

## Robber hits local bank

Ruidoso Police, Lincoln County Sheriff's Department and the Federal Bureau of Investigation are still investigating a bank robbery which occurred about 12:16 p.m. Monday, September 25, at the Ruidoso State Bank North Branch, 707 Mechem Drive.

Police dispatchers received an alarm from the bank at 12:16 p.m. and dispatched police units. By the time they arrived at the bank, the suspect had fled.

According to Ruidoso Police Chief William Newman and Agent

Doug Beldon of the Albuquerque office of the FBI, the suspect is a white male, five foot eight inches tall, 165 pounds, between 25 and 35 years of age, slender build, with short brown hair and a light complexion. He was reportedly wearing a blue or green baseball cap, a green satin jacket with white stripes and blue jeans.

Beldon said the suspect entered the bank and went directly to the tellers. He showed one of the tellers a threatening note instructing her to place the note and the money in a tan plastic bag.

Newman said the suspect never



## Rape suspect is jailed

Accused rapist Elmo Silva is in the Bernalillo County Detention Center in Albuquerque awaiting transportation to the Lincoln County Jail in Carrizozo.

According to Ruidoso Police detective Mike Lovelace, local law officers received a telex stating Silva had been arrested by the Albuquerque Police Department around 2 p.m. Wednesday.

According to Sergeant Richard Tarango of the Albuquerque Police Department's Southeast division, that department received a Crimestoppers tip giving them the location of a house where Silva could be found. The caller also gave them the name of the owner of the house.

Tarango said the Southeast Impact Team placed the house, located at 828 Alverado Drive SE, under surveillance and eventually a man came out. Police stopped the man and learned he was the owner.


Tarango said the man told them Silva was in the house with two young children. He gave the police

permission to search the house.

Tarango said they removed the two kids from the house and found Silva asleep in the back bedroom of the house.

"He never knew we were on to him," Tarango said.

He said Silva offered no resistance and had no weapon on him. He said Silva had \$1,900 in \$100 bills in his possession. Silva

told police he won the money in Las Vegas, Nevada two days ago.

A warrant was issued for Silva's arrest on August 27, after Ruidoso police said he was named as the man who raped and brutally beat a young woman in an area between Wood Lane and Mockingbird Lane in the Pinecliff area.

After further investigation of the incident, Assistant District Attorney Scot Key filed additional charges against Silva on September 14.

He currently faces a rape charge, kidnapping, robbery and an open charge of attempted murder.

Police said evidence located in Silva pickup also led them to arrest two suspects in connection with a methamphetamine laboratory found in the county on September 1.

Key said Silva was previously convicted in Twelfth Judicial Court on charges of conspiracy to manufacture methamphetamines and was given a six-year sentence. He said Silva was out on an appeal bond for that offense, but his appeal was denied.

## Council calls a halt to old Main Road zoning debate

In a two hour meeting, the Ruidoso Village Council put an end to Main Road rezoning, discontinued payroll deductions from village employee's paychecks for American Family Life Assurance Company and agreed to join the city of Roswell in seeking requests for proposals for a feasibility study on a regional landfill site.

In a public hearing, the council considered the rezoning of eight properties along Main Road from R-1 residential to C-1 neighborhood commercial.

The eight properties in question are Sleepy Hollow subdivision, Block B Lot 96A, Block BB, Lots 1, 1A, 133D, 133E, 133F, 133G and 133H. The village Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) recommended the rezoning at its meeting of August 7.

Upper Canyon resident Hazel Haynsworth spoke out against the proposed rezoning and presented the council with a number of exhibits, including photographs and petitions. She told the council these were basically the same properties that have been discussed for months.

Haynsworth cited several reasons why the rezoning should be turned down including the rezoning would add commercial value to several of the properties which were for sale.

"A definite no-no for any P&Z, regardless, is to rezone for added value," she said.

She went on to state there was surely a written or unwritten law in all P&Zs that says you do not have commercial zoning on a residential street.

"By allowing commercial rezoning, you are lowering the value of these residential properties," Haynsworth said.

She urged the council to deny the P&Z recommendation and protect the natural historic area of the Upper Canyon.

Attorney Robert Beauvais, who represented the Upper Canyon Business Association, said owners bought the property as commercial and felt they deserved to have the property zoned the same as it was when they purchased. He said there had been no speculation on anyone's part to raise the value of their property.

He said the original recommendation was down from 33 properties to eight properties to be rezoned. He said statements that rezoning would cause additional traffic problems were not true. He said by the chief of police's own survey, the main intersection ranked sixteenth in accidents.

He said the council's decision on the rezoning would represent an end to the process for one year's time unless it was taken to court.

"The only alternative would be if the people I represent choose to take it on to court if they are denied the zoning."

After the discussion, Councillor Tom McNeil made the motion to leave the properties as they are

right now, and Councillor Larry Simon seconded.

In the discussion of the motion, Simon said he would vote against the change until something could be done about fire protection in the area.

"I am going to vote against this until such time as the Village of Ruidoso can place the infrastructure up there where the Upper Canyon is no longer a fire danger," he said.

Councillor Al Junge said whether the motion passes or fails it won't change a thing. He said if the property owners bought a piece of property one way, they deserve to have it that way.

Councillor Jess Stinson told the council he should probably abstain from voting because his brother owned one of the properties Haynsworth mentioned. The council did allow him to vote on the motion.

Councillors McNeil, Simon and J.D. James voted for the motion and councillors Junge, Stinson and Frank Kolb voted against it. Because a three-quarters vote of the council was required to approve the zoning change, Mayor Davis said his vote would be useless. Councillor Junge made a motion the council accept the P&Z recommendation, but it died for lack of a second.

"I can't even get a second tonight," Junge said.

Because the council did not approve the P&Z recommendation, the properties will remain zoned R-

## Another bear is killed

One more bear was killed by federal agents in the sheep ranching area east of the Capitan Mountains.

Larry Killgo, district supervisor for the Animal Damage Control (ADC) division of the U.S. Department of Agriculture, said one more bear was killed by the ADC since the last report September 11 in The News.

