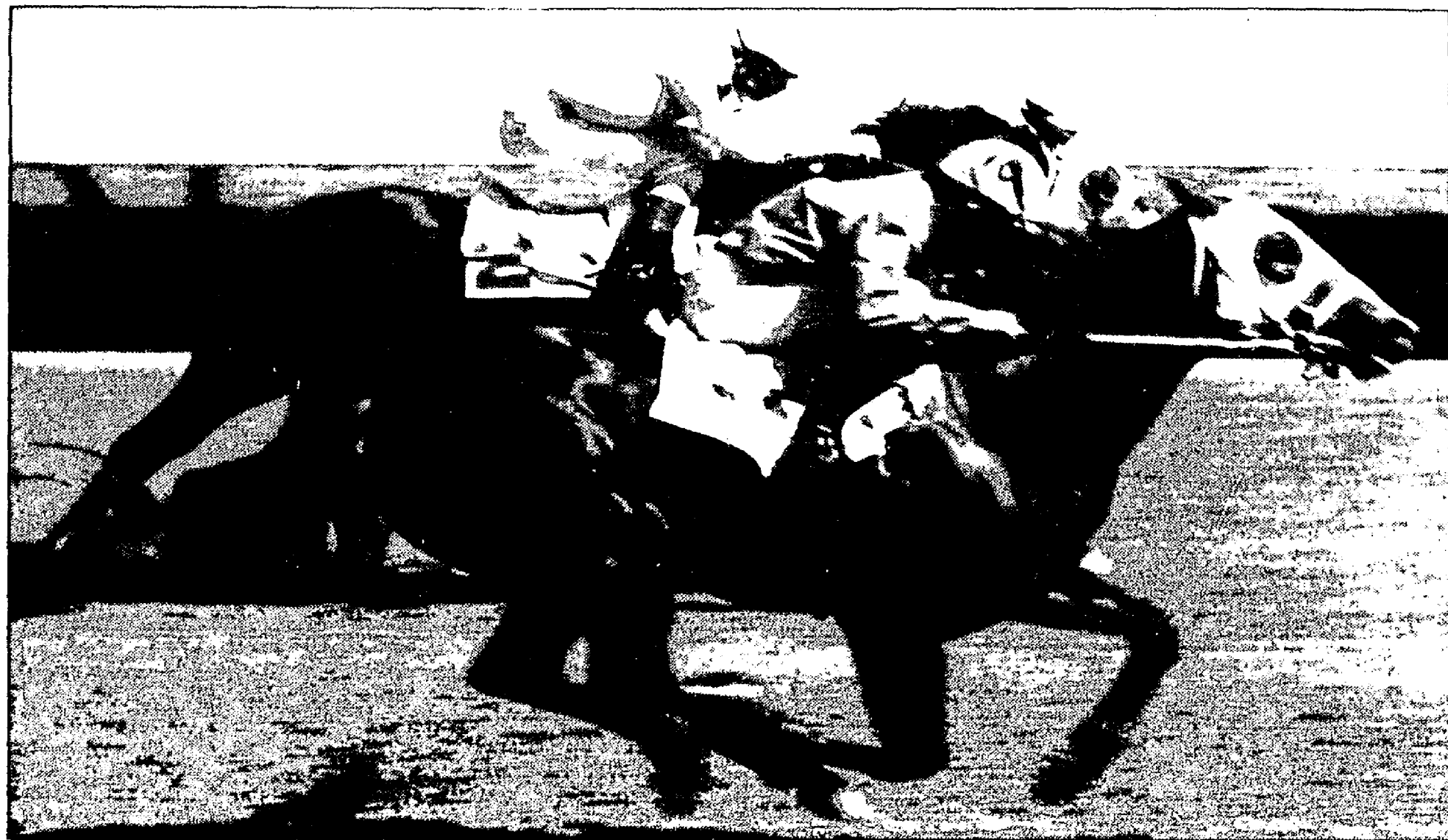

## Sixth graders start the year off with a holiday

Ruidoso sixth graders will start this school year with a two-day break.

Because the sixth grade building renovation project will not be completed on time, Ruidoso sixth graders will not start school until Monday, August 27.

All other Ruidoso students will start Thursday, August 23.

The Ruidoso Board of Education made its decision to delay sixth grade classes after hearing a building report from the district architect and the building contractor during Tuesday's regular meeting.

Paul Taylor explained to the board the delay has to do with delivery problems.

For example, temporary lighting will have to be installed because the light fixtures requested will not be shipped in time.

Also, the shipping date for lockers was August 8, but the shipping firm arbitrarily changed the date to September 3. After discussion with the firm, a new date to ship was set

at August 20.

Windows will not be shipped until the end of September or the first of October, said Taylor. In the mean time, temporary windows will be installed.

Other delayed items include carpeting, doors and vinyl flooring.

Board member Mike Morris suggested the contract be reviewed for whatever penalty clauses may be invoked.

Taylor said when the items arrive, crews will work nights and/or weekends, if necessary, to complete the job.

"I don't think this is what the board wants, but I don't think we have any choice," said board vice president Don Swalander when the board voted to delay the first day for sixth graders.

Taylor also told the board the job cost nearly \$450,000 with a 77-day completion time. This was not a lot of time for a job that size, especially when two change orders were involved, he said.

Following the discussion on the sixth grade building, district ar-

chitect Scott Stafford gave a presentation on the work to be done at the White Mountain site.

Stafford noted there were many problems with the building that required correction, but there were other problems with the grounds as well.

In particular, drainage problems were considered severe enough to warrant attention, but this may divert needed money from the building renovation, said Stafford.

Reroofing of the building will be required, using a synthetic rubber-like product which was used on the White Mountain gymnasium.

One leak did develop on the gymnasium roof, but this was the result of a bottle thrown onto the roof where it broke and punctured the tough, rubber-like material, said Stafford.

After some discussion the board agreed to call for bids for computer hardware maintenance because superintendent Mike Gladden believed the \$15,000 quoted by

## Lore sets the record straight on IRS seizures

Ruidoso businessman George Lore wants all the facts out on his troubles with federal agencies.

Lore contacted The Ruidoso News after an article appeared in the Monday, August 13 issue and offered to clarify and correct some statements made regarding his business dealings with individuals under indictment for cocaine smuggling.

In the August 13 article, The News incorrectly stated the 8,000 square foot house under construc-

tion in Glenora was being built for Hector Anchondo, who was in-

dicted by the grand jury on charges of smuggling cocaine into the U.S. The house is being built for Carlos Lopez Anchondo, Hector's son, said Lore.

Carlos Anchondo was never indicted for any involvement in the alleged cocaine smuggling operation.

A source said to never be involved in business with Carlos Lopez Anchondo, but conduct business with Hector Lopez Anchondo, who is not in the Ranch, Lore said.

Hector Anchondo was indicted by the grand jury.

None of the properties The News listed as seized by federal agents under money laundering statutes included any personal property owned by Lore.

The Internal Revenue Service had at one time seized an automobile owned by Lore. In the seizure document, the IRS mentioned Lore should have known about the reporting procedures because of his association with the Bank of Ruidoso.

Lore said he was well aware of

the bank's responsibility to report transactions of \$10,000 or more, but was not aware an individual was required to report as well.

In addition, not every transaction involved cash or cashiers checks less than \$10,000, said Lore.

For example, Lore accepted two \$120,000 personal checks from Mexico for payment on the Glenora house under construction.

Lore took back the house from Carlos Anchondo because he stopped paying for it.

As far as I know, the only money I ever received was for work

done," said Lore.

While the U.S. Attorney's office said all the properties except the Bear Ranch and one in Ruidoso owned by James Romero McTague were forfeited with the title held by the U.S. Government, Lore said the titles are still in dispute.

In fact, the U.S. Attorney requested Lore to do additional work on the Glenora house, costing about \$30,000. The U.S. Attorney then told Lore to add this to his liens.

My liens are valid, said Lore, who still continues to make pay-

ments for insurance and taxes on the properties in question.

Lore said he has a total lien of about \$335,000 on the large house under construction.

Lore also repeated he was never aware of Carlos Ponce's or Hector Anchondo's activities and that his mere association with them has contributed to a loss in business.

If I were involved in this I would've been under arrest, he said.

## Council conducts marathon meeting

Longevity was the key to sitting through Tuesday night's three and a half hour village council meeting.

The council handled a variety of issues during the marathon meeting, ranging from traffic control on Hull Road to dismissal of a lawsuit against the Environmental Improvement Division.

The council began the meeting by listening to a report from village manager Charles Norwood on a revised schedule for hiring a new civic center architect.

Norwood said the request for proposals would be advertised until August 27. All proposals should be received by village hall at that time.

He said the proposals will be reviewed on a short list developed on August 29 through 31. Interviews and the final selection will take place on September 4, and the contract and proceed order will be issued between September 4 through 7. Norwood said the approval of the selected architect will require a special council meeting on September 4.

Dick Weber of the Iron Horse Railroad Foundation Incorporated approached the council about providing seed money for several studies needed by the railroad to get started.

Weber told the council New Mexico State University and the University of New Mexico had agreed to do an economic impact and environmental impact study for the railroad. Both studies will cost around \$60,000, he said.

He asked the council for \$15,000 in seed money over the next two years.

"We need a kind of a kick," he said.

Weber asked the council for

\$4,900 out of this year's budget, to be paid directly to the universities. He said if the council is pleased with the study and believes the money is well spent, the railroad will ask for the additional \$10,000 in next year's budget.

Weber ended by saying the studies will be used to obtain funding for private, state and federal sources. He said the universities are already seeking other funding sources as well.

Councilor Al Junge asked if the seed money could come out of the lodgers tax funds. Mayor Victor Alonso said it would be more appropriate for the council to provide the money through its economic development fund, much like the council did for the Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County.

Councilor Ron Andrews said he originally was opposed to the council providing funding for private enterprises. He said since the Iron Horse will be funneling profits back into expansion of the project, he was for it.

"I think this is one of the best projects brought before us," Andrews said.

Councilor Jess Stinson made the motion to approve the \$4,900 seed money for the railroad. Councilor Al Junge wanted to abstain from the voting because he has an interest in the project. The council decided to let him vote anyhow and the motion passed unanimously.

Village attorney John Underwood read a letter from attorney Rebecca Wardlaw concerning a gift to the Ruidoso Public Library from the estate of Mary Katherine Anderson Dean.

Dean donated \$24,443 and two pieces of property, one in Deer Park Woods, the other in the Mark Condominiums, for use by the Library

Underwood suggested the money and property be turned over to the Library Advisory Board to determine how the funds can best be used.

The council unanimously accepted the gift and instructed the Library Board to study how the funds could best be used.

Underwood also told the council about a recent letter he received from the Attorney General's office concerning gasoline prices in Ruidoso.

Reading from the letter, Underwood said in the early '80s price fixing appeared after gasoline deregulation. The Attorney General's office prosecuted a number of people on criminal charges. Underwood said an investigation was recently completed of gas prices in Carlsbad. He said the investigation did not turn up any price fixing, and the Attorney General was not interested in pursuing the matter further unless proof of a written or oral agreement on price fixing can be presented as evidence.

