RHS dominates cross country meet

The Ruidoso High School cross country team, hosting its one home meet this year, took first place Saturday.

The Warriors placed first out of five teams, running past teams from Tularosa, Carlsbad, Roswell, Alamogordo and Roswell Goddard.

Head coach Ronny Maskew is excited about this year's successful team, and also looking forward to

future cross country wins.

"All but two runners on the boys varsity are freshmen," Maskew said. Ruidoso is the best cross country team in district and will be a contender in this year's state meet on Saturday, November 11, in Albuquerque.

Saturday's results are proof of the talent which is on this hard working cross country team. All the

contenders in this year's Ruidoso Invitational Cross-Country Meet, ran a three-mile course around the old airport.

Spectators were invited to run (or walk) around the course at 9 a.m. before the meet started. This was a good chance for fans to see how fast these cross country runners complete the course.

After the "fun run" the athletes

took the field and the real competition started.

Finishing first for the boys varsity was senior Ira Sago with a time of 17:24. This young man has continued to improve each week and will be a top contender in this year's state competition.

Next for the Warriors was Gilbert Kayitah finishing sixth with a time of 18:49, Nick Nanz finished

eighth with a time of 19:00, Eric Evans was ninth having a time of 19:05, Ryan Stephens finished 11th having a time of 19:16, Faustino Miranda was number 17 with a time of 19:59 and Jaime Ordoica finished 23rd with a time of 20:17.

On the boys junior varsity team, Tielson Caje finished second with a time of 19:59, next was Roger Marr with fourth place and a time of

20:34, Jeremie Livingston was fifth with a time of 20:38 and Jon Hough finished sixth having a time of 20:44.

For the girls varsity team, Ardena Comanche was third, having a time of 21:53, Luisa Tam was fourth with a time of 21:59, Yvette Maldonado was 14th with a time of

Ruidoso News Business Editor A man involved in development of what is now Ski Apache, a former county commissioner and a former president of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, Bill Hart, has been named Citizen of the Year by the Ruidoso Board of Realtors.

Hart was given the honor at the annual installation banquet of the Realtor group at Cree Meadows Restaurant Wednesday.

Retiring board president Darlene Hart was named Realtor of the Year. She and Bill Hart are not related.

Bill Hart was instrumental in getting 24-hour electrical service to Ruidoso residents during the years he owned the power company here, 1936-1945, according to Gary Caughron who introduced Hart to the group.

Caughron said Hart put in the first comprehensive water system

Crimestoppers pays out \$800 in rewards

The Ruidoso-Lincoln County Crimestoppers board of directors met Thursday at Casa Blanca Restaurant and heard a report from coordinator Lanny Maddox.

Maddox told the board that 21 calls were received on the Crimestoppers line since the last meeting. He said one of those calls led directly to the arrest of Elmo Silva, who was wanted on rape charges in Ruidoso.

"It shows it works," Maddox said.

He went on to say several calls led to drug charges being filed against suspects and the recovery of stolen property.

Maddox said Crimestoppers has paid about \$800 in rewards in the last 30 days, and has a \$100 reward pending on a narcotics case.

The board also discussed the recent Crimestoppers golf tournament at Cree Meadows Country Club. Several board members said there were some problems with the tournament, but these can be worked out by next year's tournament. The board members agreed at the last meeting to make the golf tournament an annual fundraising event.

"I thought it was a real good tournament," said board president Rich Seeley.

"It was great for public relations," said Christina Lawrence.

Maddox thanked the board members for helping with the tournament. He also announced the Ladies Golf Association donated \$55 from its "closest to the pin" contest to Crimestoppers.

Maddox told the board about his

recent trip to the International Crimestoppers Convention in Albuquerque. He said he had a super time and learned a lot.

"It was a real learning experience, to see how other departments work their programs," he said.

Maddox presented the board with an idea for a new motto for the Ruidoso-Lincoln County Crimestoppers program.

