Council votes to annex new airport, park land

The Ruidoso Village Council Tuesday unanimously approved three ordinances which amended the village's Zoning Code and annexed the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport (SBRA) and Wingfield Park.

Mayor Pro-tem J.D. James presided in the absence of Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr., who was out of town.

Before the meeting began, the council was treated to a puppet show, "Keep off the Grass," sponsored by the Altrusa Club. The puppet show presented an anti-drug message.

When the meeting began, planning administrator Cleatus Richards said amendments outlined in Ordinance 89-5 modify the Building Permit Fee System, regulate the moving and demolition of buildings and amend the Zoning Code Regulations on administra-

tion, definitions, zoning district regulations, development standards, signs, fees and subdivisions.

Councillor Al Junge made the motion and the council unanimously adopted the ordinance.

The Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) recommended annexing Wingfield Park, and Richards told the council the action will bring municipally-owned property under village control and allow the village to establish zoning regulations.

Junge asked Richards if the annexation of Wingfield Park will leave any property around Grindstone Dam that is not in the village limits.

Richards said the annexation will "close the loop" around Grindstone Dam and all the property in the area will be in the village limits.

Junge asked if the village had any plans to annex any pockets of county land within the village

limits, and Richards said some of the areas are under study.

Councillor Larry Simon made the motion to accept Ordinance 89-6 regarding the annexation of Wingfield Park.

Richards said the SBRA is owned by the Village of Ruidoso, having been deeded over by Lincoln County and the airport commission.

"Annexation will allow us to develop specific controls and regulations over development with the airport perimeter," Richards said.

"No private land or any other land is considered under this ordinance."

Lincoln County attorney Robert Beauvais spoke to the council and told them the county is still waiting for answers to questions being asked for some time.

He said the county wants to know if zoning authority will extend a mile around the SBRA if

"It's possible Friday was the best day and if not the best, close to it," Deyo said. He has been in business in Ruidoso for more than 16 years, and Friday might

have set a one-day record in sales.

Peggy McClellan, owner of Ruidoso Office Supply and Hallmark, said the weekend was wonderful, but her best day came two weeks ago in the middle of the week.

"Saturday was not better than any other Saturday ... I have no complaints whatsoever," she said.

Anita Smith of Steppin' Out in Sierra Mall was all smiles.

"Sales were up from last year. There was no snow last year, either," she said.

In addition to shoes, customers were buying handbags and scarves and such, she said. She said she has regular clientele in El Paso, Texas, Mexico, Roswell, Carlsbad, even Albuquerque who wait for a holiday and plan ahead to shop at Steppin' Out.

Herb Brunell of Brunell's indicated he was somewhat disappointed in sales figures for the weekend. Saturday was a pretty good day, he said.

"Casual shirts were going real good. Lots of sweaters were being sold, both men's and women's."

Brunell said.

Next door at The Great Southwest, Bonnie Mattox said, "It was one of our best weekends of the year." The Great Southwest opened its doors last May.

She said new coral necklaces and New Mexico luminarias were the most popular items.

"Santa helped," Gloria Montes of The Moccasin Shop in Midtown, said of the weekend.

"Saturday was our best day but Friday was good, too."

The shop had a Santa outside greeting adults and children alike.

Montes said parents were taking pictures and were asking her to take pictures so the parents could be in photos also.

Revo had sales 25 per cent better than the same weekend last year, according to Bill Long and Luetta Hunt.

"Saturday was twice as good as Friday," Hunt said. The Friday after Thanksgiving has been touted as the greatest retail sales day of the year.

This apparently was true over most of the state according to Associated Press reports, but in Ruidoso Saturday appeared to be equal to Friday.

An exception was Texas Furr and Other things. Billie Reidland said Friday was good, but Saturday was down a little.

Friday, she said, was "probably the best day since racing season."

Jim Rodriguez of Handy Hanks, a convenience store on Mechem, said business was better than expected with the ski run not open.

"It was a pretty good weekend with lots of people. I sold a few Christmas trees," said Rodriguez. Trees there run from \$15 to \$35.

Laura Mitchell Hoover of Mitchell's Gems, Arts & Gifts said, "I felt like the weekend was very good. People were shopping and buying."

But a number of people said snow and colder temperatures are needed to put them in a holiday

Sammy M. Lopez, who recently joined the staff of The Ruidoso News as business manager, was named publisher on Wednesday.


Long-time publisher Ken Green left The News to pursue other interests.

Councillors review center proposals

Village councillors will be doing a lot of homework this week.

During a special meeting Wednesday, councillors were given copies of 14 architects' proposals over the village civic/events center.

The councillors have two days to review and evaluate the mass of materials before reporting back at 1 p.m. Friday, December 1. Each councillor will present to staff their top three candidates.

Village manager Frank Potter told the councillors their job is to select the top three candidates and base their selection on five different criteria.

"We are trying today to hire an architect to build a convention center," Potter said.

The councillors will be evaluating the proposals based on the qualification of the firm's staff, the evaluations from referenced clients, related experience, the ability to perform work within the time limitations and the proximity to or the familiarity with the area which the project is located.

"We tried to make this RFP selection as simple as possible," said Potter.

Potter told the councillors it is important for them to stay on the deadlines established by the village for selecting the architect. He said the reason the village was seeking to hire a professional architect to work on the convention center is because state statutes require a professional architect anytime a municipality spends more than \$15,000 in public works money.

