Christmas for most Ruidoso residents means family reunions and the familiar trappings of brightly decorated houses, ornament laden trees, stuffed turkeys and baked hams.

"Because of the warm weather, Christmas isn't promoted as much as it is here," Kaur said.

"I had never seen a home decorated with lights until I came here," he said. "We have Christmas here, but they are not as big as the ones out of 10 are not unusual."

"We have a special meat in Argentina," he said. "It is a special meat that is not found here. It is a special meat that is not found here."

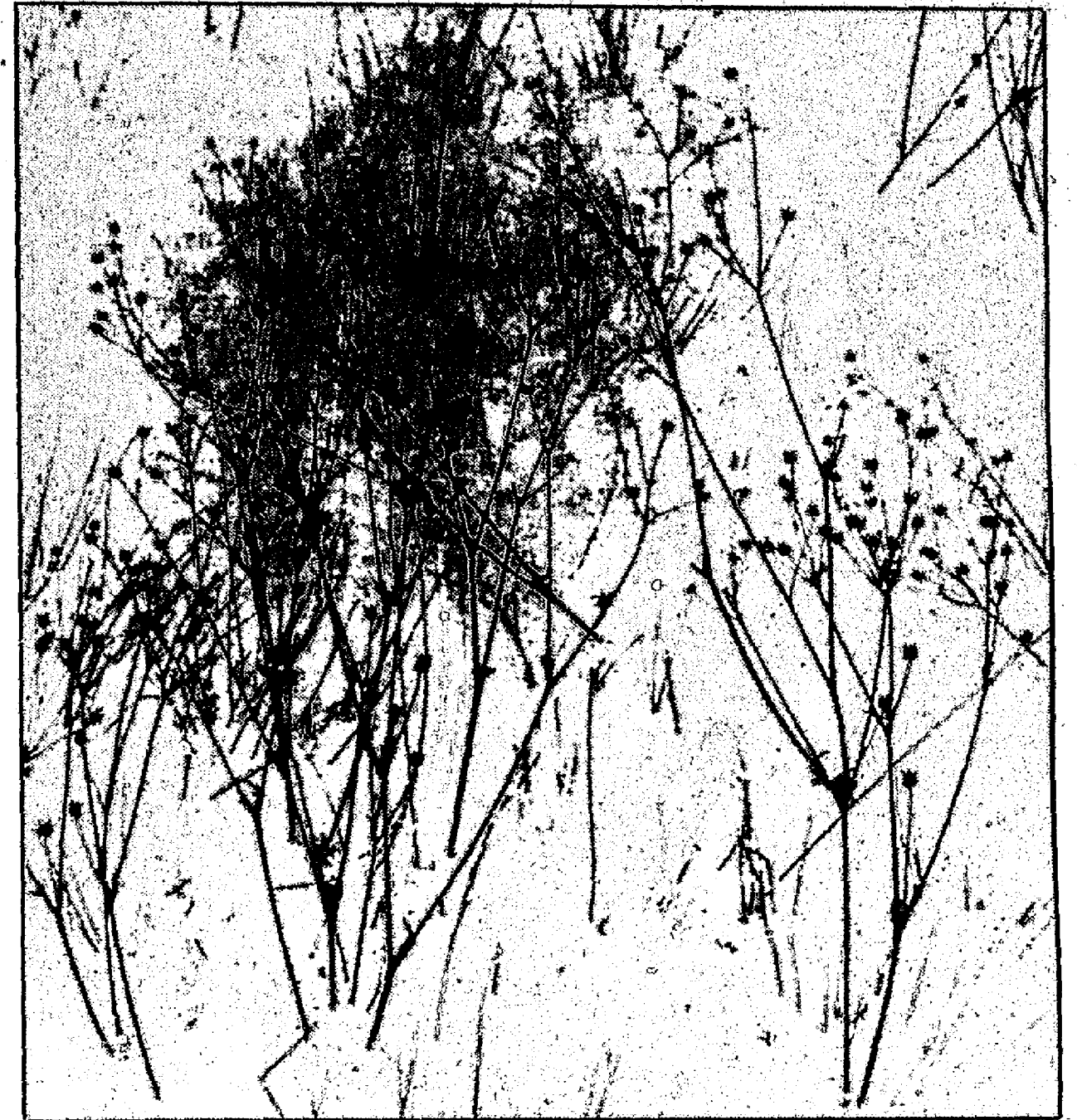
Some families hang stockings on Christmas Eve and decorate trees, but houses are not lit and one spends the warm days baking cookies, he said.

Making sure the holidays this year are happy for the two boys is John Howden, who for the past decade has handled the Rotary Youth Exchange program for the local club.

"We exchange with 20 different countries now," Howden said. The selection process for students locally includes interviews and social get-togethers that are used to evaluate a student's suitability for the program.

"From here, they need a grade average of at least a B," Howden said. Travel, insurance and medical expenses are paid by the families and usually run about \$3,500, he said. The students who visit Ruidoso receive a monthly \$75 allowance, as well as birthday and Christmas gifts from Rotary.

## NM Forestry spurs seedling program

For two centuries, mankind has systematically cut down the nation's forests to create pastures, crop beds, subdivisions and cities.

For the last 30 years, the New Mexico State Forestry Division has been enlisting the help of state residents to reverse that process of deforestation. Property owners are being encouraged to plant land with trees to retard the devastating effects of erosion and to slow the seasonal winds that sweep across the desert plains and through the mountain valleys.

The encouragement is more than verbal. The division grows and distributes at bargain prices a variety of seedlings suited for the varying altitudes, soil and growing conditions of the different sections of the state.

Lorie Stoller supervises the program in the division's Capitan district, which includes Ruidoso. Stoller, 30, said about the only requirement to qualify for the division's trees is that the applicant must own at least one acre of land.

"We don't want to sell just three or four trees at a time, because we are not in the nursery business and we don't want to compete with private operations," Stoller said.

The district's evergreen varieties are grown either in the Mora Research Center in Mora or at New Mexico State University in Las Cruces. They are sold in containers with their root plugs wrapped in dirt and are about one foot tall.

Deciduous trees, which lose their leaves in the fall, are shipped from greenhouses in Colorado.

For replanting projects in its area, the Upper Rio Hondo Soil and Water Conservation District will share as much as 50 percent of the cost of the trees up to \$100 per applicant, Stoller said.

The cost for conifers and other containerized trees such as aspen and the Four-Wing salt bush, is \$33 for 49 trees; deciduous with bare roots are \$20 for 50 trees. Delivery is scheduled for mid-March.

"Our species list gives details about the trees to help people choose," Stoller said. "The applications are sent to our Santa Fe office to be sure that enough of the proper species are grown."

Last year, aspens sold out quickly, she said.

If the Village of Ruidoso launched a community drive to plant aspens as part of the annual Aspenfest celebration, the district would need time to ensure that an adequate number of trees was available.

The distribution points for

evergreens are in Roswell, Lovington, Carlsbad and Alamogordo. Deciduous trees usually are shipped.

Some of the seeds used to grow the trees are collected locally. They are processed and kept dormant, but records note the time of year they were gathered and the growing conditions. It may be several years before the seeds are germinated.

"They can be frozen until certain species are needed later," Stoller said.

She recently collected about five burlap bags full of seed cones from Douglas fir and White fir in the Cloudcroft area.

Last year, the district distributed 2,400 trees. About 17,500 were sold statewide.

"We have an 80 percent survival rate here. That's about 10 percent higher than for the state as a whole," Stoller said.

To prepare for planting, the soil must be cultivated by disking or with a manual hoe, she said. A drip or sprinkler type water system will be needed. When planting, the roots should be arranged straight down into the hole.

"If they are bent, it will kill the tree," Stoller said. The dirt should be tapped firmly into place after the tree is inserted into the hole. The soil around the tree should be

watered immediately to a depth of 18-24 inches and that should be repeated for several days a week.

Lack of moisture is one of the major factors that weakens trees and renders them vulnerable to diseases, pests and parasites such as dwarf mistletoe, which currently is attacking large stands of Ponderosa pine in New Mexico.

Land owners also may need to fence out livestock or to install rodent protection sleeves or tubes around the trees, Stoller said.

If someone is looking for fast growing trees, aspen and poplars are good choices and they send out root suckers to create new trees.

"They may need to trim the roots to keep proper spacing for proper growth," Stoller said. "It's common for people to plant their trees too close together. If they do, they should cut out every other one later and sell them for Christmas trees. But lots of time, people get so attached to the trees, they won't cut them and all the trees suffer."

Spruce are slower growers and take about 20 years to mature depending on water and soil conditions, she said.

Fertilizer should not be applied to any of the trees for two to three years, Stoller said. "It can be very damaging."

The most popular trees sold in the district are the Afghanistan pine, best suited for lower elevations, the Arizona cypress, Lombardi poplar, Skunk Bush sumac and Russian olive, a medium-sized tree with red berries.

The Colorado Blue spruce, the aspen, the Ponderosa, Southwest White and smaller Austrian pines and any of the firs are well-adapted to Ruidoso's higher elevation, Stoller said. Junipers, except for the Rocky Mountain strain, are better for Capitan's mid-level elevation.

Fast growing trees that do well at 7,000 feet are the Lombardi poplar and the Eastern Red cedar, according to Bob Cain, New Mexico State University Extension Service entomologist.

"Any of the hardwood trees should also do well in Ruidoso," he said. They include the Green ash, the shrubby Skunk Bush sumac, the thorny Russian olive, the Native plum, the Northeastern cottonwood, the Narrowleaf cottonwood and the lilac.

Cain said he would not recommend planting Southwestern White pine. Although it would do well at Ruidoso's elevation, a disease called White Pine Blister was detected last year in the Cloudcroft area and is expected to spread.

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# County calls a halt to Alto utility line project

The Alto utility project slid into homeplate but remains short of the base.

The Lincoln County Board of Commissioners, on a recommendation from the county manager's office, revoked the contractor's permit Wednesday and put a stop to a utility cable project under way in Alto. The contractors have already begun clean-up work at the site.

Concerns over the quality of work and the close proximity of gas and high voltage electrical lines were listed as reasons for halting the work.

Spokesmen for Zia Natural Gas and Cablevision of Lincoln County said the project was within a mile of completion.

It was also discovered Wednesday that the contractor hired to do the excavation did not have the proper certifications and license to perform some of the work being done. A wide range of penalties, based on the value of the contract and the extent of violations involved, could be charged the contractor for working out of the scope of his license.

Paul Crown of Cablevision of Lincoln County hired CATV Sub-

scribers, Incorporated, based in Greensboro, North Carolina, to excavate along a county easement for the purpose of laying and upgrading cable television transmission lines.

Zia Natural Gas joined in the agreement after being contacted by Crown so that they could lay down natural gas lines in the same trench.

Gene Wilson of the Alto Lakes Water Corporation watched the project closely and questioned some of the work done by the contractor. Wilson noted 11 areas along the route of the excavation trench that appeared to him to be too close to existing electrical lines buried in the ground.

Albino Zuniga, a pipeline safety engineer for the state, came from Santa Fe to inspect the site and found two of the areas to be less than what they should have been.

"It is common practice, in areas of utility congestion, to dig down only one foot with a backhoe so that you don't rupture or cut any lines," Zuniga said. "This maximum depth has been exceeded at the Alto site."

Crown noted in a conversation that the backhoe was being used to excavate on the site trenches in excess of 18 inches in depth.

"The electrical lines are at least 24 inches underground," he said.

In some areas, the gas lines were reportedly being placed less than a foot away from the electrical lines, which conduct as much as 12,470 volts. Trenches were being backfilled with rocky material instead of dirt, therefore creating the risk of a future rupture of the PVC gas line and, in a worst case scenario, causing an explosion or fire with a shorted or cut electrical line.

The electrical utility line, owned and serviced by Otero County Electrical Co-op, was installed sometime during the mid-1960s.

Currently, the areas where the line was installed too shallow are being re-installed at the proper depth.

Ken Johnston of Zia Natural Gas, contacted Thursday, said he had been out of town and was unaware the project had been halted.

"I was also not aware that the contractor did not have the proper licensing to perform the excavation for our pipeline," he said.

Mr. Johnston claimed in a later conversation that the contractors did have the proper credentials to perform the trenching for the natural gas line.

Johnston noted also that gas would be turned on in the areas where the line was complete.

Water and telephone lines are also in the trench occupied by the electrical lines. On several occasions, the phone lines have been severed or otherwise damaged by the contractor.

"We've got about \$10,000 worth of repair bills that are being sent to the contractor," said Contel manager John Van Tussenbroek. "Safety practices just aren't being followed by the contractor."

"Based on the meeting and discussions with the county road superintendent and county attorney, I decided to have the work permit rescinded," said Lincoln County Manager Nick Pappas. "A safety hazard has been created... therefore, I took the issue before the board of commissioners for action."

Communication with the New Mexico Construction Industries Division indicated that the contractor was not properly licensed to dig a trench for the gas line.

According to officials at the Licensing and Certification office of the CID, the contractor possesses an ES-6 rated license. This certifies that the owner of the license is capable and authorized to lay down

television distribution cables, according to those officials.

A license rating of GF-9 is necessary to perform any part of the installation of utility lines. This includes sewage, water and underground telephone lines as well as natural gas lines.

