Candidates face off at the forum

The Lincoln County Sheriff's race picked up some steam Thursday evening as both candidates exchanged barbs while answering questions and making their final statements.

Speaking before a crowd of more than 200 people at the League of Women Voters candidate forum, challenger Bill Butts fired the first salvo in response to a question about continued training.

"While I was with the New Mexico State Police, my officers had monthly training sessions. The officers need to be trained in criminal and traffic investigations."

Sheriff James McSwane preceded Butts in answering the question, explaining simply that his officers would continue to receive an education in investigative methods and cross-training in all areas.

Butts responded first to the question regarding what major problems the next sheriff might face and how he would deal with them.

"Fighting drugs is the greatest problem the sheriff will see in the next term," Butts said. "I will train the officers, and we will work (highways) 54 and 70 where they are bringing in drugs. We'll get the DWIs, too."

McSwane's response to the question was heated and directed nearly

straight at Butts.

"The biggest problem this county could have in the next two years would be having a sheriff wrapped up in working the highways."

Both candidates were under time restrictions throughout the forum. Afterwards, both had statements to make about the evening's comments.

Bill Butts claimed his anger was riled when Sheriff McSwane took credit for solving the only murder since being elected.

Said Butts, "There may have been an investigation, but the suspect turned himself in and confessed to the crime. I don't think the other departments that were involved will appreciate those remarks. The crime was solved for him."

McSwane responded to the charge by saying that his remark was made from the stance that he represented the county law enforcement agencies, and he wasn't speaking for himself.

"I respect all law enforcement agencies in the county," said McSwane. "I respect the state police and job they have to do. I think they're experts in their field. But the priority of the sheriff's office is to investigate civil and mainly, criminal problems in Lincoln County."

About Butts' concern that his officers need more training in traffic

investigations, McSwane responded, "I don't think he knows what it takes to be sheriff. I've got several former state police officers working on my staff, and there was a period of learning and adjustment to be made in each case. Bob Miller, my undersheriff, went through it when he came over from the state police."

Candidates in 11 other local races also responded to questions throughout the evening. J.O. "Bud" Payne, Republican candidate for the Probate Judge's bench was absent.

Incumbent Martha McKnight Proctor has no Democratic challenger for the County Clerk's office.

Beñ Hall, Republican State Rep-

resentative for District 56 and Democratic challenger John Underwood were of differing opinions when asked their response to legislative support of an increase in teachers' salaries.

Underwood supported raising teacher salaries, citing their low rank compared to salary levels in other states.

Hall responded by showing support of reducing the class loads and getting the parents more involved in the education of their children. While acknowledging the low rank in teachers' salaries, he pointed to their high showing when compared to the resources available to pay them from.

Hall said the average teacher

salary in Ruidoso is more than \$30,000.

Both candidates concurred on how legislation can get new industry interested in the area, claiming that an end to the anti-donation clause and creating tax incentives would be beneficial. Hall went a bit further, though, remarking that the creation of a right-to-work law might be of help as well.

In the two magistrate judge's races, Republican incumbent Gerald Dean and Democrat challenger Benny Coker traded their qualifications at the podium for the Division I bench. Dean claimed experience and compassion in his job while Coker explained his administrative experience and his intent to rule on DWIs with a firm hand.

In the Division II race between incumbent J.R. "Jim" Wheeler and Harold Mansell, Republican Wheeler discussed his experience and past judicial records while Mansell vowed to be relentless in his education for the position.

Six commissioner candidates took to the podium, each extolling the strengths they hoped to provide the county after election day.

In the District I race, Republican Monroy Montes spoke of far-sighted ideals for the job, while Democrat Ralph Dunlap answered questions directly. Both felt that the county is adequately staffed, and that the salaries of the employees are not

out of line with their performance.

Stirling Spencer and Chuck Rominger III are vying for the District II seat. On the subject of recycling and the local landfill issues, Republican Spencer claimed full support of a recycling program, but said realistically it is financially unfeasible because of the low volume of materials generated in the area. Democrat Rominger also is in support of recycling, but said that presently the county has invested \$27,000 in studies on alternatives to the landfill, and wouldn't really commit to an answer until the results are made public.

In the District III race, Republican Tommy Valliant and Democrat Bill Elliott commented on the county staff and their salary. Elliott remarked that the staff is adequate, but that maybe there is too much in some areas. Better training was another thing he mentioned in the improvement of the staff.

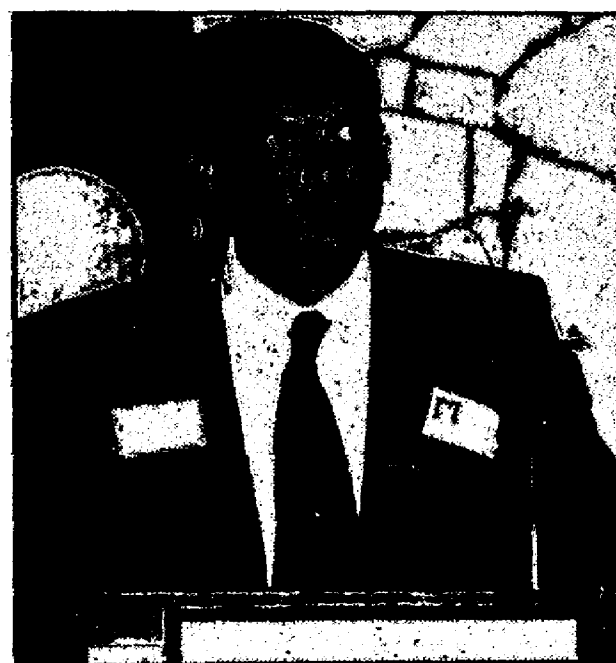
Valliant said that specialization levels needed to be opened and that the employees need to be paid in accordance with their level of training.

Republican Janice Ware reviewed her experience in the county treasurer's office while

Poll participants prefer Pete

Voters who responded to The Ruidoso News' voter poll probably won't be voting straight party lines on November 6.

Of the 173 surveys that were submitted, only one voter indicated they would pull the lever for a straight Democrat vote. Two other people did vote for all of one party or the other.

The rest of the participants switched back and forth throughout, but almost all agreed on Senator Pete Domenici, Republican incumbent. He got 141 votes in our poll to his Democrat opponent, Tom Benavides, who garnered 29 votes.

State Representative Joe Skeen is running unopposed in his bid to continue to represent this congressional district. He got 114 votes in The News survey.

Of course this survey was completely unscientific, and is not an indicator of how the election will go. But, it provides an interesting comparison as the election day nears.

The closest race in the survey is the Lincoln County assessor with Republican Patricia Serna and Democrat Wayne Townsend each getting 85 votes.

For governor, the participants in The News poll are betting on a Bruce King-Casey Luna win over Republicans Frank Bond and Mary Thompson. The Democrat

gubernatorial team got 97 votes to Bond-Thompson's 74.

Poll participants also placed Republican Ben Hall and his opponent Democrat H. John Underwood in a close heat for the state representative, District 56, race. Challenger Underwood got 86 votes in the poll to incumbent Hall's 83 votes.

