Ruidoso schools are full

The Ruidoso School District is not accepting new students into the district.

Some concern was voiced by Ruidoso parents that the schools here would be swamped by parents in Mescalero attempting to transfer their children from Tularosa to Ruidoso.

Although it would take approval from the State Board of Education, as well as the Tularosa and Ruidoso boards, to allow Mescalero to be annexed into the Ruidoso district, parents in New Mexico may still enroll their children in the district of their choice provided certain requirements are met.

One of these requirements is the school district chosen by the parent must have the room for the child.

"We are not accepting anyone out of district because we don't have the space," Ruidoso superintendent Mike Gladden told **The News**.

Gladden said some transfers were approved earlier in the year and involved only those students already living in the transportation district or those wanted by Tularosa that had justifiable reasons.

"We have stopped that now," said Gladden.

Mescalero students were left without a facility when the Bent Mescalero Elementary School, a part of the Tularosa district, burned last year. The students, in kindergarten through sixth grade, completed the school year in makeshift rooms in the Mescalero Community Center.

When the State Board of Education ruled that the Community Center facilities were inadequate, Tularosa's school board announced plans to move in portable buildings and transport the Mescalero students to Tularosa.

Mescalero President Wendell Chino disagreed with that decision and made arrangements for the Bureau of Indian Affairs to operate a school in Mescalero. That school was scheduled to begin Thursday, but information was not available as to whether that was the case.

According to published reports, some Mescalero students did enroll in Tularosa.

Ruidoso High School students got a day off on Friday when a computer glitch disrupted the scheduling process.

Principal Mike Kakuska said the computer problem became an opportunity for him to call in a computer consultant who educated the entire faculty on the school's computer system.

Police investigate death

Ruidoso Police are investigating the fatalized death Sunday of a 22-year-old Ruidoso man.

Leroy Lewis Coome of 321 Brady Canyon Drive was pronounced dead Sunday afternoon by deputy medical examiner Jim Stover.

Ruidoso Police Detective Dick Swenor said the man's body will be sent to Albuquerque for an autopsy to determine the cause of death.

Police Chief William Newman

said police responded at 2:53 p.m. to a call from a neighbor who said an ambulance was needed at the Brady Canyon address.


Police said Coome's fiance, who lived with him in the red A-frame, arrived home and found him lying on the kitchen floor. Police said Coome's fiance had left about 9 a.m. and said the victim was just fine then.

He had a history of asthma, and

his fiance at first thought he had passed out from an asthma attack. Newman said he apparently had been dead two to four hours when his body was discovered.

Police said there was no evidence of foul play. The investigation will continue until the results of the autopsy are received.

Police said Coome worked as a cook at the Carousel Restaurant.

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Pro-Musica Choir to perform here

The Pro-Musica Concert Choir conducted by Bruce Nehring will perform its concert solo tour of Czechoslovakia this year under the auspices of The Office of Cultural Affairs of the American Embassy. In 1992, the choir will travel to the Soviet Union, and its collection will be used to support the Chernobyl area.

According to a news release, the Pro-Musica will appear in the 14th season of our standing concerto performed by the 20 member choir and chamber orchestra. The tour on the international scene has performed at EXPO '86 in Vancouver, Canada, Kōrea, New Zealand and EXPO '88 in Australia, and on the Midwest and Victoria, Canada during the summer of 1990.

In June 1990, the choir has been invited to be the featured choir at the International Church Music Festival in Oberammergau, Germany. The final masses choir concert international choirs will be conducted by Sir David Willcocks from King's College in Cambridge, England.

The Pro-Musica Choir is also scheduled to perform in Leipzig and

Berlin, West Germany, and Linz and Salzburg in Austria. While in Czechoslovakia they are performing under the auspices of The Office of Cultural Affairs of the American Embassy. In June 1990, the choir will also perform in the Best Performer Russian Music award. PBS has already made a video of this tour.

The Pro-Musica Choir is performing the weekend of September 2nd and 3rd at the National Elk Refuge in Ruidoso with performances in Durango, New Mexico. Auditions for the 1991 first International Chamber Music Festival, January 13, with artists from Berlin, Stuttgart, Shanghai, Paris, and the Vienna State Opera.

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



Ranchers show off at rodeo

When you hear the word "rodeo," the images that most often come to mind include bronc riding, steer wrestling, calf roping and bull riding.

But at the Lincoln County Ranch Rodeo Saturday in Capitan, the program included team penning, wild cow milking, calf branding and other unusual events.

A large crowd came for the event and cheered the participants on in some very close events.

For example, the first event was the team penning, in which each team was timed as they cut-out three cows from a small herd, then rounded them up into a pen.

The cows had numbers on them and each team was required to pen only the three cows with their assigned number.

As the event progressed, the times kept getting better and better until two teams both registered times in less than one minute, the Block Ranch Team and the Turkey Track Ranch Team.

It was a toss-up as to what the wildest event was. Some might say it was the wild cow milking, a free-for-all attempt to be the first to gather a spot of milk into a Coke bottle. Others might say it was the wild horse race, one of the wildest cowboy spectacles perhaps ever seen in Lincoln County.

But one thing was certain, and that was the crowd enjoyed themselves and frequently hollered out their excitement and approval.

