Michael is getting better

Mike and Suzie Malis of Ruidoso say they've witnessed a miracle.

A week ago their six-year-old son had no more than a year to live. But today, young Michael Malis is walking and eating pancakes and ice cream in his room at University Hospital. His parents are optimistic he'll have a normal life after undergoing a liver transplant last week.

"We always had hope," Suzie Malis said.

"We handed it to the Lord," added her husband, a U.S. Forest Service employee. "Otherwise, you put yourself in the dirt worrying about it. We feel like the Lord is doing the healing."

Michael has had a difficult life from the moment he was born. After inhaling amniotic fluid during his birth, he was rushed to another hospital in Roswell.

"He was in eight ambulances and three hospitals before he was 10 hours old," Malis said.

At five months, Michael suffered a brain hemorrhage, and doctors discovered his blood wouldn't clot. The problem was traced to his liver. He also has suffered from rickets, jaundice, asthma and a nervous disorder that kept him from walking at the age of three.

"We've put a lot of miles on in

the last six years going to hospitals," Malis said.

A week ago, the Malises received a call that a liver donor was available at University Hospital in Denver. The surgery was completed the next day, Sunday, November 26.

Suzie Malis, a nurse, said the first sign of improvement she noticed was that Michael's skin began to return to a normal color and that he had rosy cheeks for the first time in his life.

That's particularly important to Michael, a student at Ruidoso Christian School. He said some weeks ago that he wants his eyes to be white instead of the yellow color that is a symptom of his liver disease.

The youngster is expected to remain hospitalized for about six weeks. Then, he will remain in Denver for two additional months so doctors can monitor his progress.

The Malis family's miracle has been shared by the Village of Ruidoso, where the entire community got behind the little boy, raising money to be sure he could receive the liver transplant he so badly needed.

When Ruidoso learned that the Malis family needed from \$30,000 to \$100,000 in the bank to ensure that Michael could be on the liver

donor list, fundraising efforts began. It's estimated the family will need around \$200,000 in addition to their health insurance.

That's where the citizens of Ruidoso came in, baking cakes, selling spaghetti and having a giant garage sale, just for starters.

The Michael Malis Fund topped the \$100,000 mark this weekend, bolstered by a more than \$4,800 donation from the Hubbard Museum, which pledged 10 percent of memberships sold last month to the fund.

During a museum show Saturday, entertainer Joan Stauffer handed over her speaking fee to Ruidoso Downs Race Track manager Rick Henson to be given to the Malis fund.

Area hairdressers got together Sunday for a luncheon and show at Cree Meadows Restaurant and the proceeds of that event also were donated to Michael Malis.

Several ongoing fundraisers are under way, including a chair giveaway at Candlepower in Midtown Ruidoso. A local furniture manufacturer donated a chair which is on display at Candlepower where tickets are being sold for a December 23 drawing.

Radon test kits offered

Lincoln County residents can sign up now to get free radon testers for their homes in January.

The state Environmental Improvement Division (EID) will have available free to Lincoln County residents kits for testing their homes for levels of the radioactive gas radon.

The test kits will be offered on a first-come, first-served basis, and a waiting list is already under way at the Ruidoso EID office, said Carl Stubbs, local EID representative.

There will be 75 kits available in Lincoln County beginning some time in January for an eight week period. Only 48 hours are required to get results, which means a large number of homes can be tested, said Stubbs.

The only known health risk associated with radon exposure is an increased risk of developing lung cancer, according to information provided by the Environmental

Plane crash kills 2

The airport built to replace the most dangerous airfield in the Southwest recorded its first fatal accident Saturday.

A California man and his wife were killed when their twin-engine plane crashed Saturday afternoon while attempting to land at Sierra Blanca Regional Airport (SBRA) in snow and fog, a Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) official said.

Robert W. Fish, 51, and his wife, Fay Fish, both of Fall Brook, California, died in the crash, according to State Police officer Danny Kiper of Capitan. The two took off Saturday from Carlsbad, California, in the Beech 90 King Air.

Kiper said a rancher reported at about 2:35 p.m. Saturday what appeared to be a plane crash. He told dispatchers he saw an explosion and could see smoke.

Kiper and Tom Guck of the United States Forest Service (USFS) were the first to arrive at the scene, and discovered the crash still afire at 4 p.m. Kiper said they put out the fire using foam from a USFS truck.

