George Lore recounts his recent ordeal

Long-time Ruidoso businessman George Lore and his wife, Nancy, are glad to be back home after what George Lore characterized as a nightmare experience in Mexico over the past two weeks.

"I'm here, I'm not in jail," said George Lore early today (Thursday). "That should tell you something," he added.

Lore and his wife made a statement over the accusations and reports that he said wrongly linked him with the largest cocaine bust in U.S. history.

"We are not involved or were we aware of any illegal activities," said the Lores in a statement. The two were questioned and their names were published in various reports over a DEA investigation.

"All I did was know the Tapias," said Lore, who was detained in Mexico but was never charged with anything. "They can detain you as long as they want to," said Lore, whose home and business were searched by agents with the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) while he was out of the country.

Although the DEA, along with area law enforcement officers, made a thorough search of Lore's home and office, he said they confiscated very few items. Lore said early reports that a small amount of cocaine was found at his home were untrue.

He said the gun that officials confiscated from his truck, and reported was stolen, was one he took from a customer in payment of a debt.

"The DEA gave us a ride home from El Paso," said Lore, who apparently was drawn into the investigation because of his business relationship with Hector and Carlos Tapia Anchonda.

Hector Tapia Anchonda reportedly was arrested in Las Vegas, Nevada, where he remains in custody. His brother, Carlos Tapia Anchonda, reportedly was arrested in Mexico. Both have been linked by DEA reports to the cocaine bust in Los Angeles.

Lore said he met the two businessmen three and a half years ago, and since then has been con-

P&Z asks to annex airport land

The Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) took the first steps to annex the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport and the Wingfield Park property Monday.

During a regular meeting, commissioners unanimously approved and passed along to the village council a recommendation for the annexation of both municipal properties.

In addition to the annexation recommendation, P&Z also set November 6, as the date for a public hearing on the initial zoning of both properties.

The Wingfield Park property, also known as the Hall property, was purchased by the village on June 1, 1988, and retained for village purposes. The property, located below Grindstone Dam, is about 6.687 acres and is surrounded on three sides by the corporate limits of the village.

The commission has recommended the property be designated as PUD-M, or planned unit development, which is the same zoning of the adjacent properties in the village. This would allow mixed commercial, residential or public use of the property.

Planning administrator Cleatus Richards said no village departments expressed any concerns over the annexation. He said there was no village water or sewer to the property at this time, but it could easily be run to the property.

According to Richards, the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport is legally village property, having

been turned over to the village by Lincoln County and the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission on December 1, 1988.

The village is able to annex the airport because state statutes allow a municipality to annex property that is not adjacent to the corporate limit.

The statute states: "Territory may be annexed to a municipality which would otherwise be eligible for annexation except for the interposition of territory owned by the Government of the United States, its instrumentalities, the State of New Mexico or a Political Subdivision of New Mexico."

There are national forest lands adjacent to the village limits at locations along Gavilan Canyon Road. The forest land continues to the southernmost portion of the airport property. There is no intervening private land between the village corporate limits and the airport.

Village attorney John Underwood told the commission he saw no legal problems with the annexation of the airport.

"Based on my research, there's no hurdles to go through," he said. "It's perfectly legal."

Richards said both the Fire and the Police departments had expressed concerns over the fire and police protection at the airport. He said both departments had recommended cross-training of airport personnel to alleviate these concerns.

The commission recommended the airport also be designated PUD, to allow the widest range of uses. Areas for development around the

airport will have to be leased from the village.

Sierra Blanca Regional Airport manager Tim Morris told the commission the leasing of property is a vital part of the plan for the whole airport. He also invited the commissioners to spend some time at the airport and view the layout of the property.

P&Z will also hold a public hearing on the Airport Hazard Zoning Regulation at its next regular meeting on November 6.

The village council will review the annexation of the two properties at its next regular meeting on October 31.

During the Monday meeting, the commission had a public hearing on proposed Zoning and Building Code amendments.

Mike Radziewicz was the first person to address the commission on the proposed amendments, and raised the question whether the building code would allow the use of used materials in construction.

"In the days of recycling, you could be throwing away a lot of good dimensional lumber, good blocks and other things like that," he said.

Richards told him the building inspector has the right to allow new or used materials in construction.

Radziewicz said, regarding a proposal to require that homeowners/builders take a test to show proficiency in what they do, the Home Builders Association is working on a test that the average person with an average knowledge of

Get ready to golf!

The proposed hotel and golf course on the old municipal airport property are no longer just proposals—in a few months they will become a reality.

The village council, in a special meeting on Monday, unanimously approved both leases with SWD Motels, Inc. and Jim Colbert Golf, Inc. to construct an 18-hole championship golf course and a first class luxury hotel on the old airport property.

During the meeting, the council heard from members of the ad hoc committee, assigned with reviewing the leases.

Committee member Ted Bennett told the council after the committee's last meeting there had been a problem with the part of the lease dealing with latent defects. But, he said, that had now been remedied and the committee was recommending the lease be approved and signed.


Bennett also said, following a meeting in Albuquerque, SWD Motels had deleted one paragraph in the lease, but he also recom-

mended this lease be approved.