At that time, The News reported 20 adult bears were killed by ADC employees in the area east and north of the Capitan

Mountains.

The bears were reported to have caused damage to sheep ranchers by killing sheep in their flocks.

Killgo said bear activity in the area slowed down substantially, and believes most of the bears have returned to the mountains.

He said ADC was aware of damage caused by six bears, but none of these animals were found.

The State Game & Fish (G&F) department closed the bear season in the Capitan Mountains in reaction to the 20 bears killed during the month of August.

Killgo also said G&F asked ADC

to cease their activities in the area. Ranchers who continue to have problems with sheep-eating bears can use licensed bear hunters to locate and kill the animals, he said.

According to Killgo, the bear season is closed within the area circled by US Route 70, the Arabela road, the Pine Lodge road, State Highway 47 as it runs north from Capitan to Encinosa and US Route 380.

The bear season remains open in the areas outside this circle, an area that normally doesn't have any bears, said Killgo.



## Domenici staff visits Ruidoso

Two representatives of U.S. Senator Pete V. Domenici's Roswell office were in Ruidoso on Tuesday to answer any questions the public might have and help them with any problems with federal agencies.

Nancy Smith and Poe Corn say their duties are to help get situations resolved and convey constituent's opinions to the Senator in Washington D.C.

"It's Senator Domenici's policy to go to the people," said Corn.

Smith said their job is to help people with any problems they might have with a federal agency. She said they try and handle the problem out of their office, but occasionally a Congressional Inquiry is required.

Smith also added the staff also gives guidance on problems that do

not relate to the federal government.

The three staff members in the Roswell office are responsible for the eight counties in the southeastern New Mexico.

Corn said the staff tries to keep in contact with the major communities at least once a week and the smaller communities once a month.

"We go three or four places a month out of the Roswell office in an eight county area," he said.

While they are in a community, Corn said they try and touch base with the elected officials and provide information to them on any subject they need.

The Roswell staff members also represent the Senator at meetings of every kind, Smith said.

Corn said he and the other staff members in Domenici's Roswell of-

fice get the local area newspapers and keep up on local issues and then convey those issues to the Senator.

Although not a lot of people showed up at the Chamber of Commerce Building on Tuesday for the two hour meeting with the staff, Corn said the last time they were in Ruidoso a lot of people showed up.

He said they try and get to Ruidoso about every four to six weeks and they also try and get to Capitan and Carrizozo at the same time.

Corn said the number of people who show up to meet with the staff usually depends on the time of the year and what is going on in Congress. He said sometimes there are a lot of people with a lot of things to discuss, sometimes there are hardly any at all.

"You never know," he stated.

## Voters will decide on proposed \$3 million school bond projects

Registered voters in the Ruidoso school district will vote Tuesday, October 10, on a \$3 million general obligation bond.

Three million dollars is to be used to remodel and improve White Mountain School campus and the sixth grade building of Ruidoso Middle School.

The bond monies will also cover furniture and equipment, including classroom computers for all schools in the Ruidoso district, said Superintendent Sid Miller during a briefing Tuesday.

The net effect the sale of the bonds will have on the average taxpayer will be a decrease in taxes over the entire life of the bonds, said Miller.

For the taxpayer with a \$60,000 home, taxes will go up a total of \$7 average for the first three years of the bonds. Beginning with the fourth year, taxes will drop drastically and continue for the remaining four years on the bonds, said Miller.

This net tax decrease was facilitated in part by selling the bonds in two parts; \$1 million to be sold in January of 1990, and the other \$2 million to be sold one year later, said Miller.

General needs of the district include replacing the portable class-

room units at the White Mountain campus with new, indoor, classroom space; an improvement of the cafeteria at the White Mountain campus, which may include the building of a new facility; remodeling of the sixth grade classroom building at the middle school which will include lowering the ceiling and new floor coverings; computer classroom space and computers for all schools in the district.

Other needs to be addressed with the bond issue include increasing bus parking space at the White Mountain campus; connecting the White Mountain Intermediate and Elementary schools; improving the central heating system at the intermediate school; improving accessibility to restroom facilities for handicapped students.

Miller said the bond issue is a continuation of the commitment by the Board of Education to provide the best possible facilities and education to the students of Ruidoso.

This commitment began with the construction of the new high school, followed by the remodeling of Nob Hill Elementary and the middle school.

"It is now time to go to White Mountain Intermediate and Elementary schools," said Miller.

The district currently owns more than \$20 million worth of facilities, which need to be maintained on a

continuing basis, said Miller. The construction of the new high school and the remodeling of Nob Hill and the mid school were necessary to respond to the growing student enrollment experienced at the time, said Miller.

Over the last four to five years, the district experienced a decline in overall enrollment, which worried district officials because of possible losses in state funds, said Miller.

This trend was considered in the making of this year's enrollment projections.

"We projected another loss," said Miller.

However, student enrollment so far is 30 students above projections. "If our enrollment stays the same as it is now for the 40-day count, then it will be almost exactly the same as last year at the fortieth day," he said.

Miller said this was significant, because the district lost 200 students between the 40-day count and the 180 day count last year.

"This means we gained 200 students over the summer," he said. "We had a hard winter last year and a lot of people left, but we've gained them back."

Miller said he was available to answer any questions voters might have regarding the bond election. His telephone number at the Superintendent's office is 257-4051.

## Murder charge is filed in Yank Kannady shooting death

An Alamogordo man has been charged with an open count of murder in the March 8 fatal shooting of a teenager.

According to Assistant District Attorney Raymond Van Arnam, based on new information, involuntary manslaughter charges were dropped on 19-year-old William J. Smith of Alamogordo, and he was charged with the more serious charges.

Smith was arrested the day after

the fatal shooting of 16-year-old Yank Kannady of Alamogordo. He was charged with involuntary manslaughter and negligent use of a firearm. He was released after the original complaint, but was rearrested on September 19.

Kannady, a former Ruidoso resident, was the son of Ruidoso resident Jerry Kannady.

Police records said Kannady was shot once in the head with a .22-caliber handgun while riding in a

car with three other men, including Smith.

