## Ruidoso schools' enrollment is up

Ruidoso school enrollment is up five students from this same time last year.

As of the official 40-day count, a total of 2,007 individual students are enrolled in the Ruidoso district, either in regular or special education, said Sid Miller, superintendent.

This translates into 1718.5 full time equivalents (FTEs) for state funding purposes in regular education, and 120 FTEs for special education.

Because kindergarten students attend only a half day of school, each individual student counts as one-half an FTE.

At the 40-day count in 1988, the total was 2,002 individual students in the district in both regular and special education.

This year's 40-day count of 1,787 individuals in regular education is 16 students more than the projected figure of 1,771.

The state funds the district a specific amount for each unit value

student. The unit value is determined by a formula which translates an individual student into a single FTE, or one-half an FTE in the case of kindergarten students.

Each grade level FTE is then assigned a value that reflects the cost to educate that child in that grade.

For example, a single kindergarten FTE is worth 1.3 in terms of its unit value. Because the unit value amount for 1989 is \$1,811.51, then each kindergarten FTE is funded

the amount of 1.3 multiplied by \$1,811.51, or approximately \$2,354.96.

In grades one through three, the FTE unit value is 1.1, or about \$1,992.66 per FTE; in grades four through six, the FTE unit value is 1.0, or \$1,811.51 per FTE; in grades seven through 12, the unit value is 1.25, or about \$2,264.39 per FTE.

Students enrolled in special education are funded in larger amounts. There are 120 FTEs in special education in the 1989 40-

day count. Special education students are funded according to their level of service; C level students have a unit value of 1.9, D level have a unit value of 3.5, and DD level have a unit value also of 3.5.

The 1988 funding amount per unit value was \$1,737.78.

These funds do not represent the entire amount of money the district receives from the state, said Miller.

## Village gets the word on highway project plans: 45 mph

Village manager Frank Potter received word on Tuesday evening that the state has selected the two alternates for the widening of Mechem Drive.

According to Potter, he received information from Allen Whitesel of the New Mexico State Highway Department, that the 45 mile per hour design speed alternates have been selected for the new construction of New Mexico State Highway 48, or

Mechem Drive. The Highway Department was considering both a 45 mph speed design and a 35 mph speed design for both the southern half and northern half of the project.

The project itself will be a widening of Highway 48 to four lanes from the Mechem and Sudderth Drive intersection to the Ski Run Road.

The southern half of the project will be from the Sudderth intersection to White Mountain Drive and

will feature a continuous left hand turn lane.

The northern half will be from White Mountain Drive to just past the Ski Run Road. This portion of the project will have selective turnouts for left hand turns.

Potter also said the right of way section of the Highway Department will begin right of way acquisition, for both the north half and south half of the project, in August of 1990.

At a public hearing, October 5,

on the reconstruction of the highway, representatives of the Highway Department and the engineering firm which is doing the design work on the highway, said the schedule called for construction to start on the southern part next summer and the northern part the following summer.

The News was unable to reach Whitesel by telephone in Santa Fe to ask about the project delay.

The 45 mph alternates will sig-

nificantly effect more commercial businesses and residents in the area than the 35 mph alternate would have.


In the southern part of the 45 mph alternate, three commercial businesses will have to be acquired. These include Gary Lynch Realty and A-Frame Cabins.

In the northern part of the 45 mph alternate, two residences and eight commercial businesses will

have to be acquired by the Highway Department. These include Incredible Restaurant, Starr Nursery, Sully's Food Mart and the Wild West Ski Shop and Wild West Storage.

Potter said the Highway Department wants concurrence on the selection from the village mayor and council in a formal council meeting.

That item will be placed on the November 14 agenda.

# State lawmakers meet area leaders

## Legislative Day is a forum for legislators

Four members of the New Mexico State Legislature met with members of the Lincoln County government, the Village of Ruidoso municipal government, the Ruidoso Municipal School Board and members of the news media Monday night at Cree Meadows Restaurant as part of a Legislative Day. (See related story.)

The Legislative Day gathering was the idea of county manager Nick Pappas. It gave the local government representatives a chance to talk with area legislators and ask them questions about the upcoming legislative session.

Present at the gathering for about 50 people were State Representative Ben Hall, Republican of Ruidoso and Representative Toots Green, Republican of Alamogordo. Also present were state senators Joseph Harvey, Democrat of Hobbs and Tim Jennings, Democrat of Roswell.

Each area legislator gave a series of opening remarks, primarily concerning Lincoln County and Ruidoso.

"Lincoln County is a recreation site for now and the future," said Harvey, who recently purchased a home in Ruidoso.

He said Lincoln County and Ruidoso have a lot to offer in the area of recreation. He added that even though some people say they don't want the area to grow, he

urged everyone to continue to make the area grow and develop into a top recreation spot.

"This area is going to be the recreation spot of the southwest for the future," he said.

Hall told the group he is enthusiastic with the things that are happening in Lincoln County. He also said Lincoln County's status in the state would grow.

"Lincoln County will be the hot spot in the state," Hall said.

Green touched on the tourist trade in Ruidoso and how it affected her district. She urged the group to work together to increase and promote the tourist trade.

"We all have unique areas," she said. "We've got to make people realize there are other areas in the state besides Albuquerque."

Jennings said Lincoln County and his district in Roswell have a lot in common. He said the two areas share the same problems, like the funding of public education.

"We need to learn to work together," Jennings said.

Following their introductory statements, village of Ruidoso manager Frank Potter asked the legislators to comment on funding for MainStreet and the civic center, and to talk about the landfill situation in the state.

Harvey said funds for MainStreet and the civic center should come along with other economic development. Lacking of severance tax funds, he urged the

group to consider state tax bonds to produce revenue.

He said the key to the landfill situation is regionalization.

Jennings said the landfill situation is a difficult one to solve. He said Roswell and Ruidoso's plan to have a regional landfill in the Roswell area would place a landfill over a vital water recharge basin.

