## Voters approve mill levy by 3 to 1

Only about 15 percent of the eligible voters in the Ruidoso Municipal School District turned out to approve the renewal of a two mill levy Tuesday.

The final vote was 430 votes for approving the renewal of the levy and 127 votes against the mill levy,

according to documents recording the vote provided by the county clerk's office.

Only three votes were cast by absentee ballot, all against the levy.

Similar elections votes in other communities drew greater voter turnouts.

In Alamogordo 37 percent of the

registered voters participated in that city's mill levy election, and 15 percent voted in Roswell. Those municipalities, too, renewed the mill levy.

Ruidoso Superintendent Sid Miller said the percentage in favor of the mill levy in Ruidoso was almost exactly the same as the percentage

in favor of the bond issue passed in October. In spite of fewer voters, the same voter philosophy turned out for the mill levy renewal, said Miller.

The board of education was to meet Wednesday to accept the results, but the meeting was canceled because a quorum was not

present.

Member Lynn Wolard was the only board member present. Another meeting to accept the results will be announced within the next week.

The next meeting is scheduled for 7 p.m. Tuesday, February 13.

## Cable rates are going up

The mayor and village council of Ruidoso have been notified that the basic Lincoln Cablevision rate for cable service will rise 5.3 percent effective March 1, 1990.

The rate will be \$19.95 per tax compared to the present \$18.75 per tax. The tax is the village of Ruidoso's 0.5 percent.

Paul Crowl, general manager of Lincoln Cablevision, also reported to the council that a major rate-increasing project was started in 1987.

In January, when the village council raised the rate of the tax, it was noted by the mayor and council that the rate was too high.

The village council is currently reviewing the rate increase and will report back to the council in the next few weeks.



of Trans Star Aviation, used allegedly as a front for the smuggling operation.

The weapons included AR-15 automatic rifles, a type of Japanese

sub-machine gun, and various other rifles, shotguns, automatic and semi-automatic weapons, said Tihuni.

Also confiscated were various records, vehicles, and aircraft. No real property seizures have been

made yet.

Tony Dudley was found dead north of Capitan in December 1988 under circumstances that were never clearly explained. His brother, Don Dudley, offered a large reward for information on

Tony Dudley's mysterious death.

Canadian attorney Douglas Cassilio of Vancouver, British Columbia, was arrested for allegedly laundering money from the drug trafficking.

# "Ice" could replace crack

New Mexico is the number one producer of illegal methamphetamine drugs in the country and labs here have the capability to produce a new designer drug, Ice, which has invaded Hawaii.

The Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) seized 33 labs in 1989 while other law enforcement agencies seized 90 throughout the state, all of which had the capability to produce the new drug Ice.

"Including the one in Lincoln County," said DEA official Tom Smith, referring to a methamphetamine lab seized by local and federal agents September 1, 1989, in the Loma Grande area.

Ice is a crystallized form of methamphetamine and looks like clear rock candy. It is smoked and its effects are experienced within seven seconds, similar to crack cocaine.

But, unlike crack cocaine, which has a short duration of effect, the euphoria created by Ice lasts between 16 and 24 hours.

Smith reported that no labs have been discovered that have actively been producing Ice within the U.S. The source of the drug that has invaded Hawaii is the Far East.

The production time is longer and the techniques more sophisticated to make Ice which creates a higher risk of being discovered, said Smith. Because there is no large demand for the drug at this time, producers are unwilling to take that risk.

Reports of the drug's existence in some areas of Colorado and California are suspect.

"You can walk around Albuquerque and someone will tell you they have Ice," said Smith. "I can assure

you it is not Ice. If you're in the market for drugs people will tell you they have what you want."

Smith said the DEA would like to investigate and test any alleged reports of Ice to verify the drug's existence. But, so far, all reports of the drug's appearance have not been confirmed.

Use of the drug appears to be limited to Hawaii and officials here are crying out a warning in hopes exposure of the drug will prevent it from sweeping the county the way crack cocaine did.

Demand for Ice in the mainland U.S. would probably first appear in Los Angeles, California, and if the demand was strong enough, New Mexico has the potential to become the number one producer.

Already, New Mexico produces more dosage units of methamphetamine than any other state, said Smith. There may be more labs in California, but the labs in New Mexico produce greater quantities, he said.

Previous reports in the media placed New Mexico number five in the country, but this was determined by the numbers of labs seized, not by their production capabilities.

The caliber of the individuals arrested in New Mexico indicates the production of Ice could easily be handled should a demand for the drug develop, said Smith.

Reactions to Ice are the same as other stimulant drugs, but the effects are of greater duration.

Users of the drug may become violent, exhibit psychotic behaviors, express feelings of paranoia, and show a severe loss of appetite. Physiological effects include cardiac arrhythmia and cardiac arrest.