Police said Smith was sitting in the front passenger seat of the car when he picked up a pistol from the floorboard. Police said the gun went off, striking Kannady, who was sitting in the left rear seat.

Smith was arraigned in Magistrate Court on September 18, and entered a plea of innocent. Kannady died on March 9.

1 residential.

Following the public hearing, Ralph Fresquez, Roswell city manager asked the council for Ruidoso to join Roswell and Artesia in requesting proposals from companies to look into the possibility of operating a regional landfill site.

"Our feeling in Roswell is, it is to our mutual benefit to see whether a regional landfill will work in our area," Fresquez said.

He said the actual study would probably cost around \$25,000 to \$30,000 and the cost would be shared by the three cities, with Roswell assuming a larger share because it is the largest city.

He said if the cities agree to the regional landfill concept, they would hire a manager to run it and would then ask other communities to join in.

He said the three municipalities would need to buy sufficient enough land to meet their needs well into the future.

"We would buy sufficient land to serve participants in the landfill for 50 to 75 years," he said.

Fresquez was asked several questions about whether the counties would be allowed to join in the landfill and how much would transportation cost run.

He said the counties would be allowed to join in if they paid their share of the cost up front. As far as transportation, he said the study would outline those costs.

"I think the thing to do is conduct the study and find the answers," he said.

County attorney Robert Beauvais said he was concerned with the municipalities doing this without the participation of the counties, because the counties were required to provide landfill services for its residents. He said without Ruidoso, Lincoln County could not operate its own landfill.

County Commission Chairperson Karen Petty told Fresquez that they appreciate what he was doing, but the commissioners believe Lincoln County should have its own landfill.

"We unanimously believe we need a landfill in Lincoln County," Petty said.

She said the county commissioners are trying to get a guarantee of at least \$3 per customer from each of the municipalities in the county. The county would then

use the money to purchase land for a landfill and seek requests for proposals from private companies to operate the landfill. She said there would be no tipping fees except to commercial users.

She also said there were four professional landfill operating companies wanting to bid.

In the end, Councillor Simon made the motion Ruidoso go along with Roswell and seek the requests for proposals, but he stated the village should continue to work with the county to find the best solution to the landfill problem.

The council heard from Ralph Laymaear, a retired employee of American Family Life Assurance Company now living in Bent, who told the council the insurance company had been working with the village since 1978. He said the company's premiums were voluntary and the only way to access them was through payroll deductions.

He went on to tell the council the program was voluntary to the employees and the company had paid out many claims in the last few years, including one to Mrs. Elmer Pirelli, wife of former councillor Elmer Pirelli who died this year.

He admitted there had been problems with the company in the past.

"The problem came because there was no representation in the area," Laymaear said.

He said the Seeley Company was now handling the policy locally.

He said since the village had sent a letter to the company's home office in Columbus, Georgia, notifying them payroll deductions would no longer be offered, agents have not been allowed to contact village employees.

Village finance director John Varley told the council there had been problems with the company since he started work with the village in 1983.

"The actual decision to cancel payroll deductions was mine," Varley said.

He said there was a long history of billing problems with the company and the billing procedure was too hard to administer.

He gave the council a list of factors and documented facts the village used in making its decision.

"The information that I presented in your packets was brief intentionally, because our reasons for canceling the payroll deduction, we

did not feel would be complementary to the company," Varley said.

Varley told the council only 33 out of 140 employees voluntarily took the payroll deductions for the policy.

He said the company had a long history of billing and payment problems. He continued and said the company had contacted village employees on village time without permission, at least one employee who was contacted by two different agents, almost purchased the same policy twice, the company began premium billing on an employee and then rejected the employee for the policy. There were numerous other problems he cited.

Councillor Junge asked if the employees properly understood the policy and said the village should give the new agent a chance.

"Let's give Seeley a six-month try," Junge said.

Village division head Leon Eggleston reminded Junge he had the same opinion when he was on the council in 1984 and the problem was brought up.

"At least it shows I'm consistent," he said.

Local insurance agent Frank Sawyer spoke to the council and said if they were going to allow payroll deductions for insurance policies, he would like the opportunity to bid on it.

Finally, Councillor McNeil made the motion the village cancel the payroll deductions. Councillor Simon seconded the motion, and it passed four to two, with councillors Junge and Stinson casting the "no" votes.

In other regular items the council:

- Approved a replat at lot 1A, Block 3, Riverside Addition. According to village planner Cleatus Richards, the replat would eliminate an encroachment by a structure onto a public right of way and an encroachment of the roadway onto private property.
- Approved the appointment of David Harding to the Extraterritorial Zoning Commission.
- Village clerk Tammy Maddox reported to the council, no purged names had been returned to the referendum petition on Ordinance 89-2.

## Alamogordo man is convicted here

An Alamogordo man was convicted of first-degree murder on Friday, September 22, by a state district court jury in Ruidoso.

Sixty-one year old Jim Breit was convicted of the shooting death of his neighbor, Colvin Hill, on September 1, 1988.

According to Assistant District Attorney Jim Van Arnam, Breit shot Hill after the two men had

talked at Hill's home in Dog Canyon, outside Alamogordo.

Breit said in testimony that he shot Hill in self defense after Hill shot at him with a pistol.

Breit fled after the shooting and turned himself in to police the next day.

The trial, which was moved on a change of venue, was conducted by District Judge Sandra Grisham and

began on September 18.

The jury deliberated only two hours before convicting Breit of the murder.

According to District Court Clerk Margo Lindsey, the last time there was a first-degree murder conviction in Lincoln County was 1982. That trial was also moved to Lincoln County on a change of venue.

# Lincoln County Commission zeroes in on extra-territorial zoning question

The Lincoln County Board of Commissioners (LCBC) agreed during its regular meeting Monday to begin negotiations with Ruidoso on the extension of the village's zoning authority.

Robert Donaldson, chairman of the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning (P&Z) commission and a member of the extraterritorial zoning board, spoke to the commission and explained what Ruidoso had in mind with extending the extraterritorial zone (ETZ) from its present one mile to three miles beyond the village limits.

