

Chino challenger cries foul

The man who seeks to challenge a 34-year presidential rein over the Mescalero Apaches wants to know why his name is not on the list of candidates published by the tribe.

During a press conference Friday in Mescalero, Joseph Geronimo said he submitted his name to the tribal election board of the Mescalero Apache Tribal Government as the sole challenger to Wendell Chino, president of the Apache

tribe for 34 years. But when the candidate list was posted in the Tribal Government Center, only Chino's name was listed as a presidential candidate, said Geronimo.

A former tribal council member, Geronimo said none of the election board members would speak to him on record as to why his name was omitted from the final list.

Attempts by **The Ruidoso News** to contact election board members were unsuccessful. An attempt to contact the election board chairman, Elizabeth LaPaz, was also unsuccessful.

The deadline to submit names for candidacy was 4:30 p.m., Wednesday, September 20. Geronimo said he mailed his letter of intent on Tuesday, September 19, at the tribal post office in Mescalero.

Mail is usually delivered the following morning, which would be in time for the afternoon deadline, said Geronimo.

During the news conference, Geronimo said the Tribal Constitution requires only a statement of intent to run, which he sent with his letter the day before the deadline.

"I believe my basic civil rights have been violated," he said.


The final list, posted on a bulletin board in the Tribal Center, listed three candidates for vice president. They are Francis N. Smith, Keith Miller and Silas Cochise.

Cochise is the great-great grandson of the Chiricahua Apache chief Cochise, and Geronimo's running mate, said Geronimo.

Highway project will be subject of public hearing

Plans to widen Mechem Drive from the intersection of Sudderth Drive to just past Ski Run Road will be the subject of a public hearing from 7 to 9 p.m. Thursday, October 5, at White Mountain Intermediate School.

According to LeRoy Givens of Boyle Engineering, the hearing results will determine which two of four alternates the State Highway and Transportation Department will use as the basis for the final design.

The Highway Department has divided the more than \$13 million project into four alternates, two for the southern portion and two for the northern part of the project. The alternates are designated S-1, S-2, N-1 and N-2. Alternates S-1 and N-1 would be designed for traffic to move at a speed of 35 mph. Alternates S-2 and N-2 would be designed for traffic to move at 45 mph.

Village of Ruidoso officials have

been reviewing an Environmental Assessment Study (EAS) for Highway 48 prepared by the Highway Department, and have until October 14 to comment on the study.

According to the EAS, all four routes would greatly improve the level of service with four-lane traffic operation. The two southern alternates have a continuous left turn lane, while the two northern alternates have left turn pockets at selected intersections.

The S-1 alternate would improve local and regional access, but would require the acquisition of one commercial business. Driveway access points would be reconfigured to conform to the widened roadway. Some parking and landscaping areas along the road may be affected.

The S-2 alternate would have the same improvements, but would require the acquisition of three commercial businesses.

The two northern alternates would have the same improvements and affected areas, but the N-1

alternate would require acquisition of two single family houses and four businesses. The N-2 alternate would require acquisition of the same two family houses, as well as eight commercial businesses.

The study says no land from a publicly-owned park, recreation area, wildlife or waterfowl refuge will be affected, but some right of way acquisition will be required to modify the driveway access to Alto Lake.

Information on air quality and noise impacts are also in the study, which states no excesses of state or federal carbon monoxide standards are expected. However, between Sudderth Drive and Rio Arriba Road, about six residential and 19 motel/lodging units could expect projected noise levels exceeding federal criteria.

The study further states culvert structures would be designed to avoid significant impact on floodplains. Limited stream channeliza-

Search is on for accused rapist

Police are still searching for Elmo Silva, who is accused of an August 27 rape of a woman in Ruidoso.

A substantial reward is being offered by the Ruidoso-Lincoln County Crimestoppers for information leading to his apprehension.

