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Voters approve school bonds 2-to-1

The school bond issue passed Tuesday by a margin of about two-to-one, though voter turnout was low.

The election for the \$3 million bond issue to renovate school buildings and purchase computer hardware was passed with a vote of 348 yes, and 155 no, reported Sid Miller, superintendent of the

Ruidoso School District.

The turnout represents about 15 percent of the eligible voters in the district, which number approximately 3,000, said Miller.

The board of education accepted the results of the election during its meeting Wednesday.

Miller said the next step will be to issue requests for proposals (RFPs) for building plans from architects.

The architect currently employed by the district, Architecture Plus of Roswell, was hired just for the bond issue election, said Miller.

The company will have to respond to the RFPs like any other architect if it wishes to continue to be part of the school district's plans, he said.

Once a plan is accepted through the bid process, the building com-

mittees will meet with the architect to fine tune the plans to meet the district's needs, Miller said.

Some items covered in the bond issue, however, will not need an architect's plan and can be acted on much sooner, he said.

Miller said the purchase of computers can be done soon, and is likely the first item on the list of needs to become reality.

Miller was also invited to the

Fifth Town Hall Meeting this weekend at the Inn of the Mountain Gods.

The New Mexico First meeting will discuss topics in education, and is to include speeches by Senator Jeff Bingaman and Governor Gary Carruthers. Senator Pete Domenici is also scheduled to speak.

Though the topic of the meeting was determined some time ago,

Miller said he is excited by how the meeting coincided with recent trends nationwide in education.

Carruthers said in recent speeches he wants the school day extended to eight hours, and the school year extended to 200 days.

Miller said this will help out, but longer school days do not necessarily correlate to more education.

Classic will help three charities

Proceeds from the February 23-24, 1990, Connoisseur Classic will be split three ways, benefiting three charitable organizations. The three organizations were among eight that applied for funds through the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, event sponsor.

The three organizations selected by a chamber committee are the Family Crisis Center, Care, Inc. (MealCare) and the Children's Hospital of New Mexico.

In a letter to each of the applicants, Tracey Moran, director of the Chamber Convention and Visitors Bureau, said, "These two local organizations were chosen due to their very basic needs of food, shelter and safety."

Other applicants for the funds were Red Cross, Ruidoso Care Center Auxiliary, Home Health Services, Ski Apache Handicapped Skiers Association, Cub Scouts of Ruidoso, RHS Band Boosters and Kiwanis Club of Ruidoso.

Care, Inc., provides meals on wheels to elderly and/or handicapped persons. Care, Inc., in cooperation with the Village of Ruidoso, also provides transportation for those who want to have the noon meal at the Ruidoso Senior Citizens Center.

Moran said that because of support from the Connoisseur Classic last year, Care, Inc., expanded their operations from two days a week to three.

The Connoisseur Classic will be a two-day event featuring Southwestern cuisine, wine and art. The first such event was staged last year.

Location of the event will be throughout Ruidoso, depending upon bids received.

In her letter to applicants, Moran said, "We found it very interesting that the cries for help were for volunteers more than money ... because of this we will make a commitment to create a new local event highlighting the area volunteer organizations."

"The purpose of the Volunteer Fair will be to provide interested individuals with the information necessary to assist with area volunteer organizations."

The Volunteer Fair has been tentatively set for April of next year.

DEA searches for area man

Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) agents are still looking for Jose Manny Vasquez.

The Ruidoso Downs businessman is wanted in California on charges of conspiracy to distribute cocaine in connection with the largest cocaine bust in history, said Tom Smith of the Albuquerque DEA office.

The DEA is also interested in questioning George F. Lore about the cocaine smuggling ring allegedly led by El Paso resident Hector Tapia Anchondo, said Smith.

At this time, there is no warrant for Lore's arrest, said Smith.

Lore, who owns the Ruidoso Building Corporation and is a member of the board at The Bank of Ruidoso, was contracted to build a house belonging to Anchondo on property adjacent to Lore's, according to county records.

Anchondo, along with his father,

was arrested earlier in Las Vegas, Nevada.

Conflicting information exists as to Lore's whereabouts.

Media reports indicate Lore was arrested in Mexico on an island in the Gulf of California.

Smith said the DEA is unable to confirm this report, and is not concerned if it is factual.

"They'll catch him at the border when he tries to come in," said Smith. "I'm not worrying about George Lore."

Lincoln County Sheriff James McSwane said he reported a report from the Albuquerque Journal that Lore was released in Mexico the day after he was arrested there.

Media reports claim Lore was arrested by Mexican authorities Thursday, October 5, the same day federal agents and local authorities were searching his home, business, and the homes and businesses of

Harris appoints Hicks to Downs board

The Village of Ruidoso Downs Board of Trustees, during its Monday night meeting, received a new member and appointed a village employee to fill in for the village clerk who resigned.