"We want to protect our borders," said Donaldson.

He said Ruidoso would like to have zoning control in the new area as a protection during future growth trends.

Acknowledging Ruidoso is currently in a no-growth trend, Donaldson explained now is a good time to get ready when future growth occurs.

Donaldson also said Ruidoso is not interested in annexation, other than the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport property.

He said the area would be zoned based on its present use. Any major changes made in the zoning of a particular area would first go to a public hearing, he said.

The commission had previously requested Ruidoso first conduct public hearings prior to doing any zoning in the area, which Donaldson objected to as being non-productive.

"If you ask, 'do you want to be zoned?'... you're just asking to be turned down," said Donaldson.

The proposal was presented to the commission in the form of a joint powers agreement, but Donaldson said he did not want the county to sign such an agreement.

"What we want is to enter into a negotiation process for a new ordinance," he said.

The commission then agreed to proceed with negotiations through the ETZ authority, with the Ruidoso P&Z preparing both a zoning map and ordinance sample before further negotiations are conducted.

County manager Nick Pappas, reported to the commission a letter was drafted to send to area legislators inviting them to Lincoln County for a Legislative Day.

The event would provide a forum

for the county and municipalities to make legislative needs known to representatives of Lincoln County, and to those from Chaves and Otero counties, said Pappas.

Once the legislative session starts, it will be difficult to consult with representatives on county issues, said Pappas.

No specific date for the event was scheduled, but the commission hopes to conduct it by the end of October or in early November.

The commission also directed Pappas to re-activate the Landfill Advisory Committee (LFAC) to research if county communities would participate in a county landfill.

Commission Chairman Karon Z. Petty presented an idea the county could purchase land, then issue requests for proposals (RFPs) for an operator once the revenues generated were known.

Petty's idea was to use existing fee schedules implemented by municipalities to fund the project.

The county would have to devise its own fee schedule for the unincorporated areas of the county, she said.

Assignments were then made for individual commissioners to attend municipal government meetings. Petty asked if Commissioner Rick

Simpson would attend the meeting of Ruidoso Downs Board of Trustees.

"Sure, if I can take a whip and a chair," said Simpson.

During the discussion of the final pay estimate for the Airport Scenic Drive repaving, county road supervisor Tommy Hall mentioned a mud slide had plugged one of the culverts along the road.

Pappas said it was initially believed an engineering error resulted in the culvert plugging up, but the contractor informed the county the culvert was built according to specifications, thus releasing the contractor from liability.

Pappas explained there was no warranty on the construction of the culvert because it was not specified in the contract, therefore the contractor was not responsible to correct the problem.

"It never is when it falls apart," said Hall.

Petty asked if it was an engineering error, didn't that mean the contractor did not fulfill his contract.

Pappas answered the contractor was apparently free and clear.

"It will happen again," said Hall.

## Quintana reports on water case

Ruidoso Downs officials were waiting for bad news, but got some good news instead on Monday.

Mayor Jake Harris and members of the board joked that Hubert Quintana, executive director of the Water Defense Association (WDA), was surely on the agenda to ask for more money.

But Quintana, arriving just in time to speak to the board, reported that the WDA has just paid off a past due attorney's fee, and has the funds to carry forward the next phases in the ongoing court case involving area water right owners and the Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe.

"Just to let you know I don't only come to ask for money," said

Quintana before reporting that the final judgment was entered in the case, and that was a "carbon copy" LaFel Oman's decision. Quintana said the tribe asked for 18,000 acre feet of water, but Oman allowed just 1,800, or 1,000 acre feet more than the tribe currently uses.

"We were never against the tribe having water; we just didn't want them to have it all," said Quintana.

He said Oman found that the priority date for the tribe's water rights is 1873, a date later than about 80 percent of downstream users.

The tribe and the United States government both have filed appeals in the case, said Quintana, with the tribe appealing the decision and everything that led up to it. He said WDA's attorney, Richard Sims, is

reviewing the two-inch thick appeals documents.

This entire appeals process will take the case into 1991, said Quintana.

Also Monday, the board discussed a request by Joe Jarvis for a street light on West Circle Drive. Members of the board and the Police Department all agreed to drive by and see if that area is dark and needs a light.

The board also noted that the area discussed last month where a dumpster had been moved and trash dumped on the ground, has been cleaned up.

Trustee Joe Smith was absent, and the board remains two members short because of resignations in April.

The commission took action to approve the final pay estimate, which was about \$30,000 under bid.

In other business the LCBC: —Approved the minutes of the board of finance meeting and the regular meeting of September 11, accounts payable, the payroll register and a budget increase.

—Approved a specified road project for county road D-006, in which materials will be provided by the U. S. Forest Service, and labor and equipment will be provided by the county.

—Heard a presentation of leasing options for road equipment, in which the county could save money because the leasing agent would cover maintenance costs.

—Accepted the figures of tax rates sent by the Department of Finance Administration, and approved a letter to be sent notifying the agency of the commissions acceptance. According to the tax schedule, residents of Capitan are the highest taxed group of all the municipalities in the county.

—Approved an amendment to the notification of grant award to

the Zia Senior Citizens Center for the amount of \$516.

—Selected the following alternates to the Lincoln County Personnel Board: Martha McKnight as the elected official, Mignon Sims as the county employee, Alice Van Tussenbrook as the representative from District III. Representatives for Districts I and II were tabled until the next meeting.

—Approved members Simpson and Robert E. Hemphill as co-vice chairmen to sign checks and warrants in the absence of Petty under unusual circumstances.

—After a closed session, announced no action would be taken regarding personnel at the Zia Senior Citizens Center, and tabled indefinitely a proposed joint powers agreement regarding the center pending further information.

—Approved the county manager to proceed with investigating the Carrizozo Municipal buildings as a viable option to increase record storage space for the county.

—Canceled the next meeting of the commission because it occurred on a holiday, Columbus Day. The next regular meeting is scheduled for 6 p.m. Monday, October 23.

# EID investigates valley landfill

The Environmental Improvement Division (EID) is about to proceed with a site inspection of Ken Nosker's land to verify if garbage dumped there illegally by Ruidoso Downs was removed as ordered.

