

Chino says he will seek re-election

Mescalero President Wendell Chino defended his administration and announced the reasons for his candidacy for re-election during a news conference Thursday at the Inn of the Mountain Gods.

"I can no longer remain silent against those who impugn my character...and influence," Chino said to the news media and to about 40 Mescalero reservation residents who attended the conference.

Chino said he called for the conference to respond to allegations made by Joseph Geronimo that the

president conspired to keep Geronimo's name off the list of presidential candidates in violation of the tribal constitution.

"No one's civil rights have been violated," said Chino. "I reject, counter, refute allegations made against me."

Chino said the reason Geronimo's name was omitted from the list, which makes Chino the only candidate for president, was Geronimo did not sign his request, nor did he use the proper form available at the tribal office.

"No one can say I am part of a conspiracy," said Chino.

He also said all the other candi-

dates for either vice president or council positions filed correctly, including Geronimo's brother, Harlyn Geronimo.

The decision of the election board is final and voters are not allowed to enter write-in votes, said Chino.

In a previous news conference conducted by the election board last Monday, other irregularities in Geronimo's letter of intent were displayed. These included an afternoon postmark, when the letter was delivered in the morning the same day of the postmark.

Chino said Geronimo had plenty of time to file his name properly.

Geronimo said in a previous news conference Friday, September 22, he mailed his letter Tuesday, September 19, the day before the deadline to declare candidacy.

When asked why he hadn't entered his name sooner, Geronimo said he had misgivings about challenging Chino, but changed his mind after receiving encouragement from tribal members.

Although there is no specific statement in the tribal constitution requiring a signature on a letter of intent to run for tribal office, Chino noted many documents are not con-

Governor Carruthers helps make Crimestopper's scramble a success

The Ruidoso-Lincoln County Crimestoppers Golf Scramble was a success, according to organizers.

Sixty players, including Governor Garrey Carruthers and Ruidoso Downs Race Track owner R.D. Hubbard, traveled around Cree Meadows Country Club course in the warm sunshine on Saturday to benefit the Ruidoso-Lincoln County

Crimestoppers Program.

Crimestoppers board members are still totalling up the proceeds, but it appears the scramble will become an annual fundraiser for the organization.

The 12-team, five man scramble started at 9 a.m. and it didn't take long for a crowd to grow around the first tee box, waiting for the Governor to tee off at 10 a.m.

"I don't know why I like this

game," said Carruthers jokingly as he waited for his turn on the tee.

While he waited for the group ahead to reach the first green, Carruthers talked about the recent education summit he and the other 49 governors attended with President Bush in Charlottesville, Virginia.

"I think the summit was outstanding," he said. "We started a process which we've needed to do for a long time in this country and

that is to have a clear vision for what we want for education."

The Governor said the President has agreed to work with the governors in setting some national goals in education.

"From those national goals we hope to define some performance standards for all our schools and compete with one another," Car-

County zoning ordinance is unenforceable

The county has no zoning jurisdiction over its own land, said County Manager, Nick Pappas, during a regular meeting, Thursday, of the county Planning and Zoning (P&Z) commission.

After lengthy discussion during the two and one-half hour meeting, it became apparent the Lincoln County, New Mexico Zoning Ordinance No. 88-4 is unenforceable except with reference to subdivisions.

County attorney, J. Robert Beauvais, said the ordinance is unenforceable because there is no formal zoning, or a zoning map, in place for property in the county.

"I don't think you can use a special use permit without zoning in place," said Beauvais.

The discussion was about a request from a San Patricio resident for a mausoleum to be constructed on his private property.

In the ordinance, cemeteries, as well as landfills and other high im-

port buildings or operations, require a special use permit from the county before their construction.

However, both Beauvais and Pappas said the concept of a special use permit is the same as a variance to other zoning regulations and without a zone to vary from, the permit is irrelevant.

"You can't vary from zero," said Pappas.

The P&Z said it would like to begin mapping the county with proposed zoning regulations, but first needs the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners (LCBC) to formally direct P&Z to proceed by taking action during a regular commission meeting.