In Position II for Supreme Court Justice, Democrat Seth Montgomery is unopposed. He got 97 votes.
Voters throughout the state will get to the polls from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m. Tuesday, November 6. Absentee voting is now under way, and will end on November 3.
For those out of town on Novem-

ber 6, absentee balloting allows you to still cast your vote.

According to Election Clerk Sam Chavez at the Lincoln County Clerk's office, there are a few alternate methods to get your absentee ballot.

First, you can pick up your absentee ballot at the county clerk's office in Carrizozo. Or, you can request the ballot by phone or mail.

If not requesting the form in person, you will first receive an application that must include the address the ballot will be sent to and your signature, witnessed by another registered voter in Lincoln County.

After the clerk's office receives your application, they will send out the ballot form. A small red pencil is provided for you to fill in arrows pointing to the candidate of your choice. Chavez said that it's very important not to make a mistake since any type of erasure on the ballot makes it invalid.

When the ballot is filled out, it goes into one envelope and then another. The outer envelope must have your signature on the outside, and the signature must be notarized.

Chavez reported that of the 7,042 registered voters in Lincoln County, 265 had elected to turn in an absentee ballot as of this morning.

Three injured in one-car accident

Three people were injured Friday in a one-car rollover between Capitan and Ruidoso.

State Police and medical personnel were called to a one-car rollover on State Highway 48 near Airport Scenic Drive.

State Police officer Mike Howard said a 1985 Subaru station wagon driven by James Ray Smith, 16, of Capitan, was headed toward Ruidoso from Capitan when the driver drifted off the roadway, went into a roadside slide and overturned three times.

Smith and two passengers, Carla Harper, 14, of Ruidoso Downs, and her sister, Mary Ann Harper, 15, were taken to Lincoln County Medical Center (LCMC) where Mary Ann Harper was admitted. Howard said Carla Harper was transferred to Roswell with head injuries, but was expected to be released today.

Smith was treated and released at LCMC. Howard said Smith was cited for careless driving.

On Saturday, State Police and an ambulance responded to an accident with injuries that left at least one person injured.

The State Police in Alamogordo and in Ruidoso were not available to provide information on that accident at press time. The report was not completed and the officer who responded was off duty.

Two yearling cows were struck by a pickup truck and killed Sunday night on U.S. Highway 70 south of Ruidoso Downs. Lincoln County Sheriff's deputies responded to the call at 9:56 p.m.

A man driving the pickup refused assistance from an ambulance sent to the scene. Both cows were killed by the impact of the truck; the pickup reportedly received damage to the grill only.

The Lincoln County Sheriff's office received a report of a motorcycle accident Sunday afternoon on Highway 246 north of the Capitan Mountains. The accident was reported by a livestock inspector at 3:18 p.m. State Police were dispatched to the scene near Mile Marker 9. There was no request for an ambulance.

Watch for new, improved tax bills

Lincoln County property owners will be receiving a new bill in the mail this year.

County Treasurer Shirley Goodloe and her staff have worked up a shorter, less complicated tax form that she hopes will save the county many dollars in manpower, postage, and printing costs.

The new form, which will be appearing in mailboxes soon, comes in one sheet with four sections.

The first section details property to be taxed and the tax rates being charged. Property owners with several holdings may find an extra sheet detailing what they are being taxed for as the front sheet doesn't allow for too many listings.

The other three sections are payment stubs. Two are for half payments and the third is for full payments.

Goodloe mentioned that the county will no longer be working

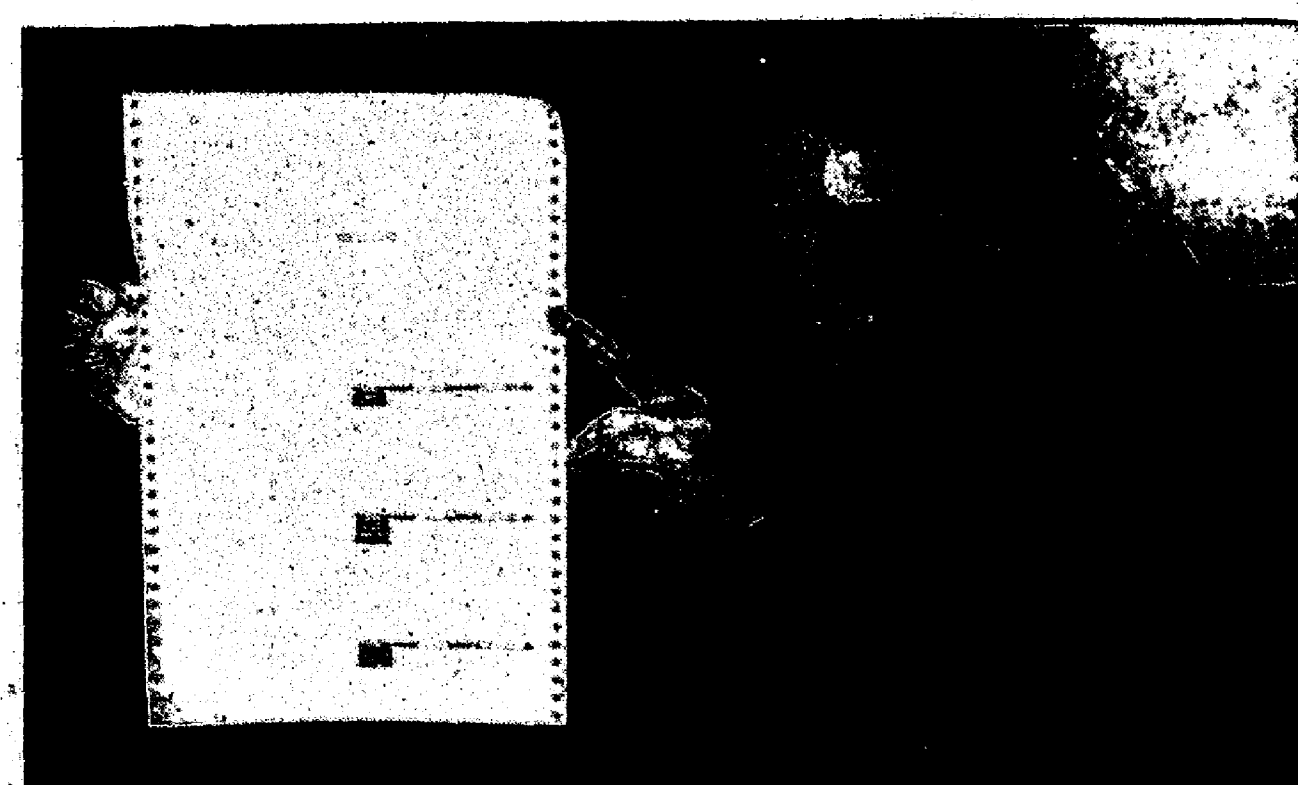
directly with finance or mortgage companies. Residents with mortgages will be receiving their tax bills directly, and should make certain that the bill is forwarded to their mortgage company for payment.