According to police, Silva, 28, is described as having dark hair and dark eyes. He is five foot seven inches tall, weighs 145 pounds and has a tattoo of a Zig-Zag man on his left forearm.

A warrant was issued for Silva's arrest on August 27, and police say he should be considered armed and dangerous.

Police say at approximately 2:30 a.m. on Sunday, August 27, a young woman was raped and brutally beaten in an area between Wood Lane and Mockingbird Lane in the Pinecliff area. The victim identified her attacker as Silva.

Along with the rape charge, Silva faces robbery and kidnapping charges, as well as an open charge of attempted murder.

Anyone with information on the whereabouts of the

accused is asked to call the Ruidoso Police Department at 257-7365, or Ruidoso-Lincoln County Crimestoppers at 257-4545.

There were also 13 names listed as candidates for tribal council.

A letter requesting an explanation why his name was not on the list was sent by Geronimo to LaPaz.

After the election two years ago, Geronimo, who opposed incumbent Chino in that election, filed a com-

plaint with the election board on the ballot counting procedure.

He said the committee counted all the ballots behind closed doors and the results were not available until the following morning.

A subcommittee of the board was established to review the complaint, said Geronimo.

"They heard the case against them themselves," he said.

Dissatisfied with the outcome, Geronimo filed a complaint in the tribal court, but this too was denied by then Judge Harrison Toclanny.

"I have no confidence in our judicial system," said Geronimo.

Toclanny is currently the Chief Justice of the Mescalero Apache Tribe, appointed by Chino, said both Geronimo and Harlyn Geronimo, a current tribal council member.

Joseph Geronimo said he contacted the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) regarding the last election, but was told it was an internal tribal issue and out of the FBI's jurisdiction.

The previous election experience is a reason why Joseph Geronimo waited until almost the last minute

to submit his name.

He said he had misgivings about opposing Chino again, but many visitors encouraged him to submit his name.

Also, because of the alleged election irregularities, Geronimo suggested that this year's election be observed by an independent party.

Geronimo said the Apaches face many social and economic problems.

"I'm not proud to be number one," he said, noting the tribe's high unemployment, alcoholism, high school dropout and juvenile delinquency rates.

"These are things I want to change. That's why I want to run," he said.

A former tribal council member for eight years, Geronimo is currently employed by the tribe as an adolescent counselor.

Leadership is poor in the tribe which contributes to the poor self-image experienced by many Apache youth, which results in a 60 percent dropout rate, said Geronimo.

"As they become older, they become more and more aware of how their real world is on the reserva-

tion," he said.

Geronimo also said many media reports on the economic success of the Apache tribe is misleading.

"Where are those Apaches that are doing well?" he asked.

He claimed both the Inn of the Mountain Gods and the sawmill operated on the reservation have lost millions of dollars.

"Our recreation areas are in deplorable condition," he said.

Geronimo described himself as a controversial individual when he served on the tribal council.

"But controversy is the heart of democracy," he said.

The tribal personnel policy is another item Geronimo said is unfair in its regulations.

He explained any tribal employee who wishes to run for council or other tribal elected positions must take a leave of absence during the campaign period.

"It's not only illegal, it's unfair and unconstitutional," he said. "It's the policy of one man."

Chino was unavailable for comment. It was reported by employees of the tribal office the president is in Albuquerque.

Police report busy weekend

Local police, ambulance and fire personnel were keep busy with calls over the weekend.

Ruidoso police, Lincoln County Sheriff's Department, Mescalero BIA and Ruidoso EMS all responded to various accidents throughout the area.

With the Golden Aspen Motorcycle rally in town, police handled a number of accidents involving motorcycles.

On Friday morning, two people were injured when the driver apparently lost control of his motorcycle on Highway 48, just North of the Swiss Chalet Inn. Phillip Lindsey, 35, of Athens, Texas, and Barb Johnston, 34, of Malakoff, Texas, were taken by ambulance to Lincoln County Medical Center with a possible broken leg and cuts and scratches.