# Council to consider junk dealer regs

Ordinance 90-1, which will require pawnbrokers, secondhand dealers and junk shops to keep permanent records on all secondhand goods, wares or merchandise, will be the subject of a public hearing at the February 14, regular village council meeting.

According to village clerk Tamme Maddox, the ordinance, which was requested by the Ruidoso Police Department, will bring the village's code into line with current state statutes.

"What it basically does is require them (second hand dealers and junk shops) to keep records on all secondhand stuff," Maddox said in referring to the ordinance. Pawnbrokers are already required to keep records by state law.

Chief William Newman of the Ruidoso Police Department said the ordinance will give the police department a mechanism to check on possible stolen items.

The purpose of the ordinance is to assist in recovering stolen property, to provide a mechanism for the courts to reimburse the dealer when they inadvertently purchase stolen property and to provide identification of the thief, Newman said.

He said the police department is seeing a number of stolen items turning up in places other than pawn shops. He went on to say, there have not been many items turning up, but there may be more than they are aware of because they have no mechanism to check for it.

"We are aware of enough to cause concern," Newman said.

Ordinance 90-1, which is similar to an ordinance already in place in Alamogordo, will require every secondhand dealer, junk shop and pawnbroker to keep a permanent record with the following information: the date and hour of the purchase of all secondhand goods, wares or merchandise; the name, age, address and physical description of the vendor; the amount of money paid in any such transaction, and a complete and accurate description of the goods, wares or merchandise purchased.

The ordinance defines a pawnbroker as a person engaged in the business of lending money on the deposit or pledge of personal property or who purchases personal property with an expressed or implied agreement or understanding to sell it back at a stipulated price. The definition says if a pawnbroker also purchases used merchandise

for resale, he must do so in accordance with the provisions of ordinance.

State statutes currently governing pawnbrokers require them to complete a report of all used property of every kind which is received or purchased in a pawn transaction during the preceding business day. It also requires either a drivers license or other photo identification card of each person entering into a pawn transaction.

Ordinance 90-1 defines junk shops as all persons engaged in the business of purchasing or selling secondhand or cast-off material of any kind, which is commonly known as and referred to as "junk" such as old iron, copper, brass, lead, zinc, tin, steel and other metals, metallic cables, wires, ropes, cordage, bottles, bagging, rags, rubber, paper and other like materials.

It defines a secondhand dealer as a person engaged in the business of purchase, sale, barter, trade, consignment or exchange of secondhand goods, wares or merchandise.

State statutes require every junk dealer to keep in a book, written in ink, the time of their purchase a full and accurate description of each and every article purchased, together with the full name, residence and general description of the person or persons selling the item(s). Statutes also say the owner of a shop receiving used merchandise shall keep a record in which they note the time of each transaction, a description of the goods purchased, the name and address of the person selling the goods and date and hour the goods were received.

Ordinance 90-1 also covers the handling of all gold, silver and platinum by dealers.

In addition to the same items required for used merchandise, the owner of a shop receiving gold silver and platinum must also issue a serialized receipt for each purchase or statement of appraisal containing the following information: the net weight in terms of pounds troy or avoirdupois, ounces troy or avoirdupois, penny weight troy or avoirdupois or kilograms or grams; the fineness of the precious metal in terms of karat for gold and sterling or coin for silver.

The merchant must retain copies of each receipt or statement of appraisal for not less than one year and they must retain all gold, silver and platinum in the form in which it was purchased, in their possession, for a period of not less than five days.

All these requirements for gold, silver and platinum are currently required by state law.

The ordinance also would require that the records kept by pawnbrokers, secondhand dealers and junk shop, as well as the merchandise or articles purchased, be open and available to inspections by the police or the code enforcement officer.

Chief Newman said the dealers would not have to submit any reports to the police, but they will have to maintain the records and make them available to police upon their request.

He said if the ordinance is passed by the village council, officers from his department will visit each dealer covered by the ordinance and provide them with a copy of that ordinance. He also said officers will provide them the necessary forms for the required information and answer any questions they might have.

Newman stressed this ordinance will not apply to items that are traded in to a dealer for another item, but strictly for items bought for resale.

Ordinance 90-1 also readjusts the annual business license fees for junk shops, secondhand stores and antique dealers. Business license fees for junk shops and secondhand

stores will decrease from \$100 annually to \$50, while a business license fee for antique dealers increases from \$35 dollars to \$50.

Antique dealers are defined by the ordinance as persons whose primary business is buying and selling pieces of furniture or objects made at least 50 years ago.

Pawnbrokers will still be required to pay an annual business license fee of \$100. But, Ordinance 90-1 will also require pawnbrokers to execute a bond before a license can be granted.

Ordinance 90-1 says no junk dealer, secondhand or hold pawnbroker can store or hold merchandise at any other location in the village other than the one specified on the license. All locations have to be approved.