Crown said he understood the contractor could do the work so long as no gas was being run through the pipeline.

The county's quick response to the situation all but ensures them against any liability for any accidents related to their issuance of a permit to an improperly licensed contractor.

Pappas said permits are issued based solely on the expressed need of a contractor to work in a county easement or right of way. Road superintendent Tommy Hall went over the proposed area of excavation to ensure it was all county property and then issued the permit.

"We've never run into this situation before," Pappas continued. "Lincoln County has no zoning or code inspectors, so we don't have the tools to monitor given projects until a situation like this comes up."

Crown indicated earlier in the

week, however, that the serious concerns of the other utility companies and the Alto representatives were somewhat overblown.

"Only two out of the 11 needs inspected had to be addressed," said Crown. "We have plans to correct the problems. Also, we were told we were leaving too much of the ditch open at one time; from now on, we'll both dig and cover in a day's time."

Crown remarked Thursday that the decision to pull out was made last week after it was evident the water and electrical companies were still not happy with the situation.

"Quite frankly, I don't need the headache," said Crown. "If I had been on top of the situation from the start, this whole thing probably wouldn't have been blown out of proportion like it was."

Crown said that this was the first time Cablevision of Lincoln County has used an outside contractor.

With the project being suspended, and cable work moved to other job sites, Alto probably will be one of the last communities turned on to the company's new system.

## Water group elects directors

The Water Defense Association on Saturday re-elected three river-district representatives to the board of directors, and executive director Hubert H. Quintana brought the members of the association up to date on the court case involving the Mescalero Apache Indian tribe, the United States government and members of the association.

The group met at Hurd-La Rincónada Gallery in San Patricio.

Gail Hopkins, Leonard McCutcheon and Fred Pfingsten were all re-elected to their posts as board members representing the river residents. Each river is represented by three board members while municipalities are represented by one board member each.

Hopkins is a representative of the Rio Hondo, McCutcheon the Rio Ruidoso and Pfingsten the Rio Bonito. Each was nominated and re-elected without a run-off.

Quintana reported that appeal briefings are complete now, and the case has been sent to the New Mexico Court of Appeals. With the current docket load, Quintana remarked that the case will probably not be heard until late 1992 or early 1993.

However, the court date may be moved up by as much as a year if enough of the current cases can be settled out of court.

Cases not yet on the dockets are being put before retired judges for review in an effort to remove as many cases from the future dockets as possible.

The Mescalero section of the L.T. Lewis case (which involves the people represented in the Water Defense Association) cannot be decided out of court due to its complexity.

The Mescalero tribe and the United States government are attempting to claim in the case that the priority date of the tribe for the water dates back to 1852 instead of the currently accepted date of 1873, which is when the reservation was established. Most Hondo Valley non-Indian priority dates in the Hondo Valley predate the formation of the reservation, but an 1852 priority date would put the Indians at the head of the priority date list.

The 1852 priority date claimed by the tribe (but overturned in the first round of court proceedings) was when the Peace Treaty was signed between the Mescalero Apaches and the United States

government.

The tribe has since filed against the Water Defense Association, but the WDA has in turn filed against the tribe, stipulating that they are not the real party of interest.

The association is currently attempting to ensure that the \$95,000 remaining in the defense fund provided by the state will carry over into the next fiscal year. Area legislators are being contacted to help achieve this end.

Quintana discussed in brief the status of the Wind River case in Wyoming as pertinent to the local case.

The Indians there were granted a priority date predating the non-Indian users in the area. The Indians changed the water use of the river from agricultural to wildlife and detained the water on the reservation, in essence holding the state of Wyoming hostage in regards to the use of the water.

The main difference here is that 80 percent of the water users in this area predate the currently-allowed priority date of the Indians.

The Water Defense Association will conduct its annual meeting of the board of directors in January at the Hondo Valley School. A date for the meeting has not yet been set.

The applicants range in age from 16 to 19. Most are enrolled in high school, but some like Ryan Kerr, already have graduated even though they attend the local school.

"It's hard to keep going when you know you don't have to," Kerr said. "But it's better than sitting at home and it's a way to meet people and be involved in sports."

As many as 40 students may be exchanged in the Rotary district that includes New Mexico, El Paso and Ft. Stockton, Texas.

Called Tito by his Ruidoso family, Echeverria has adjusted to his new environment with a casual air of self-confidence.

When he arrived in America for the first time at the Los Angeles airport, he was sure the stories were true about the streets being lined with gold.

Parked at the passenger ramp were four limousines.

"But now that I'm here, I know that's not the way it is," he said.

He feels at home with Mike and Nancy Radziewicz. He teases their daughter, Nicole, 14, like he bugs his real sister of the same age. He pals around with Greg, 17. He has two brothers in Argentina, where his mother is a teacher and his father is a merchant.

While the emotional adjustment has been easy for Echeverria, he has experienced problems physically.

"Argentina is flatter," he explained. "It has some very tall mountains, but there are great distances of similar altitude. To leave Ruidoso, there are many ups and downs. I get terrible headaches."

His home town of Conesa is similar to Ruidoso in population and its seasonal influx of tourists, but the people live much closer together.

His school is smaller, but classes are spread out among several facilities and are heavily weighted with agricultural and technical sub-

jects. Students are rated on a scale of one to ten, with seven considered passing.

Boys have much more freedom in Argentina, he said. "It's not unusual for a boy my age to go to a party and stay out all night," Echeverria said. Some of the parties involve as many as 1,000 people in a community.

Many women work, he said. But they find it difficult to claim top management positions.

Prices in America are lower for electronic equipment, an important item for Echeverria since he plans a future in electronic engineering and computers. Clothing and tennis shoes also are much less expensive. The general inflation rate is significantly lower. It is not unusual for Argentina to experience 100 percent inflation in one month.

"Last year from February to August because of a panic in gasoline, the inflation rate was 6,000 percent," Echeverria said.

This is his first foreign exchange and he is proud to have been chosen as the first to represent his area. He picked America as his destination because he wanted to sample another culture and to learn English, Echeverria said.

Kerr said he selected America because, "You hear so much about the American people and the country, I wanted to see for myself."

His first glimpse of the States was from a Dallas airport. During a nine hour layover, he was impressed by the pride the Texans have in their state.

"My first impression of America was very good and it hasn't changed much," Kerr said. "The people are great."

Coming from a city of 5-million people, his biggest adjustment has been to slow down to the small town pace of Ruidoso.

He already has graduated from high school, but attending classes here allowed him to compare school

systems.

"We have a lot more homework, as much as three hours a night," Kerr said. "I attended a boy's school and we all wore uniforms. The only time we were in jeans was on the weekends. There is much more discipline in school and at home."

Their class schedules in South Africa change each day, not like the routine at local schools. As in Argentina, sports are totally separate from the curriculum and are heavily emphasized.

The legal driving age is higher in South Africa at 18, but that also is the legal drinking age.

Kerr is staying with the family of Ruidoso School Board member Mike Morris and his wife Karen.

His real father is sales director for a snack foods firm and his mother is a housewife and part time secretary. He has one younger brother.

Most students in South Africa hope to attend a university, Kerr said, "but you have to be very clever to get there." Kerr has received a full scholarship from the South African Paper Pulp Industry. The organization will pay his tuition. In return, he has agreed to work in the industry after graduation. His major will be industrial relations.

In the last few months, both boys have been able to travel with their American hosts. Echeverria visited the Grand Canyon, Las Vegas and Los Angeles. Kerr spent a week in Washington D.C. at the invitation of a scientist from Los Alamos, and did some nightseeing in Denver and several cities in California. He found San Francisco the most similar to his hometown of Johannesburg.

"It's not just the similarity in geology and development."

"I want to thank the people of Ruidoso for a wonderful year and I will miss them all."

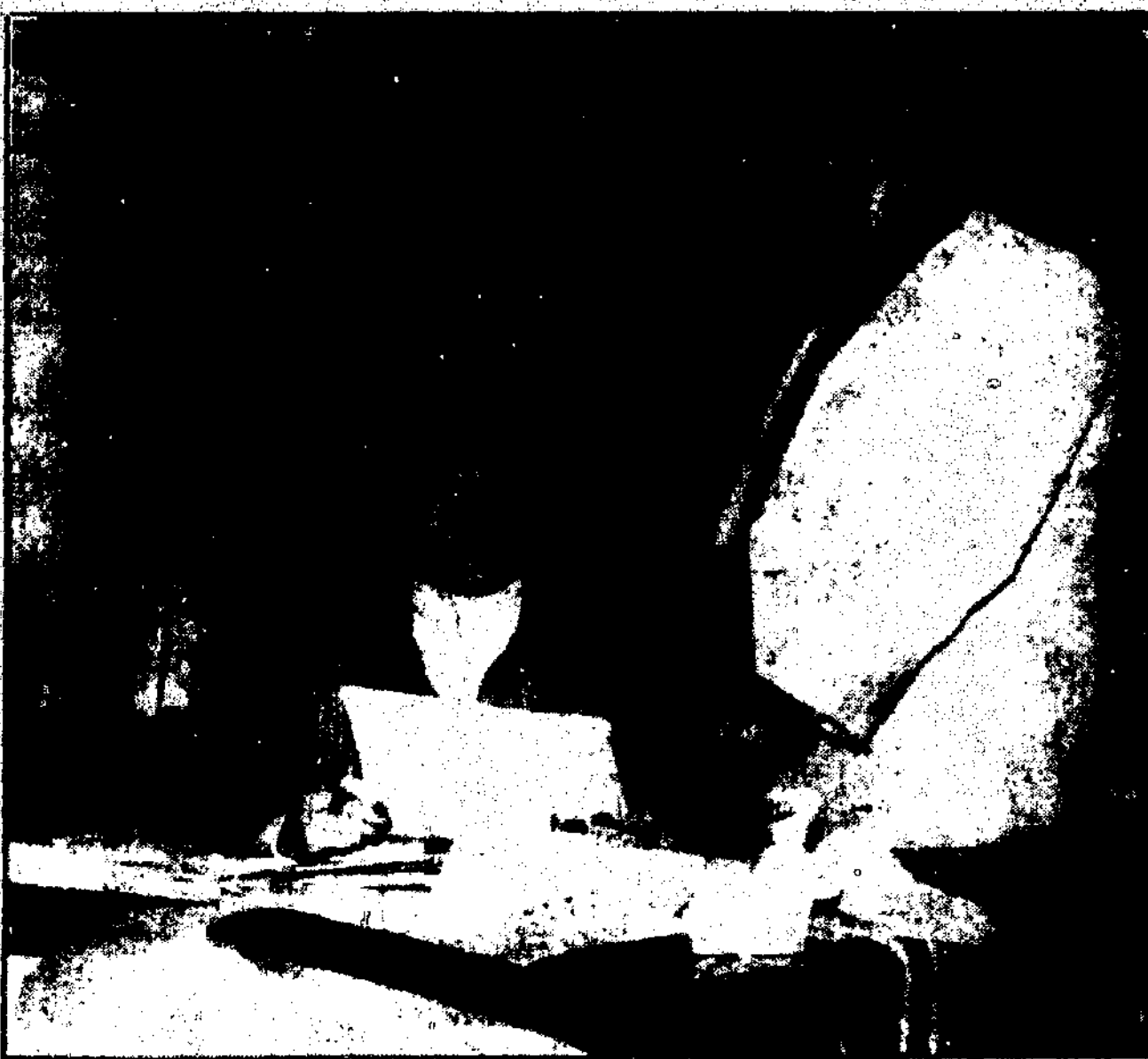

## Sales tax to rise January 1

Ruidoso's gross receipts tax will increase January 1 from 6.75 to 6.8125 percent.

Capitan, Carrizozo and Ruidoso Downs gross receipts taxes will be boosted from 6.00 to 6.0625 percent, according to the New Mexico Taxation and Revenue Department. Corona gross receipts tax will increase from 5.75 to 5.8125 percent.

Also effective January 1, the gross receipts tax throughout Lincoln County will increase from 5.000 to 5.125 percent.

The new rates reflect a .0625 percent municipal environmental services gross receipts tax imposed by the municipalities in the county and a .125 percent county environmental services gross receipts tax imposed by Lincoln County.