Underwood said the Attorney General feels the matter of gasoline prices would be best handled through legislative action instead of criminal action.

Councilor Junge told the council and the audience, an article in the Monday edition of The Ruidoso News brought out some concerns of the council about problems with the hotel and golf course leases. Junge said it was not Mayor Alonso's responsibility to bring these problems up to the developers of the golf course and hotel. He said you would think people who deal with multimillions would know of a breach of the lease.

In response to R.D. Hubbard's comments that All Hub has not taken over the golf course property as of yet and therefore has not pro-

vided the village with copies of its insurance, Junge said as far as he is concerned when the first shove of dirt was turned over, the property was occupied and the village should have had copies of the policies.

Junge then made a motion, seconded by Ron Andrews, that the village attorney contact All Hub and get copies of the policies.

He went on to say the hotel had not provided proof of construction, financing to the village as of the deadline of July 16. He said the village sent them a certified letter on August 9 stating this fact and they now find out the financing people would be here on August 20. He questioned why the hotel hadn't obtained financing before now.

"I have no patience with people who don't keep their word," Junge said.

Mayor Alonso asked Underwood for his legal interpretation of the section of the lease in question. Underwood said the problem seems to center around the word "occupation." He said the section of the golf course lease requiring proof of public liability insurance and worker's compensation would apply to the construction phase. He said the village should be supplied with copies of the policy because the village, as the owner of the property, is subject to being sued.

Mayor Alonso told Councilor Junge he wanted to keep his concerns separate from those of the governing body. He said since the election, the village has negotiated with the principal of the golf course and hotel on over 30 separate items. He said it was his intention to handle these problems in the same manner.

"It's important we keep the avenues of communication open," he said.

Jostens could be beat.

There was some confusion during the discussion as to what was required by the district.

White Mountain Elementary principal Frank Cannella told the board he believed a better price could be found.

The Josten's software and equipment, as well as the Apple hardware, comes with a warranty, which led board member Rod Adamson to think a contract for an entire year was not necessary.

With the 90 day warranty, Adamson thought only another 90 day maintenance contract was necessary because a school year is 180 days.

Cannella said the contract would be for a school year, but when asked if that meant the contract would run over to the following school year Cannella said he wasn't sure.

Cannella also said the warranty on the computers, which were delivered in June, may have started at the time of delivery, which means nearly 60 days of the warranty may have already been used

before the computers themselves were used.

The \$15,000 quoted by Josten's is for all three computer labs.

Cannella told the board he would research the issue and come back with better information.

In other business the board:

—Heard an update from Gladden regarding Mescalero elementary students. Gladden recapped the meeting he attended in Mescalero, which The News reported on in the Thursday, August 9, issue.

—Approved the coaching assignments for 1990-91.

—Agreed to meet every-other month, beginning with September, at each of the school sites for regular board meetings.

—Heard reports from Gladden and other administrators regarding computer workshops for teachers and other in-service training for teachers and substitutes.

—Accepted the resignations of Linda Skellet, second grade teacher; Diane Curry, special education teacher; Zale Woodward, eighth grade coach and teacher; and Rita Herrera, cafeteria manager at the high school.

—Approved the employment of Terry Goff as a half-time speech and language pathologist; Gary Stamper as a third grade teacher; Jean Forister as a counselor at the high school; Ed Davis as a math teacher and coach at the high school; Nancy Wright as the middle school secretary; and Kathy Roten as a Nob Hill aide.

—Approved a bid for non-GSA computer related items from Computer Works in Alamogordo for \$9,509.65.

—Approved the lunch applications and the cafeteria plan.

—Approved a joint powers agreement with the Hondo Schools for developmentally disabled students.

—Accepted the board goals for 1990-91.

# Searchers locate lost man

White Mountain Search and Rescue (WMSAR) continues to bat a thousand following another successful overnight mission.

Joseph Rockholt, 70, of Roswell, was found at 3 a.m. Tuesday morning in the Capitan Mountains following a three-hour search by WMSAR, Lincoln County Sheriff's Office (LCSO) and Posse.

"He was pretty cold, but otherwise he was OK," reported Dave Travis of WMSAR.

After resting in Carrizozo Tuesday, Rockholt was expected to contact friends to return him to Roswell. He was unavailable for comment.

Rockholt told his rescuers Tuesday morning that Monday afternoon he had been showing his mining claim below Capitan Peak to two Roswell men who worked for him. Rockholt had driven to the mine site alone in a sedan while the other two were in a pickup. The group was returning to Roswell about 4 p.m. on Forest Road (FR) 57 in the Capitan Mountains when Rockholt's car became stuck in the mud.

His companions in the other vehicle didn't stop to help, however, "just waved and went on," he later related to Travis.

At 7:30 that evening, LCSO received a call from "George and another guy" from Roswell telling them that "a 70-year-old man with a heart condition was stuck in the mud somewhere in the mountains." Having no equipment to extricate a car from heavy mud, LCSO dispatched the wrecker from Carrizozo.

Philip Ortiz searched the area for several hours, himself becoming stuck at one point.

"Directions the guy had given us were wrong," confirmed sheriff's deputy Gilbert Sambrano.

At nearly 11 p.m. the wrecker called in, saying he couldn't find Rockholt and was giving up. Sambrano then decided not to wait until morning to resume the search. "I was worried about his heart condition," so he called members of the Sheriff's Posse and notified Ruidoso Police Department to call out WMSAR.

It was a chilly 1:30 a.m. when Sambrano met volunteers Jerry Bertramsen and Marvin-Jones of the posse and WMSAR volunteers Danny Harrington, Travis, Bob Power, Jr., David Saum, Al Radtke and field coordinator Bob Profit at the Smokey Bear Restaurant in Capitan.

The search had begun.

Despite confused directions from the Roswell pair, Sambrano had a fairly good idea where to find Rockholt. Using triangulation, he estimated Rockholt to be about three-quarters of the way toward Arabella.

Rather than approach the search site from the east, rescuers chose to come into FR 57 from Baca Campground off NM 380 near Lincoln. They hoped to avoid an uphill, muddy trek. Even so, their vehicles became mired more than once, and one had a flat tire.

Volunteers' persistence paid off when, at 3:25 a.m., rescuers spotted Rockholt's sedan. It was encased in six inches of mud on FR 57, approximately 13 miles from the intersection of FR 57 and NM 380, about 5 miles west of Arabella.

Rockholt was safe inside, sleeping," reported Travis. "And he sure was glad to see us."

The Roswell man had done the right thing by staying in his car. Those whose vehicles become stuck or disabled often think they should attempt walking out to seek help, but this is wrong.

"Always stay with the vehicle," emphasized Travis. "You have a better chance of keeping warm and dry, you can honk the horn or shine lights."

He also recommends carrying a survival kit with candles in your car at all times. In extreme circumstances, "you can fill your spare tire with gasoline and set it on fire. Heavy black smoke can be seen for miles."

"He had no family to miss him," pointed out Travis. "Always tell someone where you're going and when you expect to be back. It doesn't matter if you're hiking, four-wheeling, or checking on a mine claim — tell somebody."

Unable to move the sedan, rescuers bundled Rockholt into Sambrano's vehicle for a warm trip back to Carrizozo and civilization. The search concluded at approximately 6 a.m. — in time for the weary volunteers to go to work.

"I appreciate all the help from WMSAR and Posse members," thanked a grateful Sambrano. "These guys have daytime jobs, but they came out at midnight and didn't leave until we found him. We couldn't have done it without them."

# Mayor taps lodgers group for research project

Members of the Ruidoso Lodgers Tax Advisory Board have officially accepted an assignment by Mayor Victor Alonso regarding the quest for an acceptable plan for a proposed civic events center.

At issue are interior space allocations and design as well as exterior appearance and type of construction.

Alonso requested that board members personally check buildings in other cities which exhibit different types of construction methods.

Members said at a special meeting Monday afternoon at village hall, that they have requested printed material and photographs

from various prefab and tilt-wall construction firms.

The Ruidoso Village Council recently severed a relationship with the architectural firm which was under contract and had been drawing plans for a civic center. Bids for architectural services are being sought from other firms.

Alonso, Lodgers Tax Advisory Board chairman Ed Hyman, members Mark Doth and Slover Cape, and ex-officio member Jerry Watts of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, went over interior design plans that had been drawn by the original architectural firm.

LTAB members were charged by the mayor to study convention and civic centers in other communities to determine what is a "proper"

ratio of permanent meeting rooms space to exhibit space which might have movable walls.

Doth said the original design, in his opinion, contains way too much space devoted to permanent meeting rooms as opposed to exhibit space where trade shows and such might be staged.

Watts said that from the Chamber's point of view the present interior layout is not functional for various reasons.

LTAB members will report to the Village Council on August 28 regarding the assignment from the mayor.

There has been some criticism from the public that a pre-fab type building or "tilt-wall" type construction would appear "cheap."

One goal is to have a civic center which is compatible architecturally and in appearance to the Radisson Hotel which will be built adjacent to the civic center.

Alonso also asked LTAB members to check into how the hotel, civic events center, restaurants and hotel meeting rooms will interact.

"We are contractually obligated to build a building that fits in with the Radisson Hotel," the mayor said. The mayor said one of his concerns is that one councilor is possibly leading the village council just one way.

"That's not what I want," he declared.

Indications were that although the LTAB is looking at other types of construction, conventional construction

is being considered.

"The council is committed to getting the most square footage for the dollar," Alonso said. He asked LTAB members to "ask other pre-fab contractors ... get a broader view."

The council had heard and seen a presentation from just one pre-fab firm, Speed Fab-Crete from Fort Worth, Texas, as arranged by Councilor Al Junge.

Board members and the mayor agree that a civic events center of 30,000 to 35,000 square feet is highly desirable.

Chairman Hyman said 30,000 square feet should be the minimum.

Alonso asked board members to ask this question: "Are we on track

at this point."

Planned completion date for the civic events center is July 1, 1991. The Radisson Hotel completion date is the same.

Watts, executive director of the Chamber of Commerce, was asked to recommend a meeting rooms-exhibit space ratio considering the various Chamber promotions which would be held in the center each year.

Other members of the LTAB who will be involved in providing the village council with information are Jay Frances and Pat Morrison, both of whom couldn't be present, Monday.

Alonso said he did not want to polarize people and that these things were points for negotiation.

Junge said it was past time for talking, the village needed the policies.

Alonso said he would work with the village attorney, meet with the developers and come to an agreement.

Junge said he didn't realize until he read the article on Monday that the attitude of the other folks was they didn't owe the village the policies because they haven't occupied the property. Junge then withdrew his previous motion.

He then proceeded to lambast The Ruidoso News for a recent editorial concerning the proposed civic events center. Reading from a memorandum that he asked to be put in the official minutes, Junge said since the March 1990 election, The Ruidoso News has been no friend to the council.

"Everything the council is doing is being criticized by The News," he said.

He concluded by saying the council would build the civic center, on time, with the best construction materials, without the help of The Ruidoso News.

Mayor Alonso said when the council invited Speed Fab-Crete to give a presentation to the council, they had every intention to not stop with only one construction firm. He said the council hasn't made up its mind yet about the construction method of the civic center. He said the council simply has not had the time to investigate other methods, and councilors shouldn't be accused of having made up their minds yet.