Before the lease was approved, the article dealing with the latent defects read: "the Village shall be responsible for any latent defect or change of condition in the Premises arising in whole or in part out of events occurring prior to the Commencement Date; provided, however, that except as explicitly set forth in this Lease, the rent payable hereunder shall in no case be withheld or diminished on account of any defect in the Premises or for any change of condition or for any damage occurring thereto."

At the urging of the ad hoc committee, the following was added to the above paragraph: "and provided further, that in the case of a latent defect which is not economically feasible to correct, the Village may either: (a) correct the defect at its sole cost and expense; or (b) terminate this Lease and reimburse, Colbert for all costs and expenses incurred by Colbert pursuant to the terms of this Lease, including costs and expenses incurred in construction of



the golf course, up to and including the date of termination; or (c) re-evaluate the project contemplated by this Lease and renegotiate the terms hereof."

Committee member Ralph Petty Jr. said this addition would give the village several options in the event the defect was expensive to correct.

The paragraph deleted from the hotel lease by SWD dealt with a penalty of \$100 a day, SWD would pay the village if the hotel was not completed in time for the projected opening date of July 1, 1991.

Councillor J.D. James made the motions to approve both the leases. Councillor Larry Simon seconded the motions.

Councillor Al Junge, who in the past had opposed the leases, said

after he reviewed them, he felt it was a good lease. Junge voted along with the rest of the council in approving the leases.

Mayor Lloyd L. Davis thanked the ad hoc committee for their work.

"I hope people who had great reservations will in a short time be just as proud of it as we are," said Davis in referring to the project.

After approving the leases, the council took up one other unrelated item. It approved the awarding of a bid for \$144,741 to the Oshkosh Truck Company of Oshkosh, Wisconsin, for a diesel rotary type snow blower for Sierra Blanca Regional Airport. The funds for the snow blower come from the Federal Department of Transportation.

Once the meeting was ad-

joined, the mayor and councillors, along with a number of people at the meeting, drove over to the old airport for a groundbreaking and tee-off.

Following a ribbon cutting, a number of people hit golf balls into the field between the old runway and taxiway. Then a city employee used a backhoe to break ground on the project while a number of people, sipping champagne, watched.

"I think it is the beginning of one of the greatest things that has happened to this village," said councillor James. "It's going to give us some new vitamins."

Construction on the golf course is expected to begin in about two weeks.

construction could pass.

Tim Collins asked the commission about the definition of an RV park. He asked if the 150-day limit for a parked recreation vehicle meant the owner could not use the parking lot for the rest of the year.

Richards said the definition meant that an individual RV could not be parking in a specific lot for more than 150 days, and the RV park owner could use the lot on a year-round basis.

Collins told the commission he objected to the amendment which

left it to the discretion of the building inspector whether a person needs a survey or not for a building permit application. He said some people don't even know where their property lines are.

Richards said the amendment came about as a result of numerous complaints from people who were only adding additions to their lots that were well within the lots' setbacks. He said the amendment only applies to additions, like decks, and not major construction.

Chairman Robert Donaldson suggested specific distances from

the setback be stated in the amendment.

Carl Stubbs, of the local office of Environmental Improvement Division (EID), told the commission the EID is in favor for the proposed changes in the subdivision codes.

"We are very much in favor of what you have done," he said.

Under the proposed changes, a developer of a subdivision, without village utilities, would have to consult with the EID on the placement of water and sewer lines.

P&Z unanimously approved the proposed changes to the codes and recommended they be sent to the village council for its consideration. Richards said the council would review the changes at its October 31 meeting.

Commissioner Eddie Nichols said house numbers are available at village hall and the phone company offices for residents of Ruidoso who do not have them. He said the numbers are courtesy of Contel and are for use with the future 911 emergency system.

tracted to do several construction jobs for them. Lore, who has built a number of big projects in the Ruidoso area, said his first projects for the Anchondas were small remodeling jobs. In 1987 he sold Hector Tapia Anchonda a house in El Paso, Texas, for \$55,000.

"We had no idea of any involvement in these alleged illegal activities," said Lore.

He said the Anchonda brothers talked of their various businesses, which Lore was told include livestock, ranching, farming and a large construction company in Mexico. The Lores recalled that Carlos Tapia Anchonda told them he sold \$9 million in livestock last year.

Besides their business interests, the two Anchondas told the Lores they were beneficiaries in their grandfather's will and inherited a large estate.

Believing that the two men were successful in various business enterprises, Lore wasn't surprised when Carlos Tapia Anchonda bought some land and asked him to build a large home on it that would cost several hundred thousand dollars. Lore said Carlos Anchonda has a beautiful home in El Paso, and a \$2.5 million home in Kino Bay, Mexico.

Carlos Anchonda was having major problems with his Kino Bay estate, and contracted with Lore to travel to Mexico and inspect the three-story home he was having built. The estate also includes a swimming pool, handball court, chapel, stables and a large guest home, said Lore.

During his preliminary inspection, Lore found that about 100 people were working on the job. He said it was such a mess that he shut down construction, and arranged to return for a week to get the job back on track.

It was during that week, when George and Nancy Lore were in Kino Bay to continue his inspection of the construction, that Hector Tapia Anchonda was arrested in the United States.