And in spite of some of the events' names, such as branding and doctoring, there was no real branding going on or doctoring either. The participants used paint to set their times, and any unnecessary roughness on the animals resulted in time penalties.

It is hoped the Ranch Rodeo, in which teams representing various ranches in Lincoln and Chaves Counties are invited to participate, will become an annual event.

The wild afternoon was topped

off with a dance that evening, the music provided by R.W. Hampton and the Cowboy Band.

Final team results for the five-event competition are the Roswell Livestock Auction team in first with 34 points. Team members include Smiley Wooten, Benny Wooten, Kim Chester, Aubrey Lynch, Jeff Ellis and Craig Wooten.

Each of the team members won a belt buckle as part of their prize.

Second place, with 26 points, went to the Bonito Ranch team of John Sisk, Wes Smith, Scott Daniel, Ron Merritt, Cindy Smith and Bobby Smith.

And third place with their 22 points went to the team from the L.E. Ranch with riders Randall

Jones, Ray Gainer, Allen Cox, Steve E. Murray, Bob Van Winkle and Jim Jones.

Sharon Betancourt won the cowgirl steer riding competition and the Top Hand Award went to Jeff Ellis of the Roswell Livestock Auction team. Each competitor won a buckle.

The Top Horse named was Bear, owned by Benny Wooten, who won a portrait of his mount done by artist Gary Morton.

So if the Lincoln County Ranch Rodeo happens for a second time, be sure to be there because you'll see some of the wildest cowboy and cowgirl antics around, not to mention some highly skilled riders exhibiting their trade.



NM co-op advertising funds flow

The New Mexico Development and Tourism Department's Tourism and Travel Division recently awarded 72 tourism organizations \$565,400 in cooperative advertising funds for the 1990-91 fiscal year, announced A.G. "Buzz" Bainbridge, state Tourism Director. Lincoln County organizations received a total \$33,000 for their advertising budgets.





DEAR EDITOR:

Our county commissioners were voted into office by the people of Lincoln County to act and make decisions for the health and welfare of everyone. Unfortunately, it seems they have been grappling with the problem of waste management for some time with absolutely nothing being accomplished. In fact, since their most recent decision to suspend dumpster service to county residents, we are now headed in the other direction — back to the dark ages. The decision to force county residents to haul their two plastic sacks of garbage to a remote compactor shows little common sense.

Entrusted with the leadership responsibility of dealing with waste management, our commissioners have failed to handle our problem. Dumping their mistake back in the lap of the taxpayer is not a long term solution. It is a nationally known fact that future trash disposal is going to cost more money. Long-term decisions must be made now to spend future taxpayers' dollars wisely.

Since trash has become everyone's problem, we need to address it now, not a year from now. The county should have considered investing in a large, efficient regional recycling center. Not only to serve our needs but as a long-term investment and potentially profitable venture. An investment of this type could include both the public and private sectors. Mutual investment from a business venture of this type could prove advantageous to both sides.

Recycling has become the buzz word of the '90s. Everyone's for it but no one wants to take that first step. It seems every county wants to see what the other will do before taking the plunge. "It's just not profitable," is a common reply you hear from every laid-back official.

Granted, recycling will take some organization, and a market for the product somewhat lacking at the moment. So why not initiate a temporary solution in the interim?

One solution might be to collect and stockpile recyclable goods until the market becomes lucrative enough to turn a profit. Until technology catches up with the demand for raw materials, why not use our vast land reserves for long term storage capability. Storing glass, metal, paper, used tires, and plastic just might be feasible. Throw that idea at a politician and watch what happens. Sure it will take sizable investment but look at the alternatives — landfills already bulging to capacity.

Frustration is when you talk waste management with the county, you fall on deaf ears and get the same answer — we're working on it — yet nothing gets done. The county however had come up with a distinctly new approach, bury your head in the sand and hope someone else comes up with a solution. Tell the public what they want to hear and postpone the inevitable. Don't take any action that could be politically embarrassing or that one might have to take the heat for. Then gracefully bow out of the landfill issue.

Options are currently available but need to be acted upon before we, the taxpayer, can benefit.

Trash to energy is a viable alternative that might be implemented as a stopgap measure until recycling gets a positive push forward; this technology currently exists.

This county is not going to diminish in size. We are going to grow and the problems will grow with us.

The regional landfill is another alternative and like trash to energy has its drawbacks. Costs are high, but is burying our trash the answer? For our protection regulations require expensive monitoring, test

wells, and plastic liners. Federal and state guidelines for the future will most likely prohibit this type of disposal. Just dealing with the tonnage of garbage in the future will cause nightmares for government officials.

The landfill, as we know it today, will soon go the way of the dinosaur. Government is making it harder and harder for municipalities to use this form of disposal. Clean-up costs, remediation, and public entitlements are causing for support of this type of option. The public is demanding that officials not close eyes to viable alternatives and act accordingly. Lincoln County should lead the forefront of waste management. We have the opportunity to begin a solution before our quality of life is gone.

Landowner responsibility is to appoint a plan and down to knowledgeable experts so we can expect reasonable results from our tax dollar investment. Government's responsibility is to enact a plan which is worthwhile that the public can and will support.