Goodloe suggested that five minutes spent reading the form in its entirety would alleviate most concerns over changing the process.

Another noticeable change will be the use of cancelled checks for receipts unless the county is provided a self-addressed stamped envelope.

Goodloe says there isn't really a way to figure how much the new bill will save the county this year since it is the first attempt with the form, but boasts that the savings "will be substantial."

Goodloe did remind that the county will still send out second-half payment reminders to those making two payments.

Just vote "yes" or "no" on judges

Not every "unopposed" candidate in the upcoming election is home free.

Take the case of District Judge Richard A. Parsons.

Parsons is not allowed to establish a platform, or to state his political affiliation and he can't debate issues. Along with other district judge candidates, he shares an easy to miss position at the very bottom of the voting ballot.

District judges run for re-election strictly on the public perception of their past judicial records, Parsons said.

It wasn't always that way.

Just six years ago, judges ran their re-election campaigns like everyone else. They were Republicans and Democrats and they faced flesh and blood opponents, not the ghosts of their judicial records.

But in an effort to remove the judicial process from political pressure and special interest leverage, New Mexico in 1985 joined 41 other states by passing a version of what is called the Missouri Law.

That amendment to the state constitution requires that 49 of the 59 district judges in New Mexico every six years ask voters in a non-partisan election to retain them based on their courtroom performances.

If the voters say no, a complicated process of selecting a successor is kicked into motion.

As Parsons explained the procedure, a non-partisan committee is formed to handle the review of all applicants for the soon-to-be vacant judgeship.

The committee is comprised of people appointed by the State Supreme Court, the State Court of Appeals, the governor, the State Bar Association and the presidents of the state Senate and House of Representatives. The dean of the state school of law acts as chairman. The presiding judge of the district also serves on the committee.

Three committee members must be laymen, four must be lawyers and one must be a judge. Seven are Democrats and seven are Republicans.

"They receive applications and conduct hearings to check qualification."

"Their role is to determine the most qualified applicant," Parsons said. "The applicant's name is submitted to the governor. He can ask for additional names, but the com-

mittee could refuse. The governor must select the new district judge within 30 days or the Chief Justice of the State Supreme Court will assume that power."

Some people may question whether voters are any more knowledgeable about a judge's judicial record under the new law than they were under the partisan election process. But at least the election of judges should have less to do with personalities, supporters point out.

And if a new judge is to be selected, the process will be accomplished by people more qualified to analyze past judicial decisions, they say.

"They are not hoping to let any ringers in with a registration slip two hours old," Parsons said.

The same state constitutional amendment that changed the district judicial election to a retention-type process also increased the amount of experience required for those seeking district or appellate judgeships, Parsons said.

"It doubled the necessary experience for district judges and tripled it for appellate judges," he said. The amendment also raised the mandatory age to 30 years old for district candidates and 35 years old for appellate judge candidates.

To retain his judicial seat, 50 percent of the votes cast in his race in the 12th Judicial District must be in favor of him retaining his post as judge.

Parsons, 64, has lived in Lincoln and Otero counties for 31 years. He served as an assistant district attorney and has operated a general civil practice. In 1985, he became the first resident district judge for Lincoln County.

Nearly 6,000 cases later, Parsons said he has continued to live up to his pledges to be available to residents and law enforcement officers, to be a no nonsense judge and to reduce the backlog of local cases.

Candidates appraise assessor's job

Wayne Townsend

Wayne Townsend says he's always been on the outside looking in, but the Democratic candidate for the Lincoln County Assessor's job hopes to change that now.

"I've been interested in politics all my life, and this is the first time for me to do something about it. I've worked all my life for money, now I want to do something because I like it."

Townsend believes he's the most

qualified to do the assessor's job, and claims his office will be his pickup truck.

"I'd hire the best office manager (chief deputy) I could find, and I would be out helping my staff with appraisals."

Townsend cites 24 years of business management, personnel supervision and budget responsibilities as basis for his expertise.

If elected to office, Townsend hopes to enact three different programs for the betterment of the office.

First, he mentioned that the staff will be held more accountable for their time and work. While not critical of the current administration, he believes there is always room for improvement.

Second, he wants to see the office run more efficiently.

"More service should be rendered from the sub-office in Ruidoso. One appraiser is stationed there, while four are in the office at Carrizozo. With 75 percent of the appraisals being done within 15 minutes of the sub-office, there ought to be a larger staff there."

Townsend said he would transfer personnel from the county office rather than hire more appraisers.

Third, he plans on providing greater equitability in the appraisal of similar properties. Spot-appraising properties is one way he proposes to keep tabs on the accuracy of his appraisers.

Townsend also thinks the appraisers should have cartographic skills, and the assessor appraisal skills.

Regarding the two-year term, Townsend said changing the length of office would be beneficial for the sake of continuity.

And if elected, will he run for re-election in two years?

"If I felt that I did a good job, I'd want to run again," he said.

While Townsend hasn't served in any public office, he has served on several local boards.

Townsend has lived in Ruidoso for the past 10 years. Educated in Portales and at Eastern New Mexico University, he has been a New Mexico resident for 40 years. He and his wife, Helen, have one son who lives in Austin, Texas.

Patricia Serna

Pat Serna has worked in the Lincoln County Assessor's Office since 1972, and now the chief deputy assessor is running for the top job in the office.

Republican candidate Patricia Serna claims her lengthy experience makes her the ideal candidate for the job.

"I'm already familiar with every duty of the assessor, and I know I'm qualified."

Serna explained many of the job duties in detail, explaining the calendar deadlines that the office must meet in getting out appraisals to the property owners in the county and sending reports to Santa Fe so the tax rates may be set by the Department of Finance Administration.

Serna noted that any property owner has the right to protest appraisals within 30 days of receiving the notice, and then has up to 120 to prepare a case before a board of protest.

Serna said that many of the cases this year have been decided before reaching the Board of Protest, therefore taking up less of the assessor's time.

The assessor's report to the property tax department is compiled from files provided by the various entities in the county. Home and property values are figured in the final report as well as values set by such offices as the soil and water conservation district.

Serna feels her experience in the office is one of her strongest points.

"I came over from the county treasurer's office in September of 1972, and started as the assessor's clerk. Later I took a computer training course in Dallas, Texas, and when I returned started the training of other members of the staff."

Serna would like to see a few

changes made in the office.

"We have three clerks in the office right now, and I would like to see everyone become at least a Level I Appraiser. The state has an appraisal school — it's a one week course — and some of the other counties send their clerks for the instruction. It would be beneficial for the clerks to be more knowledgeable of the appraisals."

Serna says that she has no higher aspirations than the assessor's office, but she would like to see the term of office extended from the current two-year period to four years.

"It takes nearly a year to get used to the job, and then you have to run again if you want to keep the

office. The continuity would be a real benefit to the office."

Serna feels confident that her experience in the office will make the transition smoother than if someone new to the office came in as assessor.

"I like working here, too."

Serna would like to see some new equipment in the assessor's office as well. The office just received a small personal computer, but she feels that a map plotter would be helpful in the cartographic section.