"I was shocked when I heard Hector was supposed to be involved," said Lore, who traveled on a supply boat to inform Carlos (who was on another island) of his brother's arrest. Lore said published reports of a high-speed boat chase are untrue.

Mexican police detained all the office staff working on the Anchonda project.

"They arrested 11 people," said Lore, stressing that they were never charged, but were detained for several days in Hermosilla, 70 miles from the construction site.

"The office staff, including us, were totally shocked and terrified

at being detained," said the Lores in their statement. All have been released.

"We had no idea of any involvement in alleged illegal activities and we're still not aware of any charges against Carlos," said George Lore.

After their ordeal in Mexico, being detained and questioned with no proof or charges, the Lores are especially glad to be home.

"Even Hector, a Mexican national, has the right to be considered innocent until proven guilty (in the U.S.) ... we should all be thankful that in this country we have that right," said the Lores in their statement.

The sweep that led to the arrest of Anchonda, also included the arrest of James Romero McTague of El Paso and a search for Jose "Manny" Vasquez of Ruidoso Downs.

Lore said he has met McTague, who owns a home at 302 Hull Road in Ruidoso, twice, but doesn't really know him. He said McTague is the brother-in-law of Hector Anchonda.

Lore said he does know Vasquez, who owns the Phillips 66 station in Ruidoso Downs which is in front of Champions Run.

"I bought gas from him," said Lore. "I never thought anything bad about Manny—I never thought of him being involved in any illegal activities," he added.

Both George and Nancy Lore said they are concerned over the untrue reports that have damaged their reputations as successful business leaders in the community.

"The damage that can be done by lies and misrepresentations can be irreparable," they said in their statement. Lore, who serves on the board of The Bank of Ruidoso, said he has been a successful contractor here for many years, and has completed many successful projects. He said he also has contributed to the community in many ways.

Nancy Lore is a successful real estate agent.

"People that know Nancy know of her strength of character, integrity, helpfulness and professionalism," said George Lore.

"Both of us are proud of our successes—we've worked hard for it," he added.

"We are of course cooperating completely with the authorities' inquiries over our relationship with the Tapias," said Lore.

"Justice, truth and faith in the Lord shall prevail," said Nancy Lore.

"We wish to thank our many friends and business associates who have had faith and supported us in this ordeal from the beginning," said the Lores in a written statement.

The DEA is continuing its investigation.

One objective is to reduce the amount of "fuel" in the forest. Fallen trees and other dead or decaying wood are considered "fuel". Reducing this dead organic matter within a forest will decrease a forest-fire's potential.

Another reason Makowski makes prescribed burns is to improve the wildlife habitat, allowing new growth and diversity.

Controlled use of fire can be dangerous if specific characteristics are not met within the areas.

Flu shots offered here

Flu vaccines for persons 65 years of age or over will be available from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Wednesday and Thursday, November 1 and 2, at the Ruidoso Senior Citizens Center.

According to Bette Romans, director of the Senior Citizen Center, the shots are free and no preregistration is required.

"The nurse takes them as they come in," she said.

She said in addition to persons over the age of 65, people who are members of a high risk group can receive the vaccines as well.

Persons considered to be high risk are encouraged to receive the vaccine for influenza during November, prior to the peak of the flu season, which normally occurs after December, said the Health and Environment Department.

Individuals considered at risk of developing severe complications with influenza are those older than 65 years old and those with chronic health conditions that require regular medical attention, such as heart and lung problems, asthma, diabetes, kidney disease, anemia or those having problems with their immune system, including those receiving treatment for cancer.

Romans said even though the vaccines will be given in both Capitan and Carrizozo by the County Health Office, any senior citizen who misses the shots there is welcome to take them at the Ruidoso Senior Citizens Center.

She said the only thing that could prevent a senior citizen from getting the shot is that they are allergic to eggs.

"I've seen her (the nurse) turn down several through the years," Romans said. She said the allergic person should consult their doctor before taking the shot.

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EID will check out site of Downs landfill

Officials of the Environmental Improvement Division (EID) claim a Hondo Valley landowner has been uncooperative with inspection of his land, but the landowner says all he wants to do is protect himself.

EID wants to inspect property owned by Ken Nosker to verify whether or not garbage the state agency claims was dumped there illegally has been removed.

Gary McCaslin, district supervisor for EID in Roswell, presented Nosker with a court order that gives the agency seven days to gain access to the land and conduct its verification, said Nosker.

McCaslin called the document a search warrant, and said EID will be at Nosker's property on Friday.

"We have tried for the past month to negotiate a reasonable agreement for access to Mr. Nos-

ker's land," McCaslin said on Tuesday.

"I have never refused anyone...to go on my property, as long as they would call me first," said Nosker today (Thursday) during a telephone interview with The News.

Nosker is currently seeking a stay on the court order that would prevent EID from searching his land unless they post a cash bond to pay for any damage done to the property.

The conflict is over solid waste deposited on Nosker's land with his permission from Ruidoso Downs. EID contends this constituted the operation of an illegal dump and ordered all the garbage removed.

Both Nosker and Ruidoso Downs Mayor Jake Harris, have said publicly they complied with EID's order, but before verification could take place, Nosker had the property covered, graded, and reseeded.