He said the new motto, "crunch crime in Lincoln County," would be featured on a television commercial, in the newspaper and on the radio. He said Parsons Production has agreed to do the commercial and run it at no charge. He said it would take about three or four months to put together.

In other action, the board voted unanimously to ask the district attorney's office to do the write-ups and nominations from each police department for the annual Officer of the Year award.

The next board meeting will be November 16 in the Tee Pee Lounge at Ruidoso High School.

In state Crimestoppers' news, the Gallup Fire Department is asking the public for help in solving an arson case. The fire resulted in \$70,000 in damages to Econo Auto Sales.

Gallup Fire Department investigators indicate that many flammable liquids were used to start the fire, which had six points of origin in different rooms and buildings of the establishment.

EID wants to check out Downs dump

The Environmental Improvement Division (EID) Friday canceled its inspection of private property alleged to be an illegal dump site in the Hondo Valley.

Officials from EID were to inspect property owned by Ken Nosker in the Glencoe area to verify the removal of garbage EID claims was dumped there illegally.

Gary McCaslin, district supervisor for EID, said he canceled the inspection after telephone discussions with Nosker and with Ruidoso Downs Mayor Jake Harris.

McCaslin said Nosker told him he would do whatever necessary to keep EID from stepping onto his property. An attorney in Santa Fe representing EID suggested the search be canceled until another option could be investigated, said McCaslin.

"It's not an indication we're giving up," he said.

The conflict involves garbage deposited by the Village of Ruidoso on Nosker's land, with his permission.

The dumping took place after the Village of Ruidoso and Lincoln County, in response to new EID regulations governing the operations of landfills, closed the Fort Stanton landfill in May.

The Village of Ruidoso Downs had no site to dispose of its solid waste once the county landfill was closed.

EID contended the operation on Nosker's land constituted an illegal dump and ordered the garbage removed.

Both Nosker, Harris and environmental engineer David Bollschweiler have said publicly the garbage was removed as ordered.

However, before verification could take place, the site was covered, contoured, and reseeded.

EID officials say they attempted to gain access to the land to verify the removal of the solid waste, but have either been ignored or told not to enter Nosker's land.

Nosker is seeking a stay to the court order to search his property pending a cash bond posted by EID.

EID did send a letter to Harris suggesting an option for verification, but Harris did not reply to the letter, said McCaslin.

Harris previously told The News he would not dig holes on someone's private property to see if garbage was still there.

The Village of Ruidoso Downs is currently seeking a permit from EID to operate a landfill on Nosker's land.

Mayor Harris said Friday he wants to provide answers for the continuing questions and provided the following statement which is printed in its entirety:

"This is to explain the situation that is involved in the landfill on the Nosker property.

When the landfill was closed on the Fort Stanton Mesa, and Ruidoso refused to transport our solid waste, I made an arrangement with Mr. Nosker down in the valley to unload this waste on his property. At this time, there was no temporary landfill, there was nowhere to go with the waste.

"Our trucks were all full, and we had a big weekend coming up and we had nowhere to go with this waste. So, we took it down and unloaded it onto Nosker's property.

"Now the EID wanted to see where we put the waste, so we met at the site with Mr. McCaslin, Mr. (Jim) Edwards (of the EID), Mr. Tony Parker, a trustee in the Village of Ruidoso

Downs; and Mr. Nosker.

"EID was concerned because the waste had been unloaded in a place that wasn't designated for a landfill. I asked them, 'where can I put this waste? I have nowhere to go with this, and it has to go somewhere. Now, you tell me where to go with it.'

"Now at this time there was no landfill, and to my knowledge, I don't even know if there was even a permit issued for a temporary landfill or not, and had no ideal how long it was going to take to dispose of this waste.

"Mr. Edwards made this remark, 'I may always regret this, but I'm going to make this statement, how about us just turning our backs for about 10 days on this, so that solved our problem for the moment.'

(Edwards confirmed this statement today. "That was the gist," he said. "We were going to allow them to continue with what they were doing. At the time he (Harris) didn't have anything to do.")