Mayor Jake Harris announced at the meeting that village clerk Janice Polk had resigned because of health reasons. He asked the board's permission to appoint Leann Weibrecht as deputy treasurer so Weibrecht, who has been performing the clerk's duties during Polk's absence of more than a month, can sign village checks.

Harris also appointed Barney Hicks to fill one of the vacant positions on the Board of Trustees. Hicks was later sworn into office by Harris.

The board heard a report from Lincoln County Commissioner Rick Simpson on the county's plan for a landfill.

Simpson said the county is working toward purchasing a 100-acre block of land for a landfill. He said the county will seek a private oper-

ator for the landfill.

"That will relieve us of the responsibility and liability of monitoring it for 25 years," he said.

Simpson stated the money to pay for the operations of the landfill will come from a two or three dollar increase in each municipality's current sanitation fee. He said there will be no charge for individuals to use the landfill, but commercial users will have to pay a fee.

Simpson said the county commissioners are going to study what the county is planning.

Harris asked Simpson how long it would take to implement the plan since the present landfill will close in two months.

Simpson said the plan would take a couple of months.

Harris said it has been a month since Ruidoso Downs submitted its application to operate a landfill. He said the drilling of test wells and

the soil analysis would take the county more time.

Ruidoso Downs has applied for a permit to operate a landfill on property owned by Ken Nosker in the Glencoe area.

"Ruidoso Downs was put in an embarrassing situation by the county and Ruidoso," Harris said. "We don't want to be under anyone's thumb."

Simpson said it was the county's plan to sell 10-acre tracts of landfill site to the operator. He stated the county would retain the surface rights.

Harris asked Simpson about Ruidoso's and Roswell's committees looking into a regional landfill.

"We don't see why we can't operate a landfill here," Simpson said. He added at this time nothing is set in concrete.

"I'll say this much, you have


A very big weekend!

started in the right direction," Harris said. In other business, Ruidoso Downs Municipal Judge Harold Mansell approached the board as a private citizen concerned with an animal control problem. He said in the last four months there were 16 documented telephone calls to the police department concerning barking dogs. "I've had zero success getting the situation remedied," he said. He said there were three occasions he knew of that the animal

The only item on the agenda for the meeting was the naming of a deputy clerk to fill in for regular clerk Tammie Maddox when she is out of town or absent from work. Village manager Frank Potter said it is mandatory the village have someone to fill in. He recom-

mended Mary Seelbach for the position. The council approved a motion naming Seelbach as the deputy clerk and she was sworn in by Maddox. MainStreet Ruidoso board members Wednesday approved a plan to develop "winter" banners to hang along Sudderth Drive during the winter months.

"We already have the design, royal blue with white snowflakes," Teri Sodd, artist and MainStreet board member, told the board during its monthly board meeting Wednesday. netted \$926 for MainStreet Ruidoso. The proceeds from the events will be used to purchase trash receptacles for the Midtown area.

other individuals here. Robert Witajewski, of the U.S. Embassy in Hermosillo, Sonora, Mexico, told *The Ruidoso News* Wednesday he believes Lore was arrested and still being held by Mexican authorities. Witajewski also said he believes no formal charges have been made against Lore, though he is aware that newspaper reports claim the arrest involved narcotics.

Specific information regarding Lore could not be released by the embassy because Lore did not sign a privacy waiver at the time of his arrest, said Witajewski. Unless a U.S. citizen signs this

waiver, the embassy is prohibited from releasing any information on that person arrested in Mexico, even to members of the immediate family, he said.

Attempts by *The News* to contact Lore at his business or home Wednesday were unsuccessful. Lore, Anchondo, Vasquez, and Ruidoso property owner James Romero McTague have all been linked to an operation that allegedly imported more than 60 tons of cocaine into the U.S. through El Paso during the last year.

Vasquez was allegedly living in a house on Hull Road owned by McTague, said Smith.

Media reports claim a 1989

Jaguar belonging to Vasquez was seized at a routine road block of the U.S. Border Patrol after Vasquez abandoned the vehicle.

Associated Press reports claim McTague was the manager of the cocaine warehouse in Los Angeles in which more than \$80 million worth of cocaine was transferred in the last six months.

The same reports claim McTague provided federal agents with information on the cartel's operations.

Smith said the DEA is still conducting its investigation in New Mexico, and does not expect it to end soon.

Building permits are up in the village for September

Seven building permits for single family dwellings were issued in September in Ruidoso proper, showing a trend indicating a revival of home construction.

The estimated value of building permits taken out in September 1989 were close to double the value of permits issued in September 1988.

Total for September of this year was \$642,569; for September 1988, the total was \$324,240.

Value of permits issued for the first nine months of 1989 was \$4,882,963. This was almost \$300,000 more than the value of permits the first nine months of 1988.

Total for the first nine months of 1988 was \$4,599,761.

