Firefighters battle two Alto blazes

Bonito Volunteer Fire Department firefighters fought two structure blazes over Christmas weekend.

The volunteers contained a chimney fire at the Mike Cunningham residence in Alto on Friday, and then spent Christmas night and well into Tuesday fighting a fire at a two-story home on El Camino Drive in Alto Village.

Firefighters were able to save the Cunningham home, but the El Camino Drive home was a total loss.

Seven units and more than 20 firefighters from four communities battled the El Camino Drive fire in a house owned by Jess and Bobby Johnson of Plano, Texas. The holiday renters were evacuated, and no one was injured.

The alarm was sounded at 10:30 p.m. Monday, and Bonito volunteers responded and contained the fire to the fireplace on the first floor and a nearby space heater in the basement by 3:30 a.m.

At 5:45 a.m. the structure became totally involved, and firefighters from Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs and Capitan joined the Bonito Volunteer Fire Department, bringing tankers, additional water and personnel.

Witnesses said the structure went like a torch. "One minute it was standing and the next, it went down."

One firefighter narrowly escaped injury when a wall collapsed. A propane tank engulfed in flames posed an additional threat to firefighters.

About 6:15 a.m. a wind blowing into the northeast carried live embers about an eighth of a mile from the burning structure and started a spot fire in a wooded area. A unit was dispatched from the original fire and quickly extinguished it. The burned area was confined to about a tenth of an acre.

Units remained on the scene until after noon Tuesday.

The cause of the fire has not yet been determined. Please see Firefighters, page 2A

Celebrators may party here

There may be more people in town on Sunday than just your average tourist and their family.

A lot of residents of communities like Roswell, Alamogordo and Socorro may be coming to Ruidoso and Lincoln County to celebrate New Year's Eve.

The reason for this is New Mexico law prohibits the sale of liquor, both package sales and liquor by the drink, on Sunday, except in municipalities and counties where a special election has been held regarding Sunday liquor sales.

This year, New Year's Eve, falls on Sunday, December 31.

Municipalities and counties that have passed the Sunday liquor sales election can have liquor by

the drink sales on Sunday. Package liquor sales are never allowed on Sunday.

According to state statutes in those municipalities which have Sunday liquor sales: "a dispenser, restaurant licensee or club may, upon payment of an additional fee of one hundred dollars, obtain a permit to sell, serve or permit the consumption of alcoholic beverages by the drink on the licensed premises on Sundays from noon until midnight and in those years when December 31 falls on a Sunday from noon until 2 a.m. on the following day."

The News contacted seven municipalities surrounding and neighboring counties and determined which ones will have liquor sales on Sunday, December

31. Only the municipalities of Las Cruces and Tularosa will have bars open on Sunday. Roswell, Alamogordo, Hobbs, Clovis and Socorro will not have any liquor sales this Sunday.

In the actual counties, it is a little different. Of the three counties The News was able to contact, only Otero County will have bars open on Sunday, Chaves and Lea counties will not.

Here in Lincoln County, Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs and Carrizozo will all have bars open this Sunday for New Year's Eve celebrations. Liquor by the drink sales are not permitted on Sunday in the Village of Capitan.

According to County Clerk Martha Proctor, all areas outside

the municipalities in Lincoln County will have liquor by the drink sales this Sunday.

With many people out celebrating this Sunday, there is always the danger of alcohol related accidents. Ruidoso Police Chief William Newman recommends preventing this by choosing someone to be the designated driver or by calling a law enforcement officer for a ride home.

In the county, the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office has announced it will offer free rides to those who celebrate a little too much on New Year's Eve.

Newman says it has been an ongoing program of the police department to offer free rides home to anyone who has had too much to drink.



Wilderness: A Series

Public trust vs. private rights

"It is out of the wilderness that we built a nation."

New Mexico Senator Pete Domenici

EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the first in a series of five dealing with wilderness issues.

Wilderness has played a key role throughout American history.