"So, we continued to dispose of this waste in this manner. Now they suggested while we were talking, when and if we got a temporary site somewhere, to transport it to this other site. I made the remark, 'why don't we just wait till we get a landfill site and then we'll transport it to that site and that will be the end of it.'

"After the temporary site was granted and opened, Mr. McCaslin and his staff began to pressure me to move the waste to the temporary site. I was not in favor of this because this would shorten the life of the temporary site, as well as being an added expense.

"Mr. McCaslin and Mr. Edwards were told

that there was a considerable amount of iron under the waste, and their response was to get what we could. The iron consisted of car bodies, farm machinery, etc.

"Under continued pressure from Mr. McCaslin, I engaged a contractor to take his equipment to the site and transport the waste to the temporary site. I also told him about the iron.

"He took a caterpillar, a front end loader and six dump trucks and moved the waste. The site has been contoured and reseeded to grass; and to go in now with heavy equipment would destroy this and that is why the property owner is asking for damages.

"After McCaslin and Edwards had consented for us to continue disposing of the waste at this site, Mr. McCaslin made the remark that if and when a temporary site was approved and opened, we might consider moving the waste to this temporary site. My reply was that that had crossed my mind, but that I thought a better suggestion would be to leave it there until a permanent site was permitted and then move it.

"As far as I know, the contractor moved what he could move safely, without damaging his equipment. He sent us a bill and we paid it.

"Mr. McCaslin knows that there is some trash there. No one has ever denied that. We do deny that we can go in there without jeopardizing the equipment.

"We have an application in the EID office in Santa Fe, asking to permit this site. This application does show that this is an ideal location. We are to meet with Mr. Mitternolt and his staff in Santa Fe, October 30, at 1:00 p.m. to discuss this."

Electronics industry is announced

A new industry for Ruidoso should be in production turning out wire harnesses, cables and panel assemblies for high tech industries by late November, according to George Puckett, executive director of the Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County.

Puckett told EDCLC board members at a board meeting Wednesday that a David M. Lortz, who just sold one similar business in Ohio and will go into production under a new company name in November in Ruidoso.

Puckett said Lortz has leased some 25,000 square feet of the old Gibson's building at the "Y" and that initial employment should be 25.

"Hiring will be local," Puckett said. The company will be known as Concept Images and Designs, Inc. Lortz has been headquartered in Gahanna, Ohio.

The state economic development division referred Lortz to six communities in the state, and referred him to EDCLC in Ruidoso.

Puckett said Lortz immediately said he liked Ruidoso and decided to put his operation here.

"He made an offer on the lease the same day," Puckett said.

Puckett said Lortz's original company was doing about \$6 million in sales per year. It was known as Da-Tech when Lortz sold it.

The new company is described as a consulting, design and

manufacturing company.

The company Lortz sold was producing from computers and robotics to power supplies and communications equipment, said Puckett.

Puckett said Lortz has an "excellent track record" and that the company could employ as many as 100 people down the road.

In other business, the EDCLC board and its president, Carroll (Buddy) Bundick, recognized Territorial Abstract Co. for its moral and financial support of EDCLC activities.

A certificate of appreciation was accepted from Bundick by Truman Barnett of Territorial.

The board left it up to Puckett's discretion about charging some in-

dividuals or entities for EDCLC promotional packets which originally cost some \$15 to produce.

The material, in an attractive folder sealed by a leather thong, provides detailed information on Lincoln County and its communities for industrial prospects.

Serious prospects receive the packets free, but Puckett indicated demand is heavy from other sources.

Cost to EDCLC for future packets would run about \$6 because basic materials and dies and such for printing already are in existence with the Phil Price Advertising Agency in Lubbock, Texas.

Bundick said EDCLC is continuing to look to other sources for financing the organization.

"It may be difficult," he said. Karon Petty, EDCLC board member and a Lincoln County commissioner, said she believes the county commission, past and present, has provided requested financing for the first two years of EDCLC operations.

She said EDCLC requested \$90,000 for the first year's operation from the former county commission and received \$130,000.