Alonso said he has asked the Lodgers Tax Advisory Board to do the investigation on the council's behalf and report back to them in two weeks.

It was ten minutes after eight before the council took up the first regular item on the agenda.

The council accepted the recommendation of village manager Charles Norwood and postponed the adoption of Ordinance 90-8, regarding issuing revenue bonds for the civic center, until a special meeting at 9 a.m. on August 23. Norwood told the council the fiscal agents were working on improving the bond ratings.

The council heard a presentation from Stan Cape of the MainStreet Ruidoso selection committee. Cape told the council MainStreet had received eleven proposals for a planning consultant firm. He said the committee interviewed five of the applicants and chose the firm of Carter and Burgess, Incorporated of Fort Worth, Texas.

MainStreet Ruidoso was seeking a planning consultant firm to develop a redevelopment master plan.

The council approved a motion to enter into a contract with Carter and Burgess, and enter into a joint powers agreement with the Highway Department using the scope of services as a basis for an agreement.

Councilor Junge asked what this was going to cost the village.

State Representative Ben Hall, who was present at the meeting, said he had received a letter from Highway Secretary Dewey Lonsberry saying the village would not have to put up more money as part of their 10 percent match. Hall said money for MainStreet already in the village's budget would work as a match. He added the village would be receiving \$36,000 for the master plan as promised in the House Memorial.

In a discussion with planning and zoning chairman Robert Donaldson over a proposed three-way stop at Old Lincoln and Hull Road, Councilor Barbara Duff said she traveled with village consulting engineer John Shaw to look at the location and it appeared to her a car traveling north on Hull Road would have a hard time getting traction following a stop on a snowy road.

Donaldson said he felt there was room for two cars to stop at the crest of the hill. He said the other alternatives were increase enforcement or lowering the roadway.

"There are not a whole lot of good alternatives," Donaldson said.

Councilors asked Donaldson about the possibility of closing old Lincoln Road. Donaldson pointed out the other two entry road to Country Club Estates have problems. One is very steep and the other is shaded by trees which prevents the ice and snow from melting away.

In the end, Councilor Jess Stinson made the motion to table the recommendation for a three-way stop indefinitely. That motion passed unanimously.

Councilor Andrews then made the motion to have the P&Z commission hold a public hearing on the possible closing of Old Lincoln Road. Councilor Duff asked to amend the motion to include at the public hearing a discussion of problems at the intersection of Hull Road and White Mountain Drive, Warrior Drive and Cree Meadows Drive.

In other business before the council on Tuesday night:

—Council approved a request by Lamar Osbourn for a vacation of public right of way adjoining Lot 1, Block 1, Cherokee Subdivision. The vacation of right-of-way was to eliminate an encroachment of a house and deck into the right-of-way. The village maintains the right to obtain utility easements without cost, across the vacated area.

The applicant must pay 50 cents per square foot for the 363.9 square foot of vacated right-of-way.

The council instructed Norwood and planning administrator Cleatus Richards to review the amount of money set for vacation of right of way.

—The council upheld the interpretation of the sign ordinance and enforcement action taken by the planning and zoning commission in

prohibiting Domino's Pizza from displaying banners in locations other than its business location.

Domino's attorney, Owen Russell, said he agreed the P&Z followed procedures correctly, but disagreed with their interpretation of the ordinance. Russell contended the commission had no authority to enforce an advertisement sign on someone else's property.

Underwood agreed the village ordinance prohibits portable signs like banners, regardless of where they are. According to the sign ordinance, banners are allowed on the inside of a store's windows.

In the end, the council instructed the P&Z to review the sign ordinance pertaining to banners. The P&Z is to look at the wording of the ordinance and the process and procedures for placing a banner on a building.

—The council approved the appointment of Cleston Pritchett, John Schuller, Bill Hostetter, Jim Baker and Dr. Michael Spence to serve on a water study committee. Mayor Alonso also appointed J.D. James and Bill Karn to serve as members.

—Councilors also approved

Resolution 90-18, which dismissed the lawsuit the village has a part of against the Environmental Improvement Division. The village joined a New Mexico Municipal League lawsuit against the EID after that organization tried to enforce tough new landfill regulations.

—Following all regular items on the agenda, the council adjourned into executive session to discuss threatened and pending litigation as well as personnel. The council took no action following the executive session.

# Don't worry; Addy assures her town that it won't be annexed by its big neighbor

Ruidoso Downs residents and village trustees were assured at a meeting of trustees Monday evening that there is no way Ruidoso Downs can be annexed by Ruidoso without a popular vote of the people in Ruidoso Downs.

"The nonsense of annexation is just that," Mayor Bonnie Addy told the group. Village attorney Gary Mitchell explained the two ways annexation could occur.

Apparently some citizens expressed fear that a joint powers agreement with Ruidoso merging police dispatch and jail functions could result in annexation.

Mayor Addy read a portion of a state statute which says no municipality may annex territory within the boundary of another municipality "no matter how many joint powers agreements."

Ruidoso Downs is working with the Village of Ruidoso on a plan to combine the two police dispatch units and save both communities thousands of dollars a year. Plans have been discussed to use some of that found money to begin implementing the emergency "911" service.

Trustees and visitors at the trustees meeting Monday night heard a presentation by Jim Stover, Ruidoso Emergency Medical Services director, on the advantages to the public if the "911" emergency number service could be instituted county-wide or in various communities in the county independently or jointly.

Not everybody was convinced. During the evening a spirited discussion was heard over the proposal to link the police departments by consolidating the dispatching systems.

Addy said consolidation would save Ruidoso Downs \$20,000 per year plus a similar savings for Ruidoso.

Police officers would remain in Ruidoso Downs. The communications center at the village hall would be shut down at 5 p.m. with Ruidoso radio dispatchers taking over. The dispatchers would include two present Ruidoso Downs dispatchers who would join with Ruidoso dispatchers to create a central dispatching facility.

"No one would get fired or lose their jobs," Addy told trustees.

She said the only time Ruidoso officers would come to Ruidoso Downs would be as back-up or if all Ruidoso Downs officers were tied up.

Addy said she wanted to emphasize the financial savings.

"If we don't have the money, we can't spend it... we can't sit here by ourselves. We can't afford it," she declared.

"I'm not in favor of giving up any sovereignty for any reason," Jake Harris, former Ruidoso Downs mayor, who was in the audience, said.

"If they get control of the dispatchers, it'd be the first move toward taking over the Ruidoso Downs Police Department," Harris said.

He said that under a joint powers agreement with Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs was paying an unfair share of sewer plant operation.

"We pay our fair share and that is all we pay," Addy told Harris. She said flow meters determine who pays how much.

Trustee Jim Rethmel said he "doesn't perceive us losing anything" under a joint power agreement.

In fact, he said, "jail liability" would be transferred to Ruidoso. He cited the attack on one dispatcher which resulted, apparently, when she was on duty alone at night at the police department. He also cited possible legal liability say, if someone should hang themselves in the 72-hour holding jail facility at the Downs.

Police Chief Skip Hazel said he has reservations about closing the dispatching station at the PD at 5 p.m.

Addy also said she has heard concern over the possibility that Ruidoso Downs might lose its Post Office.

She said she had checked with Washington and found out "that people in the community have no say whatsoever on whether we have a post office or not."

She said that in eight or ten years, there may be one post office in Lincoln County covering a 50-mile radius. She said that due to economics the federal government is "looking to streamline" the postal service.

A joint powers agreement would have no effect on the Post Office," the mayor said.

Addy told trustees that she and deputy village clerk Leann Weihbrecht went to Santa Fe one day last week to "get the finances straightened out."

"We had our hands full getting the budget straightened up," she said. She said that for 1989-90, the village had an approved budget of \$171,525 but spent \$285,246.

Addy indicated that most of the overspending went toward solid waste handling by a previous administration. She said that a landfill operation "was certainly shut down for illegal dumping."

Addy was elected mayor of Ruidoso Downs after C.L. "Bones" Wright resigned in July.

She told the trustees and residents Monday night of her goals:

—Work within New Mexico, the county and the village for code enforcement.

—To treat everyone equally.

—Keep citizens advised of problems and possible solutions and what is going on at village hall.

—Work toward a planning and zoning board reactivation.

—Work on plans for moving the municipal offices to larger quarters, produce a periodic newsletter for citizens, work on the park and senior center projects and seek a major grocery store for Ruidoso Downs.

A main goal she said is "to put financial responsibility back in village government."

Stover asked the Downs trustees to spearhead a move toward establishing a "911" system for the county. He cited many advantages, especially during medical emergencies.

If the whole county were participating, there would be a savings, he said.

"If you can light a fire in Lincoln County for 911, I would encourage you to do it," he said.

A county-wide operation would require coordination including five telephone systems. He said most residents, especially part-time people, don't know their emergency numbers which are different for each community.

In other business, trustees were handed activity reports from the fire department, animal control, municipal courts, police and shop.

The village realized a \$1,502.10 profit from a county equipment sale. A fire truck brought \$900, a Dodge car, \$850, and miscellaneous, \$76.

A sale of Ruidoso Downs-owned property in Ruidoso Gardens brought \$3,612. Purchasers were Lee and Rita Ivy.

New village clerk Maurice Gudgel, new shop supervisor Dennis Riddle and animal control officer and code enforcer Bill Heineken were introduced.

Gudgel, who moved to the Downs from Oklahoma about July 1, was sworn in at the meeting by Weihbrecht.

The Warrior Volleyball team opens up its district schedule at home on September 29 against Oñate, and then the next weekend they must travel to Deming to play the Wildcats.