On Saturday, two more accidents, one at Peña Canyon and the other on Ski Run Road, kept police and ambulance personnel busy.

Because of the large crowd in the Midtown area on Saturday night, Ruidoso Police called in the graveyard shift early and asked for help from State Police, Ruidoso Downs Police, Capitan Police and units from the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department in maintain-

ing order. On Sunday, Ruidoso Police investigated an accident between a motorcycle and a pickup on Sudderth Drive.

According to police, a pickup driven by 16-year-old Erica Batton of Ruidoso attempted to make a left turn off of Sudderth. An eastbound motorcycle, driven by 27-year-old J.L. McDaniel of Texico, struck the vehicle. A passenger on the motorcycle, 31-year-old Becky Burgess of Clovis, was taken to Lincoln County Medical Center with visible head injuries.

The Ruidoso Fire Department was also busy this weekend. Three engines from Ruidoso and a county unit responded to a house fire on Carrizo Canyon Road on Sunday.

According to the Fire Department, the house was located on the east side of the road, about a block from Rainbow Lake. The house was unoccupied and the department is still investigating the cause and trying to determine who owns the structure.

A motorcycle accident, late Sunday night, sent one man to the hospital in Roswell. Details are not available at this time, but the accident occurred about 11:25 p.m. on Highway 70, near mile marker 246.

tion and acquisition of small areas of wetland may be necessary.

A substantial amount of utility relocation would be required prior to start of construction. Some temporary interruptions of utility service could also occur during construction. The village's water main along the highway would have to be reconstructed.

The estimated costs of the different alternates are: S-1, \$5,971,000; S-2, \$6,139,000; N-1, \$7,194,000; N-2, \$9,092,000. These figures include the cost of construction, engineering, contingencies and right of way acquisition.

According to village planning administrator Cleatus Richards, the village is concerned over several issues in the EAS.

Richards said the study calls for

signal lights at the intersection of Mechem and Cree Meadows Drive, but states the Highway Department will only place the conduit for signal lights at the intersection of White Mountain Drive and what will be the entrance to the proposed hotel and golf course.

Richards said the Highway Department should go ahead and place signal lights at these intersections and avoid problems in the future. He said entrance to the proposed hotel and golf course should particularly have a signal light.

"I think it deserves a signalized intersection because of heavy traffic and the fire station," he said.

The report does not mention any other intersections where signal lights might be placed.

Richards said the other thing which concerns village officials is the impact the construction could

have on businesses. He said the report says every effort will be made to minimize the impact on residents and businesses during construction, but it is not specific enough.

"I feel they should give us more information on how they are going to do that," he said.

According to Richards, the current schedule calls for completion of the final design and awarding of contracts by April or May 1990. He said construction would then begin by June 1990.

"Unfortunately, it's going to hit at our peak business period," Richards said. "If they handle it bad, one bad season could put some of these people out of business."


He went on to say, the Highway Department will be providing relocation assistance to businesses and he hopes there will be someone

at the public meeting to answer questions about assistance.

Richards said he was glad the Highway Department decided to change its mind and start the southern portion of the project first. The Highway Department was originally going to complete the northern portion first, but decided to switch because of the amount of right of way acquisition required in the northern portion.

Richards concluded by saying, whichever alternates are chosen, the village will have to live with them. He said the project wouldn't be able to be redone in 10 years because of development.

"Whatever we go with at this point, we are going to be stuck with," Richards said. "This is going to set the pattern for development and control that development."

Petition process complete

Village clerk Tammie Maddox will report to the Ruidoso Village Council Tuesday that none of the purged names were re-instated on the petition for a referendum on Ordinance 89-2.

According to Maddox, only one person came to her office in village hall and asked why her name was taken off the petition. Maddox said in that instance the woman had signed the petition twice and only one of her signatures was removed.