The crash site is 11 miles north-northeast of SBRA on the south side of the Capitan Mountains about three miles east of Lincoln. The remote area is difficult to reach by vehicle and is several miles from the Baca Campsite over extremely rocky terrain and some open pasture land.

Rescuers were summoned to the scene in the mountains near Lincoln, said Dave Wingert, area manager in charge of the Albuquerque Air Route Traffic Control Center.

"It was landing," Wingert said. "Weather was a factor. It was snow showers and fog."

The mass of blackened materials, in the center of a wide circle of burned out grass, is cordoned off and under tight security until a complete investigation is conducted. Kiper said medical ex-

aminer Dave Pfeffer joined State Police at the scene, and helped determine that no survivors were in or around the plane.

One body was removed on Sunday morning, said Kiper. He said police believe that Robert and Fay Fish were the only two passengers in the seven-seat twin-engine plane.

Kiper said airport personnel in Carlsbad, where the plane took off, said there were only two people on the aircraft.

The National Transportation Safety Board (NTSB) will lead the investigation, and will be aided by the FAA. Investigators are expected to arrive today (Monday).

Already in the area is John

Ward, a senior engineer for Beechcraft out of Wichita, Kansas. Ward said he offered his services to the NTSB and flew to the SBRA to meet and work with investigators.

Saturday's fatal crash was the third accident at the regional airport on Fort Stanton mesa. The other two involved minor injuries to the aircraft passengers.

The old Ruidoso Municipal Airport, built near the center of the Village of Ruidoso, was called the most dangerous in the Southwest. The old airport, located in a bowl surrounded by mountains, recorded 17 deaths in 20 years.

SBRA replaced the old municipal airfield.

FAA could ground landfill

Lincoln County and the Village of Ruidoso Downs are both facing resistance over their proposed landfills.

Ruidoso valley residents are opposed to a landfill site proposed by the Ruidoso Downs on land owned by Kenneth Nosker, and a site considered by Lincoln County may be buried by a federal agency.

The Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) may take measures to halt the establishment of a county landfill on the Fort Stanton mesa near Sierra Blanca Regional Airport (SBRA), said county manager Nick Pappas during a regular meeting of the Lincoln County Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z).

A site under consideration by the county commission for a county landfill looked as though it could qualify for a permit from the state Environmental Improvement Division (EID), according to preliminary information compiled by PAJO Technical Services.

In fact, Pappas was present at the P&Z meeting to begin the application process for a county permit to operate a landfill, but the situation is on hold until formal notification comes from the FAA.

Of concern to the FAA is the proposed site's proximity to the SBRA. FAA regulations prohibit a landfill within 10,000 feet of a runway and the proposed site is beyond that limit. But the FAA can extend that limit if it believes it is in the best interest of the airport.

Pappas said the FAA plans to issue a negative recommendation for the county's proposed landfill.

The P&Z took action to accept zoning ordinance 85-3, in connection with the special use permit section of the zoning ordinance 88-4, as a procedure to regulate the establishment of landfills in the county.

On the recommendation of county attorney J. Robert Beauvais the P&Z then moved to allow the county manager to advertise for public hearings for input on other criteria the county may wish to include in the landfill permit application process.

Beauvais said EID regulations govern the operation of a landfill, but pay little to no attention to the location of a landfill. Such considerations of land use might be items the P&Z may wish to include in the permit process.

These criteria could include provisions to further protect groundwater and surface water resources.

However, Ruidoso Downs Mayor Jake Harris and village attorney Richard Hawthorne contend the county has no authority to regulate private property.

"It is legal garbage," said Hawthorne.

Harris asked the P&Z if Ruidoso Downs applied for a county permit would it receive one.

"I can't say until we see a presentation," said P&Z chairman Patsy Sanchez.

Harris then said again Ruidoso Downs would not apply for a county permit, at least not until all the legal ramifications were clear.

Beauvais assured the P&Z the county does have the authority to regulate landfills through the permit process and that verbal confirmation was indicated by EID.

The county directed Beauvais to send a letter to EID inquiring if the agency agreed with the county's interpretation that a procedure existed to regulate landfills through the permit process.

EID officials verbally replied the agency thinks the county does have the legal wherewithal. A formal reply is expected this week.

Beauvais also mentioned a district court case that was ruled in favor of the Rio Arriba County Commission that may have implications in Lincoln County.