Serna, who is single, grew up and still lives in Carrizozo. She graduated from Carrizozo High School before starting to work for the county.

Locals garner prizes at conference

The First Annual Governor's Rural Economic Development Forum was created to provide opportunities to learn about issues affecting the economic growth of our rural areas.

The conference provided access to information on existing economic development programs and data bases and offered attendees the chance to network with professionals in development services. Sharing information on successful techniques and development strategies minimizes expenses and the underlying feeling of the symposium was one of cooperation and sharing.

Program participants included Roland R. Vantour, Under Secretary for Small Community and Rural Development, U.S. Department of Agriculture; Mitch Horowitz, Director for State and Local Government Studies, The Corporations for Enterprise Development, Washington D.C.; Tom Dowell, District Director, U.S. Small Business Administration; and Donald E. Bussell, Principal, PHH Fantus, Chicago, Illinois.

A special MainStreet Program Workshop preceded the economic development sessions, and it was attended by MainStreet Ruidoso project director Mary Maul and Ruidoso village councilors Barbara Duff, J.D. James and Jess Stinson.

MainStreet Ruidoso received two awards for program leadership and progress.

Representing the Ruidoso and Lincoln County area in the economic development sessions were Ruidoso Downs Mayor Bonnie Addy, Jim Bassett, Duff, Maul, Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County (EDCLC) Executive Director George Puckett, EDCLC secretary Anita Sanders, Howard Shanks and Dick Weber.

The efforts of the Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County were acknowledged and rewarded with two awards from Governor Garry Carruthers (see related story).

The economic structure of the state is undergoing gradual change with the decline in mining agricultural employment. The rural population slightly exceeds its urban counterpart with 772,400 to

737,600 yet rural New Mexico has the highest unemployment at 8.4 percent compared to 5.2 percent in our urban communities. The per capita income of rural areas is significantly lower than areas of high density population like Albuquerque, Las Cruces, Roswell and Santa Fe with \$10,796 compared to \$14,263.

Our government is the largest and most constant employer in rural New Mexico with more than 26 percent of the non-agricultural work force on its payroll.

The forum indicated that tourism was possibly our single best growth prospect although, as an industry, it consisted of the lowest paying jobs. If we can increase wage and benefit levels in this industry, it could provide us with great returns in the future.

The attraction of retirees to the area will increase our economic base without competition for existing jobs. This sector also provides communities with expertise and an expanded membership in service clubs and volunteer efforts.

Some of the problems that face rural communities are our people who consistently rank among the most industrious labor pools in America. Entrepreneurship is strong in rural New Mexico, but often held back due to isolation and lack of financial resources. As employees, our rural workforce excels in company loyalty, productivity and job attendance.

What can we do to create new higher paying jobs? Foremost is dedicated and aggressive leadership in the private sector, followed closely by linking with other communities to increase economies of scale and areas of non-competitive specialization which can interrelate with one another. We need to develop a plan of action, increase communications with agencies that can be of assistance to us and, quite simply, get everyone involved in strategic planning sessions.

Don't wait for the 'other person'; get in the act yourself, encourage others who are trying to create new high paying jobs and keep positive attitude. Good paying jobs will be coming to rural New Mexico when you join in the commitment.

An early morning brush fire in Gavilan Canyon awakened area firefighters Tuesday morning.

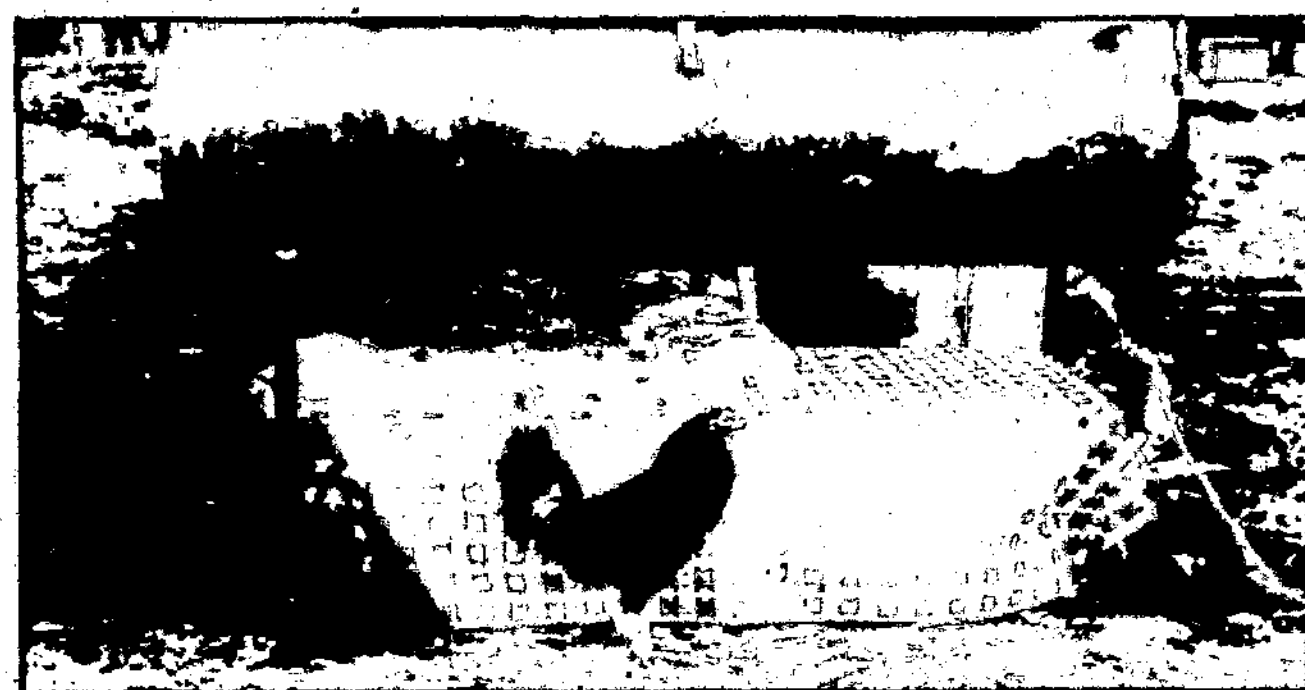
Crews contained the fire in minutes with no damage to nearby residences.

Although they contained the blaze quickly, firefighters spent more than two hours quelling hot spots. The bulk of the crews were released by 6 a.m., leaving a skeleton crew to monitor.

OMI rules Geronimo death was accidental

Results from an autopsy and blood screen have been released in the case of Sonny Geronimo of Mesquero.

Dr. Patricia McFeeley of the Office of the Medical Investigator in Albuquerque said there were several injuries that could have caused death for the youth.

Geronimo was found dead on the side of the road September 22, apparently hit by a car. He was 17.

Geronimo suffered from multiple head injuries and brain contusions, blood in his chest cavity and abdomen, and damage to his liver, a lung, and an artery to his kidneys.

All injuries were consistent with the report that he was hit by an automobile, said McFeeley.

Results of the drug screen turned up negative results, but it was discovered that his blood alcohol content at the time of death was .121. The state considers a person legally intoxicated if their blood alcohol content is .1 or above.