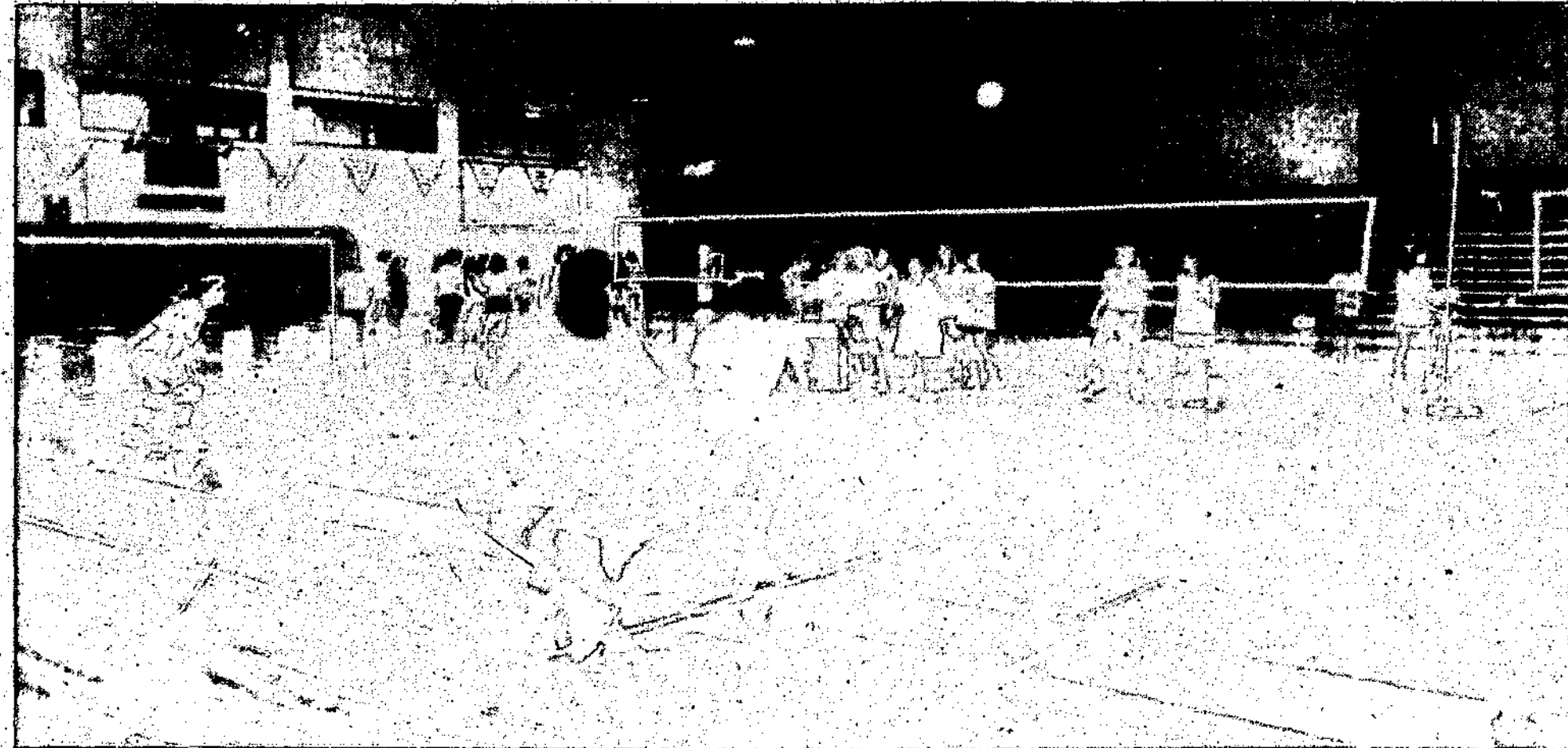

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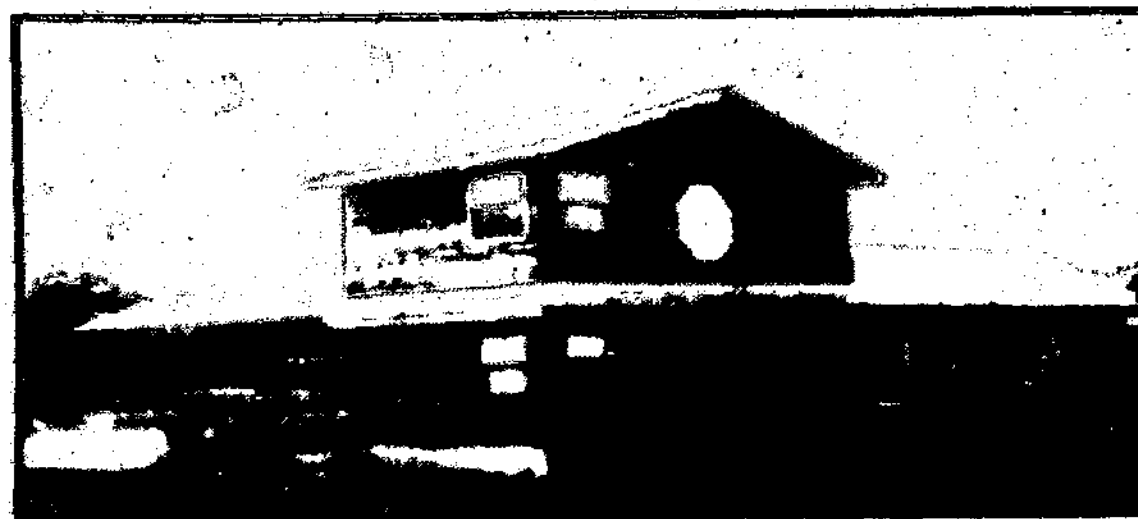
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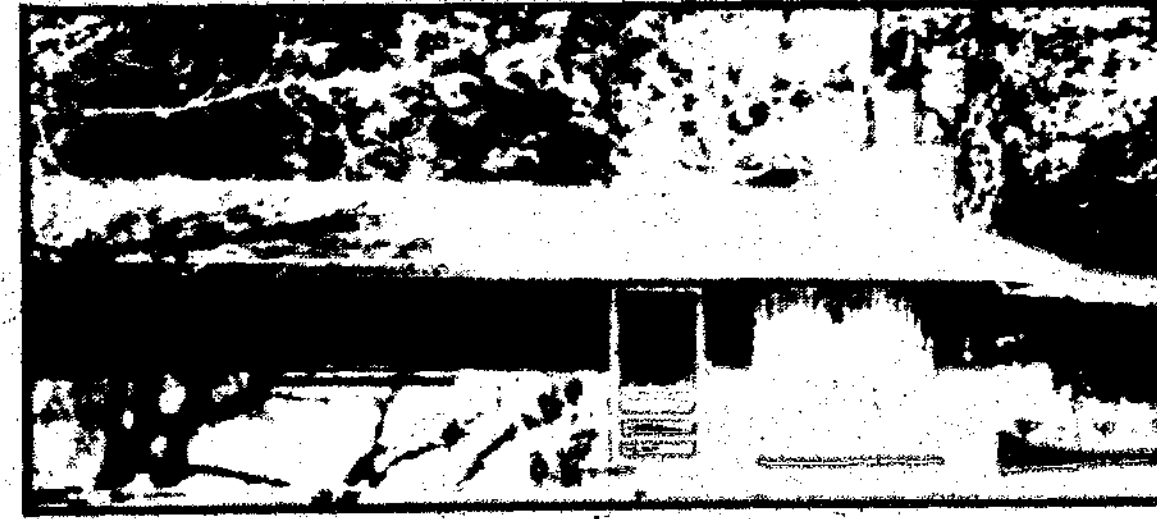

## Fish & Games purchases eggs from Australia

Summer is a difficult time to obtain trout eggs for state hatcheries, so the Department of Game and Fish has purchased four million eggs from Tasmania, Australia — where it's winter.

The rainbow trout eggs, shipped by air express last week and this week, are being hatched at Parkview, Red River and Lisboa Springs state hatcheries. They'll be ready for stocking next spring.

Normally, brood fish at Parkview hatchery, near Tierra Amarilla, supply eight to 10 million of the 14 million eggs the Department of Game and Fish needs annually. Parkview just reopened last year after being completely rebuilt, however, and is still building its inventory.

# Commission stands firm on dumping dumpsters

Lincoln County commissioners stood firm Monday on a decision to discontinue garbage collection in the county.

After an hour's discussion, the commission stuck by its guns, and county dumpsters will be taken out of service on, or about, September 7. At that time the county will be out of the garbage collection service.

A group of angry county residents came to Monday's regular commission meeting and asked the commission to reconsider.

Commissioners Robert E. Hemphill and Karen Z. Petty explained again their positions and they, along with commissioner Rick Simpson, who was not present when the commission first took action to remove the dumpsters, listened to pleas and complaints. They remained convinced the county has no obligation to be in the garbage collection business.

Simpson sat quietly through much of the discussion, but after listening to both sides, he agreed the present system of dumpsters is not working. Simpson agreed that some county residents are being left out in the cold.

The discussion on solid waste was an agenda item requested by county resident Joe Baker, who, along with several other audience members, contends the dumpsters are working and should not be removed leaving the county with only a compactor station at the old Fort Stanton site.

"The trash is getting out of hand," said Baker. "The tourists will not dump out at Fort Stanton."

Ruidoso Valley resident Mike Randle joined Baker in stating that when the dumpsters are removed illegal dumping will occur because residents will not want to drive the distance to the compactor station.

"I know for a fact what's going to happen," said Randall. "No one but a few diehards will haul their trash to Fort Stanton."

But the commission was not swayed by these and other veiled threats.

"The system doesn't work," said Hemphill, noting that the dumpsters are still in place but illegal dumping is already going on.

Randle countered the system does work because he sees the dumpsters full all the time.

Petty said the dumpsters in some areas are always full because contractors and other commercial haulers are using dumpsters which were intended for personal, residential use only.

The commissioners repeated their only obligation is to provide a site for disposal of solid waste, which will happen when the compactor station is established.

State law does not mandate the county to provide a collection service, said Hemphill.

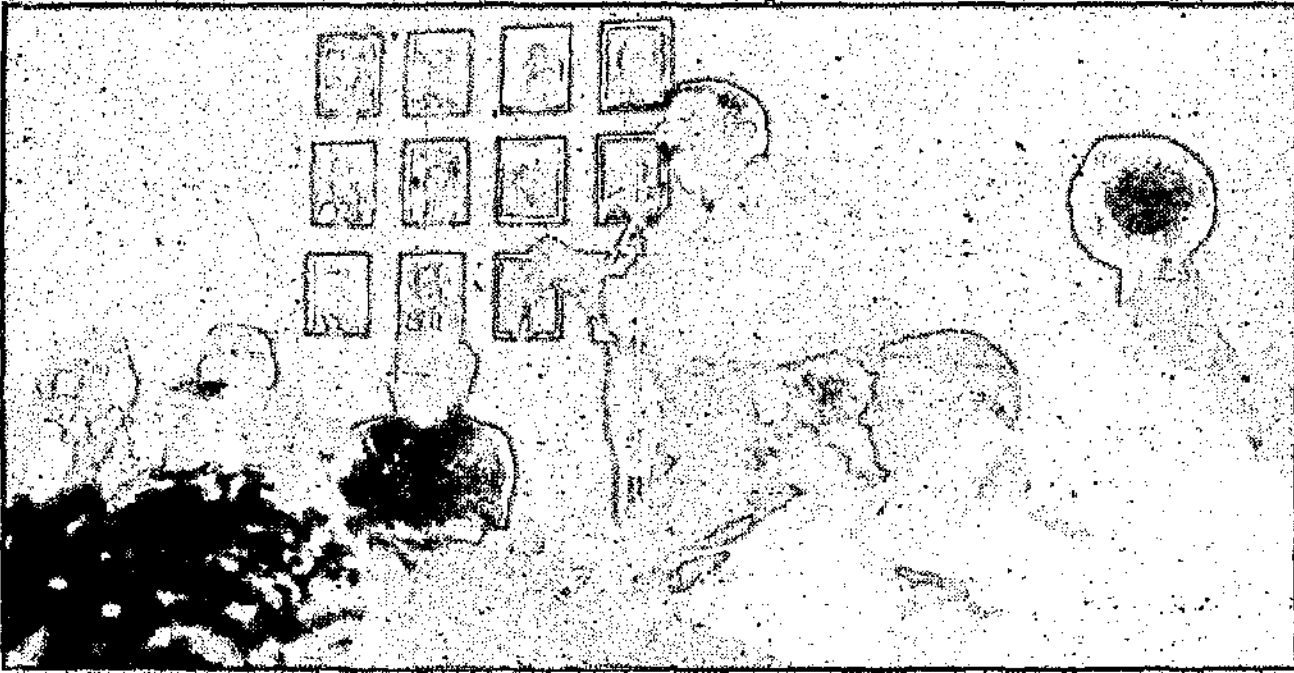
The other problem with the present system, the commissioners repeated, is that there is no fair way to charge for the service.