The LCBC balked at letting P&Z proceed because it did not want to zone the county in specific ways that would require enforcement.

"We've been afraid of zoning the county and all the flack that goes with it," said commission member Robert E. Hemphill.

Members of the P&Z agreed they would like to begin the process by

first mapping the county with proposed zones and then present this to the LCBC.

If the proposal was agreeable to the LCBC, the P&Z would then begin the lengthy process of conducting public hearings in specific areas and fine tune the zoning regulations until it appeared area residents were in agreement with the proposed zones.

When this was completed, the LCBC would conduct its own public hearing on the zoning of the entire county, after which the zoning regulations would take effect through a resolution of the commission and have legal relevance all at the same time.

The process would take at least a year, said Beauvais.

P&Z member Ben Hall said all existing properties would be grandfathered in, and would not be af-

ected by the zoning ordinance.

New properties and developments would have to comply, he said.

Hall also said each area would be individually addressed on its own merits.

LCBC chairman, Karon Z. Petty, directed Pappas to place the P&Z on the agenda for the next regular meeting of the LCBC, which is scheduled for 6 p.m. Monday, October 23.

P&Z member James Sanchez commented if the LCBC is going to direct the P&Z to proceed with the development of a proposed zoning plan, then the commission needs to be certain the county budget will have money available to get the job done.

"Unless we have total commit-

Lobby to close at night

Effective immediately the lobby at the Ruidoso Post Office will be locked from 5:30 p.m. to 6 a.m. daily because of vandalism to post office boxes.

Bob Chamberlain, postmaster, said a clerk who works Sundays discovered that nine post office boxes had the glass smashed when the clerk reported for work Sunday about 8:30 a.m. It was the second such occurrence within a year.

"We don't know if any mail is missing," Chamberlain said. He said postal authorities won't know if anything is missing until patrons report mail which never arrived.

"In order to protect the sanctity of the post office, the lobby will be closed at night," Chamberlain said.

Police and postal inspectors are investigating the break-ins.

Health care organization looking for new members

A new organization that wants to impact health care issues is forming and asking for interested persons to join.

New Mexico Health Decisions (NMHD) hopes to play a role in the establishment of responsible medical care for all people and to provide this care regardless of an individual's ability to pay, said Connie Ross, the quality management coordinator for Lincoln County Medical Center (LCMC).

"We are establishing a program of public education and involvement based on small group forums and town hall meetings," said Ross.

The draft goal for NMHD is to "establish a health system that is: just, responsive, ethical, fiscally sound, culturally sensitive," accessible, inclusive of diverse approaches to health services and reachable; and which also does not discriminate on the basis of ability to pay, nature of illness/disease, ethnicity, age, gender, disability or location," said a statement provided by Ross.

NMHD will not be an advocate of specific policies, nor of particular political candidates, but wants to be involved in the formation of public health policies, said Ross.

Kerry Limback, a nurse at LCMC, attended a quality management seminar in Albuquerque on September 21 and 22.


Nominations of local individuals to a board of directors will be accepted between now and Thursday, October 5.

"Elected officials are always saying the public must decide," said Ross.

This is an opportunity for the public to help make important decisions in health care, she said.



Hobby turns into business

Once a year TRN Music Publisher of Ruidoso, headed by retired bandmaster Dr. Charles (Pete) Wiley, creates and mails out 38,000 music catalogs to schools and colleges throughout the United States and beyond.

TRN Music Publisher, with headquarters in Ruidoso, specializes in publishing band and orchestra music from some 50 composers that Wiley sends royalty checks to annually.

Pieces are published for public school bands and orchestras, university bands and orchestras and military bands and orchestras here and overseas.

"I sort of have gotten a niche in the market," says Wiley, who retired to Ruidoso six years ago. He was bandmaster at Lamar University in Beaumont, Texas, for 31 years. Only this year he was honored by being chosen Texas Bandmaster of the Year.

Wiley founded TRN Music Publisher in 1973, and moved the operation here six years ago upon retirement.