"It is out of the wilderness that we built a nation," said New Mexico Senator Pete Domenici at a wilderness forum in May.

As the American people moved westward the goal was to conquer the wilderness, to tame it and utilize its resources. By the turn of the century, however, a new direction took shape with the desire to protect wilderness, to maintain it unchanged by man.

This new direction gathered strength and eventually became law when President Lyndon B. Johnson signed the Wilderness Act of 1964.

More than 90 million acres are protected by this law, most either in national parks or national forest areas.

But Congress directed another federal land agency to evaluate areas for wilderness designation, the Bureau of Land Management (BLM), and this mandate created some controversy.

Two items have become contentious: water rights and grazing rights. However, representatives of the farming and ranching communities have also questioned publicly the validity of maintaining a wilderness preservation system.

Whether or not the creation of a designated wilderness also creates federal reserved water rights is at the center of the

water issue.

The pro-wilderness group says a federal reserved right is created, but its priority date is identical to the date of wilderness designation. The other group, mostly represented by the New Mexico Farm and Ranch Bureau and the New Mexico Cattle and Sheep Growers Association, says the federal government must apply for a water right through the state water adjudication system.

The pro-wilderness group doesn't believe a problem exists with grazing rights. Management programs already exist and have been used; nothing needs to change.

But the farm and ranch group believe management systems developed in other states are not appropriate for New Mexico and new language needs to be written in a New Mexico wilderness bill.

Extremists on both sides have viewed this disagreement as an opportunity to promote other ideas that could open a can of worms that no one has the ability to re-close.

For example, some extreme environmentalists would like to see grazing banned from all public lands. And some ranchers would like to see the wilderness preservation system dismantled.

"These issues are halting the legislative process and are of paramount importance to the west," said Domenici in May.

This is the first article in a series which will explore the wilderness issues as they pertain to the land recommended by the BLM.

This first article introduces the various topics with some background. Individuals

with key roles and their ideas are also presented.

The second article will cover the history and development of the Wilderness Act of 1964, the development of the wilderness preservation system, and the current status of the BLM lands presently under consideration.

The third article will cover the issue of water rights as they pertain to wilderness designation. Water is a volatile subject because the west's economy depends on its careful use.

The fourth will deal with the second contentious issue facing new wilderness; grazing regulations. Range management techniques have already been developed, but their relevance to New Mexico are being challenged by the agriculture industry.

The fifth installment will be a column.


In general, Congress mandated the BLM in 1976 to survey lands under its jurisdiction for wilderness potential with the Federal Land Policy and Management Act (FLPMA).

Until then, the Wilderness Act itself only directed the National Forest System (NFS), the National Parks System (NPS), and the Fish and Wildlife Service to evaluate their lands and recommend areas for wilderness designation.

Once these surveys are completed, it takes an act of Congress to create a wilderness area.

Of 901,695 acres evaluated for wilderness potential by the BLM in New Mexico, the

Thief makes off with two gas meters Where's the heat?

You don't pay much attention to them. They sit there behind your house or business, working quietly, doing what they are supposed to do. You never notice them until they stop working or are missing.

It's your natural gas meter and The Ruidoso News is missing two of them.

Someone has stolen the gas meter at The News the past two weekends.

Editor Frankie Jarrell was working on the Monday, December 18, edition on Sunday night when she noticed the building was getting colder. The next morning, pressman Joe Martin discovered the gas meter was missing from the building.

The police and gas company were called. A police report was filed and Ruidoso Natural Gas installed a new gas meter.

This Tuesday, The News staff came to work following Christmas Day off and made a startling discovery:

an ice cold building and another missing gas meter.

The Ruidoso Police were called and another report was taken.

According to Ruidoso Natural Gas manager Ken Johnston, each of the missing gas meters had a serial number and the numbers were turned over to the police.

Johnston said the gas meters cannot be used for anything else without a regulator.

"All it's good for is measuring natural gas," he said.

He went on to say whoever took the meters must have known what they were doing because the gas was shut off before the meters were removed.