Because the county cannot selectively tax specific areas, a single tax is necessary county-wide to fund the collection service as well as other county services.

This meant residents in municipalities were paying twice for the same service, because each municipality used its own tax base for its own garbage collection system.

Also, the county really had no budget for solid waste collection and was using money from the road department to pay for the service, said Petty.

The system was costing the county between \$72,000 and \$100,000 each year, when the county had only a \$16,000 line item

for a garbage truck driver when the present commission took office, said Petty.

It is hoped that the new compactor station will pay for itself with the tipping fees, and further taxation of the county for solid waste, other than the present mill levy, will not be necessary.

Petty reminded the audience the solid waste mill levy is still available for county use, but is reserved for future plans which may include a county landfill.

About \$60,000 of this money has already been loaned to Capitan to dig the trenches necessary for a Class C landfill, which accepts only construction and other dry, non-compactable, materials.

Members of the audience were just as unconvinced by the commission's reasoning as the commissioners were of the audience's.

Randle said the county could provide collection services cheaper than any private enterprise, mentioning Southwest Disposal quoted him a price of \$30 a month for each household.

However, Joe Lewandowski of Southwest Disposal, later approached The News and said the price quoted to Randall was \$30 for four households.

Lewandowski also said that in some areas of the Ruidoso and Hondo Valley there were older residents who produce a minimal amount of garbage and therefore could also use the dumpsters without additional cost or an additional burden on the dumpster.

"They could have ten households using the dumpster at the same cost," said Lewandowski.

Gary George of Ruidoso is also offering a collection service for \$20 a month for each household. However, this is for curbside service, and the company will walk up to someone's home to pick up the trash, said George.

Petty told the audience Monday the commission wants to encourage private enterprise in garbage collection, but as long as the county maintains dumpsters, the businesses cannot acquire customers.

Randle said he would be willing to pay whatever necessary for the service, but wants the county to provide that service.

Petty replied that residents need to pay for the service, but the county will no longer provide it.

"You're not listening to the beat of the drum," said Bill Elliott, who is also the Democratic candidate for county commission in District III.

Elliott suggested the commission reconsider its decision and let the next commission deal with it.

Lincoln resident Ralph Dunlap, who is the Democratic candidate for county commission in District I, said it took the county 10 years to get everyone used to the dumpsters and to use them.

There must be another way to tax or fund the service where only those using it are paying, said Dunlap.

Alto resident Yvonne Lanelli said not all subdivisions are well enough organized with sanitation or water districts that they can devise their own billing method to contract for collection services.

Also, Lanelli disagreed with the commission's reasoning the taxing system wasn't fair because there was no way to exclude municipal residents from the use of county dumpsters.

There are many services supported by taxes in which not everyone receives a direct benefit, said Lanelli.

She used the example of school taxes in which she pays to support the public schools, but has no children herself.

Lanelli was also concerned that a few people in the Sun Valley area were being blamed for the dumpsters being removed county-wide.

Hoyt Graham, who lives in the county in spite of the fact he is only one mile from the Ruidoso Police Department, said he had always had to travel a relatively large distance to a county dumpster and the service was never really that convenient.

Living in the Carrizo Canyon area, the closest county dumpster to Graham's residence was at Cedar Creek.

"You just have to get used to it," said Graham.

In other business the commissioners:

—Approved the minutes of the July 23 regular meeting and the July 18 special meeting.

—Approved a healthcare facilities contract.

—Approved a low water crossing contingent on approval from the Road Department.

—Approved a vacation and replat of lots in Deer Park Meadows subdivision.

—Approved to vacate Short Circle and Circle Drive in Agua Fria subdivision Unit 2.

—Accepted a recommendation from the Planning and Zoning Commission for a partial vacation of plat in Alto Lakes Golf and Country Club unit 2, block 8, lot 2, if the lot owner will pay for a survey of the property and be willing to pay fair market value for the land vacated.

—Passed a motion to clarify the use of the word closure on an access road in Gavilan Hills subdivision.

—Approved the field agreements for predator and rodent control with the Department of Agriculture.

—Approved the new personnel ordinance.

—Passed a motion to opt out of the retiree health insurance program.

—Took no action on a request from Quay County to purchase Lincoln County dumpsters.

—Approved to continue the penalty on delinquent taxes for the 1990 tax year.

—Approved a request to reduce taxes in the Alpine Village Sanitation District.

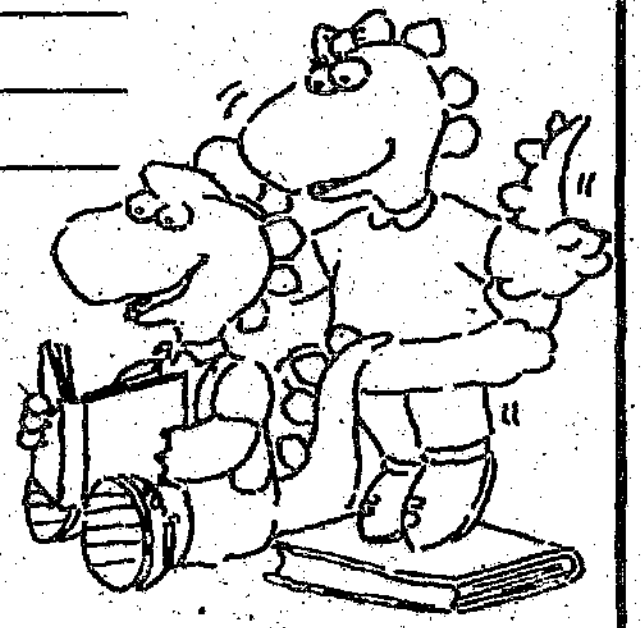

# Hubbard Art is off to China

John V. Hall, director of the Hubbard Museum, is on his way to China, with a stopover in Tokyo, Japan.

Hall is paving the way for the Hubbard Art Award collection to be exhibited in Tokyo, Shanghai and Kunming next year.

With the help of Senator Pete Domenici and his staff, Hall is making contacts all over the world, where people are learning to say Ruidoso with all kinds of accents.

He'll be meeting in Tokyo with the cultural attaché of Japan, and will go on to the Shanghai Cultural Exchange and then to Kunming, a town of three and a half million people that is located 500 miles due north of Hanoi.

Even as the invitations have gone out to 60 artists, with 28 already having accepted, for next year's huge art award and show, Hall is doing the preliminary work for that tour and making final plans for this year's art to tour in Russia and Germany.

The art, featuring Howard Terpning's \$250,000 award winning painting, will leave Ruidoso for Moscow September 15, and will be exhibited in the U.S.S.R. through November 5. The collection will then be displayed in Berlin through December 2, and will return to the U.S. for a Christmas show at the Bank of Boston in Boston, Massachusetts before being disbursed to its various owners.

The 50 or so pieces of art were a part of the Hubbard Art Award for Excellence show and exhibition last June in Ruidoso Downs. That sale ended with sales of \$1.8 million, as well as the \$250,000 cash purchase/prize that R.D. and Joan Dale Hubbard presented for the winning painting.

Next year's show, the result of the second annual Hubbard Art Award for Excellence, could be even more exciting than this year's said Hall. He said 52 museum directors from the most prestigious museums in this nation made the nominations.

"Unfortunately, I've been instructed to look for a new place to have next year's awards," said Hall. This year's event was such a huge success, and drew such a big crowd that, even though the Hubbards want very much to continue the important event in Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs, that just may not be possible.

It was expected that a new hotel would be open for business by next year, but the problems with the Village of Ruidoso civic center project could delay the opening of the resort project. Hall said there just aren't enough accommodations in the Ruidoso area for the numbers of people who will be attending next year's award, and he can't delay making the arrangements any longer.

Hall said he and the Hubbards have placed a priority on promoting Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs

through the publicity that the Hubbard Art Award prompted. He said he continues to do that, but the award may have to move elsewhere.

Hall said that would be a great loss to this area, noting that the current collection is viewed by 1,500 to 2,000 people each week. The art is on exhibit at the Hubbard Museum in the Turf Club at Ruidoso Downs Race Track.

The Hubbard Museum is open to the public from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Tuesday and Wednesday and from 8:30-10 a.m. on racedays. Turf Club and Jockey Club guests can view the collection at any time during the races.

Hall said private tours are available by special arrangements, encouraging everyone to make a point to see the exhibit before it leaves the museum.

People are surprised and pleased at finding the great collection gathered here, said Hall, adding that you just need to stand around and hear for yourself the comments the visitors make. He said some come to Ruidoso Downs specifically to view the art.

"The award show is getting the best comments," said Hall. He said the Hubbard Museum is offering visitors a chance to vote on a "People's Choice" award to be announced Labor Day weekend. Voting on the best piece of art is prompting a lot of visitors to comment on how difficult the judges' jobs were last June.

Hall is excited about another big project that will enhance the Hubbard Museum.

He is on his way today (Thursday) to Patagonia, Arizona, to bring back \$8 million worth of art from the Museum of the Horse. Anne Stradling of Patagonia is transferring her entire museum, including the art collection, to the Hubbard Museum, and these paintings will be the first of the collection to arrive in their new home.

Among the paintings will be two Remingtons, a Russell and a large selection of Stradling family paintings. They will be added to the Hubbard Museum exhibit through the end of this season, said Hall.

Over the next couple of years, Stradling's priceless collection of carriages, art, saddles, Indian artifacts and antiques will be carefully moved into its new home at the Hubbard Museum in the old Chaparral Convention Center.

Hall said the benefits that the Museum of the Horse, added to the Hubbard Museum, bring to this area are enormous.

"We've just begun to see the tip of the iceberg," said Hall.

Hall is also working on the first Lincoln County Cowboy Symposium planned for Friday through Sunday, October 12-14, at the Ruidoso Super Select Sales Pavilion on U.S. Highway 70.

The tribute to the old West, Lincoln County and to the cowboy will include three days of fun, food and festivities.

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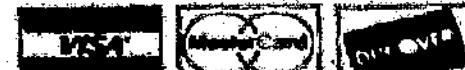

## Racing fans are looking for a superstar

RUIDOSO DOWNS, N.M.—One trainer commented, the day after the all-important All American Futurity Elimination Trials, that she was a little disappointed in this year's crop of 2-year-old quarter horses.

"There isn't one standout like a Special Effort or a Strawberry Silk this year," the lady trainer said.

Very true. But is that because the juvenile crop lacks a real superstar, or is it because there are actually several potential champions among the 1990 models.

I tend to lean toward the latter explanation. There's a lot of Cadillacs in this year's line of quarter horses.

In any other year, Takin On The Cash would probably be an odds-on choice to capture quarter horse racing's most prestigious test on the first Monday in September. This year, however, the son of Dash For Cash, who thoroughly dominated the West Coast kids, is only one of a handful of hopefuls eyeing the starting grid for the \$2 million All American Futurity.