Composers send Wiley music which he evaluates from his many years of experience. The composers also send him cassettes containing the original marches or music for orchestras.

If Wiley likes what he hears, he advertises the offerings to school

and university band directors. He also attends trade fairs in Chicago, Illinois, and San Antonio, Texas, where he promotes his offerings.

Wiley sends the original sheets of music to Korea for engraving. When the engravings are returned after Koreans have hand-drawn the notes and most symbols, Wiley has The Ruidoso News make PMTs of the sheets of music. Wiley and his crew, including his son Jim Wiley, production manager, a printer and another helper who collates the productions, print from the PMTs.

Wiley designs his own covers. A "package" includes an attractive cover, music for every instrument, plus master sheets for the conductor. Wiley has about 160 offerings for bands and orchestras; he publishes 15 or 16 new tunes a year.

"We have about 60 stores, worldwide, that take anything we publish," Wiley says. Some 350 music stores around the world handle his music so that bandmasters and orchestra directors will have ready access to the music.

Japan is a good market, he says. Other countries where his music is marketed include the Scandinavian countries, Holland, Canada, Belgium, France and Australia.

He admits his music is "sort of highbrow."

He says, "I like marches." He said that long ago he discovered old European marches ... Belgian, Ger-

man, French, 60 to 90 years old. "They are not out of date. A march is a march," he says.

The old marches have to be edited. German bands don't have saxophones, he says. And bands in the U.S. don't use tenor horns.

"We are now into publishing new things written the last year or so, too," Wiley says.

He commented that there aren't many music publishers specializing in marches and "high brow" music for orchestras.

The big music publishers, he says, like popular type music and background music for movies and such.

Wiley says he tried to market jazz music at one time. It didn't work.

"It's not my thing," he says.

He wants it known, also, that he doesn't publish songs that people write, such as country and western.

"Country-western is out of my field," he says. He also doesn't do engraving or printing for individuals.

That's understandable. His whole plant is filled with music including the 20 some-odd closets at his plant.

Wiley considers his operation a hobby rather than a business. He says it keeps him in touch with former acquaintances in the teaching profession and in the music industry.

His hobby, however, keeps him

busy more than 40 hours a week. He wrote his own computer program to handle the unique facets of his business including billing, inventory, information on composers, etc.

Wiley doesn't dump 38,000 pieces of mail at the Ruidoso Post Office at one time.

Because of the scope of his oper-

ation, he utilizes a bulk mailing company in Sweet Springs, Missouri, or occasionally, he uses such a company in Dallas, Texas.

Such companies, he says, have all types of mailing lists.

If he tells the company, "mail to all schools," the company has his list on file. The company prints the labels and takes care of all facets of

the mailing.

Wiley's postage bill is humongous.

TRN, that stands for "That's Really Nice," Wiley says. It's nice to have a major music publishing company centered in this resort community.





Warriors fall short in Homecoming game, 46-35

"The longer we played the better we got," Head Coach Doug Ragsdale said about the Homecoming football game last Friday night. "I was proud of the kid's efforts in the second half."

The Ruidoso Warriors came back from a 17-point deficit in the first half to within three points before the end of the third quarter. There was no stopping the Warriors after that.

Although the final score was 46-35 in favor of the St. Pius Sartans, this football game could have gone either way.

"Against Portales we played a defensive game," explained Ragsdale. "Against St. Pius, we played our best offensive game. Now we're ready to put it all together in district. We're going after the 3AAA District Championship."

Without a doubt the Warriors had their best offensive display, scoring five touchdowns!

The defense helped by forcing a fumble and recovering it in the Sartan's endzone.

Ruidoso never led during this ballgame but, it was possible at any given time, especially in the second half. This kind of football was fun to watch and no doubt fun to play.

FIRST HALF SUMMARY

The Sartans got off to a quick start, taking the ball on their own 37 yard line after a fake punt by the Warriors. Using an impressive passing attack, they controlled the ball, taking it inside the Warrior 10.

Not being able to penetrate any further they kicked a field goal and led 3-0.