Potter said once the architect is hired and begins working with

the other architects on the hotel and golf course project, it could turn out a larger building could be designed for the same amount of money.

Architects will also get input from the Economic Development Advisory Board and Tracey Moran of the Convention and Visitors Bureau.


"We don't want the community to think anything is carved in stone," he said.

Potter said it is possible the village could go back to the legislature to ask for more money for the convention center.

Currently the village is seeking a convention center design of about 12,000 square feet and capable of handling a maximum of 700 people. The center will be designed to be flexible, possibly with movable partitions, and will not contain a kitchen facility.

The 14 architects and architectural firms which submitted proposals include: Architecture Plus of Roswell; Leedshill, Herkenhoff Incorporated of Albuquerque; Stanley J. French of Ruidoso; Alley, Mendell, Shelton Architects and Planners of Las Cruces; Waggoner Architects of Roswell; David Smith of Ruidoso; Holmes, Sabatini and Eeds Architects of Albuquerque; Chamber, Campbell and Partners Incorporated of Albuquerque; Beryl, Durham and Associate Architects of Carlsbad; Nims Calvani and Associates of Albuquerque; Speed, Fab-Crete of Kennedale, Texas; Designs Professional Incorporated of Albuquerque; D.W.L. Architects and Planners Incorporated of Albuquerque and De La Torre-Rainhart Architects of Albuquerque.

The council will interview the top three candidates on the morning of December 4, and begin negotiations with the top candidate.

year. In fact, he said, business has been on the upswing for him since he opened his doors in 1977.


"Saturday was good, Sunday was good, Friday was not up to par," he said.

Area towns get set for 1990 elections

Area voters will elect three mayors and about a dozen councillors when they go to the polls next March.

The villages of Ruidoso, Ruidoso

Downs and Capitan have all adopted election resolutions to set in motion the process that will end with separate elections on March 6, 1990.

Candidates for municipal offices will file for the offices they seek on

January 9. Candidates in any municipal election will be required to provide a certified copy of their voter registration.

Filings will take place between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. at each municipal hall.

In Ruidoso voters will choose a mayor to serve for four years and three councillors for four-year terms. Going off the council, along with Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr., will be councillors J.D. James, Frank Kolb and Larry Simon.

Ruidoso voters also will elect a municipal judge for four years.

The Village of Ruidoso Downs will elect a mayor to serve for four years, four trustees to serve four-year terms and two trustees for two-year terms.

Trustee Alice Allison will be the only trustee whose term of office hasn't expired.

Ruidoso Downs Mayor Jake Harris and trustees Wilma Webb,

Travis Hicks, LeVerne Cole and Tony Parker will go off the board.

Municipal Judge Harrold Mansell has two more years to serve.

Capitan voters will elect a mayor for a four-year term and three trustees. Members of the board whose terms will end are David Rouleau, Jack Pogue and Myrl Ray. Mayor Benny Coker will complete his term of office.

Municipal Judge Jimmy Stewart will also complete a four-year term, and his office will be on the ballot.

Also next year, Lincoln County voters will elect three commissioners, a sheriff, county clerk, county treasurer, county assessor

and two magistrate judges.

Those offices will be on the primary ballots in June and the general elections in November.

The election process for state offices got started last summer when prospective candidates for governor, lieutenant governor, attorney general, secretary of state and representative began testing the waters before announcing for office.

Even though party primaries aren't until next June, the campaigns have already begun, with candidates launching fundraising efforts and advertising in the media.

Ruidoso annexes the airport. He also asked if the village plans to extend the extraterritorial zoning (ETZ) to three miles around the airport.

Beauvais said he is concerned because the county is attempting to purchase a piece of land two miles from the end of the runway for a landfill.

Junge said if the county established a landfill near the airport, the village wouldn't do anything to them.

Beauvais said if the ETZ is extended to three miles from the airport, the county would have to get a special use permit for operating the landfill.

P&Z Chairman Robert Donaldson asked Beauvais how long it will be before the county has zoning regulations completed. Beauvais said it will take from eight to 12 months.

Donaldson and Richards told Beauvais the extension of the ETZ could not happen without county consent because there are more representatives of the county than the village on the ETZ Commission.

Richards said, even if the ETZ is extended to three miles around the airport, the majority of land will not come under zoning regulations.

"Over 80 percent of it is forest and military reservation and there is no zoning proposed for that area," Richards said.

Beauvais said the county's im-

mediate concern over extending ETZ is because of the proposed landfill.

County resident David Saum asked the council if the village didn't intend to extend the ETZ to three miles why was it drawn on maps in the council chamber. He also said he didn't think the airport property was contiguous to the village and he asked if the village was going to annex the Airport Scenic Drive.

Richards told Saum the annexation of the highway is not legal and there was intervening government land between the village limits and the airport.

Saum asked why the village was even annexing the airport.

Donaldson said the village is annexing the airport because it is municipal property and as of right now the village is receiving no sales tax revenues from the airport.

Saum continued to ask the council what would happen to certain pieces of property if the village annexed the highway and extended its zoning.

"I believe you will eventually annex the highway and extend the ETZ from one mile to three miles," he said.

Village manager Frank Potter said unless the county adopts some kind of zoning regulations for the Airport Scenic Drive, the area could end up looking like the area between Tularosa and Alamogordo.

The council did approve Ordinance 89-7, annexing the SBRA.