Last week's All American Elimination Trials, an early indicator in the search to separate the contenders from the pretenders, probably did more to muddle the picture than it did to help put it in focus.

For a while, it looked like the race would boil down to Takin On The Cash, "Strait" and eight. But then along comes Quick Fun, First Prize Dash, Repeatedly, Royal Bushwhacker, Refrigerator ... whew, what a year for 2-year-olds.

Leading Jack Brooks, who seeks an unprecedented third consecutive All American Futurity, and a sixth winner of the race overall, is still best represented by Rainbow Futurity hero Strait To The Bank.

The big son of Dash For Cash is quite talented, indeed. Unfortunately, he's not real lucky. In most other years, Strait To The Bank would already have been touted as the next coming of Special Effort. After all, he ran the fastest time by a 2-year-old in the history of the sport when he captured the July 15 Rainbow Futurity in 17.26.

This, however, is not just another year. Some observers feel undefeated Quick Fun is dead on target to knock the big boys down a peg when the real running begins in the Aug. 23 time trials. The dashing daughter of Dash For Cash is quick, all right, but she might not be much fun to try and outrun.

A couple of \$50,000 supplemental fees to the race-Refrigerator and Royal Bushwhacker, who ironically drew the same heat in the eliminations—seem well worth the risk.

Refrigerator, who was second in the Grade I Heritage Place Futurity at Remington Park, posted a nostril-hair decision against Royal Bushwhacker in their last heat last Friday.

Speaking of fast, who was that streaking blur that upset both Valid Proposal and Rocket Bug, a couple of juveniles with pretty impressive credentials, in Friday's 13th race.

That was First Prize Dash, who could turn out to be one of the best kept secrets in the country. First Prize Dash, a full-sister to 1987 World Champion First Down Dash, posted the fastest winning time of two days of elimination heats when she covered the 400 yards in 19.71. The daughter of Dash For Cash, who checked in fourth in the Heritage Place in her previous start, could get very good in a hurry.

Then there's One Slick One, who came out of summer hibernation to earn a deadheat decision Friday. It was the Dash For Cash son's first afternoon appearance since capturing the Grade I West Texas Futurity on April 22.

Oh yes, and let's not forget Valid Proposal, the best horse in the country to never win a major race; Special Legend, who never tosses in a dull one; Repeatedly, the sensationally-bred youngster who can only improve off his two victories in as many starts; and By A Deck, a big By Yawl son who can really get down the racetrack.

Let's see now, there must be a horse who has been forgotten. Oh yes, that's right—Signed To Fly. Didn't he win a big race on the other side of the Rainbow? This doesn't look anything like Kansas.

## Horses to Watch

**SIX ON THE BEACH:** Ran a huge race in last week's All American Futurity Elimination Trials, despite finishing off the board. This daughter of Streakin Six should be tough against maidens in her next start here.

**ILLUSIVE ALIBI:** Veered out badly at the start in his last outing and nearly hit the outside rail after breaking from the 10 hole. This son of Sir Alibi can run a bit, and should handle a maiden field in his next start.

**STREET SWEEPER:** Stumbled at the start and still made the lead in his last start. This sophomore gelding has plenty of gas away from the gate, and should find a field he can wire in the near future.

**I'M YOUR GAL:** Broke in the air, about 3-lengths behind the field in her last start and finished off the board. The filly packs a great late-kick and should be closer to the pace when she starts a move in her next outing.

**HOLY MACK:** Was very game while contesting a tough pace in his last start at 1 1/16 miles. He figures to be very tough in his next start against \$2500 claimers at either 7 1/2 furlongs or a mile.

Talent Connection, who is trained by Roy "Cotton" Barrington, has won six of seven starts, including a victory in the Norgor Futurity here June 24. He has banked in excess of \$70,000. Talent Connection

will compete in Friday's 11th race.

C.M. Bogle's Way Cool has captured both of his lifetime starts by daylight. In his debut here June 9, the Kentucky-bred son of Cool defeated a maiden field by 6 1/2-lengths. He earned June 23 by capturing an allowance race by 4-lengths. Way Cool is trained by Cliff Lambert.

## Six Shooter Tex draws for Saturday race

RUIDOSO DOWNS—James Capps' Six Shooter Tex, third in the prestigious Los Alamitos Marathon in his last start, heads a full-field of 10 Saturday in the \$10,000-added Gene Hensley Handicap at 870 yards.

Six Shooter Tex, the leading candidate for 870-Yard Horse of the Meet, has won two of four outings this year for trainer Arnold Simmons. The 6-year-old gelded son of Cut Shot won the Fine Loom Stakes here May 26, and finished third in the Master Salls Handicap July 5.

Saturday's fifth race features simulcast wagering on the Travers Stakes from Saratoga. The field for the \$100,000 race, which is reserved for 3-year-olds, is expected to lure Thirty Six Red, Profit Key,

Restless Con, Rhythm, Shot Gun Scott and Secret Hello.

A new exotic wager—the Superfecta—will be available in the last live race each day. The Superfecta wager calls for a bettor to correctly select the top four finishers in exact order.

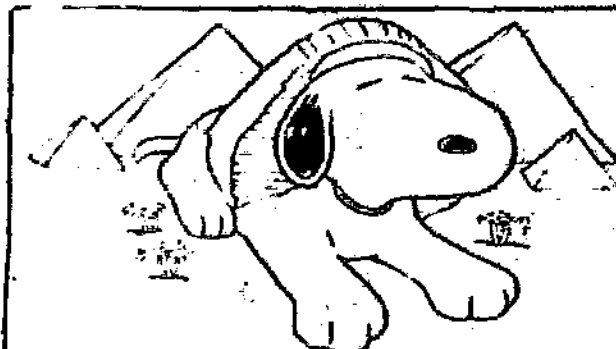
The big gray gelding, ridden to perfection by leading jockey Joe Martinez, settled off the pace, rallied strong on the turn and pulled away down the lane.

Foreign Fella, who is trained by Bill Thompson, covered the distance in 1:48.1.

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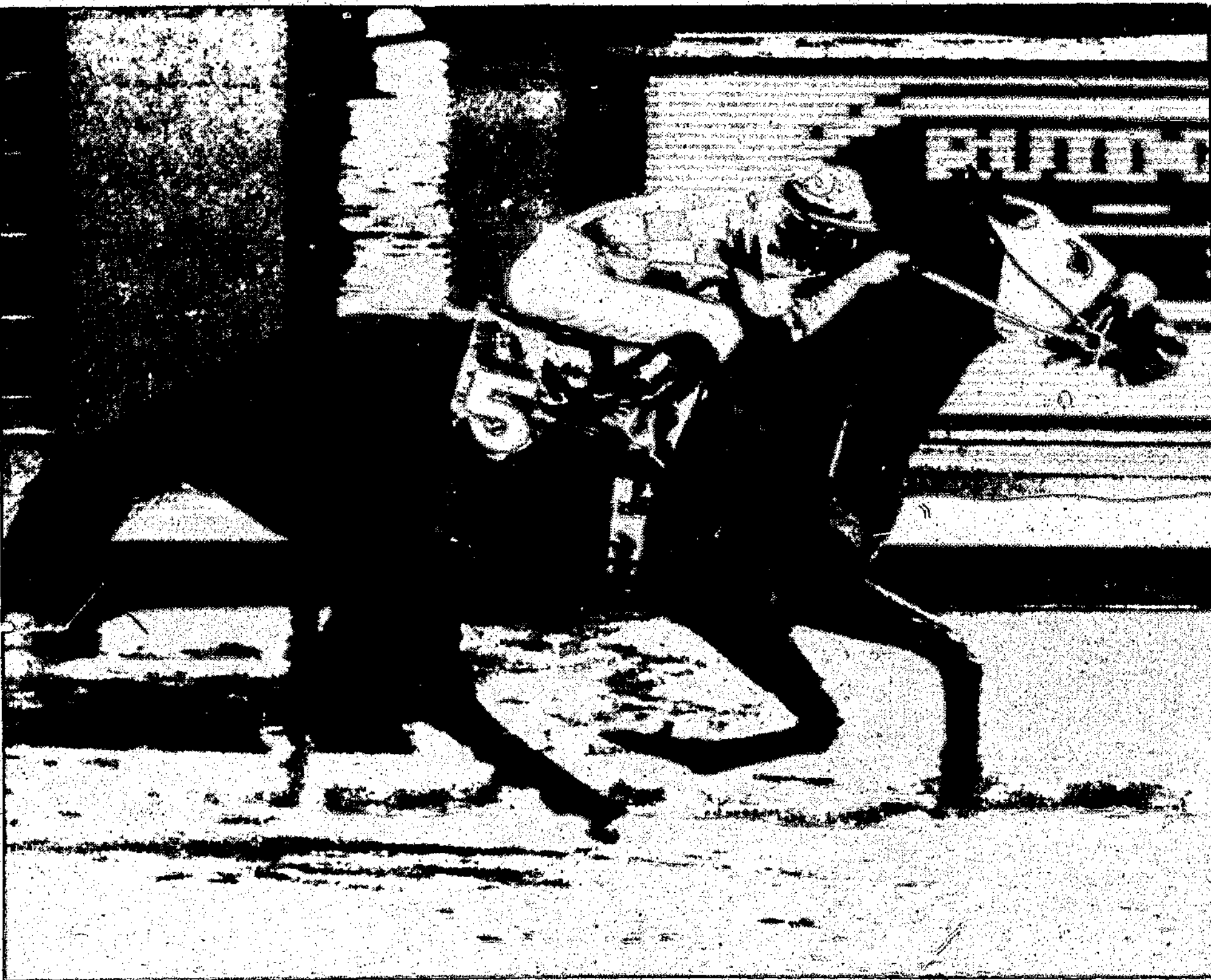

Pre-registration for new students began August 14. New teacher orientation will be Friday, August 17, and all teachers report for in-service, August 20. Classes will begin the following day for students.


The usual cafeteria program for students will encompass a full meal plan. Cost for high school students will be \$1 and 85 cents for

Both Paul and Nellie are descendants of pioneer Lincoln County families; Paul's grandfather and grandmother Jones came from the green hills and vales of Wales.

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
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
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

## Mayor defends Hammontre after accusation of harassing local teen

A Capitan police officer defended his actions after a woman accused him of harassment during a meeting of the Capitan Trustees.

Josephine Wolfert complained about Capitan officer Tom Hammontre's behavior while dealing with her grandson, Jason Wolinski. She spoke to the Capitan Trustees during the regular meeting Monday, saying Hammontre had unnecessarily embarrassed her grandson in one incident, and had threatened the youth with jail during another.

"You know you harass a lot of boys in this town," said Wolfert.

In one incident, Wolfert said on August 1 Hammontre unnecessarily confronted her grandson while the boy was at football practice.

The confrontation occurred after Jason Wolinski had allegedly caused three cars to drive off the road because the drivers thought Wolinski's car was an emergency vehicle.

The youth's vehicle apparently had fog lights mounted on the front grill that were covered with red lenses. The red lights were apparently flashing in the same manner as an emergency vehicle's, said Hammontre.

The Capitan officer went to the weight room at the Capitan High School where he approached Wolinski and asked him to go out-

side, said Hammontre.