In the case, which is on appeal, the New Mexico Coalition for the Protection of Private Property Rights contended Rio Arriba County had no right to regulate liquid waste disposal on private property if the state had already granted its permit.


However, the court ruled against the coalition.

"The county has the authority, pursuant to the New Mexico Subdivision Act, to enact regulations which are more stringent than those enforced at the state level," said the ruling.

Section 503 of the solid waste regulations developed by the Environmental Improvement Board (EIB) makes a similar statement regarding local requirements of a landfill operator.

"Compliance with the Solid Waste Management Regulations does not relieve a person of the obligation to comply with other applicable local, state and federal regulations," said Section 503.

"You can't stop one (landfill) just because you don't want one," said

EID to Nogal: don't drink the water

Don't drink the water in Nogal. That's what the state Environmental Improvement Division (EID) recommends to residents in this unincorporated area of Lincoln County.

Bacteriological studies done on the drinking water provided by the Nogal Water User's Association show the water should not be consumed or used for cooking without first boiling for at least 10 minutes, said Jim Edwards of the Ruidoso EID office.

Of five tubes tested for coliform bacteria November 6, all were posi-

tive.

"This is the worst result you could get in a fermentation test," said Edwards.

The EID recommends boiling the water before consumption, or using another source, such as bottled water until the association passes the next bacteriological test. The tests are conducted monthly.

A notice posted in the post office in Nogal also recommends boiling the water or using another source, but cites a different reason.

"Due to the extremely dirty water in the Alamo pipeline, we are unable to filter to acceptable standards," said the notice.

The notice then encourages residents to boil their water or use bottled water.

Work is currently being done on the Alamogordo raw water pipeline from Bunto Lake which serves Alamogordo. Nogal buys water from this pipeline, but is responsible for disinfecting the water.

Users along the pipeline were notified a week in advance by the Alamogordo Water Utilities that the supply would be shut off because of work done on the line, said Jose Miramontes, public works director for Alamogordo water.

A notice, dated November 20,

was posted in the Nogal post office on November 27 informing residents that the water would be cut off on November 29, and reinstated December 1.

When working on the line, pipes are flushed with clean water to reduce turbidity before the pipes are reconnected, said Miramontes.

"But we are not responsible for chlorinating the water," he said.

Nogal has had problems in the past with turbidity in the water, which is controlled by filters.

Two years ago the Environmental Protection Agency filed an order against the Nogal Water User's Association because its filtration was

not appropriate for the flow of water into the system.

But the current problem has little to do with dirt in the water.

Coliform is found in the intestinal tracts of animals and generally is not a pathogenic, or disease-causing, bacteria, said Edwards.

Bacteriological tests are done to identify coliform bacteria because it can be an indicator that other pathogenic bacteria may be present in the water supply.

State regulations normally require a water utility to notify its users by mail of any interruption in service, or any change in the

quality of the water.

However, an exception was granted for Nogal because the state was assured that everyone in the community goes to the post office there each day. Proper notice then could be published there.

However, officers of the association may not have been completely aware of the situation. The group hasn't formally met for three months said Milow Sharpe, the association secretary.

Turbidity tests are supposed to be done daily. Nogal has not had any turbidity problems recently, said Edwards.

Harris.

Both Harris and Hawthorne said Ruidoso Downs is further along than anyone else in finding a solution to the solid waste disposal issue which municipalities statewide face.

However, Pappas objected to Harris' and Hawthorne's statements made at the P&Z meeting, and others made at earlier times through the media.

"We took the leadership role in the landfill situation," said Pappas of the county. "We did not do this as blindly as some people let on."

Pappas repeated the history of the Fort Stanton landfill that was closed in early May. He said a solution will have to be found soon to

help other municipalities in the county and building contractors.

"We didn't want to close because we knew we would hurt a lot of people," he said.

The county then developed the Landfill Advisory Committee to research a solution to the solid waste issue. Harris was the representative for Ruidoso Downs in the committee.

The county attorney also filed a separate lawsuit which allowed Lincoln County to re-open the present temporary site without being liable for post-closure costs at the old site.

The two-acre temporary site has an estimated life span of another six months because the trenches are now being dug deeper than be-

fore, said Pappas.

The county has also been investigating possible sites for a county landfill, as well as seeking the cooperation of area municipalities to make a county site economically feasible.