The penalty for anyone violating without a license or violating any provisions of the ordinance is a fine of not less than \$5 and not more than \$500 for each offense. A separate offense can occur on each day during which a violation occurs or continues.

Maddox said if the council passes Ordinance 90-1, it will become law five days after it is published in *The Ruidoso News*.

# January building permits hit \$398,950

January is a slow month in the building industry, primarily because of weather.

But January 1990 saw \$398,950 in building permits issued by the Village of Ruidoso. That compares to only \$198,855 in January of 1989.

Permits issued in December 1989 totaled \$367,129.

Only one permit for a single family dwelling was issued in January of this year. It was for a house in Alto Unit 5.

The big item for last month was residential additions and alterations. The total was \$321,915. One other permit was for a foundation at \$1,220. Another was a commercial permit by Pioneer Savings for "repair and replace" at \$5,000.


Permits for single family dwellings hit a whopping \$321,915 in December 1989. A year ago in January the figure was only \$55,000.

Residential additions and alterations in December added up to

\$49,650; in January of 1989, the total was \$143,355.

## Trustee candidates describe their objectives on issues

### Jack Pogue

Jack Pogue would like to be re-elected as a Capitan Trustee for another four-year term.

Pogue sees long-term planning for future growth in Capitan as one of the major issues facing the village. Completion of the water and sewer projects and the efficient operation of the municipal government are other issues as well.

"I wanted to complete the projects started by this administration for the good of the village," Pogue said as his reason for running for re-election.

As a goal, Pogue wants to keep the village government running as cheaply and efficiently as possible. He believes a review and revision process of village ordinances is necessary, as well as the continuation of updating the Village Personnel Policy.

"My philosophy on government is that we have too much, and that with more citizen participation, we can lower the cost and increase the efficiency of our government," said Pogue in a prepared statement.

Pogue also served as the chairman on the Emergency Water

Board in 1983, and was chairman of the Water Advisory Board in 1986. He said he has 28 years experience in federal service, half of which was administrative or supervisory. He said he has an equivalent degree in business administration.

Pogue and his wife, Virginia, moved to Capitan after he retired 18 years ago. He said he worked with the Civic Improvement Organizations in El Paso, Texas, for many years and attended hundreds of council meetings. He also served for a short period on the El Paso Advance Planning Board.

Pogue said he believes he should give something in return to Capitan after living here.

### Alfred LeRoy Montes

Alfred LeRoy Montes has been a civil servant for 25 years and believes this experience will assist him if elected as a Capitan village trustee for a two-year term.

Montes said he was a municipal judge for four years, and a magistrate judge for eight years. He was also a policeman and was employed in management at the state Health and Environment Department.

"I feel that with my past experience with the general public and knowledge of our community, I would be able to make better decisions for the improvement of our village," he said in a prepared statement.

Montes believes the sewer system should be a village priority

The water situation has progressed well, he believes, but the village needs to go forward to meet future needs, he said.

Montes said also he hopes in the future the village will be able to have two policemen.

"I will examine all other issues and act according to true facts for the betterment of the village," he said.

Montes and his wife, Rose, have lived in Capitan for more than 25 years. They have three children. He presently works at the Alto Village Service Corporation. He has an associate's degree in business administration.

### Mryl Ray

Mryl Ray is running for re-election as a two-year term village trustee in Capitan. She believes there is unfinished business in Capitan to be completed and wants to be a part of this process.

Priorities given by Ray are the village water system and sewer system, paving of streets, new street lights and sidewalks.

"The only way we can get this done is for the village people to work together," said Ray in a prepared statement.

Improved communication between village departments will be a goal for Ray. She believes that will enhance the completion of major village projects.

She would also like to see the village Police Department upgraded.

Ray is a retired farmer, rancher and housewife after 46 years and has lived in Capitan for two and one-half years. She said she has 20 years experience working with community projects and clubs. She is a high school graduate. She worked with the Carlsbad Chamber of Commerce for six years and has served as a Capitan trustee for 18 months.

### Jimmy D. Wright

Greater involvement of Capitan residents with their local government is one of trustee candidate Jimmy D. Wright's goals if he were elected to a four-year term.

"Something needs to be done about the apparent apathy shown by a majority of Capitan residents," said Wright in a prepared statement. "I want to be their voice at Capitan trustee meetings."

Other objectives Wright would like to accomplish include reinstating the status of volunteers which are essentially the backbone of a small municipality, work toward alleviating Capitan's sewage and solid waste disposal problems and replacing aging water lines and working with other entities involved to straighten out problems concerning water for Capitan.