In case you are wondering, Johnston said this is not a common occurrence.

"It's the only ones since I've been the manager that have been stolen," he said. Johnston has been the manager of Ruidoso Natural Gas for six years.

The gas meters cost \$108 apiece.

been determined, but the State Fire Marshal's office has been asked to investigate.

The Cunningham fire was reported about 5:40 p.m. Friday, when the family noticed smoke in the living room. They checked the basement and discovered flames below the fireplace.

Three Bonito Volunteer Fire Department units responded, used chainsaws to gain access to the wall and had the flames knocked down

within minutes. The crew spent several more hours extinguishing the smoldering floor joists and the subflooring below the fireplace.

According to the official report, the fire started in the firebox, burning through the floor and bottom of the firebox and into the basement.

Family members speculated to firefighters that the charcoal lighter fluid used in the fireplace may have leaked into the subfloor, leading the resulting fire into the floor joists.

Although smoke was present in the home, the family's smoke alarms failed to sound. Upon examination, it was discovered the alarms had been disconnected without the family's knowledge.

"We were fortunate the fire department got here as fast as they did or we would have lost the house," said Ken Cunningham.

The Ruidoso Fire Department also answered calls to several chimney fires over the weekend.

agency will recommend 485,760 acres for wilderness designation, including 25,312 acres in Lincoln County.

The Lincoln County area is called the Little Black Peak and Carrizozo Lava Flow Wilderness Study Area (WSA). Locally it is known as the Malpais and is located to the west and northwest of Carrizozo.

Disputes over water and grazing generally do not apply with the Malpais WSA because there is no surface water and the topography virtually prohibits reasonable or economical grazing.

Two wilderness areas already exist in Lincoln County. The White Mountain Wilderness Area and the Capitan Wilderness Area, both

managed by the Lincoln National Forest.

These wilderness areas are located in alpine terrain at the headwaters of any riparian systems. The Malpais WSA is a low altitude area, as are most of the BLM areas.

This difference between the BLM areas and those managed by the NFS is viewed as very important by groups who believe language pertinent to New Mexico needs to be written regarding grazing and access by motorized vehicles.

"The language addressing grazing will not survive a test of law," said Bud Eppers, the new president of the New Mexico Cattle Growers Association.

"That's just not the case," said Jon Joseph, wilderness specialist for the New Mexico BLM.

Language in the FLPMA, which required the BLM to survey areas suitable for wilderness, indicates once these areas become wilderness the management guidelines currently used by NFS wilderness areas will apply to the BLM areas.

These management procedures have already been successfully used both in Arizona and New Mexico in wilderness areas of low altitude with no change in grazing regulations, said Joseph.

But the process to find a resolution to these issues is likely to be lengthy. In fact, the Secretary of the Interior has until October 1991 before he makes his recommendations to the president. The president then has two years before he makes a recommendation to Congress, and Congress has no time limit in which to act.

Candidates get set to file January 9

The time is drawing near for interested parties to file for candidacy in the March 6, regular municipal elections.

Ruidoso will be electing a mayor for a four-year term, three councilors for four-year terms and a municipal judge for a four-year term during the upcoming election.

According to village clerk Tammie Maddox, the only day candidates can file for office is January 9, between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. at her office in village hall.

Maddox said in order for a person to be certified as a candidate, they must have the following documents:

—A declaration of candidacy form which is provided by the Maddox's office.

—A certified copy of the candidate's current affidavit of voter registration on file with the county clerk and which has been certified by the county clerk between November 28, 1989 and January 9, 1990.

—The triplicate copy of the candidate's current affidavit of registration, stamped by the county clerk on a date between November 28, 1989 and January 9, 1990.

Maddox said all the candidate's affidavits of voter registration must show their address as a street address or a rural route number, not a post office box.

She went on to say, the declarations of candidacy will only be accepted if they contain the following information:

—The identical name and residential street address as shown on the affidavit of registration submitted with the declaration of candidacy.