"I don't know if that is where you want to put a landfill," he said.

In referring to the MainStreet and civic center funding, he said the problem Ruidoso faces is not how to fund the sidewalk project, but how to get traffic off of Sutherland Drive.

He said the civic center will face the same problem getting conventions to come to Ruidoso that other cities in New Mexico have.

Jennings asked the group about two issues he is interested in.

"I would be very interested to find out where your community stands on gambling," he said.

## Accountability may be the key to more money for education

Educators may need to show more accountability in how they spend state monies if they hope to have their legislative wish list fulfilled during the coming state legislative session.

Education funding, as well as landfills and roads, were some of the topics discussed during a meeting of area legislators and area government officials Monday at Cree Meadows Restaurant.

It was a consensus of both the National Education Association of New Mexico and the members of the Fifth Town Hall session that more money is needed for education in the State of New Mexico.

Ruidoso schools superintendent Sid Miller asked the legislators at Monday's meeting how they would raise the money the schools say they need.

"I don't know where we're going to get them," said State Senator Tim Jennings of Roswell.

Jennings said more money is needed for education, but he is upset over the lack of accountability in the school districts.

"We give the money to the schools ... and all we hear is the legislature didn't give enough," said Jennings. "We have no method of knowing if that's enough money or not."

Jennings said it will take 38 million new dollars to fund schools at their current level at a time when the legislature is looking at a \$40 million deficit.

The legislature was told by the education lobby that 2,500 teachers would be lost in the state when the per unit funding amount for the schools from the state was cut a few years ago, said Jennings.

"Only 56 to 60 were lost," he said. "Would you raise taxes?"

Other legislators present were Senator Joe Harvey of Hobbs, and representatives Toots Green of Alamogordo and Ben Hall of Ruidoso.

The event was initiated by county manager Nick Pappas and organized jointly by the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners and the Village of Ruidoso.

Called Legislative Day, it was

organized for local elected and appointed government officials to communicate needs to legislators before they go to Santa Fe for the upcoming session.

Ruidoso village manager Frank Potter said Lincoln County received \$10 million dollars from the state in the last two years.

Although no clear ideas were presented as solutions to the state's landfill dilemma, it was agreed by the legislators that the cost of meeting the new regulations developed by the Environmental Improvement Board will be enormous.

"There's not a city in New Mexico that can afford to comply," said Harvey. "This mandates regionalization."

Regional landfills may be the most economical way to address the disposal of solid waste, but this also creates a problem for residents in rural areas who must drive long distances to a landfill site, said Green.

This situation already contributes to illegal dumping going on in rural areas, said Green.

"If you think people aren't doing it, just take a drive," she said.

The development of a state superfund to clean up problems and fund areas with a low tax base was an idea expressed by Harvey.

This could be funded through gross receipts, with a portion going to the state and the rest going directly back to local government, he said.

Representative Hall said he isn't sure if a gross receipts tax is the solution, especially if some of the funds go through Santa Fe.

"The state will probably be a little bit liable for some of the money," he said.

County attorney J. Robert Beauvais said counties need an absolute commitment that the legislature will address the landfill issue.

"I encourage you to stay in session as long as it takes," said Beauvais.

The legislators also said they are committed to improving roads as a part of economic development.

"Without a doubt, (Lincoln County) will be the recreation center of the southwest," said Harvey.

## Ruidoso moves to annex new airport

The Ruidoso Village Council wasted no time Tuesday in setting November 28 as the date for three public hearings on zoning amendments and annexation of village property.

One of the public hearings will involve amendments to chapter eight of the building codes and chapter 10 of the zoning, planning and subdivision code.

Planning administrator Cleatus Richards told the council following a public hearing on October 16, the Planning Commission approved the amendments and recommended the adoption of the amendments, in the form of Ordinance 89-5, by the council.

He also said the Planning Commission is willing to hold a workshop session with the council to answer questions. That workshop meeting is scheduled for November 20 in conjunction with the Planning Commission's regular meeting.

The other two public meetings involve the village annexing Wingfield Park, also known as the Hall property, and the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport.

In other actions, the council awarded a bid for a water system at Sierra Blanca Regional Airport to Eidson Steel Products Incorporated of Albuquerque.

Village purchasing agent Fonda Hazel told the council that she, Water Department head Richard Sanchez and airport manager Tim Morris all recommend the village purchase a 100,000 gallon tank system from Eidson for \$74,860. She also pointed out to the council there are federal funds available for this project. Councillor Jess Stinson made the motion to accept the bid.

The council approved the transfer of ownership of two wells in the Eagle Creek well field to the Eagle Creek Intercommunity Water Supply Association.

Village manager Frank Potter explained that the association will cleanup paperwork and get everything documented. He said the transfer of the wells will not decrease the water Ruidoso receives from the well field.

The transfer will incorporate all the wells on land owned by the Eagle Creek Intercommunity Water Supply Association into its jurisdiction and relieve the Village of Ruidoso of the financial burden of maintaining the wells.

The councillors also passed a final adoption of the 1989-90 fiscal year budget.

Village finance director John Varley said adoption of the budget makes it legally binding on the village and brings it into state statutory compliance.

Councillors also passed a final resolution on the 1988-89 budget.

Varley told the council the Department of Financial Affairs had approved the village's final budget resolution. He said the only change in the final resolution was an in-

crease in the Internal Services Fund revenues of \$390.

The council approved a motion to terminate, within 30 days, an agreement with the Kiwanis Club for the use of an old hangar as a teen center at the old municipal airport. The building will have to be vacated before construction can begin on the Ruidoso Golf Club and a resort hotel at that location.

Mayor Lloyd Davis read a proclamation proclaiming Wednesday, November 1, as Michael Malis Day.

Six-year-old Malis suffers from incurable liver disease and is awaiting a donated liver for a liver transplant.