Both annexation ordinances have 30 days before they go into effect (see related story).

In other business before the council on Tuesday night:

—The council set a public hearing date of January 9 for a proposed rezoning at lots 3 and 4, Block 3, Midway Townsite subdivision.

—Tracey Moran of the Convention and Visitors Bureau gave a quarterly report on the activities of the CVB.

—The council adopted Resolution 89-23 and 89-23S regarding the Village of Ruidoso regular municipal elections on March 6, 1990.

According to village clerk Tammie Maddox, the resolution designates the Ruidoso Public Library as the only polling place and sets Tuesday, January 9, 1990, as the date for anyone to declare their candidacy for office. She said the mayor's position, three council positions and a municipal judge's position will be filled in the election.

—The council approved a motion to cancel the regular council meeting of December 26, since it's the day after Christmas.

Following completion of all the regular items on the agenda, the council adjourned into executive session with village attorney John Underwood to discuss pending litigation.

No action was taken after the executive session and the meeting was adjourned.

Annexation process takes time

It will be another 30 days before the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport and Wingfield Park properties are incorporated into village limits.

The Ruidoso Village Council, in a meeting Tuesday, unanimously approved ordinances 89-6 and 89-7, annexing the two village owned properties.

According to village planning administrator Cleatus Richards, the next step in the annexation process is for the village to file the ordinance plats and the location vicinity maps with the county clerk. He said copies of the plats and the maps also have to be sent to the Secretary of Finance and Administration and the Secretary of Taxation and Revenue in Santa Fe.

Richards said there is a 30-day waiting period before the process is complete. He said the waiting period is to give people who own land within the annexed property time to file a protest. He said there will be no protest, since the village owns the property in question.

"During the waiting period we are continuing with the initial zoning of both properties and the

Airport Hazard Zoning Regulations for the airport," Richards said.

The Planning and Zoning Commission recommended to the village council the Wingfield Park property be zoned planned unit development-mixed (PUD-M) and the airport be zoned planned unit development-industrial (PUD-I).

The Airport Hazard Zoning Regulations will govern development in and around the airport. The initial zoning of both properties and the Airport Hazard Zoning Regulations will be before the council in the form of public meetings during its next regular meeting on December 12.

Richards said comments during Tuesday night's council meeting, that the village was going to annex the Airport Scenic Drive were incorrect.

He said a few cities have tried to annex public right of way before, but each time the courts have knocked it down. He said it would be foolish for the village to attempt to try and annex the Airport Scenic Drive.

"It's obvious it is going to be challenged and the courts have taken a dim view on that sort of thing," he said.

The Village of Ruidoso Downs said it will not apply for a permit through the county to operate a landfill.

"We will not apply for nor seek a 'special use permit' from Lincoln County," said Ruidoso Downs Mayor Jake Harris in a letter to the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners.

Harris said that he is disturbed by comments made during a special meeting of the commission on November 15.

At that meeting county attorney J. Robert Beauvais told the commission it has the power to regulate landfills within Lincoln County through the permit process.

Ruidoso Downs attorney Richard Hawthorne disagrees with the county's interpretation, claiming the county does not have a valid comprehensive zoning ordinance and therefore cannot regulate a landfill.

"The county has absolutely no authority to regulate the use of private property because the county does not have a valid, enforceable zoning ordinance," said Harris in the letter to the county.

"The point of this letter is to inform you, as the governing body of Lincoln County, that if the Environmental Improvement Division (EID) grants the landfill permit, it is the express intent of the Village to open and operate a landfill."

Harris applied to EID for a landfill permit for Ruidoso Downs to be operated on land owned by Kenneth Nosker in the Glencoe area.

Residents in the proposed site's vicinity are opposed to a landfill there and approached the county commission, both in a regular and a special meeting, to stop the site.

The county commission initially thought it would create a special ordinance to regulate the establish-

ment of a landfill, or other special use sites, within Lincoln County, but later decided this wasn't necessary after Beauvais explained the county already had this power.

Under the direction of the county commission, Beauvais drafted and sent a letter to Harris requesting he, as mayor of Ruidoso Downs, comply with the county's zoning ordinance and apply for a county permit for the proposed landfill site.

"Therefore it will not be permissible for the Village of Ruidoso Downs to undertake the development of a solid waste disposal site, either as a municipal utility or proprietary function, without prior approval of the Lincoln County Commission," said Beauvais in the letter.

Also under the direction of the county commission, Beauvais sent a letter to Dennis Floyd, secretary of the state Health and Environmental Department requesting EID cease the process of Ruidoso Downs' application for a landfill permit until the village complies with county regulations and applies for a county permit.

Beauvais also questioned EID as to why it is processing an application for Ruidoso Downs when Governor Garrey Carruthers issued a moratorium on the development of any new landfills in the state.

According to the executive order, only those entities that were currently operating a landfill at the time of the moratorium could open new sites after closing the old ones.

"Ruidoso Downs did not have an active landfill at the time of the moratorium," Beauvais said.

Harris said during the special meeting of the county commission November 15 that Ruidoso Downs qualified to open a landfill site under the existing site allowance in the moratorium.

EID conducted preliminary drill tests at the Nosker site to obtain core samples. Preliminary results indicate the soil type to be water permeable and not the thick layer of clay expected by David Bollschweiler, the site engineer.