The autopsy was performed shortly after the death, and the death certificate was signed October 2. Test results on the alcohol levels and drug screen did not return until mid-October.

Contel customers call home for less

The majority of Contel customers in New Mexico will see a reduction in their monthly basic telephone bill beginning in November, thanks to an order signed by the New Mexico Corporation Commission.

The Commission order, effective November 1, basically approves Contel's request for lower rates and a revamping of its measured service rate structure, according to a news release.

In the plan, Contel has agreed its basic rates will not increase over the next 12-month period. It does allow the company to come back to the Commission to seek redress in rates for non-basic services, that is, competitive services in the next three years. Non-basic services are all but the basic line connection, or dial tone as it is called.

Contel New Mexico State Manager Charles Ferrell said most residential subscribers will see rate decreases ranging up to \$5.81 per month. He said that the decreases will be seen by the majority of Contel's 23,250 subscribers.

Measured Service customers could realize even increases in usage without increasing the monthly bills, depending on their usage. In most cases, usage could even increase without increasing the monthly bill, because under the new measured plan, customers will be charged 20 cents per call, no matter how long the call is, rather than being charged on the basis of

the length of the calls as has been the present billing practice.

Ferrell cautioned that customers could also see cost increases if they do not watch the number of calls made. This points up the basis for measured service: it allows customers to control their own telephone costs.

Ferrell added that the credit to be received on the monthly telephone bill of those on the Low Income Telephone Assistance Program (LITAP) will be increased from the present \$3.50 to \$4.50.

For business customers, of which there are 5,507 in Contel's serving area, unlimited usage customers can expect to see savings of \$5.46 under the approved plan.

Customers will receive detailed letters explaining their specific rates and service options under the new rate structure.

The Commission's order also decreed a profit sharing formula, which would be applied to customers as credits in their monthly bills should the company earn beyond its authorized rate of return. The profit sharing plan provides the company with incentives toward greater efficiency.

This may be a real estate person, a banker, or simply a friend. In most cases, however, the facilitator is the economic development professional.

He or she must develop a relationship with the prospect so that a sufficient level of confidence is established. This does not mean winning and dining the prospect with riotous nights on the town. If that kind of entertainment is necessary the desirability of the prospect comes into question.

What it does mean is traveling to the prospect's place of business and learning about its problems and characteristics. And it means meeting the family to determine what their goals and desires might be. It takes a genuine interest in all aspects of the prospects life so that it is possible to understand where that prospect is coming from.

That can't be done sitting in the corner eating pudding pie.

Warriors whip winless Colts, 52-18

The Warriors' winless history against the Colts at Silver City ended with a Warrior victory last Friday 52-18.

Five minutes after the kickoff, the game was virtually over.

Silver's only shining moment in the first half was a reverse that was good for 50 yards. Other than that, they seemed to go in reverse every time they got the ball from Ruidoso's shining defensive stars.

Heath Huey played a career game on defense. Kief Johnson was power on offense, but his strong tackling knocked Colts silly all night long.

The Warriors had great plays from the whole team all night long. Everyone on the squad played.

Brooks Henderson, substituting for an injured Guardiola on one play, threw a key touchdown pass.

Jose Marquez couldn't be stopped.

Steve Dankert was a man possessed. He crashed through two tacklers for a 45-yard run, and decked Colts on defense at will.

Craig Turner continued to dominate with bone crushing tackles.

Sam Gumbert is turning into pro material with his long soccer style kicks.

Ryan Wright had his best kickoff punts of the season.

Richard Rippey, Chris Salas, Louis Jimenez, Ryan Wright, Shane Eidson, Jamie Ordorica, Poncho Portillo, James Gieb, James Atwood, all made great plays.

SUMMARY

Wright kicks to the 15. Huey drops the Colts for no gain. Two passes later Silver kicks to the Warriors 15. Johnson rips the left corner for 10 yards Marquez breaks a tackle on the sweep and gains 10 more. Marquez then breaks a long gainer to the Colts 34. The Warriors stay with Marquez who slips through the line untouched for the final 34 and a touchdown. Two Warrior penalties lead to a 40-yard extra point try that is low. Warriors lead 6-0.

Silver takes over on their own 15. A short pass over center is intercepted by Johnson who whips around the left side, breaking free from two tacklers, and slips into the endzone for a touchdown. The extra point fails and the Warriors lead is 12-0.

On the kickoff Turner and Huey flatten a Colt and Silver starts from their 16. Two plays go nowhere before a reverse sends a Colt to the Warrior 30. A face mask penalty tacks on another 15 to the 10 yard line. A movement penalty gives the Colts five more yards. Silver scores and the extra point fails. The score is 12-6 and the quarter ends.

On the kickoff, Johnson tears up the middle to the 45 yard line. Warriors are flagged for holding and two plays later they kick.

The Warriors stop the Colts on a fourth and one and take over on the Colt 45. Marquez breaks wide and is finally caught on the 10 yard line. Guardiola is dropped for a big loss and is injured on the piling on penalty of the Colts. Henderson enters the game for one play and tosses a touchdown. The two point conversion fails and the Warriors lead 18-6.

Silver starts the next series of plays with two penalties and a long pass that is intercepted by Huey and brought back to the 20. Marquez on the first play from scrimmage drives the right end and leaves Colts in his dust. Gumbert slams the extra points between the uprights and the Warriors lead 25-6.

Silver fumbles the kickoff and the Warriors recover on the 20. Johnson slams over the left side to the nine. Torres high steps the remaining nine as he cuts left of center and into the endzone. The extra point attempt flies left of the post. Warriors lead 31-6.

The Warriors keep the Colts deep in their own territory on the next series of plays and the Colts are forced to kick on fourth and 20, but the Warriors receive two critical penalties. One is an offside for five yards, the other is a strange

fair catch call by which it was ruled a Warrior signaled fair catch too quickly. That penalty was 15 yards and gave the Colts new life. The Warriors finally stopped the Colts March on Ruidoso's 20 and the halftime ended.

Dankert opened the second half with a tackle breaking run that returned to Silver's 33. Marquez then slanted the corner for 10 yards. Johnson followed carrying three Colts to the nine. On fourth down, Gumbert's 38-yard field goal attempt was long enough, but to the left.

Silver and the Warriors swap series of non-movements before the Warriors rally from the 48. Torres starts the march with a 20-yard run to the 28. Marquez cuts the corner to the 18. Marquez then starts left, stops and cuts down the center all the way for a TD. Gumbert converts and the score is 38-6.

Silver takes the kickoff and runs 85 yards for a touchdown. The extra point is no good and the Warriors lead is 38-12.

The Warriors fumble at the mid-field stripe, but the Colts can't convert.

The Warriors substitute freely and the fresh defense tears the Colts apart. Both teams exchange uneventful series.

Silver gets great field position on the 50. On the second play from center, a Colt cuts the corner and skirts the sidelines for a touchdown. The extra point is no good and the score is 38-18.