Davis also named Diane Vowell, Rick Arlaud and Jeff Chapman to fill vacancies on the Lodgers Tax Advisory Board and Liz Munro to fill a vacancy on the Library Board.

At the request of MainStreet Ruidoso president Herb Brunell, Davis also named councillor J.D. James as a liaison between the council and MainStreet.

At the conclusion of the regular agenda items, Barbara Duff stood and told the council she is concerned and disturbed over rumors that the village had voted on a deficit budget and is \$250,000 in the red this year.

She said Jim Baker, a local retired individual who worked with the council on last year's budget, will be speaking at the Service Club Council of Lincoln County meeting, Monday at noon. She invited the council and village officials to come to the meeting and discuss the budget and answer questions concerning these rumors.

Mayor Davis said he did not feel that was the appropriate place to discuss village business.

Potter said he was concerned that the Service Club Council was not a representation of the service club presidents. He also addressed the rumors concerning voting on a deficit budget.

"We are not allowed deficit spending by anyone," he said. Councillors Stinson and Tom McNeil asked Duff where she got her figures about the village budget. She said she had heard it at the Federated Republican Women's meeting.

Duff also asked why village vehicles were at Grindstone Dam if the village had approved a contract with a company for sealing the dam. She also asked about a rumor that the village is paying an engineer firm \$80,000.

Potter assured her village consulting engineer John Shaw was not paid \$60,000. He said the village would soon be finished at Grindstone and the process of filling it would begin in two weeks.

Councillor James held up a copy of a listing of checks issued by the village and said there was no such payment.

"I don't care what other reports are going around, I am satisfied," he said.

James also said he believed he could get a motion to that effect seconded during the regular meeting.

Junge left the council chambers after the budget workshop and did not return for the regular council meeting at 6:30 p.m.

# Tax bills are in the mail

The county tax office mailed tax bills to Lincoln County property owners this week.

Capitan still leads the county in tax rates, with the Village of Ruidoso running a close second due to its recent implementation of the maximum in operational mill levies.

The Hondo school district imposes the highest school tax, with Capitan second and Ruidoso third.

According to the certificate of tax rates provided by the tax assessor, Lincoln County has net taxable property valued at \$278,949,136 in all its various taxing entities.

Tax rates as recorded below from the certificate of tax rates are expressed in dollars per thousand dollars of net taxable value.

In the Village of Ruidoso, residential property has a taxable value of \$103,004,336; and non-residential property has a taxable value of \$42,296,567.

The total is 37,489 for residential property in the Village of Ruidoso and 39,769 for non-residential property in the village limits.

Of the 37,489 for village property owners, it is allocated: 1.762 for state debt service; 5.093 for county operations; 1.750, county special projects; 6.873, municipal operational; 11.169, municipal debt service; 8.399, school district; 1.869, Ruidoso Hondo Valley Center (Lincoln County Medical Center); and 0.574, Carrizozo Health Center.

The non-residential Village of Ruidoso assessment is divided: 1.762, state debt service; 8.235, county operations and special projects; 18.253, municipal operations and debt service; 8.408, school district; 2.379, Lincoln County Medical Center; 0.732, Carrizozo Health Center.

The Village of Capitan has a total taxable value of \$3,543,876 residential and \$1,991,169 non-residential.

Capitan residential property owners are assessed 40,354, and non-residential property owners are billed 43,197. For residential owners that translates to: 1.762, state debt service; 6.843, county operational and special projects; 20,586, municipal operational and debt service; 8,720, school district; 1,869, county hospital; and 0.574, Carrizozo Health Center.

Capitan non-residential property owners pay 43,197: 1.762, state debt service; 8.235, county operational and special projects; 21,329, municipal operational and debt service; 8,760, school district; 2,379, Ruidoso Hondo Valley Center; and Carrizozo Health Center, 0.732.

Capitan school district property owners who live outside village limits are assessed 20,210 for residential and 22,219 for non-residential.

The breakdown on residential is: 1.762, state debt service; 6.843, county operational and special projects; 8,720, school district; 1,869, county hospital; 0.574, Carrizozo Health Center; and 0.442, Chaves Soil and Water Conservation District.

Non-residential property in that same area is assessed: 1.762, state debt service; 8.235, county operational and special projects; 8,760, school district; 2,379, county hospital; 0.732, Carrizozo Health Center; and 0.351, Chaves Soil and Water Conservation District.

The Village of Ruidoso Downs has residential property with a taxable value of \$6,415,046; and non-residential property with a taxable value of \$8,346,499.

The residential rate in the Village of Ruidoso Downs is 30.846, divided: 1.762, state debt service; 6.843, county operational and special projects; 11.399, municipal operational and debt service; 8.399, school district; 1.869, Lincoln County Medical Center; and 0.574, Carrizozo Health Center.

The non-residential rate in Ruidoso Downs is at 33.294, allocated: 1.762, state debt service; 8.235, county operational and special projects; 11.778, municipal operational and debt service; 8.408, school district; 2.379, Lincoln County Medical Center; and 0.732, Carrizozo Health Center.

County property owners with property in the Ruidoso School District, but outside any village, have residential property with a value of \$10,484,818; and non-residential property with a taxable value of \$11,673,708. Those owners are assessed at 19.447 residential and 21.516 non-residential.

For residential owners that is broken down by 1.762, state debt service; 6.843, county operational and special projects; 8.399, school district; 1.869, hospital; and 0.574, Carrizozo Health Center.

For non-residential owners in those same areas, the tax is allocated: 1.762, state debt service; 8.235, county operational and special projects; 8.408, school district; 2.379, county hospital; and 0.732, Carrizozo Health Center.

Carrizozo has residential property valued at \$2,592,917; and non-residential property valued at \$1,791,712.