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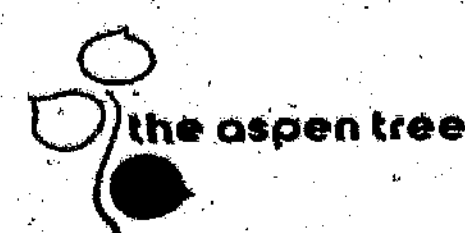

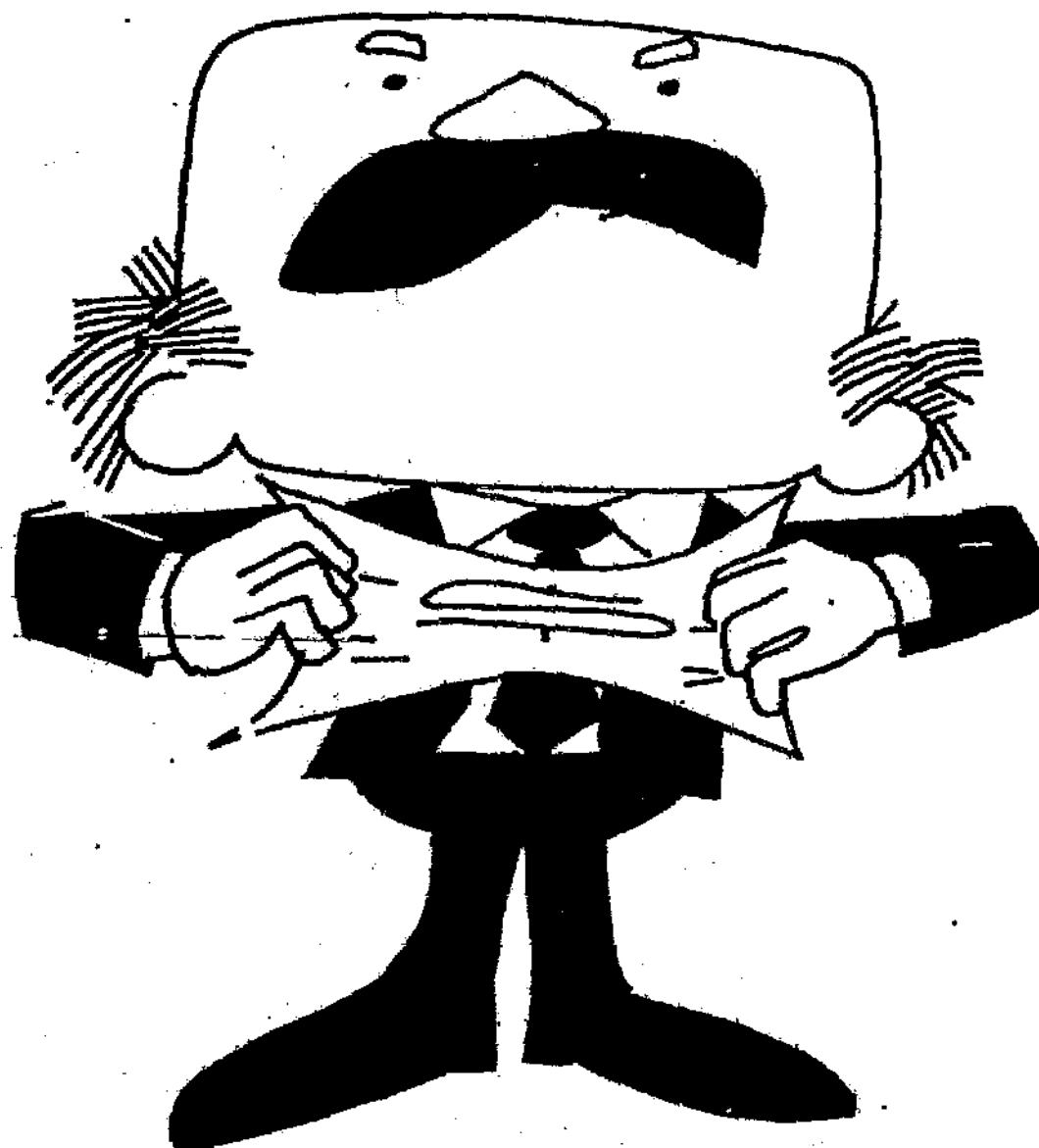

## Editorial

Accountability ... from accountable, meaning obliged to account for one's acts; responsible; capable of being accounted for, explainable. The synonym for accountable is responsible. Being accountable means to be responsible for one's own actions, and that's a good thing for governing bodies at every level, as well as for individuals.

Taxpayers are reminded about this time of the year that we are accountable to the United States through the Internal Revenue Service for reporting all of our income. Just in the midst of the Christmas season, report forms are distributed reminding us that we'll be paying taxes come April.

In the public sector, accountability (responsibility to the voters) should extend from setting policy to making decisions and budgeting for the best use of public monies. The only way that government can really be accountable to the people is through openness. That means open meetings and open records, including every detail of how public monies (those dollars we pay in taxes at every level of government) are spent.

That's where the newspaper comes in. Because the voters, the people who put elected officials in these responsible positions, can't be everywhere and most individuals don't have the time to "watchdog" public monies, newspapers have a responsibility to fulfill that role.

This newspaper has made a commitment to provide our readers with as much information as possible on the way Lincoln County governing bodies are spending tax dollars. Over the next few weeks, stories will be published that include details of how schools, villages and the county are spending your money. Those public entities comprise the largest overall payrolls in this county. It's public money, and the people who supply those funds have a right to know exactly how it is spent.

The more you know, the more accountable your elected officials can be. We're going to help by gathering public information and publishing it as a service to you, our readers.

### No One Was Surprised...

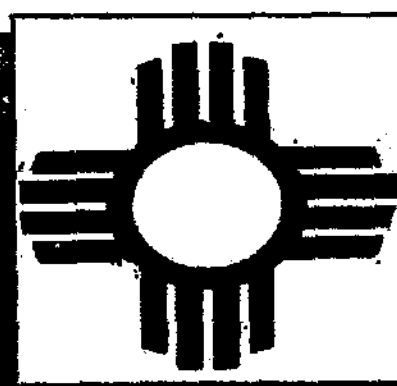
...Around the Emerald City last week when King named the new highway chief, Lou Medrano, God help him.

Fortunately, you get to come back from a killing and play another day in the world of sports, particularly in basketball.

I recently watched a hard-nosed, very good Carrizozo team tear apart a young, inexperienced Tiger squad that is the first offspring of yet another new basketball coach at Capitán.

102-36.  
That was the final score of the boy's varsity match.

104-15.  
That's how bad the Capitán JV got beat by the Grizzly junior squad.

Carrizozo's Ron Brewer has created one of the best Class A basketball programs in the state over the last few years. His players press so hard during a game that their opponents' jerseys look freshly starched. He doesn't have the height that many teams in the state might, but the boys are stout and know how to go to the hole or clean off the boards. Their offense is run as tight and crisp as Melba toast.

Carrizozo has a very good basketball team. So why'd they have to beat up on Capitán so badly?

Well, if you were a coach, you might say that you want to see if your team will perform the way you teach them to for an entire game.

Or, you might say that the boys are only playing the way expected of them — hard all the time.

But what about that pressing defense for all four quarters, even when the game was

neck and neck at 54-19 at halftime?

Zozo didn't have to press. They could have worked on zone defense in the second half, even if they don't PLAY a zone. The Grizzlies would have been better off practicing the press against their JV squad — they're probably more adept at breaking through the pressured defense.

Capitán didn't stand a chance. Tiger coach Pat Ventura, who came up 380 from Carrizozo, knew what was going to happen in the games. Fortunately, from a first game disaster (depending on whose side you cheer from), the Tiger schedule only gets somewhat easier.

That is to say, if trying to rebuild a program is easy.

Capitán's game against Cloudcroft started off much the same way as the Carrizozo game did.

In fact, the halftime score was even worse than the Grizzly game, as the Bears held a 59-16 advantage over a smaller and less confident Tiger squad. The pressure defense was forcing endless Capitán turnovers. The Cloudcroft for-

wards were able to drive the lane at will. Things were not looking exactly bright for Ventura's club.

The second half was different, though. The starting five of Cloudcroft came out on the floor for the second half and continued to dominate the Tiger squad, but they didn't use their pressure defense. Four minutes or so into the half, all five Bears came off the floor so some of their Cubs could get in the game.

Playing against a team with a similar experience level, Capitán outscored Cloudcroft in the second half, 44-28. Some of the Bear starters came back in during the second half, but the Tiger momentum was too great for even the earlier stars of the game to impede their progress. Instead, of Cloudcroft's Seth Lee and Manuel Beltran controlling the tempo of the game, it was Capitán's Bobby Griego and Nathan Roybal.

Cloudcroft's coach could have continued the press and kept his big guns on the floor, but with a 43-point halftime lead, I guess he figured maybe his younger guys could gain some valuable game experience without endangering the outcome of the game.

Granted, Carrizozo is probably the best team Capitán will face all season (they're expected to return to the state final where they lost last year), but there has to be some sort of break in strategy when it is very clear that you have completely outclassed and defeated your opponent early in the game.

The old saying "what comes around, goes around" just keeps popping up in my mind.

Fashions in the Ruidoso shops range from the Southwestern style to high fashion.

Continue on down Sudderth and you'll find more shopping, and then turn down Mechem Drive. That's right, there are more shops, and then the Sierra Mall on Mechem behind the Ruidoso State Bank North.

The Mall has a Mexican restaurant and some of the best shops this side of Dallas — everything from fine women's wear and shoes to western wear and clothing and accessories for teens.

And the shopping continues down Mechem with the Paddock and the Attic and Friends.

## Looking for something to do? Check this out

Skiing is Ruidoso's number one winter sport, but there's also golf, tennis, racquetball, bowling, go-carting, movies and gambling.

For the sedentary who occasionally dare to bend only the elbow there's gambling.

The Sports Theater, located east of the Ruidoso Downs Race Track offers pari-mutual wagering on simulcast horse racing broadcast live from Sunland Park near El Paso.

The Sports Theater also broadcasts other seasonal sports like football and the major boxing events.

Down the road a few greased wheels is Bingo of Mescalero and the Inn of the Mountain Gods on the Mescalero Indian Nation Reservation.

The Mescalero bingo hall allows you to fill your card while the Inn sports a video bingo room, a bank of one armed bandits to challenge the individual without having to yell "bingo."

Golf is considered a year round sport in Ruidoso even though a snow flurry or two may move the hardened golfer inside for a hot cup of grog.

Cree Meadows Country Club is open to the public and is located a few minutes from downtown Ruidoso. Cree golfers experience a sprawling course with gentle slopes and an outrageous view of Sierra Blanca Peak on most holes.

The Inn of the Mountain Gods' course is a spectacular championship course, beautifully maintained and snugly positioned against a mountain.

A third public golf course, Sierra Blanca Golf Club, is nearing completion less than two miles from the Cree Meadows course.

Tennis anyone? Lighted tennis courts are available at School House Park next to the Ruidoso Library. If it snows, enjoy a game under the shell at the Inn of the Mountain Gods.

Another indoor public facility is the Ruidoso Athletic Club (RAC). Located near downtown Ruidoso, the RAC has several racquet ball courts and a full line of Nautilus exercise equipment.

Fun Track Go Carts is a popular Ruidoso attraction good for all ages. This elaborate, bridged track is located at the Carizzo Road turnoff.

Bowling enthusiasts new to the village can enjoy the lanes of the newly renovated Holiday Bowling Center to keep their game in shape while away from home.

## Ski Apache has it all!

Meet Ski Apache, one of New Mexico's most popular ski areas.

From the base at 9,700 feet in elevation to the top of Apache Bowl at 11,500 feet, Ski Apache resort offers 34 runs appealing to all abilities.

About 30 percent are designated "easiest" runs, indicated by green circles. These include Deep Freeze, Easy Street and Snow Park at the base area, Moonshine Gulch and Sierra Blanca Trail, the easiest way down from the top.

More difficult runs, marked with blue squares, 45 percent, include the popular Meadows and Chino, wide-open Apache Bowl, scenic Elk Ridge, sunny Capitan, among others.

Black diamonds mean most difficult, 25 percent, and Caliente, the Terrible, Screaming Eagle and others challenge the better skier.

Know your ability before attempting a run.

A fleet of machine groomers tend some trails nightly, offering a choice of powder, packed powder or moguls.

### LIFTS

Getting to the top is easy. Three triple chairs and one double chair serve the lower areas. One double chair, a four-passenger gondola and two triple chairs serve the rest of the mountain. Ski Apache boasts the highest lift capacity in New Mexico — 12,800 skiers per hour, which translates into short lift lines.

### HUNGRY? THIRSTY?

A full-service restaurant in the day lodge serves hot breakfasts, lunches, and snacks. Two outdoor burger stands invite skiers to dine and sun. The Lincoln Burger Stand is at the base of Lincoln Chair #2; Moonshine Burger Stand is at the base of Chair #1 and can be accessed from Chair #7 as well.

Grab a quick snack at the Gazebo Snack Bar above the gondola at the top or at the Lookout Snack Bar at the top of Chair #6 above Apache Bowl.

Check out apres-ski action at the Broken Ski lounge on the second floor of the day lodge.

Restrooms are in the main day lodge on the ground floor, below the clock tower, in the Gazebo and Lookout

Snack Bar and in the Moonshine Burger Stand.

Visit the rental shop at the base area with over 700 pair of rentals or demos. Multi-day renters can take their equipment with them each day or leave it at the shop, reserved for the next day.

If your own equipment needs work, certified technicians repair bases, wax, check and adjust bindings, fit custom insoles and perform other services.

### LESSONS

Are you a first-timer? An intermediate wanting to advance? An advanced skier brushing up on latest techniques? Ski Apache Ski School teaches everyone from pre-schoolers to adults, from never-ers to racer wanna-bees.

Choose an all-day or half-day group lesson or an hour or all-day private. Sign up at the Ski School Desk and ask about packages.

### HOW FAST AM I?

Find out on the coin-operated dual slalom course or on the NASTAR

course. Both are run on Smokey Bear when the entire mountain is open. Try the "coin-op" Monday, Tuesday, Thursday, Friday and Saturday from 10-3; race NASTAR Wednesday and Sunday from 11-3. Coin-op takes tokens and NASTAR signups are at the Ski School desk.