The names, addresses and signa-

tures of those individuals who were purged were posted at village hall on September 11. Individuals had 10 days from that date to show evidence if they believed they were wrongfully purged. The names, addresses and signatures of those purged were also published in the September 14 edition of *The Ruidoso News*.

Maddox said no one else came to her office to present evidence they were wrongfully purged.

At this point there are 332 names remaining on the petition. A total of 357 names were needed to

call a referendum election on Ordinance 89-2, which dealt with the leasing of the old municipal airport property for a proposed hotel and golf course.

Maddox said this is the end of this particular petition process.

With no election needed over the council action to authorize leases with the golf course and hotel developers, the project can begin as soon as the final lease agreements are signed.

If construction begins on the golf course this fall, then the course could open in spring 1991.

Conferees are ready to schedule meetings here

New Mexico Municipal League wants to come to Ruidoso for its annual conference in 1992.

Ruidoso has been asked to submit a bid on the conference which brings together municipal officials and administrators from all over New Mexico.

Village manager Frank Potter said league officials heard about the proposed hotel, golf course and civic center project and asked if it could be used for the conference.

"We were asked to please bid on it," said Potter, adding the village will submit a bid and see what happens.

Potter said if the village bid is accepted, conference members will have to be housed in several hotels, because even the proposed hotel on the old airport property will not be enough. This year's conference in

Albuquerque attracted more than 400 people, who were housed in four hotels.

In addition to 400 lodging rooms, conference guidelines require 12 separate meeting rooms for various subcommittees.

Potter said planners need to make sure the proposed civic center and hotel conference room can be divided to accommodate these smaller group meetings.

"People have got to understand you've got to have multiple rooms for meetings," he said.

At least 10 of the lodging rooms have to be suites, according to league conference requirements.

Potter said the proposed hotel and civic center could meet all the requirements, but additional hotel rooms would be needed.

He went on to say this is not the first time the village has been contacted about having a large confer-

ence, adding, Ruidoso has never had the facilities to conduct all the meetings in one place.

"It would be a big shot in the arm," Potter said of the impact the conference would have on Ruidoso.

He said the only problem with this particular conference, and one which may keep Ruidoso out of the running, is the timing, since the conference is always the week before Labor Day. He said with hotel rooms already full from the usual Labor Day crowd, additional rooms may be hard to come by.

The 1990 Annual New Mexico Municipal League Conference will be in Taos. In years past, Clovis, Farmington, Grants, Roswell, Las Cruces and Carlsbad have hosted the conference. It has also been in the two largest cities, Albuquerque and Santa Fe.

NMSU agency research could aid area economy

The Center for Business Research and Services (CBRS) at New Mexico State University has received a \$29,487 federal technical assistance award for a research project that will involve surveying manufacturers in southern New Mexico to determine their source for component parts used in assembled goods.

The research project, titled "Planning for Growth and Development," is being funded by the Federal Economic Development Administration. Matching funds of \$10,595 are being provided by the NMSU College of Business Administration and Economics.

Principal investigator for the project is Linda Riley, CBRS associate director. The project will include categorizing component parts as foreign made or U.S. made, and identifying factors involved in com-

panies' choice of suppliers.

Companies in southern New Mexico will be surveyed to determine if they could service some of the manufacturers that are currently buying component parts from other states and other countries.

"If we can't come up with suppliers in southern New Mexico, we will develop marketing strategies to attract new companies to this area and expand existing companies," Riley said.

The project's economic development goals are to create employment, create new businesses, expand existing businesses and ultimately increase tax revenues for New Mexico.

Research is slated to begin immediately and be completed by the end of December.

The advertising agency was in the building occupied by The Printery on Sudderth Drive, but Bentley needed more room. She has it now in the Jira Center.


Technically, the agency office is on East Poor Drive, next door to where it was formerly located.





Close, but no cigar: Rams outscore Warriors

"We probably played better Friday than we have all year," said head coach Doug Ragsdale about the Warriors 7-11 loss Friday to the Portales Rams.