Carrizozo residential owners are taxes at 23.692: 1.762, state debt service; 6.843, county operational and special projects; 5.650, municipal operational and debt service; 6.995, school district; 1.869, county hospital; and 0.574 Carrizozo Health Center.

Carrizozo non-residential owners are assessed 26,714: 1.762, state debt service; 8.235, county operational and special projects; 6.109, municipal operational and debt service; 7.497, school district; 2.379, county hospital; and 0.732, Carrizozo Health Center.

Property owners in the Carrizozo school district are levied 18,484 for residential and 20,956 for non-residential.

For residential that equates to: 1.762, state debt service; 6.843, county operational and special projects; 6.994, school district; 1.869, county hospital; 0.574, Carrizozo Health Center; and 0.442, Chaves Soil and Water Conservation District.

The non-residential breakdown in that area is 1.762, state debt service; 8.235, county operational and special projects; 7.497, school district; 2.379, county hospital; 0.732 Carrizozo Health Center; and 0.351, Chaves Soil and Water Conservation District.

Corona property has a taxable value of \$379,702 for residential and \$509,358 for non-residential.

Corona residential property owners are taxed at 16.425, and non-residential property owners are assessed 20.030.

For residential that's: 1.762, state debt service; 6.843, county operational and special projects; 3.044, municipal operational; 2.333, school district; 1.869, county hospital; and 0.574, Carrizozo Health Center.

Corona non-residential property tax is allocated: 1.762, state debt service; 8.235, county operational and special projects; 4.425, municipal operational; 2.497, school district; 2.379, county hospital; and 0.732, Carrizozo Health Center.

Property outside Corona municipal limits, but within Corona school district, is assessed 13.823 for residential and 15.956 for non-residential.

That's broken down, for residential: 1.762, state debt service; 6.843, county operational and special projects; 2.333, school district; 1.869, county hospital; 0.574, Carrizozo Health Center; and 0.442, Chaves Soil and Water Conservation District.

For non-residential, that's: 1.762, state debt service; 8.235, county operational and special projects; 2.497, school district; 2.379, county hospital; 0.732, Carrizozo Health Center; and 0.351, Chaves Soil and Water Conservation District.

In the Hondo school district, residential property owners are assessed 22.216; and non-residential property owners are billed 24.275. That's broken down for residential at: 1.762, state debt service; 6.843, county operational and special projects; 10.726, school district; 1.869, county hospital; 0.574, Carrizozo Health Center; and 0.442, Chaves Soil and Water Conservation District.

For Hondo school district non-residential owners, the assessment is allocated: 1.762, state debt service; 8.235, county operational and special projects; 10.816, school district; 2.379, county hospital; 0.732, Carrizozo Health Center; and 0.351, Chaves Soil and Water Conservation District.

Other assessments in Lincoln County include: 17,353 for property owners in the Alpine Village Sanitation District; 6,150 for those in Sun Valley Sanitation District; 1,00 for residential property in the Upper Hondo SWCD; 0.914, non-residential Upper Hondo SWCD; 1.00, Carrizozo SWCD residential; and 0.252, Carrizozo SWCD non-residential.

Other assessment, where applicable, include 10,000, cattle indemnity; 20,00, sheep sanitary; 10,00, dairy cattle and predator control at five center per head on cattle and 10 center per head on sheep and goats.

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# The Silver Lining

## DR. KENNETH KURITA

Services were held October twenty-five at the Martin Funeral Home Chapel in El Paso for Dr. Kenneth Kurita who was called Home by Our Lord on October twenty-five from his farm home in Glencoe.

Father Ken Doce performed the services and the eulogy was delivered by Dr. Kurita's brother, George.

Dr. Kurita was born in Brighton, Colorado, March seventeen, 1919, to Sam and Teru Kurita. About 1930, the family moved to El Paso, which became the doctor's city of destiny.

His mother was a midwife who delivered many babies for poor people in El Paso. The doctor's daughter, Patricia Neumeier, says: "She never took any money for her services, and often left a ten dollar bill under the mother's pillow, and left some chicken soup in the house."

Patricia (I am guessing that her name derives from the fact that her father was born on Saint Patrick's Day) says that Dr. Kurita's mother was his role model, and his inspiration for his determination and perseverance in becoming a doctor, and

for his devotion to mothers and babies during forty years covering three generations.

After studies in El Paso High, The School of Mines, and the University of Colorado Medical School, he took his special training in gynecology and obstetrics in Nebraska and Illinois, he returned to El Paso, in 1946 and began his life as a doctor.

Patricia says: "My father was chief of staff of the Newark Medical Clinic and had an office in Canutillo. He never turned anybody down, and did much charity work. People would pay him the best way they could—a sack of onions or a sack of potatoes—or they would make him bread, carrot cake, or zucchini squash bread. My father was dearly beloved, and the funeral chapel was filled with people of three generations that he had brought into this world."

Dr. Laurence Nickey, Director of the City County Health service said: "This was a man who came out in the middle of the night to deliver babies."

The doctor's brother, George, in the Eulogy said:

"We had a happy childhood. He was a beloved younger brother, a

companion and advisor for seventy years. We measure a man not by what he gains but by what he gives. My brother gave much. He made many mummies and daddies happy by bringing their prides and joys into the world. All through this area these babies grew up and became mummies and daddies for three generations."

Dr. Kurita has been a good friend and neighbor here among us in Glencoe, since he arrived on his apple farm in 1966. He will always hold a fond spot in our hearts and we rejoice that he is safe and happy with our Lord and loved ones who have gone on before, in Heaven.

Here I am across the creek where I have spent most of my eighty years on the last day of my birthday month, remembering all the kindness of the last few days. I am grateful for all the fond wishes expressed in words and cards.

## Edna Falls donates time, talents

If every member of the Ruidoso Care Center Auxiliary were as diligent in meeting patients' needs as Edna Falls, there would never be a need to ask the public for help.

Falls has been a member of the auxiliary only since Barbara Duff took her to a meeting in August.