Gary McCaslin, district supervisor of EID in Roswell, said the cost of the site inspection will be covered by the state agency.

The site under investigation is land owned by Nosker in the Hondo Valley where Ruidoso Downs dumped its municipal solid waste with Nosker's permission.

EID maintains the dumping activity there was illegal in spite of Nosker's permission.

An application to permit the same land as a landfill under new state regulations has been submitted to EID by Ruidoso Downs Mayor Jake Harris.

On July 21, McCaslin sent a letter to Harris requesting a system of

verification be established to assure all the garbage dumped there was removed.

The letter was sent certified mail with return receipt requested. McCaslin said Monday his office had the return receipt in its possession.

The letter suggested that several holes be dug at random positions to determine if any garbage remained on the site which has since been covered and contoured.

EID never received a response from Harris, and has elected to proceed on its own, said McCaslin.

Harris said Wednesday he did not feel comfortable digging up someone's private property, as suggested in the letter.

"I'm not going to dig a bunch of holes on someone's private land," he said.

Harris also said he did not contact EID since receiving the letter.

When asked why the same man who gave Ruidoso Downs permis-

sion to dump on his property wouldn't allow Ruidoso Downs to dig holes to verify the removal of that garbage, Harris said "Now, that would be a good question to ask him."

McCaslin said he already made arrangements with Nosker for EID to come out and dig several holes to verify the garbage's removal under the condition EID would refill the holes and reseed the site.

The former dump has been covered, contoured and reseeded, said McCaslin.

If, after the inspection, it is determined the garbage is still present, EID will proceed with legal action against Ruidoso Downs, which could include substantial fines, said McCaslin.

And if it is determined the garbage has been removed, said McCaslin, the next question will be where did Ruidoso Downs put it.

McCaslin also said the process to permit the site as a landfill is sepa-

rate from the proceedings against the illegal dumping.

Even if the site were permitted today, the garbage still there, if any, must be removed, said McCaslin.

Harris said he and Nosker agreed that Ruidoso Downs would be the owner of the permit, and Nosker would be operator.

If, after a permit is obtained, it is determined Nosker would be unable to operate the site, then bids would be requested for another operator, said Harris.

Under those circumstances, Nosker would still own the land and retain a fee for leasing the land to be operated as a landfill, said Harris.

Further speculation on how Ruidoso Downs would proceed to operate a landfill would be premature until after a permit was obtained, said Harris.

## The Plant Corner

DEAR SALLY:

Years ago, my mother had what she called a rosary plant. Could you give me some information about this plant and where I might find one. I enjoy your column very much.

DEAR CARLA:

Try our local nurseries first. If they don't have this plant or cannot order it for you, try Black's Nursery in El Paso, Texas, or in Albuquerque. They will order it for you if they don't have it in stock.

The *Ceropegia woodii*, or rosary vine, is a succulent and is easy to grow. It grows outdoors in zones 21-24, and as a house plant, anywhere.

A native of South Africa, this plant has been a favorite hanging basket and house plant for generations. Certainly the best known of several trailing species of *Ceropegia* is the *C. woodii*—the rosary vine. It grows with slender, thread-like stems that are hung with silver and green heart-shaped leaves and very dainty, purple lantern-flowers. These thin stems grow from a tuberous base. The heart-shaped leaves are in pairs, thick and succulent, about one-half inch long. The little tubers that form on the stems can be used to start new plants. The dainty long stems with the tiny leaves do actually resemble a rosary, so what if you have to use your imagination a little.

**Soil**—The mixture should be rich, organic, porous and very fast draining. Use a commercial cactus soil mix or mix your own using 1/3 sharp river sand, 1/3 potting soil, 1/3 finely ground bark or peat moss with some vermiculite added to help maintain a cool, airy condition for the roots.

**Water**—Overwatering and poor drainage are the dear little plants' worst enemies. Never allow the roots to completely dry out. A Proper soil mixture will stay moist for weeks at a time. Testing by hand is the best way to tell when the plant needs water. You will soon learn when to water. Catch and store rain water or distilled water, for they are the best to use.

**Light and Temperature**—Use a south or west exposure with some curtain filtered, direct sun. For, with rare exceptions, most succulents acclimated to life indoors would be scorched by too much hot, direct sunlight. The temperature should never drop below 40 degrees

and up to around 90 degrees. They need four to six hours of sunlight daily to bloom.

**Fertilizer**—A light dusting of bone meal is a good, safe fertilizer. This plant, as do most succulents, requires steady nourishment using a food low in nitrogen. It is best always to use a room-temperature feeding solution cut to one third the package recommended use. Organic is much better than chemical fertilizer for succulents.

Unlike most other plants, succulents are never watered or fertilized immediately after repotting. The plant and the soil are allowed to remain perfectly dry for several days, then are watered very sparingly for the first couple of months.

I hope you can find a rosary plant for they are truly delightful to watch grow.

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

## Computers in Capitan curriculum

The kids are cruisin' with computers in Capitan now.

Beginning with this school year, the Capitan Municipal Schools have implemented a 24-station computer lab that every student in grades kindergarten through eight has the opportunity to use an average of twice a week.

This makes Capitan one of just a few schools in the state that has the computers available to every student, said Jerry Newsom, Capitan elementary school principal.

For one semester, half the students use the computer lab on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays, while the other half uses the lab on Tuesdays and Thursdays, said Newsom.

The groups will switch days during the next semester.

Newsom also said all Title I students use the lab every day.

The lab was set up by Computer Curriculum Corporation (CCC), and includes programming from basic skills up to adult level education and computer programming skills.

Newsom became interested in the CCC program after reading an article in the magazine, *Educational Leadership*, which examined how computer education helps to reduce dropout rates, and which mentioned the CCC program specifically.

Each student has an individual code to key into the main computer, which keeps track of the child's progress and always restarts at the part where the child last finished.

The programs provide immediate reinforcement when a correct response is given. If an incorrect response is given, the program pro-

vides an easier example of the problem, and then goes back to the original problem for the correct response.

The machine never tells the students they are wrong.