McCaslin sent a letter to Harris suggesting a method to verify the removal of the garbage which entailed the drilling of random holes at the site and inspecting the holes, but Harris did not respond to McCaslin's letter.

Now, EID wishes to search Nosker's land itself and will refill the holes, grade them and reseed the property all at EID's expense, said McCaslin.

"What assurance do I have that McCaslin has the authority to do that?" said Nosker. "They (EID) are trying to make an example of little 'ol Ruidoso Downs."

Nosker said he wants EID to post the bond before they go on his property to assure any damage done is corrected.

"I don't want to take any damages from this," he said.

Nosker also said he reseeded the property at the optimum time of

year, and it is unlikely EID will be able to restore the land to its current state.

"I don't have any reason to trust EID," said Nosker.

The property in question has been an erosion project for Nosker and over the years, he allowed others to dump old cars, bed springs and other scrap metal in the arroyo there to control run-off, he said.

"When they get down to that wire and steel, they're going to find some plastic bags," said Nosker.

Ruidoso Downs applied to EID for a permit to operate a landfill under new state regulations at Nosker's property.

McCaslin previously said even if the site becomes permitted, all the old garbage must be removed before any new garbage can be deposited.



The Plant Corner by Sally Black



DEAR READERS:

On October 17 I had the pleasure of meeting with the Ruidoso Garden Club and share some of my mother's garden hints. Some suggested I pass these hints on to the readers of "The Plant Corner."

Who said it first?—I don't know, but I do agree, "that we must learn to care for gardens and plants of all kinds before we can care for ourselves. We have the same beginning; we, too, come from a seed."

I realized how little I knew about plants not long ago when a reader asked, "if I water my silk flowers, can I grow silk worms?" and I wasn't sure how to answer.

Much of what I know about plants, I learned from my mother. We lived in the country before the age of so many chemicals and we learned to do the best we could with what we had.

I remember asking my mother how she had learned so much about plant life and she simply said, "Why, from my mother, of course."

My mother did a lot of "Companion Planting" whenever possible. She always planted marigolds all over the garden and any which just came up voluntarily were allowed to remain, making pretty little bright spots all over the garden.

Some other little tricks of my

mother's were to save all fat drippings on the back of the stove to bury near the roots of his climbing roses. One year we had leftover lard for "hog killing" the year before and it was all buried around all types of rose bushes and they really flourished that year.

All horse hair, dog and cat, as well as discarded human hair was saved to plant around the green bean seeds so the noxious little creatures in the soil would become entangled in it, the horse hair being sharp enough to prick them to death. Now I am only telling you what my mother told me. She took her gardening very seriously for she had to feed her family and we always had delicious green beans.

A sound rule-of-thumb she always used was "plant rotation." She would never plant the same kind of herb or vegetable in the same place twice in succession. By rotation, it will prevent exhausting the soil of the particular properties one plant or the other needs.

My mother saved all tar or creosote and lay on the top of soil between rows of carrots and cabbage, about two inches from the plant to inhibit the larvae of the cabbage fly and the carrot fly.

She always saved all ashes to scatter over the garden. She did all the fall clean-up burning on the

garden site and worked all ashes into the soil. There was one plant she was careful not to get ashes near. Ashes can be fatal to mint.

Mother would always give the cloves of garlic a little tap with a rock to bruise the clove a bit before planting. This was supposed to make the garlic sweeter. She also saved olive stones to scatter among the cloves when planting. We saved almost everything. You know—waste not want not.

For strawberries, and only for strawberries, incorporate scrapings of top soil from below pine and spruce trees when planting, and thereafter mulch with pine and spruce needles and crushed fir cones. This, she said, would improve the flavor.

Nettles are great, within reason, she told me. She said nettles would stimulate the growth of all plants as well as being the best thing in the world to hasten the decomposing of a compost heap while providing it with rich ingredients.

The common foxglove was respectfully referred to as Doctor Foxglove. There is nothing to stimulate growth and help disease resistance like the ordinary old purple foxglove. Apart from keeping plants healthier, they will improve the storage qualities of such things as potatoes, tomatoes and apples grown near them. Foxglove is also known as digitalis—the cut flowers will last longer if foxglove is mixed in the bouquet.

Mama said the ash tree made splendid firewood, but never plant the garden or roses near the ash tree for it robbed the soil of all good properties. On the other hand, she

said the laurel tree is safe from lightning, both in the field and near the house. We could always take shelter under the laurel tree from lightning. I don't think I would do that today.

If we had any chemicals around to kill garden pests, I never knew about it. My mother would say, "If it moves slowly enough, step on it; if it doesn't, leave it. It'll probably kill something else." She guaranteed a clove of garlic planted beside each rose will keep aphids away. With each tomato plant she would plant one marigold and one basil plant. Plant nasturtiums to prevent whitefly. She would circle all cauliflower plants with horse hair rope to keep the slugs away. To keep birds away from the soft fruit she would put long threads of black cotton thread in the trees and the bird feared getting their wings entangled. Also she planted lavender bushes near the soft fruit and beside the strawberry bed was planted a lavender hedge. I remember the tastiest strawberries, the likes of which I have not in many a year. It had to be the lavender hedge planted nearby to improve the flavor.