The present commission, she said, approved about \$50,000 from a mill levy for next year's operation.

For the two years, she said, that adds up to \$180,000 or twice the amount requested for the first year.

She also suggested a farm and ranch organization as a possible source of funds. Petty said two ranchers had told her the organization and a predatory animal control group had never been contacted.

"I think that when we show successes our credibility will be a little higher," Bundick said.

A financial report was approved. It shows total disbursement from January 1 through September as \$84,141 which includes salaries, printing, office expense including rent, insurance, travel and such.

Budgeted amount for the first nine months was \$110,264.

Income for the first nine months include \$132,128 from Lincoln County; \$800 from memberships, \$3,475 in interest and \$148 from other sources.

On another front, the state is looking for an entity to operate a New Mexico Manufacturing Productivity Center.

The Legislature has allocated \$225,000 for such a center which would provide technical expertise and assistance to manufacturers in the state.

The board approved filing an application to make the EDCLC the contractor.

The center would be charged with working with educational institutions, federal laboratories and test facilities to increase the productivity of manufacturing operations within the state.

Lodging big business


Lodging in New Mexico last year generated gross receipts of more than \$520 million, according to a recent survey by the New Mexico Hotel/Motel Association.

The total economic impact on the state's economy was an estimated \$1.2 billion for the year, according to a press release by the association.

According to the association's Economic Impact Survey, payroll for the lodging establishments exceeded \$165 million and total full-time employment was close to 16,000 people.

Employment was highest in the north-central region encompassing Santa Fe, Taos, the Enchanted Circle and other communities with 4,661 persons employed. Albuquerque rated second with 4,205 employed, followed by Ruidoso/Cloudcroft/Roswell with 2,710, the survey noted.

Phil Kithil, executive director of the association, said this was the first year the association has conducted the survey so comparative figures with earlier years are not available.



Warriors wait until 2nd half to win

Sometimes, in sports, it's tough and go during the first half of play. As the game progresses one team knows it's going to win, and does. That's what happened Friday night as the Ruidoso Warriors smothered the Silver City Colts 31-14.

In the opening moments the Warrior offense sputtered, throwing an interception on the first offensive play. Throwing four more interceptions before half, it seemed like an upset in the making, with the Colts still looking for a win this season.

Ruidoso quickly changed all of that.

Although the Warriors were behind 14-7 at half, an upset by Silver City seemed far from reality. Mistakes on the Warrior offense and a trick play by Silver City put the Warriors in a hole, but the second half was another ball game. Ruidoso powered ahead and would not be denied victory.

FIRST HALF HIGHLIGHTS

Probably the interception on the first offensive play, startled Ruidoso's sophomore quarterback, Manny Guardiola. It's hard to predict how a quarterback will react after making a mistake like that. Guardiola got his chance quickly.

The Warrior defense forced the Colts to punt and the offense was back on the field on its own 20. Not being able to run the ball effectively on the first two downs, the Warriors faced a third-and-10 situation.

Guardiola completed a pass to senior, Logan Stirman, for 13 yards. Ruidoso kept the drive alive, moving into Colt territory. On second down and 10 from the Colt 25 yard line, Guardiola threw his second interception.

Silver City broke the ball game open this time. Keeping the ball on the ground, the Colts gained good yardage. With the help of a few long runs Silver City faced a fourth down on the Warrior 22.

Making the first down, Silver City scored on the very next play. It was a trick play that caught the Warrior defense by surprise. The ball was faked to two runners and put behind the back of a third offensive back. The back stood still for a moment, holding the ball behind him, and then ran straight down the field for a touchdown.

Missing on the extra point conversion, Silver City was ahead 6-0 with 2:34 left in the first quarter.

Ruidoso got the ball back but couldn't keep it. Crossing the 50-yard line, the offense stalled. Guardiola was called for intentional grounding on third and 10.

Punting the ball away, the Warrior defense took over. On the first play, there was a fumble and Ruidoso recovered on its own 49-yard line.

The Warrior offense got a first down with runs by seniors, Kenny Trapp and Alfred Rue.