Wright's relevant experience includes two terms as past president of the Lincoln County EMT Association, past chairman of the Capitan Planning and Zoning Committee, current secretary/treasurer of the Capitan Volunteer Fire Department and an active member since 1976, and a certified and licensed EMT basic since 1977. Wright is also an inactive member of both the

Alpha Zeta and Phi Kappa Phi honors fraternities.

Born in Lovington, Wright has lived in Capitan since 1960. He and his wife, Linda, have two children. He was a graduate of Capitan High School in 1970. He earned a bachelor of science degree in agriculture from NMSU in 1975, and an associate's degree in electronic technology from ENMU-Roswell in 1989.

### Lawrence W. Brinkley

Lawrence W. Brinkley believes he has unique assets to offer Capitan that will enhance his performance as a village trustee if elected to a four-year term.

"I believe my qualifications will enhance our village's efforts to solve the problems at hand," said Brinkley in a prepared statement.

Brinkley sees the village sewer and water systems, village streets, and law enforcement in the village as the main issues facing Capitan.

To address each of these issues, Brinkley plans to utilize long-range planning, alternative funding resources, such as grants, and to use local resources to help the law enforcement issue.

Brinkley has lived in Capitan for eight years. He is married and he and his wife, Dorraine, have two

children and are expecting a third. He earned an associate's degree at NMMI in criminal justice and was commissioned as a second lieutenant U.S. Army. Brinkley is currently a captain in the Army Reserve.

Brinkley has 10 years experience in law enforcement with such departments as the Roswell Police Department, Capitan Police Department and the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department. He said he has received continuing education courses in criminal justice from UNM and from Northwestern University in Chicago, Illinois.

He is presently the branch president in Lincoln County for the Church of Jesus Christ Latter Day Saints.



The fourth period was "junk" time for the Warriors. They wasted little time letting the Indians know they were not going to let the lead slip away.


Brantley opened the quarter by drilling a three-pointer from outside and the Warriors led 55-44.

The Lady Warriors were eight for 20 from the field in the third quarter when they pulled away from Cobre. For the whole game, they shot 32 percent from the field.


The junior varsity Lady Warriors also won on Tuesday night, blowing away the Indians 59-35.



### Joe Skier says...

## Don't sit back in powder

If you weren't at Ski Apache this weekend you missed some mighty fine skiing. The powder was fresh, deep and fluffy and the New Mexico sun was radical.

Powder skiing is a different animal to most skiers who are accustomed to groomed slopes. In fact, many skiers believe they must greatly alter their technique in order to turn in the fluff. Comments such as "How do you turn in this stuff?" or "I can't ski in powder," are heard frequently on powder days. However, a skier need not make any dramatic changes in technique to successfully navigate powder.

The old skier's tale that you sit back on your skis for powder is a bunch of baloney.

Because you are an intelligent skier you know that a lesson is the best way to learn to ski powder, but the third factor in smooth turns is also very helpful for deep snow skiing, whether it be powder or crud.

You now know that it is necessary to keep even pressure on the foot with your butt above—not behind—your heels. You also know to keep the knees bent and slightly ahead of the toes, putting slight pressure against your shin. Now you're ready for the third part of turning: unweighting.

Start again by watching other, good skiers. Notice the really smooth and sure skiers have a slight up-and-down motion in their body while turning. It is especially noticeable with racers as they approach a gate. Add this technique to your turns and you will be ready for any type of condition or terrain.

Begin on an easy slope. Ski in large traverses across the slope and continuously crouch down and jump upward again with enough force you lift your skis off the snow. Try and jump as many times in a row as possible. Don't worry about feeling silly. You are an intelligent skier who wants to improve, remember?

The key is to be able to lift the entire ski off the slope in this stage of the drill. If you lift only the back of your skis you will be in trouble. For example, if you develop the habit of only lift the back of your skis while turning,

your tips will be forced downward. In deep snow the tips will become buried and you will fall. The same will happen in the bumps. But by unweighting the entire ski you create an instance of weightlessness to enhance turning smoothness and speed.

When you feel as though you are consistently lifting the entire ski off the snow, proceed to this next drill.

Begin with a wide traverse, crouch down very low, but keep your chest upward, not parallel to the snow. At the moment you would initiate your turn, plant your pole down the fall line and jump up into the air attempting to lift your skis off the snow. If you're really strong, complete your turn as far as possible in the air. When you land, go down back into the crouch position, ski across the slope, then do the same to initiate your next turn.

Here you are trying to develop the up-and-down motion to an extreme to experience the feel of lifting your entire ski. You will also notice if you are leaning back on your skis, you will fall on your butt when you land, and if you're leaning too far forward, your tips will drag in the snow also causing you to fall. You don't have to use your pole, though it may help with timing.