### SHOPPING?

Come on in, the shopping's great at the Sport Shop on the ground floor of the day lodge.

It's all here: from ski suits to sunscreen, from parkas to postcards, from sunglasses to souvenirs.

### FIRST AID

First Aid is available in the building to the right of the gondola terminal, facing downhill.

### I CAN'T WAIT TO GO!

Ski Apache is open seven days a week from Thanksgiving through Easter. For up-to-the-minute snow and road conditions, call 505-257-9001 for a recorded message, 24 hours a day.

Lift prices remain the same as last year's.

A racer flies out of the gates, skis carving every turn, striving for the finish line. The time flashes on the electronic scoreboard.

"A gold medal!" shouts the racer.

Olympics? The World Cup?

No, it's NASTAR day at Ski Apache, and for a moment, an ordinary skier is a hero.

Each Wednesday and Sunday when the entire mountain is open, skiers of all ages and abilities test their speed and skills on the National Standard Race (NASTAR) course run on Smokey Bear, an intermediate run.

NASTAR, offered at many major ski areas in the US and abroad, challenge each skier to better his or her time. Skiers race against the clock, not each

other, and times are compared to that of a local pacesetter. His or her time is compared to that of a member of the US Ski Team. A skier's time is then adjusted for age and sex, and if it comes within a certain percentage of the pacesetter's time, the skier wins a bronze, silver or gold medal.

On days when NASTAR is not open, hone your skills on the coin-operated dual slalom course. One skier can race the clock or two skiers race each other at the same time. The "coin-op" does not give medals. This course is also run on Smokey Bear when the entire mountain is open.

Sign up for NASTAR or obtain coin-op tokens at the Ski School Desk.

Two improvements, replies general manager Roy Parker.

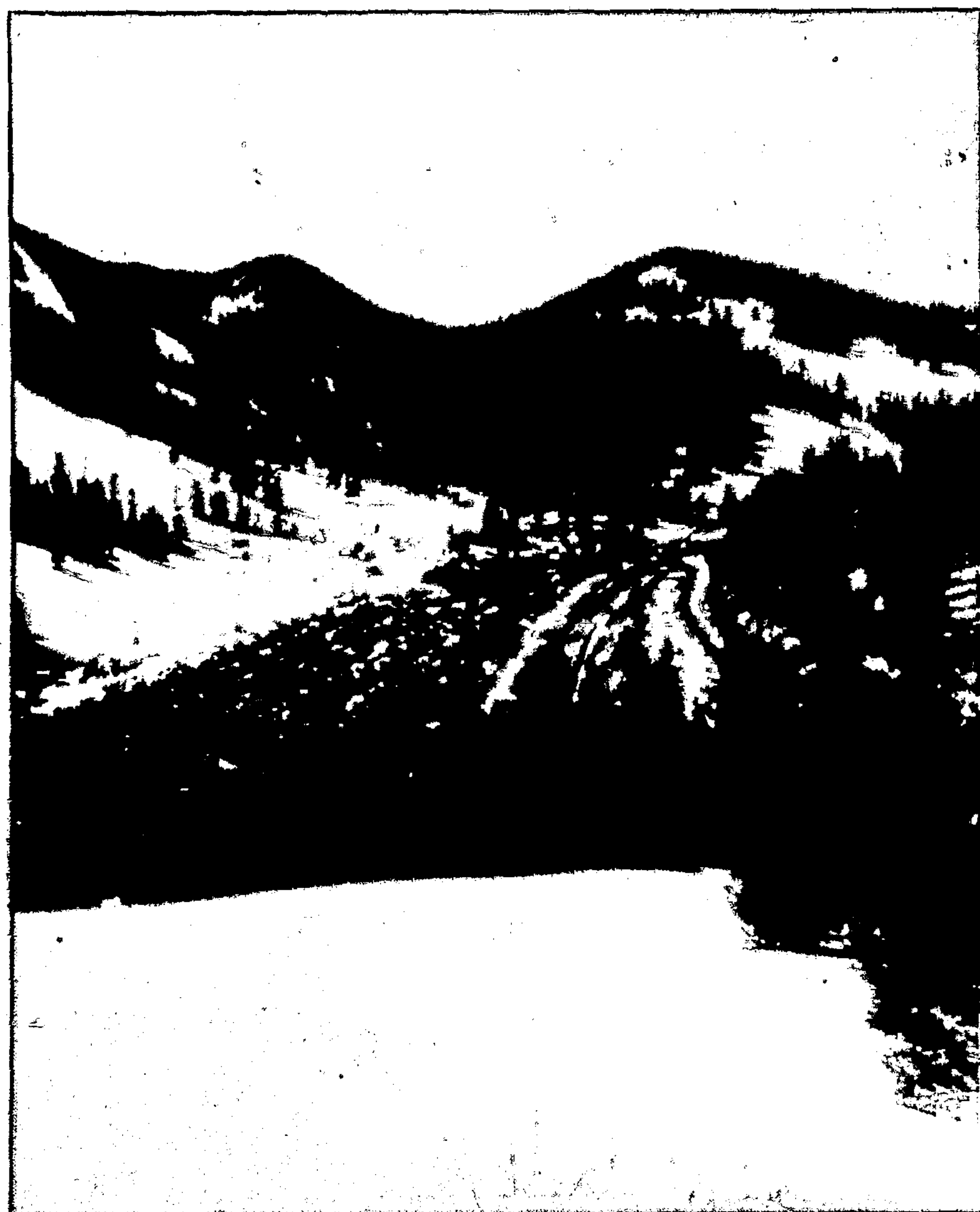
First, remember the tempting aroma of grilled beef as you rode up Chair #1? It's back — only better.

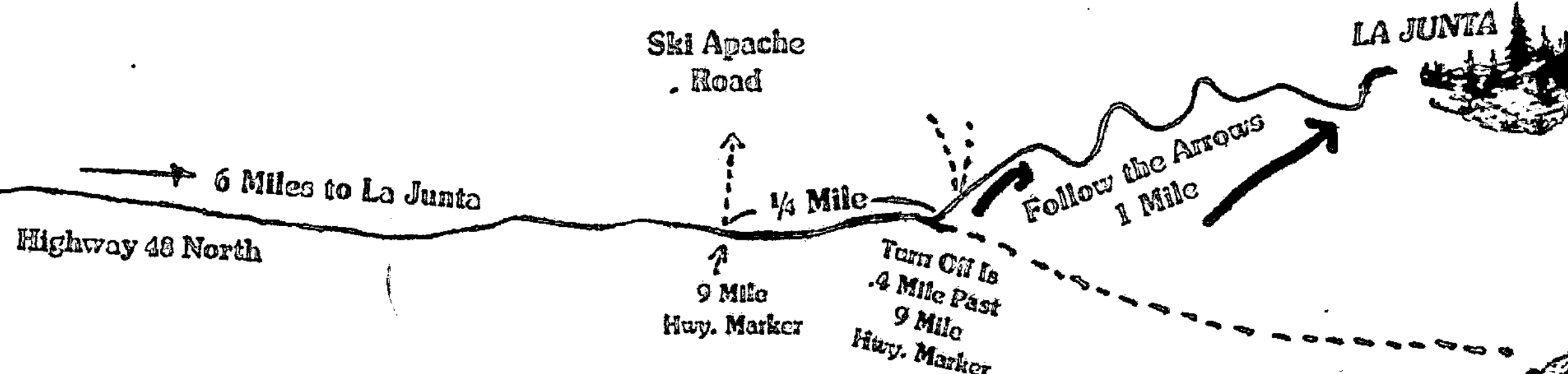

Learn techniques for better skiing from the staff of Ski Apache's Ski School. A staff of 100 instructors offers classes to children and adult at all levels, from beginners to racing, seven days a week.

First-time beginners, don't miss this package: two days' lessons and lifts for much less than if purchased separately. Even a one-day lesson for first-timers includes a lift ticket if purchased at the Ski School Desk.

Lessons aren't just for beginners, either. Intermediates and advanced skiers refine their techniques too. Call it clinic, lesson or refresher; Ski Apache Ski School calls it the Master program.

Groups of four to six work on different aspects of skiing at their own request. Depending on snow and weather conditions, one group may be in the powder, another doing bumps, another working on smooth technique.

When is a good time to take lessons? "Skiers at any level benefit from yearly instruction," says Ski School Director Rick Vincent.

## Sign up for Ski School

Want your kids to love skiing as much as you do?

Then check out the kids' programs at Ski Apache Ski School.

First, there's Ski Wee for ages 4-12, first-timer through advanced, offered seven days a week.

"We emphasize safety, learning and fun," says Carla Grover, Children's Ski School supervisor.

For ages 6-12, Ski Wee offers group lessons at the same hours as adult lessons. This means a two-hour afternoon session, a break for lunch so kids can eat with parents, then a two-hour afternoon session that ends before the lifts close so kids can show Mom and Dad what they've learned.

Buy tickets at the Ski School Desk and ask about equipment and lessons include lift tickets, just like the grownups.

For four- and five-year-olds, Ski Wee offers a special pre-school program.

"This is not baby-sitting or daycare," emphasize Grover. "This is an all-day ski lesson with both indoor and outdoor ski activities." This program, from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m., includes lift ticket, lunch and snacks, and is closely supervised.

Reservations for this popular program are recommended, especially during weekend and holidays. Call the Ski School Desk at 336-4356.

For the child who isn't familiar with a group learning experience, or for one who needs individual attention, consider private lessons, either for one hour or all day. For children aged five and un-

der only, a lift, ticket is included in the cost of a private lesson.

"We even accept two- and three-year-olds in privates," says Grover. "At that age, they benefit from individual instruction."

At the end of each class, all children take home a progress report showing Mom and Dad what they've learned. This card, shown at any U.S. ski area offering the Ski Wee program, allows the child to enter at the appropriate level and progress at his or her own rate.

Because this is ski school and not daycare, all children must be dressed for cold weather.

"This means water-resistant pants, jackets, gloves or mittens, hat, goggles or glasses and sunscreen," stresses Grover.

Second, there's a nine-week program for four- to 12-year-olds who live in the area. Kids are ability-grouped as Red Hots, Hot Tots and Hot Shots. They remain with the same instructor throughout the nine weeks, which culminates in the Hot Chocolate Cup, a fun day to show off new skills to parents.

Program begins in December, breaks for Christmas, then resumes in January, February and March, partly coinciding with the five-week school program.

If consistent, regular instruction sounds good for your young learner, sign up your potential Hot Shot, Red Hot or Hot Tot at the Ski School Desk.

## Be careful up there

To add to the enjoyment of your ski holiday, consider the following:

1. Stay in shape all year round. A combination of stretching, aerobic activity, light weights and flexibility exercises work well.

2. Make sure your equipment is checked out by a qualified technician. Ski shops in Ruidoso and Ski Apache's Rental Shop can perform this service.

3. New skiers, get a trail map and refer to it often. Be sure you know where you are, and that you're on a slope you can handle.

4. Eat properly and start slowly. Be aware of altitude changes.

5. Before skiing, take a few minutes to stretch each muscle slowly.

6. If it seems your skiing has been on the same plateau for too long, or if you're unusually tired afterward, consider taking a lesson. Advanced skiers ski with little wasted motion that tires them less.

7. Dress in layers so that you can

take layers off if the weather warms up and add them if it suddenly turns cold. And don't forget to dress your children properly, too.

8. Be aware of the Skier's Responsibility Code:

### Skier's Responsibility Code

(1) Ski under control and in such a manner you can stop or avoid other skiers or objects.

(2) When skiing downhill or overtaking another skier, you must avoid the skier below you.

(3) You must not stop where you obstruct a trail or are not visible from above.

(4) When entering a trail or starting downhill, yield to other skiers.

(5) All skiers shall wear retention straps or other devices to help prevent runaway skis.

(6) You shall keep off closed trails and posted areas and observe all posted signs.