Much more information is still needed before the application process can be considered close to ending, said Neal Weber, bureau chief at the EID solid waste bureau.

But Harris believes Ruidoso Downs can have a permit fairly soon.

"The village does not have a permit, but we hope to have one from the Environmental Improvement Division within the next 60 days," said Harris in his letter to the county commission.

Harris also said Ruidoso Downs will resist attempts by the county to delay opening a landfill on the Nosker property.

"If the county attempts to impede, delay, or otherwise hinder the opening and operation of a landfill by the village, we will resist those attempts as strongly as we can and we will seek to recover each and every damage we suffer as a result of those attempts," said Harris in the letter.

County manager Nick Pappas responded to Harris' letter and asked that a representative of Ruidoso Downs be present at the meeting of the county planning & zoning commission (P&Z) at 7 p.m. today (Thursday) to discuss the application procedure.

Pappas also said he will be present at the P&Z meeting to initiate the application process for the county to open and operate its own landfill site.

The county is investigating the possibility of a landfill site in the vicinity of the present, temporary Fort Stanton site. Pappas said the county could begin the application process with EID.

Help is here for holiday depression

Everyone knew that Andy spent a lot of time at home, that he seldom socialized with the other students at school, but because he was a "straight A student," his peers stereotyped him as a nerdy recluse.

His teachers didn't think much of all his absences. He always had a handwritten note from his mother excusing him, and he was never behind academically.

Though Andy was very thin, he had a voracious appetite everyday at lunch, which was passed off as peculiar but not alarming. He had a high metabolism, everyone said, even though his complexion was often pale and he appeared constantly fatigued.

No one noticed a thing until a neighbor saw Andy huddled over on the front porch of his house and crying. There was blood on his shirt and pants. He wouldn't respond to any of the neighbor's questions.

The neighbor stepped into the house which was dark, had an odor of uncleanness, and few dishes in the kitchen but many dirty glasses. Upstairs in a bedroom, Andy's

mother was found dead. She was an alcoholic and because her throat had become ulcerated, she frequently had bleeding spells from the mouth. This time, however, the bleeding was so bad she choked to death on the blood as it collected in her lungs while her son held her head in his lap.

Though the situation is fictitious, Andy's behavior makes sense after the tragedy. But area counselors and mental health specialists would like people to learn to identify the warning signs of emotional and psychological problems before they turn into tragedies.

"We have all the problems the big cities have," said Birgit LaMothe, a local mental health counselor.

But Ruidoso also has many services available to deal with most all situations from marital stress to drug dependency.

A recent release from the Vital Statistics Bureau of the New Mexico Health and Environment Department placed New Mexico number one in the suicide rate throughout the nation for the age group 25 to 34, and fifth overall.

The suicide mortality rate for New Mexico males is also greater than for females in all age groups both in the state and nationally.

Recognizing warning signs of various emotional problems can save a life as well as prevent some situations from becoming more serious.

If a person has tried their normal or routine coping mechanisms to deal with stress or trauma and they don't seem to be working, it would be a good idea to call a counselor and talk, said Eric Hankla of the Counseling Center in Ruidoso.

"They have nothing to lose to come in just one time," he said. "When family and friends no longer seem to help, a person should seek professional help."

Many people are reluctant to seek professional help because it is viewed to be a weakness, rather than a good decision; to do so, said Robert Walters, a clinical and consulting psychologist.

The compartmentalization of our society has led to a belief that people must help themselves.

"The pull-yourself-up-by-the-boot-straps syndrome," he said.

Efforts to educate the public about mental illness are ongoing.

A conservative measure claims that one family in 10 will experience a mental illness severe enough to require hospitalization, according to information provided by the National Alliance for the Mentally III (NAMI).

A release from NAMI suggests a person seek a qualified medical opinion if several of the following characteristics are present and persistent in an individual:

- Withdrawal from others; abnormal self-centeredness.
- Confused or delusional thinking; strange or grandiose ideas.
- Changes in personality or mood.
- Persistent depression, apathy or extreme mood swings.
- Excessive anxieties, worries or fears.
- Changes in eating or sleeping patterns.
- Difficulty in coping with daily activities.
- Inappropriate emotions.
- Denial of obvious problems.
- Increased use of alcohol; use of drugs.
- Violent or suicidal thoughts or actions.

—Anger or hostility out of proportion to the situation.

—Hallucinations.

The holiday season can be a particularly troubling time for many people because of emphasis television and movies place on happy endings and perfect families.

Some research even indicates the fewer hours of daylight contribute to depression in some people.

Dichotomies of behavior can also be warning signals, especially with children, said LaMothe.

For example, the child who exhibits model behavior at home, but is very disruptive or inappropriate at school may be having some emotional problems, as well as the child that exhibits the opposite behavior.

"Growth and development is inevitable, which means change," said Walters.

Children want to learn new things, but if this desire disappears, something may be wrong, he said.

Area counselors would like Lincoln County residents to seek information about mental health services available in Ruidoso and the county.

During a discussion between area professionals it was revealed Ruidoso has a wide variety of services available to its residents, including professionals with doctorate degrees. Carlsbad has no counselors available with doctorate degrees, said Walters.

But residents of Ruidoso need not feel limited to mental health counselors, specifically. The group said help can be obtained from local clergy, social workers in schools and the hospital, and other counselors who may not necessarily have their own practice.

"There's a lot of people available," said Schroeder.