The officer then showed the youth the statute indicating the rights were illegal.

Hammontre said Capitan Police Chief Randy Spear and a State Police officer were present as well.

In the other incident, Wolinski was using a pay phone after curfew and was told by Hammontre to get off the phone.

Wolfert said she sent her grandson to make that late-night telephone call.

Hammontre said he asked Wolinski to get off the phone, reminding the youth of the curfew. Wolinski did not inform the officer he was sent to use the phone, said Hammontre.

The officer then drove away, after receiving assurance from Wolinski the boy would only be a few more minutes. But when Hammontre returned to the phone between 20 and 30 minutes later, Wolinski was still on the phone.

The officer then told him to get off the phone or he would be seeing the judge.

"I can't accept enforcing the law as being harassment," said Capitan Mayor Frank Warth.

The trustees accepted Wolfert's input. No formal action was taken. The trustees also changed the

fee schedule for use of the village's Class C landfill.

A flat fee of \$7 for each yard was agreed on after some discussion. The gatekeeper at the site will measure the total capacity of each vehicle.

Warth reported to the trustees that the landfill collected \$354 during its first week of operation.

However, after a closed session, the trustees rejected the previous bids received for digging the trenches at the site because of a technicality in dealing with the proposal.

New proposals will be requested and will be taken until 4:30 p.m. August 27. The bids will be opened during a special meeting at 7 p.m. the same day.

Lincoln County loaned money from its solid waste mill levy fund to Capitan so the village could contract for the trenches at the landfill site.

The trustees also formerly adopted the 1/16 of one percent gross receipts sales tax allowable under Senate Bill 2 to fund solid waste operations.

The state projected as much as \$2,400 potentially collected through the tax for Capitan, but Trustee Norman Renfro questioned the state's arithmetic.

Renfro noted that out of \$100,000 collected in gross receipts, 1/16 of one percent amounts to only \$625.

Still, Warth reminded the trustees that although the amount generated by the tax is insignificant, its implementation is significant because it will increase the village's opportunities for grants and other funds.

The trustees called for bids for solid waste collection and will begin advertising.

In other business the trustees: —Accepted the contract for legal services with J. Robert Beauvais.

—Approved the minutes of the regular meeting of July 9, and the special meetings of July 16, July 23, July 30 and August 6.

—Called for bids for the Smokey Bear Museum with new specifications.

—Heard a request for water from Phil Fifer. Warth suggested to Fifer that he apply first for annexation to the village.

—Approved a revision in the house numbering ordinance which provides more leeway to home owners whose residences are in other communities should their house numbers not be in place by the deadline.

—Accepted the stipulation agreement to opt out of the Municipal League lawsuit against the state over the implementation of new regulations governing the operation of landfills.

—Declined to make an offer to purchase land owned by Herbert Lee Traylor.

## Here's the scoop on the Tiger school year

The first day of school in Capitan is Tuesday, August 21, and school hours will be from 8:10 a.m. to 3:10 p.m.

Only those students entering the first time for the 1990-91 school year should register.

Elementary students need not be with the parent to register. However, parents need to bring a birth certificate of the child and the child's immunization record if he or she is entering kindergarten.

Supplies recommended for elementary grades are as follows:

**Kindergarten:** one smock for art, one box of facial tissues regular size, one box of 16 crayons, one four-ounce container of school glue, one plastic school box and five primary pencils.

**First Grade:** One box of 16 crayons, one large container of school glue (no paste), one large box of facial tissues, one pair scissors, a school box, five #2 pencils for each nine weeks of school, one eraser, a book bag or folder to carry papers home and one box of watercolor paints.

**Second Grade:** Five pencils for each nine weeks of school, one large eraser, a large box of crayons, pointed metal scissors, one large bottle of glue (no paste), one spiral notebook, one large box of facial tissues, one school box regular cigar box-size, one box watercolor paints, three folders with pockets; no binder notebooks.

**Third Grade:** One sturdy pocket folder, college ruled notebook paper, three spiral notebooks, crayons, large bottle of glue, pointed scissors, 20 pencils, a red ballpoint pen, one package of pencil-top erasers, watercolors, plastic school box, pocket calculator, large box of tissues.

**Fourth Grade:** 20 #2 pencils each semester, two packages of pencil-top erasers, pointed scissors, large bottle of school glue, colored pencils, two red pens each semester, two spiral notebooks, a school box, large box of tissues, notebook paper, watercolors, pocket calculator, box of crayons; no Trap-

per Keepers.

**Fifth Grade:** Scissors, #2 pencils, folding or plain clipboards, notebook paper, pencil top erasers, red grading pen, box of tissues, ruler with metric and English measurement; no binder notebooks.

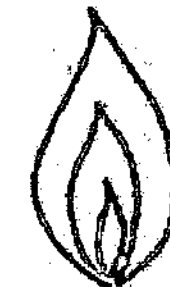

## Editorial

If we build a humongous civic/events center, our visitors and guests may feel a little like Goldilocks when she sat in Papa Bear's chair. "This building is too big," will echo through the huge hall as groups of less than a thousand cluster in the center.

The Ruidoso civic/events center just keeps growing, even though a look at the list of possible users shows clearly that 28,000 square feet will be, in Goldilocks' words, "just right."

The biggest event on a list of those expected to take place in our civic/events center is the Ruidoso Art Festival, an event that draws about 135 artists each year. The Albuquerque architect who designed that city's big center said the 110,000 square foot exhibit hall provides space for 700 exhibitors using the industry standard of 10x10-foot booths. And so, if we expect 350 exhibitors, we need 60,000 square feet including circulation and traffic areas; divide that again, and for 175 exhibitors, we need 30,000 square feet. What we need is 28,000 square feet. The Art Festival will fit into that space, but we aren't convinced the Art Festival needs to be indoors anyway. Part of its charm over the years has been the big tents with the view of Sierra Blanca.

Here's what we have: the Golden Aspen Rally, a really big event that will take place indoors and outdoors with some exhibitors needing more than the normal amount of space. The motorcycle folks have made the best of it wherever the rally has been, and they'll surely make the most of a 28,000 square foot building, as will the Chamber of Commerce when planning the Wurstfest and the Lincoln County Homebuilders when putting together the show of homes. The Hubbard Art Award is another event we hope will take place in the new center next year, and we understand that the 28,000 square feet will work just fine.

The New Mexico Bar Association wants to bring 750 people to Ruidoso for a convention. The 110,000 square feet in Albuquerque is designed to seat 6,500 people. Do some more dividing and you'll see that 28,000 square feet will be plenty for meetings of 750 to 1,500 or so.

Events that need to be staged in an auditorium will take place in the performing arts center, not the civic/events center, and so the long-range needs of the Community Concerts and Ruidoso Little Theatre have no effect on the size and plans of the civic center.

Of more importance than the size will be the design of the building. Space planners stress the importance of a building constructed without columns and posts every few feet. In Albuquerque, the new center will have a space 450x250 feet with no columns to interfere with the use of space.

Let's build a great 28,000-square-foot center, fill it with good events and plan to grow into the balance of the space leftover from the 40,000-square-foot building that has been proposed. 28,000 square feet is just right.