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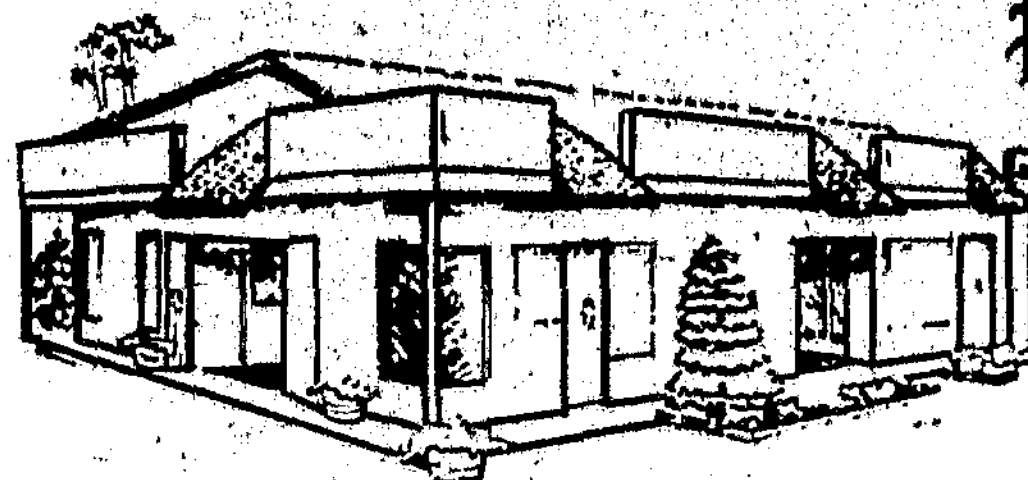

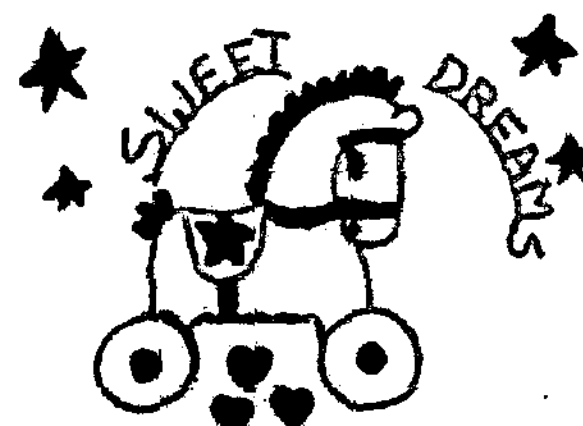

## Ski Apache — it's no secret

If a skier in the Southwestern United States reads a newspaper, listens to the radio, watches TV or attends a ski show, he or she knows about Ski Apache resort, thanks to the efforts of the marketing department.

Patricia Morrison, marketing director at Ski Apache, counts off an impressive list of media that receive regular snow reports.

More than 650 radio and TV stations in New Mexico, Texas, Arizona and southern California broadcast the offi-

cial snow report that is updated each morning and recorded on 505-257-9001.

Locally, tune to KRUI-AM, 1490.

The Ruidoso News, El Paso Times, Dallas Morning News and the Los Angeles Times carry Ski Apache snow reports as does cable TV's Weather Channel.

Ski and trade shows in large cities attract many potential customers.

Ski Apache's booth promoted the area at several shows in the Phoenix and Tucson area, Houston, Dallas, Lub-

bock, El Paso and Albuquerque. At the New Mexico Products Show in Albuquerque, the booth was a joint presentation by Ski Apache, the Village of Ruidoso, and Ruidoso Downs Race Track.

In addition to distributing brochures and answering questions, marketing personnel at these shows further enticed visitors to the Ruidoso area by offering prizes of lodging and lift tickets.

At most shows, the prize is lift tickets for two days at Ski Apache and a night's lodging at either Super 8, Condotel, La Junta Guest Ranch, Shadow Mountain Lodge, Vantage Point Condos, Storybook Cabins, West Winds Lodge and Condos, High Country Lodge and the Swiss Chalet. Many include gift certificates from Don Victor's and the Upper Canyon restaurants.

The word is out — Ski Apache and Ruidoso are the place to be this winter!

## Snowmakers enhance the real stuff

He walks among swirling spouts of snow, hands out to catch flakes, examining them. Machinery roars as he adjusts knobs and nozzles.

Satisfied, he straddles a snowmobile and drives down the ski slope to a warm building at the bottom. Inside, he strips off his dripping wet parka and tosses it into the dryer. Icicles dripping from his mustache, he grins, "Everything looks great!"

A Ski Apache snowmaker has finished another round.

Snowmaking is simple in concept, yet painstaking in execution.

"It is machine-made snow made by a natural process," explains Denny Grover, Ski Apache's mountain manager.

"Just combine compressed air and water under high pressure, shoot it into the air and it freezes into crystalline structures that fall to the ground like little flakes of snow."

It's a more consistent product than Mother Nature's.

"The corners are rounded, they fit together and it packs well," says Grover.

"It skis just like powder," says a local skier.

Ski Apache begins snowmaking as soon as temperatures are cold enough, usually around November 1. But not only must air temperature be near or below freezing, humidity also must be low, a combination snowmakers call "the wet bulb temperature."

Water doesn't always freeze at 32 degrees (Fahrenheit) measured on a dry bulb thermometer, explains Grover. "If the temperature is 32 degrees and the humidity is 80 percent, water won't freeze and we can't make snow. But if the temperature is 36 degrees and the humidity is 20 percent, then the wet bulb temperature will be around 26 to 27 degrees, water will freeze and we can make snow. The drier the air, the better."

So the snowmaker makes his rounds of the machines, constantly monitoring air temperatures and relative humidity.

He adjusts the air and water mixture accordingly.

"The colder it is, the more water we can add. The warmer it is, the more air we add." Sounds simple enough, but it's tough work.

"Also cold, wet, and dark," adds Grover. A crew of five works a 24-hour shift. One monitors the air compressors and water pumps; the other four rotate outside among the snowmaking machines, checking, adjusting, knocking off ice around nozzles and fans, protecting hoses from freezing, and monitoring the quality of the finished product.

"The only way to check that is to stand in front and get wet," laughs Grover. "That's why the men come in looking like mushrooms."

One of the snowmakers, Dave Tetrault, showed a reporter the fine flakes on his glove. "That's how they are supposed to look," he shouted above the machinery noise. "Perfect."

Another snowmaker, Carl Botella, pointed to the falling "snow" shooting out from a gun. "When it falls like that, in streamers, it's just right." No adjustment of the air/water mix was necessary at this time. But the men must check frequently because temperatures and humidity change suddenly.

Moving about via snowmobile, a snowmaker checks any of the 30 machines and guns working that shift.

Ski Apache uses two types of snowmaking devices. One is an air/water gun that is generally mounted on a pole or lift tower but can also be portable. The second is a larger machine with a ring of nozzles mounted in front of a turbine fan.

These machines and their hoses cover the lower one-third of Ski Apache, including the beginner area under Chair #5, Capitan, Lower Deep Freeze, Easy Street, Smokey Bear, Lower Snow Park and to the top of Chair #7.

The result — delightful skiing.

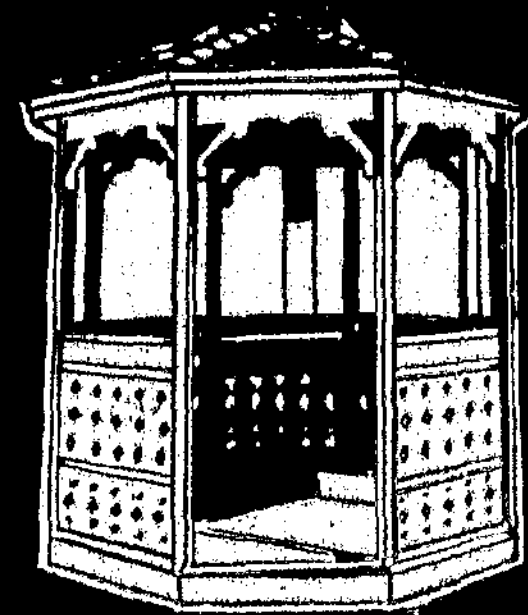

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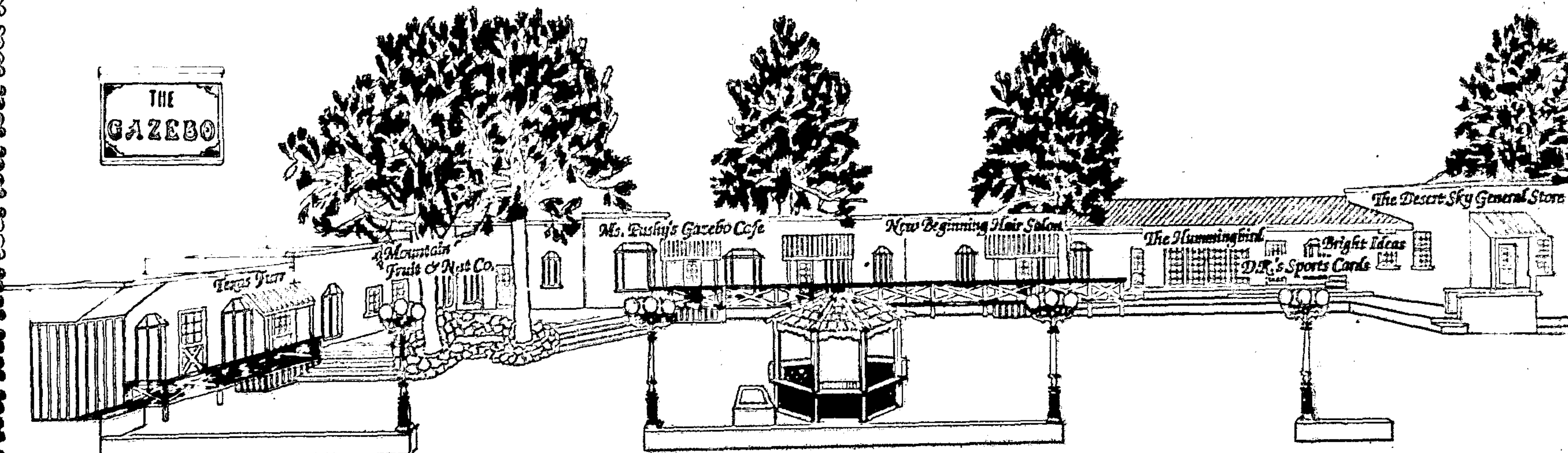

## Road crews are up early

How exciting to wake up and discover fresh snow fallen overnight, just in time for your ski holiday. What will road conditions be like? What should you do?

Ski Run Road, officially New Mexico 532, and New Mexico 48 from Ruidoso to Capitan are the responsibility of the Capitan District of the State Highway Department, who offers these tips:

At 4 a.m. the morning after a snowfall, crews begin working on the roads with a blade and Sno-go snowblower.

After cleaning the road, they salt it. During the day, a crew with salt truck and blade stay at the top of NM 532 in case they're needed to clear daytime snowfalls. Therefore, drivers should always expect to meet slow-moving equipment and should drive carefully.

To chain or not to chain. The highway department makes that decision and signs go up at the intersection of 48 and 532 and below Eagle Creek turnoff. This information is part of the recorded snow report, available 24 hours a day by calling 505-257-9001.

Even if chains are not required on a particular day, the wise skier always carries chains in his or her vehicle. Mountain weather can bring unexpected snowfall, and a moment of forethought may pay off.

Reminder; Ski Run Road, NM 532, closes to uphill traffic from 3 p.m. to 6 p.m. daily.

"We're here to serve," say highway crews proudly. And we skiers can do our part by being prepared and driving carefully.



## Clearing the way

## Slow down on Slick Roads

There is a Number one and cardinal rule which helps prevent accidents when driving in snow or on ice, Ruidoso Police Chief William J. Newman says.

That rule is: Slow down!

Most accidents reported to the Ruidoso police involve driving too fast for road conditions, Chief Newman explains.

Driving with rear two-wheel drive, front wheel drive and all wheel or four wheel drive each have special considerations.

Regardless of what type vehicle you drive, Newman says rule No. 2 should be, "Don't make any sudden moves with brakes ... steering or accelerator."

Another rule is to have all equipment, from windshield wipers to tires in good shape. Smooth tires and ice and snow certainly don't mix.

Any time of the year, Newman asks motorists to be careful around school zones and to observe rules of the road when near school buses.

Winter driving in the Ruidoso area can be both a fun and learning experience.

It's important for winter drivers to have a warm set of gloves and clothing in case they have to change a tire or put chains on during snowy weather.

Other items people should have for winter operation include scrapers, flashers, jumper cables and brushes. It's against the law to drive with vision obscured. Thus, a scraper is important. A credit card in an emergency makes a good scraper.

A person should warm up their car for several moments in the morning. This will help prevent stalling in cold weather.

One expert says that in case of a skid, while driving a rear wheel drive vehicle, steer into the skid and let up on the gas. For a front wheel drive vehicle, steer away from the skid and gently accelerate.

Being cautious after a bad storm is important. When the snow is scraped or melted, "black ice" can form which looks like the pavement.

On Ski Run Road, the cardinal rule is take it easy on speed, remember that the road is steep in places and exert extraordinary caution.