It was first and ten from the Sil-

ver City 37-yard line and Guardiola threw his third interception.

The Colts took possession on Silver's 41-yard line but couldn't get past the 50.

Receiving the ball on the 26, the Warrior offense tried again. On third and six from the Ruidoso 24-yard line, Guardiola threw his fourth interception and that led to another Silver City touchdown. This time the Colts got a two-point conversion making the score 14-0.

The Warriors were behind by two touch downs with 5:29 remaining in the second half.

Guardiola would not throw another interception. The Warriors had to punt the ball during the next offensive possession and so did the Colts.

Even though Guardiola had to eat the ball when he was sacked for a loss, he was through making mistakes for the evening.

This is when the Warriors started building confidence. On second-and-16 from the Warrior 49, Kenny Trapp busted open for an 8-yard gallop. The next play Manny Guardiola ran for 10 yards and the first down.

It was first and ten at the Colt 35-yard line with 20 seconds left before the end of the first half. Guardiola threw a 30-yard pass to sophomore, Jose Marquez, for a touchdown.

Tacking on the extra point was junior, Ryan Wright.

The Warriors were behind 14-7 with 11 seconds to play in the first half.

SECOND HALF HIGHLIGHTS

Kicking off to Silver City at the beginning of the second half, allowed the Colts to lose a yard in three downs. Juniors, Abel Montelogo, Steve Dankert and Kief Johnson romped all over the Colt ball carriers on the first two downs. On third down Kenny Trapp finished the job with a shattering tackle at the line of scrimmage.

The Warriors took control of the ballgame, and on the next offensive possession scored. A 16-yard pass from Manny Guardiola to his brother Jessie Guardiola put the Warriors back in the drivers seat. The extra point by Ryan Wright tied it at 14-14, with 7:02 left in the third quarter.

Mentally, the Warriors had already won the ball game.

Silver City fumbled on the next offensive possession and the Warrior offense took over on the Colts' 28-yard line. After six running plays and one incomplete pass, the Warriors were on Silver City's 20-yard line. Freshman Shane Wells booted a 25-yard field goal and Ruidoso was ahead 17-14 with 52 seconds remaining in the third quarter.

Defensive plays by juniors James Atwood and Jamie Candelaria forced the Colts to punt after the kickoff.

Ruidoso couldn't move the ball either, but didn't force anything.

Guardiola was sacked again, but had learned not to panic.

During the Colts' next try at offense, the Silver City quarterback was called for intentional grounding on third-and-one from the Silver 31-yard line.

Getting the ball back, Ruidoso's junior Jose Marquez ran for 25 yards, but it was brought back because of a penalty.

Starting from the 3-yard line, the Warriors dug in for a win. Running and passing down the field, the offense penetrated to the Colts five yard line.

Senior Alfred Rue ran in for a touchdown with 1:57 left in the game. Adding an extra point the Warriors led 24-14.

Feeling the pressure, the Colts tried to move quickly down the field after the kickoff. Silver made the mistakes this time and junior Steve Dankert was waiting. Intercepting a pass on the Colt 20, Dankert flew past everyone for a touchdown.

With the extra point, it was 31-14 Ruidoso.

Only 1:26 was left in the game but it wasn't over as far as junior Nick Herrera was concerned. On the first play after the kickoff Herrera intercepted a pass.

Taking possession of the ball, Ruidoso had won the game mentally and physically.

WRAPUP

"Manny Guardiola built some confidence," said head coach Doug Ragsdale after Friday's win over the Colts. "He became more comfortable as the game progressed," he added.

The Warriors had 18 first downs, rushed 200 yards on 43 carries and gained 118 yards passing.

Kenny Trapp was the leading rusher with 134 yards on 19 carries. Guardiola passed 18 times with four interceptions and seven completions. Logan Stirman was the leading receiver with two receptions for 45 yards.

Ruidoso had no fumbles and five penalties.

This game has added depth to Ruidoso's offense. Coming back from a 14-0 deficit took more than better blocking or fewer mistakes. It was a team playing together that forged the winning attitude.