On the Sartan's third offensive

possession, from their own 17, they broke away for two long runs. One of those two runs was 65 yards for a touchdown.

With 13 seconds left in the first quarter the Sartans led 10-0.

A few offensive downs later and the Warriors looked like they would score on a field goal attempt. The ball was snapped and fumbled. Rick Ragsdale, for Ruidoso, recovered it and ran but was caught behind the line of scrimmage.

Taking over on their own 37 yard line, the St. Pius Sartans passed their way down the field to the Warrior 18. They ran two rushing plays and scored.

The two point conversion failed and St. Pius led 16-0, with 5:36 left in the half.

With time running out in the half it looked like it was going to be another defeat for the Warrior football team. But, the fans at Willie Horton Stadium got a pleasant surprise.

Keeping the ball on the ground, the Warriors ran up the field following a good kickoff return by Steve Dankert.

Kenny Trapp made the yardage, running four times to the Sartan 10 yard line.

It was a new man, sophomore Jose Marquez, making his appearance in the game, who ran the ball into the endzone with speed and versatility. Marquez broke the curse from the previous game when Ruidoso couldn't score from inside the 20!

Now new energy was on the field. The Warriors had begun a new strategy by scoring!

The extra point was good and with 3:26 left in the half the score was 16-7.

Momentum was in Ruidoso's favor. Things looked better and then they kicked off to St. Pius. In their

teen short seconds, number 30, Brent Moore of St. Pius took the kick and ran straight up field for a touchdown. Adding a two point conversion, St. Pius was leading 24-7 with 3:13 left in the half.

What a momentum slayer that proved to be.

The Warriors gathered themselves and after another good kickoff return got the ball on the Sartan 45 yard line. One passing play looked like a touchdown but, the ball slipped out of the receiver's hands.

At half the score was still in favor of the Sartans, 24-7.

It was easy at this point to dismiss the Warriors from having any chance at beating the St. Pius Sartans.

The Sartans had an impressive and effective offensive style. Gaining 10 first downs to the Warrior's five, they rushed for 149 yards to the Warrior's 80 yards. St. Pius had 96 yards passing to the Warrior's one and eight out of 13 pass completions to the Warrior's one out of five.

It looked like a 17 point lead was the same as 100 points.

Whatever the thoughts were by the spectators, the Ruidoso Warriors had other things on their minds.

SECOND HALF SUMMARY

At first it seemed like the Sartans would begin another scoring drive. Receiving the ball on their own 30 they ran the ball 32 yards to the Warrior 45 yard line.

The next play, a Sartan pass was intercepted by Alfred Riel!

Not only did he intercept but, he also made some yardage running it back.

Now, the Warriors were ready. Kenny Trapp started it by getting a Warrior first down. Getting the ball again on second and nine from the Sartan 29, Trapp broke away and stamped down the field for a touchdown.

The extra point was missed and the Warriors were behind 24-13, with 8:11 left in the third quarter.

Getting the ball follow the kickoff, St. Pius took over in good field position. On second down and seven and there was a fumble and Ruidoso recovered!

It was first and 10 for the Warriors from the Sartan 30 yard line!

Ruidoso got penalties on the next two offensive downs and then threw two incomplete passes.

On third and 25 from the Sartan 45, quarterback Manny Gaudiola went back to pass again. Gaudiola saw number 40, Alfred Rue, open on the opposite side of the field and catapulted a 30 yard pass completion and Rue

scattered into the end zone!

Adding a two point conversion the Warriors trailed by 3 points, 24-21!

Now, St. Pius knew they had to fight to win this ballgame.

Receiving the kick off they started on their own 42 yard line. With a long run and a face mask penalty against the Warrior defense, the Sartans were on the Ruidoso 14. One play later they ran the ball in for a touchdown.

A two point conversion and the Sartans led 32-21. There was 3:03 left in the third quarter.

Steve Dankert had another fine kickoff return to the midfield and the battle was on. Nobody could say who would win this football game.

Ruidoso passed and ran the ball to the Sartan 19. On second down Marquez gets the ball and finds his own hole around the end for another touchdown!