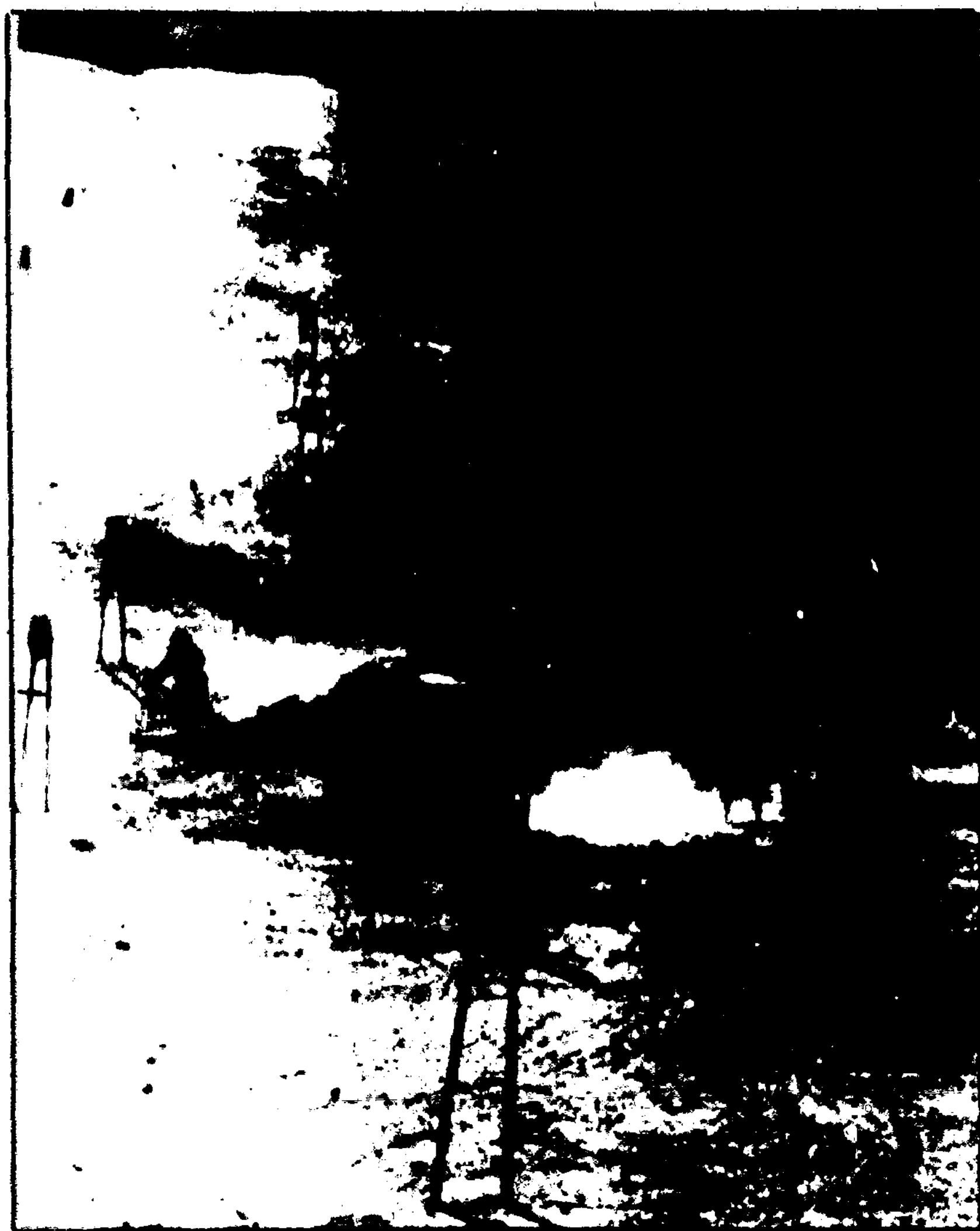
Four wheel drive vehicles can slide on a slippery road just like any other vehicle. Although your car will accelerate and drive through conditions that might stop a two-wheel drive car, it will not stop any quicker. Avoid locking the wheels.

When driving in deep snow, shift to a low gear and maintain steady pressure on the accelerator. This will help you avoid spinning the wheels and will help to keep your car moving.

Yes, winter driving in the mountains can be both fun and a learning experience.

Using good judgment and driving at speeds suited to road conditions will keep you out of trouble, hopefully.

## Take a trip around Lincoln County

Take a trip through Lincoln County and you'll be taking a journey through history. It's a trip worth taking.

Taking a circuitous route through the county, head north out of Ruidoso on State Highway 48. The first major attractions will be located off Ski Run Road where it enters the highway in Alto.

Turn off to the right after about a mile on the ski road and head up to Monjeau Lookout. Until the present rock structure was built by the CCC in the thirties, a wooden tower looked over the area.

During the fire season, the structure is still used by the Forest Service as the 10,356 foot elevation provides a spectacular panorama. Visitors are welcome to climb up and enjoy the vista. From the Monjeau Trail, you have access to miles and miles of backwoods trails in the White Mountain Wilderness.

The United States Forest Service can give you more information about campsites and trail conditions. The Smokey Bear District Ranger Station is on Mechem Drive across the street from Innsbrook condominiums.

There are also campsites further up the road toward the ski area.

Going back to Highway 48, head north again where you come down off

the mountain where the Rio Bonito crosses underneath. Cross the bridge and you can turn left onto State Highway 37 which takes you through Bonito and Nogal to Carrizozo, the county seat.

Along the way about three miles off the highway is the man-made Bonito Lake. Underneath the waters lies Bonito City, but still accessible are the remains of the old Parson's Mine. The South Fork Campground is about four miles past the lake.

Driving back north on Highway 37 through pine forests and rolling hills, you come to an incredible vista above the town of Nogal and below Nogal Peak. From the road above the old mining town you can see miles across the desert to the Malpais Lava Flow beyond Carrizozo 12 miles away and the mountain ranges far behind.

Passing through Nogal, you intersect with U.S. Highway 380. A left turn and eight miles takes you to "Zozo". The town sprung up on Carrizozo Flats after the El Paso and Northeastern Railroad Company established a supply center and workshops along the route to Tucumcari.

Bring your golf clubs when you come because there's year-round play on the nine-hole course just east of town. Cart rentals are available for those with

tired, overskied legs.

Several miles west of town you come to the entrance of Valley of Fires State Park. The jagged black lava-rock abruptly rises from the desert floor, clearly displaying the edge of the ancient flow of molten rock. The source of the flow lay only a few miles to the north from the park, but streamed down nearly to the White Sands.

At the park, camp just inside the boundaries of the flow where you can look out over a wide expanse of the area. In some places, the flow of magma reached depths of 70 feet.

Electrical hookups are available in the campground. Overnight fees begin at \$5 per night and day use fees start at \$3. Group rates are also available for the larger shelters at the park, and senior citizens receive discounts on some of the fees.

Go back to Carrizozo and turn north on U.S. Highway 54. Three miles north of Carrizozo, you come to County Road 349, which takes you to the ghost town of White Oaks.

Once a thriving community of 2,500 miners and their followers, only a few buildings, the schoolhouse, and a handful of quiet-loving residents remain. Call ahead and you might get to visit the museum in the schoolhouse. On weekends, call 648-2228, 648-2521 or 648-2237 for information.

Northwest of White Oaks lies the community of Ancho. Once a supply center of bricks made from local clays, almost all that remains is the old railroad depot and a few residents.

"My House of Old Things" is a museum in the depot, but is generally closed during the winter months.

Returning to Carrizozo and Highway 380, drive east to Capitan, the home of that famous fire-fighter, Smokey Bear.

Smokey was recovered from a forest fire in the Lincoln National Forest near Capitan and became the national figure for fire prevention campaigns ever since. After an illustrious career with the Forest Service, Smokey now lies beneath a large memorial stone in a garden at the Smokey Bear State Park and Museum.

Heading east on Highway 380, you come to the Fort Stanton turnoff that also comes up behind the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport. Established in 1855, the fort was created to help defend local settlers against retaliations made by Mescalero Apaches.

After the Civil War, the fort was home to the "Buffalo Soldiers" of the 9th Cavalry who took the trail after famous Apache leaders Victorio and Geronimo.

Today, the fort and surrounding reservation is home to several Bureau of Land Management projects with hiking trails and campsites.

Back out to Highway 380 and keep

heading east. Before long, you'll step back into the days of the cattle barons and the Lincoln County Wars. Lincoln, New Mexico was once the county seat of the largest county in the United States. Here Billy the Kid and his band of Regulators shot their way in and out of the area until the Kid was captured.

Billy made his famous escape from a corner room of the courthouse, and you can stand and look out the same window that Billy must have to plot his escape. Sheriff Pat Garrett eventually tracked Billy to Fort Sumner, New Mexico, where the Kid was shot down.

South from Lincoln on Highway 380, you drive through the scenic Hondo Valley, home of beautiful orchards and several tiny, pretty churches. Turning west on U.S. Highway 70, you drive through the community of San Patricio, home of Henriette Wyeth and the late Peter Hurd.

Stop and visit the Hurd La Rinconada Gallery and see a collection of some of their fine works.

And right next door is John Meigs' gallery. If it's open, it's worth a few hours of browsing. Meigs, an artist himself, has gathered one of the most eclectic collections of art and stuff you'll ever find anywhere.

Call ahead.

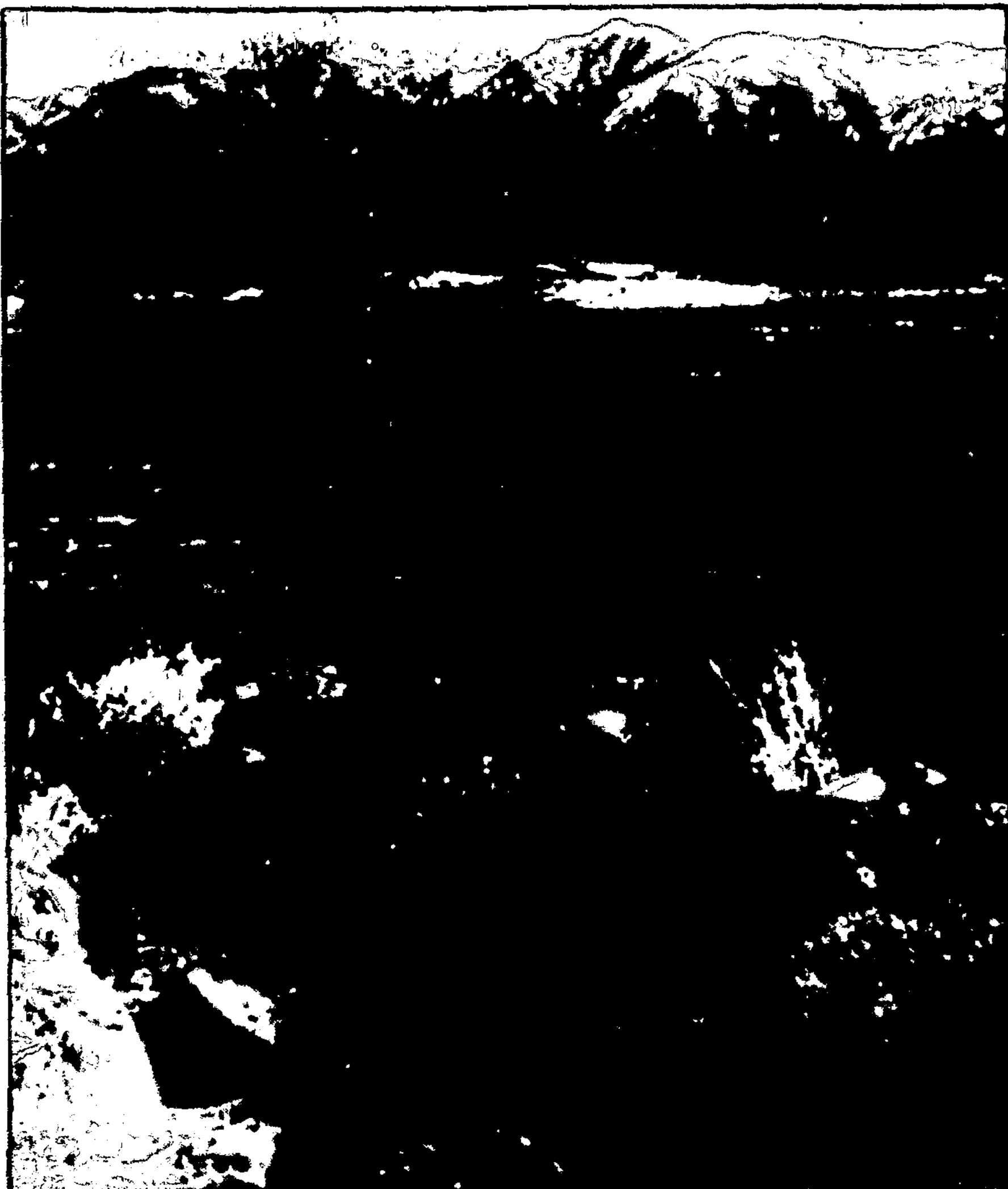
Continuing west you pass through Glencoe and drive right by the spot where Englishman John Tunstall was murdered. His death is largely accepted as being the spark that set off the Lincoln County Wars.

In Ruidoso Downs, you have arrived not only at the Ruidoso Downs Racetrack, but the home of the fabulous Hubbard Art Museum. The Hubbard is home to some of the greatest American works by artists such as Charles M. Russell, Frederic S. Remington and William R. Leigh. Unfortunately, the museum is closed during the winter months while many of the pieces are on tour.

Soon Ann Stradling's Museum of the Horse will be open in Ruidoso Downs. Watch for more on that.