"We have one glaring weakness that must be corrected, score from inside the ten," he added.

Defending state AAA champs, the Portales Rams got pushed all over the field by the Ruidoso Warriors football team. Yet, after four quarters of Warrior bullying the final score didn't agree with the

game's statistics.

On the very first play, Kenny Trapp ran 50 yards to the Portales 34. Ruidoso forced its way down to the Portales four before the team began what seemed to be a replay of a bad dream. The Warriors couldn't score.

On fourth down Ruidoso threw an interception in the end zone. That was after an offensive drive of sixty-four yards.

Turnovers, penalties and questionable calls by the referees were the only defense for the Portales Rams. Ruidoso's offense

might have scored the same amount of points without the Portales defense being on the field.

The second offensive possession by the Warriors got them to the Portales 38. It was fourth down and one yard to go. Jammie Candelaria got the ball and the first down ... except for a holding penalty against the Warriors.

Ruidoso decided to punt, and what a beautiful one by Logan Stirman, all the way to the Portales four yardline ... except for an ineligible man down field, penalty

against the Warriors ...

During the second quarter Ruidoso's Logan Stirman ran 30 yards to the Portales five. On second down and goal-to-go at the three, Ruidoso fumbles ... Portales recovers.

A few downs later the Warrior offense had a second down and 7 at the Portales 28 ... then ... an off-side penalty against the Warriors. Now it was second down and 12 and a pass. A Portales defender traps the ball with his knees while

on the ground ... it's ruled an interception and the Rams get the ball on their own 13.

That was the end of the first half, the score 0-0.

Unfortunately, the second half was much like the first. The main difference was the score at the end.

With 1:55 left in the third quarter, Andrew Telles of Portales gave the Rams the lead with a 24-yard field goal. This was the first time the Rams had made it through the tough Ruidoso defense to Warrior territory and they walked away with a 3-0 lead.

With 10:05 left in the ballgame Kenny Trapp ran 16 yards for the long-awaited Ruidoso touchdown. The Warriors had penetrated into Portales territory eight times and finally scored, now leading 7-3.

Cippy Garcia got the ball for Portales, 2:44 left in the game, he takes the ball down the left side for a Portales touchdown. It was a 32-yard run which started out as a pass play. Garcia broke away one time Friday night and got a touchdown. It was the second time the Rams offense got past the 50-yard line. Scoring on the two point conversion the Rams were ahead for good, 11-7.

The clincher came when sophomore quarterback, Mannie Guardiola completed a pass for nearly 20 yards inside the Ram 30, 1:35 left to play, the receiver turns to run for a few extra yards and is hit ... fumbling the football ... Portales recovers and runs out the clock.

The defensive plays of Ruidoso's James Atwood and Pete Baca's quarterback sack on the Portales 3 are highlights of the game, espe-

cially considering the defense was on the field such a short period of time.

The Warriors made Portales punt the ball ... except for two defensive pass interference calls.

Another decision by the officials after a fourth down Portales run led to the Rams touchdown. Officials gave the runner an extra foot after he put the ball ahead of his body while lying on the ground. The measurement was still very close, dead even with the first down marker ... another judgment call by the officials and another break for the Portales Rams.

Three plays later Cippy Garcia scored.

It's difficult to understand losing the way Ruidoso lost last Friday. The Warriors played well, better than the other team.

The only reason a team loses is because they can't find a way win. The best way to win is to get more points on the scoreboard at the end of the game.

Grass is growing on fire-charred Blood Ranch

When the Blood Ranch fire burned on July 6 this year, 11 area fire crews with about 150 firefighters responded.

About 70 acres were burned, an area that could have easily been much larger without the cooperative effort of the units involved.

But today, below the shadows of black and charred ponderosa and alligator juniper, a new carpet of green is sprouting to take hold of the land and prevent erosion, thanks to another cooperative effort.