State offers help with heating costs

When the temperature drops, fuel bills begin to rise.
Help is available for some low income residents of Lincoln and Otero counties.
The New Mexico Human Services Department (HSD) is offering the Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP).
The program is primarily for low income families and individuals, said Darla Burke of the HSD office in Alamogordo.

"It is not for those in subsidized housing," she said.
Burke said the program is designed to help certain households pay their winter heating bills, no matter what kind of heating source is used. The program pays fuel bills for natural gas, propane, electricity or even wood to heat homes.
She explained people who are already receiving HSD financial assistance don't need to worry about filing out an application for the program, they will automatically be considered. A determination will be made on the household based on their October circumstances and the qualified households will be notified by mail.
Burke said anyone who is not already on HSD assistance, and would like to apply for the program, must meet certain gross monthly income requirements. She said to qualify for the program, a family of four's gross monthly income can not exceed \$1,311. For a single person home, the gross monthly income cannot be more than \$648.
She said anyone who qualifies for the program and would like to

apply may pick up an application at the HSD offices in Alamogordo or Ruidoso. The directions are on the application.
Burke said the applications must be returned to her office in Alamogordo by 5 p.m. on December 13 to qualify for regular benefits. The applications for regular benefits will not be accepted at the Ruidoso office.
The Human Service Department office in Alamogordo is at 108 Cottonwood Drive. Burke said applications will be accepted through the mail. The offices mailing address is P.O. Drawer E, Alamogordo, New Mexico 88310.

Burke said there is a special crisis program for households that are in an emergency situation, for instance, out of propane. She said the criteria for assistance in an emergency situation is a little different. Instead of being based on gross monthly income, the criteria is based on net income. Burke said HSD will be accepting applications for emergency expenditures until March 31, 1990. Applications can be picked up at either office and can be returned in Ruidoso to the HSD office, located at 1906 Mechem Drive.
Burke said a number of homes in Lincoln and Otero counties qualified for LIHEAP last year. Statewide, more than 41,000 households participated last year, but Burke said the number keeps increasing.
"The numbers have gone up and a lot of people need assistance," she said.

The Plant Corner

DEAR BETTY MC:
In answering your letter in the 11-16-89 column, I failed to tell you the name of the plant you asked about. I do apologize for my hasty reply to your call for help and leaving out the most important part of the answer. The name of the plant is the *false aralia*. Sorry about that.
DEAR SALLY:
Last year for Christmas we received two gloxinias. They hated me and soon committed suicide. The gloxinia is a beautiful holiday plant and I would appreciate your help with the care before Christmas time.
Thank you, Kathleen M.
DEAR KATHLEEN:
The gloxinia, or sinningia, is one of the easiest flowering plants to care for and one of the most colorful. These plants must be kept warm and moist and fed. Many named varieties are available, all with flowers in shades of red, purple, pink and white, single or double and some with frilled edges. The leaves are oblong, deep green and fuzzy.

The flowers are truly spectacular. Large, bell-shaped and velvety. After the flowering cycle they go dormant. Gradually dry off the plants and store the tubers in a cool, dark place with just enough moisture to keep them from shriveling. Repot them again in the spring.
Soil—It is best to buy a potting soil mixture made for African violets. Gloxinias and African violets are members of the same family. Repot every year using fresh soil mix and water sparingly until the first new leaves appear. Increase the watering after the roots form. It is best to water from below like the violets, and never get water on the leaves.
Water—Keep the soil just moist, never soggy wet or completely dried out while the plants are growing. Small, frequent waterings are best to keep a moist condition and use water at room temperature, never cold water.
Light—Bright, indirect, or curtain-filtered sunlight. Hot sun will cause scald and wind will harm the hairy leaves.

Temperature—Here is the hard part. It must be 65 degrees to 70 degrees at night—no lower—and 75 degrees to 85 degrees during days. You might put the pot within a pot to help keep warm and keep away from heat vents or any drafts. Do this and they will not commit suicide.
Fertilizer—While they are growing and until flower buds form, feed them monthly with a liquified fertilizer diluted to one-half the strength recommended on the label. When the flowers start to fade, withhold the fertilizer and gradually reduce the amount of water until the leaves wither. Now is when the plant will become dormant. Start the fertilizer again when repotted and new growth begins.
Pests—Aphids, cyclamen mites, and you guessed it, the dreadful, wretched, creepy, ugly little cotton-headed with no eyes mealy bug. Use a light spray of Malathion for aphids and mites and cotton ball swabs dipped in rubbing alcohol. Check for these pests each time you water and never let them get a head start. Should the pests become out of control it is best to discard the plant, pot, drip tray in the dumpster.
Kathleen, I do hope I have helped you with your gloxinia.



New Mexico hunters go for the birds

BIRD HUNTING SEASON
Deer season may be winding down for this year, but many other hunting seasons are in progress. Waterfowl and game birds are a challenge to hunt and are found in many parts of southeastern New Mexico.

Duck season opened November 18 in the south part of the central flyway and will continue through January 7. In the pacific flyway, duck season opened on November 25, and continues through January 6. All ducks are fair game except canvasbacks; none of these birds can be hunted in either flyway.

The Central flyway is divided into two zones. Zone two pertains to

the area south of I-40 and east to the Texas state line. The bag limit for ducks is based on a point system. Possession limit on ducks is the maximum number of birds that legally could have been taken in two days.