Each time the student works with the system, a brief review is provided before new material is presented.

Another feature of the CCC program is its ability to be used for adult education and GED preparation.

However, funds are not available at this time to provide the personnel for evening instruction, said Newsom.

The CCC program has also demonstrated success with students identified as "at risk" to become dropouts.

Thirty-five different courses are available at the lab in Capitan. Four involve computer programming skills utilizing three computer languages, BASIC, COBOL, and Pascal.

I knew when players from the varsity football team came by *The Ruidoso News*, they had some important concerns which needed to be talked about with head coach Doug Ragsdale.

The players were upset about a remark Ragsdale was quoted as making to an Associated Press reporter. "There would have been many more parents here if they could have got off work," another added.

One thing was clear on Monday before practice, players and parents wanted to know what Doug Ragsdale was thinking and how the team could get on track.

With a community watching, a head coach must clearly define his purpose and expected results.

Ruidoso has a 2-3 record so far and many members of the community are wondering why. They feel Ruidoso should be winning, not losing.

"I still believe we are going to be state football champions," Ragsdale told the parents. "I want to win all the games."

It's hard to explain a loss like last Friday but the first step to

winning the remaining games has been made.

For players and parents it doesn't really matter if the Ruidoso football team wins every game. Their concerns are mainly based on HOW they win, or more importantly HOW they lose.

When parents and players can talk directly to the coach without massing together, that's when the communication lines are open and unobstructed.

A new head coach has many obstacles to overcome. The biggest is communication with players and parents.

After this meeting of the minds on Monday, everyone feels better, I think.

Now let's get on with the football season, learning from losses and enjoying the wins.

Ruidoso High School had its first home volleyball match Friday, and got off to a good start that didn't compute into winning scores.



## Cross country runners will head for Carlsbad


In High School Cross Country action this last week, Ruidoso boys placed sixth and the girls second during the Mayfield Cross Country Invitational.

## Intertrack wagering is success at Sunland Park

Sunland Park announced its new intertrack wagering system (ITW) was a big success, contributing to a 20 percent increase in the purse for the track during the 1989-90 season.

The system allowed wagerers at the southern New Mexico track to bet on races at Ruidoso Downs.

About 1,100 race fans turned out for the opening day of the ITW, June 17, and wagered more than

\$125,000. Officials at Sunland Park reported attendance and wagering increased with each additional day of the Ruidoso-to-Sunland simulcasting.

"Through 24 performances, Sunland Park is posting an average daily handle of (more than) \$103,000 with attendance averaging (more than) 700 daily," read a report from Sunland.

"Overall, we have added (more than) \$4,500 per day to the purse account," said Harold Payne, racing director at Sunland Park.

The bottom purse, after the initiation of the ITW, was raised from last season's initial \$1,700 to \$2,000.

Top end allowance horses will start the season with \$5,000 purses, instead of the \$4,200 purses of last season.

The bottom claiming level was also increased from \$2,000 to \$2,500.

"Sunland's ability to offer bigger purses will attract a better caliber horse, which in turn will make for better live racing during 1989-90 at Sunland Park," read the official report.

Negotiations are in process to include the 26-day running of the

New Mexico State Fair and Albuquerque Downs season.

The inclusion of the Albuquerque races with Ruidoso, Raton, and Farmington should have a significant impact on the upcoming season at Sunland Park, officials said.

According to the Park's recently published Stakes and Condition

Book, the bottom purse at Sunland has been raised from last season's initial \$1,700 offering to \$2,000. Top-end allowance horses will begin the season running for \$5,000 purses instead of the \$4,200 pots of last year.

In conjunction with the purse increases, the bottom claiming level has been upped from \$2,000 to \$2,500.

## 38 American Artists seek Award

The Hubbard Museum has announced the names of 38 American artists who have accepted invitations to participate in the first Hubbard Art Award for Excellence.

The names were announced at a press conference last week in conjunction with the opening of the Hubbard Collection exhibition at the Eiteljorg Museum in Indianapolis, Indiana.

"Of the 55 artists invited to participate, 38 have accepted," said John V. Hall, director of The Hubbard Museum. "There is enormous excitement surrounding this award. The country's finest representational artists will spend the next eight months creating masterpieces that will enrich the art world for decades to come."

The artists are from all over the United States, and work in a variety of media. The oldest participant will be 91-year-old watercolorist Donale Teague, with the youngest artist in his early 30s.

The Hubbards created the \$250,000 annual award, the largest art award ever offered, as the Nobel or Pulitzer of art to recognize excellence in American realism today. Invited artists were nominated by 15 top museum directors from across the nation, Hall said.

The 1990 award piece will be added to The Hubbard Museum's permanent collection.

Participating artists, considered "American Masters," will submit two new paintings or sculptures. From among those, the Hubbard Art Award for Excellence will be awarded on June 1, 1990, to a single work. All other submitted works will be included in a special show and sale June 2 at The Hubbard Museum. One piece from each artist, including the award piece, will continue to be shown free to the public at The Hubbard Museum through Labor Day 1990, and then tour internationally.

According to Hall, the great diversity of work within the realm of realism will be one of the most exciting aspects of the award and show.

"This is not a contest for media or subject matter," Hall said. "Participating artists vary widely according to medium, subject matter and regional ties. The award's goal is to bring to the public forefront America's finest representational artists and to build a magnificent collection."

Following the international tour, the award piece will become a permanent member of the Hubbard Collection at The Hubbard Museum in the Turf Club at Ruidoso Downs Race Track. Over the years, the collection is expected to emerge as one of the nation's most prestigious collections of American contemporary art.

"The possibilities for the collection are fantastic," said Hall. "Just imagine the art of The Hubbard Collection 20 years from today. In coming years the collection will undergo an unparalleled metamorphosis as great new American works are added."

The Hubbard Collection, which has never before been publicly exhibited outside New Mexico, features two large murals by Charles Russell, the famed "cowboy artist." The two murals—which are both 30 inches high and measure 20 and 24 feet in length—are together titled "History of the West." They were painted in 1926, the last year of Russell's life. Also included are works by Frederic Remington and William R. Leigh.