Now about the scarecrow. We had in our garden. Mama said, "It's not that silly figure that does the job of keeping the birds away; it's the scent of man on the clothing, so change a scarecrow's shirt often."

Now I thank Mama and God who gave me the love of plants, rather than big feet.

Hungry Tigers starve Bears, 33-16

It was a running game, and for Capitan, it ran the right way.

Of 306 yards rushing, 240 yards belonged to Nathan Roybal in Capitan's win over Cloudcroft, 33-16, Friday.

Both teams were winless going into the game, but Capitan may have had more at stake because it was the Tigers' last game to be played in front of the home crowd.

"All of these young men work extremely hard every day, and this victory is encouraging for all of us," said head coach Blane Miller.

The rush was the primary method of attack used by both teams, with passing playing a negligible role.

A total of only 19 passes were thrown in the game, and of those, only three were completed by either team. There was also an interception for each team.

The big gains were made by Roybal, who had five rushes of 15 yards or more, and four touchdowns. His 240 yards was in 19 carries, giving him an impressive average of 12.6 yards per carry.

Quarterback Heath Huey scored the first touchdown on a 17-yard run in the second quarter.

The percentage of third down conversions improved for Capitan over previous games, and in fourth and long situations, the team opted for the more conservative punt play rather than attempt the first down.

"There has been a tremendous amount of improvement for the entire team since August," said Miller.

Of 10 third down situations, Capitan converted six into either first downs or touchdowns.

Penalties were a problem for the Tigers in the first quarter when they were penalized 40 yards, but only 30 more yards were accumulated in the remainder of the game.

First Quarter

The Tigers won the toss and recovered an on-side kick by Cloudcroft on the Capitan 38. The Tigers were penalized on their first play five yards for being offside, placing them in a first-and-15 situation.

Four plays later the Tigers punted, and Cloudcroft began moving the ball immediately.

In three plays, the Bears had a first down, plus another five yards from another offside penalty against Capitan.

The Bears ran the ball for another first down, but on second-and-eight, fumbled the ball during a pass attempt.

The Tigers ran eight plays

achieving two more first downs. However, a pass was called back because of an ineligible receiver downfield.

A third-and-12 turned into a fourth-and-18 when a pitchout went for a loss. Dan Seay attempted a field goal, but it was no good.

The Tiger defense forced the Bears to punt after four plays, and Capitan had the ball back on their own 32, but couldn't muster an effective attack.

Cloudcroft got the ball back on their own 20 after the punt went into the end zone.

The Bears made a first down in two plays. In a third-and-five situation, the quarter ended.

Second Quarter

The Bears were forced to punt when they were unable to convert their third-and-five.

The Tigers began their possession on their own 44. In a third-and-12 situation, Huey completed a 15-yard pass to Warren Russell. Roybal ran 27 yards for another first down, putting Huey in the position to make his 17 yard run for a touchdown at 9:59.

The point after kick was good, putting Capitan in the lead, 7-0.

Cloudcroft ran four three plays after their kickoff return and punted out-of-bounds.

The Tigers took possession on their own 45. A six-yard pass on the first play took Dan Seay into Bear territory, followed by two successful runs by Russell for the first down.

Two more runs by Roybal and Capitan had another first down. Huey attempted a pass, but was incomplete. Huey then rushed 9 yards, and in a third-and-one situation, handed the ball to Roybal who exploded for 25 yards and a touchdown.

The point after was no good, and the score was 13-0.

Cloudcroft came back and tried to challenge the Tiger defense. A short pass gave them a first down after fourth-and-three, but their next attempt to get a first down in a fourth-and-four situation failed.

The Tigers went to the pass, but were intercepted. The Bears tried two passes but they, too, were intercepted by Dan Seay. However, there wasn't enough time for Capitan to score again, and the half ended with the score 13-0.

Third Quarter

Cloudcroft returned the kick off about eight yards, and were then penalized during the first play for illegal procedure. The five-yard

penalty set them back far enough they couldn't get a first down and had to punt.

The Tigers began possession at Cloudcroft's 40 after the Tigers received an additional 15 yards from a penalty against the Bears for a late hit during the punt conversion.

The Tigers moved the ball well with the rush and made two first downs on a two-yard run by Huey and a 15-yard run by Roybal. Capitan was first-and-goal at the 10. A run by Huey moved the ball a little closer, then Roybal ran it in for another touchdown.

The point after was no good, so the score was 19-0 at 6:40 in the third quarter.

After about a 20-yard return on the kick off, the Bears couldn't move the ball effectively against the Tiger defense, and were again forced to punt. But they didn't miss the ball long.

During a Huey run on a third-and-five play, the Tigers fumbled and lost the ball to Cloudcroft.

The Bears blasted with their first play in a 34 yard run, setting them up for first-and-goal. Two plays later, they had a touchdown, followed by a successful two point conversion. The score was 19-8, Capitan.

Cloudcroft tried another on-side kick, but the Tigers recovered the ball on their own 49. Huey moved the ball another two yards into Bear territory, but the second-and-nine run by Roybal went nowhere.