The Warriors march down the field on the next series of plays. Johnson gets the long run, breaking tackles and cutting from one side of the field to the other for the touchdown. Gumbert's boot is good, 45-18 Warriors.

On the kickoff, the Colts fumble and the Warriors recover. Henderson hits Ordorica in the endzone and Gumbert converts another extra point. The Warriors lead jumps to 52-18. There was no further scoring.

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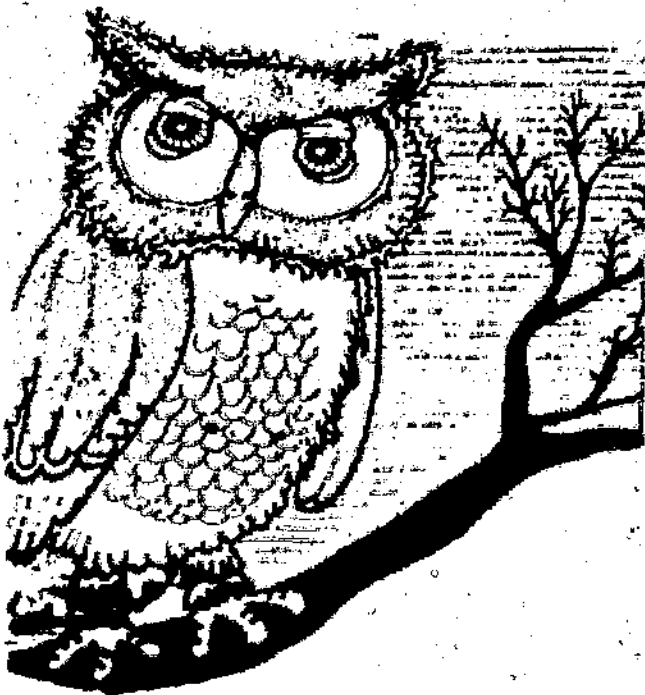

BLM head has words of advice for hunters

Now that deer hunting season is upon us, Bureau of Land Management Roswell District Manager Francis R. Cherry, Jr. has a message for hunters and landowners alike.

"Cooperation, advance planning, respect, and talking with the private landowners in the area are key elements in ensuring a successful experience during this hunting season."

The three separate stratification for deer hunting this year are November 3-4, 7-11, and 14-20. Hunters need to ask permission before hunting on private lands, and if granted, they need to respect the wishes of the landowner and make sure that gates are left as found, and do not leave litter.

In a release, Cherry said the landowner must also respect the rights of the hunter to utilize public lands and not deny access on public roads, Cherry adds, "I hope everyone will remember that kind and courteous behavior usually receives kind and courteous behavior in return."

A series of access maps are available at all BLM offices; they sell for \$2 and \$4. These maps show land status and public access roads, in addition to lands and roads

which cannot be entered without the landowner's permission. Again this season, BLM Law Enforcement Rangers and New Mexico Game and Fish officials will be patrolling heavily utilized hunting areas to provide assistance where needed.

Over the past few years, hunters in southeastern New Mexico have been involved in a pilot effort to implement the Sikes Act Stamp Program which makes additional hunter fees available for habitat improvement.

With the public partnership of state and federal agencies, sportsmen, and ranchers, thus far, hundreds of thousands of dollars of habitat improvement actions have been completed, including 110 wildlife watering facilities built or maintained, and 66,952 acres of controlled burns for improved big game habitat.

This successful program will be implemented statewide beginning April 1, 1991.

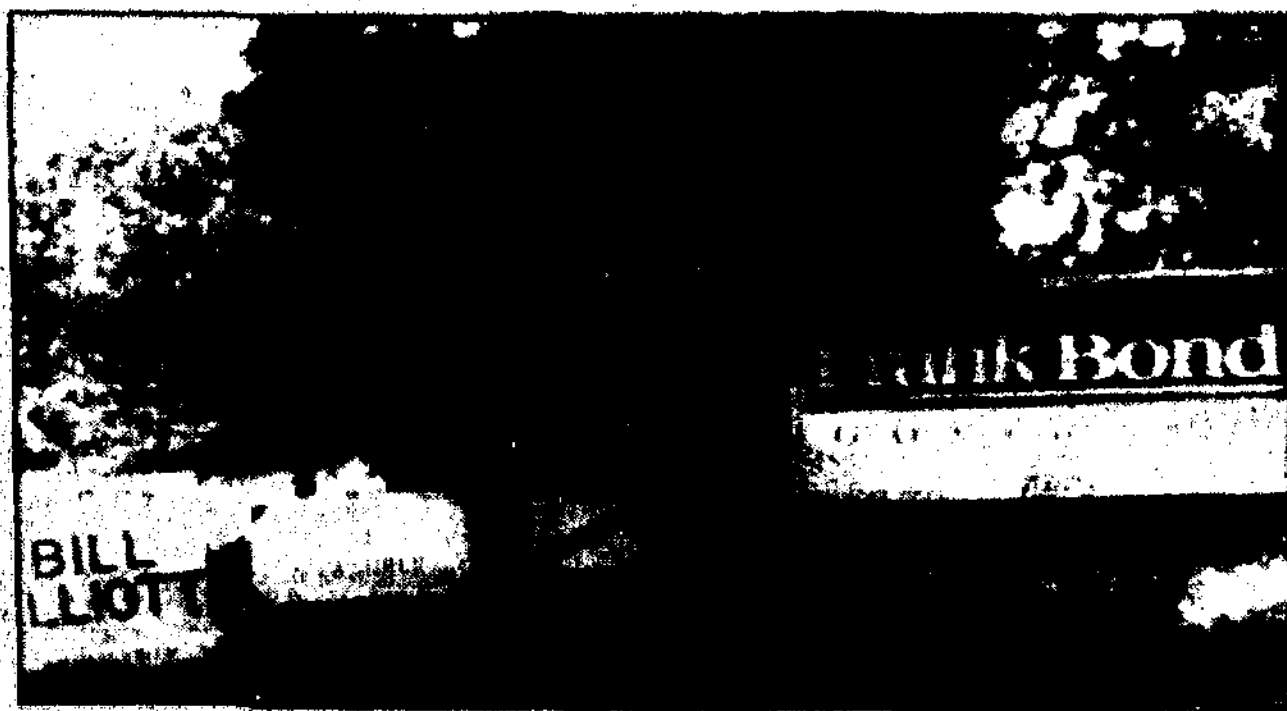
The initiation of the program statewide will increase the funds collected from the current \$160,000 per year over sevenfold to \$1.7 million," said Ben Hanson, Public Information Officer for the New Mexico Game and Fish Department. Hanson added, "The Wildlife

Habitat Improvement program has worked so well in New Mexico that other states are looking into it."

With the Sikes Act in effect, people hunting in the southeastern part of the state this year will see that the purchase of wildlife habitat improvement stamps is providing better quality habitat and an increase in wildlife in this area.

This year, the Bureau of Land Management, New Mexico State Game and Fish and Forest Service wise hunters and landowners alike a safe hunting season, respect for land, other people, and wildlife, in order to help ensure hunting for the future, said Cherry in the release.