"We haven't been sitting on our butts waiting for someone to give us a God-given piece of land," said Pappas. "Lincoln County has been one of the leaders in the state in finding a solution."

Harris said later the temporary site was helpful to everyone in the county.

"We'd be dead without it," he said.

In other business, the P&Z: —Will consider an invitation from the Municipal League to join a

zoning think-tank.

—Discussed the condition of roads in the Lakeside Estates area of Alto. The developer there went bankrupt prior to completing the roads. Residents there are complaining the county hasn't paved them yet, but the county will not accept dedicated roads until they are completed by the developer. Beauvais said there may be a bond in place which can help the county complete the roads.

—Took action to request \$3,000 from the county during the mid-year budget adjustment for technical assistance in mapping the county with the comprehensive zoning ordinance.

Protection Agency (EPA).

The radioactive gas comes from the natural breakdown of uranium and can be found in soils and rocks containing uranium, granite, shale, phosphate, and pitchblende.

Of about 150,000 deaths caused by lung cancer each year, between 5,000 and 20,000 can be attributed to radon exposure.

Scientific evidence linking radon exposure to lung cancer is considered more reliable because it is based on exposure to radon by miners while working underground. Other

cancer risk studies are based solely on laboratory animals.

Radon most often enters a home through cracks in the floors or in block walls, through floor drains, and sumps. It can also enter through private wells when the water is released out of the pipes.

Homes with crawl spaces beneath them, or basements, should be checked.

Being a radioactive element, levels of radon are measured in picocuries per liter of air, signified as pCi/L. The average background level of radon outdoors is 0.2 pCi/L, and the average level inside a home

is 1.5 pCi/L.

Homeowners are encouraged to take action to reduce radon levels if their home measures more than 4.0 pCi/L.

An exposure level of 4.0 pCi/L annually is equivalent to smoking one-half a pack of cigarettes each day. An annual level of 20 pCi/L is equivalent to smoking one pack of cigarettes each day.

In a statewide random study done by EID earlier in the year, only six percent of the homes tested had levels of between 4.0 and 20 pCi/L, and zero homes tested more

than 20 pCi/L.

Complete instructions are provided with the kits which are quite small and not bulky or obtrusive, said Stubbs.

Renters are required to sign a disclaimer when they pick up a test canister.

Persons interested in obtaining a kit must have their name on a list at the Ruidoso EID office. Names, addresses and telephone numbers are required and are accepted over the phone. The EID office phone number in Ruidoso is 258-3272.

Lincoln County makes a wish list for State Legislature

A District Court annex and central maintenance complex for county vehicles are two items Lincoln County wants the state legislature to help finance.

These and other ideas were discussed during a meeting of the county commission Monday, November 27, called primarily to address legislative priorities for Lincoln County in 1990.

Plans for a county building annex already exist, and the construction of a new wing would solve many records storage problems faced by both the county and the district court.

District Judge Richard A. Parsons asked the county do something about the shortage of storage space for court records. Currently, court records are piled in boxes in the foyer of the district courtroom.

The county clerk's office also faces a storage problem because many irreplaceable records are in danger of being lost to water damage in the basement where they are stored.

The county commission already instructed county manager Nick Pappas to take steps to correct plumbing problems in the basement storage area because pipes there leak. The area is also suscep-

tible to flooding during heavy rains.

The county clerk's office is in the process of transferring documents onto microfiche for public availability. The treasurer's and the assessor's offices also will need to microfiche records.

The district court is required by state law to copy records onto microfiche, but county officials are not certain the county must do this for the state.

"I can't see the county hiring someone to do a state job," said commissioner Robert E. Hemphill.

The development of a central maintenance yard for county vehicles could be a strong runner for legislative funds.

"It could be a pilot program," said Chairman Karon Z. Petty.

Commissioner Rick Simpson suggested that all county vehicles be placed on a regular maintenance schedule at a facility operated by the county.

Currently, drivers of county vehicles are expected to find the time to maintain their vehicles, and must seek out several bids for repairs before they are done.

With a county mechanic, repairs and routine maintenance can be accomplished without a loss of working hours.

"If you could save one vehicle per year you would more than pay for

an individual," said Simpson.

Pappas said he would like to investigate the use of the old Carrizozo municipal building and seek a Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) for the building's restoration.