Dove season opens statewide on December 1, and continues through December 30. Bag limits are 15 doves per day, 30 in possession and includes mourning and white-winged doves.

Statewide pheasant season is from December 2-6, limits are three males per day and six in possession. The head or tail of each pheasant must remain attached to the bird for inspection.

The lesser prairie chicken can be hunted statewide from December 9-17. Bag limits are three per day and six in possession.

Quail season opened statewide on November 11 and will continue until February 11. Limits are 15 per day and 30 in possession.

Sandhill cranes can be hunted in the Chaves, Curry, De Baca, Eddy, Lea, Quay and Roosevelt counties, and crane season will continue through January 21. Limits are three per day, six in possession.

Hunting licenses are \$9.50 for residents and \$51 for non-residents. A resident may also purchase a general hunting license that includes game birds.

Steel shot is required statewide for anyone using shotguns or muzzle-loaders. Also, hunters should only have nontoxic ammunition on any state game refuge or waterfowl management area.

Hours for hunting are generally a half hour before sunrise to sunset.

Hunters should check the 1989-90 waterfowl and game bird proclamations for all bag limits and scheduled hunting times.

BIRD WATCHING
While you're outdoors this winter it might be a good idea to pass by the Bosque Del Apache National Wildlife Refuge. Five whooping cranes have been sighted at the

refuge which migrated from Idaho. Whooping cranes are an endangered species and are similar to the sandhill cranes but a beautiful snowy-white color. The main flock of whooping cranes migrates from Canada to the Texas coast.

The Department of Game and Fish surveys state lakes and waterways each year in October, November, December and January. The data collected is used to set new hunting regulations and biological studies.

"Most of our birds were in the northeast in October," said Don McCarter, a bird population

counter. "Bald Eagles are beginning to migrate into the state. We have seen about 7,000 snow geese and 800 sandhill cranes at the Huey Waterfowl Area, near Artesia," added McCarter.

By mid-winter, New Mexico can expect 10,000 sandhill cranes and 30,000 snow geese in the central Rio Grande Valley. Many birds will be in southern New Mexico as northern state waters freeze.

So if your sport is bird watching, I'm sure the nearby national wildlife refuges will be a wonderful place to practice.



TO BE A CHAMPION

It was a humorous but serious introduction to the sport of wrestling.

Gerald Ames, head coach of the Ruidoso High School wrestling team, gave the Warriors something to strive for Monday. It was a novel way of introducing and reinforcing the goals set in all Warrior sports.

Using a wrestling shoe as a goal, Ames threw it across the blue wrestling mat.

"That's the state wrestling championship..." said Ames, pointing at the black high top shoe. He used the names of varsity wrestlers and newcomers, explaining how most athletes never become state champions.

Pointing at the shoe, about 20 feet away, he used examples of common obstacles found in a high school student's life.

The visual effect was concrete. The shoe didn't seem far from the wrestlers that were sitting down along one end of the matted wrestling room, but Ames showed the difficult paths that many of his athletes have tried to take.

From following the path of female persuasion, to falling through small holes in a competitor's self confidence, Ames covered it all.

The interesting part about the pep talk was the honest determination of the coach.

He was jovial about certain topics, at first, then his serious persuasion would come through, enthraling the athletes.

There is no doubt Ames understands the pitfalls of high school athletes and the reasons why state champions are hard to find.

Sure, the old black high top wrestling shoe might seem easy to acquire, simply crawl across the foam mats. The simplicity of this was real and gave the impression that a state championship was also simple.

The only obstacles are the ones created by the athlete. Mental anguish is easy to overcome when striving to be a champion, just concentrate on the goal.

Most athletes don't prepare themselves mentally. High school students have so many things flashing in front of their eyes. Concentrating on a simple path is sometimes overwhelming; Gerald Ames proved that.

High school sports teach students many things, and one of the most important is trust. There are many ways to learn, but if the student doesn't trust the teacher, the learning process never begins.

Ames reminded the students of their role in a relationship. He told them that after a hard wrestling workout, you're drained, there's nothing left, you just want to go home. He might then tell the wrestlers to lift weights

and they had better do it.

"I'm not going to check up on you," he said, explaining how easy it would be to ignore lifting weights because he would never find out.

He also explained policies of out-of-town trips. Asking one of the veteran wrestlers, if he wanted to, could he sneak out of the hotel and go party. The wrestler admitted it was possible.

"If you're not there to wrestle, then don't go," said Ames.

Explaining his strict policy on stealing, he told them it would immediately eliminate the person from the team.

"If you steal anything you're off the team," he said.

Showing the students his role as coach, gave the wrestlers an idea of how to succeed.

Trusting him on proper wrestling techniques was another point Ames discussed. He wouldn't be able to help them if they refused to listen, he said.

Listening was easy during this pep talk and I think most of the wrestlers understood Coach Ames.

With or without a state championship wrestling team, the athletes under Coach Ames will learn some important lessons in life.

Mario Portillo made the quarter finals in the U.N.M. take down tournament last weekend. James Atwood also did well and Craig Sears placed fourth. There are many athletes trying out for the wrestling team, including Kenny Trapp and other members from the football team.

Good luck Coach Ames and the wrestling team. The state championship is only a shoe-throw away!

RHS ADVANCED ART CLASS


The Ruidoso High School advanced art class will be painting up the town today and Friday, according to instructor Karen Reeder.