After you reach the point where you can lift the entire ski and then land smoothly, combine the other factors in the turn; even pressure, knee into the turn. When you raise upward, keep the ski on the snow but still get that feeling of lift when you initiate the turn. Float the ski from one edge to the other by shifting your weight with your knees, but keep the upper body facing the fall line. If you are an intermediate skier, continue to exaggerate

the upward and downward motion and gradually go from long, wide turns to short narrow turns. Remember, upward right at the point of initiating the turn, downward as you complete the turn.

Unweighting is very useful in the powder. When you master this technique, you will find leaning back on the skis in powder is actually a hindrance to your turns, not a facilitator. Leaning back may cause your tips to float better on the powder, and may actually make a turn easier for at most two turns, but your weight will continue to fall behind and your skis will go out from under you.

Always remember the first rule of skiing: your skis want to go down hill, so you might as well go with them.

By practicing the motion in an extreme way will also help in the powder. If you can lift the entire ski off the groomed slope, you can just about lift yourself through the powder.

Unweighting will also make the humps easier. And just like with the powder, if you only lift the backs of your skis, you tips will drive right into a bump sending you head-over-heels.

Another thing about powder is turning gets easier the faster you go. That's why a skier faces the fall line: always. Traversing in powder is very difficult because you never build up enough speed to float to the top. Don't worry about going too fast; it's almost impossible to do. Combine the three factors in a turn; even pressure on the foot, initiate with the knee and slight pressure on the shin, unweight at the start of a turn and come down at the end. And don't forget to face the fall line while keeping the upper body still and you will be gliding through the fluff like a real pro.

Awesome!

Do you find yourself turning like a true pro for about six to eight turns, then having the unnerving feeling you are losing control? Or do you have the feeling your skis are going faster than you are? Next week, improving your control with your pole plants

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
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# All American Ball to help local charity


MacBeth was a jockey who died of cancer in 1987. "This year we want to designate

**RUST PROTECTION**

Consider you have just bought a brand new car, you just cannot help but think of how beautiful it is. Although it was a very large investment you took the plunge and ordered it just the way you wanted it. It is truly an extension of your personality and success.

Even though the manufacturer has warranty covering the paint, surface rust and rust perforation, it will not cover appearance. It is your responsibility to maintain the body and paint to keep them looking like new for along as you own the car.

This task starts the day you buy the new vehicle. Whether to have it rust proofed, the paint sealed or the upholstery treated are decisions you make right away.

In order to make the right decisions about protecting your investment, you need to know exactly what the warranty will or will not cover, how long it is covered, how long you intend to keep the vehicle and how severe the environment in the area you live will be on your vehicle.

**WARRANTY:** Since warranty coverage varies from one manufacturer to another, you should ask the selling dealer representative to spell out the complete warranty coverage on the vehicle of your choice.

Be sure that you understand coverage and limitations in regard to surface rust perforation, rust caused by road salt and/or nicks in the paint. Also deterioration or damage due to industrial or environmental fall-out, resulting in paint pitting, flaking or discoloration. Finally, deterioration of trim an upholstery caused by the sun, rain or extreme temperatures.

Refer to the owners manual for information regarding the manufacturers recommended care procedures. Also ask the dealer representative about any additional, **FACTORY APPROVED**, information about protecting your investment.

If you decide to purchase extra, extended protection for your new vehicle, be sure to check out the added warranties. It is also a good idea to check with the Better Business Bureau to be sure the product and company responsible for application of the product have a good track record, including a reasonable time in the business.

Individuals or companies that purchase new vehicles every two or three years usually do not purchase extended warranties of any kind as the manufacturers warranty is almost always adequate. On the other hand, people that hang onto vehicles for a number of years usually do, and should, consider extended warranties.

Even though the manufacturers have made great strides toward longer vehicle life, such as one or two sided galvanized sheet metal, electrodeposition of organic coatings, improved clear coat paints and more durable materials for trim and interior parts, they still require care. For example, there can be up to twenty-five areas of the vehicle that are not covered by manufacturers warranty for rust perforation.

# P&Z approves four requests Monday

The Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) met in a regularly scheduled meeting on Monday, approving four requests and tabling one other request.

The commission unanimously approved a request by Jessie L. Locke for a replat at Lot 1 and the west 75 feet of Lot 2, of Palmer Gateway Subdivision (142 Paradise Canyon Drive).

The applicant wants to combine three lots into two and designate them lots 1A and 2A. Both lots are zoned R-1 single family and exceed the 10,000 foot minimum lot size. Lot 1A would comprise 48,003 feet and Lot 2A would comprise 20,081 feet.

Commissioners tabled a request by Clifford R. Hicks for a conditional use at Lot 12A, Block 4,

Young Heights Subdivision (206 Porr Drive).

According to Hicks' agent, Cindy Lynch, he wants to construct a garage on the lot for the purpose of storing a recreational vehicle, before constructing a residence on the lot. Lynch said the house will be built on the lot within a year. She also said Hicks wants to build a metal structure.