"Learning to deal with adversity," is how Coach Ragsdale puts it.

However, he is cautious about the future, explaining that it's one game at a time.

Ragsdale believes the Warriors have an excellent chance at the district championship, but doesn't want his players thinking too much of past glory.

"We can't live in the past with good things or with bad things," he said.

The Warriors play next at 7:30 p.m. Friday, October 27, in Socorro.

While at the Roswell church, he served as president of the executive board of the Baptist Convention of New Mexico (BCNM) in 1965 through 1967. He was president of the Sunday School Board of the Southern Baptist Convention (SBC) in 1965-66, chairman of the SBC Executive Committee Program from 1971 through 1973, and chairman of the resolutions committee at the SBC in Portland, Oregon, in June 1973. He also served on the executive board of the Baptist General Convention of Texas, while he was at Palestine.

He has served on the BCNM Executive Board from 1983 through 1987 and on the Board of Trustees of the International Baptist Bible Institute in El Paso, Texas, from 1980 through 1987.

He wrote a series of articles

entitled "Baptist Beliefs," published in Baptist journals in 1962 and a booklet entitled "The Holy Spirit and I," published privately in 1971.

Parrott and his wife, Elizabeth, currently live in retirement in Norman, Oklahoma.



A fund has been set up at the Ruidoso State Bank to help defray the cost of a liver transplant for five-year-old Michael Malis of Ruidoso.


Malis suffers from a liver disease and is in Denver, Colorado, awaiting a liver for a transplant.

Take a break from dieting this Friday

This week has been declared Eating Disorders Awareness Week by the American Mental Health Counselors Association, as part of Mental Health Awareness Month during October.

The emphasis on dieting and being thin placed by our society may be inappropriate in many cases, and in others, can be life threatening, according to information provided by Birgit LaMothe, Ph.D.

Lynda Wilson Laurence, chairman of the Committee on Eating Disorders, said weight prejudice is now recognized as a contributing factor in the development of eating disorders.

This emphasis on weight, called "weightism," is claimed to influence the choice of playmates by children as young as three years old. In one study, 80 percent of the fourth graders interviewed said they were dieting.

The focus of this week will be "Fearless Friday," modeled after the Great American Smokeout.

Persons are encouraged to stop dieting and thinking about weight for one day, Friday, October 27.

Weight cycling is a problem that can develop from restrictive dieting, said Laurence.

In weight cycling, the dieter goes through periods of weight loss, followed by other periods when all the lost weight is regained, or more weight is gained.

Serious eating disorders include anorexia nervosa (under-eating) and bulimia (binging and purging). Both can be life threatening.

Individuals who may be overly conscious or obsessive with dieting, or who may exhibit characteristics of the more serious eating disorders, are encouraged to seek a qualified opinion from a mental health specialist.





NM First will issue report on public education

The education system in the U.S. is still intact, but overwhelming social problems have hampered its effectiveness.

This was the conclusion of more than 100 participants in New Mexico First's fifth Town Hall meeting conducted recently in Mesalero.

The meeting covered a very complicated subject and was an eye-opening experience, said Bill Hirschfeld, a local real estate agent and member of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce. Hirschfeld is the area media spokesperson for the event.

Ruidoso Municipal Schools Superintendent Sid Miller also participated.

Social factors, such as the increase in the number of single parent families, drug abuse, child abuse, the breakdown of the

nuclear family, and others, have all combined to confuse and even stop the education process in public schools across the nation, said Hirschfeld.

"It's gotten to the point you can't be a teacher without being a part-time social worker," he said.

Hirschfeld said one New Mexico principal said that if the school is given a healthy, adjusted five-year-old, twelve years of standard education will prepare that student to go on to higher education or into the work force.

But distracting social issues along the way confuse the education process and make the child a high risk candidate for dropping out.

Educators estimate at least half of New Mexico students qualify as "at risk," which means they are likely to drop out before completing high school, said Hirschfeld.

