commission.

During the June 12 meeting of the LCBC, Gonzales went on record saying he was promised a \$38,000 net salary, the same salary he received at the clinic he previously worked at in Georgia.

Gonzales came from the West County Medical and Surgical Clinic in Garden City, Georgia.

Pat Adams, the bookkeeper for the Georgia clinic, said Gonzales' base salary was \$38,000 before taxes. He also received 100 percent insurance coverage, and any weekend or overtime work was considered profit.



# The Plant Corner

DEAR SALLY:

Recently I was given, as a memorial gift for a loved one, a beautiful camellia plant. Now I don't know what to do to keep it growing. Friends have told me it is an outside plant for much warmer climates. I love this plant and would love to keep it growing as an inside plant. Please help me. We enjoy your column.

Thank you, Brenda

DEAR BRENDA:

The camellia is a small tree or evergreen shrub. It is a native to eastern and southern Asia and is normally grown outside. They do make outstanding container plants, especially in wooden tubs and half-barrels. These large containers should be mounted on a strong four or five caster dolly to allow easy moving from the patio in the spring to back inside in early fall. I will describe some general growing requirements to help you enjoy this plant. It will take about three years for a camellia to become "established" and "acclimatized" after you re-pot the plant to its larger, permanent container. So you must be patient while waiting for the blossoms. The flowers will come if you provide proper light and other growing conditions.

**Soil**-Camellias need a fast, well-draining soil rich in organic material. Mix 1/3 peat moss, 1/3 fine ground bark and 1/3 potting soil and add to this a generous amount of vermiculite. The roots must be cool, moist, and have air circulation for extra oxygen. Help keep the roots cool with a two-inch cover of thick mulch on top. Never allow the mulch or soil to cover the base of the trunk. If you put mulch on top be sure to plant the camellia "high" when repotting. Be sure to have six or eight one-inch holes drilled in the bottom of the planter and place plastic packing do-dads about eight inches in the bottom of the planter before adding the soil.

**Water**-Try to maintain a slightly moist condition at all times from early spring to late fall. It can become drier in the winter, but never allow it to completely dry out. Poor drainage and over watering are the main trouble causers. You can leach accumulated salts with a deep soaking a couple of times in the summer.

**Light**-Camellias do not like strong, direct, hot sun and drying winds. If you wheel them out to the patio or deck in the spring, place them under the partial shade of trees, under lath cover, or on the north side of a building. Inside they

will need good, bright light, but filter a south or west window exposure. It is essential to have supplemental artificial light coming from above. Either use a sky-light or mount a gro-bulb directly above the plant.

**Temperature**-A cool, more moderate range of about 50 degrees in the winter to 85 degrees in the summer is required for this plant to thrive and give you many flowers.

**Fertilizer**-Use a good commercial acid plant food or your own organic food. Generally it's best to feed in the weeks and months following flowering time. Don't use more than one-half the package recommended use and feed more frequently. Do not feed sick plants or newly repotted plants. Any plant must be thriving to tolerate fertilizer.

**Pests**-Camellia petal blight will cause the flowers to turn an ugly brown, and also hot sun and dry wind will turn the flower edges brown. Sanitation is the best control for petal blight. Change the top mulch with fresh, clean mulch and spray the soil with PCNB before replacing the new mulch.

Some flower-bud dropping is natural as many plants set more buds than they can open. Some bud dropping can be caused by over or under watering.

Prune right after flowering in the fall. Remove dead or weak wood and thin dense growth to allow new flowers room to open properly. Shorten the lower branches to encourage upright growth.

The final score for Texico came in the fourth quarter after they recovered a Capitan fumble and ran it back for 25 yards and the touchdown.



What the Warriors accomplished would please any coach. They came back with fire and stuck it to the Rams for the next two games. It was a battle to the wire in game five before the Warriors finally lost this early season thriller 10-15, 12-15, 15-9, 15-12, 11-15.

Jody Hopkins was extremely proud of her team.

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

## Warriors ready for always tough Tulie

The Warriors romp with division 2-A Tularosa this Friday in Wildcat land at the bottom of the hill.

Tularosa has a 2-1 record, winning over Class 1A Cloudcroft 40-7 and Class 2A Santa Rosa last week 7-6. The Wildcats only loss was to Cobre 55-6.