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Downs mayor scoffs at landfill cost estimates

Ruidoso Downs Mayor Jake Harris disagrees with claims that opening a landfill under new state regulations could cost as much as \$200,000.

"It will cost just exactly what it costs to move dirt," said Harris during a meeting of the Village of Ruidoso Downs Trustees Monday.

The village has applied for a permit to operate a landfill near Glencoe on land owned by Ken Nosker, and Harris predicted Monday that testing will prove the site is suitable.

He said he'll have the results by the end of the week from a series of test wells drilled at the site, and will make those results public.

"Anybody but an unadulterated idiot knows it's going to cost at least \$200,000," said Ruidoso Downs Municipal Judge Harold Mansell.

In a short exchange between the judge and the mayor, Mansell told Harris he wasn't interested in listening to what he had to say about landfills without getting equal time.

"You're a one-way street," said Mansell.

Trustee Wilma Webb, who initiated the discussion on landfills, reminded everyone that the Village of Ruidoso Downs used to have its own landfill near the site that is under consideration.

"We never had any problems,"

said Webb, noting the people who are opposing the village's application aren't aware of that old landfill.

"What they've seen would turn anybody off," said Harris. He said the landfill being planned will be operated differently than the ones that people have seen in the past.

Harris said the site in the application is 190 feet from ground level to water, including 120 feet of impermeable material. He said some opponents have said the site should have red clay.

"Well, what difference does it make what color it is," said Harris.

Questioned if the sanitation budget is operating in the red, Harris replied it was in the black until the Village of Ruidoso and Lincoln County closed the county landfill on Fort Stanton Road and left the village without a place to dispose of its garbage.

He said Ruidoso Downs had a landfill, but closed it when Ruidoso asked the municipality to participate in the county landfill. At the time, Ruidoso Downs was paying \$35 a load, and that continued at the county landfill.

Harris said the Village of Ruidoso, operator for the county landfill, then went up to \$50 a load. Currently, it costs \$100 a load at the temporary landfill site.

"(Ruidoso Downs) should have had a written agreement," said former trustee Bill Smith.

Harris said he looked for the

people who were operating that site when the village closed Fort Stanton landfill. He said they aren't interested in re-opening that site.

"Trucks were full, garbage cans were full, the weekend was coming up ... we had to do something," recalled Harris of the weekend when the Village of Ruidoso Downs dumped some trash on the Nosker land. The EID has ruled that action was illegal, and ordered that the trash be removed.

After discussions of recycling and other options, Harris noted the

village doesn't have time to start from scratch.

"We've got to have a place to take our trash," said Harris.

He disagreed with claims that an agreement with Ruidoso Downs Race Track over garbage pickup in exchange for a large truck was what pushed the sanitation budget into the red.

Harris admitted the village might have to consider increasing garbage pickup rates.

"If we can get a landfill of our own, it's possible we won't have to go up—maybe 50 cents," said

Harris.

Also Monday, the trustees approved a one-time merit increase for all village employees. The board allocated \$2,400 for village departments and \$800 for the Ruidoso Downs Volunteer Fire Department.

"If you come right down to it, it's a Christmas bonus," said Trustee Travis Hicks.

"We have to do it like this," said Trustee LeVerne Cole.

Smith, recalling comments at a previous meeting over dwindling village coffers, questioned the mayor and board if funds are available for the one-time pay boost.

"Regardless of what you've heard, we're taking care of finances," said Harris.

On another subject, Webb wanted to know if Ruidoso Downs Race Track had permits for three new signs, and learned that no application has been filed.

"They should get a permit like anybody else," said Cole, and Harris said the village will send a notice.

Webb also questioned if the village is getting its share of revenues from the Sports Theater operating at Ruidoso Downs.

"They've already run a half million dollars through here and we're not getting anything out of it," said Webb, and the mayor offered to check with an attorney and research state statutes regarding simulcast pari-mutuel receipts.

"They do turn in their gross

receipts taxes in the name of Ruidoso Downs ... I checked on it, and we are getting that," said Harris. He recalled an arrangement through the state where race tracks pay sales taxes on concessions instead of any percentage off pari-mutuels.

"If we can get anything, I'm for it," said Trustee Alice Allison.

In other regular business Monday, the board:

—Approved the minutes of the last meeting, financial statement and accounts payable.

—Authorized village staff to buy recording equipment to replace the worn-out recorder in the board room.

—Moved the December 25 board meeting to Thursday, December 28.

—Adopted a resolution for next year's municipal elections.

—Approved sending Police Department employee Phil Provence to dispatch school and learned that officer Will Hoggard resigned to join the Ruidoso Police Department.

"We hire them and certify them and (they) go to Ruidoso to get another hundred bucks," commented Harris.

It was learned that Provence will be obligated for another 18 months with the Village of Ruidoso Downs after he completes the required certification training.

Petition calls for grand jury review

A group of Lincoln County residents wants a grand jury to investigate the Village of Ruidoso Downs.

The News has been furnished a copy of a petition being circulated that will ask Twelfth Judicial District Judge Richard A. Parson to call a grand jury to look into the village operations and elected officials.

Such petitions do not have to be approved to form before being circulated. District Court Clerk Margo Lindsey, not questioned about this particular petition, said that such petitions have to be signed by five percent of the registered voters to be considered. She said Lincoln County has 6,030 voters.