Wow! What a football game! A two point conversion brought the score to 29-32, with 16 seconds left in the third quarter.

The kickoff to St. Pius brought on feelings of disbelief.

Number 30, Brent Moore got the ball and within 12 seconds scored another St. Pius touchdown. Running up the center of the field, he sped past all Warriors untouched and into the endzone.

This was the second time in the game Brent Moore had scored on a kickoff return.

An extra point conversion made it 39-29, in favor of St. Pius.

Ruidoso couldn't move the ball after receiving the kickoff and had to punt.

The Warrior defense stopped St. Pius on their own 39 yard line. On fourth down they decided to punt. It proved to be a bad decision.

James Atwood sliced through the line, leaping like a wild animal, and blocked the punt!

It was first and 10, Ruidoso, on the Sartan 26 yard line!

Now, the Warriors had some bad luck. They fumbled inside the Sartan 10 and St. Pius recovered.

Then Ruidoso had some good luck. With 5:56 left in the game, the Warrior defense pressured the Sartan quarterback, causing him to fumble. Ruidoso recovered in the endzone for the score!

A failed extra point gave the Sartans a four point lead, 39-35.

An onside kick almost worked for the Warriors, but "almost", was in favor of St. Pius.

They took control of the ball on their 42 and ran the clock down with rushing plays. Gaining two first downs on the ground to Ruidoso's 19, the Sartans pulled a passing play and scored.

With an extra point conversion the Sartans led 46-35. Only 2:16 was left in the game and no timeouts remained for the Warriors.





Special month stresses mental health

Mental Illness Awareness Week begins today, (Monday), initiating Mental Health Awareness Month, and area mental health specialists would like to take the opportunity to dispel the many myths which surround mental illness.

For example, one of the most damaging myths is that all mentally ill individuals are dangerous to society.

Most mentally ill persons have a recognizable, though not defined, brain chemistry deficiency which interferes with day to day behavior, said Robert H. Walters, Ph.D., a

psychologist practicing in Ruidoso.

Walters said these deficiencies can be corrected through a combination of medication, education, and therapy.

Another myth mental health specialists would like to dismiss is that it is a sign of weakness for an individual to seek either psychiatric or psychological help.

To deal with many emotional or psychological problems alone is like attempting to change a flat tire without a lug wrench or a jack, said Walters.

"It is actually a sign of intelligent strength to be able to utilize all the available resources," he

said.

Most emotional and psychological stresses, which create crisis, are temporary, so an individual need not be suffering from a chronic mental disorder to receive benefit from a mental health professional, said Walters.

Mental health specialists can help with family crisis situations, addictive behaviors, recovery from catastrophic illness, coping with bereavement, depression, or other stressful events which may make a person's life uncomfortable or difficult to manage.

"We were all happy together," Roman often said. He told me of taking a wagon load of cedar fence posts to Roswell, camping out on the way. "That will teach you the value of a dollar," said Roman. Adding that he enjoyed these trips often stopping along the way to visit.

A lifelong member of San Juan Bautista Church, (Church of John The Baptist) in Lincoln, Roman has always been a man of very devout nature, carrying on the religious traditions of his forefathers.

As Father David Bergs said: "When we pass through Lincoln at night and see the cross he placed on top of the nearby mountain top all lit up, we will remember Roman and say a prayer for our beloved friend and be thankful that he is in God's care in Heaven."



considered legal without a signature. The Apache president displayed two petitions, one with more than 700 signatures calling for him to run for re-election and one with more than 500 signatures asking Chino to continue to represent the tribe in a pending claim in federal court regarding the Chiricahua prisoners of war.

"The number of signatures is tantamount to re-election," he said. The population of the reservation is approximately 3,000, with 1,400 tribal members eligible to vote, said Chino.

Chino has been the leader of the Mescalero Reservation for all but three years since 1952 and has served 12 consecutive terms as president since 1965.

Joseph Geronimo opposed Chino three times and lost every time by wide margins.