Permits are available to cut Christmas trees

Those who enjoy the tradition of cutting their own Christmas trees will soon be able to obtain a permit from Lincoln National Forest.

Mail-in permit applications will be available from November 1 through November 13 on a first-come, first-serve basis, according to information provided by the United States Forest Service. A total of 6,000 permits will be sold.

Applications can be obtained at all Lincoln National Forest offices. Cloudford Ranger District will be open on Saturdays. Other locations are: Chamber of Commerce offices in Alamogordo, Las Cruces, Clovis, Roswell, Artesia, Loving, Jal, Ruidoso, Hobbs, Carlsbad, El Paso, Midland and Odessa; post offices in Tularosa and Carrizozo, and J.C. Penney stores in El Paso and Las

Cruces.

This year, for the first time, applications will be available to Holoman Air Force Base in the Morale, Welfare and Recreation (MWR) office and at the public affairs office at White Sands Missile Range. To request an application by mail, write: Christmas Tree Application, c/o Lincoln National Forest, Federal Building, 11th and New York, Alamogordo, NM 88310.

Trees may be taken from the forest between November 22 and December 24. Trees up to 10 feet tall may be cut, or they may be dug for use as a living tree. Instructions on restoration of the digging site are included in the permit applications.

A detailed map of cutting areas is mailed with each permit. Individual households are limited to one tree, however, clubs, churches and schools may apply for more than one permit if the trees are for public display.

There are 2,500 fir trees available for cutting along the Sunspot Highway on Cloudford Ranger District. Smokey Bear Ranger District has 1,000 piñon trees to choose from. Permit holders may cut a tree south of Glencoe or northeast of Carrizozo near White Oaks. Mayhill Ranger District has 1,500 piñon trees available southeast of Mayhill in the McDonald Lake area. Guadalupe Ranger District in Carlsbad will allow 1,000 trees to be taken from that area of the Forest.

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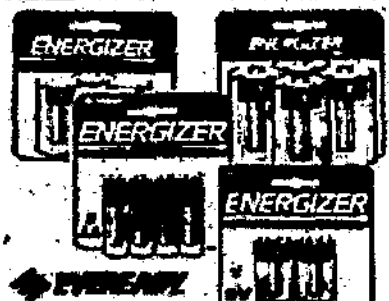
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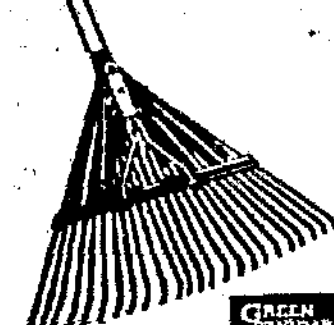

EDITOR:

We recently attended your Cowboy Symposium and would like to take this opportunity to express our views on what we think could be a worthwhile event.

The program, we thought was excellent, and though we personally lean more to music than poetry, both subjects were well presented. The dance on Friday night was somewhat of a disappointment for two reasons: 1. The band would lose or change the beat in the middle of a song, and 2. the indifference of the band to get on stage when your M.C. announced them. It was some

15 to 20 minutes before they decided to grace the crowd with their presence.

Being Bob Wills fans, when he used to come through the country playing for dances, we found this unacceptable.

Saturday morning we were up early looking forward to another great day and were going to be the early birds and stay until the last dog died that night. We headed out from the Circle B R.V. Park, and upon our arrival, were informed by a deputy sheriff, in curt tones, that motor homes had to park across the highway, and that we could walk

Had the parking been on a first-come, first-serve basis, we would have felt better about being required to park across the highway.

We also felt there was a definite safety hazard crossing a busy highway without protection, and especially at night.

Because of this, we decided to forget Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs,

Glencoe and the Cowboy Symposium and find a place that did not consider RVers second-class citizens.

One couple drove from La Habra, California (some 800-plus miles) and the other couple from Tucson, Arizona (almost 400 miles) for the sole purpose of attending your Cowboy Symposium, and were going to stay for all three days.

Looking at what we had spent, we feel that we would have spent an additional twelve to fifteen hundred dollars at and around your function. Plus the fact that you may be assured that we will not return

to Lincoln County for any Cowboy Symposium or anything else if this is the prevailing attitude of the sponsors and others. This will also be our recommendation to anyone that asks us about Lincoln County. What could have been a great trip was a sad experience. We would be interested in any comments you would care to make.

When I arrived at the symposium site, quite to my surprise, I found that my so-called 8x10 booth was nothing more than a marked off piece of dirt under a tent. I'd like to point out that nowhere in any of the cor-

respondence ... was there any mention of the exhibitors booths being located in a place other than inside the pavilion. I might add that it was not until I arrived and received my exhibitors packet that a letter appeared stating that these so-called booths were to be located under a tent. At that time, I was told our exhibitor fee was not refundable so I was left with no choice but to exhibit under such poor conditions. Had I been made aware of the exhibiting conditions, I would not have been a participant in the event.

Realizing no human has control of the weather, I would have expected a little more consideration than I received on Saturday given the weather conditions....

In addition, we were told security would be provided and there was no security provided on Friday; further, the exhibitors had

to hire their own security personnel for Saturday to ensure it be provided, thus adding more cost to exhibiting during your function, not to mention the irreparable damage done to our products by being placed in such poor facilities, treated so unprofessionally, nor any different than a herd of animals standing in dirt. Due to the damage to our products, we were unable to show at all on Sunday.

In conclusion, I feel that the representation of your event was indeed misleading and extremely deceiving. I resent the fees charged to exhibit given the poor conditions in which to exhibit....

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There's just something about throwing rocks

Last week, before the first game of the World Series, a feeling came over me suddenly, directing me outside for some rock throwing.

The pre-game introductions and festivities were blaring out the cabin door while I methodically threw my arm completely out of its shoulder socket.

There is something inherently male about throwing rocks, be it skipping them across some pond, aimlessly throwing them down a road, or purposely bearing down and trying to strike out some imaginary Reggie Jackson with a dirt clod.

There's a Realtor's sign down the road a ways from my cabin, and although much further than 60 feet, six inches, appeared to be a perfect target to throw rocks and clods of various sizes at.

Properly throwing rocks at any given target requires some amount of skill, albeit a lesser supply of something more important to do.

First, you limber up by bending over to pick up some rock that is reasonably within proper size and weight specifications. This means that you can lose the use of your arm for days depending on the size projectile you choose to

hurl at your chosen target.

Next, you take your warmup toss, which consists of one throw meant to be provided the same force that Nolan Ryan propels his pitches with.

That rock size I was talking about can do any one of several things. Smaller rocks, for instance, can be thrown side-arm great distances and with a wicked curve. It is advisable to not throw too many of these smaller rocks this way, as the elbow was not meant to be turned that way. This could lead to separation of the forearm at the elbow.

Larger rocks, by nature, have to be thrown overhand, somewhat like a football. This is the

most desirable hurling motion, as it puts the least amount of strain on the arm.

Rock throwing in general is a good thing, in the Hill Country of Texas. German immigrants near the town of Fredericksburg heaved huge field stones at lines laid out on the ground. The legacy of their accuracy lives on in the many fieldstone walls that surround many of the older farms and ranches.