In a counter option play, Huey pitched the ball to Roybal who ran left toward the sideline. The Bear defense followed the play and closed off Roybal's progress, but the Tiger runner shifted and cut back against the grain into a wide open hole to run 50 yards into the end zone.

A pass attempt for the two-point conversion failed, leaving the score at 25-8.

The Bears then mounted an effective drive against the Tiger defense. Starting off on their own 28, Cloudcroft made it into Tiger territory by the end of the quarter with help from a Tiger penalty for a face mask.

Fourth Quarter

The Bears were in a second-and-11 situation at the start of the final quarter. They continued to run the ball until they were first-and-goal.

Little by little the Bears got closer to the goal line, but the Tiger defense prevailed and closed up any holes, stopping Cloudcroft on the one yard line.

The Tigers moved the ball for-

ward a little, but had to punt.

The Bears had the ball again, and with the help of another Tiger penalty, moved the ball effectively downfield. The goal line defense this time couldn't hold back the Cloudcroft offense from another touchdown, or stop the two point conversion.

The score became 25-16, Capitan, with a little more than four minutes left in the quarter.

The Bears tried another on-side kick and it still didn't work. Capitan was first-and-10 on the 50. Huey ran for one yard. Then Roybal

exploded again for 49 yards and another touchdown. This time a pass to Russell was good for the two point conversion, making the score 33-16, Capitan.

And that's the way it stayed for the rest of the game, with the Tiger defense stopping Cloudcroft again after six plays.

Capitan took over possession until the clock ran out, earning their first win of the season.

Capitan trustees approve annexation request Monday

The Capitan Board of Trustees took action in a three-to-one vote to accept two proposals for annexation to the village.

Trustee member, David Rouleau, cast the only dissenting vote in the approval of annexation requests made by Jack E. King and J. Doyal Roberts.

Discussion prior to the vote centered on if the annexation was compatible with the village's master plan.

"We're not going to pay," said Dorothe Morton, a member of the audience.

"The master plan is not law," said Capitan Mayor Benny Coker.

The conflict with the master plan developed because the property J. Doyal Roberts requested be annexed by the village was to have a stud farm business there, which was not compatible with the surrounding residential area, according to a report from the village planning and zoning (P&Z) committee.

The P&Z report recommended both requests for annexation be denied.

Coker explained Roberts planned on developing the stud farm regardless if the property was annexed or not.

By annexing the property, the village would benefit from the property tax collected which will help carry the water bond indebtedness carried by the village, as well as the gross receipts taxes that would be collected, said Coker.

"Anybody who is willing to help retire the water indebtedness deserves consideration," said Coker.

The 1989 tax rates approved by the Department of Finance and Administration (DFA) indicate Capitan is the highest taxed community in Lincoln County.

In terms of net per thousand dollars of net taxable value, residential rates in Capitan are 40.354 and non-residential rates are 43.197.

Of this total, 19,168 is for municipal debt service, which includes the water bond.

By comparison, residents in Ruidoso pay 37.489, and non-residential rates in Ruidoso are

39.769. Residential rates in Corona are 16.425, and non-residential rates in Corona are 20.030.

Roberts said his operation will have between four and eight head of horses. The training ring is for his own use.

Trustee Norman Renfro questioned Morton if being involved with the Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County (ED-CLO), she were in favor of economic development in Capitan.

"In the county," she said. Discussion also included future water usage in Capitan.

Dr. Bernhard Reimann said more than 70 percent of the existing lots in Capitan subdivisions do not now have water meters, but are legally eligible to receive water from the village.

Through annexation, the village increases its burden to supply water service to village residents.

"Eventually, federal requirements will make it necessary that all Capitan water users also be connected to the municipal sewage treatment facility," said Reimann.

Presently, only the midtown area is connected to the sewage plant.

The trustees approved the annexation with specific stipulations on the delivery of water, how many meters would be installed, and that the King property would not be subdivided and have only one residence.

Discussion was also conducted over a cost-share project between the village and the Capitan School District on drainage.

The village is being charged more than what was credited for the work, but no one has the paperwork necessary to clear up the confusion.

Village clerk Janet Keel said she made requests for the paperwork, but neither the school district or the State Highway Department seems to have it.

Capitan Police Chief Randy Spear submitted a proposal to create a no parking zone in front of the elementary school.

Presently, cars and trucks are allowed to park in front of the school which blocks vision of children in the crosswalk.

The P&Z also recommended the proposal be accepted. The board approved the measure

unanimously. Village attorney Don Dutton presented a report on the water dispute between Capitan and Alamogordo regarding the use of water from Eagle Creek.

Using the process of binding arbitration, an agreement was reached where Capitan would pay 25 cents per 1,000 gallons with an added clause that Capitan build its own water line, he said.

Dutton said it made no sense to charge the taxpayers for parallel water lines, that it would be better to enter into a joint maintenance agreement with Alamogordo for the preservation of the lines.

He also suggested that Capitan residents write to their representatives regarding the issue.

Coker said he issued representatives of the county would come to Capitan to explain their new plans regarding solid waste disposal.

He said the Landfill Advisory Committee (LFAC) came up with a recommendation for the county, which was accepted, that called for the establishment of transfer stations throughout the county for disposal to be conducted outside the county.

"But now, the county has drifted into other directions," said Coker.