—The office and term to which the candidate is seeking election.

—A statement the candidate is eligible and legally qualified to hold the office they are seeking.

—A statement the candidate has not been convicted of a felony, or if they have a felony conviction, a statement their elective franchise has been restored.

—A statement the candidate or

their authorized representative, will personally appear at the Municipal Clerk's office during normal business hours on January 10, to ascertain whether the Municipal Clerk has certified the declaration of candidacy as valid.

—A telephone number at which the candidate or their authorized representative can be reached for the purpose of giving telephone notice.

—A statement that the declaration of candidacy is an affidavit under oath and any knowingly false statement is a fourth degree felony.

—The notarized signature of the candidate on the declaration of candidacy.

Maddox stressed the information

on the candidate's voters registration and their declaration for candidacy have to match.

"The information on that registration has to match exactly that on the declaration for candidacy," she said.

Maddox said on January 11, she will post a list of names of those individuals she has certified as candidates and those who are not certified and why they have not been.

Also at 5:01 p.m. on January 11, Maddox will oversee a drawing by the candidates to determine the order their names will appear on the ballot.

Maddox said each candidate can

only run for one elected office. She also said the county clerk's office will send by mail the required forms for filing a declaration of candidacy. The office of the county clerk requires 65 cents for postage and copying to send the certified copy of the voters registration to each candidate.

Deadlines and requirements are the same for all municipalities in the state, with candidates required to file in the municipal clerk's office of the town in which they are seeking an elected position.

Ruidoso Downs and Capitan will also be electing new mayors and trustees this March.

District judge sentences nine

Four juveniles and five adults appeared last week before Judge Richard A. Parsons in Twelfth Judicial District Court in Carrizozo.

According to assistant district attorney Scot Key's office, three of the juveniles were sent to the Youth Diagnostic and Development Center in Albuquerque for evaluation and one was sent to the New Mexico Boys School at Springer.

Daniel Chavez of San Patricio, Lyle Gene Humphreys of Ruidoso Downs and Kevin Dale Craft of Ruidoso were all sent to the Youth Diagnostic and Development Center for a 90-day diagnostic evaluation after all admitted to allegations of probation violations.

Key's office said Jorge Manual Newsome of Ruidoso admitted to one count of larceny, two counts of receiving stolen property, one count of fraudulent refusal to return leased property and 18 counts of forgery.

Newsome was sentenced to two years at the New Mexico Boys School in Springer.

Key's office also reported the sentencing of five adults during last

weeks proceedings. James Albert Morgan (date of birth 9-5-60) of Ruidoso pled no contest to criminal trespass, two counts of residential burglary, two counts of conspiracy to commit commercial burglary and one count of commercial burglary. He was sentenced to one year in prison on the first count, two, three-year sentences for the second and third counts and three 18-month sentences for the fourth, fifth and sixth counts. All the sentences are to run concurrently, for a total of three years.

Because the court also found Morgan to be a habitual offender, with three prior offenses, he was also given an eight-year sentence. His habitual offender sentence will run concurrently with the three-year sentence for a total of eight years in prison. The court also said Morgan must serve two years mandatory parole following his eight-year sentence.

According to the assistant district attorney's office, three of the other adults received probation and one was sentenced to the Lincoln County Jail.

Michael Smith (4-29-67) of Ruidoso received three years probation for possession of psilocybin mushrooms with intent to distribute and possession of drug paraphernalia.

Gerald Hudson (7-1-32) of Childress, Texas, pled no contest to writing worthless checks over \$25, a felony. He was sentenced to one year in the Lincoln County Jail. All but 30 days of the sentence were suspended by the court and he was given credit for the 11 days he has already spent in jail. Following his release from jail, he will be on unsupervised probation for the remainder of the year he was to have served.

Donald J. Timmerman (9-13-51), formerly of Ruidoso, but now living in El Paso, Texas, pled no contest to two counts of distribution of marijuana. He received 36 months probation.