The collection is owned by Joan Dale and R. Dee Hubbard.

The Hubbard Collection was most recently shown at The Hubbard Museum. Following its stay at the Eiteljorg, the exhibit will travel to the Cowboy Artists Museum in Kerrville, Texas, where it will reside through Christmas.

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# Chino challenger filed improperly

The man who wants to unseat Mescalero Tribal President Wendell Chino filed incorrectly, according to the election board.

In a press conference Thursday in Mescalero, Elizabeth LaPaz, chairman of the appointed board, said Joseph Geronimo filed improperly and incorrectly.

"The election board did not accept his filing," said LaPaz.

Geronimo, making his second bid for the presidency, said last week that he filed his statement of intent before the deadline, and claimed his civil rights had been violated when his name was not listed with Chino's as a candidate for president.

According to the list posted at the Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe office, Chino, who has served as president of the tribe for 34 years, is unopposed in the October 6 primary election.

"The fact that he cannot be a candidate is his own fault," said LaPaz during the conference that was delayed for a half hour as the board waited for television crews to arrive. LaPaz said any implication that the tribal president made the

decision to leave Geronimo's name off the ballot is untrue, since he has not attended any of the board's meetings.

Bill Magoosh, one of seven members of the election board appointed by President Chino, displayed the letter that Geronimo submitted as his statement of intention. Magoosh said the letter reads simply: "I am running for tribal president."

"As you see, it was not signed," said Magoosh, wondering why the statement wasn't submitted to the tribal secretary on the form that all the other candidates, including Joseph Geronimo's brother, used.

"All other candidates took time to come by and file," said Magoosh.

He also questioned the postmark on the letter, saying it was postmarked at 4:26 p.m. on September 19, but was received earlier, at 10:46 a.m. on September 19, in the tribal offices.

Davis Spitty, a member of the election board, read from the revised constitution of the Mescalero tribe, which says that any qualified member of the Mescalero Tribe wanting to be a candidate for office in the primary "shall file with the tribal secretary a statement of intention showing name and of-

Members of the election board all agreed that Geronimo's letter did not meet the requirements as set forth in the constitution.

"What he wrote to the tribal secretary is just out of order," said Amos Gaines, a member of the board.

"I sympathize with the lack of

discipline that brought this about," said Magoosh.

The Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe, with around 1,600 registered voters, will conduct a primary election on October 6, and a general election on November 7. LaPaz said the primary is required when there are too many candidates for the general election.

This year the tribe will elect a president, vice president, and four members of the eight-member tribal council.

Geronimo spoke to the press last week and said he had written a letter to LaPaz to find out why his name was not posted on the list of candidates. Magoosh said that letter was dated September 21, postmarked September 22, and not received in the tribal office until September 25.

"I thought that was too much," said Magoosh.

Geronimo, a former member of the tribal council, was critical of tribal leadership. He cited a number of problems he wants to address as president of the tribe.

President Chino has scheduled at press conference for 10 a.m. today (Thursday), September 28, at the Inn of the Mountain Gods.

## Lincoln County gets \$371,877 from feds

Lincoln County will receive \$371,877 in federal monies under the Payment in Lieu of Taxes Act (PILT) of 1976.

The monies compensate counties for the federal lands there which county governments cannot tax.

"Counties can use these funds for the same purpose as they do general tax revenue," said New Mexico Senator Pete V. Domenici, in a press release.

PILT payments are in addition to revenues from oil and gas leases and sales of minerals, timber, and other materials and products derived from public lands which the federal government also shares with state governments.

"There are 22.4 million acres of federal entitlement lands in New Mexico. The state will receive the second highest payment of all 50 states and other United States territories," said Domenici.

New Mexico will receive \$10.6 million, second to California's \$10.9 million. Lincoln County's payment ranks 13th among the state's 33 counties.

Eddy County receives the most with \$947,486. Quay County receives the least with \$1,313. Curry County does not receive any PILT payments at all because there is no eligible federal land within its jurisdiction.

## Hearing draws audience of three

A public hearing Tuesday afternoon regarding an application for Community Development Block Grant funds didn't take long.

The public hearing, which is required by federal regulations, was to gather citizens input on the grant application.

Only three citizens were present for the hearing, village division head Leon Eggleston, MainStreet project manager Mary Maul and MainStreet president Herb Brunell.

But in actuality these were the three most important people at the hearing.

According to Eggleston, the purpose of the grant is to provide renovation to the downtown area and create jobs.

Maul said the funds would be used to widen the sidewalks, do some drainage, water and sewer work and provide some street lighting.

"We want it for the MainStreet Streetscape project," she said.

Because the funding is dependent on the economic impact on the community, Eggleston sent out a Downtown Development Survey to merchants asking for information on employment. Eggleston said the survey is all part of the requirements for the grant.

The funds for the \$500,000 grant are from the Department of Housing and Urban Development, filtered through the states.

Once the grant application is finished, it is sent to the state's Community Development Council. Eggleston said the council will meet two weeks after they get the application and if they approve it the village will get the money.

Maul said the village also has a letter from District II highway engineer Lou Medrano stating there are cooperative funds available from the State Highway Department to help with widening the sidewalks.

Former President Ronald Reagan, in a message for National Newspaper Week in 1982, said: "A free press is a cornerstone of our democracy. In the First Amendment to the Constitution, our Founding Fathers affirmed their belief that competing ideas are fundamental to freedom."

Let's remember and protect the First Amendment, and the voices of diversity. Celebrate Banned Book Week by reading a "banned" book, like "The Adventures of Huckleberry Finn" or "Mother Goose: Old Nursery Rhymes," or "Gone With the Wind," or maybe even "The Bible."—fj

Since moving to New Mexico six years ago, I have been proud to call Ruidoso home for my family. But something happened on the night of September 6th that I feel all of the residents of Ruidoso and the surrounding areas should be aware of!

On the above date, my brother was stabbed. I won't go into the details leading to the stabbing, that is not important. What happened afterwards is the problem some of you may face at one time, Heaven Forbid!