Warrior head coach Doug Ragsdale hinted what was in store for the heavy underdog Wildcats.

He said after two straight losses it's time for the Warriors to start producing.

"We're getting to the point where we have to stop saying if this happened... We need to get things done.

We've got to quit beating ourselves. When we get to that point, we're going to explode on somebody."

The Wildcats and Warriors have been fierce rivals in the past. Tularosa seems to get up for the Ruidoso games.

Wildcat coach Bob Cerny is in his 15th year at Tulie and has compiled a winning 84-55-1 record.

Last year's Wildcat record was 3-7, 2-2 in District 3AA.

The Wildcats operate out of a basic Wild-T with a 4-3 defense.

Cerny said the 'Cats hope to be better than last year.

"We have a few people back who played last year. We should be fairly strong offensively, especially on

the line. We'll be tough up front defensively, too. We don't have a great deal of depth and will have to rely on our young kids."

Top returnees for the 'Cats are offensive-defensive linebacker Jonny Rocha, a 5-10, 217-pound senior; offensive guard-defensive end Sean Ray, a 5-9, 185-pound senior; quarterback Lew Mendes, a 5-10, 150-pound senior; and center-defensive tackle Charles Hager, a 6-2, 200-pound senior.

Top newcomer for the Wildcats is running back-defensive back Jason McKinley, a 5-8, 150-pound senior.

Ragsdale said he was satisfied with his team's performance

against Goddard despite the disparity in statistics.

Goddard had 230 yards rushing and 107 passing as its defense held the Warriors to 92 yards rushing and 93 passing.

"We had three chances to score from inside the 20-yard line and we missed two field goals and had a pass intercepted in the end zone. We definitely had chances to win," Ragsdale said.

Ragsdale said he believes the Warrior defense is improving, while the offense is still learning.

"But I think we've proved that if we can continue to improve we can be the best team in the state," Ragsdale said.



# No retirement is in sight soon for 75-year-old Peace Corp volunteer

Keeping up a home and making sure her yard was immaculate wasn't enough for Janet Klepper almost 20 years ago.

So, she joined the Peace Corps. And at 75 years of age, she is looking forward to returning to her volunteer job in Guatemala on September 27. She has 19 years service with the Peace Corps.

Because of back surgery last December, she has been on the inactive list. But, not for long.

Klepper, who has the distinction of being the oldest Peace Corps volunteer in the nation and who has served in that capacity longer than anyone, is visiting in the Ruidoso area.

Klepper and John and Phyllis Weinburg of Palo Verde Slopes, became friends some years ago when the Weinburgs, who had spent four years in Guatemala, read about Klepper in a Long Beach, California, newspaper.

Klepper is most proud of the weaving cooperative she set up in Guatemala. The co-op is operated by, managed by and employs only women.

The Peace Corps volunteer had

to leave Guatemala in 1982 "because of political and social unrest."

Tourism, she said, dwindled during that period, because of the unrest, and sales of co-op products dwindled.

But Klepper had taught her women well in how to market their goods in the world market. She taught them invoices, marketing, addressing, sales techniques and all other aspects of international trade.

The co-op, in Dunil, has an international reputation for quality, she said. The women who work and manage the co-op are Mayan Indians primarily.

Their products include shawl shirts, placemats, blouses, slipover table covers, coin purses, shopping

bags—"maybe 30 articles," Klepper said.

Klepper was 57 years old when she signed up for Peace Corps service. She was in the Dominican Republic for almost three years.

She spent nearly nine years in Guatemala her first tour of duty, until violence forced her to leave in April of 1982. She served in Costa Rica from spring 1982 until September 1984 when she returned to Guatemala. She was there until October 1988 when she fell and injured her back.

In Guatemala she lived in a Catholic church complex at 8,000 feet altitude. Temperatures range from "cool to cold," she said. There is no central heat.

The Mayans, she said, inter-

spersed their native religion and customs with Catholicism.

"Maximon," a mamkin, plays a big part in their lives. The figure has his own clothes and he "lives" with a different family every year. He is dressed in western clothes and usually is found sitting in a chair with the native family.

"They pray to him to resolve immediate problems," Klepper said.

After organizing and directing the Dunil co-op, Klepper directed the activities of volunteers over a large area of Guatemala.

She'll soon be doing the same again, although the day after Christmas, she will turn 76.