Joseph A. Aguilar (8-29-70) of Ruidoso Downs pled no contest to aggravated burglary, larceny of a firearm, larceny between \$250 and \$2,500 and conspiracy to commit residential burglary. He received one-year probation.

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



Huey has been a volunteer at the park for the past two years where she tells visitors the Smokey Bear story and assists in the park's visitor center.





The Plant Corner by Sally Black

DEAR SALLY:

Thanks to your beautiful peacock, and the fact he sheds his magnificent tail yearly, we used his feathers to make some of our "N.M. Spirit Dolls." Our dolls represent LAND (wood and wool), SEA (shells and coral), AIR (feathers), LIGHT (sun, moon, and stars). The feathers represent the clean Ruidoso AIR we love so much.

My question—is there a peacock plant? I have heard there was. If so, please give us the description and growing instructions.

Thank you and

DEAR BOLTONS:

And thank you for the precious little doll. There is, indeed, a Peacock Plant, "Calathea" and I'm happy to help you with it. First, Mr. Peacock and I want you to

know he now has his new tail, larger and more gorgeous than ever, which you may have next fall.

Native to Brazil and Africa, Calatheas are usually called "marantas," to which they are closely related and from which they differ only in technical aspects.

Exotically colored leaves in shades of green and brown with its exquisitely patterned leaves, it is one of the most striking of foliage plants. It fully justifies its common name of Peacock Plant. This is clearly not a plant for the beginner. But, if you have the time and patience, you will be richly rewarded.

Soil—For best results use a mixture of one part peat moss, one part perlite or vermiculite, one part

sharp sand, and one-half part well rotted or dried cow manure. Otherwise, use a packaged, highly organic potting mixture formulated for African Violets. Good drainage is absolutely essential.

Water—Keep the humidity to at least 50 percent. Place the pot on a tray of pebbles covered with water, but do not allow the plant pot to touch the water—the plant must drain and not ever stand in water to become soggy. Ideally, water and spray the plant frequently with rainwater or distilled water, as tap water may leave white, ugly marks on the foliage. To maintain an even, moist soil, repot as often as necessary to avoid root-bound conditions.


Light—Peacock Plants do best in bright, indirect or curtain-filtered sunlight; if only artificial light is provided, at least 400 foot-candles is needed. Flowers of most are inconspicuous and of no consequence. It's the foliage which counts with this plant.

Temperature—Warmth is very important and con-

sistency is necessary. No lower than 65 degrees at night and 85 degrees daytime. This will be difficult but must be to grow this plant. You might think about getting one of those new table-top greenhouses. You can set the proper light, temperature, and humidity. They are great.

Fertilizer—Feed established plants every two weeks with standard house-plant fertilizer or my favorite, a good organic fertilizer. Either should be diluted to half the recommended use on the label. Wait three to five months before feeding newly purchased or potted plants.

Pests—Plants that require high humidity are more susceptible to pests. Check often for mealy bugs, aphids and mites. A clean environment with good, warm air circulation will prevent pests. Remember the old saying, "An ounce of prevention is worth a mealy bug in the hand."

Santacops reports on successful season

From all indications, this year's Santacops program was a tremendous success.

A total of 179 families in Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs, Capitan, Carrizozo and the Hondo Valley were helped by the Santacops organization this Christmas with donations of food, clothing and toys.

Around 50 volunteers from all over the area were involved in the interviewing of families, wrapping of gifts and the actual delivery of the food boxes and presents.

Gift wrapping the numerous toys and stuffed animals began on Monday, December 18, and went on all day and into the night, continuing throughout the week. In fact, some of the volunteers were still wrapping presents as box loads of gifts were being delivered.

The delivery of the donated items began at 9 a.m. on Friday December 22, when representatives of the Ruidoso Police Department, Ruidoso Downs Police Department and the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office began loading boxes full of food and toys into their police cars.