Commissioners informed Lynch that an uncovered metal structure is not allowed by ordinance. Planning administrator Cleatus Richards said there was one objection to the conditional use filed with his office by the property owner to the west.

P&Z tabled the request to allow Lynch to have further discussions with Hicks and try and work out the objections with the neighboring property owner.

P&Z unanimously approved a request by Marion and Kathleen Raglin for a variance at Lot 9, Block 17, Town and Country North Subdivision.

The applicants asked for a front yard variance to allow construction of a carport to within three to six feet of the front property line. The applicant presented an amendment to the variance which would only place the carport to within 10 feet of the property line.

Commissioners also approved a request by Dr. Christopher Robinson for a variance and commercial site development at the north half of Lot 16 and Lot 17, Block 7, Palmer Gateway Subdivision (125/127 El Paso Road).

The applicant requested the side yard variance of five feet along the east property line. The property is zoned C-2 Community Commercial

which required a 10 foot side yard. Robinson is proposing to construct a 30-foot by 60-foot medical office building and parking to accommodate a minimum of 14 spaces. An existing 26-foot by 36-foot building on the site will be relocated on the property.

Planning administrator Cleatus Richards had some problems with the site development plan and present a revised plan to the commission. Richards' problems mainly dealt with the proposed parking area along El Paso Road at the front of the property. In Richards' revised plan, the buildings on the property would have been placed further back on the lot, allowing for angled parking in front and more room for cars to turn around before entering El Paso Road.

Robinson and Tim Collins, who drew up the site development, said

they could not live with the way the revised plan was redrawn.

Robinson said he wants the buildings where he proposed to allow for future expansion for a possible future partner. He said the parking area in the front would be designated for staff parking and those people would not be coming and going as much as the regular patients.

Commissioners asked Robinson if he would mind the parking being angled in the front of the property and he replied he would not. They then approved Robinson's commercial site development with the compromise that the parking spaces in front of the property be angled and designated for staff only.

In a report to the commission, Richards reviewed several addi-

tional amendments to the village's code. One would triple the fines on a person if there is work continues after a project is red tagged by the building inspector. Some of the other amendments dealt with the way P&Z will have to conduct its meeting. The meetings will have to be conducted more like a court, with witnesses sworn in by the chairman, because of a recent court case involving P&Z meetings in Albuquerque.

These and other code amendments will be discussed in a public hearing at the March 5, P&Z meeting.

This was the first commission meeting for new member Janet Reed, who was appointed to the P&Z by Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr. on January 30.

## Downs trustee candidates identify problems

Trustee Wilma L. Webb is seeking a four-year term on the Ruidoso Downs board of trustees.

Webb has served on the board for the past two years and five months. She works at Fort Stanton Hospital and Training School.

A 43-year New Mexico resident, Webb has lived in Ruidoso Downs for 15 years. Webb is a former village clerk and billing clerk, and lists her knowledge of municipal government as a reason for seeking the office.

"People in the village asked me to run again due to my involvement the past two years," said Webb.

Webb identified environmental issues, mainly landfills, economic development and extension of the village sewer lines as major issues in the campaign. She said she will work with the county and state environmentalists to obtain a landfill permit. She also said she'll address the garbage problem with recycling.

Webb wants to see small industry locate in Ruidoso Downs and

will work to get grants to achieve that goal.

Webb said she's seen the Downs through some ups and downs and believes the village is on the way up again.

"We need a governing body working together, along with the residents' involvement, to get things done," said Webb. "We especially need to know what the citizens want for Ruidoso Downs and respond to that need."

### Jim Rethmel

James D. "Jim" Rethmel is running for a two-year term on the Ruidoso Downs board of trustees.

Rethmel, a deputy with the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office, has

lived in Ruidoso for a year and a half. He has lived in New Mexico for 20 years.

Rethmel has a degree in criminal justice from East Los Angeles College.

"I feel that there needs to be new, positive changes in the Ruidoso Downs Municipal Government," said Rethmel. "There are a number of issues that need to be changed from the course that is being taken by the present council."


Rethmel believes getting the landfill issue settled is the main issue in this campaign, followed by cooperating with other government agencies and settling the investigation being conducted by the district attorney's office of the Village of Ruidoso Downs and its employees.

Rethmel proposes to work with

other agencies in solving the landfill problem and further suggests that all county government agencies meet to discuss common problems. Rethmel suggests the board meet with the DA to correct any problems identified during the investigation.






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# Chamber board shops for art festival location

The new airport, Ruidoso Downs Race Track property and the True Value building on Mechem have emerged as primary possibilities as the site for the 1990 Art Festival in Ruidoso next July.

Steve Keller heads a committee studying possible sites after the old airport site became unavailable because of other uses.

The Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce board of directors heard pros and cons concerning the possible sites at a regular meeting, Wednesday afternoon at the Chamber.