According to election records provided by Chino, he collected 71 percent of the vote in 1975 against Geronimo, 88 percent in 1979 and 63 percent in 1987.

Geronimo's largest percentage of the vote was gathered in 1987 when he received 34 percent.

"With this kind of record do you think Wendell Chino would involve himself in some kind of conspiracy?" said Chino. "I whipped him three times. I think I can whip him a fourth time."

Chino was interrupted twice during the press conference by the audience with applause.

Chino presented five reasons for running again, after he made previous statements he would retire.

At the conference, Chino said he was quietly telling tribal members he felt 12 terms as president and a

total of about 32 years was a sufficient amount of time for him being the tribal leader.

The first reason was the petition asking for him to run again for president which was presented to him on August 24, 1989.

"It is difficult to turn a deaf ear...to the pleading of the tribal people," he said.

The second reason given was Chino's work on the tribal water rights case was important and should be continued.

Also, the Mescalero tribe is involved in a lawsuit in U.S. District Court against the Indian Gaming Regulatory Act, which Chino claims is a threat to tribal sovereignty and treaty rights.

The petition requesting Chino to represent the tribe in the Chiricahua prisoner of war case was cited as another reason, as well as Chino's professed desire to continue orderly development of the tribe through creating jobs and the enhancement of social and educational programs.

Chino said unemployment on the reservation is currently about 35 percent. This, he said, was an improvement over the 80 to 85 percent unemployment the tribe faced in 1952 when he first became chairman.

In response to specific claims made by Geronimo, Chino said the personnel policy was approved by the tribal council by a majority vote.

"Until the tribal council changes it, it will remain as policy," he said.

All policies of the tribe, including the constitution, are subject to amendment with proper procedure, said the president.

"Why didn't Geronimo pursue

change as a councilman?" asked Chino.

Geronimo, now a youth counselor, said during his own news conference he was a council member for eight years.

In response to questions on the impending mining operations on the reservation by MolyCorp for yttrium and zirconium, Chino said he was confident the members of the tribe would support the contract if it ever came to a referendum.

Chino read from the minutes of a regular council meeting conducted on August 14, 1987, in which the council approved the contract, with amendments, for MolyCorp to operate near Pajarito Mountain.

According to the roll call read by Chino, the president was the only one of the ten member council absent when the contract was approved.

Geronimo previously stated he lacked confidence in the tribal judicial system because all the judges are appointed by Chino and "serve at his pleasure."

Chino said tribal judges are appointed by the president and then must be confirmed by three-fourths of the entire council membership.

Chino also said no where in the tribal constitution is it stated the council must approve appointments to the election board. However, the council does have the right to oppose nominations made by the president, he said.

The conference, scheduled for 10 a.m., was 15 minutes late because Chino was delayed at the tribal office by visitors.

"I always like to take care of people who come to my office," said Chino.

ment, then we need to wait," said Sanchez.

It was also discussed if the special use permit was unenforceable, then the county may need a special land use ordinance to protect the county from unwanted development until the county zoning procedure is completed.

At the request of the P&Z, Beauvais provided a legal opinion on Ruidoso's proposal to extend the extraterritorial zone (ETZ) from a current one mile radius around the village to three miles.

Beauvais said according to state statute, the extension was legal. However, Beauvais also said he had

a problem with Ruidoso's attempt to annex the airport property and the proposal to have an ETZ alongside Airport Scenic Drive.

Ruidoso requested an ETZ be declared a half mile from the center line on each side of Airport Scenic Drive, a request Beauvais believes cannot be legally fulfilled.

In any event, the need to provide zoning control over strip development on Airport Scenic Drive is the major concern, he said.

In other business, the P&Z tabled discussions on a proposed amendment to the zoning ordinance that would make the P&Z a decision making body as opposed to one that only makes recommendations.

The discussion was to be in the form of a workshop with the LCBC, which was suggested by the commission during a meeting. However, at the time the discussions began, Petty was the only county commissioner present.

Petty expressed her objection to the amendment because she did not want to grant the P&Z complete zoning authority.