Officer Lou Wardwell of the Ruidoso Police Department, one of the Santacops organizers, said volunteers were still delivering boxes of food, clothing and toys to extra families, not on the original list, as late as 6:30 p.m. on Christmas Eve.

She said volunteers delivered 15 to 20 extra food boxes to needy families, that were either not on the Santacops list or couldn't wait until Christmas for the food.

Wardwell said she was astonish-

ed by what each individual community had done for the Santacops organization. She said every community helped out with donations.

"Everybody just outdid themselves with what they did," Wardwell said. "Without them digging deep, it wouldn't have happened."

Santacops organizers expressed their gratitude to Jim and Jackie Varnadore for all the help with the Santacops program. Varnadore Cleaners cleaned and pressed more than 235 used coats, free of charge, for Santacops.


Wardwell said Santacops gave away so many coats to needy families and kids, the coordinators lost count.

"We lost track of the number of coats we gave away before Christmas," she said.

There was so much food, clothing and toys donated to Santacops this year, the group actually had items left over after helping all the families. But organizers say, not to worry, the leftover food was donated to the Lincoln County Food Bank and the leftover clothing and toys were donated to the Thrift Shop operated by the Lincoln County Medical Center Auxiliary.

Without a doubt, sports have qualities which sometimes leave us with wide open mouths and pruned brains. In general, the best team wins. The article explained a little about this Orange Bowl quest in the following passages.

After the game against Nebraska, Jeff Campbell, an ex-hockey player and a walk on from Vail, identified the primary reason for the Buffs winning season.

"We have a focus," he said, inclining his head toward the other side of the dressing room. There a locker had been encased in plated glass and transformed into a shrine of sorts. Inside it was a uniform of the Buffaloes' late quarterback, Sal Aunese, who died of stomach cancer on September 23, at the age of 21.

In a letter to his teammates, Aunese wrote, "Hold me dear to your heart as you know I do all of you. Strive only for victory each time we play... I love you all. 'Go gettem' and bring home the Orange Bowl. Love Sal."

The players have united around Sal's dying wish.

Most people know what the Fighting Irish can do, they have been doing it for many years, but does anyone predict the winner of the game between Notre Dame and Colorado?

I don't think many sports experts will doubt the motivating spirit of Colorado. The Buffaloes are not only fearless, but also have something else on their side.

Bill McCartney, head coach of the Buffs, remarked on the unpredictability of this years season.

"Nobody could orchestrate the way the team has come together. Nobody could plan it. It just comes from within," the coach said.

Of course the great athletes of any sport have had days, Notre Dame lost one game this year, it was a bad day for them. The other 98% of the time Notre Dame has good days and wins.

That same thing happens in business, education and political arenas of life.

What does it all mean?

Planning and preparation sometimes just won't help. No matter how many good athletes a team has or how well the team uses the game plan, if its opponents have something more to gain from a victory, they may beat the "better team".

That's where my next point comes in. The reason someone becomes a football player or a doctor etc., should be for sincere reasons, otherwise someone else will probably be better.

The sincerity of Colorado's late quarterback rubbed off on the other teammates according to Bill McCartney.

"When it gets cold up here a lot of guys put on gloves and add layers of cloths," said the coach. "Not Sal. Sal was from San Diego, but he refused to acknowledge the cold. He'd go out in short sleeves, just like a lineman. It was like that when he got sick. He refused to show us his pain. Only his spirit." The head coach was crying after the reminiscence.

Aunese's presence is everywhere. When the team is on the road a seat is saved on the bus for Sal. If a charter plane is needed, a seat is saved on the plane. Team meals also have an empty chair for Sal and a bed is saved for him at motels. McCartney's daughter, Kristyn, was married to Sal and has an eight-month old son named Tim.

Sometimes the press has accused the players of milking the death of Sal. But the players don't think that way. They feel that Sal is with them and will stay with them for a lifetime. It's not just a fad.

The Orange Bowl winner will be decided on New Year's day, Monday, and no matter who is victorious, the Buffaloes have experienced something few teams have, a real spirit of togetherness.