On August 11, the State Forestry Division (SFD) and the Soil Conservation Service (SCS)

took part in a re-seeding effort at the Blood Ranch burn area in which the cost burden was shared in part by the Upper Hondo Soil and Water Conservation District (UHSWCD), said Greg Haussler of the SCS in Capitan.

About 50 acres were seeded with a mixture of orchard grass, smooth brome, intermediate wheat grass, sweet clover and tall fescue, said Haussler.

The total cost of the project was a little more than \$1,000, which was shared evenly by the Blood Ranch and the UHSWCD, said Sue Stearns, secretary for the UHSWCD.

When the crew arrived to re-seed, the ground was barren and black. The effort was organized and initiated as soon as possible to get the seed in place before the ash turned into a hard crust, said Haussler.

When the five-hour chore was completed, it rained that same evening, bringing the steady rains everyone had awaited for so long.

Much of the grass has taken hold, but long pillar-shaped sections of barren ground remain where fallen logs soaked with pitch burned their image into the earth, like a sterile X-ray that will be empty of grass for a while longer.

Haussler said the alligator juniper will sprout new growth from its charred trunks, but the ponderosa will have to rely on seed brought in by the wind or by animals and insects.

Patches of gamble oak seedlings have already taken hold, and wild vetch, morning glory and other ground cover has returned on its own to the blackened earth.

When the ground starts to freeze during the cold nights, and thaw during the warm days, the soil will loosen, allowing the seeds to penetrate deeper and take hold for the winter, said Shirley Goodloe, chairman of the board of super-

visors, for the UHSWCD.

Board members Paul H. Jones and Ernest McDaniel, were present along with Goodloe, Haussler and Luna for a tour of the re-seeded site on Thursday.

No structures were burned during the fire, but it was a close call.

"That was a lucky fire we caught," said Barbara Luna of the SFD.

At the time of the fire the wind came from the south and fanned the flames, pushing them to the north and northwest.

Just the other side of the seeded area is a meadow in which a fire break was dug to prevent the fire from continuing into another stand

of trees and on into the Eagle Creek area, where other homes and businesses were located, said Haussler.

The line of containment was close. Forty yards from the next stand of trees is a lone ponderosa charred black from the leading edge of the fire.

The agencies involved in fighting the fire were the Bonito, Capitan, Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs, and Fort Stanton fire departments, the U.S. Forest Service, State Forestry Division, the Bureau of Indian Affairs, and three crews from Mesalero, said Luna.

There were also several other pick-up volunteer firefighters in-

cluded, she said.

Equipment used included some bulldozers, one helicopter and one air tanker from Alamogordo, said Luna.

The cost to extinguish the fire, which was believed to be caused by a short in a power line, was estimated at \$60,000, said Luna.

"Without the cooperative effort between all those involved, it could have been a much worse fire," she said.

Money for the cost share comes from a one mill levy assessed by the UHSWCD through the county assessor's office, said Goodloe.

Only residents in the district are assessed the levy, she said.

Women's health issues featured in programs

October 11 will be "Mammogram Day," part of Woman's Health Awareness Week, a joint effort of the Lincoln County Medical Center (LCMC) and the Altrusa Club of Ruidoso.

During a regular meeting of the LCMC Board of Trustees, Thursday, Dr. William Harrison reported on the project scheduled next month.

The mammogram portion of the project is sponsored by the Altrusa Club, which is paying for an additional technician to help with the diagnostic test.

Included in the program for the week will be two panel discussions. One will be for adult women, the other for teen-agers, and the topic will be women's health, said Harrison.

The mammograms will cost \$50, and will be limited to three priorities of patients: those who have never had a mammogram, those at high risk, or those referred by a physician.

LCMC trustee Sally Avery said Altrusa believes very strongly in the mammogram project.

Last year three women were discovered to have cancer who had no idea of their condition until they received a mammogram, she said.