Speaking only for herself, she said she was disgusted with the current zoning ordinance, though she did not foresee it being repealed.

"I think we are over regulating private property ownership," she said.

Retired men collect clothes for the needy

Somewhere in the Sierra Madre range in Chihuahua, Mexico, are Tarahumara Indians who have a small connection with people in Ruidoso.

That connection is made complete by Ruben Sandoval, of Ruidoso Downs, and Bill Schuerman, of El Paso, Texas.

The connection begins with residents of Ruidoso and throughout Lincoln County who bring their old clothing to the Pink Shop, operated by the Lincoln County Medical Center Auxiliary.

Clothing items in good enough condition to be sold go on the hangers and shelves of the Pink Shop to raise money for equipment at the hospital.

But the clothes that are not salable are not discarded, said Inez Tanner, past president of the Auxiliary. They are taken to Sandoval.

Retired from Los Alamos, Sandoval wanted to be active in the community. The owner of the American Sewing Machine Company, in El Paso, connected Sandoval with Schuerman, who also was retired and was looking for a com-

munity program.

Sandoval collects the old clothes from the Auxiliary and when he has a trailer load, he calls Schuerman, who picks them up and takes them to El Paso.

There, Schuerman has 10 to 13 outlets that accept the clothing for distribution to needy families, homeless people, orphans in Mexico and Indians in Mexico.

For example, the Saint Vincent de Paul Society in El Paso distributes the clothing to the Home for Orphans in Juarez, Mexico. The nuns there also distribute the clothes to people who come in need to them.

Jesús B. Ochoa, of El Paso, accepts the clothing for distribution to Tarahumara Indians in Cuzarare and Choguita, Mexico.

There are many others who write letters of thanks to the Auxiliary and to both Sandoval and Schuerman for the clothing donations.

So even if you think you wouldn't be caught dead in your old clothes, send them to the Pink Shop. There will always be someone darn glad to have them.

Trinity site is open Saturday

Be sure your gas tank is topped if you plan to participate in the Trinity Site Tour, Saturday, October 7. The trip involves about 150 miles of travel.

Trinity Site, where the world's first atomic bomb was exploded in 1945, is located deep within the White Sands Missile Range.

A caravan will depart from the K-Mart parking lot on U. S. 54-70 in Alamogordo at 8 a.m. Saturday, arriving at the site about 10 a.m. The return trip to Alamogordo will be at 12:30 p.m. from the parking lot at the site.

Another way to go is via the Stallion Gate entrance. Open from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m., visitors will be allowed to enter anytime during those hours, unescorted. The Stallion Gate is located on U.S. 380, 12 miles east of San Antonio and 54 miles west of Carrizozo.

The McDonald House is part of the tour. The restored old house is a part of the National Historic Landmark and is where the

plutonium core of the bomb was assembled. It is located two miles southeast of ground zero.

In 1984, the McDonald House was restored to its 1945 condition through the cooperative efforts of the U. S. Army Department of Energy and the National Park Service. U.S. Army transportation will be provided visitors wishing to include the ranch house in their tour.

No charge is made for the Trinity tour and no reservations are necessary. Participants should bring a picnic lunch. No foods are available at the site, but drinking water will be available.

While the degree of radiation is extremely low, less than that of a radium dial watch, pregnant women and parents of extremely small children (babies in arms) are advised the decision to visit the actual site is of their own responsibility.

Rules are strict for the tour. No weapons or alcohol of any kind are permitted at the Trinity Site. No

digging is permitted, especially in areas where Trinitite is on the ground.

Visitors are asked to stay on marked roads.

The first atomic test operation, known as Project Trinity, took place early in the morning of Monday, July 16, 1945. The site was in the north-central portion of the Alamogordo Bombing and Gunnery Range. The test site became a part of the 4,000 square mile White Sands Proving Ground (renamed White Sands Missile Range in 1958), established by the Army just one week before the explosion.

The world's initial atomic explosion left a crater about 400 yards in diameter and about eight feet deep. Sands in the crater had been fused by intense heat into a glasslike solid the color of green jade. It was given the name Trinitite and the explosion point was named Trinity Site.