My brother was taken by private car to the emergency room of LCMC. There he was told that there was not a surgeon available. The ER personnel then said he would be transferred to Roswell. Halfway to Roswell, the ambulance driver was contacted by LCMC and told to return to Ruidoso because the doctor in Roswell said he did not treat people from Ruidoso! As if we have leprosy or something!

The hospital was confronted with the problem of where to transfer him. All the while, he is bleeding profusely and going into or has gone into shock! A few minutes after returning to LCMC, the ambulance driver was again instructed

to head for Roswell. The hospital personnel had located a doctor at St. Mary's who agreed to treat my brother.

They arrived at St. Mary's where eventually the doctor saw my brother. He opened the abdominal stab wound and explored further to see if any internal organs had been damaged. Thank God none of them were. He sewed up the wound and informed my brother he had lost 2 LITERS OF BLOOD! Six hours after the stabbing occurred! He dismissed my brother with prescriptions for pain killers, antibiotics and instructions to see a local doctor in a few days to check for infection. Thank God he was not seriously wounded!

Now do you see the problem we face? What if there had been damage to a vital organ? Would he have bled to death on the way to Roswell? Because we had No Surgeon Available? What does it take to have one available? What if it was a child who had fallen and needed stitches in his or her head? I have a small son and it scares me to think what might happen if he were to need a surgeon, appendix or otherwise!

How would you feel if you and

your family were faced with a similar problem? The main question is what can we do about this? Do we have to continue to live with this problem?

Don't get me wrong, I strongly commend the emergency room personnel and the ambulance attendants. They did their best. But there has to be a doctor there too! I just read the article in the paper about the ER being available 24 hours a day and the expert person-

nel they have. That's great, but what about the part that said, "the doctor normally sees the patient within 5 minutes of his or her arrival?"

Was I mistaken to understand that we had more than one surgeon in this town? Were all of them "unavailable?"

I pity the next family of a person who needs a surgeon in Ruidoso!

## Reporter's Round

Have you ever seen a golden eagle swoop down from high in the air to take a rabbit unawares, then carry the carcass up to its nestlings high in some cliff eyrie?

Well, neither have I. But I have a mountain story, nonetheless, that may show sometimes people have to be made to do things because we don't always know what's good for us.

In the summer of 1980 I worked at a residential treatment center in Tucson, Arizona, for children with emotional problems. Many of these kids came from abusive family situations, or they had school problems which led to problems with the law. Each summer was the annual,

14-day camping trip, and in 1980 we went to Woods Lake near Telluride, Colorado. Also scheduled during the trip were two overnight backpack excursions to nearby Wilson Peak, one of the fourteeners there in Colorado, a fourteener being a peak 14,000 feet or taller.

Two days before I, along with other staff members, took a small group of kids there. I suffered a severe gall bladder attack that laid me out with a fever of 102 and a pain in my side so intense I couldn't sleep. That inconvenience lasted 24 hours, but I was still a bit fatigued when it came time to climb the three miles and the two or three thousand feet to the tree line where we would camp.

There were three adults taking six kids up the trail, and I goofed because of my inexperience, and went on ahead of the last three kids. Doubt made me stop and I waited for them to catch up, and when only two arrived I asked what happened to the other.

"Oh, he got mad and said he wouldn't go any further," said one of the boys. I thought, great, we haven't even hiked a mile and already this kid is whimpering out. I dropped my pack and began to back-track, and five minutes later I came across the other boy's pack. He was gone. Oh no!

I ran down the trail almost all the way to our base camp when I caught up with him. Our confrontation was not pretty. The poor boy, only 10 years old, pleaded with me not to make him go. The hike was too hard, the pack hurt his shoulder, he was scared, you name the excuse, he said it. But I refused to listen to him. I told him I was not going to let him be a baby and go back to base camp a failure. For the rest of his life, I told

him, he would be living with the thought of "maybe..." and I said he deserved better than that.

Well, that was my best shot. He didn't agree. So, as a last resort, I told him he had no choice, I was making him go even if I had to drag him all the way. By this time the poor child was crying hysterically. Mean ogre that I was, I stood behind him, gave him a push on his shoulder, and said "Move!"

And, cliché of clichés, I said it out loud and amazed even myself. "You'll thank me for this some day."

Egads, it almost made me sick, but the boy began to walk, and for the next three miles, and nearly five hours (ugh), we trudged up the path, the boy crying the entire way up. And, of course, the higher we went, the thinner the air became, and the more he cried because the harder it became for him to breathe. When he got the hiccups, I signed knowing I deserved every minute of this miserable trip.

We met the other staff people near the top. They were on their way down to see what had happened because they were worried

that I may have suffered another gall bladder attack, or whatever, and that I might be in trouble.

When they saw the whimpering child, they smiled knowingly and said they would walk with him the rest of the way.

When the boy finally made it to the top, he plopped himself down in the dirt, didn't even bother to take the pack off that had tortured him so, obviously bent on making himself have a miserable time. His determined pout nearly curled his lip entirely inside-out.

I had to make amends. I didn't want the boy hating me for the rest of his life, so I asked him to go with me and see some snow in August.

"No, I'm not moving!" I told him the other boys were there sliding on the snow field on their ponchos and it looked like great fun.

"No, I'm not going, you can't make me."

Fine, I said, I was certainly out of line asking him to walk another hundred yards after I nearly killed him with three miles. So off I went with the other boys, making sure

we screamed as loud as we could every time we slid down the snow field.

OK, so you know how everything turns out. It's not hard to see. The boy couldn't stand everyone else having so much fun and obviously not care how miserable he felt. Sure enough, he joined us and was soon yelling and laughing louder than any of us. Around the campfire that night, he helped the most preparing our meal, and sang the loudest later on as we all roasted marshmallows.

Just before we all went to sleep, he came up to me, gave me big hug, and said "Thanks."

Maybe that boy would never be able to change the fact his mother was an alcoholic who verbally abused him, treated him like a baby, never bought him clothes, and generally made him feel like a worthless inconvenience.

But one thing he'll never forget. He climbed a mountain and hated every minute of that climb, but he will always be damn glad he did.