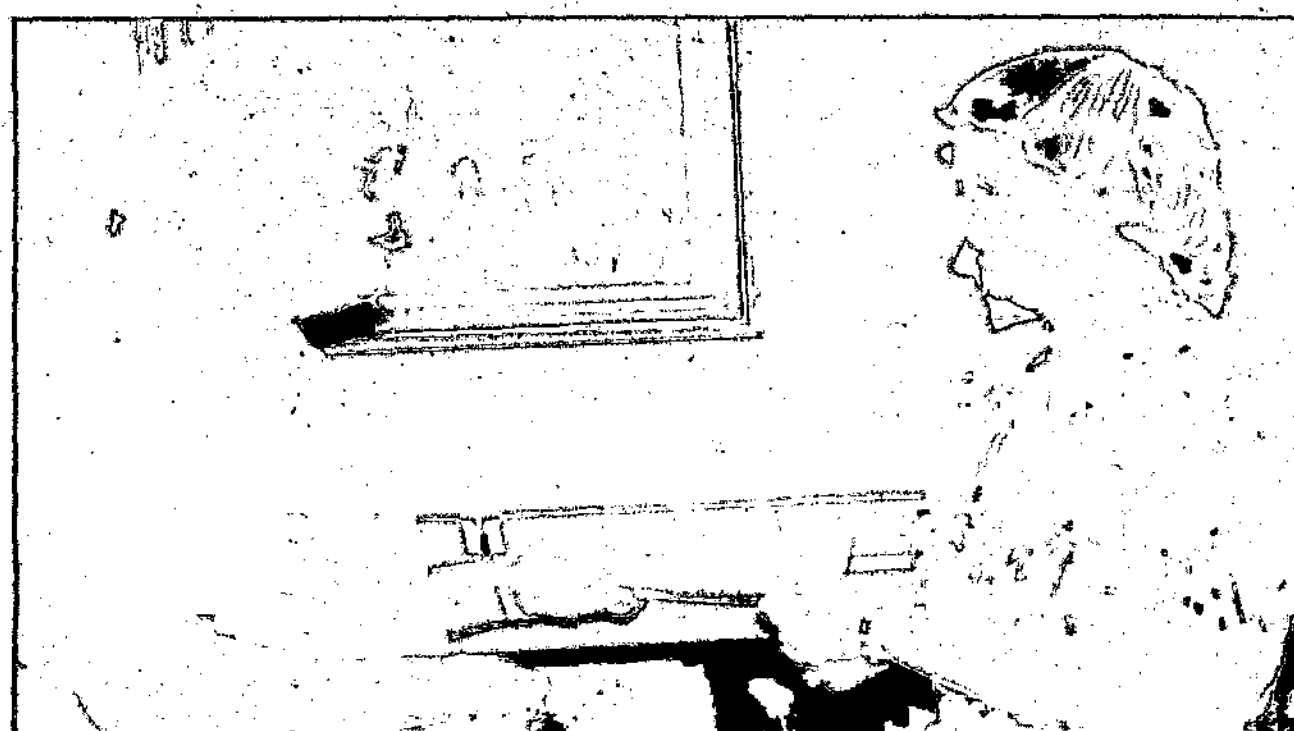

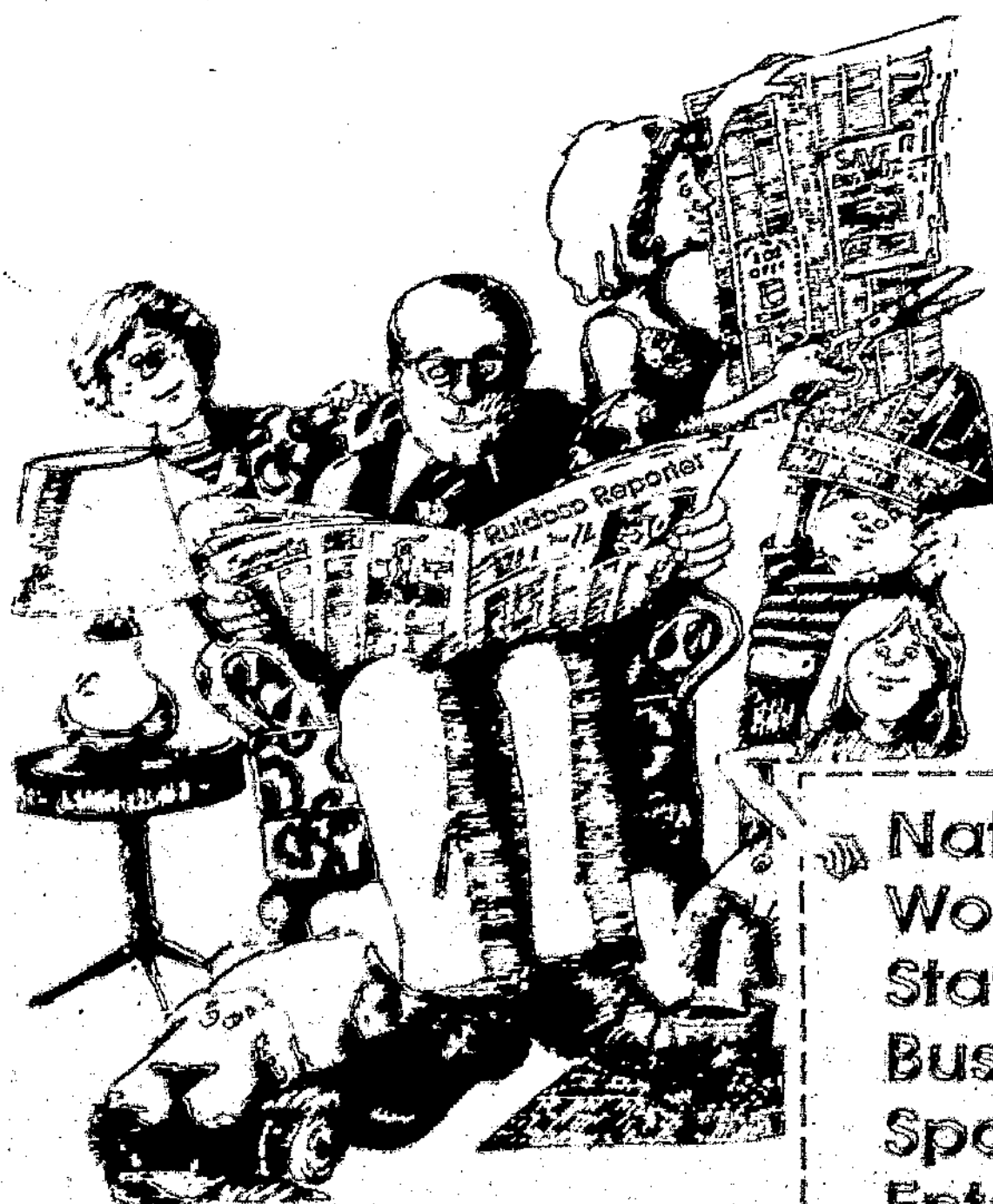
## Hospital support

# Color old Lincoln beautiful with flowers

### Lincoln Flowers

Only a few weeks ago Old Lincoln Town was a golden brown color. There had been so little snow and rain since the first of the new year. In fact, the driest spring ever recorded.

The rains finally came in early July and the moisture and cool humid air has transformed the little town and the brown countryside is a lush green and the Lincoln flowers are bigger and more colorful than ever.

Joe Baca, the expert dahlia grower, has been bringing large fresh-cut dahlia bouquets to Ellen Fay, Lincoln Postmaster. The large dahlias and Ellen Fay's smile make a bright spot for all who come to the post office.

Joe Baca has invited all who are interested to come on over to Old Lincoln Town to see his flowers, pick a few to take home with you.

You can enjoy a delicious meal at the Wortley Hotel, and make a day of happy memories. Glen and Kay and Cile and Pam are all back at Wortley Hotel to happily serve you their "fine home cooking." Cile still makes that heavenly bread, sweet rolls and dinner rolls and perhaps best of all, her famous fresh fruit cobblers. You owe it to yourself to come on over to the Wortley and see Joe's beautiful dahlias.

This morning was cool, and cloudy, perfect for gardening. I looked up too see Joe Baca coming down my drive with a large bouquet of

dahlias. There were four different colors. Some measured almost 11 inches in diameter. To produce beautiful flowers such as Joe does, he must drive many stakes, do lots of tying, thinning and pinching, but he tells me all his time and efforts are worth it when he can share his dahlias with his friends and all who stop for a look and take a few pictures.

Joe cuts the blooms very early in the morning and if he wants them to last a little longer time, he places the cut stems, which the ends have been crushed, immediately in two or three inches of hot water to stand in the gradually-cooling water for a few hours or over night.

Usually Joe picks a few flowers on his way to the post office every morning and they stay really pretty all day. All cut flowers will last longer in water if foxglove is incorporated in the arrangement. If their presence is not con-

sidered appropriate for a particular artistic affect, add foxglove tea to the water: pour boiling water on a handful of leaves and flowers, or just the leaves alone if the flowers are not in season, and allow the foxglove tea to steep overnight. I know people who grow foxglove plants just to be able to make this tea for cut flowers. Another trick to make the bouquets last longer is to put a few copper pennies in the water. Always keep the cut flowers in a cool place.

Dahlias are only half-hardy perennials. They do best if the tuberous roots are lifted after the first frost blackens the foliage, store in boxes of peat and planted again the following year, but young plants bought at the nursery annually in May are less trouble. Plant in sun or part shady and they grow best in cool or northern climates. Several weeks before planting in the spring, prepare the holes, digging about a foot deep and adding peat, compost and shad sand, thoroughly incorporate 1/4 cup complete fertilizer at planting time in bottom of hole and then add 4" of plain soil. Drive in 5" stake into hole before placing tubes horizontally with eye pointing toward stake and 2" from it. Cover tubes with 3" of soil. Water thoroughly and as shoots grow, gradually fill hole with plain soil. Fertilizer needs to be high in phosphates and potash and used when first flower buds appear.

## Campus Policy

Ruidoso High School has a closed campus except for lunch. This means that students may not leave during class time unless they check out through the office. If they fail to do so, they will be considered to be truant and will be subject to disciplinary action.

The campus is considered "open" at lunch, from 12:20 to 1:05 p.m. Students are free to leave, but must be back by 1:05.

### Tardies

Students will not be allowed to be tardy at Ruidoso High School. If they are not in class on time, they will report to the attendance counselor, and will be counted absent from their regularly scheduled class.

### Absences

Students are allowed 10 absences per semester. Starting with the 11th absence, credit is lost. We do not differentiate between excused and unexcused; if a student is not in class, he is absent unless on a school approved activity.

Exceptions may be granted by the principal in case of extended illness.

### New Student Registration

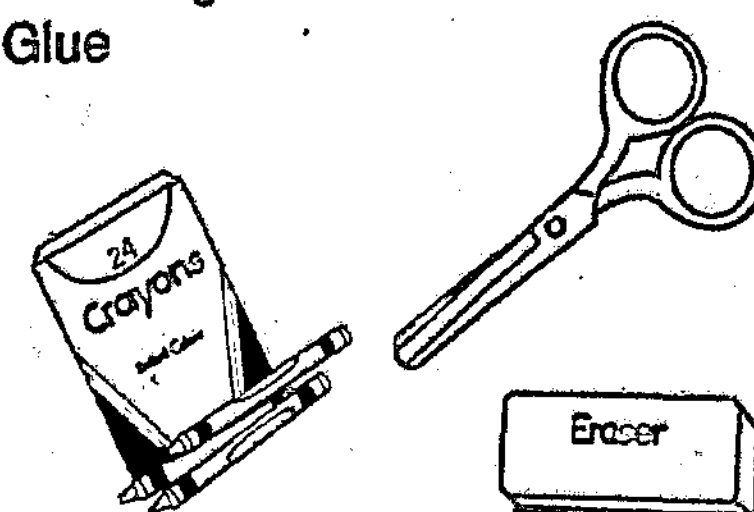

## Special Education Programs

Every exceptional student within the Ruidoso Municipal Schools District (RMSD) has a right to a free, appropriate public education.

It is the goal of the RMSD to assist exceptional students in developing their potential to the highest level possible, and to become independent, well-adjusted and competent members of society to the maximum degree possible.

RMSD operates in compliance with all federal laws and state standards concerning the education of exceptional students.

Services are available for three- and four-year-old developmentally disabled children and for students age five to 21 who are identified as behaviorally disordered, communication disordered, gifted, hearing impaired, learning disabled, mentally handicapped, multiply impaired, physically impaired, and visually impaired.

Nineteen teachers work in special education programs. Support programs are provided on a contracted

service basis, and include language therapy, physical therapy, occupational therapy, psychological counseling and audiology.

Anyone having a legitimate interest in a student may make a referral for screening. This should be done through a principal, who will then refer the child to a screening committee. Formal evaluation will be initiated only with a parent's permission to do so, and after the screening committee has documented other unsuccessful efforts at remediation.

Certified diagnosticians will determine whether students meet state regulations for placement, and a team of persons including the parent, teacher(s), diagnostician, and a building principal will determine whether placement appears to be warranted, and is in the best interest of the student.

Each student placed in special education will have an individualized educational program developed with his/her particular needs in mind. Services vary with the level of need, from one-hour-a-day resource rooms to full-day programs for those who require them.

All special education records are considered confidential, in accordance with the family rights and privacy act to 1974. Only those persons having a legitimate interest in a particular child will have access to that file. A sign-out sheet is kept detailing any persons who access a file, their position, date checked out and in, and reason for checking out the file.

Karen Tillman is responsible for supervising special education programs in the district. Any questions regarding special services may be directed to her at Nob Hill Elementary School, 257-9041.

## Lunch Program

Ruidoso Municipal Schools provides a free and reduced price meal for Ruidoso school children.

Local school officials have adopted the following eligibility criteria to assist in determining eligibility:

### Food Stamp/AFDC/ACD Households

Households which currently include children who receive Food Stamps or benefits under "Aid to Families with Dependent Children" or "Aid to Dependent Children" for your child, need only list the child's name and food stamp, AFDC or ADC case number, print their name and address and sign the application. Separate applications must be filed for those children within that household who do not receive food stamp, AFDC or ADC benefits. Eligibility determination for these children must be based upon the same criteria as for "All Other Households", as outlined below.

### Other Households:

With incomes at or below the amount of money listed for their family size may be eligible for and are urged to apply for free and/or reduced price meals. They may do so by completing the application

forms which will be sent home with a letter to parents. Additional copies are available at the principal's office in each school.

Applications may be submitted any time during the school year.

The information provided on the application will be confidential and will be used for only the purpose of determining eligibilities.

The school district does, however, have the right to verify at any time during the school year the information on the application. If a parent does not give the school this information, the child/children will no longer be able to receive free or reduced price meals.

In certain cases, foster children are also eligible for these benefits. A family may wish to apply for meals for them and should contact the school.

All questions on the application must be answered completely for the application for the applications to be considered by the school district for approval.

In operation of Child Nutrition Programs, no child shall be discriminated against, the parent or guardian must sign the application form, certifying that the information is true and correct.

A complete copy of this policy and applications are available in school offices.