The United States Olympic soccer team will be playing in its first World Cup performance this year. Soccer is becoming more important in the United States and players like Sam Gumbert are the backbone of the Olympic scouting efforts.

All members of the Under 15 1/2 New Mexico State Olympic Development Soccer team were selected by four coaches, the Under 16 1/2 National Development coach, two regional coaches and the New Mexico State Under 15 1/2 coach, Winston Cole. Cole will practice with the team in the spring to prepare the players for the regional tournaments in Tempe, Arizona, in April and Colorado Springs, Colorado, in May.

Wildlife news

The State Game Commission unanimously approved a regulation that will continue the Wildlife Habitat Improvement program on a statewide basis, according to Ben Hanson of the New Mexico Game and Fish.

The meeting in Las Cruces on December 15, centered on the 1973 federal Sikes Act which allows states to collect funds for improving wildlife habitat.

New Mexico was the first state to use this act in 1985 with a \$10 stamp required for hunters in the Valle Vidal unit of the Carson National Forest. A \$5.25 stamp was required for all hunters trappers and anglers on Lincoln National Forest and surrounding Bureau of Land Management properties in 1987.

The Game Commission adopted the program for a five-year period beginning on April 1, 1991, and lasting until April 1, 1996.

"The Wildlife Habitat program has worked so well in New Mexico that other states are looking into

it," said Hanson. The expansion of the program will mean about \$1.2 million yearly in habitat stamp sales, rather than about \$160,000 as at present.

The special sandhill crane season scheduled for January has been canceled because the number of greater sandhill cranes taken during October has exceeded the state's allocation, said Greg Schmitt, bird project leader for the Department of Game and Fish. The second hunt was to be in the southwestern part of the state in portions of Luna, Sierra and Dona Ana counties January 6-8, 12-14, 19-21 and 26-28.

Hunters that applied for permits will be mailed letters of explanation.

"The number taken during the Middle Rio Grand Valley hunt was more than we estimated hunters would take in both seasons," said Schmitt. The department issued 574 permits for the Middle Rio Grande Valley hunt, but not all

hunters issued permits eventually go hunting."

The department biologists determined that hunters exceeded the allotted 454 bag limit on greater sandhill cranes, taking 458 cranes.

Channel catfish were stocked in the southeastern waters this month.

A Department of Game and Fish crew brought 20,000 catchable channel catfish from Uvalde National Fish Hatchery in Texas. These seven- to eight-inch catfish were put in Lake Van, Carlsbad Municipal and Bataan lakes in the southeastern part of the state. Another 44,000 channel catfish, five and a half inches long, were distributed to other southeastern waters, including the Pecos River above and below Carlsbad.

All the transplanted catfish will be catchable next spring and summer, said Steve Henry, assistant chief of fisheries management for the department.

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
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

Sunland increases purses

Sunland Park officials have announced the third purse increase of the meet as the New Mexico inter-track network has given horsemen a Christmas present that will mean an average increase of almost \$1,200 a day.

According to a news release provided by Sunland Park, straight allowance race purses will increase by \$500 with conditioned allowance purses jumping \$300. For the claiming ranks, the increase will be \$200 a race beginning with the \$4,000 level on up and will be \$100

more for the bottom level \$2,500 claimers.

The increase was scheduled to take effect Wednesday, December 27.

"The increase is a direct result of ITW and it is helping us to compete with other tracks in the Southwest in trying to attract and keep top quality stables," said Sunland Park president Lloyd Shelhamer in making the announcement.

After 38 days of racing this season, the numbers show the dramatic effect that intertrack

wagering (ITW) has had on the Sunland handle. A total combined mutuel handle of \$17,975,846 has been wagered on track and at the four simulcasting outlets. At that total, \$8,602,865, or a daily average of \$226,391, has been wagered off-track.

The Sports Theater at Ruidoso Downs Race Track is one of the ITW outlets, and presents all Sunland races with pari-mutuel betting. For more information on Sports Theater schedules, call 378-4431.