In the financial statement, LCMC administrator, Steve Keller, reported an operational excess for the first time this year.

For the first five months of the fiscal year, LCMC has an operational excess of \$9,256. For the

month of August, the excess was \$62,031.

Total operating expenses for the month were down slightly from last year. August 1988 expenses were \$437,541, and August 1989 expenses were \$429,628.

Operating revenues were up in August 1989 at \$488,040. Revenues for August 1988 were \$455,610.

The Carrizozo Health Clinic (CHC) showed a net loss during July of \$6,484, the first month of its fiscal year.

Total operating expenses were \$22,634. Total salaries in July were \$11,356, with \$6,359 paid to medical personnel, and \$4,997 paid to dental personnel.

Total patient revenue for July was \$11,356.

In August, CHC showed a monthly loss of \$15,143, bringing the net loss for the fiscal year to \$21,627.

Total patient revenues for August at CHC rose to \$15,026.

Operating expenses at CHC for August were \$31,409, up by about \$9,000 from July. Salaries were \$17,489, with \$8,077 paid to medical personnel and \$9,412 paid to dental personnel.

The month of August was busy for the Ruidoso Emergency Medical Service. There were 104 local calls, 69 of them emergencies. There were also 10 emergency transfers and 11 routine transfers.

A total of 82 surgeries were completed during August, 41 inpatient, and 41 outpatient, including nine surgeries completed in one day.

Keller reported meeting with de-

partment heads at 7:30 a.m. every Thursday. The meetings, which are not mandatory, are designed to increase communication throughout the hospital.

Keller also said improvements are still being made with the emergency room (ER) coverage, reporting another physician's assistant was hired.

Dr. William Harrison reported statistics are being kept to see if a particular doctor or specialty seems to be overburdened with ER calls.

Though specific information was not available, an overload does seem to exist in internal medicine, said Harrison.

Keller expressed gratitude to Harrison and the other doctors who choose to stay in the ER to help out after they have finished with the patient on their original call.

Dr. Roger Beechie gave a report for the physician recruitment committee.

He said several surgeons were in contention, as well as a couple internists.

Beechie also said the program is very extensive, and the committee has been very helpful to Keller in making contacts.

Board chairman Dub Williams suggested the committee remain intact to continue helping in the recruitment process.

In other business:

—Keller introduced to the trustees Connie Ross as the interim quality management coordinator. In her report, Ross said there was a 92 percent overall compliance rate.

—Keller reported the building

renovation is in its final stages. Completion is expected very soon, he said.

—Keller reported on the Leadership Retreat scheduled for October 6 and 7.

—Keller reported on the New Mexico Hospital Association convention. He mentioned a drawing for the trustees that will raise money for a political action committee to represent hospital interests in the state legislature.


—Incoming Auxiliary President, Emadair Jones, reported the Auxiliary accumulated 1,484 volunteer hours and netted \$4,960.56.

—During a discussion on the interest from the mill levy account, trustee Gary Mitchell said the commission can make the mill levy a discretionary account and not pool the interest into the general fund.

—After a closed session, the board announced it had granted

credentials to Michelle Nancy Han, Michael Carbuto and John Keith, all Medicus physicians for ER coverage on weekends; granted temporary credentials to Jody Redmon, a physician's assistant, pending licensure; changed the status of doctors Paul Echols and Paul Whitwam from that of regular staff to associate staff.

—The next meeting is scheduled for 5:30 p.m. Thursday, October 26.




But, we don't always know what to do, or have the skills to respond in an emergency.

In regard to the Catastrophic insurance, unjustly imposed on the elderly retirees; I find it hard to believe that our elected representatives would impose such an outrageous tax on one class of citizens who have already paid their dues to Medicare and are still paying, plus high costing insurance premium for co-payment for health insurance.