While we would never advocate throwing money indiscriminately at problems, we believe the school board's long-range commitment to refurbishing and upgrading of school facilities deserves the support of voters and taxpayers. The school board set the district on a positive course when it replaced the high school with a large, modern building that will serve the needs of high schoolers for many years to come. The board followed up with a redo of Ruidoso Middle School (the old high school) and then Nob Hill Elementary School.

Those improvements are badly needed, and anyone who doesn't believe it should visit the sixth grade classrooms and experience the depressing atmosphere in those high-ceilinged rooms with unfinished concrete floors. And isn't it time we brought our students inside out of the "temporary" portable classrooms at White Mountain?

We hear that the schools may not be growing as fast as they once did, but the planned improvements are needed for the youngsters we are educating right now, today. The plans aren't extravagant, and will just continue the long-range plans for a safe and pleasant school plant.

Some of us are convinced this community is heading into a bright and prosperous future. We believe a vote for the school bond is just one more positive step forward.

We urge voters to vote "yes" on Tuesday, October 10.—fj

REALISM: In Search of Excellence

Realist art took a giant step last week. It did so without attacking modernism or taking to task the questionable programs funded by the National Endowment for the Arts.

A little known museum in New Mexico showed how a cultural blockade can be breached without entangling itself in the bureaucracy that now controls the culture of the United States.

The Hubbard Museum of Ruidoso, New Mexico, announced last week the establishment of an

annual award of \$250,000 for new works of American representational and realistic art. The prize is sponsored by R. Dee and Joan Dale Hubbard of Fort Worth, Texas.

The Hubbard Art Award will be one of the largest art awards ever bestowed. More than 100 artists will be nominated by 15 museum directors. These museum directors will name five judges, who in turn will select five works, from which the winning artist will be chosen.

The museum directors include an official from the Brandywine River Museum at Chadds Ford, Pennsylvania, which is home for the Andrew Wyeth and N.C. Wyeth art collections. Other directors will be drawn from the San Francisco Museum of Fine Art, the Phoenix

Museum, the Denver Museum of Western Art, the Denver Museum of Fine Art, the Amon Carter Museum of Fort Worth, Texas, and the Buffalo Bill Center in Cody, Wyoming.

These museums are clearly not part of the group who blindly follow the agenda set by the New York/Washington art establishment.

Winner of the competition will be announced on June 1, 1990. The criterion for first prize is defined in one word: EXCELLENCE.

Excellence is a criteria long ago abandoned by an establishment concerned only with the shock of the new, vulgar, and perverse. Excellence is a word rarely used to describe exhibitions funded by the NEA.

It was not a criterion for the judges who awarded \$15,000 to photographer Andres Serrano for his photographs of Pope John Paul and Christ on the Cross submerged in vats of the artist's urine. It was not a value employed by the directors of the Southeastern Center for Contemporary Art of North Carolina (funded in part by the NEA), which sent Piss Christ and Piss Pope on a national tour.

Excellence was not a word used by Dr. Donald Kuspit, one of the judges who selected Serrano, who wrote the text for the catalog that featured Serrano's work. Kuspit praised Piss Christ and Piss Pope for their "fresh visual rhapsodizing of religious icons."

Excellence in the arts was what President John F. Kennedy had in mind when he conceived the endowment in 1962. Excellence was the criterion Congress had in mind when they approved funding for a national arts program.

Congress chastised the NEA in 1979 and again in 1985, and again in 1989, for its failure to establish standards of excellence for a national arts program.

Congress is not seeking to censor the arts by cutting \$45,000 from the budget off the NEA (for funding exhibitions of Robert Mapplethorpe and Andres Serrano), but, rather, attempting to prod the NEA to take responsibility for art they fund.

The Hubbard Museum Award, with its focus on realistic and representational art, seeks to reestablish excellence as a criterion for American art. The grant of \$250,000 offers hope to hundreds of artists who have been denied grants by the NEA because they choose to work representationally.