Petty suggested a CDBG be requested for several buildings in Carrizozo for historic preservation.

"We've been getting enough media coverage with the dump heaps of the week," she said.

Petty also suggested the county ask for as much as possible because bills frequently are amended out of existence in the legislature. By making many requests, the county improves its chances to obtain some wishes.

The commission directed Pappas to investigate a memorial to be sponsored in both houses of the legislature for a possible by-pass route around the Lincoln historic district.

Plans exist for widening U.S. route 380, which poses a threat to some historical buildings and sites in Lincoln.

A dramatic increase in the number of visitors to the historic town this summer caused some residents there to be concerned over how to control visitor growth.

A by-pass route would eliminate truck traffic through the town, but

could still provide access for visitors, said Pappas.

"I don't know why it hadn't been done already," said Hemphill.

Some Lincoln residents expressed a wish for a new speed limit zone in Lincoln, reducing the current one of 35 mph to 25 mph, but the commission did not think such a change would be successful.

Hemphill suggested Lincoln County Sheriff James McSwane have a deputy patrol the Lincoln area and enforce the current speed zone.

The commission also requested a letter be drafted and sent to Lincoln County Medical Center (LCMC) administrator Steve Keller requesting an explanation and documentation of the Hill-Burton charity write off.

"Why are they writing these services off?" asked Petty. "What are they doing?"

Pappas said he would like to see the specific Hill-Burton clause that requires LCMC to make the write-offs which have increased the facility's budget deficit because he believes the action is unnecessary.

Pappas reported that Airport Scenic Drive could not be designated as a scenic drive by the legislature because the road is neither a state or federal route.

Petty suggested a letter be sent

to the Village of Ruidoso offering the village Airport Scenic Drive and the balance of Gavilan Canyon Road.

The commission also briefly discussed other legislative priorities that are of interest to all New Mexico counties. These items included:

—Support of state funding of the implementation cost of state and federal solid waste regulations on a county by county basis.

—Opposition to legislation requiring counties to be responsible for all costs of prisoners in their care.

—Support for a 25 percent increase in salaries for county elected officials.

—Support for a constitutional amendment allowing government to enter into lease-purchase agreements for capital equipment only.

—Opposition to legislation requiring county treasurers to be responsible for sales of property for delinquent taxes.

—Support for a retiree health care plan.

—Support for a constitutional amendment allowing governments to enter into lease-purchase agreements for buildings and facilities subject to a negative referendum.

—Support of legislation and funding for the Secretary of State's office to conduct a separate mailed

ballot election on constitutional amendments.

—Opposition to any additional property tax exemptions.

—Support of legislation describing penalties for violations of the Campaign Reporting Act and limiting the time in which penalties can accrue against violators.

—Support the rescission of the Procurement Code regulation specifying that cost not be a factor in reviewing bids from architectural and surveying firms.

—Support expanding local option 5 percent liquor excise tax for drug and alcohol treatment programs and facilities (Chapter 326) to all counties.

Barbara Ward, from the Zia Senior Citizens center requested help to begin another center at the Saint Jude's church in the Hondo Valley.

She was also concerned about the salaries for site managers, which presently are \$826 each month, plus benefits, for 40 hours each week.

The commission also took action to approve the payroll and the accounts payable.

Petty announced several times during the meeting that she will not seek re-election.



Ruidoso News Business Editor Jerry Watts, recently hired as executive director of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, told board members at a regular meeting Wednesday he is on the job full-time effective today (Monday), December 4.

"I'll be behind my desk full-time. You'll know where to find me," he told the board.

Watts comes to Ruidoso from an executive position in El Paso, Texas. He has served a number of chambers of commerce in Oklahoma and Texas.

Watts said he will spend the first week here researching chamber activities.

The second week, he said, he will be contacting individual board members to get ideas and their thinking on chamber direction.

Chamber board members, during their meeting, heard divisional reports, office activity report, financial report and a rundown from Steve Keller, Lincoln County Medical Center administrator, on how many doctors will be moving to Ruidoso in the near future.

Included are a gynecologist and a surgeon husband-wife team coming to Ruidoso after military service.

Clay Adams, who heads chamber greeters, said the Tri-State Association of Chamber Ambassadors will be meeting in Ruidoso the December 9 weekend.