Reimann, who was a member of the LFAC along with Coker, said he read in the newspaper that the LFAC was reinstated, but no meetings have been organized, nor any other contact from the county initiated.

Coker said he was going to Columbus, Ohio, for the Rural Water Association's annual convention, and asked if the trustees would consider paying for some of his expenses.

The Eagle Creek Water Association is paying for the \$302 round-trip airfare and some expenses, he said.

Coker also said he would go to the convention whether he paid the expenses of if the village paid.

The trustees approved a motion to pay for the registration fee of \$200 and a per diem.

During the approval of the accounts payable, Coker reported on an electric bill credit for charge errors over defective equipment that was replaced.

can help a football team win. Playing with overconfidence and predictability can spell defeat.





Sunland Park opens with record crowds

It was the best opening day in Sunland Park's history as a total 4,986 fans were attracted to the track and the four other New Mexico inter-track network sites to wager an impressive \$568,479, the sixth best handle ever recorded at Sunland.

The more than half million bet opening day completely shattered the old opening day record of \$407,390 set back in 1981.

On the track in the feature race, W.C. Henderson's Veil Of Courage lost the lead momentarily to Quando Victory, but battled back in the final strides to take a courageous 1/2 length victory in the \$12,350 Mr. Vale Handicap.

The four-year-old Kentucky-bred took the early lead under rider Joe Martinez and stayed there for all but a few yards of the 6 and 1/2 furlongs to log a 1:17.3 for the distance and pay \$6.80, \$3.40, \$3.20.

Richard Montgomery's Quando Victory paid \$9.80, \$6.20 as the runner-up while Flachado finished third to pay \$3.20.

For Veil Of Courage and trainer Jon Arnett it was the second time in as many starts that the Veil Of Courage had entered the win circle.

Raise An Impudent overcame highweight of 123, a slow start and a hard bump to rally in the final yards and narrowly win the \$7,500 Jess Burner Series # 1 at Sunland Park.

The race highlighted a day in

which the track handled a total \$516,958 as compared to last year's \$302,143. The total opening weekend handle of \$1,085,437 was 67.8 percent above last year's same two days, and was, by far, the best opening weekend in Sunland's 31 year history.

The New Mexico intertrack network has helped the track to boast of an average daily handle of \$542,718 as compared to \$323,482 last year.

Under rider Jerry Rodriguez, Raise An Impudent won Sunday's 350-yard feature in :17.52 which was just .35 of a second short of the track record.

The Jim Richardson trainee broke from the middle of the pack and was bumped by Classy Comment about 100 yards from the gate. After righting himself, he caught his stride to power to the lead in the final yards and win his sixteenth career contest.

The first six finishers across the wire were all less than one length apart as Classy Comment came out of the blanket finish to run just a head behind the winner and pay \$3.20, \$3.20.

Boy Hes Snazzy, racing at 31-to-one, was less than a neck behind the winner and returned \$7.60.

Also on Sunday, no one correctly picked the Twin Trifecta and the carryover stands at \$13,553 for the next racing card.

EDITORIAL

While education in general has been getting a bad rap lately, we believe state and national leaders, as well as a great many educators and business people, deserve an A+ for efforts to turn around what seems to be a trend of declining productivity in public education.

President George Bush, in an unprecedented move, called all the governors together for a "summit conference" on education. Bush presented proposals that ranged from freedom of choice in schools to national standards in public education. "People are ready for radical reforms," said Bush; and Governor Garrey Carruthers, as well as the other state leaders, agreed.

New Mexico First dedicated last weekend's town hall meeting at the Inn of the Mountain Gods in Mesalero to education, with the topic "Beyond Survival: Public Education in New Mexico." More than 100 educators and business people took part in the four-day meeting that concluded with the adoption of a report that includes a broad range of restructuring plans.

In a nation that spends more per student than any other, Carruthers has indicated an unwillingness to provide more funding without radical reforms. His recommendation of a longer school day and more teaching days, was paired with the suggestion that social workers and professionals in various fields be brought into the schools to provide specific instruction on health and other subjects so that teachers will be free to teach, and not be turned into social workers.

The governors pledged to support two of Bush's major proposals: freedom for parents to choose which public schools their children attend, and alternative teacher certification methods for professionals switching careers. The president is calling on businesses to join in partnership with the schools, and also advocating exams for graduation and promotion. We believe those proposals would all have positive results in the schools.

New Mexico First delegates adopted a list of recommendations that calls on the state legislature to provide additional funding through increased taxes. The group turned thumbs down on school choice. The recommendations New Mexico First will present to the governor and legislature also call for teachers to have greater autonomy in the classroom, as well as increased salaries, generous leave time for professional development and the chance to visit in students' homes.

It's significant that the final reports from a group of educators (more than one-third of New Mexico First participants are involved in education) and a group of elected governors are quite different on a number of issues. But it is a positive step that both groups are talking seriously about public education and ways it can be improved.

It could be that educators are too close to the subject to be able to make the hard choices that will accompany the kinds of radical changes being advocated by the governors. And the governors may not be as well-informed on the day-to-day operations of a school system as they should be. It's good that the two groups are both working toward the same purpose—a better education for all students. While we believe that most educational decisions should be made at the closest level possible to the schools, with operational control in the hands of local districts and the state, we are pleased to see the president placing a high priority on education as it affects the future of this nation.