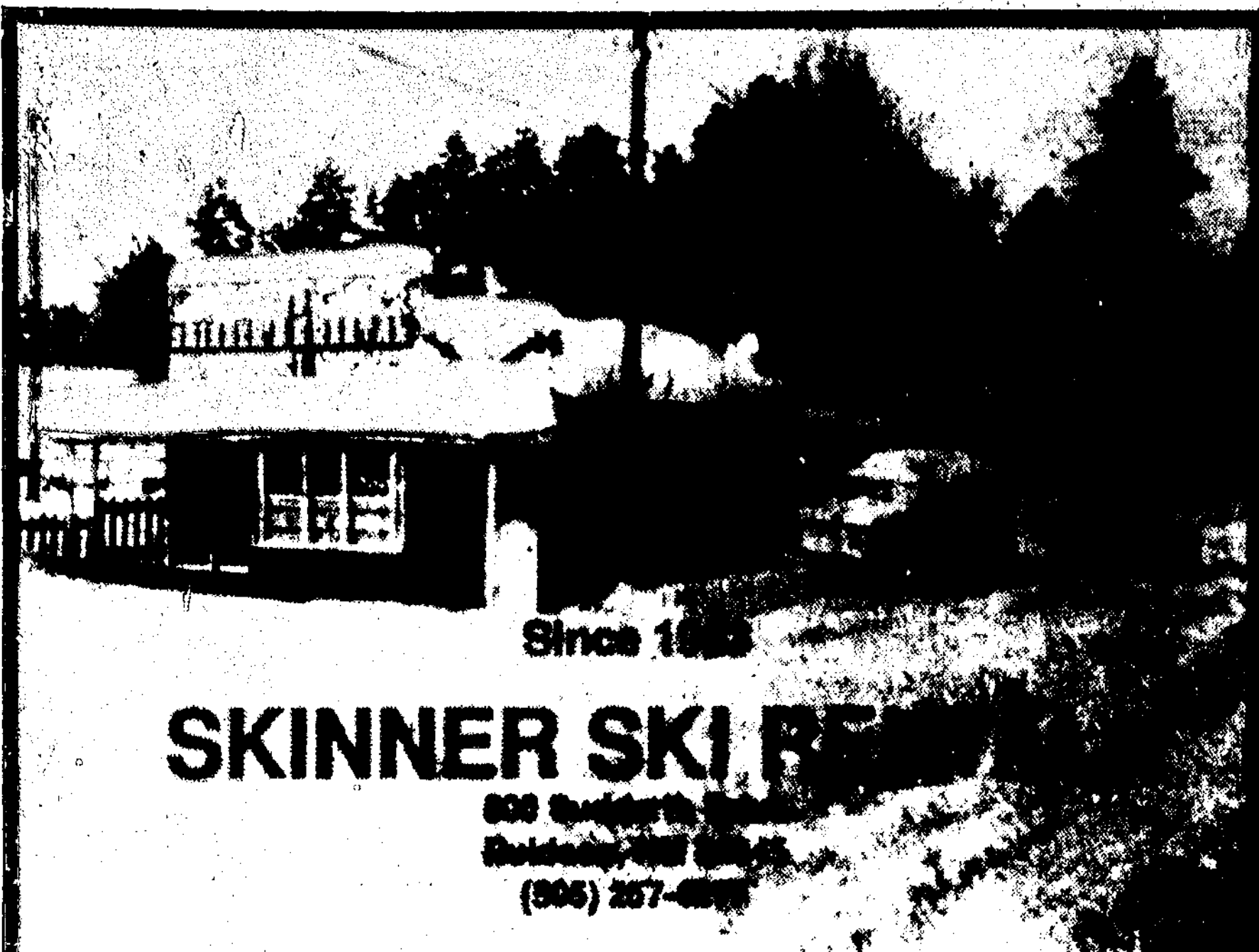
And don't forget to visit the homelands of the Mescalero Apache Indians south of Ruidoso on Highway 70. Here you'll find the famed resort Inn of the Mountain Gods where you can dine, relax, hunt, gamble and enjoy any number of other activities.

## Get in shape and then hit the slopes

To huff and puff is a way of life around Ski Apache's 11,000 feet altitude. Good reason to prepare for the slopes with an exercise regimen that could prevent injury.

Jeanie Whitwam, a registered nurse and co-owner/manager of the Ruidoso Athletic Club (RAC), says the two factors to consider when getting into condition for skiing are aerobic and leg mus-

cle conditioning.

Stretching may be the single most important factor in injury prevention for skiing, Whitwam believes.

She suggests a few simple exercises:

—With a partner, grasp each other's left hands and drop quickly into a deep knee-bend. Then pull each other erect. Repeat four times, then try it with the other hand.

—Sit opposite each other, supporting yourself with your hands, the soles of the feet pressed together and "bicycle." Push against each other's feet as you do it.

—Leap-frog sideways, over your kneeling partner! Rest your hands on his shoulder blades and stand beside him. Quickly, up with both legs, kicking your heels high up behind you, and land

on the other side of him. After two brief in-between hops, spring back the other way again.

Many exercises can be done alone or with a partner, but as ski season approaches, it's time to get started.

For the individual who needs a little help from a friendly machine, the RAC has a full line of Nautilus equipment.

## Sleepy Lincoln is wide awake this year

Sleepy Lincoln, located in the mountains of Southeastern New Mexico, has a niche in the history of the Old West totally out of proportion to its present size (population: 70).

It was once the county seat of the largest county in the United States (30,000+ square miles), as well as the focal point of the notorious Lincoln County War (1878—1879).

Currently, it is one of the last remaining historic, but uncommercialized, Western towns.

Billy the Kid blazed his way into the history books here. He helped ambush the sheriff, escaped from the surrounded and burning McSween House, and cheated the hangman by shooting his way out of the Old Courthouse. But Lincoln's history consists of more than just outlaw violence.

Nearby Fort Stanton, Mescalero

Apaches, gold strikes, sailors and tuberculosis all played an important role.

Notable historic figures include: Kit Carson, John Chisum, Susan McSween Barber, Pat Garrett, Lew Wallace, George Curry, Albert Fountain and John "Blackjack" Pershing.

Many Lincoln aficionados prefer to visit during the off-season. It is a pleasant, uncrowded time. For those of the inquiring mind, questions asked during this season tend to receive more detailed answers from the town's interpretive staffs. Curiously, Lincoln weather is generally milder than in the surrounding mountain areas, with warm days and chilly nights.

Lincoln is a town to be savored; anticipate spending at least half a day there.

The town's two principal museums are open daily from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.

through the end of this calendar year. The Historical Center and the Old Courthouse Museum both present slide shows on the Lincoln County War and contain artifacts and displays from the days of the Old Wild West.

Though some of Lincoln's summer attractions are not regularly open during the off-season, special arrangements may be made for groups; call 653-4372 for the Tunstall Store and 653-4025 for the Dr. Woods' House. (Both Museums will be closed Thanksgiving Day and Christmas Day).

For those who would enjoy a well-guided private tour of Old Lincoln, Pasttime Tours offers customized services. Leave a message at 653-4025 or write: Pasttime Tours, P.O. Box 12, Lincoln, New Mexico, 88338. Rugged individualists may prefer the self-guiding walking tour of the town available for half a dollar at the Historical Center Museum Store or from other local merchants.

To help celebrate the holidays this year the Historical Center Museum Store will be celebrating an old-fashioned Victorian Christmas bazaar for the four weekends following Thanksgiving.

Come in and browse amidst the advent calendars, curios from the past and a Christmas tree decorated with paper. Enjoy some apple cider around the woodstove and reflect that none of the unique gifts displayed require batteries!

Special extended store hours will be in effect from 10 a.m. to 7 p.m. Friday through Sunday. Enjoy Lincoln after dark; look for the luminarias on the courtyard walls.

But the Museum Store is not alone in its Christmas offerings. Lincolnworks and the Old Lincoln Trading Company will have local crafts available for holiday shoppers. Lincolnworks is fast establishing a formidable reputation as a source of quilts, quilting supplies, collectibles, and for the holiday season, handcrafted Christmas gifts.

The Old Lincoln Trading Company has a real pot-bellied stove, opens early for morning coffee and also displays varied locally handcrafted Christmas gifts.

During the weekend of December 15

and 16, enjoy touring an authentic old adobe as Casa de Patron, Lincoln's first bed and breakfast establishment, hosts an open house from 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. Refreshments will be served.

Besides enjoying the ambience, visitors may browse amidst handmade soaps, homemade English toffee, gingerbread and — chocaholics beware! — fondants.

And worth a drive on Christmas Eve is the stunning townwide luminaria lining Lincoln's sole street!

Beginning in February, and running for four months, Lincoln will host a "Meet the Local Artists" series. Resident Gary Morton will lead off with a display of some of his contemporary cowboy art at the Dr. Woods' Annex in Lincoln from 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. on February 2. Each artist will appear on the first Saturday of the succeeding months.

Other participating artists include watercolorists Walter Henn and Russell Waterhouse. Corresponding exhibits during February, March and April will feature quilts (at the Old Community Church), washboards (at the Casa de Patron), and a collection yet to be announced.

Lincoln's biggest drawback during the off-season is that limited eating facilities become even more limited! The town's hotel and restaurant are closed during this time of year. However, microwavables and snack foods can be purchased at the Old Lincoln Trading Company (closed Sunday's).

And with a little advance planning, a quiet picnic can be enjoyed in the town's small but delightful park. Sit-down meals can be had after a short drive to nearby Capitan (13 miles), where four restaurants offer a range of alternatives.

Surprisingly, lodging is less of a problem. Three bed and breakfast establishments remain to cater to the tired traveller. One may choose from the Casa de Patron (653-4676), Old Ellis Store (653-4609), and Old Lincolntown Bed, Breakfast and Gallery (653-4185).

Come visit Lincoln during the off-season. You will be pleasantly surprised!