Further analysis will be accomplished to consider parking problems and other handicaps at each of the sites.

During the Wednesday meeting, board members affirmed Tony Wilcoxson as the new chairman of the chamber's advertising committee.

Ron Wall was affirmed as the chamber representative on the board of directors of the Economic

Development Corporation of Lincoln County.

Attention was called to the Carson and Barnes Circus which will be coming to Ruidoso Downs, Good Friday, April 13. Proceeds will be split between the chamber and the Ruidoso-Lincoln County Crimestoppers.

Tickets will be \$7 for adults and \$4 for children.

The circus is described as the largest traveling circus in the United States, boasting, among other attractions, a couple of dozen elephants, according to Mary Maul who reported on the circus project.

The subject arose again of possibly joining Sun Country, a consortium of communities collectively promoting portions of southern New Mexico and El Paso and Juarez.

Wilcoxson said he believes Ruidoso would be better served by forming our own region. There is so much here to draw tourists.

State matching funds for tourism apparently are going more

to regional entities such as Sun Country. He indicated this area could have its own region.

Wilcoxson said there is a "community of interest" running from Alamogordo on the south, to San Patricio on the east and Carrizozo or beyond on the north.

"We can't keep everything in the Village of Ruidoso; Carrizozo, the Valley of Fires, the race track, the Inn of the Mountain Gods, all have a community of interest," he said.

He said the Inn of the Mountain Gods is known world-wide, and he believes people who stay there spend money in Ruidoso.

"There is a lot of feeling that we should keep everything within the village. I don't think we can do that," he said.

Roy Crocker commented that the EDCLC operates on the regional concept, that development is sought for all communities in the county.

Jerry Watts, executive director of the chamber, said he is excited about possibly acquiring a "900 number" system for the chamber.

Under the system, incoming inquiries to the chamber would provide income at so-much per call.

Callers could indicate by code what questions they would want answered via tapes, such as track information, retirement information or a list of special events.

Mary Maul reported that the quest for \$100,000 from the New Mexico Legislature for developing a master plan for midtown Ruidoso is "looking good."

She said a bicycle race planned for April has been scaled back to a one-day affair.

Roy Crocker, who presided over the meeting, said that a contract between the Convention and Visitors Bureau and the Village of Ruidoso must be renewed by June 30. A letter of intent is due 90 days before that date, he said.

He said there will be some changes in the contract because of questions centering on the civic events center which should be constructed within the year after July 1.

Crocker said the question of who will manage the facility must be answered.

Tracey Moran, who heads the CVB, said that 507 of 1,000 tickets had been sold for the Connoisseur Classic set for later this month.

Chamber directors will attend a mid-year workshop from 2 to 4 p.m. Friday, February 9, at the Inn at Pine Springs Canyon.

Crocker said one purpose will be a mid-year budget review.

"We want to see where we've been and where we're going," he said.

Watts reported on the Apache Trail project. A further organizational meeting is set for February 8.

Crocker said he is impressed with how quickly the new executive director of the Chamber, Watts, has "got a grasp" on chamber matters.

He said Watts' style of management "is going to be all to the good."

## Lincoln County businesses may be eligible for federal disaster loans

WASHINGTON (AP)—Businesses in eight New Mexico counties can apply for federal loans to help them recover from losses caused by severe hail storms last August.

Small agricultural related businesses and small agricultural cooperatives in Bernalillo, Guadalupe, Lincoln, San Miguel, Santa Fe, Socorro, Torrance and Valencia counties are eligible for the Economic Injury Disaster Loans.

Last August's storms hurt farmers and ranchers and caused

sales to plummet at various businesses which sell products and services to farmers and ranchers," Rep. Bill Richardson, D-N.M., said Friday. "This government program will help New Mexico's agriculture-dependent businesses get back on their feet."

The Small Business Administration has been authorized to accept

and process the applications. Under the program, the loans will be given at a four percent interest rate.

The deadline for applying is Aug. 14.

Farmers and ranchers are not eligible to apply for the loans, but may qualify for assistance under already announced loan programs.



## EDITORIAL

New Mexico lawmakers have passed two bills that could help save the lives of many New Mexico women. Bills have passed in both the Senate and the House that would mandate group health providers to pay for mammogram examinations. We hope the two houses concur on one of those bills and the governor signs it into law.

Breast cancer, easily detected during the early stages, is a major threat to women between the ages of 35 and 75. Mammograms can identify the deadly disease in time to begin the very successful treatment. But, because of the \$100 to \$200 cost, many women haven't been able to take advantage of the mammogram testing.

Senator Tim Jennings of Roswell sponsored a bill that passed the Senate, and Representative Pauline Eisenstadt of Corrales sponsored a bill on the House side, both requiring insurance companies to cover the cost of mammograms.