Such a statistic may not seem reasonable for Ruidoso, where the majority of high school seniors graduate with a diploma, but in other districts in the state, the dropout rate is a serious problem, said Hirschfeld.

"The situation will be the kids dropping out will become a majority and the kids graduating will be a minority," he said.

Recommendations by the Town Hall group include lengthening the school day to accommodate extra services to address these social problems.

During the extra hours, social workers would be brought in to address social problems, and the emotional needs of students could be met without changing the role of the teacher, said Hirschfeld.

Another recommendation included lengthening the school year to 200 days and operating school

facilities the entire year.

"The educators present were concerned about student retention during the summer," said Hirschfeld.

Such a school calendar might have six-week sessions broken up with three-week vacation periods, he said.

The longer school day would also more closely match the standard work day which addresses the problem of latch-key children.

Raising teacher salaries and the standards for hiring and firing teachers were also deemed necessary.

"I did not meet one teacher present that did not feel underpaid, unrespected by the community, and overburdened by the district," said Hirschfeld.

Teachers from Albuquerque commented that some students in their classrooms are known drug

addicts and criminals. The teachers said they are required to teach everyone in spite of these distractions.

Hirschfeld said 70 percent of the state's budget is devoted to education, including post-secondary education.

A recommendation of the Town Hall group is a one percent tax increase, or some other method, to raise more monies for education in the state.

Governor Garrey Carruthers said in previous speeches he believes public education needs can be met without new money.

Hirschfeld said a general feeling at the meeting was higher salaries would encourage people to stay longer with the teaching profession.

Some concern was expressed after the meeting that participants directly involved in education were over represented.

In an Associated Press release, State Superintendent Alan Morgan said he was disappointed more non-educators were not present.

"The credibility of this effort hinges on representation from the general citizenry, not on those of us responsible for implementation," Morgan said.

Hirschfeld said he did not believe the educators were over-represented, but they did overpower the others because of their greater basic knowledge in the field.

"The educators controlled the discussion," he said.

The final report from the meeting should be available in a week, and will cover all the recommendations adopted by the delegation.





Reporter's Round

My father was a teacher for more than 30 years. His first teaching job was at a small, rural school in Six Lakes, Michigan, where the first graduating class was nine.

He taught biology and for his first assignment he was given a class of the so-called "slow learners."

Not wanting to stigmatize his students, my father asked them to make a list of 10 items they would like to learn in biology. He also made his own list. His and the students' lists were so close, he kept his own and made that the course curriculum. He also selected college level text books.

My father believed that a student will rise to the level of his or her expectations, so he expected a lot. And the students performed. The lowest grade he gave was a B, so all his students were "mainstreamed" into the regular level science courses.

Every one of them failed. The school board accused my father of doctoring grades.

My father told me this story a few years before he died, when I started to work at a private school for teen-agers with learning disabilities. It's a story close to my heart because it exemplifies there is a lot more to teaching than most people, even most teachers, think.

Recently, there's been a lot of talk about the state of education in our country, and the discussion is relevant. It is very discouraging when nearly half of all high school seniors cannot identify Mexico as the country south of the U.S. on an unlabeled map, or that a significant number of college students don't know the date Columbus came to the New World.

But if the situation is going to be corrected, many things need to be changed, including the perception of education held by educators.

Governor Garrey Carruthers would like to see more and longer classroom days. That is one thing, but what he wants to do with the longer day is very interesting.

Carruthers believes we need to let teachers teach, and utilize the extra time to bring in social workers, police officers and other non-educators to cover the areas of sex education, drug education and other counseling needs.

I think it is a brilliant idea because teachers have no business being social workers or therapists. If a teacher wants to be involved in correcting the family dynamics of a student, then the teacher needs to become a social worker and drop out of teaching.

And so I'm upset that one of the recommendations from the delegation at the New Mexico First Town Hall meeting recently conducted in Mesalero is to provide teachers with the opportunity to visit the homes of their students.