There are others who need to be involved—parents who provide the "raw materials" for the educational system, taxpayers who continue to foot the bill for public education and business leaders who end up employing the "end products" of the system.

It looks like national, state and local leaders are ready to respond to calls for massive changes in education. Let's be sure we let them know what we think.—fj

DEAR EDITOR:

Frankie Jarrell, you have gone too far this time. Blatantly, you presume that since voters did not turn down the chance to change our form of government, (Ruidoso government), these voters must have therefore endorsed this golf course proposal (Ruidoso News, September 7, 1989; R.N., June 20, 1989). Were this true, there would not be the extent of dissension toward this proposal that exists more important, as an argument, you are grasping at straws. A change in the form of government and a golf course-hotel lease agreement are two entirely different items.

I would have liked to make this letter short, but I have a lot to get off my chest.

For starters, the way you carry on about how hard it is to attract clean industry to Ruidoso, one would think you are trying to attract business to the Sahara Desert, not the Sacramento Mountains. ("If anybody thinks attracting a multi-million dollar clean industry is easy, just check with ..."; Ruidoso News, August 24, 1989; Frankie Jarrell.) Not only do these mountains provide for a refreshing refuge from the surrounding desert but, given the package deal Colbert Golf, Inc. and the resort hotel were given (free water, \$2,000 a year

lease without a single clause regarding inflation, a mere 20% gross of golf sales after the gross revenue exceeds 1.5 million per annum...) informed businesses would be lining up to relocate or expand in our charming village.

Ms. Jarrell, the voters of this town were not only denied their RIGHT to vote on the proposed development of Municipal property — a very nice asset Ruidoso stumbled upon, the voters were not even allowed to participate in the development of this contract — especially regarding key issues such as water, effects on the environment, design, architecture, revenue. I take this moment to remind our mayor and village council that when given the choice and the opportunity to vote on proposals for developing this old airport land, the people (6.9% of over 200 residents polled) voted for a new golf course seventh out of twelve potential uses. A college ranked number one with 15.5% choosing it and an event center came in number two with 13.3% of the polled population favoring it. An open space/park/playground came in number three with 12.9% favoring it. Given the amount of acreage Ruidoso has to work with, all three of these choices could have been developed. (Old Airport Master Plan, page 50).

That's not all, Ms. Jarrell. You think it ridiculous to say that people were intimidated one way or another to not voice objections or to not sign the petition calling for a referendum vote (Ruidoso News, September 11, 1989; Frankie Jarrell on the Record). You are fooling yourself. Had you circulated one of those petitions, you would have seen it for yourself. I know. I did. From store merchants to car dealers, from school teachers to lawyers ... people were intimidated and successfully so. As a fact, the degree of intimidation and the extent of one journalismist just goes to show how valuable this chunk of real estate really is. This is not the democratic dream; this is a communistic nightmare.

Lastly, the collective consciousness of the group of people who signed and circulated that petition could have come up with not only a more utilized, but more economic proposal. Something that truly would diversify the existing economy. I do not think that by providing for more waitressing, bartending and cleaning and cooking jobs is not what the Master Plan meant when it listed diversifying the economy as a major objective. Shoot, given the available state and local resources and this amount of acreage — not to mention the level contour of the land and the prime

location — Ruidoso residents could have fulfilled their first FIVE personal choices of development and realized FIVE times the accepted lease price of \$2,000 a year! (an outdoor amphitheater and a corporate training center are choices four and five respectively). A situation of this magnitude would have produced jobs for this winter as well as the next four or five. And just as important, all ages, work classes, residents and tourists alike could enjoy the finished product. As it stands now, the laborers, architects, engineers, testers etc. that will build, construct and develop this golf course, hotel and amphitheater will be back to looking for new work once this task is complete. The people that LIVE here and raise their children here, will still be out of a year-round, indoor-outdoor physical health center, a college, a corporate training center providing for high paying jobs; a community focal point—and a lot of potential revenue.

No, the people who circulated and signed that petition are not elected to any office—yet. I remind those that are, you have an obligation to represent us — the villagers, NOT your self-interests.

"Tales of Enchantment," Boyd's latest presentation, will be presented at the Ruidoso Public Library, Monday, November 6, at 7:30 p.m. Sponsors are Friends of the Library and the New Mexico Endowment for the Humanities.

His newest program is a series of four stories Barrett acts out.

The intriguing tales of the search for the Seven Cities of Gold, the "disappearance" of the ancient Anasazi civilization, the discovery of the Carlsbad Caverns and the unsolved murder of Colonel Albert Jennings Fountain are the four stories. They are told with a blend of storytelling, drama and music.

The presentation is part of the Chautauqua series of the New Mexico Endowment for the Humanities.

Barrett has been heavily involved in dramatic productions since 1972. He has traveled extensively as a one-man dramatist and with a six-person drama group.

In October 1985, Barrett began a one-man show on the Lincoln County War called "Trouble in Lincoln County." He has performed this and another production called "Lincoln Lore" under grants provided by the Lincoln County Heritage Trust.



Evangelist from Aruba preaches here