Ruidoso's Representative Ben Hall said individuals and groups for and against the proposal have been lobbying hard at the Roundhouse. Hall said he objects to the House version because the insurance deductible still would apply, so the cost still could put the test out of reach for many women.

Insurance lobbies are trying to convince lawmakers that the companies shouldn't have any of their coverage mandated. Apparently the strong insurance lobby believes the matter of coverage is between the provider and the payee, and the state should keep hands off. But, those same companies don't mind having auto insurance mandated through the state. Having the state mandate customers for them is a different matter than having the state tell insurance companies what to do.

Let's encourage our lawmakers to require group medical insurance providers to pay for mammograms and other lifesaving tests that will save lives through early disease detection. In the long run such tests save money that would be spent in treating the diseases at later stages.—fj



## The Plant Corner by Sally Black

### DEAR SALLY:

You have written a couple of columns about plant pests. I have enjoyed them and saved them. Now, would you, please, do a column about plant diseases and the cures?

I started growing a Bromeliad after your column March 30, 1989. The plant is doing fine, but I have a little tid-bit to pass on to you, just in case you didn't know it.

Put an apple in a plastic sack along with the Bromeliad plant; use a twist-turn on the top (only open to water). The apple will produce a certain acid to make the plant bloom again in only 30 days. I have tried this and believe it or not, it really works.

I look forward to your column every week. Thank you for all your help, Sheila M.

### DEAR SHEILA M.:

Thanks for all the kind words and the apple trick. I can hardly wait to try.

Bad housekeeping and not understanding your plants are major causes for plant diseases.

The growing environment—the light, temperature, and humidity that closely resembles the plant's native habitat, encourage strong, healthy growth and reduces the possibility of developing and spreading diseases.

Soil mixing, watering, and fertilizing should be specific to each plant. Use clean, fresh soil for repotting. You can sterilize used soil by spreading the soil two inches deep in flat pans and bake it in the oven at about 225 degrees for three hours. Stir occasionally and allow it to stand several days before using.

Sterilize all pots to be used the second time with bleach and sun for a few days or you can bake the clay pots in the oven at 225 degrees for a couple of hours. Also, keep all your tools clean with soap and bleach water and wash your hands and gloves often. Remove dead leaves, dust, and decaying matter from the plant and soil. Have good air movement at a proper temperature. All this is "good housekeeping." It must be remembered that prevention is always better than cure. You know the old saying, "an ounce of birds is worth a pound in the bush."

Poor growing conditions will be the number one cause for puny plants. Forestall trouble by regular inspection. Twice-a-month washing and dusting plants provides a good opportunity to scrutinize them. Promptness is the key for the cure. If you recognize the symptoms early, most problems will be easy to correct. Wear your glasses when you check your plants and look on all the stems and under the leaves. And do not overlook the condition of the soil and of the pot itself. For there you can find the discoloration, salty crusts or protruding roots that are a warning of trouble.

Here are a few more common diseases to look for:

**Rust**—A reddish-brown area on the leaves.

Prevention: spray once a week with Thiram or Zineb. Cure: Spray twice a week with Thiram or Zineb.

**Mildew**—Looks powdery or downy. The powdery looks like white dust on the leaves and the downy mildew has more of a fluffy look. Prevention: Dust once every two weeks with sulphur or Thiram. Cure: Provide good air circulation and dust twice a week with sulphur, Thiram or Kethane, or spray once a week with Kethane or Benomyl.

**Root diseases and damping-off**—Wilting of the plant while the soil is still moist, the effects being that of either rotting of the roots or stems. Prevention: Keep the soil and pots sterile with good air circulation and proper growing conditions. Cure: Best to repot with new sterile pot and soil or mix water with Benomyl or orthocide solution poured over the soil every week for three weeks.

Brown leaves can be caused by too much or too little water, too much or too little light, sunscorch, too little humidity and from bruising.

Leaves fade and lower ones yellow and drop and new leaves are small or growth stops is the lack of proper fertilizer. But if new growth is fast but weak and the plant wilts, then it is probably getting too much fertilizer.

This field is much too vast for me to cover. I suggest you buy a good plant disease book and keep it in a handy place to read often.

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## Modern Eye Care

A CHILD'S VIEW

While most information about cataracts focuses on the older patient, some mention should be made of congenital cataracts. This condition may appear in about three births in a thousand. It is the mother who usually notices a clouding of the lens, which may range from a tiny localized opacity to generalized clouding. In this latter case, surgical correction of the cataract is most beneficial if performed during the first months of life. This early action helps to insure that the brain will learn to process visual information properly. If both eyes are affected, the second eye may undergo surgical treatment a mere few months after the first procedure has met with success. It must be pointed out that most congenital cataracts are not dense enough to warrant surgery, nor are they necessarily progressive.