Since then she has made 52 "touch cushions" and 36 lap robes for patients at the center. Her goal is to make 90 lap robes.

The "touch cushions" are applied and are for patients with Alzheimer's disease.

Carole Wall, president of the auxiliary, says that "the sense of touch is the last to go" in people who have Alzheimer's disease. The velour cushions provide some satisfaction to patients.

The bright figures sewn on the cushions are cut from velour bedspreads from Shadow Mountain

Lodge. Falls found that shredding plastic clothes bags and mixing that material with styrofoam makes a good "stuffing" for the cushions.

Sewing is second nature to Falls; she once had an interior decorating shop in Clovis. She came to Ruidoso in 1971 from Bisbee, Arizona, and has rental property in the area behind the old Whispering Pines Restaurant in the Upper Canyon.

"I can do this at home," she said of her home economic endeavors on behalf of care center clients.

"It's hard work, but it keeps me young," Falls said. She will be 80 in February, so she relates perfectly with the patients she serves.

Wall and Falls both said the care center is endeavoring to provide as much of a home environment as possible for care center clients. In developmentally disabled

units of four to five people each, care center personnel and auxiliary members are trying to make designated areas of the center "homey."

Wall said tables are set for meals, pictures are on the walls, bookcases have books in them, and a general atmosphere "like home" is provided.

To help furnish the developmentally disabled units, the auxiliary is seeking donations of household goods such as small appliances, cutlery, napkins, dishes and even small refrigerators and microwave ovens.

In fact, there is a long list of needed items which the care center can provide to interested persons. Personal items always are in short supply.

"Bean chairs" often furnish a respite from a wheel chair. These would be welcome, Wall says.

## Taxes go up due to state board snafu

Capitan residents may be a bit surprised when they open their tax bills and see a substantial rate increase.

The county treasurer's office has already received numerous calls about the tax rate, which increased over last year's because of a snafu in Santa Fe, said Shirely Goodloe, Lincoln County Treasurer.

The State Board of Education sent the wrong rate to the Department of Finance and Administration for tax collection in the Capitan School District during the 1988-89 tax year, said Goodloe.

As a result, the State Board undercollected from the Capitan district. To make up for the error, a rate increase was installed to recoup the taxes and bring the district up to date, said Goodloe.

Tax rates for the next tax year should decline once this error is corrected, she said.

There were no new property revaluations done, said Goodloe. Tax rates in other areas of the county are generally unchanged.

The due date for the first half of tax payments is November 10. Tax payments become delinquent after December 10.

If a tax bill is \$10 or less, it must be paid in full. Otherwise, a taxpayer may pay their bill one half at a time.

Second half payments will be due April 10, 1990, and become delinquent after May 10, 1990.

On October 25, a tax sale was conducted of properties delinquent since 1985.

Thirteen properties were sold, raising about \$14,000, said Goodloe.

A total of 124 properties were available in the sale. Those that weren't sold will be available during next year's tax sale.

## Extension seminar on leadership is approaching

The registration deadline for a leadership skills workshop to be conducted in the mountains near Santa Fe is November 8.

The Family Community Leadership (FCL) training seminar will be conducted the weekend of December 6 through 8 at the Glorieta Baptist Conference Center in Glorieta, New Mexico.

The development of leadership skills used in public policy-making situations is the goal of the session, which is open to individuals and to state and county Cooperative Extension Service employees.

"What participants learn will be useful not only to them, but to their organizations and communities, because they, in turn, train others to use these methods," said Mary Ellen Payne-McKay, FCL program coordinator.

Topics to be covered include how to testify, group leadership skills, effective presentations, state and local government funding, and others.

The FCL program began in 1981 in six western states as a pilot project funded by the W.K. Kellogg Foundation. It is an adult education program primarily for women, and is jointly sponsored by the New

Mexico Cooperative Extension Service and the Extension Homemakers Council.

A registration fee of \$75 covers two nights lodging, seven meals and conference materials. For more

## BLM requesting input on management plan in district

The Bureau of Land Management (BLM) plans to develop a Resource Management Plan (RMP) for the Roswell Resource Area and will accept public input.

"The plan will establish future management actions on approximately 1.5 million acres of public land and 2.4 million acres of subsurface mineral resources managed by the Roswell Resource Area," said a new release from the BLM.

The planning area includes both public land and federal mineral ownership in Lincoln County.

Items to be covered in the RMP include acquisition, exchanges and access of public lands, and the management of special areas for significant scenic, riparian, cultural,

wildlife, plant or other values.

Public input will begin with the identification of issues and planning criteria in April of 1991. Comments will then be accepted until September 1991.



## Henson punts his way to fame

Believe it when 1987 Ruidoso High School graduate, Garret Henson says, "I set a goal that I was going to see some action on the kicking game."

As a walk-on punter for the New Mexico State Aggie football team, Henson has worked his way into a secure spot as starting punter and then kicked his way to number 20 in the nation on gross average punts. He is number 33 in the nation for net average punting with an average of 40.4 yards per punt.

Even though the Aggies have not won a game this year, the team still has something to talk about with this six-foot, 170-pound kicker from Ruidoso.

Henson outpunted Roman Mudd, who was brought to New Mexico from Nevada on a punting scholarship.

"We (Henson and Mudd) had a competition for the first-string position," Henson said.

"Every day the coaches would time our day time, release time and charted our distance. It was a daily competition out at practice up until the day before the first game against Oklahoma," he said.

The coaches made a wise decision and Henson has accomplished his goal. He was the starting punter for the Ags in that season opener against Oklahoma.

Not seeing any action on the football field the previous two years, Henson was a little excited to be playing against the top-ranked Sooners.

"It will definitely be an experience I won't soon forget," he said after going to Norman, Oklahoma.

Being 20 years old and on stage before a larger than average crowd, Henson was overwhelmed by different emotions. Not only nervous about his inexperience, Garret also remembered watching the Oklahoma Sooners on television when he was in high school.