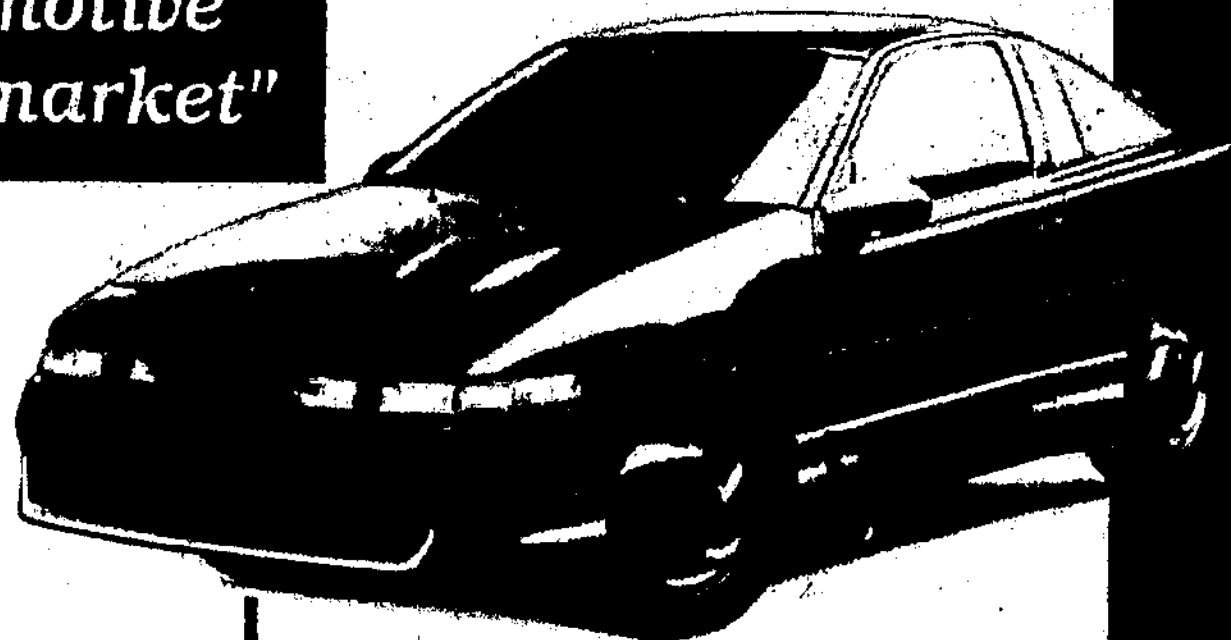
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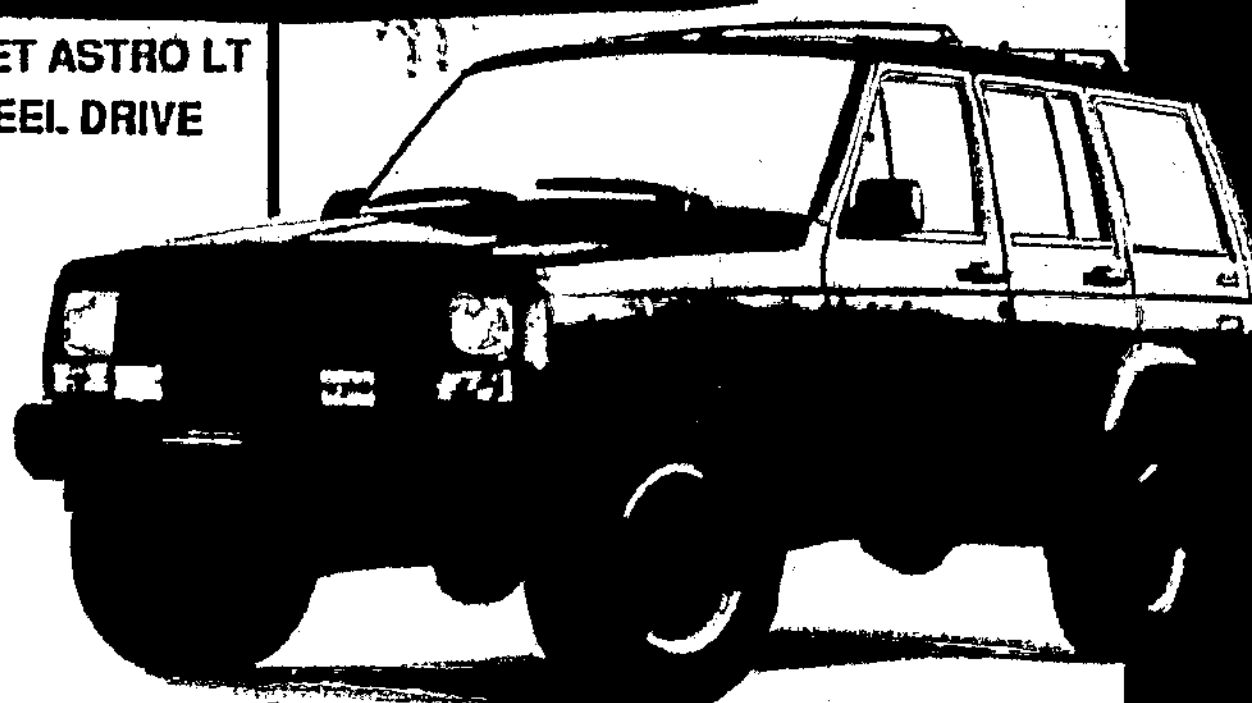
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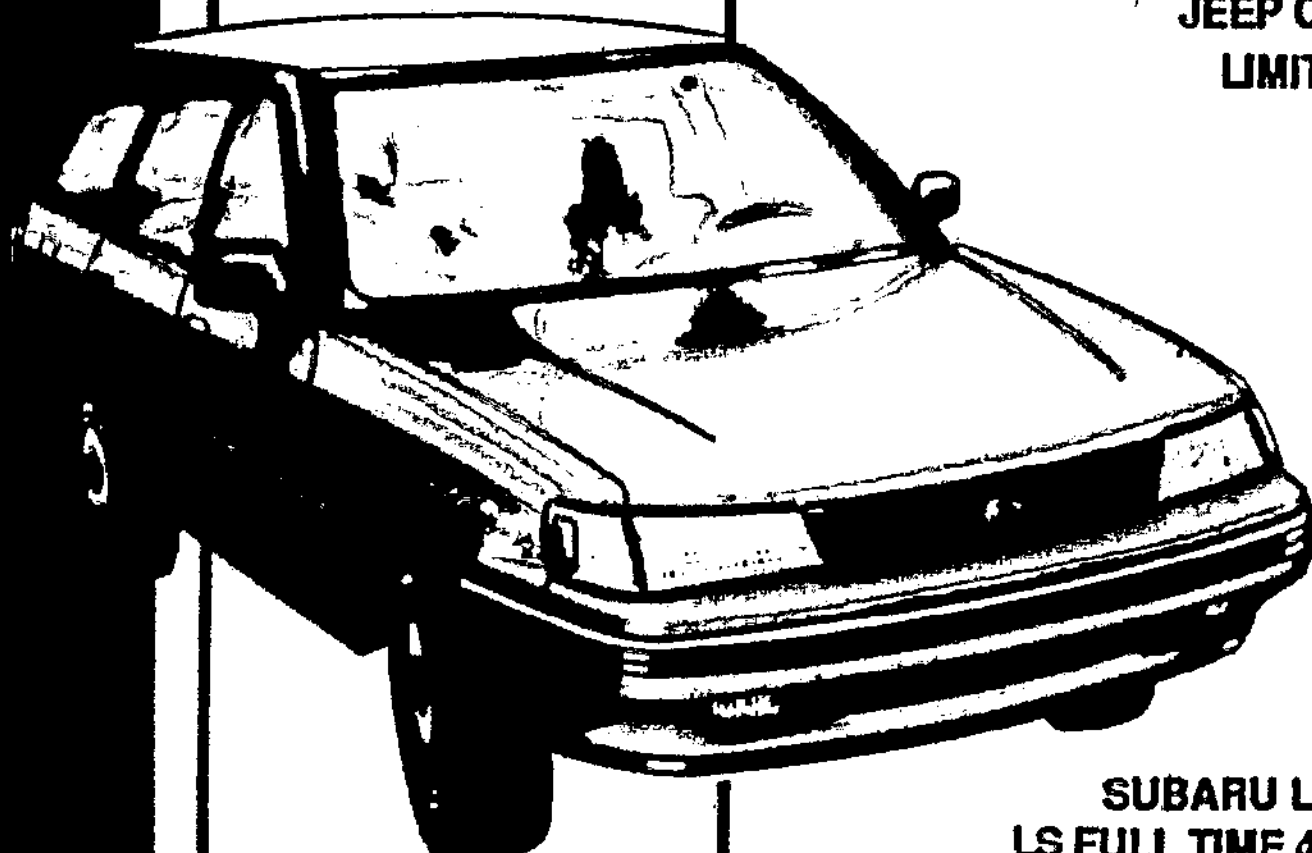

Hours are 11 a.m. to 10 p.m. daily with happy hour from 2-6. Casa Blanca Restaurant, upstairs, features Mexican food, burgers and chicken fried steak.

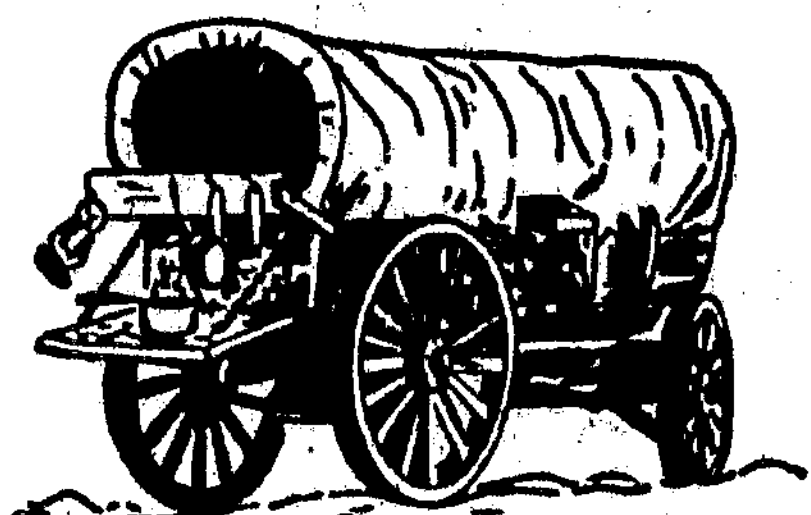
The Texas Club, at 212 Metz, is a restaurant and lounge that is open to the public. Call 258-3098 for hours.

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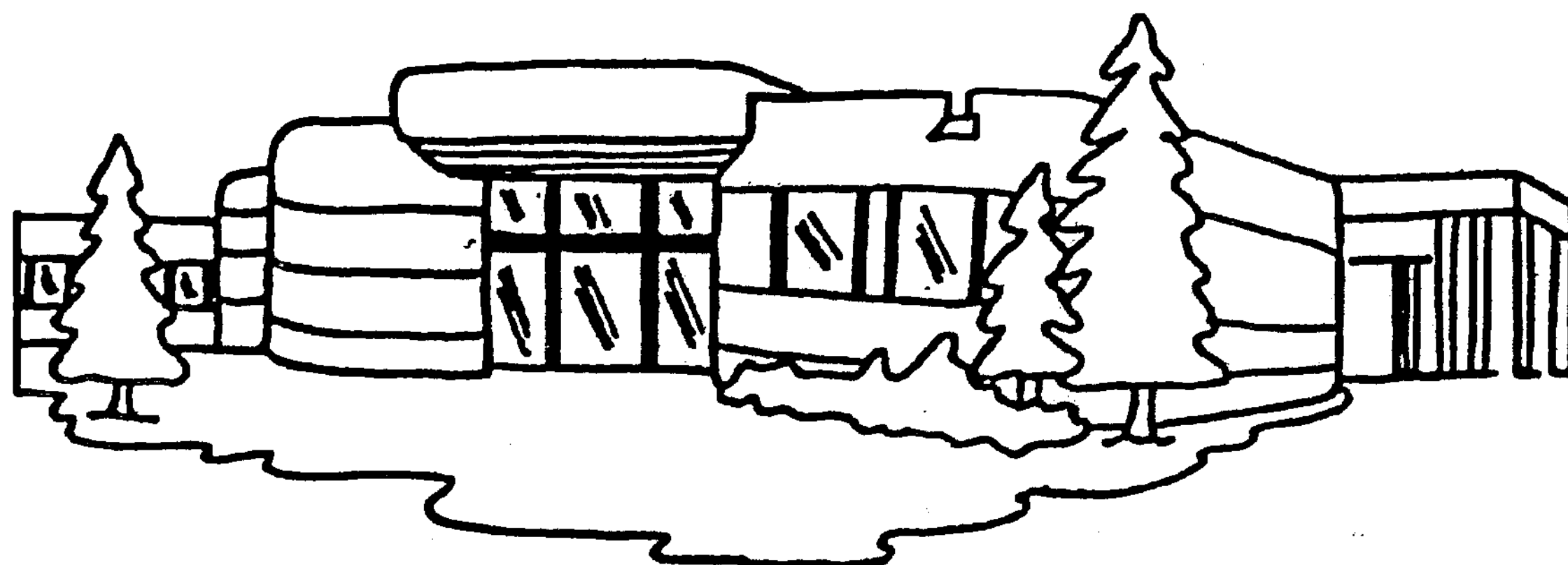
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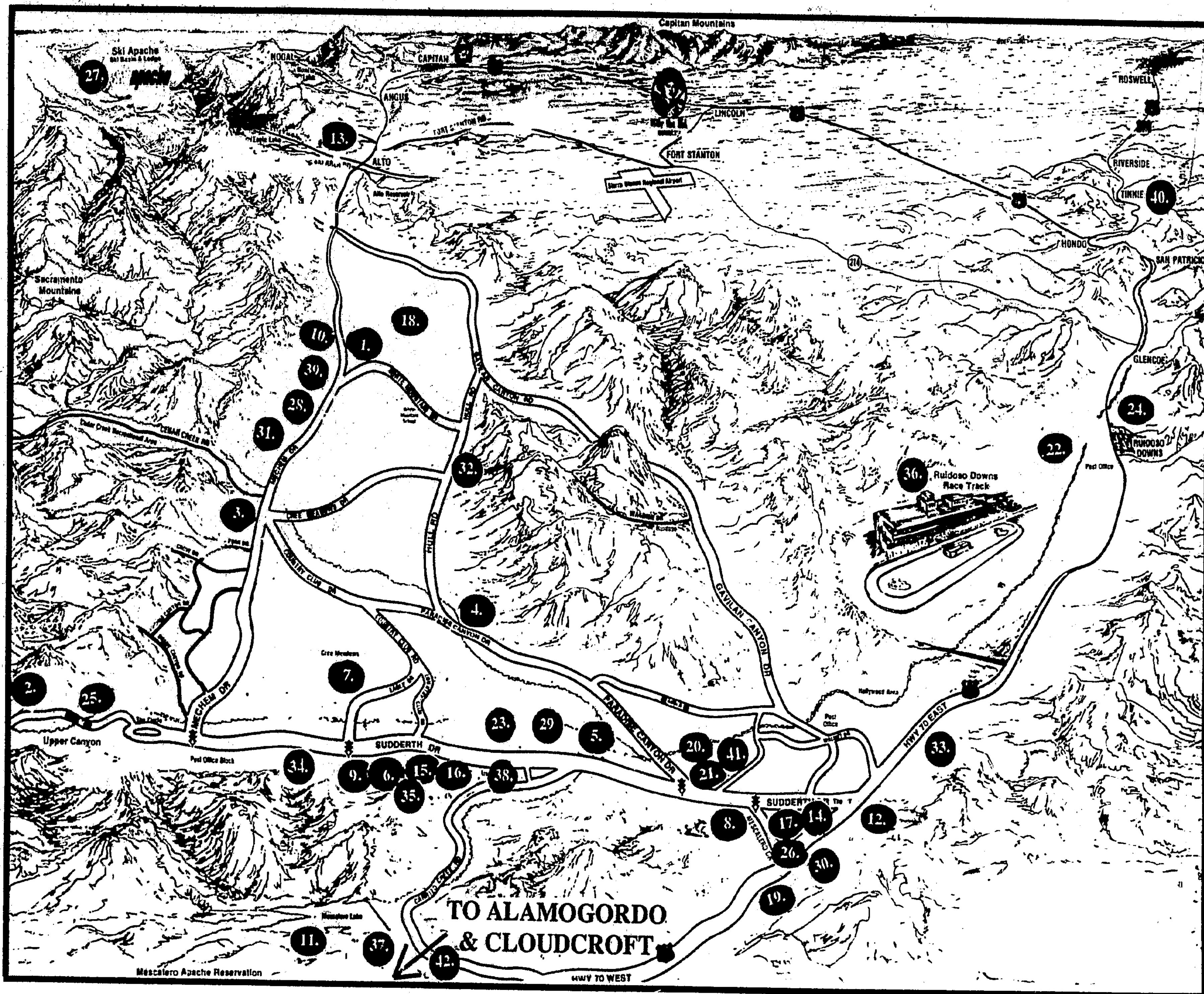