That village and several of its employees were the subject of a recent investigation by the district attorney's office. According to information included in a search warrant served as part of that investigation, that case was mainly over purchasing procedures.

Vietnam veterans gain new access to medical records

Medical records of Vietnam veterans who received treatment at military hospitals in the Vietnam theater can now be obtained by the veteran.

Vietnam veteran Lucky Mulqueen of Ruidoso said these medical records will aid veterans who need to file a medical claim or corroborate an existing claim.

Mulqueen, who suffers from disabilities he received from injuries in Vietnam, said up until now he believed the medical records were either lost, not on file or simply "just in limbo."

Mulqueen said when he tried to file a claim for disability with the Veterans Administration, he was denied because of the lack of corroborating records from the Vietnam hospital. This despite the fact he had affidavits from the three men who helped put him on an evacuation helicopter, two men who replaced him and from the man in the hospital bed next to him.

"The V.A. has been jerking me around for 11 years," he said.

Mulqueen said his wife finally brought him a copy of the article and asked if he wasn't in one of the

hospitals listed in it. He said he looked and, sure enough, medical records were available from May 1965 to December 1972 for the Third Field Hospital in Saigon where he was treated.

Medical records from Army, Air Force, Navy/Marine and support/evacuation hospitals in Vietnam and the Vietnam theater, which were previously unavailable, can now be requested from the National Personnel Records Center (NPRC) in St. Louis, according to an article in the October/November issue of the New Mexico Veterans News.

The article states these records can be distinguished from the individual veterans' medical record, which are routinely available from the NPRC.

Mulqueen said he thinks there might be other Vietnam veterans in this area who might need these records to file a claim or corroborate one. He offered to provide a list of the hospitals, the dates and locations to any veteran if they would call him at 257-9099.

Included in the list of army hospitals is the 2nd Surgical Hospital, 3rd Field Hospital, 3rd Surgical Hospital, 6th Convalescent Center,

9th Field Hospital, 12th Evacuation Hospital, 17th Field Hospital, 18th Surgical Hospital, 2nd Surgical Hospital, 24th Evacuation Hospital, 27th Surgical Hospital, 29th Evacuation Hospital, 36th Evacuation Hospital, 45th Surgical Hospital, 67th Evacuation Hospital, 71st Evacuation Hospital, 85th Evacuation Hospital, 91st Evacuation Hospital, 93rd Evacuation Hospital, 95th Evacuation Hospital, 312 Evacuation Hospital, the U.S. Army Hospital Saigon and the 25th Medical Battalion with the 25th Infantry Division, headquartered at Cu Chi.

Also available are medical records from support and evacuation hospitals in the Philippines, Japan, Guam, Hawaii and Okinawa.

Medical records are available for 10 different Air Force hospitals with dates ranging from 1962 to 1973.

Navy and Marine Corps hospital medical records are available from the Da Nang Naval Hospital, the First Marine Medical Battalion of the First Division, the Third Marine Medical Battalion of the Third Division and from the U.S.S. Repose.

Public Service Commission will review Otero rate structure here

The New Mexico Public Service Commission will have public workshops in Cloudford and Ruidoso on Tuesday, December 5, to obtain comments on possible rate design alternatives from customers of the Otero County Electric Cooperative.

The public meeting in Ruidoso will begin at 7 p.m. at the Village Hall, 313 Cree Meadows Drive. The public meeting in Cloudford will begin at 2 p.m. at the Convention Center (fire hall), 201 S. Burro Avenue.

In May of this year, the New Mexico Supreme Court upheld the Public Service Commission's 1988 decision to end Otero's longstand-

ing program of demand metering some of its residential customers. As an alternative to demand metering, Otero proposed a declining block rate design in which rates decrease at certain levels of use.

The commission staff, which acts independently of the commission, opposed Otero's proposal and submitted its own plan for a flat rate structure with two classes, residential and recreational residential.

In June 1989, the Commission approved Otero's proposal for declining block rates on an experimental basis for two years. The commission also ordered the commission staff and Otero to file

proposals within 90 days describing plans for collecting and analyzing information needed to assess alternative rate designs in a timely, practical and economical manner.

On September 22, Otero Electric Cooperative filed a proposal for a study costing between \$162,000 and \$214,000 which would gather this information but would ultimately be charged to Otero's customers. Before the commissioners take any action on this matter, they would like to get as much public input as possible from Otero's customers concerning the need for this study and about various rate design alternatives.

Michael Malis continues to improve after undergoing a liver transplant

Six-year-old Michael Malis remains in a Denver hospital and is recovering nicely after receiving a new liver on Sunday.

According to Brad Bawmann, a spokesman for the University Hospital in Denver, the child's condition will be upgraded to "good" this morning (Thursday).

Bawmann said Malis is out of intensive care and eating solid food. He said Malis has been out of bed some and, so far, is showing no sign of rejecting his new liver.

He went on to say the Ruidoso boy has become quite a celebrity in the Denver area. Bawmann said a picture and story on Malis appeared in Tuesday's Denver Post and he has been featured on several of the local television stations newscasts.

He also said Forest Service personnel in the Denver area are beginning to raise money to help with his medical expenses.

Fundraisers to help with the Malis family's mounting medical

expenses continue in Ruidoso and the surrounding area.

According to Sue Buhr of Alamogordo, who keeps track of all three bank accounts that make up the Michael Malis Fund, the total amount of money raised so far is \$100,895.