It is ironic this recommendation emerged considering teachers complain frequently of being overworked, underpaid and unrecognized. (If you really want to know what unrecognized is, work as a childcare worker or house parent for awhile.) Apparently they don't work so much they can't drop by a student's home.

Perhaps some teachers have a fantasy of being a Jaime Escalante. But the big difference is Escalante made time to visit the parents of his students and knew what he was doing. If you provide an opportunity for all teachers to visit student homes, you open the door for inept people to come in and screw things up.

If it is necessary for a teacher to meet with a parent, then it should be done at school. If it is absolutely necessary to visit the home, the good teacher will make time, not ask for it.

Another problem I see is the development of a reliance on standardized tests to decide whether or not students have "mastered" skills. Tests are important as a gauge to a child's progress, but the trend is to emphasize test results to the point where they become absolute.

In the background report for the Town Hall meeting a study claimed "Teaching behaviors that appear to increase students' achievement on standardized tests and factual examinations are nearly opposite from those that appear to increase complex cognitive learning, problem-solving ability, and creativity."

It is a general agreement among statisticians and psychometricians that unless a standardized test matches the curriculum of the district it is used in, the results are not valid. This is because there may be items on the test that are not covered in the curriculum, and/or the curriculum may cover items that do not appear on the test.

The Comprehensive Test of Basic Skills (CTBS) is such a test. It is used statewide as a measure of student achievement in mastering basic skills because the State Board of Education has chosen the instrument. But this choice was made without any consideration to local school districts.

The match between test content and local curriculum should be the most important consideration in selecting an achievement test," said Lorrie A. Shepard, associate professor of education at the University of Colorado, in a review of the CTBS in the Ninth Mental Measurements Yearbook (MMY).

The MMY is a comprehensive, objective review of all published psychological and educational test instruments, and is considered the quintessential reference of these tests.

Unless the content of the CTBS matches the curriculum in every school district it is used in, comparisons of test results between various school districts is inappropriate, although routinely done nationwide.

Also, because the State Board of Education requires high school seniors to pass a standardized competency exam—that has been in existence only two years and has no validity or reliability data—in order to receive a diploma, individual district needs are ignored just so an alienated bureaucracy can say something has been done to improve the quality of high school seniors.

Therefore, in order to improve graduation results, districts slowly, and even unknowingly, modify their curriculums to teach the skills necessary to pass a specific test.

Districts have to, because a student denied a diploma for failing the competency exam can sue the district for the diploma if the student can prove proper

preparation for the exam was not provided.

Is that what education is about? While the choice of the CTBS and the competency exam is not a choice of individual districts, and therefore, not a district's sole responsibility, the choice to use the Armed Services Vocational-Aptitude Battery (ASVAB) is.

The ASVAB is made available to the Ruidoso district free of charge, and the results of this test are used for career counseling guidance. Why the choice?

I was told, because it is free and the ASVAB is considered one of the best vocational batteries on the market.

But the MMY paints a different picture. "In these days of computer scoring and plotting, there is no excuse for reporting (ASVAB) scores as point estimates; they should be shown with their error bands around them to show students and counselors how unreliable they are."

And, "If scores are not sufficiently stable over periods of a year or two, they should not be used for making long-term predictions such as career placement and counseling."

The problem with the ASVAB, critics claim, is the tests are structured in such a way as to encourage guessing among test takers.

"Making such data available to counselors is absolutely inappropriate, since conversions with such low intercorrelations are useless," said David J. Weiss, professor of psychology and director of the Psychometrics Method Program at the University of Minnesota in his review of the ASVAB in the MMY.

Our system of education needs an overhaul badly, but a few nests will need to be rattled if the overhaul will work.

The State Board needs to provide local districts with greater autonomy; local districts need to be more responsible in their self-evaluation; and teachers need to stick to teaching.

But something else needs to be remembered. Our system of education is unique in the world in that everyone has a right through our constitution to a free, public education.

This is mandated by law. There are not many other countries in the world that have similar, let alone identical, systems.

American schools are good. They need to get better, as I suspect they will. But the transition will not be painless.