Permits for single family dwellings for September 1988 added up to \$489,845 compared to \$229,000 in August 1989 and only \$165,500 in September 1988.

Residential additions and alterations in September 1989 added to \$134,723; however, two permits had no dollar figures as to cost. These are estimated at \$20,000.

Additions and alterations in August 1989 totaled \$178,590; September 1988 in that category added to \$105,040.

New commercial permits for September 1989 totaled \$5,000; none were issued last month, but the total for new commercial in September 1988 was \$53,700.

There was one commercial

alteration and addition permit issued in September of 1989. This was for a new roof on Ruidoso State Bank. Value of the permit was \$13,000.

Demolition last month has a total of \$2,000.

In August of this year, there was a commercial alterations category adding to \$24,000. This category was blank last month.

The Plant Corner

DEAR SALLY:

My fuchsia plant was so full with hundreds of beautiful blooms when I brought it home from the nursery. Now it is obvious it is in a terminal stage of something. Help! Please.

DEAR RUBY:

The fuchsia is one of my favorite plants—to look at, but not to own. I did try to grow one a couple of years ago only to find again what I already knew about the very beautiful but demanding plant. This selfish little plant requires almost daily care and precise growing conditions.

Fuchsias come in hundreds of varieties from outdoor shrubs to species grown almost entirely by collectors. A native of Central and South America and New Zealand, they were very fashionable in Victorian times, and then went out of fashion. They are back in, and because of their beauty it is difficult to see why they ever ceased to be popular, except for the busy modern times and the care they require. In the garden they are deciduous

and grow well in partial shade. They are a favorite of the hummingbirds. In Ruidoso where freezes are hard, most plants die back to the hard wood, sometimes to the roots. For protection from the cold, cover the roots with six inches of saw dust and keep the soil moist, but not soggy, all winter. However, the fuchsia is truly in its glory in a hanging basket where it will bloom almost year-round with proper care. I will say again, with proper care.

Soil—For containers, the soil mix should be porous and very fast draining with good aeration, yet water-retentive. Use plenty of organic matter. I think you should repot your plant just home from the nursery. Use a mixture of 1/3 sharp river sand, 1/3 potting soil, 1/3 finely ground bark or peat moss with

vermiculite added to insure aeration and hold moisture around the roots.

Water—Water once every day, and sometimes twice. It's almost impossible to give thriving fuchsias in well-drained containers too much water. Do not allow it to stand in water: the plant will die if allowed to stand in a drip tray or water. Remove the drip tray and place a large drip pan on the floor under the hanging plant. Again, this watering goes on year-round.

Light—You can use a south or west exposure, but with some filtering method from direct, hot sun. The plant grows best in partial shade in the open. The flowers will tell you how much light you need. If too little light, the plant will not produce flowers.

Temperature—For a plant that flowers throughout the year you should maintain a temperature of 40 degrees to 90 degrees. When the foliage wilts in extreme heat

regardless of watering, mist with distilled water to cool it down. Do not open the window near the plant on hot, windy days. The hot wind will kill the plant.

Fertilizer—Because of so much water flowing from the container the plant requires more frequent feedings. Apply a complete fertilizer in light doses about every week or 10 days. Cut the label-recommended feedings to one third and you can almost see the fertilizer take effect. Once or twice a month switch to a tomato fertilizer for more blooms. Cut the tomato food to 1/3 and make a water solution.

Pests—Spider mites, white flies, and—you guessed it—the hideous, little cotton-headed mealy bug. Watch daily and never let these pests get a head start. Use a good general purchase insecticide and my goodness, I hope you know by now how to kill those balls of cotton with no eyes. Be sure to spray un-

It was the best of games, it was the worst of games.

The rush averaged three yards per carry, but only provided two first downs. The defense stopped a Mountaineer scoring drive by recovering a fumble inside the Tiger 10-yard line, but the defense was penalized five times for being off-sides.

The Tiger offense made the first score of the game with a touchdown early in the first quarter, but lost two other game-winning opportunities to the clock.

"The loss to Reserve was a heart-breaking experience for all of us," said Tiger head coach, Blane Miller.

The Oñate Knights are the biggest team Ruidoso has faced this year. With eight players weighing 200 pounds or more, the Knights could be hard to move.

Oñate has a 4-3 record this year, losing last week to Socorro in their first district game, 3-0.

"It was just one of those nights," head coach Tom Essex explained about the Knight's defeat last week.

"We're headed for a touchdown and the kid drops the ball and they race the other way for a touchdown. We bat a pass and they catch it. No matter what we did, something went wrong."



The volleyball match last Saturday against Cobre was also a winner for the Warriors.





Local girl places second in talent at national pageant


Tawnya Reynolds, age 9, placed second in talent at the National Miss America Beauty Pageant in Las Vegas, Nevada, on August 20.