We used to throw rocks not necessarily in a contest of strength, but pure accuracy. Many a glass electrical insulator near Casa Linda Park back home went the way of a cola bottle thrown out of a car at 60 miles per hour.

Darrel and I were throwing rocks at each other, but usually able to duck each other's throws. Unfortunately, we discovered the art of camouflage, which sacrificed some of our visibility. Darrel didn't see one lobbed his way like a hand-grenade, and zipped instead of zipped.

I'll never forget how mad his Daddy was at him for jumping in the path of that rock and getting blood all over his forehead. 'Course, I just looked on with some sort of awe at the power of the projectile. Oh well...

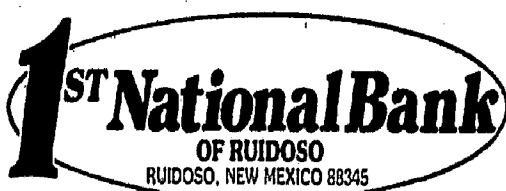

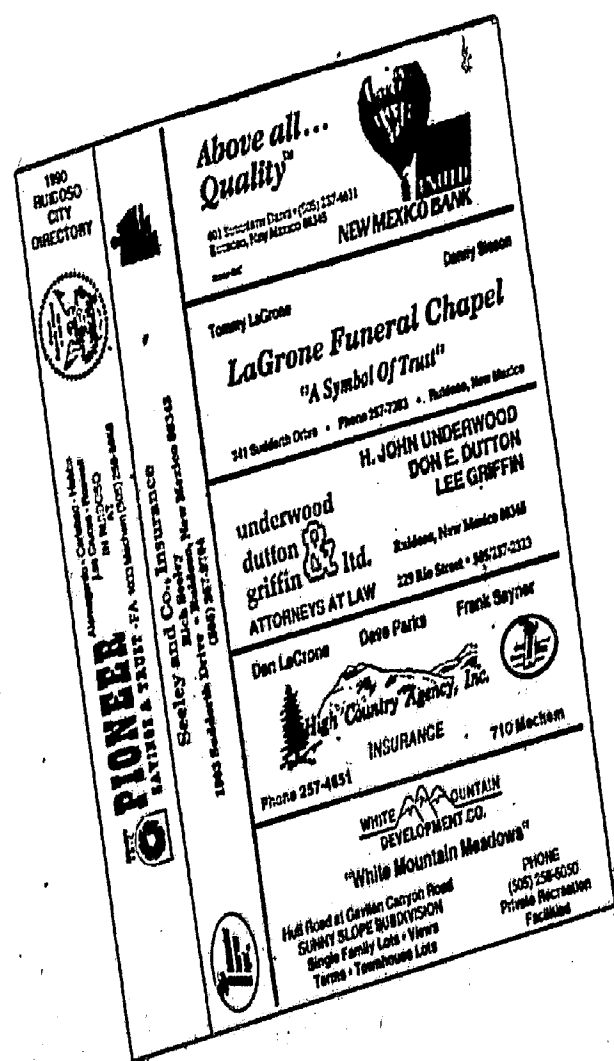

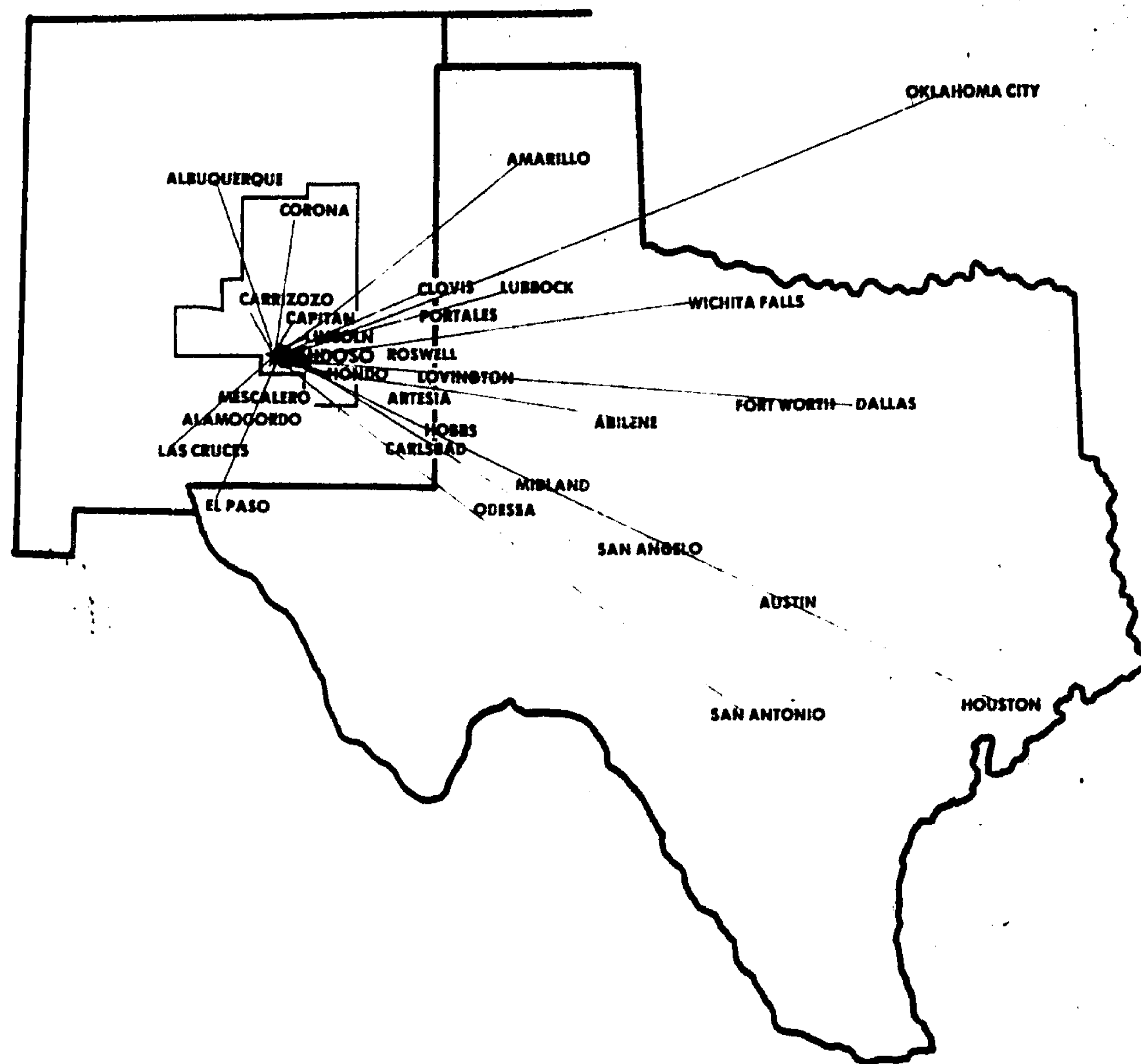