The group will be hosted and housed at the Inn at Pine Springs Canyon in Ruidoso Downs and at a cocktail party at Winner's Circle, Saturday night, December 9. The association actually has members in five states.

Adams said 41 booths were at the recent Christmas Jubilee at Carrizo Lodge and that the ticket count was 1,609.

Ruidoso will be represented at the Governor's Conference on Tourism December 13-14 in Santa Fe.

Watts, board member Mary Maul, Phil Price Advertising Agency in Lubbock, Texas, and Tracy Moran will attend. Moran heads the Ruidoso Convention and Visitors Bureau.

Moran asked for volunteers to accompany her to Portales today (Monday) for the annual auction of KENW, PBS station at Eastern New Mexico University. Tonight (Monday) will be Ruidoso Night with Ruidoso people answering telephones during the auction.

"They support us, and we support them," Moran told the board.

Moran also reported that the Saturday night extravaganza during the Connoisseur Classic will be at the Inn of the Mountain Gods at Mescalero. More than 20 wineries will be involved in the "taste of southwest food, wine and art," she reported. Gourmet luncheons at Ruidoso restaurants will be part of the weekend.

Roy Crocker, who heads the retiree services division of the chamber, said the division had received a partial payment of matching funds from Santa Fe.

She asked board members to give Puckett a pat on the back when they see him.

Lynch said Tim Morris, airport manager, told her 1989 is the best year since 1983 at the airport.

Sally Waters, Community Development Division head, said applicants for chamber scholarships must show involvement in community affairs to be eligible.

Steve Keller, board vice president, said his site selection committee for the 1990 Art Festival will visit possible sites soon.

He said using White Mountain School might be complicated because the festival has beer sales as a chamber fundraiser.

The festival has been staged at the old airport the past two years. That facility is no longer available because a golf course, civic center and performing arts center will occupy the acreage.

Tony Wilcoxson, reporting for the Advertising-Promotion Division, said advertising on a powerful, 150,000-watt station in Mexico is paying off.

More residents from the interior of Mexico are coming to Ruidoso on the big holidays, he said.

The financial report presented to the board showed that the Bavarian Bash in October netted the chamber \$2,087.



School leaders meet with Indians

Students who don't go to school and don't do their homework can't expect to excel.

School leaders, meeting with Mescalero Apache Indian tribal leaders and parents of Mescalero students, identified attendance and failure to complete assignments as problems for Indian students attending Ruidoso schools.

School administrators stressed that those problems are the same ones that plague all students, not just Indian students. But the 416 Mescalero Apache Indians who attend Ruidoso schools were the focus of last Thursday's meeting, and so problems were discussed zeroed in on that segment of the school population.

Ruidoso schools receive more than \$200,000 a year in federal funds earmarked for Indian programs, and regular meetings with Indian parents are a requirement for receiving those funds. Associate

superintendent Mike Gladden admitted Thursday that those public meetings are behind schedule.

More than 50 people gathered at Ruidoso Middle School to discuss how federal funds designated for Indian programs are being used. Gladden lined out the program by each funding source.

Title IV funds total \$48,495, and are used for an aide at Nob Hill Elementary School, a liaison person between the schools and the tribe, after school tutoring and supplies and fees.

Johnston O'Malley funds, allocated through the Mescalero tribe, total \$18,350, including a carryover from last year. Those funds pay for an aide and Apache language instructor, tutoring and transportation.

Public Law 874 Special Education funds total \$79,325 and pay for one language development aide at Nob Hill, one-fourth of the special education coordinator's salary, classroom materials, inservice

training and travel.

Federal "add-on" funds, which the system began receiving last year, pay for a half-time nurse, four aides and a counselor, as well as activity bus transportation, outside speakers, inservice training and supplies.

Mescalero parents want to be sure the funds are being used to enhance their children's education. They also encouraged Gladden to hire members of the Mescalero for those positions whenever possible.

The parents, Indian leaders and school leaders agreed Thursday to establish a task force to work for solutions to problems of Indian students. They also agreed to establish an academic booster organization for Mescalero students.

Also during Thursday's meeting, the school board voted unanimously to call for bids on a metal maintenance building and for quotes on snow removal for parking lots.

EDITORIAL

Indian students are an important part of the Ruidoso Municipal Schools, with 416 Mescalero Apache Indians attending Ruidoso schools this year. That's a healthy boost to the school census.