When the ambulance didn't arrive very quickly, Bud headed for the accident scene to make arrangements for the car so we could still make our flight. He showed up at the hospital a little while later, kind of white and pretty shaken by the sight of that car. It looked pretty bad.

And Bethany, when the ambulance pulled up and the EMTs unloaded our battered and bloody daughter, looked pretty bad herself. And that's when those well-laid plans went out the window, and (for the time being) we didn't really care.

Tom Hansen, who came upon the accident scene right after it happened, looked a little white, too, when he came by to check on Bethany and Nikki, as well as the Texas couple in the other car. He said they were all pretty lucky.

And so, those plans changed for all of us. That young couple from Texas didn't expect to make a stop in the ER on their Christmas vacation. We're all glad they're all right.

Bethany surely hadn't planned on a brand new ankle, built carefully by Dr. Lahey. And neither Nikki, Bethany or their mothers had planned on a hospital stay. We kind of had a slumber party that first night before Nikki went home the next morning.

And so we exchanged those plans for some new experiences and some new lessons. I'll bet Bethany, who will be on crutches for several months, will learn a lot from this whole trauma.

I already learned a lot. Like, what really good medical care we have right here in little Ruidoso. From the EMTs who brought the four injured young people to the hospital to the ER personnel, doctors and floor nurses at Lincoln County Medical Center, I don't think those kids could have gotten better care anywhere else.

Dr. Lahey showed us the "before" and "after" X-rays of Beth's new ankle, and I don't

think any orthopedist in the world could have done a neater job of rebuilding that crushed mass into a neat ankle complete with metal plate and pins. Dr. Harrison, wearing a magnifying glass, sewed up those gashed foreheads with the tiniest little stitches imaginable to make sure there would be minimal scarring.

Doctors Beechie, Robinson, Spence and Noltenmeyer were here, there and everywhere, taking care of the accident victims. All the folks in the ER were really kind and concerned, and it sure made a big difference.

Over the years I've wondered why people write letters to the editor thanking the hospital, doctors and nurses for taking care of them or their family members. After all, isn't it their job? But, now I know. The folks at LCMC make the medical care they provide much more than just a job.

And, I guess I'd like to write a letter to the editor, too. I'd thank Steve Keller and his entire staff, Pastor Dan Link and all our friends and family members who helped make a bad situation better.

And so, when plans fall through, some other things kick in...

Like the way Chuck went home and made telephone calls, cleaned the house and even unpacked Bethany's suitcase so she wouldn't be reminded of what she missed.

And the way our friends called and came by, bringing food, good wishes and offers to sit with Beth, run errands or whatever. It was really neat.

And the way Beth's friends sent flowers, brought presents and took the time to stop by and see her during one of the busiest weekends of the year.

This year, when I make my new year's resolutions, you can bet I won't resolve to plan ahead. I've gotten by without it all these years, so why start now.

But, I will resolve to take time to appreciate my hometown, my family and friends.







Section 2. The polls shall be open between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m. on election day.

Section 3. Precincts shall be consolidated for the election pursuant to Section 1-22-6, NMSA 1978, and all of the area within the exterior boundaries of the District

shall constitute a single consolidated precinct. The boundaries of the entire District shall constitute the boundaries of the single consolidated precinct and all voters of the District shall vote at the Middle School Office Lobby, Ruidoso Middle School, Ruidoso, New Mexico.

Section 4. Absentee voting will be permitted as authorized by Section 1-22-19 NMSA 1978, and the Absent Voter Act of the Election Code, Sections 1-6-1 through 1-6-18, NMSA 1978. Applications for absentee ballots may be obtained from the office of the County Clerk of Lincoln County, Lincoln County Courthouse, in Carrizozo, New Mexico; however, at 5:00 p.m. on February 5, 1990, the County Clerk is required by statute to destroy unused absentee ballots so completed applications shall be returned to the County Clerk prior to that time.