"It was so hard to clear your mind. There were thousands of fans there yelling at the top of their lungs and there I was playing my first game against a team like that," Henson said.

Losing to the Sooners 73-3, Garret thought it was still an important game.

"The score may have been ridiculous but the experience you gain by playing a team like that is great. It let us see what level a college team can achieve," he said.

The punting season is almost over for this year, but Garret Henson has made more than a mark in national competition. Previously ranked in the top-20 punters in the nation, Henson has kept a consistent leg stroke.

He is third in the Big West Conference and has punted more than 43 times this year.

As a member of the state champion Ruidoso High School Warriors, Henson saw plenty of action. He kicked and punted on the varsity team for two years and during his senior year he also played split end.

According to Ronny Maskew, a nine-year veteran football coach for the Ruidoso High School Warriors, Henson had good potential as a field goal kicker also.

"He was a consistent extra point

kicker and a good kickoff man," Maskew said.

"He used to kick off for the team and would usually get the ball in the end zone," Maskew said, explaining how this put the other team's offense in a bad position and helped the Warrior defense.

Being an all around athlete, Henson played basketball and ran on the state champion 400-meter relay team in track.

Henson is the son of Rick and Carolyn Henson of Ruidoso. His father is general manager of Ruidoso Downs Race Track and his mother

is a Realtor with Coldwell Banker. Garret's younger brother, Keith Henson, is a sophomore at RHS and a member of this year's Warrior football team.

Garret Henson attributes part of his success at NMSU to the good snaps and blocking from the punting team.

Business is his major field of study and his mind is set on an economical goal.

"It would be nice to have a scholarship (for playing on a team.) But I guess that can be a new goal of mine," said Henson.

## Warriors set sights on district

Fourth-ranked Cobre will try and oust the sixth-ranked Ruidoso Warriors from any district championship hopes this Friday night.

The Indians are 8-2 this season and have lost only to Lovington (37-14) and Animas (29-0).

Cobre beat Deming by the same score that the Warriors beat Deming, 14-0, and have similar point spread wins over Socorro and Silver City.

The Indians' highest scoring game was against Tularosa, winning 55-6.

All in all, it looks like the Warriors will have an even match up Friday night.

With eleven returning starters from last year's 4-7 team, Cobre has learned a few things.

Third year head coach Henry Carrillo has an overall record of 19-15.

This year the Indians have a scoring average of 22.7 points per game, with the Cobre defense allowing 10.9 points per game.

Some of the players to keep under control are seniors, Billy Davila, quarterback and a kick off return man; Tobby Padilla, back, and Alex Tovar at wing back.

Big players on the team are junior Robert Escobar at 198 pounds and senior David Martin at 187 pounds.

The Cobre Indians are not a big team but the players have a quick and aggressive pursuit on defense and are quick off the line on the offense.

The Indians play a Wing-T offense and an eight man multiple front defense.

The way Ruidoso played last week was the way the Warriors

Ira is from Mescalero and has lived in the Ruidoso area all his life.

Being proud of his heritage, Ira doesn't hesitate in telling he's 100 percent Mescalero Apache.

Playing football from eighth grade till last year, he was a starting tailback on the Warriors State Championship football team.

Ira also played basketball for two years, but his most im-

pressive achievement was becoming the 800-meter state champion in track last year.

Running is Ira Sago's specialty and he has dropped out of other sports to train all year for the 800-meter race in the spring. His time last year for the 800-meter (That's about two laps around the track.) was 1:59.13.

"Billy Mills, he's a Sioux Indian, came out and talked to us. He was the first American to win the 10,000 meters," Ira said, when asked about his olympic goal.

Mills was at RHS two years ago and talked to students about the olympics.

Taking his goals seriously, Sago is training for the 800-meter by running for the Ruidoso High School cross country team this year, and not playing football. This gives him a five-mile running workout per day, and competition on the weekends.

Sago is currently the top cross country runner in the district and hopes to do well at the state meet.

When the cross country season is over Ira will continue his training.

"I'll usually run three miles in the morning and four miles at night," he said. "I'll run about 35 miles a week during the off season."

If that isn't enough, two days a week he'll go to the track and run sprints.

I think of 40 to 50 yard sprints, but Sago thinks of 100 and 200 yard sprints.

"It works on my quickness," he added.

Scholastically, Sago is interested in psychology and would like to go to college in Colorado somewhere.



Of all the Breeder's Cup races the \$3 Million Classic is expected to draw the most attention with a grudge match between Easy Goer and Sunday Silence. The score is now two to one in favor of Sunday Silence who won the Kentucky

Derby and the Preakness Stakes but lost to Easy Goer in the Belmont Stakes.

Both are coming off impressive victories: Sunday Silence destroyed his opposition in the \$1 Million Super Derby at Louisiana Downs in September while Easy Goer easily handled a field of older horses in the \$1 Million Jockey Club Gold Cup. A victory by either one of these horses in this race could clinch the Horse Of The Year honors especially since there has been no clear stand-out in the older horse handicap division.

Expected to give some competition to those two is the recent Pennsylvania Derby winner by 17 lengths, Western Playboy.

Earlier this spring, Western Playboy won the Jim Beam and the Blue Grass Stakes and was one of the early favorites to win the Kentucky Derby.

The Breeders' Cup Turf drew an outstanding field of turf horses including; the winner of Sunday's Budweiser International at Laurel, Caltech; one of the most consistent grass runners and winner of three Grade I grass stakes this year, El Senor; the winner of the Group I Juddmonte International at York in England, Ile De Chypre; the 1988 American grass champion, Sunshine Forever; and the winner of the Arlington Million, Steinlen.

Other horses worth mentioning in other races include: Bayakoa in the Breeders' Cup Distaff. Bayakoa charged to an 11 and 1/2 victory in the \$250,000 Grade-I Spinster Stakes at Keeneland in Lexington, Kentucky, October 14.