As a federal service retiree with thirty years-plus service, I find

myself having to work at a part-time job in order to pay living expenses incurred by increases in cost of living. The C.O.L.A. increases are never enough to cover the increases in rising cost of taxes, insurance premiums and other everyday expense increases.

DEAR EDITOR:

About supporting elected public officials.

If they had promised to "lower the water table by millions of gallons, raise property taxes to their legal maximum, lease million dollar acreage for \$12.00 an acre and obligate taxpayers to raise \$350,000 each year to subsidize an Airline" I doubt that they would be on the Council.

When they voted to do these things, many felt the decisions were too important to be decided by any five or six well-lobbied individuals and should be decided by a vote of the majority — hence the referendum.

There were many items that deserved public discussion before a public vote but the pressure groups were successful in defeating the referendum. Now, until and unless Mr. Hubbard's final contract is made public, we will not know its contents for, unfortunately, the items mentioned by you in your excellent condensation are subject to change and not legally binding; nor did your editorials address several items of major import.

We who signed and remained on the petition looked beyond the temporary trickledown of construction monies and perceived eventualities that have so far escaped the Council's attention.

It is not too late for them to salvage a portion of the protection to which the Village is entitled. The pittance rental of \$2,000 should increase in proportion to the rate of inflation. In my lifetime the nickel hamburger escalated to \$1.90 at the track, Milky Way candy bars, three-for-a-dime in 1941, sell for 47¢ each, and the 1932 National Debt of eleven billion has inflated into the trillions. By the termination of the Golf Course lease \$2,000 may well be the average child's monthly allowance.

There is more.

Some form of legalized gambling is inevitable.

The Council has a sworn duty to safeguard our future and can do so by including, in every applicable contract, the guarantee that the Village will receive a percentage of the GROSS revenues generated by any form of legal gambling that is conducted on any premises owned, leased by or controlled by the Municipality. If, in the future, legislative approval becomes necessary, it can be obtained.

My interest in Ruidoso's future is equal to most. My tenure is longer than many, my investments as large. I bought lots when coyotes chased rabbits on Cree Meadows, "Willie" Horton was our only doctor and we had neither bank nor hospital. In thirty-five years of part and full-time residency, this is only my second letter to you, but I resent the implication that we who signed the petition did so out of ignorance or for personal gain. The referendum is sacred. It is the common man's only defense against landslide rule by a minority. It is condemned only by those who, for whatever reason, fear the collective will of the majority.

I welcome the Hubbards and if the Village had been invited to participate in the purchase of our only Blue Chip asset, Ruidoso Downs, I would have been an avid supporter even to sanctioning a tax increase, but Mr. Hubbard proved his business acumen with his outright purchase.

Like any good businessman, he entered into an aggressive rejuvenation and promotional campaign that resulted in a sensational increase in attendance and handle and the spread of enthusiasm throughout the entire area. Ruidoso benefited from his excellent advertising. But, Mr.

Hubbard owns the racetrack as well as the magnificent collection of Western Art that has been so generously displayed. He will also own the golf course and possibly part of the hotel which, had the recent gambling bill passed the State Senate, would have been the only facility in Ruidoso able to qualify for a gaming license.

This is not a criticism. Mr. Hubbard's activities are open and above board and he deserves to realize profits commensurate with his investments. Mr. and Mrs. Hubbard's largess has helped many groups and individuals and I hope that their interest and concern for the Village will continue for many years.

But just as Mr. Hubbard protects his investments, so do I want to protect the Village.

Mercer Airlines services the racetrack at Calienta and several gambling establishments in Nevada and, without, exception, the empty seats are subsidized by the various establishments.

I would have more faith in this joint-risk-venture if the promoters would assume the \$350,000 subsidy as their act of faith.

In the past, disputed contracts of public concern, have suddenly appeared at council meetings where, with a demand for action and minimum discussion, they become law before the audience is properly seated. I hope that is not true in this case for the rental, gambling and subsidy matters deserve the Council's full attention.