Those Indian students bring federal funds amounting to more than \$600 each to the Ruidoso schools. That money enhances the state school funding by paying for tutoring, transportation, staff and supplies to meet some special needs that the students also bring into the system.

The School Board met Thursday with Indian leaders and the parents of some of those students, and it was good to hear school administrators and board members admit that the Indian students are an asset to the system. The group of school administrators thanked the parents and leaders for their support of the local system, and we do, too.

For the Mescalero Indians bring more than money into the Ruidoso schools. They bring their own culture, language and experiences into the various schools, expanding the understanding that non-Indian students have of another race. We would challenge Ruidoso teachers to make the most of the opportunity to promote students' pride in their different heritages and appreciation of the things they have in common. We're such close neighbors that understanding and appreciating one another is vital to our future.

The Indian parents challenged school administrators and principals to provide adequate staff and support for the Mescalero Indian students; and the school leaders responded by asking the parents to help improve communications between the schools and Mescalero parents. We were impressed with both groups' sincere concern for the students and their commitment to seek the best education possible for them.

Two concrete recommendations were endorsed by the end of the meeting. The first is to establish a task force with members of both groups to identify problems peculiar to Indian students and form solutions to overcome those problems. The second is to form an academic booster organization for Mescalero students, formed through the schools and supported by the Mescalero Apache tribal leadership.

We believe those recommendations should be pursued immediately in the best interests of the school system, the Indian students and the Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe. If we want Mescalero parents to continue to send their students to Ruidoso schools, we must ensure that there is an outlet for their continuing input and involvement.—fj



DEAR EDITOR:
 A commitment has been broken by the Convention and Visitors Bureau, Chamber of Commerce, Ruidoso, to Lindavida Fine Art (and to The Blue Goose as the selected caterer). The committee for the Connoisseur Classic, an extension of the CVB and the chamber, chaired by Tracey Moran who also heads up the CVB, requested bids for the Friday night wine tasting to accommodate 250 people. David Smith, representing Lindavida Fine Art, attended the appropriate meeting, presented a bid, and was awarded a bid by the committee by due process and a unanimous vote. The bid was accepted at the meeting. A press release went to this newspaper from the Chamber of Commerce. The newspaper announced that week that the Connoisseur Classic would have the wine tasting at Lindavida Fine Art. Two weeks from the date of the agreement, Tracey Moran called

the gallery and told us that although the bids had been originally awarded to the gallery and to Cress Meadows for the two major events of the Classic, now the events were to be held at Cress and The Inn of the Mountain Gods—that the reversal had occurred at a meeting the day before Thanksgiving, and at another meeting the day after Thanksgiving. (We were out of town and couldn't be reached, she said.)

Lindavida Fine Art was denied the opportunity to participate in any way in the taking away of the bid that had been granted to us. It was a done deal—and there was apparently no recourse.

At the next committee meeting we requested that the bid be reinstated, that we did not recognize the right of the committee to arbitrarily and, without our input, take away a bid offered and accepted.

The committee voted once again whether or not to honor the com-

mitments, and voted not to. The only substantive reason given for the change involved the perceived necessity for larger facilities. For the record, Lindavida Fine Art is the largest of the three facilities.

At stake here is the credibility, if not the integrity, of the Convention and Visitors Bureau and the Chamber of Commerce. As an organization whose purpose is to promote and support Ruidoso businesses and industry, the Chamber has a responsibility to conduct business in a professional and ethical manner. The arbitrary breaking of a commitment to a member and city business is neither professional nor ethical.

Another issue entirely, is that breaking the commitment the Chamber made to two Ruidoso businesses, was done in order to award a bid for the major event of the Connoisseur Classic to The Inn of the Mountain Gods, who is neither a Chamber member nor a Ruidoso business. Indeed, this will

further encourage attendees of an event designed to aid Ruidoso businesses to find lodging and food outside of the Village. It is curious that the Convention and Visitors Bureau is partially funded through the lodgers tax, paid by Ruidoso businesses.

We believe that the Connoisseur Committee and its leadership have failed to serve the interests of the Ruidoso community and, in the process, have compromised the ability of the Chamber of Commerce to effectively serve the community.

The problem as it now stands is not that a wrong was done—but that a wrong was not righted. We expect nothing less than a reinstatement of the original commitments by a committee which must reflect the ethics and professionalism of the community it serves.