Zizal will be the odds-on choice in the Breeders' Cup Mile as he is widely regarded as the best miler in Europe and has won all five of his starts. However, the Mile is Arlington Million winner Steinlen's first entry choice.

In the Juvenile, Adjudicating and stable-mate Rhythm, both owned by Ogden Mills Phipps, will try to out run each other again as they finished first and second by one-half of a length in the \$500,000 Champagne Stakes at Belmont Park, October 14.

The Juvenile Fillies looks to be wide open but Stella Madrid just recently beat Go For Wand one-half of a length in the \$250,000 Fризette Stakes at Belmont Park.

The Breeders' Cup Sprint matches a very competitive bunch of speedsters including D. Wayne Lukas' hard knocking On The Line and Barry Weisbord's outstanding three-year-old filly Safely Kept. Sewickley could give chase as he beat Once Wild and Mr. Nickerson in the \$200,000 Vosburgh Stakes at Belmont on October 8.

Sam Who is also worth mentioning as he recently beat a good field of sprinters in the \$75,000 Ancient Title Handicap at Santa Anita in a stakes record time of 1:08.

## Track 'n Tack

After 10 days of racing in the 1989/90 racing season, Sunland Park's total handle stands at \$4,834,618. That compares to \$2,518,914 for the first ten days of last year and represents an increase of 91.9%.

The New Mexico Intertrack network is the reason for the big boost with daily handle averaging a total \$225,095 at the four off-track sites.

On track, Sunland has handled \$2,583,669 as compared to \$2,518,914 last season which means the on-track handle is up 2.5 percent.

The racing world looks toward this Saturday's Breeders Cup races

at Gulfstream Park in Florida. Sunland Park will present simulcast wagering on the Breeders Cup and will offer five live races with a special early first post time set for 11 a.m.

Sunland Park fans will be able to watch and wager on the \$100,000 Remington Green Handicap on Sunday, November 5th.

Just A Tab, winner of the New Mexico State Fair Handicap and the recent Red Earth Derby at Remington, is expected to start in the 1 and 1/8 mile race on the Turf.

The Gray-colored speedster already has lifetime earnings of over \$350,000 having won 12 of 15 starts and numerous stakes in this state.

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
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
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# Americans sweep the USSR/USA challenge

# New teachers join Ruidoso High School faculty

## BonnaDell Ortega

A Native American language is now being taught at Ruidoso High School (RHS).

Students can learn the Apache language from BonnaDell Ortega, someone who knows about it first-hand. She is fully versed in the Apache culture and language.

"I learned the Apache language before English," said Ortega, a new member of the RHS faculty.

Attending numerous universities in her educational studies, she has seen a wide variety of teaching methods.

During high school she also attended the University of Albuquerque, learning about New Mexico's Head Start program. From there she went to Greeley, Colorado, where she received more training for Head Start and took classes in child psychology and development.

Next Ortega traveled to Fort Lewis College and studied business administration for a year.

In 1967 she became director of the Head Start program on the Mescalero Reservation. This was a new pilot program which she helped foster for five years.

After that Ortega worked two years as a traditional counselor supervisor for the Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe. This involved working with high school youths and young families.

In February of 1989 she became a math aide at RHS and continues to perform these duties.

Teaching two classes on the Apache language involves more than reading and writing. Apache

is not a strong written language. Although she uses a dictionary of Apache words in her course, students are also taught Apache culture.

Starting her teaching career as a student at the Royal Naval College in Dartmouth England, she knows Spanish and English like the front of her nose.


After spending 10 years in England she went to Paris to learn French.



### The Plant Corner by Sally Black



The question and answer period ran short at the Garden Club meeting the other day and I promised to do this entire column on scale insects.

Personally, the only plants I ever had with scale insects were my citrus trees. I was really somewhat surprised to hear that some of you had been troubled with brown scale on the ficus trees. I have never seen a scale on any of my ficus trees.

So I have been searching my books to learn all I could about these little pests to help out all I can. I have learned a lot about this little bug.

Some of the plants scale seems partial to are citrus, rubber trees, palms, ferns, Dracaena, and some ivies. If you have any of these plants, always wear your glasses when checking these plants for scales, as they are hard to see until the infestation is severe. I overlooked them on my orange tree, thinking they were just part of the leaf.

They line up so neatly along the stem and veins of the underside of the leaves, they look like they belong there. Scales congregate on the undersides of leaves along the main veins and look like oval spots about 1/8 inch long, but their yellowish or greenish brown color does make them hard to see at first.

At this stage the scales encrust stems and leaves like lumpy blisters and the plant may yellow and die if not treated. Scales also deposit honeydew, a sticky substance which attracts a black mold on the leaves causing the plants to become stunted and die if not

treated. As an adult, the scale lives under a stationary, waxy shell that sticks to the plant. It lays its eggs in there. When the eggs hatch the young crawl out and go elsewhere on the plant to establish themselves as mature, fixed lumps or flat slivers.

A tiny filament mouth part runs from the underside of the creature into the plant tissue. Through it the creature sucks plant juices, killing the plant.

If you find this hideous little pest early you may be able to control them by using a cotton ball soaked in rubbing alcohol to wipe each leaf and stem. Another non-

chemical way of treatment is frequently washing the plant undersides with soap suds. Let the suds remain on the leaves and stems five or 10 minutes and rinse with warm water. The next treatment should be the alcohol swab.

Researchers in California have studied extensively the parasites and predators of scales. If weather permits, move the plants to the deck or the patio and the wasps will eat three meals a day on scales.

Now, when all else fails, use a chemical spray in a well ventilated area. Mix Volck oil spray with Malathion. Follow the instructions on the Malathion label. The oil mixture will allow the Malathion to stick to the plant better.

I now rate this insidious little creature right down there with the creepy, ugly, cotton headed mealy bug.

I hope I have helped you. I have learned much about scales.

### DEAR EDITOR:

Your article of September 28th on rezoning Main Street in the Upper Canyon was interesting but unfortunately came to the wrong conclusion. The matter is not ended, because the mayor and council simply acted contrary to the ordinance requiring a three-quarter vote. I realize we are used to it, but ordinarily it is a matter of lack of knowledge, being unprepared, not caring, no direction—just a bunch of the good ole boys have a good ole time!

In this situation there had been considerable publicity, public hearings, etc. and the matter was well-defined. The question to be acted upon was the P&Z recommendation to rezone some properties from R-1 to C-1. (There was one nay vote on that recommendation). At the com-

bination public hearing meeting and regular City Council meeting of 9-26, item PZ-89-001, it was even noted that "a 3/4 vote of Council is required" for approval or denial of the P&Z recommendations.

Yet, led by our charmingly inept Mayor with his useless vote (as he put it), the Council voted a 3-3 tie on the P&Z recommendation which motion then allegedly failed on the tie vote. Then the interpretation was made that this left the zoning as is. Incredible. What the tie vote did was approve the P&Z recommendation to rezone by failing a 3/4 vote to deny!

The sorry part of this whole thing is that no one, including the newspaper, brought up the fact that McNeil's two-part motion was out of order (i.e. to deny rezoning and leave zoning as is); so, where

was our all-knowing parliamentarian when needed?

Then to NOT require the 3/4 vote as called for on the notice! Where were the attorneys, the city manager and the mayor? The only correct motion was made by Junge and it died for a lack of a second.

So citizen voters of Ruidoso—you keep getting what you deserve—a mayor who does not prepare, a majority of the council that hasn't time to do its homework, or worst case, doesn't appear to know what it is doing, and managers and division directors who teach Robert's Rules of Order but won't follow them.

Perhaps it is not altogether accidental that this group—the mayor to whom no law applies—the city manager who talks a good game and enforces no laws, a division director who himself will not follow

ordinances or law (the case of the barking dogs), and a council so unconcerned about enforcement they will not even fund full-time enforcement employees—really doesn't intend to allow government to function in a responsive manner.

It may be this has led to voter apathy ... "you can't fight City Hall" - the arrogance of power - and the small town good ole boy network that continues to operate on the basis of "it ain't what you know, it's who you know."

Oh well—elections are coming. Let's just hope this last mayor and council malfunction doesn't bring on a class action suit, and cost we taxpayers another bundle to defend.

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

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

## Cookbook features La Junta recipes

Around these parts, Bob and Katherine Finley are known for their cooking.

Their annual Cajun Festival, at their La Junta Guest Ranch, features some of the best Louisiana cajun style cooking, west of the Sabine River.

However, until now you had to be a guest of theirs to enjoy the delicious meals served at the ranch. Thanks to the numerous requests for recipes from the participants with the Eastern New Mexico University (ENMU) Elderhostel Program, everyone can now try some of the Finleys' tasty dishes.

A cookbook entitled "Served at La Junta," featuring some of the Finleys' recipes, has been published by the University Printing Services at ENMU.

The ENMU was the idea of Dr. Janet Roehl, director of the University Outreach Program at ENMU, which includes the Elderhostel Program.

Roehl said the Elderhostel Program has had five of their educational programs at La Junta, and every time the participants kept asking the Finleys for their recipes.

"They kept liking different ones, so she (Katherine) went through all her files and gave us this collection," said Roehl.

The Elderhostel Program is a nationwide, non-profit, education program for people 62 years of age or over. It is sponsored by universities across the country, like ENMU, and brings together people from all parts of the country for one week classes on a variety of subjects like landscape drawing, music

therapy and stress management.

Because different people from across the country attend the different sessions, many people were getting their first taste of the Finley's home cooked meals.

"The lovely cajun recipes are something else," said Audrey Komerek from Milwaukee, Wisconsin. "I have never tasted anything like it before."

"They're so tasty, new things I have never tasted before," said Margaret Becker, Komerek's sister from Whittier, California. "After these meals, they give us these wonderful desserts."

"We look forward to the meetings and the meals, but we also look forward to trying the recipes ourselves," said Komerek.

Jules and Naomi Dubois of Midwest City, Oklahoma, were attending their 18th Elderhostel program and they said the food at La Junta was the best. They say they will definitely try and attend another program at La Junta.

"If we have the opportunity, we sure will," said Naomi. "Just for the food too," said Jules.

When asked if she would purchase one of the cookbooks, Naomi replied, "I have already purchased it."

Katherine Finley says she is a little overwhelmed with the initial response to the cookbook. But she added, it tickles her when someone gets excited about one of her recipes.

She said she never thought about doing a cookbook, but it was a fun project to do. She went on to say Roehl and the people at ENMU did a fabulous job putting it together considering the 180 mile distance between La Junta and

Portales.

She said she was happy the cookbook was published through the Elderhostel program since many of the recipes are good for older people.

"The reason is the food is cooked with low cholesterol and low fat content," said Finley.


She said all the recipes were good, but she recommended the following recipe, from the cookbook, for the cold winter nights ahead.

### CHICKEN SAUSAGE GUMBO

- 1 cup oil
  - 1 cup flour
  - 1 pound hot link sausage
  - 8 chicken breasts, skinned and deboned
  - 4 cups chopped onions
  - 2 cups chopped bell peppers and celery
  - 1/2 cup minced garlic
  - 8 cans tomato broth
  - 2 cups finely diced fresh parsley and green onions.
- Make roux, browning the flour in oil until it is very brown. Season the chicken with salt, pepper and cayenne. Brown the chicken and add the sausage, saute greens. Gradually add broth. Bring to a boil. Reduce to simmer and cook for an hour. Sprinkle the chopped parsley and green onions on top. Serve over rice.
